SEGAMA GOLDFIELDS, NORTH BORNEO.

THE following Despatch from L. B. von Donop, Esquire.
Government Secretary of North Borneo, and its enclosures are published for general information.

(No. 14/87.) Government Secretary's Office, Sta, Sandakan, 14th January 1887. In view of the fact that several diggers from the colonies have recently arrived here with the object of working gold in the Segama District, I am directed by the Governor of British North Borneo to request you to be good enough to bring to the notice of His Excellency the Governor of Victoria the advisability of taking steps to notify gold diggers in your colony that, owing to the tropical climate and heavy rainfall, the fields here are not of a nature to be profitably worked by white men who have not capital to enable them to employ native or Chinese labor; and further, that at present there exists no suitable overland route to the fields through the dense jungle, nor are there any facilities for that in the supplies and provisions, except from a great distance. As will be seen from the copies of the Government Notifications of the 17th January 1883 and the 26th of August 1886, which I have the honor to enclose, this Government refuses to allow persons to land in the Territory unless they can show that they are in possession of sufficient means of livelihood; and that, for the present, they reserve the right of refusing permits to Europeans, Australians, or Americans to reside or work in the Segama goldfields district.

WE do hereby direct and proclaim that any person arriving in any of the ports of the Territory of North Borneo may, at the discretion of the officer in charge at the port of arrival, be refused permission to land, unless he can show that he is in possession of sufficient means of livelihood, or can produce a landing ticket from some recognised agent of the North Borneo Government at the port of departure.

And we do further direct and proclaim that the master of any vessel bringing to ports in the said Territory persons who are so refused permission to land, and for the above-mentioned reasons, may be required to keep such persons on board at the risk and charge of the ship during her stay in any North Borneo port, and to take away with him the said persons on departure, under a penalty of Five hundred dollars in each case.

WHEREAS by The Diseases in Stock Act 1872 among other things the Governor in Council is empowered from time to time to make orders and regulations for the purposes therein mentioned and to rescind the same: And whereas from time to time, and in particular by an Order in Council dated the nineteenth day of March 1880, the Governor in Council has made divers orders and regulations under the powers conferred by the said Act: And whereas it is desirable to add the disease known as malignant or typhoid fever in horses to those dealt with under an Act for the Prevention of Disease in Stock, No. 451: Now therefore His Excellency the Governor in Council, with the advice and consent of the Executive Council, doth hereby, in exercise of the power conferred by the above-recited Act, and of every other power cnabling him in that behalf, order as follows, that is to say:—

PETITION UNDER THE HOSPITALS AND CHARITABLE INSTITUTIONS ACT.

THE GEELONG PROTESTANT ORPHAN ASYLUM.

TN accordance with the provisions of the Act 27 Victoria No. 220, intituled An Act for Hospitals and Charitable Institutions, the Governor in Council has, by Order made on the 8th day of March 1887, directed to be published the substance or prayer of a petition to His Excellency, signed by thirty-two contributors to the Institution called the Geelong Protestant Orphan Asylum, praying for its incorporation.

The petitioners state that the Geelong Protestant Orphan Asylum is established at Geelong for the relief of destitute persons, having for its objects the reception, maintenance, and education of children deprived of one or both of their parents by death, insanity, or permanent desertion. That such Institution is partly supported by the voluntary contributions of not less than fifty persons, each of whom has not paid less than One pound per annum, and that it is desirable that the said Institution shall become a body politic and corporate, and have perpetual succession and a common seal; and the petitioners pray that the said asylum may be incorporated under the provisions of The Act for Hospitals and Charitable Institutions, 27 Vict. No. 220.

BOROUGH OF HORSHAM WATERWORKS TRUST. REGULATIONS.

THE Chairman and Commissioners of the Borough of Horsham Waterworks Trust, the waterworks district of which has been proclaimed an Urban District for the purposes of The Victorian Water Conservation Acts 1883-4, do hereby, pursuant to and in exercise of the powers and authorities conferred by The Victorian Water Conservation Acts 1884-4, repeal the Regulations numbered 1 and 2 of the Regulations made by the said Waterworks Trust dated the twenty-fifth day of March 1886 and approved by the Governor in Council on the twenty-ninth day of April 1886, and do hereby make the Regulations following in lieu thereof:—

The following are the rates and charges which the owners and occupiers of lands and tenements shall pay in respect of water supplied by the Trust within the said urban district, that is to

- 1. (1.) For every house or tenement used either wholly or partly as a domicile of twenty pounds annual value or under, the sum of One pound per annum.
- (2.) For every house or tenement used either wholly or partly as a domicile of more than twenty pounds annual value, an amount equal to Five per cent. on the amount of the municipal
- (3.) For water supplied by the Trust by measurement, Two shillings and sixpence per thousand gallons; and the minimum quantity of water to be charged for to all owners or occupiers of troughs shall be 16,000 gallons for any trough not exceeding twelve feet in length, and 8,000 gallons for every additional five feet or fractional part thereof.

