Amsterdam, January 1882.

Your Excellency.—It is intended to hold in the spring of 1883 an International Colonial and Export Trade Exhibition in Amsterdam, to which His Majesty the King of the Netherlands has graciously accorded his high patronage, while the Minister of Colonies has accepted the honorary Presidency, and a large body of distinguished and learned men have offered their hearty support.

It will scarcely be necessary to demonstrate the high importance of an Exhibition like the present, the first of its kind, and intended to embrace all that is interesting and characteristic in the vast province of colonial nature, life, and culture. In order to obtain this end as completely as possible, the co-operation of all whose high official position, experience, and ability place them at the head of the communities they govern is as desirable as it is essential.

We therefore venture to solicit Your Excellency's powerful aid in advancing the object of this Exhibition, to which Colonies and Nations are invited to bring their tribute, and thus worthy the sympathy of all Colonies and trans-Oceanic countries, for whom progress and development are essential conditions to welfare and prosperity. Accordingly, promises of support and co-operation have already been received from the Governments of various foreign powers.

The programme of the Exhibition (of which we enclose several copies) will present to Your Excellency in detail the aim and comprehensive scope of the undertaking, and we may mention here that the principal steamboat companies between Great Britain and the Continent, and those connected with the East and the United States, have already generously granted a reduction of freight for all goods destined for or returned from the Exhibition.

In consideration of the great value of an impetus given by highest authority, especially in Colonies, we take the liberty to beg that Your Excellency will accord to our international enterprise the benefit of your influential support.

We have no doubt but that if Your Excellency's influence be exerted in its favor, the several classes in your country, whose interests are intimately bound up with agriculture, industry, trade, science, and art, will not fail to respond to Your Excellency's appeal, and in so doing contribute to achieve that success which the Exhibition deserves in the cause of Humanity and Progress.

GENERAL REGULATIONS.

First Section.—*Patronage, Commission of Organization, Executive Committee, General Commission, Provincial and Colonial Committees, Foreign Commissions.*

ART. 1. Under the high patronage of H. M. the King of the Netherlands and of the Government of the Netherlands, and under the honorary presidency of H. E. the Minister of Colonies, an International Colonial and General Export Trade Exhibition will be held in Amsterdam in the year 1883.

This Exhibition will contain:—

- 1st. Produce of the Colonies.
 - 2nd. Articles of General Export.
 - 3rd. Works of Art and Antiquities.
- It will give opportunity for competitive exhibitions of:—
- 4th. Living Animals, Flowers, Fruit, &c.
 - 5th. For Congresses and Conferences.

It will be opened on the 1st of May 1883, and have a minimum duration of five months.

ART. 2. The Exhibition is organized by a Commission called the Committee of Organization. It is placed under the direction of an Executive Committee, represented by a Delegate.

The administration and general management is entrusted to a Commissioner-General.

ART. 3. Provincial and Colonial Committees are formed, having for function:—

- 1st. To make known within their province the object and purport of the Exhibition.
- 2nd. To promulgate information concerning its organization and to distribute the forms for requests of admission and all other documents.
- 3rd. To find out the most prominent inhabitants of colonies, agriculturists, manufacturers, artists, &c., whose admission to the Exhibition would tend especially to enhance its solemnity; and to indicate the importing merchants, exporters, &c., fit to lend efficiency to the organization for competition.

4th. To call forth exhibitions of agricultural and horticultural products of the colonies and provinces.

5th. To call forth and eventually to organize the collective grouping of similar products of the colonies and the provinces, and to accredit to the executive committees Delegates charged with representing each collective exhibition.

ART. 4. The Foreign Commissions appointed by the several countries at the request of the Government of the Netherlands are invited to communicate as early as possible with the Executive Committee, and to have themselves represented there by Delegates.

Each Delegate will be appointed to treat with the Commissioner-General on questions touching his nation.

Second Section.—*Commissioners of Groups, Juries, Rewards.*

ART. 5. For every group in the Exhibition of the Netherlands and the Dutch Colonies a special commissioner will be appointed charged with:—

- 1st. Preparatory labors for the organization of his group.
- 2nd. Transmitting to the Commissioner-General all claims of his exhibitors, and to detect all breaches of the rules, which he is bound to execute strictly.

The Foreign Commissions or their Delegates are charged with presiding at the installation of the exhibits of their nation.

ART. 6. Rewards will be granted by an International Jury. The Jury will be divided into sections corresponding to the groups and classes of the Exhibition.

ART. 7. The rewards will consist of:—

- 1st. Diploma of Honor.
- 2nd. " " for Gold Medal.
- 3rd. " " " Silver Medal.
- 4th. " " " Bronze Medal.
- 5th. " " " Honorable Mention.

Every Diploma of Medal will be accompanied by an official Medal of Bronze.

These rewards will be apportioned on the reports of Juries, to the exhibitors whose contributions are pronounced to be of incontestable superiority.

A special regulation for the procedure of the jury will be drawn up later.

Third Section.—*Arrangement of Products. Catalogue.*

ART. 8. The articles exhibited will be arranged for every nation into nine groups for the two first divisions. Each group is divided into classes according to the system of the General Classification.

ART. 9. An official catalogue of the produce of all nations and the names of the exhibitors will be drawn up in the French and Dutch languages.

Fourth Section.—*Admission of Exhibitors. Installations.*

ART. 10. Applications for admission will be sent up to the Commissioner-General and submitted to the Executive Committee, which will decide in the highest instance as to the admission of the applicants.

The Commissioner-General will be charged with sending the certificates of admission to every admitted exhibitor.

ART. 11. The space allotted will be placed at the disposition of the exhibitors, subject to the following charges:—

Galleries of the main building. For every superficial meter	25	guilders.
Galleries of the main building. For every superficial meter for isolated spaces	50	"
Annex Galleries in the gardens. For every superficial meter	12,50	"
Space in the open air. For every superficial meter	7,50	"

ART. 12. The industrial exhibitors requiring water, gas, or steam, must state so on applying for admission, indicating the quantity of water, gas, or steam required.

The supply of water, gas, or steam furnished by the administration is subject to a proportionate charge, regulated according to a special tariff, which will be at the disposal of parties interested.

ART. 13. The exhibitors that are admitted will receive in due course all the necessary information, particular regulations and printed addresses for the dispatch and transport of their products.

The addresses will contain the following printed indications:—

- 1st. The number of the Group.
- 2nd. The number of the Class.
- 3rd. The labelled address as follows:—

International Exhibition of Amsterdam, 1883,
Amsterdam, Netherlands.

Colonial Section or Section of General Export or etc. etc.

The packages must bear on one side of the address, in large characters, and on paper of the national colors:

- 1st. The nationality.
- 2nd. The name of the exhibitor.
- 3rd. His address.
- 4th. His consecutive number.

ART. 14. The Exhibition enclosures will be constituted bonded warehouses, where the foreign products will be admitted as in transit.

