AMENDED REGULATION RESPECTING PUBLIC ACCOUNTS UNDER SECTION 2 OF 22 VIC. No. 86.

THE following amended Regulation respecting Public Accounts under section 2 of 22 Vic. No. 86, to be substituted for Regulation No. 14, has been approved by the Governor in Council:—

“When moneys are tendered to a Collector of Imposts or Receiver of Revenue, if he should be in doubt as to the manner in which they, or any part of them, should be credited, or as to whether they are properly payable to him, or if he should observe any irregularity in relation to them of a character to require explanation, he may receive the moneys, giving a properly qualified receipt, place the amount in his statement of collections to the credit of ‘Suspense Account,’ and take immediate steps to obtain and transmit to the Treasurer such further information as will enable him to transfer the amount in the Treasury books to the proper head of Account.”

INTRODUCTION INTO VICTORIA OF CATTLE,
SHEEP, ETC.

At the Executive Council Chamber, Melbourne, the tenth day of

WHEREAS by the 30th section of an Act intituled *An Act to amend the Laws relating to or affecting the Public Health*, and numbered 310, among other things the Governor in Council is empowered from time to time to make, alter, or vary and revoke such orders as may seem necessary for the purpose of prohibiting or regulating the introduction into Victoria from any country or colony, or part of a country or colony (in which respectively any disease in sheep, cattle, horses, swine, or other animals of the same or any other kind or kinds whatsoever is known to exist), of all sheep, cattle, horses, swine, or other animals of the same or any other kind or kinds whatsoever; or of meat, skins, hides, horns, hoofs, or other parts of any animals, or of hay, straw, fodder, or other articles likely to propagate amongst men or other animals any infectious or contagious disease whatsoever. And all orders for any of the purposes hereinbefore in this section mentioned should have the like force and effect as if the same had been inserted in the now in part recited Act; and all persons offending against any order made under the authority of this section should for each and every offence forfeit and pay any sum not exceeding Fifty pounds, or such smaller sum as the Governor in Council might in any case by such order direct, and such sum should go to and form part of the consolidated revenue; provided that nothing in this section should apply to the disease in sheep called scab: Now therefore His Excellency the Governor, by and with the advice of the Executive Council doth by this present Order, in exercise of the powers conferred by the above recited Act and of every other power enabling him in that behalf, order as follows (that is to say):—

1. The following Orders of the Governor in Council shall be and the same are hereby revoked, viz:—

The Order bearing date the seventh day of July One thousand eight hundred and seventy-nine, so far only as the same is affected by this present Order.

The Order of the twenty-sixth day of June One thousand eight hundred and eighty-two.

2. The introduction of cattle, sheep, or swine into Victoria from the countries following, that is to say, Europe, Asia, Africa, America, and the Islands in the Atlantic, Pacific, and Indian Oceans, save and except the Australasian colonies and New Zealand, is hereby prohibited. Provided that all cattle or sheep which have been shipped from Great Britain, Ireland, Canada, and the United States of America for the said Colony of Victoria in accordance with regulations heretofore in force, shall be dealt with as if such regulations were still in force.

3. No manure shall be introduced into Victoria from any of the countries hereinbefore mentioned, or from any of the Australasian colonies or New Zealand, without the authority, in writing, of an inspector of stock, and except in accordance with the conditions of such authority.

4. No person shall do or attempt to do, cause to be done or to be attempted to be done, or assist in doing or attempting to do any act forbidden by this Order, or obtain or endeavour to obtain, or assist anyone in obtaining or endeavouring to obtain by fraud any authority under this Order, or forge any such authority, or make use of any such forged or fraudulently obtained authority, or fraudulently grant or issue any such authority, or obstruct or refuse to carry out the directions of any inspector or other person acting under the authority of this Order.

5. All persons offending against this Order shall for each and every offence forfeit and pay a penalty not exceeding £50.

And the Honorable Charles Young, Her Majesty's Minister of Agriculture for Victoria, shall give the necessary directions herein accordingly.

EXAMINATION FOR LAND SURVEYORS.

THE Board of Examiners which has been appointed in connection with the Department of Lands and Survey to enquire into the qualification of surveyors who desire to obtain certificates of competency, hereby notifies that the next examination will commence on Monday, 2nd October 1882.

Intending candidates must give notice of their intention in writing, and must forward to the Board documentary evidence that they have complied with the following preliminary conditions; shall also specify the optional subjects in which they desire to be examined; and upon their applications being approved by the Board, shall pay the prescribed fee of £2 2s. into the Treasury, Melbourne, or any Receipt and Pay Office, and forward receipt for same to the Secretary to the Board.

All candidates presenting themselves for examination must be provided with a book of logarithms, a 40-20 scale, a parallel ruler, protractor, and all necessary appliances (except paper) for plan drawing.

All applications must be in the hands of the Secretary by the 20th September next.

PRELIMINARY CONDITIONS.

I. A candidate must have passed the matriculation examination at the University of Melbourne, or the examination prescribed for candidates for admission into the Civil Service of Victoria (including in either case the subjects of Arithmetic, Euclid, and Algebra), or such other examination as shall in the opinion of the Board be equivalent thereto; and must have served with some authorized surveyor for not less than three years, two of which must have been in the field.

