## AUSTRALIA.—SOUTH COAST.—RIVOLI BAY.

(1.) *Beachport*—Temporary Red Light on Jetty.

The Government of South Australia has given notice, dated 21st October 1880, that during the construction of the new jetty at Beachport, a light would be exhibited from a pole on the north end of the T head:—

The light is a red light, elevated about 18 feet above the sea. Position approximate, lat.  $37^{\circ} 29' 50''$  S., long.  $140^{\circ} 1' 25''$  E.

## EAST COAST.

(2.) *Provisional Fixed Light on Montagu Island.*

## PACIFIC OCEAN.—Notice No. 52.

## SOUTHERN AND WESTERN PARTS.

THE following information relating to various groups of islands and reefs in the south-west part of the Pacific has been received from Lieutenant J. St. C. Bower, H.M.S. *Danae*, Captain J. C. Purvis; and from Lieutenant G. E. Richards, commanding H.M. schooner *Renard* (1879).

[All bearings are magnetic. Variation in 1880. Admiralty Islands and New Britain  $5^{\circ} 10'$  E. Solomon Islands  $8^{\circ} 10'$  E.]

ADMIRALTY ISLANDS.<sup>1</sup>

LA VANDOLA ISLAND is bold, dark colored, between 300 and 400 feet high, and affords a good mark when approaching the Admiralty Islands from the south-east.

JESU MARIA ISLAND.—The western part of Jesu Maria is low, the eastern part is 600 to 800 feet high, well wooded and even-topped; the light in the southern part is not so deep as hitherto shown on the chart, and the island is more regular in shape. A horn of low islands extends to the north-west of Jesu Maria Island.

*San Miguel Islands* are low and thickly wooded.

*Fedarb Islands* are three in number, about 100 feet high, and thickly wooded. The easternmost one has a conical peak about 250 feet high, which is remarkable when the almost unvarying characteristic of these low coral islands is a flat sandy base, with tall even-topped trees.

ST. ANDREW ISLANDS are five in number, and a bushy islet.

*Violet Island*, marking the entrance to St. Andrew Harbor, is about 60 feet high and thickly wooded.

*Waikatoe Island* is the largest of the group, about 70 feet high, and thickly wooded; the village is built out into the water at its south-west end.

*Bull, Broadmead, and Berry Islands* are about 60 feet high, and thickly wooded; *Berry Island* has a tall tree in its centre.

*Violet patch*, lying N.W. by N. 4 cables from *Violet Island*, is a detached patch of live coral, the least water found on which was  $3\frac{1}{2}$  fathoms.

*Caution*.—A small shoal exists about  $1\frac{1}{2}$  miles N.W. of *Violet Island*, it was seen from the *Danae's* mast-head; judging by the color of the water, the shoal probably has over it from 3 to 5 fathoms of water.

*St. Andrew Anchorage*<sup>2</sup> is tolerably well-protected, with room for several vessels, open to the benefits of sea air from whatever direction the wind blows, and at the same time protected from a heavy sea by reefs and foul ground.

The natives appear to be a finer race than the Solomon or New Britain Islanders; they came off in large numbers, eager to barter their obsidian spears and other curiosities for knives and old iron.

*Directions*.—St. Andrew Harbor is easy of access, the centre of *Berry Island* S.S.E.  $\frac{1}{2}$  E. leads up to anchoring ground; let go in 12 fathoms on that bearing, with *Waikatoe* village closing *Bull Island* W.S.W. There is also well-protected anchorage between *Broadmead* and *Berry islands*, but as this part was only partially sounded it should be entered with caution.

*Maitland Islands* are two in number, and remarkably alike in height and appearance.

*St. George's Island* corresponds with the former *Low Island* of the chart. A reef runs out three quarters of a mile off the south-west end of *St. George's Island*; near the end of the reef is a small sandbank always uncovered, which is a good mark; when rounding the reef with an unfavorable sun give it a berth of 3 cables.

*St. Andrew Strait*, situated immediately to the southward of *St. George Island*, has two shoals existing between *Fedarb* and *St. George islands*, but they are out of a mid-channel course through the strait; the dangers to be avoided in *St. Andrew Strait* are the reef off the south-west end of *St. George Island*, the foul ground between the *Maitland* and *St. George islands*, and the small shoal lying about  $1\frac{1}{2}$  miles N.W. of *Violet Island*; the actual position of this last shoal is doubtful.

*St. Patrick Island* is about 600 feet high, and with the exception of a cliff appearing like a haystack; on its north-east coast, has a tolerably even slope from coast to summit.

*Johnston Islands* are three in number and a bushy islet; the islands are about 70 feet high, and thickly wooded.

*Stuart Bank* is a dangerous reef, lying about 5 miles W.  $\frac{1}{2}$  N. from the *Johnston Islands*; vegetation appeared to have commenced to grow on the sand cay, which is about 4 feet above high water.

An *Island*, small and wooded, not previously marked on the chart, about 12 miles S.S.E. from *St. Patrick Island*, was seen from the masthead of H.M.S. *Danae*.

ADMIRALTY ISLAND.—The eastern part was visited by H.M.S. *Danae*, but that vessel did not anchor; off the southern part of the large Admiralty Island is a maze of reefs, requiring the assistance of good sunlight in navigation amongst them.

## NEW HANOVER.

*North Haven*.—At the northern end of the South Barrier Reef a sandbank has formed, and a few bushes have grown, bearing N. by W.  $\frac{1}{2}$  W. distant  $1\frac{1}{2}$  miles from *West Island*.

With a good sun no difficulty was found in picking the 3-fathom passage. Anchorage was found off a clump of large trees in 19 fathoms, where the fringe reef recedes in a bight to the coast line.

Natives came round the ship in large numbers; hoop iron being found the best article of trade, they even prefer it to knives and worked iron.

SAN FRANCISCO ISLAND.—The centre of this island is in lat.  $2^{\circ} 44'$  S., long.  $152^{\circ} 41'$  E., depending on *Ferguson Island* in *Marau Sound*, being in  $160^{\circ} 48' 15''$  E. *San Francisco Island* is about 700 feet high, thickly wooded and even-topped. *San Joseph* and *San Antonio islands* are 4 miles nearer to the north-east end of *Gerrit Denny's Island* than formerly shown on the chart.

NEW BRITAIN.<sup>3</sup>

BLANCHE BAY.—Anchorage.—Good anchorage in 10 fathoms, mud bottom, may be obtained between *Bridges Point* and the salt-water creek, at about a quarter of a mile from the shore. Off the *Observation Spot Spit* of *Greet Harbor*, good anchorage may be had in from 8 to 14 fathoms. Off *Schulze Point*, westward of the reef, fair anchorage in from 10 to 14 fathoms, sand and coral, protected by the reef from any sea setting in from the eastward.

Water.—No fresh water can be obtained on the north side of *Blanche Bay*, except by digging in the sand, and when obtained thus, it is of inferior quality. On the west and south sides of the bay, water may be had, but not in any considerable quantity. At the anchoring ground, northward of *Volcano Island*, water can be obtained from a small running stream situated just to the southward of the anchorage. On the south side of the bay, off the water-holes, a vessel must anchor in 18 fathoms, too close to the shore for safety if northerly breezes should set in.

These streams, however, being small, vessels generally prefer crossing to *Makada Harbor*, *Duke of York Group*, to replenish their stock.

*Supplies* of yams, sweet potatoes, taro, a few fowls and pigs may be procured from the natives, also quantities of eggs of the maloa or bush turkey. Fish are plentiful. There is a German trading station on Matupi Island, from whence coal may be procured.

**DUKE OF YORK ISLANDS.**—This group consists of 13 islands, of which Duke of York Island is the largest. Makada and Ulu are the only others of any size. All the group, with the exception of Makada Island, are low, thickly wooded, and slightly cultivated. Ulu is the only one uninhabited, probably on account of its being considered unhealthy by the natives.