ART. 15. Every exhibitor must attend either personally or through his agent, to the despatch, transport, and reception of his packages, as also to the declaration of their contents.

If the exhibitor or his agent is not present to receive the packages on their arrival within the enclosures of the Exhibition, the supervisor will be charged to remove them immediately and store them at the expense of the exhibitor.

ART. 16. The exhibitor who shall not have staled his contributions before the 20th April 1883 will lose all his right on the space allotted; his application for admission and the certificate addressed to him will be considered null and void. The Commissioner-General, after conferring with the Executive Committee, shall have the power of disposing immediately of the space allowed for his exhibits, without any judicial or extra-judicial formalities.

ART. 17. The cases and other wrappings of packages, after unpacking, must be removed by the exhibitors or their agents; if not, they will be removed under the direction of the administration, without the latter incurring any responsibility in the discharge of their duty, and this at the expense of the exhibitor.

The storing and keep of empty cases, &c., will take place at the charge of the exhibitors and must be done outside the enclosures of the building, either by themselves or by the supervisor, after a special tariff.

It is distinctly understood that all the cost of packing, transport, keeping, unpacking, putting up and return, &c., &c., will be at the expense of the exhibitor.

Immediately after the close of the Exhibition, the exhibitors must proceed to remove their exhibits. This operation must be completed by the 31st December 1883.

After this date, the products, packages, &c., which shall not have been withdrawn by the exhibitors or their agents, will be removed officially, and stored at the expense, risk, and peril of the exhibitors.

The articles which shall not have been withdrawn from the storehouse on the 31st May 1884, will be put to public sale, and the net proceeds handed to the Municipality of Amsterdam for the benefit of the poor fund.

Fifth Section.—Administration and Police.

ART. 18. All colonial products and articles of exportation are admitted into the Exhibition, save the following:—

Detonating and explosive materials and, in general, every article considered dangerous.

Spirits or alcohol, oils and essences, corrosive materials and, in general, whatever may damage other exhibited products or incommode the public, will not be received excepting in solid and appropriate receptacles and of limited sizes.

Percussion caps, fireworks, chemical matches, and other analogous objects, cannot be received except in imitated form and without any addition of inflammable material.

ART. 19. The Commissioner-General, in consultation with the Executive Committee, has the absolute right to cause the withdrawal of all products of such substance, which, from their nature or appearance, may seem to him to be dangerous or incompatible with the aim and propriety of the Exhibition.

ART. 20. Products are exhibited under the name of the signatory of the application ticket. This condition will be strictly adhered to.

The exhibitors are invited to indicate within the space of their stall, the names of their co-operators, whoever they may be, that have contributed, in what manner soever, to the excellence of the products exhibited.

They are particularly invited to state the selling price of the articles exhibited.

ART. 21. The exhibitors will be permitted to sell their articles, but cannot remove them during the hours that the Exhibition remains open, when removed, they must replace them immediately by articles of the same nature.

They are in such case to provide themselves with a permissive pass.

The articles produced on the spot can at once be delivered to the purchasers.

Drinks and products for consumption sold on the spot are subject to a special agreement.

ART. 22. No article or object whatsoever shown at the Exhibition can be imitated, copied, or reproduced under whatever form, without a special authorization from the exhibitor and from the Commissioner-General; the latter reserves the right of authorizing the reproduction of collective groups.

ART. 23. An entrance card is delivered gratis to every exhibitor. This card is personal.

It will be withdrawn if it be found to have been lent or ceded to another person, and this without prejudice to the right of prosecuting the delinquent.

The card must be signed by the exhibitor, bear his photograph, and the number of group and class to which he belongs.

It must bear, moreover, the stamp of the Commissioner-General.

ART. 24. The exhibitors are allowed to be represented by agents of their choice, agreed to by the Executive Committee.

The personal cards of free entry will be delivered to the agents under the conditions enumerated in the preceding article.

The representative of an exhibitor will not be allowed to have more than one entrance card, whatever be the number of exhibitors he represents.

ART. 25. The Executive Committee will take the necessary measures to secure the articles exhibited against every damage, but will in no case be responsible for fires, accidents, deterioration or damages which they may undergo, whatever the cause or extent.

The Committee leave the exhibitors to attend to the insurance of their goods, immediately, and at their own expense.

It will furnish the necessary persons for guarding the articles exhibited, but it will not be responsible for thefts or irregularities which may be committed.

ART. 26. All communications relative to the Exhibition must be addressed by the exhibitors and others interested to the Commissioner-General of the International Exhibition of 1883, Amsterdam, Netherlands.

Sixth Section.—Supplementary Exhibitions.—Congresses and Conferences.

ART. 27. Supplementary Exhibitions, competitions, congresses, conferences, lectures, reports, &c., will take place during the Exhibition.

ART. 28. The Executive Committee will invite International Congresses on all questions subject to diversity of opinion and action, and lend their assistance to all projects the realization of which they consider likely to increase the importance and success of the Exhibition.

SPECIAL REGULATION.

Natives of the Netherlands and Foreigners who become exhibitors, are thereby held to declare themselves bound to conform

to the present general regulations, as well as to the special rules hereafter to be enacted.

Appendix I.

EXPLANATORY REMARKS TO THE PROGRAMME FOR THE COLONIAL SECTION OF THE INTERNATIONAL COLONIAL AND EXPORT TRADE EXHIBITION.

In framing the programme for this Exhibition its object, to wit: "The extension and a more general diffusion of the knowledge regarding the colonies and extra-European possessions of the different powers" has been kept in view as much as possible. The authors have considered it the best means of attaining that end, by dividing the programme into three distinctly characterized chief groups, and by subdividing these into classes which, as it were, constitute the units thereof.

In Group I. "The physical conformation of the colonies and possessions," natural science in its strictly critical sense is the primary object. Moreover, as basis for the development of both the succeeding groups, it is destined to embrace all such data which may contribute towards the knowledge of the soil and its productions, of natural forces acting thereon, the races and tribes inhabiting it, its realms of plants and animals.

In both the succeeding groups we have endeavored to include everything connected with the life and doings of the different classes of the populations in the colonies, with the object of giving a clear and exact representation of them.

Although completeness has been the aim, we do not contend that the limit of perfection has been attained, and, perhaps, much has been withheld or forgotten which nevertheless strictly belongs to an exhibition, and contributions of which would therefore be desirable.

In each class under the three groups objects are mentioned, contributions in which would be particularly welcome, and on which the authors intended to draw special attention. It should be remembered, however, that we have done so in a descriptive, not in a limited sense, so that articles not mentioned are not necessarily therefore excluded.

A few explanations may render our meaning more clear and show that what may appear to have been omitted in one group will sometimes be found in another.

In the second class of the first group "Meteorology and Terrestrial Magnetism" mention is only made of—charts, tables and graphical diagrams. We had then, as regards the Neth.-Indian possessions, mainly in view the series of magnetical and meteorological observations made in Batavia by Dr. P. A. Bergama, and published by order of the Neth.-Indian Government, as well as the magnetical survey of the Indian Archipelago by Dr. E. van Rijkevorsel, the report of which is accompanied by charts on which the lines of equal magnetical intensity and those of inclination and declination are indicated.