II. Or, he must have served under articles for not less than four years some certificated surveyor of recognized standing, two years at least of such service to have been in the field; and must, if required, give satisfactory evidence of having received such education as will qualify him for the proper exercise of his profession.

NOTE.—By service in the field is to be understood the survey and subdivision of country lands.

A candidate whose application shall have been approved as showing that he has complied with either of the above conditions will be examined in each of the seven compulsory subjects, and in one at least of the optional subjects included in each of the groups; but he will only be examined in such optional subjects as he shall have given notice of at the time of making his application.

COMPULSORY SUBJECTS OF EXAMINATION.

- Construction, adjustment, and use of instruments: Principles of construction, manipulation, adjustment, and use of the following instruments, viz:—
Theodolite,
Level,
Box sextant,
Prismatic compass,
Chain.
- Principles and practice of land surveying: Details of field practice, including the keeping of field-notes;
Topographical surveying;
Setting out block surveys;
Laying out roads.
- Plane trigonometry (practical).
- Computations connected with land surveying: Reduction of traverses;
Computations connected with the setting out of roads;
Elimination of discrepancies in measurements and observations in the field;
Computation of areas, including irregular and curved boundaries.
- Plotting: Plotting from field-notes by protractor and by ordinates.

MURDER NEAR DEEP LEAD, VICTORIA.

DISTRICT WHERE PUBLICANS' LICENSES MAY
BE SPECIALLY GRANTED.

PROCLAMATION

By His Excellency The Most Honorable George Augustus Constantine, Marquis of Normanby, Earl of Mulgrave, Viscount Normanby, and Baron Mulgrave of Mulgrave, all in the County of York, in the Peerage of the United Kingdom; and Baron Mulgrave of New Ross, in the County of Wexford, in the Peerage of Ireland; a Member of Her Majesty's Most Honorable Privy Council; Knight Grand Cross of the Most Distinguished Order of Saint Michael and Saint George; Governor and Commander-in-Chief in and over the Colony of Victoria and its Dependencies, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS by *The Licensing Act 1876* (No. 566, section 44) it was amongst other things enacted that, notwithstanding the provisions thereinbefore contained, it should be lawful for the Governor in Council from time to time to proclaim any place or district a place or district where, owing to a sudden increase of population or otherwise, the necessity for the immediate grant of publicans' licenses exists, to be a place or district wherein publicans' licenses might be specially granted, and from time to time to revoke any such proclamation: Now therefore I, the Governor of Victoria, with the advice of the Executive Council, do hereby proclaim the district hereinafter mentioned to be a district where publicans' licenses may be specially granted under the provisions of the 44th section of the said Act, that is to say:—

An area of a quarter of a mile radius from the Railway Gates on the eastern side only of the Railway Line at Glenrowan.

SIR,—With reference to my Circular Despatch of the 25th of October last, I have the honor to transmit to you, for the information of your Government, a copy of the instructions which have been issued for the guidance of the Metropolitan Police Force by the Secretary of State for the Home Department, in regard to the provisions of the *Fugitive Offenders Act 1881*.

"FUGITIVE OFFENDERS ACT 1881."

ON 1st January 1882, the *Fugitive Offenders Act 1881*, 44 and 45 Vict. c. 69, comes into operation (s. 40), and provides for the surrender from the United Kingdom to a British possession, or from a British possession to the United Kingdom, of fugitives who are charged with having committed, either before or after the commencement of the Act (s. 38), treason, piracy, or some offence which (whether felony, misdemeanor, or other crime) is, in the part of Her Majesty's dominions where it was committed, punishable by imprisonment with hard labor for twelve months or more, or by some greater punishment (s. 9).

The Act extends to the Channel Islands and Isle of Man as if they were part of England and of the United Kingdom (s. 37).

SURRENDER FROM THE UNITED KINGDOM TO A BRITISH POSSESSION.

Arrest on endorsed warrant.—The usual mode of arrest is on an endorsed warrant, i.e., a warrant issued in the British possession where the offence was committed, and endorsed in the United Kingdom (ss. 2 and 3). The Act provides to the effect that where a warrant has been issued in any British possession for the apprehension of a fugitive therefrom, and the fugitive is or is suspected of being in or on his way to the United Kingdom, such warrant may be endorsed (s. 3) by—

1. A judge of a superior court;¹ or
2. A Secretary of State;² or
3. One of the police magistrates of the Bow-street Police Court.

provided that the person endorsing is satisfied that the warrant was issued by some person having lawful authority to issue the same.

The warrant so endorsed will be a sufficient authority to any of the persons named in the endorsement and of the persons to whom the warrant was originally directed, and also every constable, to apprehend the fugitive in any part of the United Kingdom and Channel Islands or Isle of Man (ss. 3 and 37), and

bring him before a police magistrate at Bow-street Police Court,³ or before any other magistrate,⁴ who will then order him to be brought before such police magistrate³ (ss. 3, 5, 26, and 30).

Where the warrant has been endorsed, any court or magistrate⁴ has the same power of issuing a *search-warrant* to search for any property alleged to be stolen or to be otherwise unlawfully taken or obtained by the fugitive or otherwise to be the subject of such offence, as that court or magistrate⁴ would have if the property had been stolen or otherwise unlawfully taken or obtained, or the offence had been wholly committed within the jurisdiction of such court or magistrate⁴ (s. 24).