- (4.) Everytrough situated in a paddock shall be supplied through a meter affixed by the consumer according to the directions of the Trust, provided nevertheless that the minimum quantity of water to be charged for shall not be less than that charged for troughs supplied under the preceding clause.
- (5.) For every steam boiler supplied with water from the works of the Trust by measurement the charge shall be Two shillings and sixpence per thousand gallons, and the minimum quantity to be charged for shall be 8,000 gallons for each inch of the diameter of the cylinder.
- (6.) For water supplied by the Trust by measurement, Two shillings and sixpence per thousand gallons (or at such price as may be specially agreed upon), and the minimum quantity of water to be charged for to all owners or occupiers of gardens and lawns, or other lands where water is supplied by the Trust for the purpose of irrigation or for ornamental purposes, shall be as follows:—

One-sixteenth of an acre and less, per annum, 8,000 gallons. Exceeding one sixteenth of an acre, but not exceeding one-eighth of an acre, per annum, 12,000 gallons.

Exceeding one-eighth of an acre, but not exceeding one-quarter of an acre, per annum, 16,000 gallons.

Exceeding one-quarter of an acre, but not exceeding half an acre, per annum, 28,000 gallons.

Exceeding half an acre, but not exceeding one acre, per annum, 40,000 gallons per acre; for every additional acre, and proportionately, according to the foregoing scale, for every fractional part of an acre.

In livery and carriers' stables supplied by the Trust with water by measurement, the minimum quantity to be charged for shall be 2,000 gallons per stall used for stabling horses.

In open sheds used for the above purposes each space of five feet shall be charged for as a stall.

2. That each syphon-pump must have a meter affixed, and that Two shillings and sixpeuce per thousand gallons be charged for all water registered at such meter.

all water registered at such meter.

The before-mentioned rate is made for one year, commencing on the first day of January One thousand eight hundred and eighty-seven and ending on the thirty-first day of December One thousand eight hundred and eighty-seven, and shall be payable half-yearly in advance fourteen days after demand. Such persons as the Commissioners of the Borough of Horsham Waterworks Trust may from time to time appoint for that purpose shall be authorized to demand, receive, and collect and recover the said rate.

A repetition of irregularity in the quality or quantity of the supplies, or of delay in delivering or replacing them when required, or of refusal to execute orders, will subject the contractor to such mulct, not exceeding £50, as the Treasurer of the colony for the time being may direct. It will also be in the power of the said Treasurer, upon such repetition, to terminate the contract forthwith
- Contractors are not at liberty to transfer their contracts under cover of power-of-attorney, coupled with an interest or otherwise; and no such transfer will be recognised by the Govern-
- 10. In the event of any alteration in the tariff affecting any of the items included in these contracts, the Government, or the contractor, as may be the case, will make a proportionate allowance by way of deduction from or increase of the price of the item so affected.
- 11. In the event of the contractor failing to carry on the contract, the contract security money will in that case be absolutely forfeited, and in addition the contractor will be held liable for any loss which the Government may sustain in consequence of such failure.
- 12. It will be also competent for the Secretary to the Tender Board on behalf of the Government, or the contractor for coal on his own behalf, to terminate the contract, by giving, in writing, a notice of one month within the period for which the contract is made, and under no other circumstances will a contractor be permitted to abandon his contract. BYE-LAW NO. 2.—DAIRIES, DAIRY CATTLE, AND MILK.

THE Local Board of Health in and for the Shire of Alexandra, in the colony of Victoria, being the Municipal Council thereof, by virtue of the powers contained in "The Public Health Amendment Statute 1883," and every other power enabling the said local board in this behalf, and for the purpose of carrying the said Act into execution within the jurisdiction of the said local board, doth hereby make the following Bye-law No. 2 of the Local Board of Health, that is to say:—

1. All former bye-laws on the matters and things hereinafter provided for are hereby repealed.

2. This bye-law shall come into full force and operation on its confirmation by the Central Board of Health, and immediately after its publication in the Gavernment Gazette.

3. This bye-law shall apply to and have operation in the said Shire of Alexandra.

Registration of Cowkeepers, Dairumen, and Purveyors of Milk.

Accountation of Conkeepers, Dairymen, and Purryors of Milk.

