## "THE FEDERAL COUNCIL OF AUSTRALASIA ACT 1885."

By His Excellency Sir ROBERT GEORGE CROOKSHANK HAMILTON, Knight Commander of the Most Honorable Order of the Bath, Governor and Commander-in-Chief in and over the Colony of Tasmania and its Dependencies.

### A PROCLAMATION.

WHEREAS by the Act of the Imperial Parliament of the 48 and 49 Vict. Ch. 60, intitled "An Act to constitute a Federal Council of Australasia," it is enacted that the First Session of the Federal Council shall be held in Hobart, in the Colony of Tasmania, and that subsequent Sessions shall be held in such colony as the Council shall from time to time determine; and, further, that the Council shall be summoned and prorogued by the Governor of the colony in which the Session shall be held, and shall be so summoned and prorogued by Proclamation published in the *Government Gazette* of each of the colonies in the said Act referred to in respect to which the said Act is in operation, and shall meet at such time and at such place as shall be named in the Proclamation: And whereas the First Session of the said Council was duly held at Hobart aforesaid during the months of January and February in the Forty-ninth year of the reign of Her Majesty Queen Victoria, and in the year of Our Lord One thousand eight hundred and eighty-six; and it was, on the fifth day of the said month of February, determined by the said Council that the next Session thereof should be held in Hobart, in the Colony of Tasmania: Now therefore I, Sir ROBERT GEORGE CROOKSHANK HAMILTON, Knight Commander of the Most Honorable Order of the Bath, Governor and Commander-in-Chief as aforesaid, in pursuance of the said Act, and by virtue of the power thereby conferred upon me, do, by this my Proclamation, summon the Federal Council of Australasia as constituted by the said Act to meet at the Parliament Buildings in Hobart, in Tasmania aforesaid, on Monday the sixteenth day of January, in the year of Our Lord One thousand eight hundred and eighty-eight, at the hour of Eleven in the forenoon, for the dispatch of business.

Given under my hand, at Hobart, in Tasmania aforesaid, this sixth day of December One thousand eight hundred and eighty-seven.

## ALTERATION OF REGULATIONS RELATING TO PACKETS FOR TRANSMISSION THROUGH THE POST.

## REGULATIONS CANCELLED.

Accounts receipted or unreceipted (remarks such as "With thanks," "A cheque will oblige," or printed communications in the nature of a letter, render them chargeable as letters).

Cards, either plain or bearing printed matter, or pictures, or both (the name only of the addressee may be written on the face of such cards).

## NEW REGULATIONS.

Accounts receipted or unreceipted (written remarks such as "With thanks," "A cheque will oblige," render them chargeable as letters).

Cards, other than Birthday, Christmas, or New Year Cards, either plain, or bearing printed matter, or pictures, or both (the name only of the addressee may be written on the face of such cards).

Birthday, Christmas, or New Year Cards may have written on them complimentary, or such like, remarks, together with the names and addresses of the senders, and of the persons for whom the cards are intended, also the date of sending. (For example: "To John Smith, with best wishes, from Mary Smith, Christmas, 1887.") But cards having messages or other communications, written on them, such as "Hoping to see you shortly," "Be sure to write soon," will be liable to letter rate of postage.

That the West Riding of the Shire of St. Arnaud be excised from School District No. 238 (which embraces the Central and West Ridings of the Shire of St. Arnaud) and constituted a separate School District, to be known as the "School District of the West Riding of the Shire of St. Arnaud, No. 390," having a Board of Advice consisting of five members.

2. That the designation of School District No. 238 be altered to the "Central Riding of the Shire of St. Arnaud," the boundaries of the said School District to be identical with those of that riding.

## CONVENTION CONCERNING THE CREATION OF AN INTERNATIONAL UNION FOR THE PROTECTION OF LITERARY AND ARTISTIC WORKS.

Signed at Berne, September 9, 1886.

[Ratifications exchanged at Berne, September 5, 1887.]

### TRANSLATION.

HER Majesty the Queen of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, Empress of India; His Majesty the German Emperor, King of Prussia; His Majesty the King of the Belgians; Her Majesty the Queen Regent of Spain, in the name of His Catholic Majesty the King of Spain; the President of the French Republic; the President of the Republic of Haiti; His Majesty the King of Italy; the President of the Republic of Liberia; the Federal Council of the Swiss Confederation; His Highness the Bey of Tunis.

Being equally animated by the desire to protect effectively, and in as uniform a manner as possible, the rights of authors over their literary and artistic works,

Have resolved to conclude a Convention to that effect, and have named for their Plenipotentiaries, that is to say:

Her Majesty the Queen of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, Empress of India, Sir Francis Ottwell Adams, Knight Commander of the Most Distinguished Order of St. Michael and St. George, Companion of the Most Honorable Order of the Bath, her Envoy Extraordinary and Minister Plenipotentiary at Berne; and John Henry Gibbs Bergne, Esquire, Companion of the Most Distinguished Order of St. Michael and St. George, Director of a Department in the Foreign Office at London.

His Majesty the German Emperor, King of Prussia, M. Otto von Bülow, Privy Councillor of Legation, and Chamberlain of His Majesty, his Envoy Extraordinary and Minister Plenipotentiary to the Swiss Confederation.

His Majesty the King of the Belgians, M. Maurice Delfosse, his Envoy Extraordinary and Minister Plenipotentiary to the Swiss Confederation.

Her Majesty the Queen Regent of Spain, in the name of His Catholic Majesty the King of Spain; the Count de la Almina, Senator, Envoy Extraordinary and Minister Plenipotentiary to the Swiss Confederation; M. Don José Villa-Amil y Castro, Chief of the Section of Intellectual Property in the Ministry of Public Instruction, Doctor of Civil and Canon Law, Member of the Facultative Corps of Archivists, Librarians, and Archaeologists, and of the Academies of History, of the Fine Arts of St. Ferdinand, and of the Academy of Sciences at Lisbon.

