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TREATY OF FRIENDSHIP, COMMERCE, AND NAVIGATION BETWEEN GREAT BRITAIN AND THE REPUBLIC OF THE EQUATOR.

THE following Despatch from the Right Honorable the Secretary of State for the Colonies to His Excellency the Governor, and its enclosure, are published for general information.

SIR,—With reference to Lord Kimberley's Circular Despatch of the 8th July 1881, I have the honor to transmit to you, C. 4785. for information and publication in the colony under your Government, a copy of a Treaty of Friendship, Commerce, and Navigation, between Her Majesty and the Republic of the Equator, signed at Quito on the 18th of October 1880, the ratifications of which were exchanged at Quito on the 19th of February last.

You will observe that the terms of the Protocol of 17th July 1885, relating to the Colonies, accord with the wishes of your Government, as expressed in reply to the above-quoted Despatch.

TREATY OF FRIENDSHIP, COMMERCE, AND NAVIGATION BETWEEN HER MAJESTY AND THE REPUBLIC OF THE EQUATOR.

Signed at Quito, October 18, 1880.

[Ratification exchanged at Quito, February 19, 1886.]

HER Majesty the Queen of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, and the Republic of the Equator, being desirous of extending and facilitating the relations of commerce between their respective territories and subjects and citizens, have resolved to conclude a Treaty for that purpose, and have named as their respective Plenipotentiaries, that is to say:

Her Majesty the Queen of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, Frederic Douglas Hamilton, Esquire, Her Minister Resident to the Republic of the Equator;

And his Excellency the President of the Republic of the Equator, General Cornelio E. Vernaza, Minister of Foreign Affairs;

Who, after having communicated to each other their respective full powers, found in good and due form, have agreed upon and concluded the following Articles:—

ARTICLE I.

There shall be perpetual friendship between the dominions and subjects of Her Majesty the Queen of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, her heirs and successors, and the Republic of the Equator and its citizens.

ARTICLE II.

There shall be between all the dominions and possessions of the two High Contracting Parties reciprocal freedom of commerce and navigation. The subjects and citizens of each of the two Contracting Parties, respectively, shall have liberty freely and securely to come, with their ships and cargoes, to all places, ports, and rivers in the dominions and possessions of the other to which other foreigners are, or may be, permitted to come, and shall, throughout the whole extent of the dominions and possessions of the other, enjoy the same rights, privileges, liberties, favours, immunities, and exemptions in matters of commerce and navigation which are or may be enjoyed by native subjects or citizens generally.

Su Majestad la Reina del Reino Unido de la Gran Bretaña é Irlanda, y la República del Ecuador, deseando extender y facilitar las relaciones de comercio entre sus respectivos territorios y súbditos y ciudadanos, han resuelto concluir un Tratado para aquel efecto, y han nombrado como sus respectivos Plenipotenciarios, á saber:

Su Majestad la Reina del Reino Unido de la Gran Bretaña é Irlanda, al Señor Federico Douglas Hamilton, Escudero, su Ministro Residente en la República del Ecuador; y

Su Excelencia el Presidente de la República del Ecuador, al Señor General Cornelio E. Vernaza, Ministro de Relaciones Exteriores;

Quiénes, después de comunicarse sus respectivos plenos poderes, hallándolos en buena y debida forma, han convenido y concluido los siguientes Artículos:—

ARTICULO I.

Habrà perfecta amistad entra la República del Ecuador y sus ciudadanos y los dominios y súbditos de Su Majestad la Reina del Reino Unido de la Gran Bretaña é Irlanda, sus herederos y sucesores.

ARTICULO II.

Habrà entre todos los dominios y posesiones de las dos Partes Contratantes reciproca libertad de comercio y navegacion. Los ciudadanos y súbditos de cada una de las Partes Contratantes respectivamente tendrán libertad para entrar libre y seguramente con sus buques y cargamentos á todos los parajes, puertos y rios de las posesiones y dominios de la otra, á los cuales se permite ó se permitiere entrar á otros extranjeros, y gozarán en toda la extension de las posesiones y dominios antedichos, en materia de comercio y navegacion, de los mismos derechos, privilegios, libertades, favores, inmunidades, exenciones que generalmente gozan ó gozaren los nacionales.

ARTICLE III.

No other or higher duties shall be imposed on the importation into the dominions and possessions of Her Britannic Majesty of any article the produce or manufacture of the dominions and possessions of the Republic of the Equator, from whatever place arriving, and no other or higher duties shall be imposed on the importation into the dominions and possessions of the Republic of the Equator of any article the produce or manufacture of Her Britannic Majesty's dominions and possessions, from whatever place arriving, than are or shall be payable on the like article the produce or manufacture of any other foreign country; nor shall any prohibition be imposed on the importation of any article the produce or manufacture of the dominions and possessions of either of the two Contracting Parties into the dominions and possessions of the other, which shall not equally extend to the importation of the like articles being the produce or manufacture of any other country.

ARTICLE IV.

No other or higher duties or charges shall be imposed in the dominions and possessions of either of the Contracting Parties on the exportation of any article to the dominions and possessions of the other, than such as are or may be payable on the exportation of the like article to any other foreign country; nor shall any prohibition be imposed on the exportation of any article from the dominions and possessions of either of the two contracting parties to the dominions and possessions of the other which shall not equally extend to the exportation of the like article to any other country.

ARTICLE V.

Goods, in respect of which import duties shall have been paid upon the importation thereof by a subject or citizen of either country at a port of the United Kingdom or the Republic of the Equator, shall not be liable to the payment of any further import duty, in the event of such goods being conveyed by sea to any other port of the United Kingdom or Republic; provided, always, that both in the United Kingdom and in the Republic of the Equator such reshipments shall have been made in conformity with the laws of the two countries respectively for the regulation of the coasting trade.

ARTICLE VI.

Equality of treatment in regard to warehousing and to the transit trade, and also in regard to bounties, facilities, and drawbacks, shall be enjoyed by the subjects and citizens of the High Contracting Parties reciprocally.

ARTICLE VII.

All the articles the produce or manufacture of the dominions and possessions of either of the Contracting Parties, or of any other country, which are or may be legally importable into the ports of the dominions and possessions of Her Britannic Majesty in British vessels, may likewise be imported into those ports in Equatorian vessels, without being liable to any other or higher duties or charges, of whatever denomination, than is such articles were imported in British vessels; and, reciprocally, all articles the produce or manufacture of the dominions and possessions of either of the Contracting Parties, or of any other country, which are or may be legally importable into the ports of the dominions and possessions of the Republic of the Equator in Equatorian vessels, may likewise be imported into those ports in British vessels, without being liable to any other or higher duties or charges, of whatever denomination, than if such articles were imported in Equatorian vessels. Such reciprocal equality of treatment shall take effect without distinction, whether such articles come directly from the place of origin or from any other place.

In the same manner there shall be perfect equality of treatment in regard to exportation; so that the same export duties shall be paid, and the same bounties and drawbacks allowed, in the dominions and possessions of either of the High Contracting Parties, on the exportation of any article which is or may be legally exportable therefrom, without distinction whether such exportation shall take place in British or in Equatorian vessels, and whatever may be the place of destination, whether a port of either of the Contracting Parties or of any third Power.

ARTICLE VIII.

No duties of tonnage, harbour, pilotage, light-house, quarantine, or other similar or corresponding duties of whatever nature, or under whatever denomination, levied in the name or for the profit of Government, public functionaries, private individuals, corporations, or establishments of any kind, shall be imposed in the ports of the dominions and possessions of either country which shall not equally and under the same conditions be imposed in the like cases on the vessels of other nations.

Such equality of treatment shall apply reciprocally to the respective vessels, from whatever port or place they may arrive, and whatever may be their place of destination.

ARTICLE IX.

It being understood that the general liberty of commercial communication conceded by both Contracting Parties to one another by the preceding Articles Nos. V., VI., and VII. shall in no way extend to the coasting trade of the two respective nations.

ARTICLE X.

In all that regards the stationing, loading, and unloading of vessels in the ports, basins, docks, roadsteads, harbours, or rivers

ARTICULO III.

No se impondrán otros ó mas altos derechos á la importacion en los dominios y posesiones de la República del Ecuador de cualesquiera artículos naturales ó manufacturados de los dominios y posesiones de Su Majestad Británica, de cualquier paraje que llegaren, que los que se pagan ó pagaren por semejantes artículos, cuando sean productos naturales ó manufacturados de cualquier otro pais extranjero; ni se impondrán otros ó mas altos derechos á la importacion en los dominios y posesiones de Su Majestad Británica, de cualesquiera artículos naturales ó manufacturados de los dominios y posesiones de la República del Ecuador, de cualquier paraje que llegaren, que los que pagan ó pagaren por semejantes artículos cuando sean productos naturales ó manufacturados de cualquier otro pais extranjero; ni se impondrá prohibicion alguna á la importacion de los productos naturales ó manufacturados de los dominios y posesiones de una de las dos Partes Contratantes en los dominios y posesiones de la otra, que no se extiendan á la importacion de iguales artículos cuando sean productos naturales ó manufacturados de cualquiera otro pais.