4. Every person carrying on the trade of a cowkeeper, dairyman, or purveyor of milk shall, on or before the first day of April in every year, register himself with the Local Board of Health in manner following, that is to say, by signing and forwarding to the secretary of the Local Board of Health an application in the form hereunder written, and every such person shall with every such application pay a fee of Five shillings.

- 5. Upon receipt of every such application and fee, the secretary for the Local Board of Health shall indorse the same with a memorandum of the date on which it is received, and of the fee received, and shall file the same, and shall enter the particulars in the schedule of such application in a book to be kept for that purpose, and cause the same to be properly indexed.

 6. All paddocks, ground, land, and enclosures used as grazing grounds for dairy cattle shall, whenever necessary, he inspected by any member or officer of the said local board; and if, on inspection, such paddocks, grounds, or enclosures, or any one of them, are, or is likely, in the opinion of the officer or person so inspecting to be prejudicial to health, by affecting the milk or otherwise, the said local board may, by an order in writing signed by the secretary, and served personally or left at the dwelling-house of the registered, or, in the case of an unregistered, person, served personally, or left at his dwelling-house, or posted upon the land, prohibit the use of the same for the purpose of feeding dairy cattle, either absolutely or for any time named in such order. All cattle in dairies shall also be similarly inspected by a veterinary surgeon or other competent person, and any cows found to be diseased, or which, from poverty or weakness, are, in the opinion of the inspector, likely to be unfit for use for dairy purposes, shall be forthwith removed from such dairy if ordered by such inspector or other officer as aforesaid. And any such order as aforesaid the said local board may revoke, but upon every fresh inspection a similar order may from time to time be made.

 7. All houses, dairies, cowsheds, milk stores, milk shops, or other brother buildings or structures in the competition of any nerson.
- 7. All houses, dairies, cowsheds, milk stores, milk shops, or 7. All houses, dairies, cowsheds, milk stores, milk shops, or other buildings or structures in the occupation of any person following the trade of cowkeeper or dairyman, whether registered or not, shall be kept in such a state in respect of cleanliness as not to be a muisance or injurious to health, and shall be thoroughly and effectively lighted and ventilated: and the drainage of all such buildings shall be so arranged that no stagnant water or refuse matter of any kind shall remain or lie in any way whatever in or upon or contiguous to any premises of such person following the trade of a cowkeeper or dairyman, whether registered or not. tered or not.
- 8. All yards, sheds, or other places used for keeping or holding dairy cows shall be regularly swept, and be kept perfectly clean, and shall, within twenty-four hours of such order to that effect from the health officer or inspector of nuisances, be funigated, disinfected, or lime-washed, as may be in any such order to the resulting the continuous control of the c so directed.
- 9. All vessels used for containing milk shall be scalded and scoured daily.
- 9. All vessels used for containing milk shall be scalded and scoured daily.

 10. If any person, or any member of the family of any person registered, but employed as a cowkeeper, dairyman, or purveyor of milk, or any visitor or member of the family of any visitor to any such person, shall be attacked by typhus fever or any dangerous infectious disease, the occupier of the house in which such person shall be, or (if he be the person attacked) his wife or other person in charge, shall immediately give notice thereof to the local board or officer of health, or to the nearest member of the police force, who shall immediately inform the Local Board of Health, and thereupon it shall and may be lawful for the said local board or the officer of health, by order served as aforesaid, to prohibit absolutely the sale and vending and forwarding of milk for sale from any premises in the use and occupation of any such cowkeeper, dairyman, or purveyor of milk, until danger, in the opinion of such local board or officer of health, no longer exists. And in any such case it shall not be lawful to allow any person so suffering, or having recently been in contact with a person so suffering, to milk cows or to handle vessels used for containing milk for sale, or in any way to take part or assist in the conduct of such trade or business. Nor, if the person suffering, shall he take any part whatever in the conduct of such trade or business until, in either case, all danger therefrom of the communication of infection to the milk or of its contamination has ceased.
- 11. If at any time disease exists in the dairy or among the cows or cattle in any cowshed or dairy, or in the herds of any cowkeeper, dairyman, vendor or purveyor of milk, the registered person, owner, occupier, or other person in charge, as the case may be, shall immediately give notice to the local board, officer of health, or nearest member of the police force; and the milk of a diseased cow shall not be used in any way whatever.
- 12. No cowkeeper, dairyman, or purveyor of milk shall keep, or permit or suffer to be kept, any pigs in the sheds, buildings, or milking-yards in which any dairy cows may be kept or explored.
- 13. In the interpretation of this bye-law words imputing the masculine gender shall be deemed and taken to include females, and the singular the plural, and the singular, and the word "person" shall include a corporation.
- 14. Every person guilty of any breach of this bye-law, or of any of its provisions, shall be liable, in the discretion of the convicting justices, to a penalty not exceeding Ten pounds nor less than Five shillings, or in the like discretion to a penalty not exceeding Five pounds nor less than Five shillings, for each day during which such breach shall be committed or continued.