Similar contributions may also be expected from other countries and are of the greatest importance to science. Besides, comparisons instituted by means of the exhibition of instruments used or required for such observations, are of the highest value, since it has often been proved, also recently at the Geographical Exhibition held at Venice, that the acquaintance with instruments as used by different nations, is unequal and far from common. These meteorological and other instruments were, however, ranged in our programme under the 3rd group, letter B of the 23rd Class.

In the 4th class of this group, "Geology and Mineralogy," paleontology, or descriptions, sketches and exhibitions of fossils have not been mentioned in so many words, but it was considered desirable to draw attention thereto in an especial manner in the explanatory remarks, owing to the great importance of this branch of geology. Liberal and well chosen contributions of both articles and pictures, with descriptions of them as well as of the places of origin and their vicinity are earnestly invited.

The demands of the 6th class of this group: "Animals" are various and it was not feasible to mention all in the programme.

The researches in natural history do not only require animals and constituent parts, hides, skins, tender organisms, &c., preserved in serviceable condition, but also full descriptions and drawings, mentioning the place of origin, species, native names, tables of measurements &c.

Monographs of multifarious species found in different climes, or of species conspicuous from their close connection with the mother country or other lands, are very desirable and their value will be enhanced by explanatory collections and drawings.

Of the 7th or last class of this group: "Anthropology" besides the foregoing, communications or contributions are very much desired of every thing which could bring out conspicuously the difference of races and the form of development of man, from the most barbarous up to the most civilized races.

"Furniture" in the 9th class, II. group, mentioned under letter B, must be taken in the most liberal sense, so that it would comprise furniture for ease and luxury, cooking and washing utensils, means of illumination and heating, implements for making fire, riceblocks and such like.

In sending head-gear, turbans, mantles, ponchos, sarongs, loincloths, &c., comprised under letter C, "Clothing and finery," it is desirable to accompany them by elucidations regarding the manner in which they are worn by the natives. Such can be done by means of drawings or painted figures, but it is hardly necessary to add that dressed figures of natural size would be extremely welcome.

In the year 1878, "Models and instruments used in diamond digging and polishing at Banjermaasin" were exhibited in Paris. Similar articles are also invited for this Exhibition and ought to be classed under the 10th class, letter F, "Mining."

As regards letter G, "Industry," it would be of importance to illustrate under this class the gradual processes previous to completion and fitness for use, by exhibiting the products in their different stages of treatment.

It would be extremely difficult, if not impossible, to exhibit in this country sea and river craft, fishingsmacks and other conveyances by land and water, as they are used by the natives in the colonies. It has therefore been decided to limit contributions under letter H, "Trade and Navigation," to models and drawing which, however, to be of value ought to be made in exact proportions, with indication of scale, and be accompanied by a description of the construction and joints, &c.

It would, however, not be quite impossible to bring over rowing and sailing craft and transports of small description and to allot them place in the Exhibition. This applies equally to sleighs and sedan-chairs which, together with harnesses, saddles and whips should be classed with means of land transport.

Among the conveyances by land choice should rather be made of those conspicuous by elegance, strength, lightness or adaptedness as excellent rowing and sailing boats. Among craft such attention should be given as much to elegance in form as to particular excellence in its use.

Also specimen of planks and knees to illustrate native ship-building are greatly desired.

Among ships requisites are particularly included: tackle and sails, cordage, anchors, oars, paddles, &c.

In the 13th class, "Forms of Government and States Institutions," under the heading "Military," communications are invited regarding modes of warfare, usages in war and the art of fortification by the natives. It has been proved, especially in later times, that some native people are far from being unskilled in that art; hence, in order to demonstrate the progress of such people in the construction of defensive works, it is considered desirable to accompany these communications by models of forts (bentings), redoubts or other earth or stone defences. Contributions in these are therefore earnestly solicited.

Under the title "Public Buildings," letter E, models and sketches of which are desired, no special mention has been made of palaces or dwellings of native chiefs or grandees, as being comprised among dwellings of chiefs; yet, it is obvious that contributions in such will be greatly appreciated.

Regarding the 10th class in group III., "Naval and Military Forces in the Colonies," it is to be observed that by "means of fortification and defence" is meant in the widest sense everything which belongs to the living or dead fighting forces of a country, or is destined for the organization, preparation, exercise and equipment of armies and fleets; among which may also be mentioned marine wharfs and establishments for the construction of steam engines, armour plates, gun foundries, and pyrotechnical ateliers, and particularly institutions for the education of officers and non-commissioned officers, and asylums for invalids and old soldiers who do not return to civil life.

The definition of the 17th class, "Public Works," has been purposely given in general terms in order to embrace everything that has been done in the colonies by Governments, private companies or individuals, for general benefit and use, such as rail and tram ways and engineering constructions therewith connected, bridges and river passages, the building of harbors and docks, digging of canals, the improvement of rivers, irrigation works, drainage of lakes, the construction of breakwaters, dikes and dams, and the erection of buildings for the public service or for general benefit.

Finally, it must be remarked that where statistical data and comparative statistics regarding navigation, commerce, industry and agriculture are mentioned, particularly in the third group, graphical descriptions of the movements on these various subjects, although not expressly stated, are nevertheless much desired, as being best calculated to place such movements to view in a distinct manner.

HINTS TO CONTRIBUTORS TO THE COLONIAL EXHIBITION.

It is absolutely necessary that exhibitors do accompany their contributions by such careful explanations and details as may be required to fully indicate the nature, the use and application, the origin, the composition and value or price of the article, and which are also indispensable for the drawing up of a good and explanatory catalogue.

It need hardly be added of how much importance such a catalogue would be for the many exhibitors themselves, especially for those who exhibit the products of agriculture, art, machine and manual industry, as it is also scarcely necessary to show how much the usefulness of the exhibition would thereby be enhanced.

Objects classed in the II. group of the Colonial Section must be ranged under the name by which they are known in the country of their origin, but must also have the nomenclature which European colonists or European countries may have given them.

The value of the contribution would be enhanced by a description, or rather by the addition of samples, of the materials out of which they are made.

Simple articles in daily use by the natives, indicating their morals, customs, and way of living, nature and degree of culture, are more desired than costly articles or those in less general use, betraying European influence. Even repaired articles have a peculiar value, as indicating the manner in which the repairs are done. Such articles, showing the skill of the native people to imitate European art and compete with it, should neither be omitted.

Small but carefully selected collections, tending to improve the knowledge of the people and country and advance their prosperity, are valued more than large or even costly collections where these objects have not been kept in view.

In sending models, care should be taken that all the proportions of the original have been faithfully reproduced, whilst it would be advisable to state also of what kind of wood or raw material they are made of. In case that the models require to be taken to pieces for transit, the different parts should be marked with numbers or letters in pencil (if possible twice repeated) referring to a list or sketch indicating the manner in which the parts are to be joined.