ARTICULO IV.

No se impondrán otros ó mas altos derechos ó impuestos en los dominios y posesiones de cualquiera de las Partes Contratantes, á la exportacion de cualesquiera artículos para los dominios y posesiones de la otra, que los que pagan ó pagaren por la exportacion de iguales artículos para cualquier otro pais extranjero; ni se impondrá prohibicion alguna á la exportacion de cualesquiera artículos de los dominios y posesiones de cualquiera de las dos Partes Contratantes á los dominios y posesiones de la otra que no se extiendan igualmente á la exportacion de iguales artículos para cualquiera otra nacion.

ARTICULO V.

Las mercaderías respecto de las cuales se hubiesen pagado derechos de entrada sobre su importacion por un súbdito ó ciudadano de cualquier pais en un puerto del Reino Unido ó de la República del Ecuador, no estarán sujetas al pago de otro derecho de entrada, en el caso de que tales mercaderías se conduzcan por mar á cualquier otro puerto de la República ó del Reino Unido; siempre que, tanto en la República del Ecuador como en el Reino Unido, se hubiesen hecho los reembargos en conformidad de las leyes que respectivamente hubiesen dada los dos paises para el arreglo del comercio de cabotaje.

ARTICULO VI.

Los ciudadanos y súbditos de las dos Altas Partes Contratantes gozarán de reciproca igualdad de trato en lo concerniente al depósito de mercaderías y al comercio de tránsito, y tambien en lo relativo á franquicias, abonos y descuentos de derechos de aduana.

ARTICULO VII.

Todos los artículos naturales ó manufacturados de los dominios y posesiones de cualquiera de las Partes Contratantes ó de cualquier otro pais que sean ó llegaren á ser legalmente importables en los puertos de los dominios y posesiones de la República del Ecuador en buques Ecuatorianos, podrán importarse tambien en dichos puertos en buques Británicos, sin que estén sujetos á otros ó mas altos derechos ó impuestos de cualquiera denominacion que los que se pagan ó pagaren por tales artículos siendo importados en buques Ecuatorianos; y reciprocamente los artículos naturales ó manufacturados de los dominios y posesiones de cualquiera de las Partes Contratantes, ó de cualquiera otro pais, que sean ó llegaren á ser legalmente importables en los puertos de los dominios y posesiones de Su Majestad Británica en buques Británicos podrán importarse tambien en dichos puertos en buques Ecuatorianos, sin que estén sujetos á otros ni mas altos derechos ó impuestos de cualquiera denominacion que los que se pagan ó pagaren por tales artículos importados en buques Británicos. Esta reciproca igualdad de trato se efectuará sin distincion, sea que tales artículos vayan directamente del lugar de su origen ó de cualquier otro.

Habrà, de la misma manera, perfecta igualdad de trato respecto de la exportacion; de suerte que se pagarán los mismos derechos y se permitirán las mismas franquicias y descuentos en los dominios y posesiones de las dos Altas Partes Contratantes por la exportacion de cualesquiera artículos que sean ó llegaren á ser legalmente exportables en los dichos dominios y posesiones sin distincion, sea que la exportacion se haga en buques Ecuatorianos ó Británicos, y cualquiera que sea el lugar del destino, esto es, que sea un puerto de cualquiera de las Partes Contratantes ó de una tercera Potencia.

ARTICULO VIII.

Ningun derecho de tonelada, puerto, pilotaje, fero, curantena ó otros correspondientes á semejantes derechos de cualquiera naturaleza, bajo cualquiera denominacion que se exijan á nombre ó en beneficio de los funcionarios públicos, individuos particulares, corporaciones de cualquiera especie, se impondrán en los puertos de los dominios y posesiones de una de las dos partes sobre los buques del otro pais, que no se impongan igualmente y bajo las mismas condiciones, en casos semejantes á los buques de otras naciones.

Tal igualdad de trato se aplicará reciprocamente á los respectivos buques, de cualquiera puerto ó paraje que arribaren, y sea cualquiera el lugar del destino.

ARTICULO IX.

Estando entendido que la libertad general de comunicacion comercial concedida por ambas Partes Contratantes de la una á la otra por los precedentes Artículos V., VI., VII., no se extenderá por ninguna parte al cabotaje de las dos respectivas naciones.

ARTICULO X.

En todo lo concerniente á la parada, carga y descarga de buques en los puertos, bahías, digues, surtideros ó rois de los dominios y

of the dominions and possessions of the two countries, the same privileges and immunities shall be conceded which have been conceded to the most-favoured nation.

ARTICLE XI.

All vessels which according to British law are to be deemed British vessels, and all vessels which according to Equatorian law are to be deemed Equatorian vessels, shall, for the purposes of this Treaty, be deemed British and Equatorian vessels respectively.

ARTICLE XII.

The High Contracting Parties agree that in all matters relating to commerce and navigation, any privilege, favour, or immunity whatever, which either Contracting Party has actually granted, or may hereafter grant, to the subjects or citizens of any other State, shall be extended immediately and unconditionally to the subjects or citizens of the other Contracting Party; it being their intention that the trade of each country shall be placed in all respects by the other on the footing of the most-favoured nation.

ARTICLE XIII.

The subjects or citizens of each of the Contracting Parties shall have in the dominions and possessions of the other, the same rights as native subjects or citizens in regard to trade-marks and designs of every description applicable to articles of manufacture.

ARTICLE XIV.

It shall be free for each of the two High Contracting Parties to appoint Consuls-General, Consuls, Vice-Consuls, and Consular Agents, to reside in the towns and ports of the dominions and possessions of the other.

Such Consuls-General, Consuls, Vice-Consuls, and Consular Agents, however, shall not enter upon their functions until after they shall have been approved and admitted, in the usual form, by the Government to which they are sent.

They shall exercise whatever functions, and enjoy whatever privileges, exemptions, and immunities are, or shall be granted there to Consuls of the most favoured nation.

ARTICLE XV.

The subjects or citizens of each of the two High Contracting Parties, conforming themselves to the laws of the country—

1. Shall have full liberty, with their families, to enter, travel, or reside in any part of the dominions and possessions of the other Contracting Party.

2. They shall be permitted to hire or possess the houses, manufactories, warehouses, shops, and premises, which may be necessary for them.

3. They may carry on their commerce by wholesale or retail, either in person or by any agents whom they may think fit to employ.

4. They shall not be subject, in respect of their persons or property, or in respect of passports, licenses for residence or establishment, nor in respect of their commerce or industry, to any taxes, whether general or local, nor to imposts or obligations of any kind whatever, other or greater than those which are or shall be imposed upon native subjects.

ARTICLE XVI.

The citizens of the Equator shall enjoy in all the dominions and possessions of Her Britannic Majesty complete and unlimited liberty of conscience, and shall exercise their religion publicly or privately in their own dwelling-houses, or in the chapels or places of worship, appointed for that purpose in conformity with the system of toleration established in the dominions and possessions of Her Britannic Majesty.

The subjects of Her Britannic Majesty residing in the dominions and possessions of the Equator shall enjoy the most perfect and entire security of conscience, without being annoyed or disturbed on account of their religious belief, provided that this takes place with the decorum due to Divine worship, and with due respect to the established laws, usages, and customs.

They shall have entire liberty to bury their dead, in accordance with the religious ceremonies practised in their country, in the sepulchres and cemeteries already established, or which may be hereafter established and appointed for that purpose, and the sepulchres of the dead, in conformity with the old and existing practice, shall not be profaned in any wise nor upon any account: subjecting themselves, however, with regard to the places of burial, to the laws for the preservation of public health which are or may be in vigour in the Equator.

ARTICLE XVII.

The subjects and citizens of each of the two high contracting parties in the dominions and possessions of the other shall be exempted from all compulsory military service whatever, whether in the army, navy, or national guard, or militia. They shall be equally exempted from all judicial and municipal charges and functions whatever, as well as from all contributions, whether pecuniary or in kind, imposed as compensation for personal service; and, finally, from forced loans and military exactions or requisitions.

In regard, however, to judicial and municipal charges and functions, those shall be excepted which are consequent upon the possession of real property or of a lease; and in regard to military exactions and requisitions, those which all subjects of the country are or shall be liable to as landed proprietors, or as farmers, or as tenants or occupiers of public-houses, or houses of a similar character.

ARTICLE XVIII.

The subjects and citizens of each of the two Contracting Parties in the dominions and possessions of the other shall be at full

ARTICULO XI.

Todos los buques que segun las leyes Equatorianas deben ser considerados como buques Equatorianos, y todos los buques que segun las leyes Británicas deben ser considerados como buques Británicos, serán considerados como buques Equatorianos ó Británicos respectivamente para los efectos de este Tratado.

ARTICULO XII.

Las Altas Partes Contratantes convienen en que en todas las materias relativas al comercio y navegacion, cualquier privilegio, favor ó inmunidad que una de las dos Partes Contratantes ha concedido en la actualidad ó pueda conceder en adelante á los ciudadanos ó súbditos de cualquier otro Estado, se extenderán inmediatamente y sin condicion á los ciudadanos ó súbditos de la otra Parte Contratante; siendo su intencion que el comercio de cada una de los dos países se pondrá, en todos respectos, como el de la nacion mas favorecida.