The owner or occupier of any land in the said township on which there shall be erected any stable, cow-yard, cattle-shed, or pig-sty shall cause such premises to be kept in such a state in respect of cleanliness as not to be a nuisance or injurious to health, and shall cause all soil, dung, or other manure produced or accumulated therein to be from time to time removed from such premises as often as the quantity of the same so produced or accumulated shall amount to one cubic yard; and if at any time the occupier of such premises shall neglect or fail to have such dung, soil, or other manure removed therefrom as aforesaid, the same shall be removed by the said local board at the expense of such owner or occupier.

VI. The owner or occupier of every house, building, or tenement within the said township shall cause every cesspool shall not be remove

allowed.

X. Every person placing or depositing, or causing or suffering to be placed or deposited or spread, or assisting in placing or depositing or spreading on any land, whether by way of manure or otherwise, any nightsoil, offal, blood, or other reluce matter removed from any earth-closet, privy, cesspool, or other place, shall first obtain the consent, in writing, of the said local board or its health officer, and shall, immediately on the deposit or spreading thereof, cover the same, or cause the same to be covered, and shall keep the same covered, with a layer of earth not less than six inches in thickness.

XI. The owner or occupier of any premises within the township

And any person committing any such breach as aforesaid shall be liable to the penalty, notwithstanding that the Local Board of Health may be empowered by this byo-law or otherwise to remedy such breach, and whether such local board has or has not taken advantage of such powers.

13. In the interpretation of this bye-law words imputing the masculine gender shall be deemed and taken to include females, and the singular the plural and the plural the singular, and the word "person" shall include a corporation.

14. Every person guilty of any breach of this bye-law, or of any of its provisions, shall be liable, in the discretion of the convicting justices, to a penalty not exceeding Ten pounds nor less than Five shillings, or in the like discretion to a penalty not exceeding Five pounds nor less than Five shillings for each day during which such breach shall be committed or continued.

1. All former bye-laws or parts of bye-laws on the matters and things hereinafter provided for are hereby repealed, excepting as to acts done, penalties incurred, and proceedings at law pending at the time of this bye-law coming into operation.

2. This bye-law shall come into full force and operation on its confirmation by the Central Board of Health, and immediately after its publication in the *Government Gazette*.

3. This bye-law shall apply to and have operation in the whole of the Borough of Echnea.

The occupier or person in charge, or having the management or control of any house, dwelling, school, licensed public-house, factory, workshop, or other building or premises within the said borough, shall provide for and constantly keep in every privy or place in the nature of an earth-closet used in connection therewith, a proper closet pan, made of galvanized iron, properly riveted and soldered, so as to be watertight, with handles thereto, and of a capacity not less than ten gallons.

4. Every occupier or person in charge, or having the management or control of any such house, &c., &c., as described above, shall keep or cause to be kept in every privy or earth-closet belonging thereto a supply of dry powdered eath, ashes, charcoal, line, or some other material sufficient for deodorizing might-soil, and shall cause all night-soil which may be deposited in any part to be immediately, on deposit thereof, covered with a quantity of such deodorizing material sufficient to deodorize the contents of such pan.

5. Every such accupier and person as above described shall, once at least in every fourteen days, empty and cleanse, or cause to be emptied and cleansed, every pan as aforesaid.

In pursuance of the powers contained in "The Public Health Amendment Statute 1883," and of every other power enabling them in that behalf, the Local Board of Health for the Borough of Belfast, for the purpose of carrying the said Act into execution within its jurisdiction, doth hereby make the bye-law following, being Bye-law No. 1, that is to say:

1. In the construction and for the purposes of this bye-law the following terms shall, if not inconsistent with the context or subject-matter, have the respective meanings hereby assigned to them—

"House" shall mean and include dwellings of any kind, schools, hotels, licensed public-houses, factories, work-rooms, common or other lodging-houses, or other buildings or premises. "Cesspool" shall mean any receptacle for night-soil, or for noxious or offensive matter below or above the ground. "Street" shall mean and include any highway, and any public bridge, and any road, lane, footway, square, court, alley, or passage, whether a thoroughfare or not.