It is requested not to label the articles, as during the voyage the labels frequently fall off or become detached through moisture. It would be better to write the numbers or letters in pencil on the articles, which are then detailed in a separate list.

Seeds liable to spoil through damp or otherwise, should be rather dispatched in tins or stoppered bottles.

It is advisable when packing to put camphor or insect powder in the cases, and to rub in iron or steel articles with a little grease, or, what would be better still, with some vaseline.

It is earnestly solicited not to hold any so-called preparatory exhibitions if the cases have thereby to be opened after dispatch by the sender. Experience has taught that through that cause articles reach in a damaged and sometimes quite unserviceable condition. For, nobody can be expected to attend better to a good and careful packing than the owner or exhibitor himself.

Thus the cases ought to reach the Exhibition building unopened and should be opened there first.

The latest date on which goods can be received has been fixed as 1st February 1883.

If sent later, the risk is incurred of their not being accepted.

The packages destined for the first section should be marked distinctly on at least two contiguous sides, thus:

CAUTION TO MASTERS OF VESSELS TRADING TO THE CLARENCE RIVER.

THE following information has been received from the pilot at the Clarence River :—

"The 10-foot sand patch, named in the sailing directions, is shallowing up and extending north across the entrance. There is only 9 feet on it at high-water. To clear it when coming in, vessels must keep the bar beacons in line till they are close into the north rock buoy. When going out pass close by the north rock buoy to bring the beacons in line as soon as possible. (1) *Montagu Island—Permanent Light exhibited.*

WITH reference to Notice to Mariners, No. 242 (2), of 29th December 1880, on the exhibition of a provisional light, pending the completion of the lighthouse, on Montagu Island (Barunguba):—The Government of New South Wales has given further notice that, on 1st November 1881, the provisional light would be discontinued, and the permanent light exhibited from a lighthouse erected on the summit of the island.

The light is a fixed and flashing white light of the first order, exhibiting the following characteristics—fixed thirty seconds, eclipsed twelve and two-thirds seconds, flash four and two-thirds seconds, and eclipsed twelve and two-thirds seconds. It is elevated 250 feet above high water, and should be visible in clear weather from a distance of about 20 miles.

Position, latitude 30° 15' 20" S., longitude 150° 14' 30" E.

BRISBANE RIVER BAR.

(2) *East Beacon Light discontinued.*

AUSTRALIA DIRECTORY, VOL. II.—(No. 4.)

THE following information, relating to portions of the east coast of Australia and in Torres Strait, is principally derived from the remarks of officers of H.M. ships employed on the Australian station, and from Notices to Mariners issued by the Colonial Government of Queensland.

[All bearings are magnetic. Variation in 1881.]

Wide Bay, 94° Easterly. Torres Strait, 42° Easterly. Look-out Point, 6° Easterly.

NEWCASTLE HARBOR.¹—A breakwater has been built on the south side of this harbor, extending in a north-easterly direction 579 yards from Nobby Head.

LIGHT.—From a position 145 yards within the extremity of this breakwater a fixed red light is exhibited, elevated 30 feet above high water, and visible seaward between the bearings of W.N.W. and E.N.E.

Note.—The light on a W.N.W. bearing leads northward of Big Ben Rock; and bearing E.N.E. clears the shoal ground extending off Nobby Head, north-westward of the breakwater.

Fog Bell.—During thick and foggy weather a powerful bell is sounded from the breakwater.

Bar.—The bar has shifted between 200 and 300 feet seaward, and has over it a depth of 21 feet at low-water springs.

North Channel.—The depth in this channel has increased to not less than 20 feet.

Buoys.—The red fairway buoy has been removed, also the bell buoy formerly lying north-eastward of Big Ben Rock.

PORT MACQUARIE.²—A new channel has formed at the entrance to Port Macquarie, in which there is a depth of 8½ feet at high-water springs.

The white obelisk on the western side of the port has been removed to a position near the wharf, and when in line with the beacon near the Asylum leads through this channel.

The former entrance, southward of that above mentioned, is still preferable for vessels in ballast.

MORETON BAY.⁴—South Channel.—A signal station (flagstaff and yard) has been erected on the south extreme of Sandy Point, from which the following tidal signals are exhibited, showing the depths of water on the inner bar of South or Rous Channel:—

During flood-tide a red burgee will be hoisted at the mast-head.

Howe Channel.—The Perch buoy, at the entrance of Howe Channel, is now replaced by a small vessel with one mast, carrying a cage ball and bell on top, 6 feet in diameter.

BRISBANE RIVER.⁵—The hulk formerly moored at the entrance to this river at two miles within the light-vessel has been removed.

LIGHT.—The red light hitherto exhibited from East Beacon, Brisbane River bar, has been discontinued, and the beacon and lantern will shortly be removed.

Lytton Reach.—A red buoy has been moored in a depth of 14 feet on the west side of the fairway, at one cable north of the red buoy marking the west side of entrance to Lytton Reach.

Gibson Island.—The north-west extreme of the bank lying west of Gibson Island is marked by a black buoy in 14 feet.

Quarries Reach.—The beacons and lights formerly indicating the line of fairway between Parker Island and Coxen Point have been removed.

The fairway of Quarries Reach has been dredged, and is now 33 yards wide; the white leading beacons, indicating mid-channel, have been moved 109 yards to the westward.

The black buoy, formerly lying south of Coxen Point, has been removed, and a black beacon surmounted by a square has been erected on the south side of the fairway.

Hamilton Reach.—The line of fairway through the channel across Upper Flats, Hamilton Reach, is indicated by two beacons (from which fixed lights are exhibited at night) situated on the south side of the river opposite Coxen Point.

A black beacon buoy has been laid down on the south edge of Upper Flats.

Wide Bay Harbor.—Bar.⁶—The Government of Queensland has published the following directions for Wide Bay bar, southern entrance of Great Sandy Strait.

Crossing the bar at night, Hook Point leading lights must be kept in line bearing W. by S., until Inskip Point leading lights come in line, which should then be steered for, until a red light on Inskip Point opens out. A vessel will then be clear of the spit extending south-eastward from Great Sandy Island, and a mid-channel course should be steered until the lights on the west part of Inskip Point are brought in line bearing S.E. ½ E. which lead to the fairway buoy off Snout Point, when, if dark, anchor-till daylight.

Burnett River.¹⁰—The spit projecting from the eastern side of Barubbra Island, at the entrance to this river, is reported to be extending to the southward.

Vessels, when entering and abreast of the lighthouse on South Head, should keep a little southward of the line indicated by the two beacons on the south shore, until past the red buoy on the extremity of this spit.

Pioneer River.¹¹—When the bar of Pioneer River is dangerous for river and harbor steamers, a black cone will be hoisted from the quarter of the yard at the pilot station signal-staff and at Flat-top Island.

Cairns Harbor.¹²—During the winter months (April to October) the prevailing winds in Cairns Harbor are from S.E. and S.S.E., with squalls and rain at the change of moon, but otherwise generally dry.