The President of the French Republic, M. François Victor-Emanuel Arago, Senator, Ambassador from the French Republic to the Swiss Confederation.

The President of the Republic of Haiti, M. Louis Joseph Janvier, Doctor of Medicine of the Faculty of Paris, Prizeman of the Faculty of Medicine of Paris, bearing Diplomas from the School of Political Sciences of Paris (Administrative and Diplomatic Sections), decorated with the Haitian Medal of the third class.

His Majesty the King of Italy, M. Charles Emmanuel Beccaria des Marquis d'Incisa, Chevalier of the Orders of Saints Maurice and Lazarus, and of the Crown of Italy, his Chargé d'Affaires to the Swiss Confederation.

The President of the Republic of Liberia, M. William Kœntzer, Imperial Councillor, Consul-General, Member of the Chamber of Commerce of Vienna.

The Federal Council of the Swiss Confederation, M. Numa Droz, Vice-President of the Federal Council, Head of the Department of Commerce and Agriculture; M. Louis Ruchonnet, Federal Councillor, Chief of the Department of Justice and Police; M. A. d'Orelli, Professor of Law at the University of Zurich.

His Highness the Bey of Tunis, M. Louis Renault, Professor to the Faculty of Law of Paris, and to the Free School of Political Sciences, Chevalier of the Order of the Legion of Honour, and Chevalier of the Order of the Crown of Italy.

Who, having communicated to each other their respective full powers, found in good and due form, have agreed upon the following Articles:—

### ARTICLE I.

The Contracting States are constituted into an Union for the protection of the rights of authors over their literary and artistic works.

### ARTICLE II.

Authors of any of the countries of the Union, or their lawful representatives, shall enjoy in the other countries for their

works, whether published in one of those countries or unpublished, the rights which the respective laws do now or may hereafter grant to natives.

The enjoyment of these rights is subject to the accomplishment of the conditions and formalities prescribed by law in the country of origin of the work, and cannot exceed in the other countries the term of protection granted in the said country of origin.

The country of origin of the work is that in which the work is first published, or if such publication takes place simultaneously in several countries of the Union, that one of them in which the shortest term of protection is granted by law.

For unpublished works the country to which the author belongs is considered the country of origin of the work.

### ARTICLE III.

The stipulations of the present Convention apply equally to the publishers of literary and artistic works published in one of the countries of the Union, but of which the authors belong to a country which is not a party to the Union.

### ARTICLE IV.

The expression "literary and artistic works" comprehends books, pamphlets, and all other writings; dramatic or dramatico-musical works, musical compositions, with or without words; works of design, painting, sculpture, and engraving; lithographs, illustrations, geographical charts; plans, sketches, and plastic works relative to geography, topography, architecture, or science in general; in fact, every production whatsoever in the literary, scientific, or artistic domain which can be published by any mode of impression or reproduction.

### ARTICLE V.

Authors of any of the countries of the Union, or their lawful representatives, shall enjoy in the other countries the exclusive right of making or authorizing the translation of their works until the expiration of ten years from the publication of the original work in one of the countries of the Union.

For works published in incomplete parts ("livraisons") the period of ten years commences from the date of publication of the last part of the original work.

For works composed of several volumes published at intervals, as well as for bulletins or collections ("cahiers") published by literary or scientific societies, or by private persons, each volume, bulletin, or collection is, with regard to the period of ten years, considered as a separate work.

In the cases provided for by the present Article, and for the calculation of the period of protection, the 31st December of the year in which the work was published is admitted as the date of publication.

### ARTICLE VI.

Authorized translations are protected as original works. They consequently enjoy the protection stipulated in Articles II. and III. as regards their unauthorized reproduction in the countries of the Union.

It is understood that, in the case of a work for which the translating right has fallen into the public domain, the translator cannot oppose the translation of the same work by other writers.

### ARTICLE VII.

Articles from newspapers or periodicals published in any of the countries of the Union may be reproduced in original or in translation in the other countries of the Union, unless the authors or publishers have expressly forbidden it. For periodicals it is sufficient if the prohibition is made in a general manner at the beginning of each number of the periodical.

This prohibition cannot in any case apply to articles of political discussion, or to the reproduction of news of the day or current topics.

### ARTICLE VIII.

As regards the liberty of extracting portions from literary or artistic works for use in publications destined for educational or scientific purposes, or for chrestomathies, the matter is to be decided by the legislation of the different countries of the Union, or by special arrangements existing or to be concluded between them.

### ARTICLE IX.

The stipulations of Article II. apply to the public representation of dramatic or dramatico-musical works, whether such works be published or not.

Authors of dramatic or dramatico-musical works, or their lawful representatives, are, during the existence of their exclusive right of translation, equally protected against the unauthorized public representation of their works.

The stipulations of Article II. apply equally to the public performance of unpublished musical works, or of published works in which the author has expressly declared on the title-page or commencement of the work that he forbids the public performance.

### ARTICLE X.

Unauthorized indirect appropriations of a literary or artistic work, of various kinds, such as adaptations, arrangement of music, &c., are specially included amongst the illicit reproductions to which the present Convention applies, when they are only the reproduction of a particular work, in the same form, or in another form, with non-essential alterations, additions, or abridgments, so made as not to confer the character of a new original work.

It is agreed that, in the application of the present Article, the Tribunals of the various countries of the Union will, if there is occasion, conform themselves to the provisions of their respective laws.

## ARTICLE XI.

In order that the authors of works protected by the present Convention shall, in the absence of proof to the contrary, be considered as such, and be consequently admitted to institute proceedings against pirates before the Courts of the various countries of the Union, it will be sufficient that their name be indicated on the work in the accustomed manner.