- 2. Every occupier or person having the management or control of any house or premises shall cause the same to be kept in such a state so as not to be a nuisance or injurious to health.
- 3. Every occupier of a house or premises shall remove therefrom all dust, mud, ashes, rubbish, filth, or such other refuse matter produced or accumulated thereon once in every week, and in case of the default of such occupier the local board may remove the
- 4. Every occupier of a house or premises shall provide and keep 4. Every occupier of a house or premises shall provide and keep thereon a box or some other covered receptacle for the temporary deposit of house refuse, which box or receptacle shall be of such dimensions as that the same may, with the contents thereof, when full, be readily and conveniently movable by one man, or so many such boxes or receptacles as may be necessary to contain all the house refuse produced or accumulated on such premises during one week; and shall cause all house refuse to be deposited as soon as conveniently may be in some such box or receptacles.

5. Every occupier of land on which is erected any stable, shed, sty, yard, or other place for the keeping of animals shall from time to time remove from such premises all dung, soil, or other manure produced or accumulated thereon once at least every week; and in case of the default of such occupier the Local Board of Health may remove the same.

6. Nothing contained in this bye-law or any of its provisions shall be taken to prevent the occupier of any premises from causing any dung, soil, or other refuse matter produced or accumulated on any premises to be at any time removed or to be used as manure on any garden or land, or to be kept for the purpose of being used on any garden or land contiguous to such premises as manure, so that the same be not so removed, kept, or used as to contravene any bye-law of the Local Board of Health, or so as to be a nuisance or injurious to health.

7. Every occupier and every person having the management

Every occupier and every person having the management or control of premises used for the purpose of any noxious or offensive trade, business, or manufactory whatsoever, shall cause all rubbish, filth, offal, soil, or other offensive matters, and all waste products of such manufacture from which effluvia may arise, to be removed from such premises once at least in every twenty-four hours, and to be in the meantime kept so as not to be a nuisance or injurious to health, and so that no noxious or offensive effluvia arise therefrom; and if any such occupier or person shall neglect or fail to have removed any such offensive matter or waste products as aforesaid, the same may be removed by the Local Board of Health.

8. Every occupier, licensee, or person having the management or

Every occupier, licensee, or person having the management or control of an abattoir, slaughter-house, or place where any cattle or other animals are killed, shall cause all the blood from the animals killed therein, as soon as conveniently may be, to be collected in a fit receptacle to be provided for that purpose, and to be effectually deodorized by mixing therewith commercial sulphate of iron or chloride of line in the proportion of one pound to the gallon, or some other efficient deodorizer sufficient to effectually deodorize the same, and to be removed from the premises within twenty-four hours after such blood is shed.

9. Every occupier of any premises on which may be any offal shall forthwith effectually deodorize the same, and remove the same from the premises within twenty-four hours.

No person shall construct or cause to be constructed any privy except in the form of an earth-closet, which shall consist of a suitable privy building, the floor whereof is at no point less than 3 inches above the surface of the adjoining ground; and every such building shall be constructed with proper openings or flues to provide sufficient means of ventilation, and shall be provided with a suitable pan or other movable receptacle for night-soil, the contents whereof does not exceed three cubic feet, and with the requisite apparatus for the application of dry earth or some other deodorizing material to the contents thereof, and shall be constructed and placed so as to afford easy means of access for the purpose of removing the pan or receptacle and the contents thereof, and emptying and cleansing the same. Every privy attached to any school, hotel, licensed public-house, factory, work-room, or common lodging-house, and every public privy, shall be flagged or paved with some non-absorbent material, having a fall or inclination towards the door or other opening of at least half-an-inch to the foot.

11. Every occupier and every person having the management or control of any premises shall cause to be kept in every earth-closet beionging thereto a supply of dry powdered earth, ashes, charcoal, lime, or some other material efficient for deodorizing night-soil, and shall cause all night-soil which may be deposited in any pan or other receptacle in such earth-closet to be immediately, on the deposit thereof, covered with a quantity of such deodorizing material sufficient to thoroughly and effectually deodorize the contents of such pan or other receptacle.

12. Every occupier and every person having the management or control of any premises, once at least in every week, shall empty, cause or permit to be emptied, or assist in emptying, any ear

16. Every cesspool already in existence shall be furnished with a water-tight cover or roof, and every cesspool formed or made below the surface of the ground shall be constructed with water-tight walls or sides, which project on all sides at least 6 inches above the surface of the ground.

17. Every occupier of premises, and every person having the management or control of premises, on which there shall be any cesspool, shall cause the same to be emptied once at least in every week.

No person shall empty, or assist in emptying, or cause or permit to be emptied, any cesspool or place for the deposit of offal, blood, or other refuse and offensive matter, except between the hours of eleven o'clock p.m. and five o'clock a.m., or until such contents have been properly deodorized; and every person emptying, or causing to be emptied, any cesspool, shall remove, or cause to be removed, the contents thereof so soon as the same is emptied.