After October land and sea breezes prevail, their direction being from N.E. to E.N.E. during the day, and from N.W. at night; the weather, however, is not so steady as during the winter months.

January, February, and March are generally unsettled, and much rain falls, accompanied by squalls, thunder, and lightning.

During flood tide, a red light is shown northward of the permanent white light.

Look-out Point.¹⁵—The following information has been received relative to the existence of a bank lying about 3 miles north-westward of Look-out Point:—

This bank, on which the *Decapolis* grounded, 30th August 1879, is stated by the master, Mr. Almond, to be apparently of flat surface composed of clay and sand, with a least depth over it of 2½ fathoms (one cable W.N.W. of the vessel when aground), deepening quickly seaward to 7 and 9 fathoms, and may be an extension of the shoal ground extending from Look-out Point.

The following bearings were taken from the ship on the bank, in 2½ fathoms—tide half-flood.

Cape Flannery open a quarter of a point of Look-out Point	S.E.
Remarkable sand patch	S.S.W.

These bearings place the bank 3 miles distant from Look-out Point.

Position approximate, lat. 14° 47½' S., long. 145° 14' E.

Flinders Group.¹⁶—A rock awash at low water lies 7½ yards from the south-west extreme of the south-west island of this group. Water in small quantities was procured in October 1879 from the north-west side of the northern island of the group.

Shoal.—A shoal composed of sand and coral awash at low water and extending about half a mile in a N. by W. and S. by E. direction, was observed to lie northward of No. VII. Islet in lat. 13° 20½' S., long. 143° 44½' E.

Night Island.¹⁷—The *Beagle* found good sheltered anchorage westward of Night Island in 7½ fathoms, mud, abreast of a white sandy beach. No. IX. Island, kept open of the south-west extreme of Night Island, leads clear of the coral dangers at the northern entrance to this anchorage.

Sherrard Islands.—When about 2 miles north-eastward of the eastern Sherrard Island the following dangers were clearly seen from the masthead:—

In lat. 12° 59½' S., long. 143° 40½' E., a coral patch under water, extending about 300 yards in a north and south direction.

In lat. 12° 57½' S., long. 143° 42½' E., a rock awash, with sand showing upon it, at about three-quarters of a mile S.S.E. of this danger a similar rock was seen.

V. Reef.—North-west of this reef lie several detached patches, some of which are situated half a mile distant from the edge.

Pollard Channel.—Discolored water of a light color is said to have been seen near the fairway at the eastern entrance to this channel, south-west of Middle Banks; it extended over a space about one cable long, north and south, and two cables broad. From this the north extreme of Sir Charles Hardy Island bore S.W., and West Ashmore Bank S.E. by E. ½ E.

Reef.—The reef reported to lie 10 miles N. ½ W. from Cairncross Island is said to have a depth of from 2 to 3 fathoms over it.

Raine Island.¹⁸—Information has been received that the beacon formerly on this island is gradually falling into decay.

TORRES STRAIT.¹⁹

ENDEAVOUR STRAIT.—*Possession Island.*²⁰—The *Beagle* found the anchorage between Possession Island and the mainland good for small vessels, and almost landlocked. When entering from

the eastward, Barn Island (which on this bearing appears double) kept just open of the south extreme of Possession Island leads eastward of the spit extending from the north-east extreme of Possession Island. This spit has extended considerably.

Rock.—A rock, having a depth of 2 feet on it, lies in mid-channel south-westward of High Island. From this rock the south extreme of High Island bears E. by N., and the low hill on the southern part of Possession Island appears in line with the high south extreme of Dayman Island.

This rock is difficult to distinguish, and should be avoided by keeping near the shore of Possession Island.

The sandbank lying south-east of Possession Island, south extreme, has extended about half a mile in a north-easterly direction, and is about three-quarters of a cable from the shore.

About a quarter of a cable south of the northern part of this sandbank there are two sunken rocks, having about 2 feet over them at low water.

Gibson Rock.²²—The position of this rock, heretofore doubtful (reported to lie 1½ miles north-westward of Heroine Rock), has been reported correct by Lieutenant De Hoghton; it is about 90 feet long and the same in breadth, having over it a depth of not more than 2 feet.

Horn Island.—When proceeding between Horned Point and King Point at a distance of about half a mile from the fringe reef, soundings in 3½ fathoms were obtained.

Prince of Wales Channel.²³—A can buoy, painted black, is moored off the southern extremity of Sunk Reef (d), in 4 fathoms at low water.

Var Shoal.²⁴—In 1879 the French vessel *Var* struck upon a shoal of 2½ fathoms (*Var Shoal*) situated about a mile northward of Mount Ernest Islet.

Position as given:—Lat. 10° 14' S.; long. 142° 25½' E.

Pinnacle Reef.—The *Beagle*, in 1879, passed within half a mile of Pinnacle Reef, which appeared to be a flat coral reef, one-third of a mile long N.E. and S.W., and about 300 yards across, nearly awash at a quarter flood.

A sandbank is forming on its south-west extreme, but no off-lying dangers were seen.

Banks Island.—Convenient temporary anchorage in 3½ fathoms, smooth water, may be found during the S.E. trade, westward of the point next west of Banks Peak. The water shoals rapidly from 7 to 3 fathoms.

Jervis Reef.—At about a quarter of a mile south-east of Minnie Rocks, and at one cable from the edge of Jervis Reef, are situated two detached coral patches, over which the sea was observed to break heavily.

Tide Rip.—During the ebb stream and with a fresh S.E. monsoon, there is a heavy tide rip between Passage Island and Jervis Reef, which small vessels may avoid by keeping close to the sunken fringe reef extending from Passage Island.

GREAT NORTH-EAST CHANNEL.²⁵—*Bramble Cay.*²⁶—A reef (*Nautilus Reef*) is situated N.E. by E. ½ E. from the centre of Bramble Cay, distant 2 miles.

Arden Islet.²⁷—The French transport *La Soudré*, in 1879, struck upon a bank of sand and coral, extending in an easterly and south-east direction for 2 miles from Arden Islet.

From the vessel when on shore, the centre of Rennell Islet bore N. 29° E.; the centre of Aureed Islet S. 49° E., and the centre of Arden Islet S. 83° W.

A depth of 8 feet was found close to this position.

HARVEY ROCK.—A shoal, over which there is but little water, is said to lie about one mile S.W. of Harvey Rock.

Reef.²⁸—The master of the Queensland Government schooner *Pearl* reports the existence of a reef, awash at low water, about three-quarters of a mile in length and 200 yards in width.

From this reef Mount Cornwallis bears N.W. ½ N.; Brothers Peak S. by E., and Saibai Island west extreme N. by W. ½ W.

THE following information relating to portions of the east coast of Australia, and in the inner passage to Torres Strait, has been received from Captain Maclear, H.M. surveying vessel *Alert*, 1881.

[All bearings are magnetic. Variation in 1881.]