There are three harbors in the group, Makada, Meoko, and Port Hunter. Port Hunter is not to be recommended, on account of its great depth, scarcity of fresh water, and also the difficulty generally experienced in entering and leaving. Makada is the best place for watering, but Meoko affords the best holding ground and the most sheltered anchorage.

**MAKADA HARBOR**, formed by the Island of Makada and the north-west portion of the Duke of York Island, is well adapted for small vessels, and has an average depth of 5 fathoms, over a sandy bottom.

*Anchorage.*—That generally used is off the sandspit (Spit Point) on the east side of Makada Island, in 4 fathoms, sand, about 1½ cables from the beach.

*Directions.*—Vessels entering from the south-westward after rounding Nukukuroo Point at a distance of 2 cables, should steer for the sandpit off Makada Island, thereby clearing the 2½-fathoms patch lying to the southward of it.

In leaving the harbor for the northward, the passage between the two small islands (Myet Islets) may be taken, keeping nearest to the western one, as a fringe reef extends off the eastern, nearly to the centre of the passage. The passage westward of the two small islands is not recommended, as numerous reefs and foul ground render it unsafe.

The passage between Duke of York Island and the eastern Myet Islet is clear of dangers, but the wind is likely to be lost under the land; the current also sets strongly through this passage.

Vessels working into the harbor should not close Watering Point with Spit Point, as that line leads directly over a patch with only 4 feet over it at spring tides, situated W. by S. ½ S. distant one mile from Watering Point.

Water of good quality may be obtained on Makada Island, about 100 yards westward of Watering Point, from a stream in the bush. Low water would be the best time for obtaining it, as the water has to be carried over the reef about 200 yards.

*Supplies.*—Fish, and occasionally pigs and fowls, are brought on board by the natives, but vegetable produce is scarce throughout the Duke of York Islands, barely enough appearing to be cultivated for native consumption.

**MEOKO HARBOR**, also known as Port Wesley, is the best in the Duke of York group, being well sheltered, with good holding ground, and easy of egress or ingress. The harbor is formed by the south side of the Duke of York Island to the northward, the islands of Ulu, Outan, and Meoko to the westward and southward, and a small island to the eastward. There are only two entrances that can be recommended for vessels of any size, the eastern and north-western.

During the south-east trade, the north-west entrance should not be attempted by vessels entering the harbor, as it is impossible to beat against the current, which at that time sets to the northward. In entering by the eastern passage, pass within one cable's length of the small island, thereby avoiding a shoal having two fathoms on it at low water. As soon as the shoal (which can be seen from the mast-head) is passed, steer for, and anchor off the trader's house on Meoko Island, in 5½ fathoms, white sand. This is considered the best anchorage, but anywhere in Meoko Harbor there is good holding ground. The only danger in the harbor is the reef in the centre, which dries at spring tides.

Vessels using the north-west passage must pass between Ulu Island and the island (100 feet high) in the passage, taking care to avoid a small reef of rocks extending south-east from the island just inside the entrance. There is no passage between Duke of York Island and the island in the north-west passage, except for boats, and that only at high water.

*Conflict Shoal* is a dangerous reef, situated in the fairway of the eastern part of the passage between Man Island and New Britain; it is about 150 yards long, in a N.E. and S.W. direction, by 50 yards broad, and partially uncovers at low water. As the coast has not been yet surveyed, it is difficult to assign a correct position to Conflict Shoal; 2½ miles off the New Britain shore appears best suited to the chart.

*Ratavoul Anchorage* is the first anchorage after rounding Cape Stephens, from the eastward. The best position is with two remarkable trees on the beach, bearing S.S.E., distant about a quarter of a mile, in from 10 to 12 fathoms, black sand.

*Supplies* of native produce can be obtained at Ratavoul anchorage, but no fresh water.

*Kabacadaie Anchorage* is with the trader's house about half a mile distant, in 6 fathoms, black sand.

*Supplies* of native produce and fresh water can be obtained here.

**PORT WEBER** has good anchorage off the trader's house, in 18 fathoms sand, about a quarter of a mile from the shore, where good water and native provisions are obtainable.

*Directions.*—In entering Port Weber from the eastward steer for the island to the northward of it, until the extensive reef off Cape Luen is clearly made out, and then shape course for the trader's house, which is about 4 miles westward of it.

*Cape Luen.*—The reef off this cape extends about halfway across to the island, and there are also three detached reefs off the end of the long reef; these reefs can easily be seen from the mast-head.

The western part of the passage between Man Island and New Britain is clear with the exception of Midway Reef, situated in the fairway between the west end of Man Island and the east side of Cape Luen. Vessels are recommended to keep close to Man Island which is clear of outlying reefs. Midway reef mentioned is about 200 yards long, just awash at low-water spring tides, and can be seen from the mast-head.

*Proceeding eastward* from Kabacadaie anchorage, vessels should work along the coast close to between Cape Stephens and Praed Point, thereby avoiding the strong current setting to the eastward in mid-channel, and taking advantage of an eddy current inshore. If intending to visit Duke of York group, it is advisable to stretch across towards Schulze Point and beat up along the coast of New Britain before standing over, as the northerly current is generally strong between Credner Islands and Praed Point.

**WIND AND WEATHER.**—In the Duke of York group and vicinity, the south-east trade wind generally sets in about the end of June or beginning of July, accompanied by heavy squalls and rain.

During the south-east trade, light breezes commence about 8 a.m., and freshen towards noon. The lighter the breeze in the forenoon, the stronger it will be in the afternoon, and as a rule it dies away towards sunset.

If, during the south-east trade, the wind shifts to the northward, rain may be expected.

The south-east trade wind generally finishes about the end of September, and from that time until December, which is the time the north-west monsoon generally commences, variable winds may be expected. In the early part of the north-west monsoon (December and January) the weather is generally squally with rain. February and March bring fine weather, and from March until the south-east trade commences the winds are light and variable.

*Current.*—The prevailing current appears to set to the southward, but it is much affected by the monsoons. After a strong south-east breeze, the current will be found setting to the northward, but if this be succeeded by calms or light breezes, the current will again resume a southerly direction.

Vessels proceeding south during the south-east trade are recommended to keep close to the New Britain coast, thereby taking advantage of an eddy current setting to the southward, and by making short tacks avoid the current in mid-channel. Wide (or Spacious) Bay should be avoided, as the current appears to set strongly into it, and vessels would, probably, find a difficulty in getting out again.

The currents are stronger on the east than on the west side of the Duke of York group. Between that group and the New Ireland coast, the strength of the current is about 2 to 3 knots per hour, and at times probably still stronger.

The barometer rises for eastering in the wind, falls for southing, remains steady with wind at S.E.

#### LOUISIADE ARCHIPELAGO.<sup>1</sup>

**WOODLARK ISLAND.**—H.M.S. *Renard* anchored in a small bay on the north side of Woodlark Island, east and west of which the coasts of the island were examined for a short distance.

*Richards Bay*, in which the *Renard* anchored, has a watering-place, which was ascertained to be situated in lat. 9° 8' S., long. 152° 51' E.

The coast is in general high, and densely wooded to the water's edge, in some parts consisting of perpendicular limestone cliffs.

The *Renard* anchored in 10 fathoms, coral grit, about 60 yards from the beach. This anchorage is exposed to the northward, and would be unsafe in the north-west monsoon.

In the bay to the westward of Richards Bay is the opening to a shallow salt lagoon, about a quarter of a mile broad. Outside the reef in this bay, 10 fathoms, coral grit bottom, may be obtained at a quarter of a mile from the shore. Probably this would be a better temporary anchorage than Richards Bay, as it would be easier to get to sea from with the wind from the northward.