Arrest on provisional warrant.—Occasionally, however, an endorsed warrant cannot be had in time. In these cases the arrest may, in the first instance, be made by a *provisional warrant* pending the procurement of the endorsed warrant. A provisional warrant may be issued (s. 4) by any magistrate⁴ for the apprehension of any fugitive who is or is suspected of being in or on his way to the United Kingdom, upon such information and under such circumstances as would, in his opinion, justify the issue of the warrant if the offence of which the fugitive is accused had been committed within his jurisdiction. The provisional warrant may, if necessary, be backed for execution. The magistrate⁴ issuing the provisional warrant will forthwith send a report of the issue, together with the information or a certified copy thereof, to a Secretary of State,² who may, if he think fit, discharge the fugitive (s. 4).

The magistrate⁴ before whom the fugitive offender who has been apprehended under a provisional warrant is brought is to order him to be brought before one of the police magistrates of Bow-street Police Court³ (ss. 5 and 30), who may remand him for such reasonable time, not exceeding seven days at any one time, as under the circumstances seems requisite for the production of an endorsed warrant (s. 5).

Hearing.—When the fugitive has been brought before a police magistrate,³ the warrant having been duly endorsed, the police magistrate³ will proceed to hear the case (subject to the provisions of the Act) in the same manner and with the same jurisdiction and powers as near as may be (including the power to remand and admit to bail) as if the fugitive were charged with an offence committed within his jurisdiction (s. 5).

Depositions (whether taken in the absence of the fugitive or otherwise), and copies thereof, and official certificates of or judicial documents stating facts, may, if duly authenticated, be received in evidence in proceedings under the Act (s. 29). Warrants, depositions, copies thereof, official certificates of or documents stating facts, will be deemed duly authenticated for the purposes of the Act, if they are authenticated in manner provided for the time being by law, or if they purport to be signed by or authenticated by the signature of a judge, magistrate,⁴ or officer of the part of Her Majesty's dominions in which the same are issued, taken, or made, and are authenticated either by the oath of some witness, or by being sealed with the official seal of the Secretary of State, or with the public seal of a British possession, or with the official seal of a Governor of a British possession, or of a Colonial Secretary, or of some secretary or minister administering a department of the Government of a British possession. And all courts and magistrates⁴ will take judicial notice of every such seal, and will admit in evidence without further proof the documents authenticated by it (s. 29).

If the endorsed warrant is duly authenticated, and such evidence is produced as (subject to the provisions of the Act), according to the law ordinarily administered by the police magistrate,³ raises a strong or probable presumption that the fugitive committed the offence mentioned in the warrant, and that the offence is one within the Act, the police magistrate³ will commit the fugitive to prison to await his return, sending forthwith to a Secretary of State² a certificate of the committal and a report of the case (s. 5).

He will at the same time inform the fugitive that he will not be surrendered until after the expiration of fifteen days, and that he has a right to apply for a writ of *habeas corpus* or other like process (ss. 5 and 10).

Surrender.—Upon the expiration of fifteen days from the committal or the final decision of a superior court¹ in the case, the Secretary of State may,² by warrant under his hand, order the fugitive to be delivered into the custody of the person or persons to whom it is addressed, and to be held in custody and conveyed to the British possession from which he is a fugitive (s. 6).

If the fugitive is not conveyed out of the United Kingdom within one month after his committal, he may apply to a Superior Court¹ for his discharge (s. 7).

The chief officer of any prison, on request of the person having the custody of a fugitive under a warrant of return, is bound, on payment or tender of a reasonable amount for expenses, to receive and detain him for such reasonable time as may be requested (s. 6).

The fugitive may under such warrant be returned in any ship belonging to Her Majesty or to any of Her Majesty's subjects, and the Secretary of State may order the master of any ship belonging to a British subject bound for the required destination to receive and afford a passage and subsistence during the voyage to the fugitive, his escort, and the witnesses, but not exceeding in number one prisoner for every 100 tons of his ship's registered tonnage, or one witness for every 50 tons of such tonnage.

The Secretary of State will also cause to be endorsed upon the agreement of the ship such particulars with respect to any fugitive prisoner or witness sent in her as the Board of Trade may from time to time require.

The master will on his ship's arrival in the British possession cause such fugitive, if he is not in the custody of any person, to be given into the custody of some constable, and if the master fails, on payment or tender of a reasonable amount for expenses, to comply with such order, or to cause a fugitive prisoner committed to his charge to be given into the custody of a constable on arrival at his destination he will be liable on summary conviction to a fine of £50 (s. 27).

If a prisoner escape out of the custody of a person acting under a warrant issued or endorsed in pursuance of this Act, he may be retaken in the same manner as a person accused of a crime against that part of Her Majesty's dominions to which he escapes may be retaken upon an escape (s. 23).

When a person is in legal custody in a British possession, and is required to be removed in custody to another place, in or belonging to the same British possession, he will, if removed by sea in a vessel belonging to Her Majesty or any of Her Majesty's subjects, be deemed to continue in legal custody until he reaches the place to which he is required to be removed; and the provisions of the Act with respect to the retaking of an escaped prisoner will apply (s. 25).