ARTICULO XIII.

Los ciudadanos ó súbditos de cada una de las Partes Contratantes tendrán en los dominios y posesiones de la otra los mismos derechos que los nacionales respecto á las marcas de comercio diseños de todo género aplicables á los artículos de manufactura.

ARTICULO XIV.

Será libre á cada una de las Altas Partes Contratantes el nombrar Cónsules-Generales, Cónsules, Vice-Cónsules, y Agentes Consulares, que residan en las ciudades y puertos de los dominios y posesiones de la otra.

Sin embargo, tales Cónsules-Generales, Cónsules, Vice-Cónsules, y Agentes Consulares no entrarán al ejercicio de sus funciones mientras no hubieren sido aprobados y admitidos en la forma acostumbrada por el Gobierno al cual fueren enviados.

Los enuniciados funcionarios ejercerán todas sus funciones y gozarán de todos los privilegios, exenciones, é inmunidades que esten concedidas ó que se concedieren á los Cónsules de la nacion mas favorecida.

ARTICULO XV.

Los ciudadanos ó súbditos de las dos Partes Contratantes, conformándose á las leyes del país—

1. Tendrán plena libertad, lo mismo que sus familias, para entrar, viajar, ó residir en cualquiera parte de los dominios y posesiones de la otra Parte Contratante.

2. Se les permitirá alquilar, ocupar las casas, manufactorias, almacenes, tiendas, y posesiones que puedan ser les necesarios.

3. Podrán ejercer su comercio por mayor ó menor, ya sea por sí ó por medio de cualesquiera agentes que crean conveniente emplear.

4. No estarán sujetos respecto de sus personas ó propiedades, ó respecto de pasaportes, licencias para residencia ó establecimiento, ni respecto de su comercio ó industria, á contribuciones algunas, sean generales ó locales, ni á impuestos ó cargas de cualquiera naturaleza, mas altas que las que paguen ó pagaren los nacionales.

ARTICULO XVI.

Los ciudadanos del Ecuador gozarán en todos los dominios y posesiones de Su Majestad Británica de una perfecta é ilimitada libertad de conciencia, y ejercitarán su religion, publica ó privadamente, dentro de sus casas particulares ó en las capillas ó lugares del culto destinados para aquel objeto, conforme al sistema de tolerancia establecido en los dominios y posesiones de Su Majestad Británica.

Los súbditos de Su Majestad Británica residentes en los dominios y posesiones del Ecuador gozarán de la mas perfecta y entera seguridad de conciencia, sin quedar por ello espuestos á ser molestados, inquietados, ni perturbados en razon de su creencia religiosa, con tal que lo hagan con el decoro debido al culto divino, respetando las leyes, usos y costumbres establecidas.

Tendrán tambien plena libertad para enterrar á sus muertos en la manera y con las ceremonias acostumbradas en su país y en las sepulturas y cementerios que se hallasen ó quedasen en adelante establecidos y preparados para tal objeto, y los sepulchros de los muertos, en conformidad á la práctica antigua y actual, no serán profanados de modo alguno ni por ningun motivo; sujetándose, sin embargo, por lo que hace á los lugares de entierro, á las leyes sobre preservacion de la salud pública que estén ó puedan estar vigentes en el Ecuador.

ARTICULO XVII.

Los ciudadanos ó súbditos de las dos Altas Partes Contratantes en los dominios y posesiones de la otra estarán exentos de todo servicio militar compulsorio de cualquiera naturaleza, sea en el ejército, marina, guardia nacional ó milicia. Estarán tambien exentos de todos los cargos y funciones judiciales ó municipales de cualquiera especie, como tambien de todas las contribuciones, sean pecuniarias ó en especie, impuestas como compensacion del servicio personal; y, finalmente, de préstamos forzosos y exacciones y requisiciones militares.

Sin embargo, respecto de los cargos y funciones judiciales ó municipales, se exceptuan los que sean efecto de la posesion de bienes raices ó de arrendamientos; y respecto de las exacciones y requisiciones militares, aquellos á que todos los nacionales están ó estuvieren sujetos como propietarios de tierras ó como arrendatarios, ó como inquilinos, á ocupantes de posadas ó de otras casas semejantes.

ARTICULO XVIII.

Los ciudadanos y súbditos de cada una de las Partes Contratantes en los dominios y posesiones de la otra tendrán plena

liberty to acquire, possess, and dispose of every description of property which the laws of the country may permit any foreigners, of whatsoever nation, to acquire and possess. They may acquire and dispose of the same, whether by purchase, sale, donation, exchange, marriage, testament, succession *ab intestato*, or in any other manner, under the same conditions as are established by the laws of the country for all foreigners. Their heirs and representatives may succeed to and take possession of such property, either in person or by agents acting on their behalf, in the same manner and in the same legal forms as subjects or citizens of the country. In the absence of heirs and representatives the property shall be treated in the same manner as the like property belonging to a subject of the country under similar circumstances.

In none of these respects shall they pay upon the value of such property any other or higher impost, duty, or charge than is payable by subjects of the country. In every case the subjects and citizens of the Contracting Parties shall be permitted to export their property, or the proceeds thereof if sold, freely, and without being subjected on such exportation to pay any duty as foreigners, or any other or higher duties than those to which subjects of the country are liable under similar circumstances.

If any subject or citizen of either of the two High Contracting Parties shall die without will or testament in any of the territories, dominions, or settlements of the other, the Consul-General or Consul of the nation to which the deceased belonged, or the representative of such Consul-General or Consul, in his absence, shall have the right to nominate curators to take charge of the property of the deceased, so far as the laws of the country will permit, for the benefit of the lawful heirs and creditors of the deceased; giving proper notice of such nomination to the authorities of the country.

ARTICLE XIX.

The dwellings, manufactories, warehouses, and shops of the subjects and citizens of each of the two High Contracting Parties in the dominions and possessions of the other, and all premises appertaining thereto, destined for purposes of residence or commerce, shall be respected. If there should be occasion to make a search of, or a domiciliary visit to, such dwellings and premises, or to examine or inspect books, papers, or accounts, such measure shall be executed only in conformity with the legal warrant or order, in writing, of a Tribunal, or of the competent authority.

The subjects and citizens of each of the two Contracting Parties in the dominions and possessions of the other shall have free access to the Courts of Justice for the prosecution and defence of their rights. They shall enjoy, in this respect, the same rights and privileges as subjects or citizens of the country, and shall, like them, be at liberty to employ, in all causes, their advocates, attorneys, or agents from among the persons admitted to the exercise of those professions, according to the laws of the country.

ARTICLE XX.

Any ship of war or merchant-vessel of either of the High Contracting Parties which may be compelled by stress of weather or by accident to take shelter in a port of the other, shall be at liberty to refit therein, to procure all necessary stores, and to put to sea again, without paying any dues other than such as would be payable in a similar case by a national vessel. In case, however, the master of a merchant-vessel should be under the necessity of disposing of a part of his merchandise, in order to defray his expenses, he shall be bound to conform to the regulations and tariffs of the place to which he may have come.

If any ship of war or merchant-vessel of one of the High Contracting Parties should run aground or be wrecked upon the coasts of the other, such ship or vessel, and all parts thereof, and all furniture and appurtenances belonging thereunto, and all goods and merchandise saved therefrom, including any which may have been cast into the sea, or the proceeds thereof, if sold, as well as all papers found on board such stranded or wrecked ship or vessel, shall be given up to their owners, or their agents, when claimed by them from the officers, British or Equatorian, as the case may be, who are by the laws or Government of their respective countries entrusted with the protection, preservation, and custody of shipwrecked property; and if there are no such owners or agents on the spot, then the same shall be delivered by the above-named officers to the British or Equatorian Consul-General, Consul, or Vice-Consul, in whose district the wreck or stranding may have taken place, upon being claimed by him within the period fixed by the laws of the country; and such Consuls, owners, or agents, shall pay only the expenses incurred in the preservation of the property, together with the salvage, or other expenses, which would have been payable in the like case of a wreck of a national vessel.

The goods and merchandise saved from the wreck shall be exempt from all duties of customs, unless cleared for consumption, in which case they shall pay the same rate of duty as if they had been imported in a national vessel.

In the case either of a vessel being driven in by stress of water, run aground, or wrecked, the respective Consul-General, Consuls, Vice-Consuls, and Consular Agents shall, if the owner or master, or other agent of the owner is not present, or is present and requires it, be authorized to interpose, in order to afford the necessary assistance to their fellow-countrymen.

ARTICLE XXI.

The Consuls-General, Consuls, Vice-Consuls, and Consular Agents of each of the High Contracting Parties residing in the dominions and possessions of the other, shall receive from the local authorities such assistance as can by law be given to them for the recovery of deserters from the merchant-vessels of their respective countries.