21. No person shall place or deposit any dust, mud, ashes, rubbish, filth, blood, offal, manure, dung, or soil, or any night-soil or other offensive matter, in any place so as to be a nuisance to any person or injurious to health.

Every person placing or depositing, or causing or suffering to be placed or deposited, or assisting in placing or depositing, on any land, whether by way of manure or otherwise, any night-soil, offal, blood, or other refuse matter removed from any earth-closet, privy, cesspool, or other place of deposit, shall immediately on the deposit thereof cover the same, or cause the same to be covered (and shall keep the same covered) with a layer of earth not less than six (6) inches in thickness.

No person shall empty, cause or permit to be emptied, or assist in emptying, any earth-closet, privy, cesspool, or place for the deposit of night-soil, offal, blood, or other refuse matter into any drain or sewer, or so that the same may or may be likely to find its way, into any drain or sewer.

24. No person shall place, assist in placing, or cause or permit to be placed, in or so that the same may or may be likely to find its way into any drain or sewer.

No person shall keep any animal in such a manner as to pollute any water used or likely to be used by man for drinking or domestic purposes, or for manufacturing drinks for the use of man, or used or likely to be used in any dairy, so as to endanger the health of any person using such water or drinks or milk or other produce of such dairy.

29. Every occupier or licensee or person having the management or control of a slanghter-house or abattoir shall cause the same to be supplied with a sufficient quantity of water for all purposes.

30. Every person erecting or causing to be creeted any new

The owner or occupier of every house or building in adjoining or near to any street or road, within seven days next after service of a notice by the council for that purpose, shall put up a shoot or trough of the whole length of such house or building, and shall connect the same either with a similar shoot on the adjoining house or building or with a pipe or trunk to be fixed to the front or side of such first mentioned house or building from the roof to the ground to carry the water from the roof thereof in such manner that the water from such house or the shoot or trunk affixed thereto, or from any portice or projection therefrom shall not fall upon the persons passing along the street or road, or flow over the footway, but so that no such pipe or trunk shall be an obstruction to the safe and convenient passage along the footway, and shall construct or lay from and in continuation of such pipe or trunk to the water channel a gutter, herein called channel at the outer edge of the footway, and through under and transversely to the footway, such covered drain or trunk for carrying such water to such channel as shall be authorised or directed by some regulation in that behalf, and shall thereafter keep in good condition every such shoot trough pipe drain and trunk, and every such drain or trunk shall be constructed laid and repaired subject to the inspection of such officer as the council shall have appointed in that behalf, and in default of compliance with any such notice within the period aforesaid or with the provisions of this section such owner or occupier shall forfeit a sum not exceeding Forty shillings for overy day that he shall so nuke default.

4. Every goat found at large in any street road or public place may by the proper officer of the council be forthwith seized and confined in such enclosure as aforesaid until dealt with as hereinafter provided.

7. The owner of any goat which shall have been seized as aforesaid may apply ex parte to any justice that such goat be restored to such owner, and such goat shall, if a justice shall so order and not otherwise, be, unless the same has been destroyed, restored to such owner accordingly, and such order of a justice or any minute thereof under the hand of such justice shall for all purposes of this sub-division be conclusive evidence that the person so applying was the owner of such goat.

8. The owner whether registered hereunder or not, of every goat found at large in any street road or public place shall whether such goat be destroyed or not, or be restored or not, forfeit and pay a penalty of Five shillings.

9. It shall be lawful for the council from time to time to make regulations for appointing by limits to be set forth therein portions of the municipal district in which it shall not be lawful to keep any swine, and if any person shall keep any swine within any such prescribed limits, he shall forfeit for every day during which he shall so offend, a sum not exceeding Five pounds.

THE BYE-LAWS OF THE HOMEOPATHIC HOSPITAL.

Revised to November 1886.

Introductory.

1. Repeal of Bye-laws.—All bye-laws made prior to the date of making these bye-laws shall be, and the same arc, hereby

repealed.

2. Common Seal.—The following shall be the device of the common seal of the hospital:—



3. Custody of and Affixing of Seal.—The common seal of the corporation shall be kept at the hospital in a box having two different locks; one shall be kept by the treasurer, and the other by some officer appointed by the board of management for that purpose. The common seal shall not be affixed to any deed, instrument, or writing, except by order of the board of management at a meeting at which five members at least are present at the time of making such order, and for which meeting notice to make such order has been given, the affixing shall be witnessed by the president, vice-president, or treasurer.