If the fugitive, when returned to the British possession, is not prosecuted for his offence within six months of his arrival therein or is acquitted of the said offence, the governor of that possession may, if he think fit, upon the request of the fugitive, cause him to be sent back to the United Kingdom free of cost and with as little delay as possible (s. 8).

Duties of Metropolitan Police.—No part of the expenses either of arresting in the United Kingdom a fugitive from a British possession, or of surrendering him to that possession, will be borne by the Metropolitan Police Fund or any local or imperial fund. It is for the persons seeking the surrender to pay the whole expense, and to conduct all proceedings in the case.

Accordingly, as a rule, the Commissioner of Police will incur no expense, and take no steps,—as by causing an application to be made either for a provisional warrant or for an endorsement of a warrant, or by directing the execution of an endorsed warrant,—unless he has obtained either express instructions from the Secretary of State, or an adequate indemnity or prepayment from the persons seeking the surrender. If, without such indemnity or prepayment, he should receive from any private person or directly from the colonial police, a request to take any of such steps, he should, wherever time admits, apply for instructions to the Secretary of State, who, where necessary, will cause enquiry to be made at the Colonial Office. Only, in the event of emergency, where the loss of a few hours would be irretrievable, the Commissioner of Police, in the exercise of his discretion, will be justified in taking such action as may seem imperatively required; but in that case he will, as soon as possible afterwards, report the matter to the Secretary of State.

SURRENDER FROM A BRITISH POSSESSION TO THE UNITED KINGDOM.

Arrest on endorsed warrant.—The usual mode of arrest is on an endorsed warrant, i. e., a warrant issued in the United Kingdom, and endorsed in the British possession⁵ (ss. 2 and 3). The Act provides to the effect that where a warrant has been issued in the United Kingdom for the apprehension of a fugitive therefrom, and the fugitive is or is suspected of being in or on his way to a British possession, such warrant may be endorsed (s. 3) by—

1. A judge of a superior court⁶ in that possession, or

2. The Governor⁷ of that possession,

provided that the person endorsing is satisfied that the warrant was issued by some person having lawful authority to issue the same.

The warrant so endorsed will be a sufficient authority to any of the persons named in the endorsement, and of the persons to whom the warrant was originally directed, and also every constable to apprehend the fugitive in any part of the British possession and bring him before a police magistrate,⁸ or before any other magistrate,⁹ who will then order him to be brought before such police magistrate.⁴

Where the warrant has been endorsed, any court or magistrate⁹ has the same power of issuing a *search-warrant* to search for any property alleged to be stolen or to be otherwise unlawfully taken or obtained by the fugitive, or otherwise to be the subject of such offence, as the court or magistrate⁹ would have if the property had been stolen or otherwise unlawfully taken or obtained, or the offence had been wholly committed within the jurisdiction of such court or magistrate⁹ (s. 24).

Arrest on provisional warrant.—Occasionally, however, an endorsed warrant cannot be had in time. In these cases the arrest may, in the first instance, be made by a *provisional warrant* pending the procurement of the endorsed warrant.

A provisional warrant may be issued (s. 4) by any magistrate⁹ for the apprehension of any fugitive who is or is suspected of being in or on his way to the British possession, upon such information and under such circumstances as would, in his opinion, justify the issue of the warrant if the offence of which the fugitive is accused had been committed within his jurisdiction. The provisional warrant may, if necessary, be backed for execution. The magistrate⁹ issuing the provisional warrant will forthwith send a report of the issue, together with the information, or a certified copy thereof, to the Governor of the possession,⁹ who may, if he think fit, discharge the fugitive (s. 4).

The magistrate⁹ before whom the fugitive offender who has been apprehended under a provisional warrant is brought is to order him to be brought before a police magistrate⁸ (ss. 5 and 30), who may remand him for such reasonable time, not exceeding seven days at any one time, as under the circumstances seems requisite for the production of an endorsed warrant (s. 5).

Hearing.—When the fugitive has been brought before a police magistrate,⁸ the warrant having been duly endorsed, the police magistrate⁸ will proceed to hear the case (subject to the provisions of the Act) in the same manner, and with the same jurisdiction and powers, as near as may be (including the power to remand and admit to bail), as if the fugitive were charged with an offence committed within his jurisdiction (s. 5).

Depositions (whether taken in the absence of the fugitive or otherwise), and copies thereof, and official certificates or of judicial documents stating facts, may, if duly authenticated, be received in evidence in proceedings under the Act (s. 29).

Warrants, depositions, copies thereof, official certificates or of documents stating facts, will be deemed duly authenticated for the purposes of the Act if they are authenticated in manner provided for the time being by law, or if they purport to be signed by or authenticated by the signature of a judge or magistrate⁸ or officer of the part of Her Majesty's dominions in which the same are issued, taken, or made, and are authenticated either by the oath of some witness, or by being sealed with the official seal of the Secretary of State, or with the public seal of a British possession, or with the colonial seal of a governor of a British possession, or of a colonial secretary, or of some secretary or minister administering a department of the government of a British possession; and all courts and magistrates⁹ will take judicial notice of every such seal, and will admit in evidence, without further proof, the documents authenticated by it (s. 29).

If the endorsed warrant is duly authenticated, and such evidence is produced as (subject to the provisions of the Act), according to the law ordinarily administered by the police magistrate,⁸ raises a strong or probable presumption that the fugitive committed the offence mentioned in the warrant, and that the offence is one within the Act, the police magistrate⁸ will commit the fugitive to prison to await his return, sending forthwith to the governor of the possession⁹ a certificate of the committal and a report of the case (s. 5).