The natives are Papuans, and appeared friendly and unarmed, the greater number that visited the *Renard* speaking several words of English. Very few huts were seen, so that it seems probable that these natives belonged either to the interior or to the south side of the island.

Fresh water abounds in nearly all the small bays, and of very good quality.

*Supplies* obtained consisted of yams and pumpkins, and one or two pigs. A small quantity of turtle shell and some ebony was brought off for barter, tomahawks being the principal articles of trade inquired for.

*Position.*—The extreme north point of Woodlark Island was found to be in lat. 9° 03' 30" S., long. 152° 47' E., or 15 miles further south than has hitherto been supposed.

#### SOLOMON ISLANDS.<sup>2</sup>

**MANNING STRAIT.**—*Soundings.*—The depth in the West Passage, between Cape Labée and the Arnavaon Islands, judging by the appearance of the water, which is clear, is probably not less than 7 fathoms.

*Two Shoals*.—A shoal of about 5 fathoms exists S. by E.  $\frac{1}{2}$  miles from Cape Labée, which should be avoided. Another shoal lies S. E. by S.  $\frac{1}{2}$  S. 7 miles from Cape Labée, at the western extreme of which is about 9 fathoms; this shoal trends to the E. N. E., in which direction there is probably shoaler water.

*Course*.—H. M. S. *Danae* rounded Cape Labée at a distance of 1 $\frac{1}{2}$  miles, in from 9 to 15 fathoms, and stood to the southward, passing between the two shoals above-named, with Cape Labée bearing N. N. W.  $\frac{1}{4}$  W.

**CHOISEUL ISLAND**.—First Cape is the south-east extreme of Choiseul Island, the remaining south-east portion is an archipelago of low wooded islands, running in a tongue, 3 to 7 miles wide, in an E. by S. direction, for 20 miles.

*Cape Labée* is the eastern extreme of a small island, which may be recognized at a distance of 12 miles, by a round haycock-shaped hill, about 250 feet high, on its western side. There are three remarkable rocks to the northward of this haycock, about 80 feet high, rising nearly perpendicularly out of the water.

*Tourea Peak* marks the south-east end of Choiseul Island, or First Cape; as the south-east end of Choiseul is narrow, Tourea Peak is a good mark either from the northward or southward.

**CAPE ALLEN**.—The islands termed Cape Allen and Cape Middleton, formerly marked upon the charts, have no existence.

**WANA WANA ISLAND** is an extensive low island forming the west side of Hathorn Sound on west side of New Georgia Island. Wana Wana Island is divided in two by a channel, but whether navigable for vessels has not yet been ascertained; the eastern and north-eastern edge of this island has a fringe reef, studded with small wooded islets, lying from one to two cables from the main island. Off the western and north-western part of Wana Wana Island, detached islands and small groups of islets are scattered to a distance of 4 miles, interspersed with many reefs and sandbanks.

**COOLAMBANGRA ISLAND** is 16 miles long, in a north and south direction, by 13 miles broad, and has two lofty peaks of about the same height (5000 feet), the southern of which is noticeable on account of its flat level top. Square-top Peak is similarly flat-topped, and being of less height (1600 feet) is not so often enveloped in clouds, and is consequently a better mark. The south-west part of Coolambangra Island, near Blackett Strait, is broken up into innumerable lagoons and coves, one of which is called Ariel Cove. A small islet, 15 feet high, lies one-third of a mile off the south-east part of Coolambangra Island, and at the eastern entrance to Blackett Strait.

*Blackett Strait*, about half a mile wide in the narrowest part, forms a deep clear channel between Coolambangra and Wana Wana Islands.

**GUIZO ISLAND**, 300 to 400 feet high, is low compared with the large neighboring islands. Guizo Island has a fringe of reefs and small islands, lying from a half to two miles off its northern side; its southern side was not approached sufficiently close for detailed description; there are some intricate passages inside the fringing islands known only to traders. A stranger proceeding to Guizo anchorage should approach from the southward, and not risk his vessel amongst the reefs.

*Foul ground* extends for a considerable distance to the westward of Guizo Island, and should be given a good berth when proceeding through Guizo Strait.

*Ferguson Passage* is between the Guizo Islets and the Wana Wana Islets, and so evenly are the islets dispersed between Guizo and Wana Wana that the most careful navigator would be puzzled as to where the passage really existed; however, a guide by which it may be recognized is that the Guizo Islets on the western side of Ferguson Passage are about 40 or 50 feet higher than the Wana Wana Islets, lying on the east side of the passage.

A reef extends off each side from the islets forming Ferguson Passage, which a careful look-out aloft can avoid.

*Wilson Straits* separate Vella Lavella Island from Ronongo Island, and being open to the south-east strong currents and a cross tumbling sea set through them.

*Reef Island* is situated  $\frac{3}{4}$  miles N. N. W. of the north-west point of Ronongo Island, and almost in the centre of Wilson Straits, a reef extends  $\frac{1}{4}$  miles west of Reef Island, and a quarter of a mile east of the same island. There is a clear channel on either side of Reef Island.

*Vella Lavella Island* is 20 miles long, in a N. by W. and S. by E. direction, with a large bight on its western side. Vella Lavella is mountainous, with many peaks from one to two thousand feet in height, but none are very conspicuous.

*Ronongo Island* has a ridge highest in the northern part, where it attains an elevation of about 2000 feet.

*Simbo or Eddystone Island* is also about 2000 feet high.

**NEW GEORGIA ISLAND**.—*Hathorn Sound* situated at the north-west end of New Georgia, which it separates from Wana Wana, is much used by vessels trading to Rubiana; the general depth of the sound is too great for anchoring, but anchorage will be found at its head in 17 fathoms with Pinnacle Island bearing east, distant 2 cables.

*Appearance of the land*.—The land of Wana Wana Island (with the exception of Round Hill) is low and densely wooded, as is also the north-western part of New Georgia Island.

*Round Hill*, about 250 feet high and even-topped, is a good mark to steer for coming from the north-east; it is the highest land in the neighborhood, and is situated immediately westward of Hathorn Sound.

*Directions*.—A mid-noon course should be steered until abreast of Deep Point, when borrow over towards Wana Wana

Island to avoid a long elbow of reef projecting off Cutter Point, keep within 2 cables of the barrier reef extending off Wana Wana Island until Pinnacle Island bears east; drop the anchor midway between the Wana Wana Island reef and Pinnacle Island, taking care to avoid a sunken rock lying  $\frac{1}{4}$  cables W. N. W. of Pinnacle Island.

*The tides* run with considerable strength through the Gutter to Rubiana, following the eastern side of Hathorn Sound by Pinnacle and Gutter islands, but a vessel anchored as above would be in a weak eddy, and out of the strong tideway, which is much to be desired, considering the rough uneven nature of the bottom.

*Cutter to Rubiana* is deep and narrow, but as there are several sunken rocks at the southern part between which a vessel would have to pass to get to Rubiana, it cannot be recommended, unless the navigator is thoroughly acquainted with the locality.

*The north-east part of New Georgia* is an evenly rounded point, the northern extreme of which is in lat.  $7^{\circ} 57' S.$ , long.  $157^{\circ} 31' E.$  Between Marovo opening and the above position the coast is fringed with a barrier reef, on the outer edge of which stand innumerable islets; these islets and barrier are from one to three miles off the main island; between them are many passages and anchorages, and the outer edge of the islets is steep-to.

No difficulty was experienced in steaming along the coast at a distance of three-quarters of a mile.