For anonymous or pseudonymous works, the publisher whose name is indicated on the works is entitled to protect the rights belonging to the author. He is, without other proof, reputed the lawful representative of the anonymous or pseudonymous author.

It is, nevertheless, agreed that the Tribunals may, if necessary, require the production of a certificate from the competent authority to the effect that the formalities prescribed by law in the country of origin have been accomplished, as contemplated in Article II.

## ARTICLE XII.

Pirated works may be seized on importation into those countries of the Union where the original work enjoys legal protection.

The seizure shall take place conformably to the domestic law of each State.

## ARTICLE XIII.

It is understood that the provisions of the present Convention cannot in any way derogate from the right belonging to the Government of each country of the Union to permit, to control, or to prohibit, by measures of domestic legislation or police, the circulation, representation, or exhibition of any works or productions in regard to which the competent authority may find it necessary to exercise that right.

## ARTICLE XIV.

Under the reserves and conditions to be determined by common agreement,\* the present Convention applies to all works which at the moment of its coming into force have not yet fallen into the public domain in the country of origin.

## ARTICLE XV.

It is understood that the Governments of the countries of the Union reserve to themselves respectively the right to enter into separate and particular arrangements between each other, provided always that such arrangements confer upon authors or their lawful representatives more extended rights than those granted by the Union, or embody other stipulations not contrary to the present Convention.

## ARTICLE XVI.

An international office is established, under the name of "Office of the International Union for the Protection of Literary and Artistic Works."

This Office, of which the expenses will be borne by the Administrations of all the countries of the Union, is placed under the high authority of the Superior Administration of the Swiss Confederation, and works under its direction. The functions of this Office are determined by common accord between the countries of the Union.

## ARTICLE XVII.

The present Convention may be submitted to revisions in order to introduce therein amendments calculated to perfect the system of the Union.

Questions of this kind, as well as those which are of interest to the Union in other respects, will be considered in Conferences to be held successively in the countries of the Union by Delegates of the said countries.

It is understood that no alteration in the present Convention shall be binding on the Union except by the unanimous consent of the countries composing it.

## ARTICLE XVIII.

Countries which have not become parties to the present Convention, and which grant by their domestic law the protection of rights secured by this Convention, shall be admitted to accede thereto on request to that effect.

Such accession shall be notified in writing to the Government of the Swiss Confederation, who will communicate it to all the other countries of the Union.

Such accession shall imply full adhesion to all the clauses and admission to all the advantages provided by the present Convention.

## ARTICLE XIX.

Countries acceding to the present Convention shall also have the right to accede thereto at any time for their Colonies or foreign possessions.

They may do this either by a general declaration comprehending all their Colonies or possessions within the accession, or by specially naming those comprised therein, or by simply indicating those which are excluded.

## ARTICLE XX.

The present Convention shall be put in force three months after the exchange of the ratifications, and shall remain in

effect for an indefinite period until the termination of a year from the day on which it may have been denounced.

Such denunciation shall be made to the Government authorized to receive accessions, and shall only be effective as regards the country making it, the Convention remaining in full force and effect for the other countries of the Union.

## ARTICLE XXI.

The present Convention shall be ratified, and the ratifications exchanged at Berne, within the space of one year at the latest.

In witness whereof, the respective Plenipotentiaries have signed the same, and have affixed thereto the seal of their arms.

## Additional Article.

The Plenipotentiaries assembled to sign the Convention concerning the creation of an International Union for the protection of literary and artistic works have agreed upon the following Additional Article, which shall be ratified together with the Convention to which it relates:—

The Convention concluded this day in no wise affects the maintenance of existing Conventions between the Contracting States, provided always that such Conventions confer on authors, or their lawful representatives, rights more extended than those secured by the Union, or contain other stipulations which are not contrary to the said Convention.

## Final Protocol.

In proceeding to the signature of the Convention concluded this day, the undersigned Plenipotentiaries have declared and stipulated as follows:—

1. As regards Article IV., it is agreed that those countries of the Union where the character of artistic work is not refused to photographs, engage to admit them to the benefits of the Convention concluded to-day, from the date of its coming into effect. They are, however, not bound to protect the authors of such works further than is permitted by their own legislation, except in the case of international engagements already existing, or which may hereafter be entered into by them.

It is understood that an authorized photograph of a protected work of art shall enjoy legal protection in all the countries of the Union, as contemplated by the said Convention, for the same period as the principal right of reproduction of the work itself subsists, and within the limits of private arrangements between those who have legal rights.

2. As regards Article IX., it is agreed that those countries of the Union whose legislation implicitly includes chorographic works amongst dramatico-musical works, expressly admit the former works to the benefits of the Convention concluded this day.

It is, however, understood that questions which may arise on the application of this clause shall rest within the competence of the respective Tribunals to decide.

3. It is understood that the manufacture and sale of instruments for the mechanical reproduction of musical airs which are copyright, shall not be considered as constituting an infringement of musical copyright.

4. The common agreement alluded to in Article XIV. of the Convention is established as follows:—

The application of the Convention to works which have not fallen into the public domain at the time when it comes into force, shall operate according to the stipulations on this head which may be contained in special Conventions either existing or to be concluded.

\* See Paragraph 4 of Final Protocol, p. 15.

In the absence of such stipulations between any countries of the Union, the respective countries shall regulate, each for itself, by its domestic legislation, the manner in which the principle contained in Article XIV. is to be applied.

5. The organization of the International Office established in virtue of Article XVI. of the Convention shall be fixed by a Regulation which shall be drawn up by the Government of the Swiss Confederation.

The official language of the International Office will be French.

The International Office will collect all kinds of information relative to the protection of the rights of authors over their literary and artistic works. It will arrange and publish such information. It will study questions of general utility likely to be of interest to the Union, and, by the aid of documents placed at its disposal by the different Administrations, will edit a periodical publication in the French language treating questions which concern the Union. The Governments of the countries of the Union reserve to themselves the faculty of authorizing, by common accord, the publication by the Office of an edition in one or more other languages if experience should show this to be requisite.