Cape Sidmouth, 5° Easterly. Torres Strait, 4½° Easterly.

PORT CURTIS.²⁹—During the stay of H.M. surveying vessel *Alert* at this port (April 1881), S.E. gales were experienced, during which the anchorage between South Trees Point and Auckland Creek was found to be well sheltered.

Advantages exist for the construction of wharves at Gladstone.

Keppel Bay.³²—There are no facilities for embarking produce at this anchorage; cargo is shipped from lighters, which are towed from Fitzroy River, but can only lie alongside vessels at anchor in the bay during fine weather.

PORT MOLLE.³³—The *Alert* lay quietly at single anchor at Port Molle, but at the anchorage in the bay north of Molle Islands south extreme, strong and variable tidal streams were experienced, especially close round the projecting points of the islands. Local steam vessels generally use the channel between Molle Islands and the mainland.

PORT DENISON.³⁴—This anchorage is so shoal that vessels of moderate draught have to lie at a long distance from the pier, and even with the ordinary trade wind sufficient sea is raised to be inconvenient for boats.

Weekly communication with Brisbane and Sydney is maintained by steam vessels belonging to the Australian Steam Navigation Company, which are of sufficiently light draught to lie alongside the pier.

Supplies.—No supplies except beef were procurable; water was scarce.

North Entrance.—The triangular beacon, painted red, formerly standing on a rock on north-west side of the north entrance to Port Denison, has been removed.

COOKTOWN.³⁵—This is the northernmost port visited by the Australian Steam Navigation Company's steam vessels in their weekly service from Sydney; it is also the most northern telegraph station in Queensland.

Lizard Island.—The bêche de mer fishery is prosecuted from this and the neighboring islands.

SHOALS.³⁶—In the vicinity of Cape Sidmouth the following shoals were discovered:—

A shoal of 5½ fathoms, with 9 and 10 fathoms around, lying one mile S.W. of Claremont light-vessel.

A shoal of 4½ fathoms, with a depth of 7 fathoms close to, at 3½ miles N.N.W. ½ W. from the same light-vessel.

Caution.—In the vicinity of Cape Sidmouth are numerous shoals of 5, 6, and 7 fathoms; the local pilots consider the channels between Cape Sidmouth and Cape Grenville the most intricate part of the navigation of the inner route.

G Reef.—When passing this reef at about half tide, some rocks above water were observed on the edge, at about 2½ miles W.S.W. of Forbes Islets (Temple Bay).

M Reef.—The beacon formerly marking the west extreme of M Reef (south of Cape Grenville) has been removed.

Young Islet.—There are some large boulders upon this islet, but no bushes. A square beacon, painted black, stands on Young Islet.

TORRES STRAIT—PRINCE OF WALES CHANNEL.

ASP SHOALS.³⁷—A shoal of 9 feet was reported by H.M. schooner *Beagle* in 1879 (from local information) to lie 3½ miles E. by N. from Asp shoals.

This shoal (as also that of 5 fathoms lying N.E. by E. distant one mile from it), was unsuccessfully searched for by the *Alert*, and, in the opinion of Captain Maclear, does not exist.

GOODE ISLAND.—A shoal, having a depth of 3 fathoms over it at low water, has been found to extend W.S.W. from Goode Island west extreme for a distance of six cables.

Clearing Mark.—Vivien Point, in line with the northern side of Black Rock bearing E. ½ S., leads southward of this shoal in not less than 5 fathoms at low water.

MONETA SHOAL.³⁸—An unsuccessful search for this shoal, extending over several days, was made by the *Alert*.

The vessel was anchored over the reported position, while the boats closely sounded and searched in the vicinity, without finding any indications of its existence.

The local pilots consider that the rock on which the *Moneta* struck, in 1875, was that now known as Harrison Rock.³⁹

NORMANBY SOUND.—The settlement on Thursday Island is situated on the south-west side of that island, and the most frequented anchorage is in Ellis Channel.

A coal hulk (which is also used as a depot for stores required in the pearl fishery), is moored south of the settlement, and a constant supply of coal is kept on board.

Supplies.—No fresh provisions were procurable at Thursday Island, and the supply of fresh water was scanty.

Tides.—Strong tidal streams were experienced by the *Alert* during her stay in Normanby Sound; the flood-stream sets to the westward round Vivien Point, with such strength for several hours each day that boats cannot pull against it, and vessels anchoring westward of Thursday Island are unable to communicate with the settlement. At the anchorage in Ellis Channel the tidal streams were slack.

Ghibber Rock.—The Ghibber is a small rock, which dries at low water, situated N.N.E. 2½ cables from the nearest point of Black Rock. The shoal upon which the rock stands is one cable in diameter, and has a clear passage on both sides of it, but the northern passage is at all times much to be preferred.

When covered, the Ghibber shows a strong ripple, which often extends across to Black Rock, giving it the appearance of a spit from that rock.

Buoy.—A red can buoy is placed north of Ghibber Rock, and no vessel should pass between this buoy and the rock.

Pinnacle (Brisbane) Rock.⁴⁰—This rock, on which the steam-vessel *Brisbane* struck, has a depth of 11 feet over it, and lies N.N.W. ½ W. from Heath Point, distant 3½ cables, and W. by S. ½ S. from Vivien Point, distant 3½ cables.

Clearing Mark.—The red triangular beacon on Madge Reef, in line with the white square beacon on Horn Island, bearing E. by S. ½ S., leads three-quarters of a cable eastward of Pinnacle Rock.

Ellis Channel.—The *Alert* proceeded eastward from the anchorage off Thursday Island, passing through Ellis Channel and Flinders Pass, carrying not less than 20 feet at three-quarters flood.

Larpet and Gerard Banks.—The northern edges of these banks appear to have been washed away, and the sand deposited further to the westward.

Banda Reef.—This reef, the existence of which had been considered doubtful, was found to be a small patch of sand and coral, having 9 feet over it at low water, and lying N.E. ½ E. from the summit of Booby Island, distant 6 cables.

Reported Shoal.⁴¹—See foot-note.

Alert Rock.⁴²—A sunken rock lies in the fairway of the eastern approach to Prince of Wales Channel, Torres Strait.

This danger (*Alert Rock*) has 2½ fathoms over it at low water, and lies with Double Island summit (218 feet) bearing N. 69° E., distant 5½ miles; Strait Rock, near Tuesday Islet, S. 20° E., distant 4 miles; and Ince Point, Wednesday Island, S. 67° W., distant 2½ miles. Position:—Lat. 10° 29' 15" S., long. 142° 21' 45" E.

West Island.—A cluster of boulders 10 feet high lies N.N.E. ½ E. from the west summit of West Island distant 1½ miles. Vessels should navigate in the vicinity of West Island with great caution.

East Jacobus Shoal.⁴³—The *Alert* passed over the reported position of this shoal (2 miles south-westward of Arden Islet) without observing indications of its existence. The bottom in the vicinity was composed of white sand.