**FLORIDA ISLAND**.—*Port Purvis* is a large well-protected harbor on the south-west side of Florida Island, which island is divided in two by a channel joining Port Purvis and Mboli Harbor. The general depth of the port is too great for anchoring, but, at its head, south-east of Quoin Hill, good anchorage will be found in 10 to 15 fathoms, mud. Table Rock is the only detached danger in the port; lying about  $\frac{1}{4}$  cables off the western shore; it is always covered. Table Rock and the coral spits projecting off the points were easily distinguished with a good sun.

*Barranago Peak* is sharp, about 400 feet high, and remarkable on account of its slopes being open and partially bare of trees.

*Barranago Island* is about 120 feet high and thickly wooded; it may be recognized by a thumb-shaped islet, about 40 feet high, situated off its western end.

*Directions*.—*Savo Peak* kept astern on a west bearing will lead up to Barranago Island, give south head a berth of 2 cables to avoid the spit running off it, and keep mid-channel up to the anchorage south-east of Quoin Hill. The first time of entering should be with a good sun, and come from aloft, to pick up the position of Table Rock; afterwards a careful navigator may be able to go in or out at any time of day.

*The channel* between Port Purvis and Mboli Harbor<sup>6</sup> is much used by small craft, but large vessels should not attempt it until it has been surveyed.

*Caution*.—The western part of the large bight northward of West and Low islands appeared foul, and should be given a good berth.

**GUADALCANAR ISLAND**.—*Langa Channel* is the name given to the passage along the north coast of Guadalcanar between a bushy islet, Rua Sura Islands, and foul ground, on the one hand, and the coast of Guadalcanar on the other hand.

*Langa* is one of the best anchorages for large ships in the south-east monsoon, between Cape Esperance and Marau Sound; a mud spit, formed by a rivulet, runs off the point, a mile east of Langa village. H. M. S. *Danae* anchored three cables off shore, with the trading huts S. S. E., in 10 fathoms, mud.

*Tesemboko*.—H. M. S. *Danae* anchored 2 miles east of Tesemboko in 11 fathoms, mud, a quarter of a mile off shore; there is similar anchorage anywhere along the north coast of Guadalcanar between Cera Island and long.  $160^{\circ} E.$

*The natives* of Tesemboko appeared eager to trade, coming off in their canoes and making signs to stop off their village.

A small sandy islet, with bushes, marks the western end of Langa Channel. A shoal which occasionally breaks lies 3 miles E. S. E. of the above islet.

*Foul ground* was observed between the islet just described and the Sesarga Island. Vessels should avoid the neighborhood as much as possible.

*Rua Sura Islands* are three in number, steep-to on their southern side, with foul ground to the north-west.

*Malapa Island summit*.—The ridge of Malapa Island, seen from the north-west, appears as a single conical peak, and is a good mark for making Marau Sound, being visible in clear weather, 25 miles.

*Lion's Head*, about 5500 feet high, is a broad-topped, steep-sided mountain, standing out from the main chain of mountains in the central part of Guadalcanar Island.

*Directions for the Langa Channel*.—From Langa, follow the north coast of Guadalcanar, at a distance of one mile, until Rua Sura Islands are sighted, the south extreme of which can then be steered for on an E. by S.  $\frac{1}{4}$  S. bearing. Pass about three-quarters of a mile to the southward of Rua Sura, after which there are no off-lying dangers to the eastward.

**MARAU SOUND**,<sup>7</sup> lying at the east end of Guadalcanar, is composed of numerous islands and coral reefs with many deep passages between them, through which the tides run with great strength and irregularity; there are good anchorages on the western or Guadalcanar side of the sound, well sheltered in either monsoon. The hills, valleys, and islands of Marau Sound are all densely wooded with the high dark trees common to these tropical parts.

*Making the land.*—Approaching Marau Sound from the south-east, Marau Peak is a good mark; it is the extreme of a chain of mountains which form the backbone of Guadalcanar. As the sound is neared, the high ridge of Malapa Island will be made out; the small islands begin to appear at a distance of 12 miles, and at three miles from the entrance, the Barrier Reef and Pigeon Island Peak should be distinguished.

*Barrier Reefs* extend off the islands and main land, which, lying in a somewhat even curve, give a limit to the sound, and form an excellent breakwater. These barrier reefs are generally steep-to on the outside, with the exception of foul ground about East Island.

*Taunu Shoal*, lying one mile to the eastward of South-east Island, is an extensive and dangerous shoal, about three-quarters of a mile in diameter, with many coral heads; judging by its appearance, the least water on the shoal is probably about 2 fathoms.

**MALAPA ISLAND** is the largest island of the group, and has a ridge running down its centre, which seen from the north-west appears as a single conical peak; this ridge is highest in the northern part, dips towards the centre, and rises again in the southern part.

*Pigeon Island Peak*, 365 feet high, is the finger-post for both the north-east and south-east entrances to Marau Sound; it may readily be recognized by several tall detached trees on its summit, which give it a peculiar ragged appearance.

*The flat coral islands* scattered over the south-east part of Marau Sound, and off lying on the north-west part, are much alike, having a flat sandy base, and thick covering of high trees; Ferguson Island, Robbe Island, and East Island have palms.

**KOMACHU ISLAND** is separated from Guadalcanar by a narrow passage; traders report that the general depth in this passage is from 5 to 7 fathoms, with one or two shoal spots of 2 fathoms; this passage should not be used until it has been surveyed, as the discoloured water prevents the shoal spots being easily seen.

**DANAE BAY**<sup>8</sup> is the best and most frequented anchorage in Marau Sound; the tides are not inconveniently strong, and the holding ground is good, in 9 to 15 fathoms, dark sand.

*Entrance Rock* is dangerous, lying in the entrance to Danae Bay; it is about 10 feet in diameter, steep-to on every side, and covered at low water. A cask, with a small pole and flag, were placed on it by H.M.S. *Danae*.

*Jetty.*—There is a small stone jetty inside Jetty Point, off the end of which is a depth of 8 fathoms.

*Fresh water* can be obtained from a creek in the western part of Danae Bay.

*Renard Bay* cannot be recommended, as the holding ground is not good, and the depth uneven.

*Conflict Bay.*—There is good anchorage in this bay in from 8 to 15 fathoms. Conflict Bay has the advantage of fresh air, being open to the south-east trade, though it is probable that, with a strong wind from that direction, the sea caused might be inconvenient for boats.

*Beagle Island* has two conspicuous hills, Halifax Hill and Nipple Peak. Halifax Hill is conical, and appears the same from all directions; Nipple Peak is double, but appears single when seen from the northward.

*Danae Passage* separates Beagle from Komachu Island; it is 75 yards wide and has a sharp turn. There is no danger in the passage beyond the actual banks which are hard coral. H.M.S. *Danae* used this passage when proceeding out to the north-west, but it is not recommended to any vessel not acquainted with the locality.

*North-west Bay*, lying to the west of Beagle Island, is apparently clear of dangers, except in the western part, where there are a couple of islands and a detached reef; there is good anchorage in North-west Bay to the northward of Danae Passage, in from 12 to 15 fathoms, but as mangroves abound it is probably unhealthy.

**DIRECTIONS for Marau Sound.**—Unless the Emerald Rocks are properly marked, no stranger should attempt the south-east entrance without a good sun.

Pigeon Island Peak bearing N.N.W.  $\frac{1}{2}$  W. will lead up to the entrance which can be easily made out, as the Barrier Reef shows plainly, a vessel can pass either side of Emerald Rocks; but the passage to the west, leaving Emerald Rocks on the eastern, and Ferguson Island Reef on the western side, is to be preferred. The route to the east of Emerald Rocks is equally broad, but the tides run through the eastern channels with a strength sometimes of 4 knots, which would influence a vessel's course considerably.

*Ferguson Island Reef* is steep-to, shows well, and can be approached boldly; keep in mid-channel between Ferguson Island and Pigeon Island to avoid the shoal spit off Fintry Point, pass Jetty Point at a distance of one cable, and anchor in Danae Bay conveniently clear of Entrance Rock.