OBJECTS.

4. Objects of the Charity.—The objects of the hospital are to afford gratuitous medical surgical aid under the homosopathic system to sick persons in destitute circumstances, and to others upon such terms of payment as shall from time to time be determined by the board of management.

CONSTITUTION.

5. Constitution.—The supreme control of the hospital is vested in the contributors thereto, and those who shall have contributed £10 or more in one sum, or who shall contribute £1 or more annually to the funds of the hospital.

MANAGEMENT.

MANAGEMENT.

6. Board of Management.—There shall be a board of management consisting of president, two vice-presidents, and treasurer, who shall be contributors elected annually; and twelve contributors, who shall retain office for three years, four rotiring by rotation each year, but who shall be eligible for re-election, four to form a quorum.

7. Vacancies how filled—Clause 12 of Act 220, 1864.—"If any member of the board of management die or resign by letter under his hand addressed to the president, or become in-olvent, or compound with his creditors, or be convicted of any treason,

felony, or misdemeanour, or be absent for four consecutive meetings from the board, his office shall become vacant, and the remaining members of the board may declare his office vacant and temporarily appoint therete some contributor until the next annual meeting for the election of a board of management, when the person thus temporarily appointed shall retire as one of those who by the provisions of this Act are required to go out of office."

8. Meeting of the Board.—The board of management shall meet monthly at the hospital at such times as they shall from to time

Special Meeting.—Special meetings of the board of management may be held at the hospital or some convenient place in Melbourne, and may be convened on the requisition of the president, one of the vice-presidents, or treasurer, or any two members of the board; and notice shall be given of the business shall be considered.

Adjournment.—Should a quorum not be present within twenty minutes of the time appointed for holding any meeting of the board of management the meeting shall stand adjourned to the same day and hour of the following week.

9. Committees.—The board of management may from time to time appoint committees to take charge of particular departments of the hospital, and may appoint any members of the honorary staff, although not members of the board, to act on any such committee. Two to form a quorum.

10. Officers.—The board of management shall direct the business of the hospital; shall provide all requisites for its use, and may appoint and discharge all officers and servants except the honorary auditors.

11. Rules and alteration of rules.—Rescinding of resolutions.—The board of management may, subject to these bye-laws, make, alter, or rescind rules for the regulation of the hospital in every department, provided one month's notice has been given of the same. No motion to rescind a resolution of the board of management shall be submitted within three months after such resolution has been given, and then such motion must be passed by an absolute majority of the board then present.

12. Office or contracts dispusify members of the board.—No person who shall hold any office or place of profit under the hospital, or be concerned or participate in anywise in any contract with the board of management, or in the profit thereof, or of any work to be done under the authority of the same, shall be capable of being or continuing a member of such board of management p

MEDICAL STAFF.

MEDICAL STAFF.

13. Honorary medical staff:—The honorary medical staff shall consist of such legally qualified medical practitioners as the board of management may from time to time determine; they shall be elected by the board, and shall retain office for three years, but be eligible for re-election.

Resident medical staff:—There shall also be a resident medical staff, consisting of one or more legally qualified medical practitioners, who shall hold office for such term as the board of management shall determine.

14. Regulations to be signed—Attendance of honorary staff:—Regulations defining the duties of the medical staff shall be made the board of management, and a copy of such regulations shall by essigned by every medical officer on his appointment. No member of the honorary medical staff shall be absent from the hospital for more than fourteen consecutive days without leave from the board of management.

15. Suspension of honorary medical staff:—The board of management at a special meeting called for the purpose may, by a majority of two-thirds of the board then present, suspend or dismiss any member of the medical staff.

CONTRIBUTORS.

Contributors.

16. Privileges in recommending patients and voting.—A contributor of £1 yearly shall be an annual subscriber, entitled to one vote at all meetings, and to recommend one in-patient and four out-patients every year.

A contributor of £5 yearly shall be an annual governor, entitled to one vote at all meetings, and to recommend two in-patients and ten out-patients every year.

A contributor of £10 yearly shall be an annual governor, entitled to two votes at all meetings, and to recommend four in-patients and twenty out-patients every year.

A contributor of £20 yearly shall be an annual governor, entitled to three votes at all meetings, and to recommend eight in-patients and thirty out-patients overy year.

A contributor of £10 in one amount shall be a life subscriber, entitled to one vote at all meetings, and to recommend one in-patient and eight out-patients every year.

A contributor of £20 in one amount shall be a life governor, entitled to one vote at all meetings, and to recommend two in-patients and eight out-patients every year.

A contributor of £20 in one amount shall be a benefactor, entitled to two votes at all meetings, and to recommend four in-patients and twenty out-patients every year.