The police magistrate⁸ will at the same time inform the fugitive that he will not be surrendered until after the expiration of fifteen days, and that he has a right to apply for a writ of *habeas corpus* or some other like process (ss. 5 and 10).

Surrender.—Upon the expiration of fifteen days from the committal or the final decision of the superior court⁷ in the case, the governor of the possession⁷ may, by warrant under his hand, order the fugitive to be delivered into the custody of the person or persons to whom it is addressed, and to be held in custody and conveyed to the United Kingdom (s. 6).

If the fugitive is not conveyed out of the British possession within one month after his committal, he may apply to a superior court⁷ for his discharge (s. 7).

The chief officer of any prison, on request of the person having the custody of a fugitive under a warrant of return, is bound, on payment or tender of a reasonable amount for expenses, to receive and detain him for such reasonable time as may be requested (s. 6).

The fugitive may, under such warrant, be returned in any ship belonging to Her Majesty, or to any of Her Majesty's subjects, and the Governor of the possession may order the master of any ship belonging to a British subject bound for the required destination to receive and afford a passage and subsistence during the voyage to the fugitive, his escort, and the witnesses, but not exceeding in number one prisoner for every hundred tons of his ship's registered tonnage, or one witness for every fifty tons of such tonnage.

The Governor will also cause to be endorsed upon the agreement of the ship such particulars, with respect to any fugitive prisoner or witness sent in her, as the Board of Trade may from time to time require.

The master will, upon his ship's arrival in the United Kingdom, cause such fugitive (if he is not in the custody of some constable; and if the master fails, on payment or tender of a reasonable amount for expenses, to comply with such order, or to cause a fugitive prisoner committed to his charge to be given into the custody of a constable on arrival at his destination, he will be liable on summary conviction to a fine of £50 (s. 27).

If a prisoner escape out of the custody of a person acting under a warrant issued or endorsed in pursuance of this Act, he may be retaken in the same manner as a person accused of a crime against that part of Her Majesty's dominions to which he escapes may be retaken upon an escape (s. 23).

When a person is in legal custody in a British possession, and is required to be removed in custody to another place in or belonging to the same British possession, he will, if removed by sea in a vessel belonging to Her Majesty or any of Her Majesty's subjects, be deemed to continue in legal custody until he reaches the place to which he is required to be removed; and the provisions of the Act with respect to the retaking of an escaped prisoner will apply (s. 25).

If the fugitive, when returned to the United Kingdom, is not prosecuted for his offence within six months of his arrival therein, or is acquitted of the said offence, a Secretary of State¹⁰ may, if he think fit, upon the request of the fugitive, cause him to be sent back to the British possession free of cost, and with as little delay as possible (s. 8).

The Fugitive Offenders Act only applies where an offender escapes, or is at least suspected to have succeeded in escaping, from the shores of this country to a British possession. It does not, therefore, interfere with the duties and powers of police forces of the United Kingdom or of other persons effecting arrests and dealing with such offenders before they so leave; and, if the escape is to a country subject to foreign government (such as France or America), any steps to be taken will be under powers distinct from those in the Fugitive Offenders Act.

The Act does not make necessary the intervention either of Home Office or Colonial Office; but it will in all cases be convenient that the papers should pass through those departments.

The course of proceedings will be as follows:—

The first step will be to obtain a warrant of arrest on sworn information and depositions taken, if necessary, as the Act authorizes, in the absence of the accused. A copy of each of these (the warrant, information, and depositions) should be taken and certified to be a copy by the magistrate, and his signature (except in

the case of the Lord Mayor or a metropolitan police magistrate) should, for the satisfaction of the Secretary of State, be verified by a statutory declaration of some person who either saw the document signed or is familiar with the signature. The original and copies should then be forwarded to the Secretary of State, together with a description, and if possible, a photograph, of the accused, and all details serving to identify him or contributing to his discovery in the British possession.

These should be accompanied with a covering letter moving the Secretary of State to authenticate both the original documents and the copies with his official seal, to return the originals so authenticated to the applicant, and to forward to the Colonial Office the copies so authenticated of each (viz., the warrant, information, and depositions, together with the photograph, description, and other details, in order that the Colonial Secretary may transmit them to the Governor of the British possession to which the accused is supposed to have fled, and may also at once telegraph to the Governor instructions for the arrest of the accused on a provisional warrant.

In some cases it may be advisable that the prosecutor should cause the original documents (duly authenticated) to be despatched in charge of some person as soon as a telegram notifying the arrest in a British possession has been received, and it then may be of importance that this person should be able personally to identify the accused.

Duties of Metropolitan Police.—The conduct of the proceedings belongs to the prosecutor, who may, if he thinks fit, obtain the return of the accused without availing himself of the services of the police; and whether or not the police are called on to act, the whole of the costs of procuring the arrest, surrender, and return to the United Kingdom from a British possession of an offender will (in consequence of the Act having repealed the statute 6 & 7 Vict., c. 34, by which a Court trying a fugitive from a British possession had power to order costs to be paid out of borough or county funds) fall on the prosecutor.