*Passage.*—There is a passage between Ferguson Island and the main land, with a patch of 4 fathoms at its south end; this passage is narrow but not difficult, as the reefs show well.

*Cormorant Entrance.*—A vessel can proceed into the sound and up to Danae Bay by using Cormorant Entrance and Wodehouse Passage, passing either side of Pigeon Island. The chief dangers to avoid in this route are a two-fathom spit lying S.E.  $\frac{1}{2}$  S., 7 cables from East Island, and another two-fathom spit extending 3 cables W. by S. from Square Island, after passing which the remaining reefs show clearly.

*Emu Entrance*, to the southward of Square Island, should not be used until it has been further examined, as there are one or two shoals lying in it.

*Harbor Reef*, lying  $1\frac{1}{2}$  cables east of Harbor Point, is covered at high water, there is 9 fathoms in the narrow channel between Harbor Reef and Harbor Point, through which channel the tides run with great strength. Vessels should not anchor in the strong eddies to the southward of Harbor Reef, as they would be liable to trip their anchors.

*Wilson Islands* are clustered together in the centre of Marau Sound to the northward of Pigeon Island; they are surrounded by a reef through which there is no passage.

*Beaver Shoals* are two dangerous shoals, lying on the west side of the north-east entrance; there is from 7 feet to 3 fathoms, coral, on the shoals, with 20 fathoms between them; they sometimes break.

*North-east Entrance* is the safest and best entrance to Marau Sound; it can be used with care at any time of day; the chief dangers to avoid are the Beaver Shoals, the other reefs show well.

Approaching from the north-west, keep Square Island well open of East Island S.E.  $\frac{1}{2}$  E., which clears all dangers to the northward, until the leading mark Pigeon Island peak in line with the east end of Somayu, S.  $\frac{1}{2}$  E. comes on, steer in on this bearing until East Island is shut out by Malapa Island S. 60° E., when the vessel will be to the southward of the Beaver Shoals, and a S.S.W. course can be steered for Harbor Hill, of Komachu Island, keeping the Beagle Island coast aboard (which can be approached to a cable's length) until abreast of Renard Bay, when steer for the N.W. end of Pigeon Island, which should be passed at a distance of about a cable to avoid Harbour Reef. Pass Jetty Point at a distance of one cable, and anchor as convenient in Danae Bay.

*Caution.*—Until the marks are well defined by beacons, the navigator must be careful to keep Pigeon Peak in entering Marau Sound by the north-east channel exactly in line with the east extreme of Somayu Island.

*Wolverene Channel.*—The reefs of North and Round islets are steep-to and show well, they may be approached boldly; the neighbourhood of Reid Island should be avoided on account of its sunken dangers. Purvis Point reef shows plainly and should be kept close on board if using the Wolverene Channel, until past the dangerous Beaver Shoals. Wolverene Channel has many disadvantages when compared with the broad straight north-east entrance, and cannot be recommended.

*Tides of Marau Sound* are strong and irregular, greatly depending on the season of the year. It is high water, full and change, at about 9 or 10 p.m.; one tide in 24 hours, springs rise 3 ft. 6 in. The stream runs through the deep passages with a strength of from one to four knots, sometimes retaining the same direction for days together.

Traders state that the water is generally higher in the north-west monsoon, consequently the reefs being more covered are more difficult to see at that season.

*Local attraction.*—The compass of H.M.S. *Danae* was observed to be considerably affected when passing the south-east end of New Ireland and Bougainville Island.

**INDISPENSABLE REEFS.**<sup>9</sup>—*North Reef.*—The opening on the west side of North Reef is situated 3 miles to the southward of the two conspicuous rocks which mark the north-west point of the reef.

*Middle Reef.*—From its south end Middle Reef trends gradually to the westward and northward for 17 miles, where it terminates.

The passage between Middle and South Reefs is about 2 miles across.

*South Reef* is 13 miles long and about 5 miles across, and its southern extreme is embraced in the following limits:—South point, lat. 13° 2' S., long. 160° 31' E.; south-east point, lat. 13° 0' S., long. 160° 36' E.

NORTH-WESTERN PART.

THE following remarks on Marshall and Caroline islands, by Mr. J. Bray, master of the missionary packet *Morning Star*, published by the United States Bureau of Navigation, are now republished.<sup>10</sup>

MARSHALL ISLANDS.<sup>11</sup>

*Mulgrave or Millis* is a large group of islands, with a wide passage on the eastern side to the lagoon. Between this eastern passage and the north-west point of the group there are eight other good passages for large ships. The best anchorage is at the south-east end of the lagoon, in 8 fathoms of water.

*Majuro or Arrousmith Island.*—Besides the wide passage given at about the centre of the north side of the island, there is another good passage, on the same side, and about 3 miles from the west.

*Arhno* has a greater extent of land than any other reef in the Ratak chain. It is of a singular shape, and has a vast extent of reef, most of which is covered with iron-wood, cocoa-nut, and bread-fruit trees. There are three passages on the north side, about a half-mile apart. The highest wooded islet of the reef is between two of them.

Most of the coral islands are remarkably free from any shoal water outside of the reef. Extending from *Arhno*, however, probably 2 miles from the north point, there are soundings from 6 to 60 fathoms, and it is not an uncomfortable place to anchor for a night in quiet weather. The trader's house is situated on the south-west side of the island. There is a safe anchorage, during the trade-wind season, in 20 fathoms of water at this outside part of the island. It is not over 200 yards from the shore. The *Morning Star* laid at this anchorage one night. The lagoon is deep, and has few places with less than 22 fathoms of water, and from that to 60 fathoms.

*Arwh*.—We entered through a passage about 200 yards wide, near the south-east end of the island. There is a shoal place across this passage with only 2½ fathoms on it at low water. On leaving the lagoon, we came out through one of the five passages we found through the north-west reef, four of which are wide and deep.

*Maloelab*.—Near the north-west end there is a passage half a mile wide, but it has three coral patches in it. From the north-west end to the south-west end there are eight good passages, several of which the vessel passed through.

*Namorik* has a small lagoon, but no entrance to it, and no anchorage anywhere around the island. In good trades we sometimes place a kedge upon such reefs and lie to it.

*Jaluit Island* has become the most important part of Micronesia. There is a good wide passage upon the south-east side; a deep narrow passage through a long stretch of reef on the west side; and three good passages, near each other, upon the north-east side.

Upon the first islet, north of the south-east passage, are the head-quarters of two large trading firms, that have small vessels trading between nearly all the islands in the North Pacific. Large quantities of coral are shipped to Europe by these two firms. This is a good place for a ship to recruit, as all kinds of provision and plenty of good water are always on hand.

*Coal*.—The German Government has also established a coaling station here for her men-of-war in this part of the ocean.

*Ebon*.—There is but one passage to the lagoon, and it is the most difficult one I have yet found in the group. It is on the south-west side of the island. The tide rushes in and out of this passage with great force, and it is only safe for a vessel to enter at the beginning of the flood or last of the ebb, as there is great danger of being swept against the steep coral walls that are upon each side of the passage whenever the tide is high enough to run over the reef. There is good anchorage in any part of the lagoon. The depth of water varies from 5 to 28 fathoms. There are several small coral patches, and it is not safe to sail in any lagoon without a bright sun, as many of these shoals cannot be distinguished otherwise.

#### CAROLINE ISLANDS.<sup>12</sup>

*Reef*.—In lat. 7° 25' N. and long. 156° 28' E., upon some charts a small reef is placed as doubtful. I sighted it in that position during this voyage and ran past it. There is a low growth of bushes upon it. It does not extend from *Bordelaise* bank as some suppose.