The International Office will always hold itself at the disposal of members of the Union, with the view to furnish them with any special information they may require relative to the protection of literary and artistic works.

The Administration of the country where a Conference is about to be held, will prepare the programme of the Conference with the assistance of the International Office.

The Director of the International Office will attend the sittings of the Conferences, and will take part in the discussions without a deliberative voice. He will make an annual Report on his administration, which shall be communicated to all the members of the Union.

The expenses of the Office of the International Union shall be shared by the Contracting States. Unless a fresh arrangement be made, they cannot exceed a sum of 60,000 fr. a year. This sum may be increased by the decision of one of the Conferences provided for in Article XVII.

The share of the total expense to be paid by each country shall be determined by the division of the Contracting and acceding States into six classes, each of which shall contribute in the proportion of a certain number of units, viz.:-

First Class	...	...	25 units.
Second "	...	...	20 "
Third "	...	...	15 "
Fourth "	...	...	10 "
Fifth "	...	...	5 "
Sixth "	...	...	3 "

These co-efficients will be multiplied by the number of States of each class, and the total product thus obtained will give the number of units by which the total expense is to be divided. The quotient will give the amount of the unity of expense.

Each State will declare, at the time of its accession, in which of the said classes it desires to be placed.

The Swiss Administration will prepare the Budget of the Office, superintend its expenditure, make the necessary advances, and draw up the annual account, which shall be communicated to all the other Administrations.

6. The next Conference shall be held at Paris between four and six years from the date of the coming into force of the Convention.

The French Government will fix the date within these limits after having consulted the International Office.

7. It is agreed that, as regards the exchange of ratifications contemplated in Article XXI., each Contracting Party shall give a single instrument, which shall be deposited, with those of the other States, in the Government archives of the Swiss Confederation. Each party shall receive in exchange a copy of the *procès-verbal* of the exchange of ratifications, signed by the Plenipotentiaries present.

The present Final Protocol, which shall be ratified with the Convention concluded this day, shall be considered as forming an integral part of the said Convention, and shall have the same force, effect, and duration.

#### *Procès-verbal of Signature.*

The undersigned Plenipotentiaries, assembled this day to proceed with the signature of the Convention with reference

to the creation of an International Union, for the protection of literary and artistic works, have exchanged the following declarations:-

1. With reference to the accession of the Colonies or foreign possessions provided for by Article XIX. of the Convention:-

The Plenipotentiaries of His Catholic Majesty the King of Spain reserve to the Government the power of making known His Majesty's decision at the time of the exchange of ratifications.

The Plenipotentiary of the French Republic states that the accession of his country carries with it that of all the French colonies.

The Plenipotentiaries of Her Britannic Majesty state that the accession of Great Britain to the Convention for the protection of literary and artistic works comprises the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, and all the colonies and foreign possessions of Her Britannic Majesty.

At the same time they reserve to the Government of Her Britannic Majesty the power of announcing at any time the separate denunciation of the Convention by one or several of the following Colonies or possessions, in the manner provided for by Article XX. of the Convention, namely:-

India, the Dominion of Canada, Newfoundland, the Cape, Natal, New South Wales, Victoria, Queensland, Tasmania, South Australia, Western Australia, and New Zealand.

2. With respect to the classification of the countries of the Union, having regard to their contributory part to the expenses of the International Bureau (No. 5 of the Final Protocol):

The Plenipotentiaries declare that their respective countries should be ranked in the following classes, namely:-

Germany in the first class.  
Belgium in the third class.  
Spain in the second class.  
France in the first class.  
Great Britain in the first class.  
Haiti in the fifth class.  
Italy in the first class.  
Switzerland in the third class.  
Tunis in the sixth class.

The Plenipotentiary of the Republic of Liberia states that the powers which he has received from his Government authorize him to sign the Convention, but that he has not received instructions as to the class in which his country proposes to place itself with respect to the contribution to the expenses of the International Bureau. He therefore reserves that question to be determined by his Government; who will make known their intention on the exchange of ratifications.

#### PRESERVED MEATS FOR INDIA.

#### MEMORANDUM BY THE COMMISSARY-GENERAL-IN-CHIEF IN INDIA.

In consequence of the favorable reports received regarding the Australian and New Zealand preserved meats, the Government of India ruled that our future requirements should, whenever possible, be met by importation from the colonies.

2. A paragraph to this effect which appeared in the English papers was copied by colonial papers, and communications are therefore being frequently received from Australia and New Zealand on the subject.

3. To all such letters detailed replies have been sent showing exactly what we should require and the conditions under which a demand would be likely to arise, but as letters continue to be received written without the requisite knowledge of the exact nature of our wants, the following note has been prepared for general information:

#### Circumstances under which a demand for tinned meats would arise.

4. It is very desirable that colonial shippers should bear in mind that the regular demand for tinned meats in India does not exceed 350,000 lbs. annually. It would only be in anticipation of, or in the event of the actual outbreak of war, that we should require additional supplies of preserved provisions.

5. Meanwhile we are glad to enter into correspondence with Australian and New Zealand firms to register in this office the quantities which could be readily turned out monthly by each establishment, and the prices at which the meat could be delivered at either Bombay or Calcutta, free of all extra charge, so that in the event of a sudden demand, orders could be sent by wire at the shortest notice.

6. *Samples.*—Several firms have proposed to send us samples. These will be carefully tried by experienced officers and the opinions formed thereon will be recorded confidentially in this office for future guidance. It is manifest that such samples should be of the quality which we might confidently expect to receive in compliance with orders. The samples need only be of very moderate size, and should be put up in accordance with the specification at paragraphs 8 and 9.