In cases where the prosecution is taken up by the Director of Public Prosecutions with a view to obtaining the surrender of the fugitive, or where instructions have been received from the Secretary of State, there can be no difficulty as to the duty of the police; but in other cases the police will not apply for a warrant in the metropolis as a first step towards obtaining the surrender from a colony of an offender, or make any request to the colonial police for his arrest on provisional warrant in the colony, or take any other step involving expense, unless adequate prepayment or indemnity has been received against all expenses that may be incurred, including the expenses of returning the accused to the British possession in the event of his being acquitted or not being prosecuted in the United Kingdom. In any case the action of the metropolitan police (except so far as auxiliary to that of the local police forces) in obtaining surrender will be confined to offences committed or triable within the metropolitan police district.

WHEREAS by *The Land Act* 1869 it was amongst other things enacted, that notwithstanding anything therein before contained the Governor might by proclamation declare that no person, although he be duly licensed or otherwise authorized, should cut, dig, or remove live or dead timber or particular description of timber or bark, stone, gravel, sand, loam, brick, or other earth from such portions of Crown lands as were named in such proclamation, or should exercise on any such portions the powers, or any of them, conferred by any license granted under the authority of Part III. of the said Act: Now therefore I, the Governor of Victoria, with the advice of the Executive Council, under and by virtue of the power conferred by the above-recited Act, do by this my Proclamation declare that no person although he be duly licensed or otherwise authorized, shall cut, dig or remove live timber, which, at the height of two feet from the ground, is of less diameter than twelve inches, from the land comprised within the boundaries of the Ravenswood Timber reserve.

HOTHAM RECREATION RESERVE.

Regulations for the care, protection, and management of the Hotham Recreation Reserve.

WE, Theophilus Smith Marshall, John Macgibbon, Daniel John Griffith, Robert Collie, Edward Lawrence, Edward James Lawrence, David Wilson, and Hugh Thom Jordan, the duly appointed committee of management of that portion of the reserve for public purposes (known as the West Melbourne Swamp) permissively occupied by the Hotham Cricket Club, having framed the following Regulations for the care, protection, and management of such portion of the said reserve, and for the preservation of good order and decency therein, submit the said Regulations to the Board of Land and Works, to be made by such Board, in pursuance of the powers conferred by section 108 of *The Land Act 1869*.

REGULATIONS.

- Such portion (hereinafter designated the Hotham Recreation Reserve) of the said reserve shall be divided as follows:—
 - The grand stand, pavilion, members' and ladies' reserves.
 - The playing ground.
 - The remainder of the reserve.
- All persons shall be admitted to the third division, free of charge, from sunrise to sunset, except on days whereon international, intercolonial, cup, and other important cricket or football matches shall be played, or on days on which sports shall be held in the Hotham Recreation Reserve.
- No person shall enter at any time into any part of the first division except on production of a ticket issued by the committee of management duly authorizing such person in that behalf.
- All persons paying for admission to the third division, or any part of it, or to the grand stand, shall be supplied with a ticket of admission, which they shall, upon demand, produce, and, if required, surrender to any gatekeeper or other person having authority from the committee of management to demand the production or surrender of same; and no such ticket of admission shall be of any avail except on the day for which it is issued.
- Persons renting or hiring any stand, buildings, erection, or enclosure for the occasion of any cricket or football match, or other sports, may be required to deposit any sum, not exceeding Ten pounds, which the committee of management may determine, by way of guarantee that due care shall be taken of such stand, buildings, erection, or enclosure; and the committee of management may make repairs or make good any damage or loss sustained by such stand, buildings, erection, or enclosure, or anything contained therein, during such occupancy or hiring, and deduct the cost of making good such loss or damage from the sum of money deposited by any person by way of guarantee; and all persons so renting or hiring shall abide by these Regulations, and by any order given by the committee of management in reference to the reserves, buildings, erections, or enclosures for the time being thereon.
- No person shall enter or remain in the Hotham Recreation Reserve who may offend against decency, as regards dress, language, or conduct.
- No person shall damage in any way the trees, shrubs, or flowers in the Hotham Recreation Reserve, nor shall fires be lighted therein.
- No person shall climb or jump over the fences, gates, or stick bills thereon, or cut names on or in any way damage any of the buildings, gates, fences, seats, or trees in the Hotham Recreation Reserve, nor leave or deposit any glass or rubbish, nor roll or throw stones therein.
- No person shall put in the Hotham Recreation Reserve any cattle, sheep, goats, or other animals.
- No person shall bring into the Hotham Recreation Reserve any dog unless led by a chain or cord.
- No person shall erect any dwelling in the Hotham Recreation Reserve, nor any booth or other structure, for the purpose of offering for sale any article, without the consent, in writing, of the committee of management first obtained.
- No person, except workmen employed in the Hotham Recreation Reserve, shall enter any plots therein which may be enclosed for the plantation of young trees or shrubs.
- Any person committing in the Hotham Recreation Reserve, or in any of the buildings or erections for the time being thereon, any of the following offences may be removed from the reserve,

notwithstanding such person may have purchased, and shall or may be in possession of, a ticket of admission to the reserve or any part thereof:—