[This reef which was formerly placed in lat. 7° 21' N., long. 156° 29' E., on the Admiralty charts, was expunged on the authority of Mr. Hamilton, master of the British barque *Fire Queen*.<sup>13</sup> It has now been restored to the chart in the position given by Mr. Bray.]

*Losap* is a beautiful lagoon free from shoals, and has a depth of about 16 fathoms. There is a narrow passage upon the eastern reef very much like that at *Ebon*, and it should be used only in the same manner. Upon the western reef there are six passages. Some of them, however, have rocks in them with not more than 2½ and 3 fathoms of water on them, and one I found with only 9 feet. They can be seen from aloft. The best passage, and the one we used in the *Morning Star*, is the one to the south of the only large sand bank upon the reef. At the north-east end of the lagoon there is a small lagoon within a lagoon. There is good anchorage there in 8 fathoms of water.

*Uruville*, properly called *Nama*, is a small island 12 miles N.W. of *Losap*, without any lagoon, and considerably higher than most coral islands. It has no anchorage.

*Martlock Isles*.—*Namoluk* has a lagoon with only a boat passage to it.

*Mokor Island* I could not find, though I have searched for it. I have been told by trading captains that it is certain that there is no island there.

*Truk, or Hogolu Islands*.—The group is in a vast lagoon like a large lake in the sea, and is a beautiful place. There are ten high islands in the lagoon, varying from 10 to 15 miles in circumference, and from 200 to 1000 feet high, and scores of smaller ones are found throughout the lagoon and upon the surrounding reefs.

*Givry, Hacq, Lauvergne, and South islands* are upon a separate reef, and have a lagoon to themselves, into which there seemed to be a passage at the S.E. and N.W., but of this we could not be certain. Between the two groups there is a wide clear passage with deep water and a strong current running west.

Following up the eastern reef we came to a good passage through the reef about 300 yards wide. Across the mouth is a

bank with 5 and 6 fathoms of water. There is quite a swell upon it in easterly winds. We came out through this passage when leaving the lagoon. There is a good-sized island on the south of the passage, called by the natives *Woles Island*, probably *Caplin Island* of the charts. On the north side is a small islet, or I might say it is in the passage, as there is a small passage north of that again. Three and a half miles north of this again there is another good passage about half the width of the preceding. The island just south of this passage is named *Chassant*. The natives call it *Silat*. It was through this passage that we first entered the lagoon. Fourteen miles farther north, in latitude 7° 30' N., there is a splendid passage a mile or more wide with 15 fathoms of water. Just inside is a small 3-fathom bank. There are tide rips in the passage during the N.E. trades. At the north end of the lagoon the natives reported three more good passages—the first 11 miles north of the last mentioned; also a passage at each end of *Pise Island*.

Between the *Cuop Islands* and *Falau Islet* there are five other passages through the reef. The best is the first one east of *Falau Islet*, this islet being a good mark to steer for, as it stands alone and is well covered with high wood. I think good anchorage can be found almost anywhere in the lagoon. The soundings we took varied from 15 to 27 fathoms. We anchored near the south-east end of *Umol Island* in 17 fathoms. More sheltered anchorage, however, can be found in the channel between *Umol* and *Ruk Islands* in 17 to 19 fathoms.

The natives report numerous good passages through the reef extending to the west and north from *Falau Islet*.

The natives are larger than any we have seen at any of the other Pacific islands, and a very amiable and pleasant people to meet. They are very hostile to each other, and each island has its own clan. I think there would be no further danger, however, to any vessel visiting the lagoon.

Mr. *Kubary*, a German naturalist, who resided here for a year, estimates the population at 10,000.

The most valuable article yet known at *Ruk* is a large knife.

#### PACIFIC OCEAN.—NOTICE No. 54.

##### WESTERN PART.

The following information (unless otherwise stated) has been received from Lieut. J. St. C. Bower, R.N., H.M.S. *Danae*, 1880.

All bearings are magnetic. Variation in 1880:

*Samoa* or *Navigator Islands*, 8° 50' easterly; *Fiji Islands*, 10° easterly; *Keppel Island*, 9° easterly; *Solomon Islands*, 8° 10' easterly.

##### ISLANDS OF THE SOUTH PACIFIC.

##### SAMOA OR NAVIGATOR ISLANDS.<sup>14</sup>

*SAVAII ISLAND*.—The coast between the south-east extreme of *Savaii Island* and the reef extending off *Paluale* village is apparently free from danger southward of a cable's length from the shore.

The hill situated at the south-east end of *Savaii Island* is 550 feet in height, and forms a good mark for making the strait between *Savaii* and *Apolima Island*; it begins to show above the horizon about the same time as *Apolima Island*.

*Paluale Anchorage*.—Vessels wishing to communicate with the village of *Paluale* will find fair anchorage in north-east winds outside the eastern part of the reef extending off *Paluale*, with the 550 feet hill at the south-east end of *Savaii Island* bearing east, at a distance of about 4 cables from the reef, in 24 fathoms, sand.

*Inner Anchorage*.—With a good sun for seeing the reefs and by mooring head and stern, anchorage can be found in the bight in the reef off *Paluale*, at the distance of a mile from its eastern end. There are three sunken rocks in this bight, and a dangerous shoal lies at its entrance. The difficulty of leaving this anchorage in thick weather is obvious, and it cannot be recommended in consequence.

*Falelima Village*, at the north-west end of *Savaii Island*, has a rocky coast line projecting, between the rocks of which a boat can land in favorable weather; the village may be recognized by a white house in its centre and another at its southern end.

The north-west extremity of *Savaii Island* terminates in a low rocky point, but off *Falelima* the coast is steep-to, no bottom being obtained within half a mile of the shore with 100 fathoms.

*Mataatu Harbor*.<sup>15</sup>—Vessels approaching *Mataatu Harbor* from the westward should not come nearer to the coast reef than a quarter of a mile. H.M.S. *Danae* obtained 6 fathoms when ¼ cables distant from the coast reef, and a mile to the westward of *Mataatu*, and there appeared to be shoaler water inside that position.

Soundings of probably from 9 to 11 fathoms may be had on a bank extending from the eastern sea reef of *Mataatu Harbor*, for a distance of about half a mile.

*SAPAPALE*.—The boat passage opposite *Sapapale* is reported to be indifferent even for boats. The *Svuul* passage, situated eastward of *Iva Point*, is the best in the neighborhood, and is used by small coasters of 30 or 40 tons. The entrance should, however, be approached with caution, as there are several patches lying

outside the sea reef. On one of these 5 fathoms was obtained in H.M.S. *Danae*, with the entrance bearing west, distant half a mile.

**UPOLU ISLAND.**—Shoals have been reported by various trading vessels in the following positions as stated to Mr. A. Hamilton, the pilot at Apia.

- (1.) A shoal having from 7 to 9 fathoms least water over it, 3 to 4 miles N.E. from the north-east point of Apia Harbor Reef.
- (2.) A shoal of from 8 to 10 fathoms situated  $2\frac{1}{2}$  to 3 miles N.E.  $\frac{1}{2}$  N. of the east point of Fangalea Bay.

**APIA HARBOR.**<sup>16</sup>—*Directions.*—Vessels staying for any length of time in Apia generally secure with three anchors in the south-east part of the harbor.

The Roman Catholic church spire bearing S.  $\frac{1}{2}$  W. leads between the reefs at the entrance, after passing which, steer for the elbow of the shore reef, let go the port anchor when some stones on the western shore reef which are awash at high-water are in line on about a W.S.W. bearing with Godeffroy's coal hulk; reef distant one cable, then hard a starboard, veer to about 90 fathoms in the direction of the house marked Macfarlane's store, and let go the starboard anchor: lay a kedje out astern to the southward. Vessels entering for the first time should take a pilot, otherwise they are likely to foul other moorings.