7. Shippers are specially requested not to forward samples of meats other than those indicated in paragraph 8, or closely approximating thereto. Supplies specially prepared for the use of officers, &c., are quite useless to us. On field service the officer receives exactly the same ration as the soldier.

#### Description of meats required.

8. The only kinds of meat required are tinned *unsalted* beef and tinned *unsalted* mutton. Corned, or similar meat containing salt, is not suitable for issue in India.

The relative proportions of beef and mutton required on each order will be specified at the time, but six-sevenths beef and one-seventh mutton are the usual proportions.

The meat should be put up in square or oblong tins slightly tapering at one end to facilitate the removal of the contents. Each tin must contain one, two, or four pounds of meat, *net*, the meat being well compressed.

#### Tinned meats, how to be packed.

9. If colonial firms will be good enough to bear in mind that every article required in the field must be of suitable weight and size for mule carriage, they will recognise the necessity of adhering strictly to the following rules either when complying with orders or when submitting samples.

All tinned meat must be packed in deal wood boxes. Each box must contain precisely the same number of tins of the same size. Each full box must be as nearly as possible (but must not exceed) 80 lbs. in gross weight.

Every box must be clearly marked with the net contents and size of the tins contained in it.

Boxes of meat to be suited for mule carriage must be oblong in shape; a square box is unfit for mule carriage.

The approximate dimensions of a box of good shape are given below, but reasonable deviation from this size will not be objected to as long as the boxes are of an oblong shape suited for mule carriage:—

10. Firms quoting prices should do so on the clear understanding that such prices will be considered to hold good until formally modified in writing. Alterations in prices already quoted should invariably be sent by registered letter. Prices should include all costs of carriage to Bombay or Calcutta, and this should be distinctly stated.

11. All communications on the above subject should be addressed to the Commissary-General-in-Chief by his official designation only (not by name). The address is—

12. As several firms have tendered frozen meat, it may be desirable to say that such meat is obviously unsuited for issue on field service. It has also been decided that it is not practicable to issue frozen meat to troops in India during peace time.

WHEREAS by *The Gaols Act 1887* (No. 921, sec. 8) it is provided that the Governor of the Gaol may hear and determine all charges against any prisoner for any such minor breach of the rules and regulations as by the rules and regulations made by the Governor in Council under the said Act are directed to be submitted to the decision of the Governor of the Gaol, and may punish such prisoner by solitary confinement for any term not exceeding two days, or by close confinement in a cell on half rations for any term not exceeding four days, such punishment to be concurrent with any sentence the prisoner may be then undergoing, or by stopping any gratuity which would otherwise be accruing to such prisoner for any period not exceeding one month, or by postponing the discharge of such prisoner under the regulations for any period not exceeding seven days: Provided always that a record of all such punishments shall be kept and forwarded every month to the Inspector-General; and no prisoner shall be punishable upon a second charge for the same offence before the visiting justice made under section twenty-one of *The Statute of Gaols 1864*: Now therefore His Excellency the Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, and in pursuance of the provisions of the said Act, doth by this present Order direct that any breach of the rules and regulations made on the 17th day of July 1872, under the ninth section of *The Statute of Gaols 1864*, be submitted to the decision of the Governor of the Gaol, and that every Governor of every Gaol in Victoria be empowered to hear, determine, and punish, as provided by the eighth section of *The Gaols Act 1887*, No. 921, aforesaid.

APPLICATIONS will be received, addressed to the Secretary to the Board of Examiners, up to Friday the 20th January next, from Candidates desirous of being appointed as Pupil Surveyors and Draughtsmen in connection with this department. Two vacancies.

## Conditions.

An applicant for appointment must be not more than twenty years or less than sixteen years of age. He will be required to produce a medical certificate to the effect that he is of sound constitution, and not affected with any physical infirmity which would interfere with the proper exercise of his profession. He will also be required to produce satisfactory evidence of having received a good general education, including a competent knowledge of euclid, algebra, and arithmetic, also a specimen of his plan drawing.

## Competitive Examination.

Having duly complied with the foregoing requirements, he will undergo a competitive examination on a date of which he will be duly notified—subjects, plane trigonometrical computation, plotting, and plan drawing—when the competitors to whom shall be awarded a sufficient number of points by the Board of Examiners will be recommended for appointment in the order of merit, subject to the regulations of the department as to probation.

## Term of Service.

The pupil's service in the department shall be for a term of four years, the first two of which will be served in the office, where he will be engaged in drawing and computing. He will then (if thought necessary) be examined in trigonometry, including computation of areas and reduction of traverse surveys, also plotting from field-book and plan drawing. If his progress up to this time is not deemed satisfactory he will be liable to be dispensed with, but, if satisfactory, he will be placed under a departmental surveyor for two years for field practice.

Afterwards he will have the privilege of attending for two months at the Melbourne Observatory, where he will be instructed in such branches of practical astronomy as are necessary for the duties he may be called on to perform as a qualified surveyor.

He will be allowed to present himself at the next ensuing examination for land surveyors (without payment of fees), for the purpose of obtaining the formal certificate of the Board of Examiners as to his qualifications.

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# PUBLIC HIGHWAYS IN THE CITY OF RICHMOND.