Sus herederos ó representantes pueden suceder en tales propiedades y tomar posesion de ellas, ya sea en persona ó por medio de agentes que obren en su favor en la misma manera y en las mismas formas legales que los nacionales. En falta de herederos y representantes, las propiedades se tratarán como las de un nacional en iguales circunstancias.

En ninguno de estas respectos pagarán por el valor de tales propiedades, otros ó mas altos impuestos, derechos ó gastos que los que pagan los nacionales. En todo caso se permitirá á los ciudadanos y súbditos de las Partes Contratantes el que puedan exportar su propiedad ó los productos de ella si hubiese sido vendida, libremente, y sin estar sujetos por tal exportacion á pagar derecho alguno como extranjeros, ó cualesquiera otros ó mas altos derechos que aquellos á que estén sujetos los nacionales en circunstancias semejantes.

Si muriese algun ciudadano ó súbdito de las dos Altas Partes Contratantes, sin otorgar testamento en los dominios y posesiones de la otra, el Cónsul-General ó Cónsul de la nacion á que perteneció el difunto, ó el representante del Cónsul-General ó Cónsul en su falta, tendrá derecho para nombrar curadores, que se encarguen de las propiedades del fallecido, en cuanto lo permitan las leyes del país, en beneficio de los herederos legítimos y de los acreedores del difunto, dando noticia oportuna de tal nombramiento á las autoridades del país.

ARTICULO XIX.

Las habitaciones, manufactorias, almacenes y tiendas de los ciudadanos y súbditos de cada una de las Altas Partes Contratantes en los dominios y posesiones de la otra, y todos los predios pertenecientes á ellos destinados para residencia ó comercio, serán respetados. Si hubiera necesidad de registro ó de una visita domiciliaria en todas las habitaciones y posesiones, ó de examinar ó inspeccionar libros, papeles ó cuentas, dichas medidas se ejecutarán en conformidad de la boleta ú orden legal dada por escrito por un Tribunal ó por la autoridad competente.

Los ciudadanos y súbditos de cada una de las dos Partes Contratantes en los dominios y posesiones de la otra tendrán libre acceso á las Cortes de Justicia para la prosecucion de sus causas y defenza de sus derechos. Gozarán en este respecto de los mismos derechos y privilegios que los nacionales, y tendrán tambien libertad para emplear en todas las causas á sus abogados procuradores ó agentes de entre las personas admitidas al ejercicio de tales profesiones, segun las leyes del país.

ARTICULO XX.

Cualquier buque de guerra ó mercante de una de las dos Altas Partes Contratantes que hubiere sido compelido por causa de temporal ú otro accidente fortuito á refugiarse en un puerto de la otra, podrá ser libremente reparado en dicho puerto y provisto de lo necesario y largado otra vez al mar, sin pagar otros derechos que los que se paguen en casos semejantes por un buque nacional. Sin embargo, si el comandante de un buque mercante se viese en la necesidad de disponer de una parte de sus mercaderías para atender á sus expensas, estará obligado á conformarse á las regulaciones y tarifas del lugar á que hubiese entrado.

Si algun buque de guerra ó nave mercante de una de las Altas Partes Contratantes escollase ó naufragase en las costas de la otra, tal buque ó nave y todas sus partes y todo su mobiliario y pertenencias, y todas las mercaderías que hubieren sido salvadas, incluyéndose las que hubiesen sido arrojadas al mar ó los productos de ellas, si hubiesen sido vendidas, como tambien los papeles encontrados á bordo de tales buques, encallados ó naufragos serán entregados á sus dueños ó á sus agentes, así que los reclamen de los empleados Equatorianos ó Británicos, segun el caso, quienes están por las leyes y Gobiernos de los respectivos países encargados de la proteccion, preservacion, y custodia de la propiedad naufragada. Y si no estuviesen en el lugar los tales dueños ó agentes, la entrega se hará por los supradichos empleados al Cónsul-General, Cónsul, ó Vice-Cónsul Equatoriano ó Británico, en cuyo distrito hubiese tenido lugar el naufragio ó baramiento, siendo reclamada dentro del plazo señalado por las leyes del país; y los tales Cónsules, dueños, ó agentes, pagarán solamente las expensas causadas en la preservacion de la propiedad, junto con el precio de salvamento ú otras expensas que hubiesen sido pagables en caso igual de naufragio de un buque nacional.

Los géneros y mercaderías salvados de naufragio estarán exentos de todo derecho de aduanas, á no ser que se hubieren despachado para el consumo, en cuyo caso pagarán los derechos correspondientes como si hubieran sido importados en el buque nacional.

En el caso en que un buque hubiese entrado en peligro por causa de temporal, ó que hubiese encallado ó naufragado, los respectivos Cónsules-Generales, Cónsules, Vice-Cónsules, y Agentes Cónsulares, estarán autorizados para interponer su autoridad, á fin de que se franquee á sus conciudadanos la asistencia necesaria, bien sea que el dueño ó comandante ó otro agente del dueño no esté presente, ó bien si estándolo, la solicita.

ARTICULO XXI.

Los Cónsules-Generales, Cónsules, Vice-Cónsules, y Agentes Cónsulares de una de las Altas Partes Contratantes, residentes en los dominios y posesiones de la otra, recibirán de las autoridades locales el auxilio que puedan darles por la ley para la recuperacion de desertores de los buques mercantes de sus respectivos países.

ARTICLE XXII.

For the better security of commerce between the subjects of Her Britannic Majesty and the citizens of the Republic of the Equator, it is agreed that, if at any time any interruption of friendly intercourse or any rupture should unfortunately take place between the two Contracting Parties, the subjects or citizens of either of the two Contracting Parties residing upon the coast shall be allowed six months, and those residing in the interior a year, to wind up their accounts and dispose of their property; and a safe-conduct shall be given them to embark at the port which they shall themselves select. All subjects or citizens of either of the two Contracting Parties who may be established in the dominions or territories of the other, in the exercise of any trade or special employment, shall have the privilege of remaining and continuing such trade or employment therein, without any manner of interruption, in full enjoyment of their liberty and property, as long as they behave peaceably and commit no offence against the laws; and their goods and effects, of whatever description they may be, whether in their own custody, or entrusted to individuals or to the State, shall not be liable to seizure or sequestration, or to any other charges or demands than those which may be made upon the like effects or property belonging to native subjects or citizens. In the same case, debts between individuals, public funds, and the shares of companies, shall never be confiscated, sequestered, or detained.

ARTICLE XXIII.

The present Treaty of Commerce and Navigation, when ratified, shall be substituted for the Treaty of Friendship, Commerce, and Navigation concluded between the High Contracting Parties at Quito on the 3rd day of May 1851. It shall remain in force for ten years from the date of the exchange of the ratifications, and further, until the expiration of twelve months after either of the High Contracting Parties shall have given notice to the other of its intention to terminate the same, each of the High Contracting Parties reserving to itself the right of giving such notice to the other at the expiration of the first nine years, or at any time afterwards.

ARTICLE XXIV.

The present Treaty shall be ratified, and the ratifications shall be exchanged at Quito in eight months from this date, or sooner if possible.

In witness whereof the respective Plenipotentiaries have signed the same, and have affixed thereto the seal of their arms.

Protocol.

Having met in the Ministry for Foreign Affairs of Ecuador, the undersigned, Christian William Lawrence, Esq., Her Britannic Majesty's Minister Resident, and J. Modesto Espinosa, Minister for Foreign Affairs, authorized by their respective full powers, found in good and due form, in discussing the exchange of the ratifications of the Treaty of Friendship, Commerce, and Navigation, signed in Quito on the 18th of October, 1880, and approved by Her Britannic Majesty and by the Congress of Ecuador, have agreed to the present Protocol:

1. The stipulations of the aforesaid Treaty shall be applicable to all the colonies and foreign possessions of Her Britannic Majesty, with the exception of those hereinafter named, that is to say:

The Dominion of Canada,
New South Wales,
Victoria,
Tasmania.

2. A paper shall be drawn up in which, after comparing the English and Spanish texts, the errors which had been made in copying them shall be corrected.

In witness whereof the undersigned have signed the present Protocol, and have thereto affixed their seals.

Protocol.

On account of the disappearance from their respective archives of the Declaration signed on the 4th November 1880, for the better understanding of the XVIth Article of the Treaty of Friendship and Commerce celebrated on the 18th October of the same year, the undersigned, Plenipotentiaries of Her Britannic Majesty and of Ecuador, having ascertained the terms of said Declaration from official notes and a duly authorized copy, agree to ratify it, reproducing it in the following terms:—

"The Plenipotentiaries of Her Britannic Majesty and of Ecuador declare:

"That the usages, customs, and ceremonies referred to in the third paragraph of the XVIth Article of the Treaty made by them must be understood as applying solely to the interior of the cemeteries which British subjects possess or may acquire, that is to say, that said ceremonies shall not take place except within the walls of the Pantheons or places of burial."

ARTICULO XXII.