**SALUAFATA HARBOR** is the best in Upolu Island. The northerly swell, which makes vessels roll considerably in Apia in the rainy season, has little effect on vessels anchored in Saluafata. The entrance may be recognized by the two sand cays situated on the western outer reefs and by Albatross Island.

The plan of Saluafata Harbor by the officers of the Imperial German Navy not being completely sounded, should be used with caution, especially when rounding the reefs or Saluafata bank. The sand cays at the entrance of the harbor are about 3 feet above high-water; the eastern cay is the larger of the two, and is planted with cocoa nuts; in May 1880 these were sprouting about two feet from the ground.

*Albatross Island* may be known by its black rocky base, and palm trees, which are about 70 feet high; it does not, however, show well against the dark background. Ariadne headland, which is very likely to be mistaken for Albatross Island, has no palm trees.

Vessels entering Saluafata Harbor should not approach the north-east edge of the western reef too close; it is reported to extend further east than shown on the plan, and has not been thoroughly examined.

*Leading mark.*<sup>17</sup>—Ariadne Point in line with the summit of the hill immediately behind it, bearing S. by E., leads into the harbor nearly mid-channel and clears Saluafata Bank.

A shoal on which H.M.S. *Danae* obtained a cast of 7 fathoms is situated N.N.W.  $\frac{1}{2}$  W. 6 to 7 cables from the western sand cay.

*Saluafata Bank*, nearly connected with the coast reef, is full of coral heads, the shoalest of which is reported to be only  $1\frac{1}{2}$  fathoms under water. Saluafata bank breaks in a north-easterly swell, and should not be crossed by any vessel.

*Lufi Lufi Village.*—Opposite the village of Lufi Lufi, and immediately to the eastward of Saluafata Bank, there is a break in the coast reef through which H.M.S. *Danae* entered and moored head and stern. On account of the shoals under water and the small size of the anchorage, it should not be entered without a previous examination by boat; the holding ground is bad.

**TUTUILA ISLAND.**—**PAGO PAGO HARBOR.**<sup>18</sup>—H.M.S. *Danae* twice used the passage between Taema bank and the reef off Deceit Point. Peiva Peak (1470 feet) in line with, and seen over Breaker Point N. by E.  $\frac{1}{2}$  E. leads through in mid-channel.

*Buoys.*—There were no buoys marking the Whale or Grampus Rocks at the time of the *Danae's* visit (1880).

**LEONE BAY.**—Irregular soundings of from 13 to 40 fathoms, sand and coral, were obtained between one and two miles from the shore in Leone Bay.

*Vaitoa*, the principal place in the island of Tutuila, is situated in the eastern part of Leone Bay, and may be easily recognized by a conspicuous Roman Catholic church, built of stone, situated close to the beach, about the centre of the village. Vaitoa is fronted by a reef, the boat passage through which is opposite the church.

*Shoals.*—The following have been reported to Mr. A. Hamilton, pilot at Apia.

- (1.) A shoal of from 6 to 8 fathoms, 1 to  $1\frac{1}{2}$  miles S.S.W. of Rocky Point, at the south-west extremity of Tutuila Island.
- (2.) A shoal of from 6 to 8 fathoms, about 12 miles E. by N. of Cape Matutula, off the east end of Tutuila Island.
- (3.) A shoal of from 4 to 5 fathoms, about 25 miles S.E. by S.  $\frac{1}{2}$  S. of the entrance of Pago Pago Harbor, Tutuila Island.

**BUFFON REEF.**<sup>19</sup>—The United States Consul at Apia states that the French barque *Buffon*, after passing Beveridge Reef at noon, at 2 o'clock the following morning came in sight of heavy

breakers, and barely escaped being wrecked on a reef, the position of which based on that of Beveridge Reef, is lat.  $20^{\circ} 39' S.$ , long.  $169^{\circ} 58' W.$  (approx.), or about 90 miles south of Savage Island.

#### FIJI ISLANDS—OVALAU ISLAND.

**LEVUKA HARBOR.**—The coral knoll<sup>20</sup> lying S.E. by E.  $2\frac{1}{2}$  cables from Observation Point, marked  $1\frac{1}{2}$  fathoms, reported to have been blown up, is still in existence; it is a pinnacle rock only 15 feet in diameter at the top; there is  $2\frac{1}{2}$  fathoms over it at low-water spring tides, and the lead falls off the edge into seven fathoms.

*Clearing mark.*—The half tide rock beacon, red, with a round iron cage, in line with the right extreme of Ovalau Island, just clears the outer edge of the pinnacle rock by a few yards.

*The beacon* placed upon the north elbow of the reef on the south side of the south entrance is 30 yards inside the edge of the reef proper, and 70 yards inside the shoal water; the beacon is iron, red, surmounted with a round cage.

*Black can buoy.*—There was no black can buoy in the south entrance in May 1880.

*Waitovu or North Entrance.*—There was only one buoy in this passage in 1880; its colour was white, and its position being placed inside the sunken dangers, of little use as a guide to navigation.

*A Coral knoll* having over it 6 feet, at low-water spring tides, lies 40 yards north of the buoy in the Waitovu or North entrance to Levuka, and another knoll of the same depth lies  $1\frac{1}{2}$  cables N. by E. of the buoy, much shoal water existing between them. Until this entrance is properly marked, the best directions for a stranger are a good sun and mast-head piloting.<sup>21</sup>

**SUVA HARBOR.**<sup>22</sup>—*Leading marks.*—Two white beacons have been erected as leading marks into Suva Harbor, the lower beacon is placed on the beach  $2\frac{1}{2}$  cables east of Nukumareoko Island, the upper is about three-quarters of a mile north of the lower beacon. These beacons in line are intended to lead through the entrance, but in H.M.S. *Danae* it was found that the upper beacon its breadth west of the lower beacon led nearer mid-channel.

*By night.*—A vessel leaving Suva at night can have lights placed on the beacons by applying at Na Mbukalou.

*Caution.*—The upper beacon was blown down early in the hurricane season, and not again erected until the season was over (1880).

*Buoys.*—Two white buoys mark the inner elbow of the eastern reef, at the turning point, W.  $\frac{1}{2}$  S.  $1\frac{1}{2}$  miles from Na Mbukalou store; another white buoy marks the 2-fathom knoll, lying S.  $85^{\circ}$  W. one mile from Na Mbukalou.

*A black buoy* marks the extreme of the spit S. W.  $\frac{1}{2}$  W. 6 cables from Low Clifty Point.

These buoys cannot always be depended upon.

*A Coal hulk* is moored in 10 fathoms W.  $\frac{1}{2}$  N.,  $3\frac{1}{2}$  cables from Na Mbukalou store; the port side of the hulk is that generally used for coaling.

#### KEPPEL AND BOSCAWEN ISLANDS.<sup>23</sup>

**KEPPEL ISLAND.**—The large Keppel Island is about 3 miles long, in a north-east and south-west direction, by about a mile in breadth; it has a general height of 90 feet, with a square-shaped hill in its centre, 350 feet high; looking from the north-west the island has the appearance of a wide-brimmed hat.

*West Island* lies a quarter of a mile off the south-west end of large Keppel Island, and is three-quarters of a mile long and 70 feet high.

*Twenty Feet Islet.*—One mile W.  $\frac{1}{2}$  S. from the north-east end of large Keppel Island is an islet 20 feet high, standing on, and close to the edge of the barrier reef.

*Barrier Reef* extends about half a mile off the north-east point of Keppel Island, and follows the line of coast to Twenty Feet Islet, where it is three-quarters of a mile off shore; it then takes a short curve in, and runs out again, forming an elbow about one mile off shore, from which the south-west peak of Keppel Island bears S.E. by E., after which it curves in towards the west end of West Island, off which it extends about half a mile.