- Being drunk, or using any profane, indecent, or obscene language.
 - Assaulting any person, making use of any abusive, threatening, or insulting expressions, or behaving in an improper or riotous manner.
 - Crossing or trespassing upon the playing ground during a cricket or football match, or sports, or during practice at cricket, or when crossing or trespassing upon the ground would be injurious to it as a cricket ground.
 - Being found in any part of the 1st, 2nd, or 3rd divisions of the Hotham Recreation Reserve, and not producing on demand, or surrendering, if required, to any gatekeeper or other person duly authorized to demand the production or surrender thereof, a ticket duly authorizing the admission of such person to the place wherein he or she may be found, unless such person shall forthwith satisfy the committee of management, or any person deputed by them, that he or she has paid the proper charge for admission to such place, and that the ticket of admission supplied to such person has been lost.
 - Obtaining admission to any part of the first, second, or third divisions when not entitled to such admission under these regulations.
14. The maximum scale of charges for admission to the third division and grand stand shall be as follows:—
- For admission of each person to the third division during any international, intercolonial, cup, or other important cricket or football match, or sports, such a sum as the committee of management may determine, not exceeding 2s. 6d.
 - For admission of each person to the grand stand, such a sum as the committee of management may determine, not exceeding 5s.
- Provided that the committee of management may exempt any person wholly or partially from the payment of all or any such charges or fees.
- Every person offending against these regulations shall, in accordance with section 108 of *The Land Act 1869*, on conviction before any justice, forfeit and pay a penalty not exceeding £5 for each offence; and every person who shall knowingly and wilfully offend against any such Regulations, and who shall not, after he shall have been warned by a bailiff of Crown lands, or any constable, desist from so offending; may be forthwith apprehended by such bailiff or constable, and be taken before some justice of the peace, and shall, on conviction, forfeit and pay a penalty not exceeding £10.

REGULATIONS FOR THE MANAGEMENT OF THE BEREMBOKE AND COOLEBARGHURK COMMON.

IN pursuance of the Regulations relating to Commons, made by the Governor in Council on the 1st April 1879, the managers of the Beremboke and Coolebarghurk Common, having drafted the following Regulations for the management thereof, submit the same for revision by the Board of Land and Works, and approval by the Governor in Council, in lieu of the regulations heretofore in force in respect of such common.

Regulations.

1. In the construction and for the purposes of these regulations, the words "large cattle" shall mean cows, heifers, oxen, steers, mares, geldings, colts, fillies, mules, and asses; and the words "small cattle" shall mean sheep and goats.

2. Ratepayers, holders of miners' rights, business licenses, or carriers' licenses, and farmers residing within five (5) miles of the common may respectively depasture thereon four (4) head of large cattle, or the equivalent of the whole or a portion thereof in small cattle, on the basis that one (1) head of large cattle be deemed equivalent to three (3) head of small cattle. A farmer having under cultivation not less than one-tenth portion of the land occupied by him may depasture on the common one additional head of large cattle, or the equivalent in small cattle, for every ten (10) acres of such land cultivated by him; but in no case shall the maximum number allowed to any one person exceed sixteen (16) head of large cattle.

3. The following shall be the scale of fees, payable quarterly in advance, for depasturing stock on the common:—

For every horse	10s. per annum.
" " head of other cattle	4s. "
Young cattle under 6 months old, the progeny of stock legally depasturing on the common	Free.

4. No person shall depasture stock on the common unless such stock be his or her own property.

5. The managers will not be responsible for stock placed on the common beyond supervising the duties of the herdsman.

6. Persons desirous of removing stock from the common shall give twenty-four (24) hours' notice to the herdsman before so doing.

7. All stock found trespassing on the common will be liable to be impounded, and it shall be the duty of the herdsman to impound them.

8. Stock affected with any contagious disease will in no case be allowed to remain on the common; and if after due notice having been given to the owner to remove any such stock, he fail to do so within a reasonable time named in such notice, the managers may cause all such diseased stock to be destroyed at owners' risk.

9. The managers, or some person appointed by them in writing, will attend at the yard on branding days, to receive fees and give receipts therefor, on behalf of the managers; and no stock shall at any time be taken in charge by the herdsman until the owner produces such receipt.

10. The herdsman shall muster all stock found on the common the first Monday in every quarter. He shall provide branding material, and brand all registered stock with the common-brand B. He shall release, at his own expense, all registered stock which may be impounded. If at mustering time any stock duly registered for the previous quarter are not produced, the herdsman will be responsible for their full value to the owners, should he not be able to show that he had given to the owners at least six days' notice, in writing, of the loss thereof, and had otherwise used all due diligence for their recovery. It shall be part of his duties to lay poisoned-grain for the destruction of rabbits on any part of the common where directed by the managers, who will provide the grain.

11. The managers shall have full power to remove the herdsman for neglect of duty, by giving him one month's notice in writing.

Every person offending against any of the foregoing regulations shall, on conviction before any justice, forfeit and pay a penalty not exceeding Twenty pounds for each offence.

2. No person shall permit, allow, or cause to enter within the fence enclosing the water in the said reserve any cattle, goats, pigs, geese, or other animals, without the written authority of the committee of management or their officer duly appointed.

3. No person shall climb or jump over, or break or otherwise damage the fence or gates of the said reserve, or break or otherwise damage the pumps and troughs attached thereto.