Para la mejor seguridad del comercio entre los ciudadanos de la Republica del Ecuador y los súbditos de Su Majestad Británica, se ha convenido que si en algun tiempo, desgraciadamente, sucediere alguna interrupcion de la correspondencia comercial amistosa ó algun rompimiento entre las dos Altas Partes Contratantes, los ciudadanos ó súbditos de cualquiera de las Altas Partes Contratantes residentes en la costa tendrán seis meses para arreglar sus cuentas y disponer de su propiedad, y los que residen en el interior un año; y se les dará un salvo-conducto para embarcarse en el puerto que ellos eligieren. PROCLAMATION

By His Excellency Sir Frederick Napier Broome, Knight Commander of the Most Distinguished Order of St. Michael and Saint George, Governor and Commander-in-Chief in and over the Territory of Western Australia and its Dependencies, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS under the provisions of an Act of the Legislative Council, passed in the 43rd year of the reign of Her present Majesty, numbered 23, intituled “An Act for the prevention of the Importation of Diseased Stock,” the Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, is empowered by Proclamation to prohibit the introduction into the colony, either by land or sea, of any cattle within the meaning of the said Act and of “The Cattle Diseases Ordinance 1865,” and “The Imported Stock Act 1876,” or either of them: Now therefore I, the said Governor, in exercise of such power and of all other powers enabling me in this behalf, do by this Proclamation, with the

advice of the Executive Council, prohibit the importation into, and landing in, Western Australia, either by land or sea, from Great Britain or Ireland, or from any other place beyond the limits of the Australasian colonies, of all horned cattle, sheep, and swine.

REGULATIONS RELATING TO THE EXPORTATION
AND RE-INTRODUCTION OF SAMPLES OF MER-
CHANDISE.

Act 47 Vict. No. 768, section 102.

HIS Excellency the Governor in Council has approved of the subjoined Regulations relating to the exportation and re-introduction of samples of merchandise.

REGULATIONS.

1. Commercial travellers' samples of merchandise may be exported and re-introduced into Victoria, provided that such samples have been entered outwards in the usual way, by export warrant, which shall give full particulars of all goods intended to be shipped, and also that a bond in accordance with the form in Schedule “A” has been entered into by the exporter, with two approved sureties, for a sum equal to twice the amount of duty chargeable on such goods, and conditioned that no other goods will be substituted or returned instead of the samples so exported.

2. Persons intending to export samples must, at the time of passing the export entry, make application to the Collector of Customs for permission to ship the same, and for the services of an officer to inspect the goods. Such officer will compare the samples with the invoice thereof, which must be furnished to him by the exporter in duplicate, and the officer shall certify the entry as being correct, and also sign the invoices produced. He shall then seal the packages containing such goods. When the packages have been put on board the exporting vessel, a water-side officer shall make the entry “shipped,” on being satisfied that the seals are unbroken and the goods duly exported. The exporter shall deliver to the export officer one of the duplicate invoices, signed as aforesaid.

3. In the event of the whole or any portion of the goods so exported being returned, the same shall be specially entered as “returned samples,” and shall be compared and verified, if possible, by the officer who superintended the packing thereof in the first instance, with the invoice certified to by him at the time of examination, and deposited with the export officer.

4. In lieu of a bond for each shipment, a general bond may be accepted, in accordance with the form in Schedule “B,” from exporters of samples. Such bonds shall be for such sum as the Collector of Customs may direct in each case, with two approved sureties, and may be taken to cover all exportations of samples to any places in the Australasian Colonies for a period not exceeding twelve (12) months.

5. All samples of merchandise not duly entered outwards under the foregoing Regulations shall, on re-importation, pay the full rate of duty chargeable thereon on original importation, and under no circumstances will any exception to, or relaxation of, these regulations be made.

NOTICE is hereby given that on and after this date a fixed white and red light will be exhibited from Bay Rock. The apparatus is dioptric of the 4th order, and shows all around the horizon, except where intercepted to the W.S.W. through a sector of about 14 degrees.

The light will be seen as a red light from N. by W. & W. to N.N.W. & W.—that is, from the black buoy marking the 17-foot patch to the red cage buoy—and white through the remaining sectors. While the white light is in sight to the eastward of the red sector, vessels will be clear of "Virago" Rock and the shoal water off Cape Pallarenda.

**TRAGOWEL PLAINS IRRIGATION TRUST.—
REGULATION.**

THE Governor in Council has approved of the subjoined Regulation, made in pursuance of *The Victorian Water Conservation Act 1881* (No. 736, sec. 44).

THE Commissioners of the Tragowel Plains Irrigation Trust, in pursuance of the powers conferred by section 44 of *The Victorian Water Conservation Act 1881*, do make the following Regulation:—

No. I.

REGULATION OF PROCEEDINGS AT MEETINGS OF THE TRAGOWEL PLAINS IRRIGATION TRUST, ETC.

1. *General conduct of business.*—In all cases not herein provided for, resort shall be had to the rules, forms, and usages of Parliament, which shall be followed as far as the same are applicable to the proceedings of the Trust.

2. *Minutes of meeting to be read at next subsequent meeting.*—At every meeting of the Trust the first business thereof shall be the reading and putting a question for the confirmation of the minutes of the proceedings at the preceding meeting, and the reading of the minutes of the proceedings of any committee presented at any such preceding meeting; and no discussion shall be permitted thereon except as to their accuracy as a record of the proceedings; and the said minutes of the proceedings at the preceding meeting shall then be signed by the chairman; and the rough minutes of the proceedings of the Trust at any meeting shall be read at the close of such meeting, if required.

3. *Order of business at meetings.*—After the signing of the minutes as aforesaid, the order of business of an ordinary meeting shall be as follows, or as near thereto as may be practicable, but, for the greater convenience of the Trust at any particular meeting thereof, it may be altered by resolution to that effect:—

- (I.) Reading of copies of letters sent by the authority of the Trust.
- (II.) Reading letters received, and considering and ordering thereon.
- (III.) Reception and reading of petitions and memorials.
- (IV.) Presentation of reports of committees.
- (V.) Payments.
- (VI.) Ordinary business.
- (VII.) Orders of the day, including subjects continued from proceedings of former meetings.
- (VIII.) Extraordinary business and new rules and regulations.
- (IX.) Other motions of which previous notice has been given.
- (X.) Notices of motion.
- (XI.) Reading rough minutes (if required).

And the order of business at a special meeting shall be the order in which such business stands in the notice thereof.

4. *Addresses to Governor.*—All addresses to the Governor shall be presented by the chairman and secretary of the Trust, unless otherwise ordered by the Trust.

5. *Motions.*—All notices of motion shall be dated, and given by the intending mover to the secretary at the close of the meeting of the Trust, or delivered to him at his office personally or by post, provided that he receive them at least four days before the meeting at which they are to be proposed; and such secretary shall number and enter the same in the notice of motion book in the order in which they may be received.

6. *Notice of motion to be given.*—No commissioner shall make any motion initiating a subject for discussion but in pursuance of notice given, as prescribed in the last preceding clause.

7. *Petitions.*—No motion, except that for receiving the same, shall, unless under most urgent circumstances, be made on any petition, memorial, or other like application until the next ordinary meeting of the Trust after that at which it has been presented.

8. *Motions to be moved in order in motion book.*—Except by leave of the Trust, motions shall be moved in the order in which they have been received and recorded by the secretary in the notice of motion book; or they may be postponed by vote of the Trust, and if not so moved or postponed shall be struck out.

9. *Motion to be proceeded with by commissioner giving same, except with consent.*—No motion entered in the notice of motion book shall be proceeded with in the absence of the commissioner who gave notice of the same, unless by some other commissioner producing written authority from him to that effect.

10. *Draft of address or petition to be submitted at previous meeting.*—No motion for an address or petition shall be entertained unless the mover shall at some previous meeting have submitted a draft of the same.

11. *Order, &c., of debate.*—Any commissioner desirous of making a motion or amendment, or taking part in discussion thereon, shall rise and address the chairman, and shall not be interrupted unless called to order, when he shall sit down until the commissioner (if any) calling to order shall have been heard thereon, and the question of order disposed of, when the commissioner in possession of the chair may proceed with the subject.

12. *Nature of motion to be stated.*—Any commissioner desirous of proposing an original motion or amendment must state the nature of the same before he addresses the Trust thereon.

13. *Motion not to be withdrawn without leave.*—No motion or amendment shall be withdrawn without the leave of the Trust.

14. *Motion to be seconded.*—No motion or amendment shall be discussed or put to the vote of the Trust unless it be seconded, but a commissioner may, however, require the enforcement of any standing order of the Trust by directing the chairman's attention to the infraction thereof.

15. *Mover of motion.*—A commissioner moving a motion shall be held to have spoken thereon, but a commissioner merely seconding a motion shall not be held to have spoken upon it.

16. *Designation of commissioners.*—The commissioners in meeting of Trust shall designate each other by their official title, namely, that of chairman or commissioner, as the case may require.

17. *Priority of commissioners.*—If two or more commissioners rise to speak at the same time, the chairman shall decide which is entitled to priority.

18. *Chairman to rise in addressing Trust.*—The chairman shall rise in addressing the Trust to discuss any question, and shall not leave the chair on such occasions.