*Off-lying reef.*—A dangerous off-lying reef, on which the sea was breaking, lies about 2 miles from the coast, with the south-west peak of Keppel Island bearing S.E. by E.; the width of the break was about 200 yards, but as well as could be seen with an indifferent sun, there were several shoal patches lying 1 to 2 cables from the break. As this reef lies right under the lee of the island, it probably does not always break.

*Lagoon.*—Between Twenty Feet Islet and N.E. point is a lagoon, into which no passage for boats could be seen at low-water.

*Landing.*—A boat from the *Danae* landed in the high west of Twenty Feet Islet, but there is said to be better landing at the south-west end of the large island, close to the flagstaffs.

*Soundings.*—H.M.S. *Danae* had 21 fathoms two-thirds of a mile north-west of Twenty Feet Islet, with N.E. point of Keppel

Island bearing S. 87° E. and N.E. peak of Keppel Island, in line with the west end of Twenty Feet Islet S.E. by S. A vessel would probably not have much difficulty in finding anchorage in the neighborhood during south-east winds.

*Traders.*—The white inhabitants live at the south-west end of large Keppel Island, where there are two flagstaffs, flying respectively the English and German flags.

The south-eastern part of Keppel Island was not examined.

BOSCAWEN ISLAND bears N. by E. (nearly) from Keppel Island, the nearest points of the islands being 5 or 6 miles apart.

#### SOLOMON ISLANDS.

REPORTED DANGER.<sup>21</sup>—Captain Bache, of the barque *Queen of Nations*, reports that when on a voyage from Brisbane to Manila (5th June 1880), from position at noon lat. 10° 6' S., long. 156° 13' E., he sailed N.N.W. for four miles, and then saw breakers, rocks, and sand, extending between the bearings of S. by W. and W. by S., distant about 5 miles. The position assigned to this danger appears to be in lat. 10° 6' S., long. 156° 7' E., or about 50 miles north-east of the Pocklington Bank, and in the western route taken by vessels between Australia and China.

#### NEW BRITAIN.

DAMPIER STRAIT.—*Bowen Shoal*.<sup>22</sup>—Captain J. Miller, of the steam vessel *Howen*, reports having struck upon a coral shoal in lat. 6° 3½' S., long. (by chronometer) 148° 37' E. This (Bowen) shoal is described as being a third of a mile in length, east and west, by about a cable wide, and to have over it a depth of about 12 feet. From it, the summit of Tupinier Island was in line with Cape Ann on a N.W. ½ W. bearing. To the southward of Bowen Shoal at a distance of about two miles, discolored water, with slight breakers, was seen.

By His Excellency The Most Honorable George Augustus Constantine, Marquis of Normanby, Earl of Mulgrave, Viscount Normanby, and Baron Mulgrave of Mulgrave, all in the County of York, in the Peerage of the United Kingdom; and Baron Mulgrave of New Ross, in the County of Wexford, in the Peerage of Ireland; a Member of Her Majesty's Most Honorable Privy Council; Knight Grand Cross of the Most Distinguished Order of Saint Michael and Saint George; Governor and Commander-in-Chief in and over the Colony of Victoria and its Dependencies, &c., &c., &c.

## REGULATIONS FOR MANAGEMENT OF THE LINTON TOWN COMMON AND THE ARGYLE AND LINTON FARMERS' COMMON.

IN pursuance of the regulations relating to commons made by the Governor in Council on the 1st April 1879, the Council of the

Shire of Grenville having drafted the following Regulations for management of the above-named Commons, submit the same for revision by the Board of Land and Works and approval by the Governor in Council, in lieu of the regulations heretofore in force in respect of such commons.

## Regulations.

1. Ratepayers, holders of miners' rights, business licenses, or carriers' licenses, and farmers may respectively depasture on the common, within five miles from their places of residence, four head of large cattle, or the equivalent of the whole or a portion thereof in small cattle on the basis that one head of large cattle shall be deemed equivalent to three head of small cattle. A farmer having under cultivation not less than one-tenth portion of the land occupied by him may depasture on the Argyle and Linton Farmers' Common one additional head of large cattle, or the equivalent in small cattle, for every ten acres of such land cultivated by him.

2. The fees for depasturing stock on the commons shall be paid quarterly in advance, and shall be at the rate of Eight shillings per annum for every horse, Four shillings per annum for every head of horned cattle, Six shillings per annum for every sheep, and Four shillings per annum for every goat. The quarters shall commence respectively on the first day of March, June, September, and December in each year.

3. Persons desirous of registering stock shall sign and deliver to the herdsman a description thereof; but no stock will be considered as registered unless the fees are paid at the time of entering their brand or other distinguishing mark.

4. No fees will be charged for the progeny of registered stock which in the opinion of the managers or herdsman are under six months old.

5. If any stock be removed from the commons during the currency of a quarter the owners thereof will be allowed to substitute other stock upon payment of a registration fee of One shilling per head.

6. The managers will appoint certain times and places for the registering and branding of stock, give notice thereof, and by their herdsman attend at such times and places for the purposes aforesaid, and all persons desirous of depasturing stock shall be in attendance therewith, and shall assist to brand the same.

7. All unregistered stock (without the common brand) found upon the common shall be deemed to be trespassing thereon, and may be forthwith impounded, or the owners of such stock may be proceeded against according to law.

8. No bull or entire horse shall be depastured on the commons without the sanction of the managers, and no pigs shall be depastured thereon.

9. The managers shall not be responsible for any loss of or injury to any stock depasturing on the commons.

10. The managers may destroy any goats found upon the commons, unless such goats are registered and branded with the common brand, and the fees for the depasturing of such goats shall have been paid.

Every person offending against any of the foregoing regulations shall, on conviction before any justice, forfeit and pay a penalty not exceeding Twenty pounds (£20) for each offence.

RULES AND REGULATIONS.

1. All charges must be paid when orders are given or before the ground or vault is opened.
  2. Any person making a vault or erecting a monument in the cemetery, by and with the permission of the trustees, and upon payment of the proper charges, is entitled to have, maintain, and keep a vault, monument, or tombstone, according to the terms of such permission, to and for the sole use of such person and his or her representatives for ever.
  3. Application for such permission to be made at the office of the trustees. A certificate of permission will be granted to the party applying for such permission, on payment of the proper charges.
  4. The charges will be remitted on the burial of any poor person in such cemetery, upon an order signed by a justice of the peace, or on a certificate of a minister of religion, or other evidence proving to the satisfaction of the trustees that such person was a pauper, or that the friends and relations of the deceased are unable to pay the charges.
  5. Orders for interment must be given at the office of the trustees, during the day previous to that on which it is intended to take place.
  6. The name, age, late place of residence, and probable cause of death of the deceased must be stated at the time of giving the order.
  7. The time fixed for the funeral to be the time when the procession is to be at the cemetery, and the same must be punctually observed.
  8. The time fixed for the performance of funerals will be from 10 a.m. to 6 p.m. in the months from September to April inclusive, and from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. throughout the remainder of the year.
  9. All monuments, vaults, graves, gravestones, and fences to be kept in repair and proper condition at the expense of the owners.
  10. Every coffin in a vault or brick grave to be bricked in, cemented, and covered by a slab of stone, slate, or iron.
  11. The cemetery will be open to the public daily from sunrise to sunset.
  12. A plan of the cemetery, showing the situation of the purchased and other graves, and register of all grants will be kept at the office of the secretary, where they may be inspected.
  13. The trustees reserve the right to make any alterations from time to time in these charges and regulations.

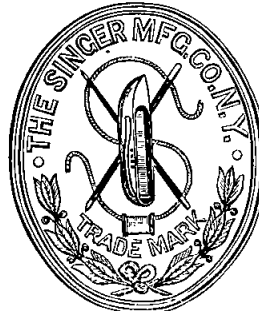