Wreck Shoal.—The *Alert* passed over the reported position of this shoal (about 3½ miles W. ½ S. from Bet Island) and carried depths of from 9 to 10 fathoms without observing any signs of shoaler water.

Discolored Water.—The color of the water in Prince of Wales Channel varies with changing circumstances; during strong winds, with the tidal stream setting to the westward, much sand is carried in the water, appearing in streaks, which present the appearance of shoals.

Care should be taken to avoid being misled by these indications. In fine weather, with the tidal stream setting to the eastward, the water is clear and the bottom can be seen.

Routes.—Steam vessels proceeding between Prince of Wales Channel and the Australian ports to the southward, generally proceed through Albany Pass, passing south of Rock (a).

WHEREAS by the *The Land Act 1869* power is given to the Governor in Council from time to time to make, alter, and rescind rules, regulations, and orders for the various purposes therein specified: Now therefore His Excellency the Governor, acting by and with the advice of the Executive Council, doth hereby rescind the Regulation made by Order of the tenth day of January 1882, fixing the fees payable for surveys, and doth make the following Regulation in lieu thereof, viz. :—

SURVEY FEES.

1. The amount of the survey fee payable by a selector shall, for the period from the 1st day of January 1882 to the 1st day of January 1885, be in accordance with the amount fixed by the Graduated Scale and Schedule, copies of which are hereunto annexed, and shall be payable on the order of the Land Officer for the time being of the district in which the land applied for is situated; and the amount of the fee shall be the same to the selector whether the selection be wholly or partly composed of lands previously surveyed or unsurveyed land, except as regards (a) lands specially surveyed and subdivided into lots deemed suitable for selection by the Department of Lands, before being declared available; (b) selections composed of detached portions; and (c) selections in the counties of Croajingolong, Karkaroc, Weeah, and Millewa outside the limits of any defined contract survey district. For these exceptional cases the fees shall be as follow :—

(a) When lands specially surveyed for selection by the Department, before being declared open for selection, are taken up in greater or less areas than was intended when subdivided, or so as to necessitate further expense in surveys, the selector shall, in addition to the cost of the original subdivisional survey, also pay the cost of any modification required by him.

(b) When the right of selection is exercised in any detached portions, a separate survey fee, according to scale, will be required for each portion.

(c) Lands situated outside the limits of the contract surveyors' districts, as now defined, will be subject to a special fee for survey, and the amount of such fee shall in each case be determined by the Surveyor-General.

2. All monies collected on the orders of the Land Officers towards the expense of selection surveys shall be deposited by the selectors at the Treasury and credited to an account called the "Survey Fees Account."

3. Accounts passed against deposits placed to the credit of the "Survey Fees Account" shall be signed by the Land Officer ordering the collection of the money, or his successor in office, and shall be countersigned by the Inspecting District Surveyor.

4. In any case where the whole of the fee collected shall not have been expended on the survey of a selection the Land Officer shall report the fact to the Assistant Surveyor-General immediately on certifying the surveyor's account, and such balance as may remain shall be carried to revenue or otherwise disposed of as the Secretary for Lands may direct.

SCHEDULE TO THE GRADUATED SCALE OF CHARGES FOR SELECTION SURVEYS FOR THE YEAR 1881.

In cases of selections in connection with which only a part of the boundaries or a portion of the areas require to be specially surveyed, the contract surveyor shall be paid in proportion to the work required to be done as follows :—

For Subdividing a Surveyed Allotment.

1. When the total length of the lines required to be marked does not exceed 60 chains, the fee shall be the minimum fee (fee for 20 acres) according to the contract scale for the locality.
2. When the length does not exceed 80 chains, the fee shall be the same, or $\frac{1}{2}$ of the maximum fee (for 320 acres), according to said scale, when the latter exceeds the former amount.
3. When the length exceeds 80 chains, the fee shall be half the maximum.
4. When the allotment is subdivided by a road the above fees shall be increased by 25 per cent.

Other Partial Surveys.

5. For setting off and marking on the ground one side of a road along a boundary-line of a section already marked on the ground, the fee shall be half the fee for running a subdivision-line of the same length.
6. If the plan of a selection can be rendered complete by adding to, or excising from, a surveyed allotment, the survey shall be limited to the survey of such addition or excision, and the surveyor paid accordingly.
7. In cases where some trifling alteration or addition only is required to complete the survey, the amount payable to the contract surveyor shall be fixed by the Inspecting District Surveyor subject to appeal to the Assistant Surveyor-General.

PARKS, ETC.

REGULATIONS FOR THE CARE, PROTECTION, AND MANAGEMENT OF THE ALBERT, YARRA, PRINCE'S, FLINDERS, FAWKNER, AND STUDLEY PARKS, AND THE GOVERNMENT HOUSE DOMAIN.

WHEREAS by section 108 of *The Land Act 1869* it is amongst other things enacted that the Board of Land and Works shall have power from time to time to make and alter or rescind rules and regulations for the care, protection, and management of all public parks and reserves, and for the preservation of good order and decency therein: Now, therefore, the Board of Land and Works, in exercise of the power conferred as aforesaid, doth hereby rescind all rules and regulations heretofore made relating to Albert Park, Yarra Park, Prince's Park, Flinders Park, Fawkner Park, Studley Park, and the Government House Domain, and doth hereby make the Regulations following for the care, protection, and management of such Parks and Domain:—

Regulations.

1. Unless otherwise directed by the Minister of Lands, the double gates at the Albert Park shall, from the 1st April to the 30th September, be closed to the public from Six p.m. to Six a.m.; and, from the 1st October to the 31st March, from sunset to Six a.m.
 2. Except on the roads in Studley Park, and as hereinafter provided, no vehicle used for hire or transport of goods, stores, or materials of any kind, bearing either name or number, shall be allowed within these parks and domain without the permission in writing of the Minister of Lands; and no person shall ride or drive within the said parks and domain except on the roads laid out therein: Provided that any licensed vehicle, hired by the day or hour, shall not be excluded from being used on the roads in Albert Park. This regulation shall not apply to His Excellency the Governor, nor to any person resident within the Government House Domain.
 3. No person on horseback or leading any horse shall enter the Yarra Park and Fawkner Park, and no vehicle shall be allowed therein without the permission in writing of the Minister of Lands.
 4. No person shall offer any article for sale in these parks and domain without the permission in writing of the said Minister.
 5. No person shall interfere with the trees, shrubs, flowers, or birds in the said parks and domain, or throw stones or other missiles, or commit any nuisance therein, or leave therein any bottles, orange peel, paper, cast-off clothing, or litter; and no fires shall be lit within such parks and domain unless under the authority of the said Minister.
 6. No person shall climb on or jump over the seats and fences in and around the said parks and domain, or stick bills on those fences or gates, or cut names, letters, or marks on the trees, seats, gates, posts, or fences, or otherwise deface or write thereon.
 7. No person shall depasture any horses or cattle in the said parks and domain without the permission in writing of the Minister of Lands, and then in such portions thereof only as may be specified in such permission.
 8. No person shall disturb the wild fowl in Albert Park.
 9. Any person found in a state of intoxication, or behaving in a disorderly manner, or creating or taking part in any disturbance, or committing in the said parks and domain any act of indecency, may be forthwith removed therefrom by any bailiff of Crown lands or police constable, and shall be liable to prosecution for an offence against these regulations.
 10. Entrance into plots of ground enclosed for plantations or for other purposes is prohibited.
 11. All goats and poultry found in the said parks and domain may be destroyed by any bailiff of Crown lands or police constable.
 12. No person shall bring into the said parks and domain any dog unless the same be held by a chain or cord.
- Offenders against these regulations shall, in accordance with section 108 of *The Land Act 1869*, on conviction before any justice, forfeit and pay a penalty not exceeding Five pounds for each offence, and every person who shall knowingly and wilfully offend against any such regulations, and who shall not, after he shall have been warned by a bailiff of Crown lands or any constable, desist from so offending may be forthwith apprehended by such bailiff or constable and be taken before some justice of the peace, and shall, on conviction, forfeit and pay a penalty not exceeding Ten pounds.