## PROCLAMATION

By His Excellency Sir HENRY BROUGHAM LOCH, Knight Commander of the Most Honorable Order of the Bath, Governor and Commander-in-Chief in and over the Colony of Victoria and its Dependencies, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS by The Local Government Act 1874 (38 Vict. No. 506) it was amongst other things enacted that it should be lawful for the Governor in Council at any time, and from time to time, upon the request of the council of any municipality, by notice in the *Government Gazette*, to declare any land reserved, used, or by purchase or exchange acquired for a street, road, highway, thoroughfare, bridge, square, court, alley, or right-of-way to be a public highway, and such land should thereupon and thenceforth from the date of such proclamation become and be absolutely dedicated to the public as a public highway within the meaning of any law then or thereafter in force: And whereas the Council of the City of Richmond has requested that the streets hereinafter mentioned, within the said Town, be so declared public highways: Now therefore I, the Governor of Victoria, with the advice of the Executive Council, do by this notice declare the lands acquired or used for the streets hereinafter named and described, and situate in the City of Richmond, to be Public Highways within the meaning of the said Act, viz.:-

WHEREAS by *The Land Act 1884* it was amongst other things enacted that it should be lawful for the Governor in Council at any time and from time to time, under regulations to be made for such purpose, to proclaim any Crown lands as a common, and place it under the management of any borough or shire council, or mining board, or any person or persons, or any two or more of the said councils, boards, or persons, and direct the manner by which the fees should be imposed, paid, collected, and recovered for depasturing thereon, and how such fees should be disposed of, and at any time to alter, add to, diminish, revoke, or abolish such common, or unite two or more commons, or add to such common any selection which may have been taken up within the area of such common and subsequently abandoned; and it was also enacted that notice of any proposed proclamation, alteration, addition, diminution, revocation, or union of commons should be published and all objections thereto should be heard in the manner set forth in the One hundred and twenty-fifth section of the said Act: Now therefore I, the Governor of Victoria, with the advice of the Executive Council, do hereby proclaim as a common the Crown lands comprised within the boundaries hereinafter described, in accordance with the provisions of the above-recited Act, that is to say:—

PORT CAMPBELL COMMON.—Five thousand acres, more or less, county of Heytesbury, parishes of Pararatte and Waarre, and township of Port Campbell, being the unappropriated Crown lands comprised within the following boundaries, viz.:—Commencing at a point on the sea coast bearing south from the south-east angle of allotment 1 of section 6, parish of Pararatte; thence north by a line to the road forming the south boundary of the said allotment; thence easterly by that road to the south-west angle of allotment 4; thence east by that allotment and north, easterly, and south by the boundary of the township of Port Campbell to the south-west angle of allotment 20 of section 5; thence easterly and south-easterly by a road to Sherbrook Creek; and thence south-westerly and westerly by that creek and the sea coast to the point of commencement.—(87.L.12223.)

# REGULATIONS UNDER "THE MALLEE PASTORAL LEASES ACT 1883."

At the Executive Council Chamber, Melbourne, the twelfth day of December 1887.

## PRESENT:

WHEREAS by the 55th section of *The Mallee Pastoral Leases Act 1883* it is enacted that the Governor in Council shall, in the manner prescribed by section 110 of *The Land Act 1869*, have power from time to time to make, alter, or rescind and publish any rules, regulations, and orders for the purposes more particularly set forth in the aforesaid section of *The Mallee Pastoral Leases Act 1883*: And whereas the Governor in Council did, by an Order made on the twenty-ninth day of September 1884, make certain regulations for the election of members of local committees, and generally for carrying out the provisions of the said Act with regard to the destruction of vermin; and it is expedient to alter in part the said regulations: Now therefore His Excellency the Governor, acting by and with the advice of the Executive Council, doth hereby alter section I. of the Regulations bearing date the twenty-ninth day of September 1884, and doth order that the following shall be read as and taken to be section I. of the said Regulations:—

## I.—TO REGULATE THE ELECTION OF MEMBERS OF LOCAL COMMITTEES UNDER "THE MALLEE PASTORAL LEASES ACT 1883."

For every vermin district the Governor in Council may appoint a person to be returning officer to conduct the election of members of local committees, and the returning officer may appoint a deputy to act for him.

The Minister shall in each and every year cause to be prepared and published in the *Government Gazette* alphabetical lists of owners, lessees, and occupiers entitled to vote for the election of the members of the local committees in each vermin district, with the number of votes to which each owner, lessee, or occupier is entitled set opposite his name, and in any subsequent issue of the *Government Gazette* prior to an election under this Act may publish a supplementary or amended list of voters.

Twenty-eight clear days before any election of members of local committees under these regulations, the returning officer shall give public notice of the time and place of meeting for such election of members of local committees by advertisement inserted in some newspaper generally circulating in such district, requiring the names of all candidates and of their proposers to be forwarded to him within such time not less than fourteen days from the time of giving such notice as shall be named in such notice, and any voters desirous of nominating a candidate for any such district shall within the time named in such notice forward to such returning officer, in writing, the christian and surname of such candidate and the district for which he is proposed, and such nomination shall be signed by not less than six persons duly qualified to vote at such election; and the names of candidates shall be published in some newspaper circulating in such district, and a list of such candidates shall be forwarded to each voter. If the number of candidates nominated as aforesaid shall not exceed the number of members to be elected for such district, the returning officer shall declare such candidates to be duly elected, and they shall be deemed to be duly elected accordingly.

If a greater number be nominated than are required, then the owner, lessees, and occupiers present in person, or by proxy, entitled to vote shall elect the members of the local committee at the place and time appointed as aforesaid. At each such meeting such owners, lessees, and occupiers may vote personally or by proxy, and in all cases the voting shall be according to the scale set forth in the fifth schedule of the said Act. Forms of voting papers shall be on the form prescribed in schedule A hereto. Forms of proxy shall be on the form prescribed in schedule B hereto. In case of an equality of votes, the returning officer shall have a casting vote in addition to any vote or votes he may be entitled to as an owner, lessee, or occupier, as the case may be. Upon the result of every such election being ascertained, the returning officer shall certify the same to the Minister for the information of the Governor.

#### CONDITIONS OF CONTRACT.

1. The Government will not be bound to order from the contractor all or any of the articles enumerated in the schedules, but only those articles, and such quantities of those articles, as it may be found necessary to order. Should the Government, however, require a larger supply of any article than the quantity stated in the schedules, the contractor will nevertheless be bound to supply the same at contract rates.