19. *Commissioner not to speak a second time on same question.*—No commissioner shall speak a second time on the same question unless entitled to reply, or in explanation when he has been misrepresented or misunderstood.

20. *Points of order.*—The chairman, when called upon to decide on points of order or practice, shall state the provision, rule, or practice which he deems applicable to the case, without discussing or commenting on the same, and his decision as to order or explanation in each case shall be final, except when an appeal is made to the Trust immediately upon the chairman giving his decision. On such an appeal no commissioner shall speak more than once, and the question shall be put thus—shall the decision of the chair be maintained.

21. *Commissioners not to depress, &c.*—No commissioner shall digress from the subject-matter of the question under discussion, or comment upon the words used by any other commissioner in a previous debate; and all imputations of improper motives and all personal reflections on commissioners shall be deemed highly disorderly.

22. *Commissioners to apologize for disorderly, &c., expressions.*—Whenever any commissioner shall make use of any expression disorderly or capable of being applied offensively to any other commissioner, the commissioner so offending shall be required by the chairman to withdraw the expression, and to make a satisfactory apology to the Trust.

23. *Commissioner called to order to sit down.*—A commissioner called to order shall sit down, unless permitted to explain.

24. *Commissioner twice offending guilty of an offence.*—Any commissioner using offensive or disorderly language, and having been twice called to order, or to withdraw and to apologize for such conduct, and refusing so to do, shall be liable to the penalty imposed for a breach of any of the provisions of this regulation.

25. *Strangers.*—Any person, not being a commissioner, who, having been admitted to any meeting of the Trust, shall be guilty thereof of any improper or disorderly conduct, or who shall not leave when lawfully requested by the chairman so to do, may be forthwith removed by him, and shall be liable to the penalty imposed for a breach of any of the provisions of this regulation.

26. *Committees of the whole.*—Whenever a majority of the Trust determine, any matter before the Trust may be referred to a committee of the whole for consideration, and report to the Trust, and such report may be received and adopted, or otherwise, as the Trust may think fit. When the Trust resolves itself into a committee of the whole, the public shall be ordered to withdraw by the chairman, and the doors shall be closed, unless a majority of the committee determine otherwise.

27. *Commissioners not attending order for call.*—Any commissioner not attending in compliance with an order for call of the whole Trust, without reasonable excuse to the satisfaction of the majority thereof, shall be liable to the penalty imposed for a breach of any of the provisions of this regulation.

28. *Commissioners may demand documents.*—Any commissioner may at right demand the production of any documents of the Trust applying to the question under discussion, and he may at any time, during ordinary business hours, require the officers of the Trust to produce for his inspection or examination any books or documents belonging to the Trust, but such books or documents shall not be removed from the offices without the permission of the chairman, and then only for short and limited periods.

29. *Voting.*—The Trust shall vote by show of hands, and any commissioner present and not voting, and not being disabled by law from so doing, shall be liable to the penalty imposed for a breach of any of the provisions of this regulation. Divisions shall be taken upon any question submitted to the vote of the Trust, provided any commissioner demand it, before the next business has been proceeded with. When a division is taken, the secretary shall call the names of those commissioners who are present, and enter in his minute-book how each vote, whether affirmatively or negatively, and the result shall be declared by the chairman.

30. *Question how declared.*—The chairman shall, in taking the sense of the Trust, put the question first in the affirmative, then in the negative, and the result thereof shall be recorded in the minutes.

31. *Motions, &c., to be in writing.*—At every meeting of the Trust all motions, whether original motions or amendments, shall be reduced into writing, signed by the mover, and delivered to the chairman immediately on their being moved and seconded.

32. *Amendments.*—(1.) No second or subsequent amendment, whether upon an original proposition or on an amendment, shall be taken into consideration until the previous amendment is disposed of. (2.) An amendment destroying or altering the intention of a motion shall be in order, but an amendment relating to a different subject shall not be in order. (3.) On an amendment to "strike out and insert," the paragraph to be amended shall first be read as it stands, then the words proposed to be struck out and inserted, and, finally, the paragraph as it would stand if so amended.

33. *Effect of rejection of original motion.*—If any words of an original question be rejected, the insertion of other proposed words shall form the next question, whereupon any further amendment to insert other words may be moved.

34. *If amendment be negatived a second one may be moved.*—If an amendment be negatived then a second amendment may be moved to the question to which the first-mentioned amendment was moved, but only one amendment shall be submitted to the Trust for discussion at a time.

35. *Mover of motion to have right of reply.*—The mover of every original proposition, but not of any amendment, shall have a right to reply, immediately after which the question shall be put from the chair; but no commissioner with the above exception shall be allowed to speak more than once on the same question, unless permission be given to explain, or the attention of the chair be called to a point of order.

36. *Adjournment.*—(1.) No discussion shall be allowed on any motion for adjournment of the Trust, but if, on the question being put, the motion be negatived, the subject then under consideration or the next on the notice-paper shall be discussed, or any other that may be allowed precedence, before any subsequent motion for adjournment be made. (2.) A motion to adjourn shall always be in order except—1st, when a commissioner is in possession of the floor; 2nd, when the commissioners are voting; 3rd, when adjournment was the last preceding motion; 4th, when it has been decided that the previous question shall be taken. (3.) A motion simply to adjourn cannot be amended, but a motion to adjourn to a given time may be and is open to debate.

37. *Protests.*—Any commissioner may protest against any resolution of the Trust, and notice of intention to protest shall, in every case, be given forthwith on the adoption of the resolution protested against; and the protest shall specify the reasons for protesting, and shall be entered three days, at least, before the next ordinary meeting of the Trust by the protesting commissioner in a book to be kept for that purpose in the office of the secretary, and signed by such commissioner, and shall be also entered in the minutes of the meeting at which notice of the intention to protest shall have been given, previously to the confirmation thereof; but such protest may be expunged from the minutes if declared by a majority of the Trust to be not in accordance with truth or in its terms disrespectful to the Trust.

38. *Lapsed questions.*—If a debate on any motion moved and seconded be interrupted by the number of the commissioners present becoming insufficient for the transaction of business, such debate may be resumed at the point where it was so interrupted on motion upon notice.

39. *Explanations.*—While a member is speaking no one shall interrupt, except for the purpose of calling to order, or asking of the chairman leave to explain, or to call the previous question. A commissioner allowed to explain shall only have the right to explain an actual misunderstanding of language, and shall be strictly prohibited from going into debate on the merits of the case.

40. *Privileged questions.*—(1.) When a question is before the Trust the only motions in order shall be—1st, to adjourn; 2nd, the previous question; 3rd, to lay on the table; 4th, to postpone indefinitely; 5th, to postpone to a definite period; 6th, to refer; 7th, to divide if the sense will permit of it; 8th, to amend to take precedence as herein arranged, and the first three to be decided without debate. (2.) When the previous question is moved and seconded, it shall be put in this form—"Shall the main question now be put?" If this is carried, all further amendments and debates shall be excluded, and the question be put without delay. If the question has been amended, the question shall be taken on the amendment first. It shall not be in order to reconsider the agreement to take the previous question. (3.) When a motion and amendment are under discussion, it will be in order for any member to give notice of another amendment which he intends to move in the event of the amendment being lost. Upon such notice no debate shall be allowed at that stage. (4.) When a motion is postponed indefinitely, it shall not come up again during that meeting.

41. *Resolutions, how revoked or altered.*—No resolution at any meeting of the Trust shall be revoked or altered at any subsequent meeting, unless notice of the intention to propose such revocation or alteration be given to each of the commissioners seven days at least before holding the meeting, nor unless such revocation or alteration be determined upon by a majority consisting of two-thirds of the commissioners present at such subsequent meeting, if the number of commissioners present at such subsequent meeting be not greater than the number present when such resolution was come to; or by a majority, if the number of commissioners present at such subsequent meeting be greater than the number present at such former meeting.

42. *Special meetings.*—The Trust may hold special meetings; and the chairman or any three or more of the commissioners may call a special meeting, but no such meeting shall be held unless four clear days' notice thereof at least be given.

43. *Notices of meetings.*—All notices of any meeting or adjourned meeting of the Trust shall be in writing, and shall be delivered or sent by the post or otherwise to the place of abode or to the usual place of business of each of the commissioners two clear days at least previous to such meeting; and every such notice shall specify the time of meeting, and in case of a special meeting shall specify the object thereof, and no business shall be transacted at any special meeting except such as is stated in the notice thereof.

44. *Power to suspend officers.*—The Trust may at any ordinary or special meeting resolve that a special meeting be called to consider the removal from his office of any officer appointed by the Trust, and may direct that notice of such special meeting be given, and thereupon may suspend such officer from his office pending the holding of such meeting, and may appoint some other person to perform the duties of such officer in the meanwhile.