AUSTIN HOSPITAL FOR INCURABLES, VICTORIA.

Incorporated A.D. 1882.

BYE-LAWS.

OBJECT.

1. The object of the Institution is the establishment of a Home for Incurables.

COMMON SEAL.

2. The common seal of the corporation shall be kept in a box with two locks and keys (one of which shall be kept by the treasurer, and the other by the secretary). The common seal shall not be affixed to any deed or instrument except by order and in the presence of the committee, and shall be verified by the signature of the chairman and the secretary.

CONTRIBUTORS AND THEIR PRIVILEGES.

3. The following shall be life contributors:—Every donor of £20 or upwards in one year. Every person who shall raise £20 or upwards in one year, by one or more collections from persons not claiming membership on account of their contributions toward such sum. The executor first named in any will by which £25 or upwards is bequeathed to the hospital, on proving the will and paying the bequest.

4. Every contributor of £1 per annum, and every contributor of £10 in one donation, shall be entitled to one vote at all general meetings at which he or she may be present; and every contributor of £2 per annum, and every contributor of £50 in one donation, shall be entitled to two votes; and every contributor of £5 per annum, and every contributor of £100 in one donation, shall be entitled to three votes.

5. No annual contributor shall be entitled to exercise any privileges as such till the subscription for the past year shall have been paid. And every yearly subscription shall be paid in advance, and every first yearly payment shall be calculated from the date of such payment, but no such first yearly payment shall entitle to a vote at a general meeting within three months from the date of such payment.

6. Any contributor being absent from the colony of Victoria may, by power of attorney, exercise all the privileges to which he or she would be entitled if personally present; but such power of attorney shall be lodged for examination with the secretary forty-eight hours before the same can be used in exercise of such privileges.

7. Applicants for admission as inmates shall produce satisfactory proof that they are suitable and worthy objects for admission to the Institution.

OFFICERS AND COMMITTEE.

8. There shall be a president, vice-president, treasurer, secretary, and two auditors, as hereinafter provided, who shall hold office for a year, and until their successors are appointed, but they shall be eligible for re-election. The committee of management shall consist of twenty-two contributors, of whom six shall be ladies and sixteen gentlemen (inclusive of the honorary officers, viz.:—President, vice-president, treasurer and secretary) of whom five shall form a quorum.

9. The president, vice-president, the treasurer, secretary, and auditors shall retire from office at the annual general meeting in every year; and, if otherwise qualified, shall be eligible for re-election.

10. The members of committee to be elected for three years, one-third retiring by rotation each year, but eligible for re-election. During the first two years those retiring to be decided by lot. Any vacancies occurring during the year may be filled up by the committee.

11. The committee shall direct all business of the hospital, shall provide all requisites for its use, may appoint, hire, and discharge or dismiss all paid officers and servants, and fix and pay all salaries and wages; may from time to time make rules not inconsistent with these bye-laws for the regulation of the hospital, and of such paid officers and servants; and, generally, for all matters whether of the same kind as those hereinbefore mentioned, or of a different kind not provided for by law or by these bye-laws, that they think proper.

12. The general committee shall meet once a fortnight, or oftener if necessary, on such day and at such hour and place as they may appoint, five to form a quorum.

The order of business to be as follows:—

To receive the reports of officers and visitors.

To decide on admission and discharge of inmates.

To inquire into complaints, and to consider reports.

To ascertain that the duties of officers and servants are duly performed.

To attend generally to the business requirements of the Institution.

13. The president, or, in his absence, the vice-president or treasurer, shall preside at all meetings of the committee, and in their absence the majority present shall appoint their own chairman, and the president or chairman shall have an additional or casting vote.

14. Any number of the committee of management who shall be absent from six (6) consecutive meetings of the committee without leave from the committee shall cease to be a member. The remaining members shall have power to fill up all such vacancies.

15. The general committee may convene a special general meeting of contributors at any time upon giving notice at least seven days previously in two or more of the Melbourne newspapers; which notice shall be advertised three times in each of such papers, and shall contain the particular subjects to be brought before such general meeting; and none other shall be discussed thereat. Any twenty contributors may request the committee to call a special meeting at any time, and should the committee, after receiving such requisition, signed by twenty or more contributors, refuse or neglect to call such

meeting within seven days, then any twenty contributors shall have power to convene such meeting upon giving notice as directed above.

16. At all meetings the chairman shall have a deliberative vote, and also a casting vote whenever the numbers are equal.

ELECTIONS.

17. Any candidate for election shall furnish to the secretary in writing, three clear days prior to the day of election, a notification of his intention to become a candidate for election; if less than the number to be elected be nominated, the meeting shall have power to nominate subscribers; and if more than those required to fill the vacancies be nominated, the election shall be decided by ballot, to be taken on such day and at such place as may be appointed by the chairman, between the hours of twelve noon and four o'clock p.m., such ballot to be conducted by a member of the committee and two scrutineers appointed by the meeting. In all cases of equal voting the member of committee conducting the ballot shall have the casting vote.

VISITING COMMITTEE.

18. A visiting committee, consisting of three members, shall be elected by and from the general committee, and shall hold office for six months.

19. It shall be the duty of the visiting committee to inspect the institution in every particular, and all belonging thereto, and to offer any suggestions.

RELIGIOUS INSTRUCTION.

20. The inmates of the institution shall be at liberty to receive religious instruction and consolation from the minister of the congregation or denomination to which they belong, at such time as the committee shall appoint.

21. Annual general meetings of contributors shall be held in the city of Melbourne on the third Thursday in the month of January in every year, at such time and place as the general committee shall appoint, of which notice shall have been given in two or more Melbourne newspapers seven clear days before the day of meeting, to receive a report and balance-sheet from the committee; to elect members of committee, president, vice-presidents, treasurer, secretary, and auditors for the current year; and to transact any other business of which due notice shall have been given.