A contributor of £20 in one amount shall be a benefactor, entitled to three votes at all meetings, and to recommend ten in-patients and thirty out-patients every year.

The privileges of life subscribers, life governors, and benefactors shall not be transferable except as provided for in bye-law 20.

17. Life contributors on collection—Any person who shall pay to the hospital in one sum monies to any or either of the amounts

17. Life contributors on collection.—Any person who shall pay to the hospital in one sum monies to any or either of the amounts

specified in bye-law 16 shall be entitled to the privileges thereto, provided no privilege shall be claimed by or for any of the persons contributing to the said collections.

18. Contributions by corporations, church congregations, and firms.—Any public or corporate body or church, congregation or firm or partnership which shall pay to the hospital any or either of the amounts specified in bye-law 16 shall be authorized to nominate some one person who shall be entitled to all the privileges attached thereto.

19. Life contributors under bequests.—The executor first named in any will, or the administrator of any estate, through which the hospital shall receive the sum of £50 shall be enrolled a life subscriter, and shall be entitled to one vote at all meetings, and to recommend one in-patient and four out-patients every year; and the executor first named in any will, or administrator of any estate, through whom the hospital shall receive the sum of £100 shall be enrolled a life governor, and entitled to one vote at all meetings, and to recommend two in-patients overy year.

20. Privileges by autorney.—Any contributor being absent from the colony of Victoria may, by power of attorney, appoint some person to exercise all the privileges to which he would be entitled if personally present; but such power of attorney shall be deposited with the board of management for record at least seven days before the same can be used in the exercise of such privileges.

21. Payment of contributions—Privileges suspended.— Every

Payment of contributions—Privileges suspended.—Every yearly contribution shall be paid in advance, and every first yearly payment shall be calculated from the date of such payment, but shall not entitle the contributor to a vote at any meeting within three months from the date of such payment. The privileges of annual contributors shall be suspended until all arrears are paid.

22. Honorary life contributors.—Any person who has conferred some signal benefit on the hospital, irrespective of contribution, may be elected by the board of management an honorary life governor, with all the privileges attached thereto, and he shall be eligible to be elected to the board of management.

Patients.

23. Conditions of admission.—Any sick person may be admitted free as in-patient or as out-patient, if the medical officers consider that such person is likely to receive benefit by treatment in the hospital, and if he appear to the board of management to be a proper object of charity, or on payment of such weekly sum as shall be fixed by the board. No person shall be admitted without examination.

examination.

24. Whenever the applications for admission are more than can be accommodated in the hospital, those cases only will be admitted which, in the opinion of the board of management upon the recommondation of some medical officer, are the most urgent.

25. Cases not admissible.—No lunatic, or persons suffering from any contagious or incurable disease or chronic epilepsy, or pregnant woman for purpose of confinement, shall be deemed a proper case for admission.

ACCOUNTS.

Accourse Accourse of the Hospital shall close on the 30th June in each year, and a statement of receipts and expenditure shall be prepared and audited prior to the annual meeting.

27. All sums received on account of the hospital shall be pail into the Bank of Victoria, or such other bank as the beard of management may appoint, to one or other of the following accounts as the case may be, viz.:—

Bequests how dealt with.—All bequests to the hospital shall, subject to any conditions under which such bequests are made, be paid to the Endowment Fund, and shall be invested in such manner as the board of management shall direct; the interest may be available for the maintenance of the hospital.

20. If no quorum be present within half-anhur of the time named, the meeting shall stand adjourned to the same day and hour of the following week. Should there not then be a quorum present, the retiring officers and members of the board of management shall continue in office till the next annual meeting. 31. Presidency at meetings.—All meetings of contributors shall be convened by advertisement, setting forth the business to be transacted thereat, inserted twice at least in some daily paper published in Melbourne; the first of such advertisements sh

Casting vote of chairman—Reading of minutes—Decision of questions.—At all meetings of contributors or of the board of management, the president, or in his absence one of the vice-presidents, or in their absence the treasurer, shall take the chair; but in the absence of all these officers, the meeting shall choose its own chairman. In the event of equality of votes, the president or chairman for the time being shall have an additional or casting vote. No business shall be entered upon until the minutes of the previous meeting have been confirmed, and no discussion shall be permitted thereon except as to their accuracy. All questions shall be decided by show of hands unless a ballot be demanded by five contributors. Voting by proxy shall not be allowed.

But no alteration, rescinding, or new bye-law shall be of any force or effect until one month after the same shall have been confirmed by a general meeting of contributors specially convened for that purpose, and published in the Government Gazette.