45. *Committees of Trust, and quorum.*—The Trust may from time to time, as they may see fit, appoint occasional or standing committees, and may fix the quorum of every such committee,

and every such committee shall appoint one of the commissioners thereof to be chairman of such committee; and the Trust may from time to time continue, alter, or discontinue such committee, and such committee may from time to time remove such chairman, and every such committee shall report to the Trust. The chairman of the Trust shall be *ex officio* member of all committees, and shall preside at all meetings at which he is present.

46. *Meetings, chairman, &c., of committees.*—Every committee so appointed may meet from time to time, and may adjourn from place to place as they may think proper, but no business shall be transacted at any meeting of the committee unless the quorum of members (if any) fixed by the Trust, and if no quorum be fixed three members, be present; and at all meetings of the committee, if the chairman be not present, one of the commissioners present shall be appointed chairman; and all questions shall be determined by a majority of the votes of the commissioners present, and in case of an equal division of votes, the chairman shall have a casting vote in addition to his vote as a member of the committee.

47. *Seal.*—The seal of the Trust shall be in the custody of the secretary, and shall not be impressed except by direction of the Trust and in the presence of at least three commissioners.

48. *Lapsed order of the day may be restored.*—If a debate on any order of the day be interrupted by such insufficiency of number as aforesaid happening, such order may be restored to the notice-book for a future day, on motion upon notice, and then such debate shall be resumed at the point where it was so interrupted.

49. *Committees.*—Minutes of all proceedings of committees, as well as their reports, numbered in consecutive order, shall be entered in the committees' minute-book, and, being signed by the chairman of the committee, shall be presented to the Trust; and the secretary, when practicable, shall attend all meetings of the committee.

50. *Meetings of committee.*—The secretary shall convene every committee within ten days of its first appointment, or at any time thereafter by order of the Trust, or on the written order of the chairman of the committee, or of any two members of the committee.

51. *Petitions.*—No petition shall be presented after the Trust shall have proceeded to the orders of the day.

52. *Petitions to be respectful.*—It shall be incumbent on every commissioner presenting a petition to acquaint himself with the contents thereof, and to ascertain that it does not contain language disrespectful to the Trust, and that the contents do not violate any bye-law or any provision hereof.

53. *Commissioners to affix their names.*—Every commissioner presenting a petition to the Trust shall write his name at the beginning thereof.

54. *Petitions to be in writing.*—Every petition shall be in writing and not printed or lithographed, and shall contain the prayer of the petitioners at the end thereof; and the petition shall be prepared in a way similar to that adopted with regard to petitions presented to Parliament.

55. *To be signed by the petitioners.*—Every petition shall be signed by the persons whose names are appended thereto by their names or marks, and by no one else, except in cases of incapacity by sickness.

56. *No letters, &c., to be attached.*—No letters, affidavits, or other documents shall be attached to any petition.

57. *No letters or memorials to be dealt with.*—No letters or memorials shall be dealt with at any meeting of the commissioners unless received at the offices of the Trust or the office of the chairman not later than the day preceding the day of meeting.

58. *Deputations to signify intention.*—Deputations can only be received by the Trust when they have signified their intention of waiting upon the Trust and stated their object at least one day beforehand.

59. *Letters or memorials returned for amendments.*—When letters or memorials do not accurately indicate the localities, by giving the number of the allotment and sections and name of the parish, or other technical description, it shall be in order to return the documents for amendment.

60. *Commissioners confined to statement of certain facts.*—Every commissioner presenting a petition to the Trust shall confine himself to a statement of the persons from whom it comes, of the number of signatures attached to it, of the material allegations contained in it, and to the reading of the prayer thereof.

61. *Appointment, &c., of officers.*—No appointment to any permanent office at the disposal of the Trust shall take place until seven clear days' public notice shall have been given, by advertisement in one or more newspapers circulating in the irrigation district, and such other newspapers, if any, as the Trust may determine, inviting applications from qualified candidates for the same.

62. *Salaries of officers, &c.*—The salary or allowance attached to all offices and places at the disposal of the Trust shall in all cases be fixed before they proceed to appoint any person to fill the same by advertisement inviting applications as aforesaid, and shall be specified in such advertisement, except when the Trust by special resolution, which may be moved without notice, orders otherwise.

63. *No commissioner, &c., to be surety for officer.*—No commissioner or officer of the Trust, and no assessor or auditor of the Trust, shall be received as surety for any officer appointed by the Trust, or for any work to be done for the Trust.

64. *Expense of preparing security.*—In all cases of security being given for the faithful performance of any duty or contract, the expense of preparing such security shall be borne by the person providing the same.

65. *Suspension of rules.*—Any one or more of the rules or regulations contained herein may be suspended for a special purpose,

on motion upon notice duly given, and shall not otherwise be suspended, except by an unanimous vote of the Trust.

66. *Penalty.*—If any person commit a breach of any of the provisions of this regulation, he or she shall be liable for every such offence to a penalty of not exceeding Five pounds.

The foregoing regulation, number one, was made by the Commissioners of the Tragowel Plains Irrigation Trust, under and by virtue of section 44 of *The Victorian Water Conservation Act 1881*, this 17th day of June 1886.

UNITED ECHUCA AND WARANGA WATERWORKS TRUST.—REGULATION.

PROPOSED SEVERANCE OF AREA.

IN pursuance of the provisions of *The Local Government Act 1874* (No. 506, sec. 46), the substance and prayer of a Petition, in accordance with the 44th section of the said Act, which has been presented to His Excellency the Governor, are published, viz.:—

The petitioners purport to constitute a majority of the rate-payers in the portion of the Shire of Walhalla which is described in their petition, and they desire that the area so described may be severed from the said Shire of Walhalla and annexed to the North riding of the Shire of Narracan.

Area described in the petition:—

SHIRE OF KEILOR.

BYE-LAW No. 1.

For keeping free from noisome matter yards, stables, and places used for noxious trades, slaughter-yards, &c.; and for regulating management of earth-closets, privies, &c., disinfecting and deodorizing nightsoil and other offensive matters, and for regulating its removal and final deposit.

THE Local Board of Health in and for the Shire of Keilor, in the colony of Victoria, being the Municipal Council thereof, in virtue of the powers contained in The Public Health Amendment Statute 1883, and every other power enabling the said local board in this behalf, and for the purpose of carrying the said Act into execution within the jurisdiction of the said local board, doth hereby make the following bye-law, being Bye-law No. 1 of the said Local Board of Health, that is to say:—

1. All former bye-laws on the matter and things hereinafter provided for are hereby repealed, excepting as to acts done, penalties incurred, and proceedings at law pending at the time of this bye-law coming into operation.

2. This bye-law shall come into full force and operation on its confirmation by the Central Board of Health, and immediately after its publication in the *Government Gazette*.

3. This bye-law shall apply to and have operation in the whole of the said shire.

4. The occupier of every house and premises within the said shire shall cause the yard and ground belonging thereto, or occupied in connection therewith, to be kept so as not to be a nuisance or injurious to health, and shall cause all filth, rubbish, and refuse matter to be from time to time removed from such yard and ground; and if at any time the occupier of any premises shall neglect or fail to have such filth, rubbish, or refuse matter so removed as aforesaid, the local board may cause the same to be removed at the expense of such occupier.

5. The occupier of any land in the said shire on which there shall be erected any stable, cowyard, cattle-shed, or pigsty shall cause such premises to be kept in such a state in respect of cleanliness as not to be a nuisance or injurious to health, and shall cause all soil, dung, or other manure produced or accumulated therein to be from time to time removed from such premises as often as the quantity of the same so produced or accumulated shall amount to one cubic yard; and if at any time the occupier of such premises shall neglect or fail to have such dung, soil, or other manure removed therefrom as aforesaid, the same shall be removed by the said local board at the expense of such occupier.

6. The occupier of every house, building, or tenement within the said shire shall cause every cesspool already in existence, and until its abolition, to be emptied and cleansed from time to time as soon as any portion of the contents of such cesspool shall have so accumulated therein as to be within a distance of one foot from the top of the side walls or lining of such cesspool. And provided also that the contents of any cesspool shall not be removed or discharged therefrom until such contents shall have had mixed therewith carbolic acid or some other efficient deodorizer sufficient in quality and quantity to effectually deodorize and disinfect the same.

7. Every occupier and every person having the management and control of any premises shall once at least in every week empty and cleanse, or cause to be emptied and cleansed, every earth-closet, privy, and place in the nature of an earth-closet for the reception of nightsoil on or belonging to such premises.

8. No person shall empty any earth-closet, privy, cesspool, or place for the reception of nightsoil except by means of a cart, carriage, or means of conveyance properly constructed, and furnished with a sufficient covering so as to prevent the escape of the contents or any portion thereof or of effluvia therefrom.

9. All nightsoil, blood, offal, or other offensive matter or thing shall be removed to and deposited in such place or places only as may be appointed by the local board from time to time for the final reception of the same.

10. Every person placing or depositing, or causing or suffering to be placed or deposited or spread, or assisting in placing or depositing or spreading on any land, whether by way of manure or otherwise, any nightsoil, offal, blood, or other refuse matter removed from any earth-closet, privy, cesspool, or other place, shall immediately on the deposit or spreading thereof cover the same, or cause the same to be covered, and shall keep the same covered, with a layer of earth not less than six inches in thickness.