Every person offending against these regulations, or refusing to pay upon demand the fees specified therein, shall, in accordance with section 108 of *The Land Act 1869*, on conviction before any justice, forfeit and pay a penalty not exceeding Five pounds for each offence; and every person who shall knowingly and wilfully offend against any such regulations, and who shall not, after he shall have been warned by a bailiff of Crown lands or any constable, desist from so offending, may be forthwith apprehended by such bailiff or constable, and be taken before some justice of the peace, and shall, on conviction, forfeit and pay a penalty not exceeding Ten pounds.

RULES AND REGULATIONS.

WHEREAS the Trustees of the said Cemetery, appointed by virtue of *The Cemeteries Statute 1864*, are empowered to enclose any land to be granted to them for the purpose of a Public Cemetery with walls, rails, fences, or palisades, and to erect suitable gates and entrances, and to lay out and ornament such cemetery, and to embellish the same with walks, avenues, roads, and shrubs, and to preserve, maintain, and keep in a cleanly and orderly state and condition such cemetery, and its walls and fences, and all monuments, tombstones, enclosures, buildings, erections, walks, and shrubberies therein. And the said trustees are by the said Act further empowered and authorized to make such rules and regulations and to do and perform, and cause to be done and performed, all such acts, matters, and things as may be necessary and proper for any of the purposes aforesaid, and for the several other purposes in the said Act mentioned: Now therefore the trustees of the said cemetery, in pursuance of the powers and authority so given to them as aforesaid, do make the following Rules and Regulations—

Before any interment shall take place in the said cemetery, application for permission shall be made in the office of the Trustees a reasonable time previously, when an order in the form or to the effect set out in the schedule hereto annexed marked A, will be given to the applicant on payment of the proper charges,

All such charges must be paid when the order for interment is given, or before the ground or vault is opened.

The charges will be remitted on the burial of any poor person in such cemetery, on a certificate of a minister of religion or other sufficient evidence to the satisfaction of the trustees, that such person was a pauper, or that the relations and friends of the deceased are unable to pay the costs and charges.

The name, age, late place of residence, and probable cause of death of the deceased, must be stated at the time of applying for the order, according to the instructions in Schedule B.

The time fixed for the funeral to be the time when the procession is to be at the cemetery, and the same must be observed as punctually as possible.

Until otherwise ordered, the usual hours fixed for the performance of funerals will be from ten a.m. to six p.m. in the months of September to April, both inclusive; and from ten a.m. to four p.m. in the other four months, except on Sundays, when the usual and only hours for funerals will be from two to five o'clock p.m. throughout the year.

The trustees will cause all common graves to be dug, and all orders for interment shall be given to the keeper at the lodge of the cemetery, or at the office of the trustees, in sufficient time for that purpose and to allow the necessary arrangements to be made.

No fencing round any grave to be erected until approved by the trustees.

No servant or other person employed by, or engaged in any duty, or on behalf of the trustees, will be permitted to receive any gratuity for the discharge thereof.

No dogs, horses or conveyances will be allowed to enter the cemetery.

The ground will be open to the public daily from sunrise to sunset.

The keeper shall have orders to turn out or take into custody, as the case may require, any person who shall behave indecorously, or commit any trespass or injury to the trees, flowers, or erections, or otherwise infringe the Act of Council relating to the cemetery, or the regulations for protection of the same, and such persons will be proceeded against according to the provisions of the Act.

Family or Private Burial-places.

The trustees will permit vaults or graves to be dug, maintained, and kept as family or private burial-places, according to the terms of such permission, to and for the sole and separate use of any person desirous to have the same, and his representatives for ever, and monuments or tombstones may be erected or placed thereon, in accordance with these rules and regulations, on payment of such fees as shall from time to time be established by them. Permission to have a family or private burial-place will be granted at the office of the trustees, in the form and to the effect set forth in Schedule A hereto annexed. Parties wanting brick graves or vaults will be required to construct them under the direction of the trustees; and in case interment is to be made in any private grave or vault, the consent of the party entitled thereto (in writing) must be left with the order. No interment shall take place in any vault or private family burying-place until an order be obtained from the trustees, and payment of such charges as shall from time to time be established by them.

All monuments, vaults, graves, burying-places, and grave-stones to be kept in repair and proper condition at the expense of the owners.

Every coffin in a vault or brick grave to be bricked in, cemented, and covered by a slab of freestone, slate, or iron.

A drawing of every stone, tomb, or pedestal, and a plan of every monument or tablet proposed to be erected, and a copy of every epitaph or inscription shall be submitted to the trustees for approval before permission for the erection or placing thereof shall be given. In the erection of tablets copper cramps must be used. The trustees shall determine the position of any monument proposed to be erected (when approved by them) according to the description, size, and character thereof, having reference to the general plan for ornamenting the said cemetery in an appropriate manner.

A plan of the cemetery, showing the situation of the purchased and other graves, shall be kept at the office of the trustees, and may be inspected; and registers of all grants will be kept by the secretary.

The trustees reserve the right to make any alterations from time to time in these charges and regulations.

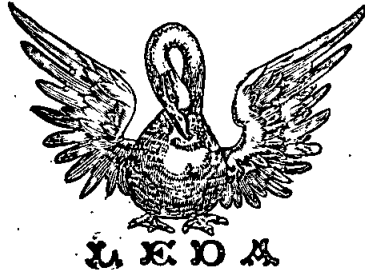