2. The supplies are to be according to sample (where so stated), and of the particular manufacture indicated in the schedule of tenders. In the case of different makers' goods, the contractor will be required to supply the kind ordered. In other cases the supplies are to be the best quality of their several kinds or manufacture. A preference will, however, be given to goods of Victorian manufacture, provided the quality is equal to the particular manufacture indicated in the schedule.

3. All orders for supplies will emanate from the Government Printer, and be transmitted through the Stores and Transport Department. All orders must accompany the goods on delivery, otherwise the goods will not be received. Delivery, as a rule, is to be of the full quantity ordered.

4. Supplies ordered must be delivered free of all charges (whether cartage, freight, &c.). The value of all packages, cases, casks, &c., whether bulk be broken or not, must be included in the prices stated in the contractor's tender; all such packages, &c., to be considered the property of the Government, and no charges or expenses whatsoever beyond the price tendered and set out in the schedule will be allowed to the contractor for any articles or packages, cases, casks, &c. The net weight or quantity only will be paid for.

Contractors must provide, without extra charge, whatever labor may be required in the packing of stores.

5. Arrangements as to time of delivery and inspection of goods will be made by the Government Printer.

6. Orders must receive prompt execution; and, in the event of the goods not being delivered within forty-eight hours after the contractor shall have received the order, or within such other time as the order may specify for delivery, it will be competent for the Government Printer, on giving the contractor twenty-four hours' notice, to purchase the supplies at the contractor's risk, and the extra expense incurred over and above the contract price (if any) will be deducted from the contractor's account.

7. The contractor will be required to furnish his account in the prescribed form simultaneously with delivery of the full quantities of goods ordered, the account being rendered with the order to which it relates. The prices quoted in the orders cannot be increased.

8. The acceptance of the supplies shall be subject to the approval of the Government Printer, whose decision shall be final.

9. Delivery will not be deemed to have been made until the goods have been approved of. All articles rejected must be immediately replaced by the contractor, otherwise purchases will be effected at the contractor's risk, and the extra expense deducted as in condition 6.

10. A repetition of irregularity in the quantity or quality of the supplies, or of delay in delivering or replacing them when required, will subject the contractor, upon report from the Tender Board, to such mulct, not exceeding Fifty pounds, as the Treasurer of the colony may direct, and the amount may be deducted as in condition 6, or from the contractor's security. It will also be in the power of the said Treasurer, upon such repetition, to terminate the contract forthwith.

11. In the event of the contractor failing to carry on the contract, the contract security money will in that case be absolutely forfeited, and in addition the contractor will be held liable for any loss which the Government may sustain in consequence of such failure.

13. Printed forms of tender and conditions of contract may be obtained from the Secretary, Tender Board, Treasury, Melbourne, or from the officer in charge at any station, by whom also information or explanation will be afforded to persons tendering.

As much forage as can be stored at any station where the storage is small will, for the convenience of the contractor, be ordered at one time.

The price, which must be expressed in words as well as in figures, and without alterations, erasures, or discrepancies, must be per cental of 100 lbs. (net weight), including delivery at the stations, and all charges except the bags, which will remain the property of the contractor. At stations where the bags can be at once emptied the contractor will be required to remove them when delivery is taken. At other stations, notice will be sent to the contractor when the bags are empty. Bags to be removed at contractor's expense.

Tenders, which should be upon the printed form, will be received for either oats, bran, hay, or straw (the particular kind of hay or straw offered to be stated); but if all be included in one tender it may be accepted for one article only, if advisable. Oaten hay will be preferred. Telegrams will not be entertained.

Tenders not complying with the terms of advertisement will not be entertained.

The successful tenderer will be required to enter into a bond for one-third of the estimated amount of the contract within ten days after the acceptance is notified. Two approved sureties are required for contracts amounting to £150 and upwards, and one surety for contracts under £150.

Tenderers failing to take up their accepted tenders, or failing to carry out their contract satisfactorily, will be ineligible to again hold contracts for Government supplies.

Tenders must be enclosed in an envelope, marked "Tender for Forage," and deposited in the Tender-Box, Pay Office, Treasury, Melbourne; or, if sent by post, they must be addressed to the Chairman of the Tender Board, Treasury, Melbourne.

The Government will not necessarily accept the lowest or any tender.

The decision of the Government will be made known by *Gazette* notice, and by letter to accepted tenderers.

## CONDITIONS OF CONTRACT.

1. The hay to be good, sound, and sweet, and properly trussed, except when otherwise directed by the police; the straw to be wheat or oat, and both to be in all respects of the best quality; oats (Victorian grown) and bran to be sound and sweet, and of the best description; chaff to be made from oaten hay of the best quality; the maize to be of the best quality. The hay tenders must specify whether they are for oaten or wheat hay.

2. The supplies are for police, telegraph, and other horses, and are to be delivered on the order of the officer in charge of the district or station. The quantities stated in the schedule being only approximate, it must be understood that the Government may draw either more or less than those mentioned; and should new telegraph stations be formed, or additional horses required to be stationed at any of the stations, the contractor will be required to supply the additional forage. Should the additional number of horses, however, exceed two, the contractor may, if he desires it, terminate the contract by supplying at once the whole quantity due at the station under the contract according to the foregoing schedule.

3. Notwithstanding anything contained in the preceding condition, the contractors for the supply to the Botanic and Domain Gardens may be called upon to supply any other Government Departments within a radius of six miles from Melbourne, and for which no contracts have been taken, at the same rates.

4. The forage, when delivered, must be accompanied by the particulars of quantity, showing the net weight, to be endorsed on the back of the order, which, when signed by the officer in charge of the station, for the net quantity received, will be returned to the contractor, and by him rendered in support of his account.

5. Each contractor will be required to prepare his own account in the prescribed form, and, on presentation thereof to the officer in charge of the station or district, it will be forwarded for payment at the Treasury, Melbourne, or the Pay Office of the district, as may be indicated by the contractor on the account.