11. The occupier of any premises within the shire used for the purpose of any noxious or offensive trade, business, process, or manufacture whatever, or used for the purpose of slaughtering, whether it be an abattoir or otherwise, shall cause any rubbish, blood, offal, bones, water, liquid, soil, or other offensive matter produced or accumulated thereon to be removed therefrom once in every twenty-four hours, and to be in the meantime kept so as not to be a nuisance or injurious to health, or to exhale any offensive effluvia; and if such occupier shall neglect or fail to have removed therefrom any offensive matter whatever, it may be removed by the said local board at the expense of such occupier.

12. Every closet-pan shall be constructed of galvanized iron, properly riveted and soldered so as to be water-tight, and with handles thereto, and of a capacity not exceeding three cubic feet.

13. No closet-door or trap shall abut or open upon a street, lane, or right-of-way exceeding ten feet in width.

14. Every person who shall by any act or default be guilty of any breach of this bye-law shall be liable to a penalty of Ten pounds for every such breach, or of Five pounds for each day during which such breach shall be committed or continued, unless the justices before whom the penalty is sought to be recovered shall order any portion only of either of the said penalties—such portion not being less than Five shillings—to be paid. And any person committing any such breach as aforesaid shall be liable to the penalty, notwithstanding that the Local Board of Health may be empowered by this bye-law or otherwise to remedy such breach, and whether such local board has or has not taken advantage of such powers.

**BYE-LAW No. 2, AS TO DAIRIES, DAIRY CATTLE,
AND MILK.**

THE Local Board of Health in and for the Shire of Keilor, in the colony of Victoria, being the Municipal Council thereof, by virtue of the powers contained in "The Public Health Amendment Statute 1883," and every other power enabling the said Local Board in this behalf, and for the purpose of carrying the said Act into execution within the jurisdiction of the said Local Board, doth hereby make the following bye-law, being Bye-law No. 2 of the said Local Board of Health, that is to say:—

1. All former bye-laws on the matters and things hereinafter provided for are hereby repealed.

2. This bye-law shall come into full force and operation on its confirmation by the Central Board of Health, and immediately after its publication in the *(Government Gazette)*.

3. This bye-law shall apply to, and have operation in, the whole of the Shire of Keilor.

**REGISTRATION OF COWKEEPERS, DAIRYMEN, AND PURVEYORS
OF MILK.**

4. Every person carrying on the trade of a cowkeeper, dairyman, or purveyor of milk, shall, on or before the first day of October in every year, register himself with the Local Board of Health in manner following, that is to say, by signing and forwarding to the Secretary of the Local Board of Health an application in the form hereunder written, and every such person shall, with every application, pay a fee of Two shillings and sixpence.

5. Upon receipt of every such application and fee the Secretary for the Local Board of Health shall endorse the same with a memorandum of the date on which it is received, and of the payment of the fee, and file the same, and shall enter the particulars in the schedule to such application in a book to be kept for that purpose, and cause the same to be properly indexed.

6. All paddocks, grounds, lands, and enclosures used as grazing ground for dairy cattle shall, whenever necessary, be inspected by any member or officer of the said Local Board, or by any person authorized, in writing, by the chairman or secretary of the said Local Board; and if, on inspection, such paddocks, grounds, or enclosures, or any one of them, are, or is likely, in the opinion of the officer or person so inspecting, to be prejudicial to health, by affecting the milk or otherwise, the said Local Board may, by an order, in writing, signed by the secretary, and served personally or left at the dwelling-house of the registered person, or in the case of an unregistered person, served personally or left at his dwelling-place or posted upon the land, prohibit the use of the same for the purpose of feeding dairy cattle, either absolutely or for any time named in such order. All cattle in dairies shall also be similarly inspected by a veterinary surgeon or other competent person, and any cows found to be diseased, or which from poverty or weakness are, in the opinion of the inspector, likely to be unfit for use for dairy purposes, shall be forthwith removed from such dairy if ordered by such inspector or other officer as aforesaid. And any such order as aforesaid the said Local Board may revoke, but upon every fresh inspection a similar order may from time to time be made.

7. All houses, dairies, cowsheds, milk stores, milk shops, or other buildings or structures in the occupation of any person following the trade of cowkeeper or dairyman, whether registered or not, shall be kept in such a state in respect of cleanliness as not to be a nuisance or injurious to health, and shall be thoroughly and effectively lighted and ventilated, and the drainage of all such buildings shall be so arranged that no stagnant water or refuse matter of any kind shall remain or lie in any way whatever in or upon or contiguous to any premises of such person following the trade of a cowkeeper or dairyman, whether registered or not.

8. All yards, sheds, or other places used for keeping or holding dairy cows shall be regularly swept and be kept perfectly clean, and shall within twenty-four hours of any order to such effect from the health officer or inspector of nuisances be fumigated, disinfected, or lime-washed, as may be in any such order so directed.

9. All vessels used for containing milk shall be thoroughly scalded and scoured daily.

10. If any person or any member of the family of any person registered as aforesaid, or not so registered, but employed as a cowkeeper, dairyman, or purveyor of milk, or any visitor or member of the family of any visitor to any such person shall be attacked by typhoid fever or any dangerous infectious disease, the occupier of the house in which such person shall be, or (if he be the person attacked) his wife or other person in charge shall immediately give notice thereof to the Local Board or Officer of Health or to the nearest member of the police force, who shall immediately inform the Local Board of Health, and thereupon it shall and may be lawful for the said Local Board or the Officer of Health, by order served as aforesaid, to prohibit absolutely the sale and vending and forwarding of milk for sale from any premises in the use and occupation of any such cowkeeper, dairyman, or purveyor of milk until danger, in the opinion of such Local Board or Officer of Health, no longer exists. And in any such case it shall not be lawful to allow any person so suffering, or having recently been in contact with a person so suffering, to milk cows or to handle vessels used for containing milk for sale, or in any way to take part or assist in the conduct of such trade or business. Nor, if the person registered or conducting such business be himself the person suffering, shall he take any part whatever in the conduct of such trade or business until in either case all danger therefrom of the communication of infection to the milk, or of its contamination, has ceased.

11. If at any time disease exists in the dairy or among the cows or cattle in any cowshed or dairy, or in the herds of any cowkeeper, dairyman, vendor, or purveyor of milk, the registered person, owner, occupier, or other person in charge, as the case may be, shall immediately give notice to the Local Board, Officer of Health, or nearest member of the police force, and the milk of a diseased cow shall not be used in any way whatsoever.

12. No cowkeeper, dairyman, or purveyor of milk shall keep or permit or suffer to be kept any pigs in the sheds, buildings, or milking yards in which any dairy cows may be kept or sheltered.

13. In the interpretation of this bye-law, words importing the masculine gender shall be deemed and taken to include females, and the singular the plural, and the plural the singular, and the word "person" shall include a corporation.

14. Every person guilty of any breach of this bye-law or of any of its provisions shall be liable in the discretion of the convicting justices to a penalty not exceeding Ten pounds nor less than Five shillings, or in a like discretion to a penalty not exceeding Five pounds nor less than Five shillings for each day during which such breach shall be committed or continued.

A Bye-law for the registration of cowkeepers, dairymen, and purveyors of milk, and for cleansing milk stores and shops, and for the suppression of any nuisances connected therewith.

IN pursuance of the powers conferred by the "Public Health Amendment Statute 1883," and of every other power enabling them in this behalf, the Local Board of Health for the Borough of Castlemaine, being the municipal Council thereof, doth hereby make the Bye-law following, that is to say:—

1. Every person carrying on the trade of a cowkeeper, dairyman, or purveyor of milk shall, on or before the first day of October in every year, register himself with the Local Board of Health in manner following, that is to say, by signing and forwarding to the Secretary of the Local Board of Health an application in the form contained in the schedule hereto, and every such person shall with every such application pay a fee of Two shillings and Sixpence.

2. Upon receipt of every such application and fee, the Secretary for the Local Board of Health shall endorse the same with a memorandum of the date on which it is received and of the payment of the fee, and shall file the same, and shall enter the particulars in the schedule to such application in a book to be kept for that purpose, and shall cause the same to be properly indexed.

3. Every person carrying on the trade of a cowkeeper dairyman or purveyor of milk shall cause every milk store or milk shop in his occupation, or under his management or control, and every milk vessel used by him for containing milk for sale, to be kept thoroughly clean.

4. Every person carrying on the trade of a cowkeeper, dairyman, or purveyor of milk, and every person having the management of any such trade, shall forthwith report, in writing, to the Health Officer the occurrence of any disease in any of his milk cows, or of any contagious or infectious disease in any person or animal upon the premises upon which such trade is carried on.

5. Every person who shall commit a breach of this bye-law shall, for every such breach, be liable to a penalty not exceeding Ten pounds and not less than Five shillings.

6. This bye-law shall apply to and be in force in the whole of the Borough of Castlemaine, and shall come into full force and

operation on its confirmation by the Central Board of Health, and immediately after its publication in the *Government Gazette*.
