TASMANIA—NORTH COAST.—TAMAR RIVER ENTRANCE.

(1.) *Port Dalrymple—Leading Lights at She-oak Point.*

The Government of Tasmania has given notice, that on 1st December 1882, two leading lights were exhibited on She-oak Point, Port Dalrymple, east side of Tamar River entrance.—

The lights are fixed white lights, placed 400 yards apart, and when kept in line bearing S.E. by E. lead through the West Channel, Tamar River entrance. The lights should be visible in clear weather from a distance of 9 miles.

The upper light, elevated 55 feet above high-water, is visible between the bearings of N.N.W., through north and east, to S.E. $\frac{1}{2}$ E. The lower light, elevated 38 feet above high-water, is visible between the bearings of N. $\frac{1}{2}$ W., through north and east, and S.E. $\frac{1}{2}$ E.

AUSTRALIA—EAST COAST.—INNER ROUTE.

(2.) *Non-existence of Sunken Danger South-eastward of Dugdale Rock.*

With reference to Notice to Mariners, No. 172 (1), of 2nd September 1882, on the reported existence of a sunken danger

lying about one mile south-eastward of Dugdale Rock, Inner Route, between capes Sidmouth and Direction:—

The Queensland Government has given further notice, dated 17th October 1882—on the authority of the commander of the Government schooner *Pearl*, who had carefully examined the locality, without discovering any sign of its existence—that the danger reported was probably Dugdale Rock itself. The sunken danger therefore has been removed from the Admiralty charts.

NORTH COAST—TORRES STRAIT.

(3.) *Temporary Light on Goode Island.*

Also, has given notice that on and after 13th October 1882 a light would be exhibited from the signalman's cottage on Goode Island, between Prince of Wales Channel and Normanby Sound. (The light is stated in the notice to be temporary):—

The light is a fixed white light, elevated 250 feet above the sea; it should be visible in clear weather from a distance of 7 miles when clear of the north end of Hammond Island, and through south, to the bearing of E.N.E.; also in Normanby sound, between the bearings of N. by E. and N.W. by N.

By His Excellency The Most Honorable George Augustus Constantine, Marquis of Normanby, Earl of Mulgrave, Viscount Normanby, and Baron Mulgrave of Mulgrave, all in the County of York, in the Peerage of the United Kingdom; and Baron Mulgrave of New Ross, in the County of Wexford, in the Peerage of Ireland; a Member of Her Majesty's Most Honorable Privy Council; Knight Grand Cross of the Most Distinguished Order of Saint Michael and Saint George; Governor and Commander-in-Chief in and over the Colony of Victoria and its Dependencies, &c., &c., &c.

of the Executive Council, do hereby diminish the undermentioned Commons in accordance with the provisions of the said Act, that is to say :—

THE CASTLEMAINE AMALGAMATED TOWN AND GOLDFIELD COMMON, described in a Proclamation bearing date the 7th day of October 1872, is hereby diminished by deducting therefrom one acre one rood, more or less, of land, being the portion of allotment 1 of section D, parish of Chewton, situate south of the creek by which it is intersected.

1st. All charges must be paid when orders are given, or before the grave or vault is opened.

2nd. Orders for interment must be given to Mr. James Dunphy, Treasurer, one of the Trustees, between the hours of 10 a.m. and 5 p.m. the previous day.

3rd. The name, age, late place of residence, and probable cause of death of the deceased must be stated at the time of giving the order.

4th. The procession to arrive at the cemetery punctually at the time appointed for the funeral.

5th. The usual hours of interment will be from 10 a.m. to 6 p.m. from 1st September till 30th April, and from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. in the other four months of the year.

6th. The charges will be remitted for the burial of any person on the certificate of a justice, or on evidence being produced to the trustees that the relatives or friends of such persons are unable to pay the cost and charges.

7th. Application for permission to make a vault or erect a monument in the cemetery to be made at the office of the trustees. A certificate of permission will be granted to the person applying on payment of the proper charges.

8th. The trustees will cause all common graves to be dug, but when a brick grave or vault is required it must be constructed under the direction of the trustees or some person duly appointed by them; and in case interment is to be made in any private grave or vault belonging to any other person, the consent in writing of such person must be left with the order.

RULES AND REGULATIONS.

1. All fees and charges shall be paid when orders are given, or before the ground or vault is opened.
2. Any person making a vault or erecting and placing a monument or tombstone in the cemetery, by and with the permission of the trustees, and upon payment of the proper fees and charges, shall be entitled to have, maintain, and keep such vault, monument, or tombstone, according to the terms of such permission, to and for the sole and separate use of his or her representatives for ever.
3. Application for such permission shall be made at the office of the trustees. A certificate of permission will be granted to the party applying for such permission on payment of the proper fees and charges.
4. The fees and charges will be remitted on the burial of any poor person in such cemetery upon an order signed by a justice of the peace (under the Act of Parliament, No. 310), or on a certificate of a minister of religion or other evidence, proving to the satisfaction of the trustees that such person was a pauper, or that his or her friends and relatives are unable to pay the fees and charges.
5. Orders for interment must be given at the office of trustees during the day previous to that on which it is intended to take place.
6. The name, age, late place of residence, and probable cause of death of deceased, must be stated at the time of giving the order.
7. The time fixed for the funeral to be the time when the procession is to be at the cemetery, and the same must be punctually observed.
8. The hour fixed for the performance of funerals shall be from 10 a.m. to 6 p.m. in the months from September to April inclusive, and from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. in the other four months of the year.
9. All monuments, vaults, graves, tombstones, and fences, or any other erection shall be maintained and kept in repair and proper condition by and at the expense of the owner.
10. Every coffin in a vault or bricked grave shall be bricked in, cemented, and covered by a slab of stone, slate, or iron.
11. The cemetery shall be open to the public daily, from sunrise to sunset.
12. A plan of the cemetery, showing the distribution of the land, compartments, situations, and numbers of the graves, and registry of all grants, and certificates of right of burial, shall be kept at the office of the secretary of the trustees, where they may be inspected.
13. The depth of graves or vaults shall not be less than 6 feet, and in cases of re-opening for additional interment no coffin remain less than 4 feet from the surface.
14. All monuments, tombstones, fences, or any other erection, shrubberies, &c., shall be protected from drainage, and the cemetery shall be maintained in general good order under the supervision of the trustees.

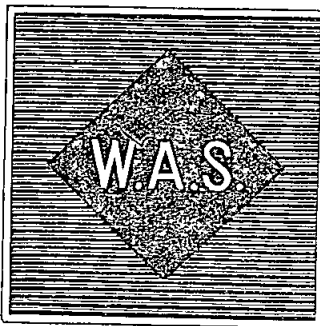