6. Should forage duly ordered under these contracts not be delivered within forty-eight hours of the time specified in the order for delivery, it will be competent for the department (should circumstances require it) to purchase the same at the risk of the contractor, from whose account any expense over and above the contract price is to be deducted.

7. In the event of a difference of opinion between the contractor and the officer receiving the forage as to the quality of the same, it is to be decided by a board of survey, composed of persons named by the head of the department ordering the supply, and the decision of the Board is to be considered final.

8. If the Board shall decide that the forage is not of proper quality, it must be immediately replaced by the contractor, failing which it will be procured elsewhere, and the extra cost, if any, will be charged as in clause 6.

9. When a board of survey cannot be conveniently assembled, or when, from some other cause, injury would accrue either to the public service or to the contractor by waiting for a board of survey, the officer in charge will have the power to reject such supplies as are obviously of inferior quality, it being understood that he will be responsible to the Government for so doing; and the contractor must take back the rejected forage, and supply good in its stead, failing which it will be obtained by the officer requiring it, and the expense will be charged as in clause 6.

10. A repetition of irregularity in the quantity or quality of the forage, or of the delay in delivering or replacing it when required, or refusal to execute orders, will subject the contractor, upon report from the Tender Board, to such mulct, not exceeding £20, as the Treasurer of the colony for the time being may direct. It will also be in the power of the said Treasurer, upon such repetition, to terminate the contract forthwith.

11. Contractors are not at liberty to transfer their contracts under cover of power-of-attorney, coupled with an interest or otherwise; and no such transfer will be recognized by the Government.

12. It will be competent for the Secretary of the Tender Board, on behalf of the Government, or for the contractor on his own behalf, to terminate the contract, by giving, in writing, a notice of three full calendar months to that effect, it being understood that such notice can only be given from the 1st day of a month, and provided that no such notice can be given before the 30th September 1888, and in the event of a station being discontinued or any change in the supplies required, the contractor will receive the earliest possible intimation.

107. All contracts shall be made by tenders, unless the Council shall otherwise direct. All tenders shall be addressed to the President, and only be opened at the time of their consideration by the Council. The respective amount with the names of the parties tendering shall in every case be entered on the minutes of the Council. When any tenders shall have been accepted by the Council, the person tendering, or some one on his behalf, shall pay a deposit in accordance with a rule hereafter mentioned into the hands of the Treasurer.

108. All payments shall be made by cheque, and be signed by the President and one other councillor, and countersigned by the Treasurer or such other person as the Council may appoint, and no cheque shall be given unless the account for which it is payment shall have been passed at a meeting of the Council, and recommended by the Finance Committee.

109. The security in all cases of contract shall be 10 per cent. on the amount of the contract: to be paid over by the contractor to the Treasurer of the shire, which amount shall be repaid to the contractor when he obtains his final certificate that the works under his contract have been satisfactorily completed.

110. The shire office shall be opened every Monday and Friday, between the hours of ten and three, during which hours the Secretary shall attend to transact the ordinary business of the Council. The surveyor shall attend during the hours of business and at every meeting of the Council.

111. Any bye-law may be suspended "pro tem." in cases of emergency, and with the consent of the Council, there not being more than one councillor absent.

112. Nothing herein contained shall render it lawful to construct any stage or scaffolding or to deposit any materials or rubbish, or to put up any hoarding or fence, platform or hand-rail as aforesaid or all or any of them, so that the same shall extend or be across or over or upon any street or road further from the inner edge of the footway than one-third of the whole breadth of such street or road, or in any case so as to render the street or road exclusive of the footways impossible for carriages, or so as to obstruct the channel.

113. If any person who ought, under this bye-law, to remove any matter or thing or to make good any footway or street or road shall fail so to do, whether or not such person shall have been convicted or not of any offence under this subdivision, the Council may remove such matter or thing or make good such street or footway, and may recover the expenses of so doing from the person so making default before any justice.

114. It shall be lawful for the Council to make regulations prescribing the rate of speed and the manner of crossing over all bridges and crossings for horses, carts, and carriages; and if any person driving or having the charge of any horse, cart, or carriage shall violate any such regulation, he shall forfeit a sum not exceeding forty shillings.

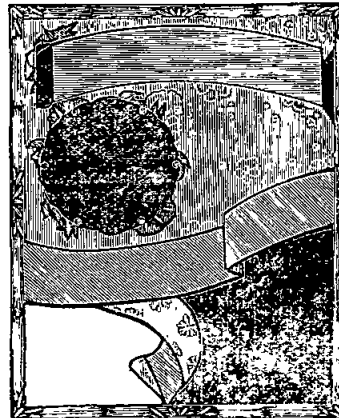

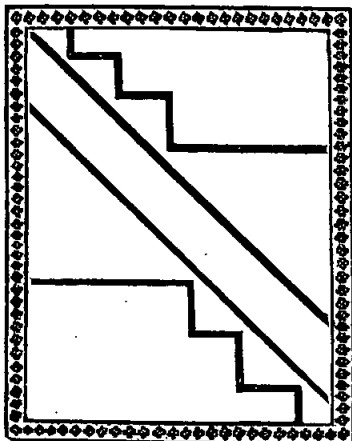

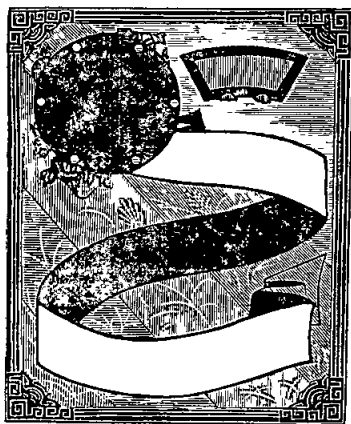
