ENGINEER STUDENTSHIPS IN HER MAJESTY'S
DOCKYARDS.

THE following despatch from the Right Honorable the Secretary of State for the Colonies to His Excellency the Governor, and its enclosures, are published for general information.

I have the honor to acquaint you that the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty have agreed to place annually at the disposal of the Secretary of State, on behalf of the sons of families settled in the principal colonies, three nominations for Engineer Studentships in Her Majesty's Dockyards, under the General Regulations at present in force with regard to these appointments; and I transmit for your information the accompanying extract from a letter from the Admiralty on the subject, together with copies of the General Regulations referred to, and of a Form of Particulars which should accompany each application for a nomination.

I have to request that applications accompanied by your recommendation may be forwarded so as to reach the Secretary of State before the 31st of December in the present and any succeeding year.

Extract from a letter from the Admiralty to the Colonial Office,
dated 3th November 1886.

"I am commanded by my Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty to acquaint you, for the information of the Secretary for the Colonies, that in view of the fact that there are at present four cadetships given annually to the sons of gentlemen of the colonies, my Lords have decided that in future three engineer studentships shall be offered annually under the same general regulations as are at present in force with regard to other candidates for these appointments.

2. With regard to the educational examination, these candidates will be subject to the provisions contained in paragraph 11 of the enclosed regulations as to service-nominated candidates at home. The general regulations in other particulars will be observed.

3. The names of the three candidates for the engineer studentships proposed for nomination by the Secretary of State for the Colonies should reach this office on or before the 1st February in each year.

4. It is proposed that the Civil Service Commissioners shall prepare the questions for the examination and transmit them to this office in a sealed packet. The same should be forwarded to the Naval Commander-in-Chief or Senior Officer on the Station nearest to where the candidates reside, with directions for the examination to be held on board the flag or senior officer's ship under the supervision of the naval instructor of the ship. The examination to take place early in April, the time when the examination of candidates at home is held.

5. The papers worked by the candidates would be collected by the naval instructor, sealed up, and sent home, in order that the same may be valued by the Civil Service Commissioners.

6. I am further to state that directions will be given to forward with the worked papers the certificates of birth of the candidates, or other satisfactory evidences of age; also satisfactory evidences of character, and reports from the medical officer of the flag ship that the candidates are physically fit for H.M. service according to the regulations.

7. The indentures and bonds will be sent out with the examination questions, filled in as far as possible. Should the candidate be successful in passing the examination, and the evidences as to age, character, &c., are pronounced to be satisfactory, the appointments will then be made, and directions will at the same time be given for the indentures and bonds to be completed so far as the parents or guardians are concerned, and brought home by the student for completion at the dockyard."

REGULATIONS FOR THE ENTRY OF ENGINEER STUDENTS IN HER MAJESTY'S DOCKYARDS, WITH A VIEW TO THEIR BEING TRAINED FOR SERVICE AFLOAT AS ENGINEER OFFICERS IN HER MAJESTY'S NAVY.

1. *Vacancies open to public competition principally; a few to be filled by nominated candidates.*—Vacancies for appointments as engineer students in the dockyards will be filled principally by means of competitive examinations open to all sons of British subjects, being of the prescribed age and of good moral character, but their Lordships will reserve to themselves the right to nominate a few candidates at each entry who will be appointed on passing the examination specified in paragraph 11.

The candidates to be nominated will be selected by the Board of Admiralty from sons of officers of the navy, army, or royal marines who have been killed in action or who have been lost at sea on active service, or killed on duty, or who have died of wounds received in action or injuries received on duty within six months from the date of such action or injury, or sons of officers

of the navy or royal marines who have performed long and meritorious service. The number to be so nominated will not exceed one-fifth of the total number of engineer students to be entered. Except as regards exemption from the competitive examination, these candidates will be subject in all respects to these regulations. Three engineer studentships will be given annually to sons of gentlemen in the colonies, on the recommendation of the Secretary of State for the Colonies. These candidates will be subject to precisely the same regulations as regards educational examination, &c., as herein laid down for nominated candidates.

2. *Appointments.*—The number of appointments to be made in each year, and the dockyards at which engineer students are to be entered, will be fixed by their Lordships.

3. *Time for sending in applications.*—The list of candidates for these appointments by open competition will be kept at the office of the Civil Service Commissioners. All applications for the forms to be filled up by persons who wish to compete must be sent to the Secretary, Civil Service Commission, London, S.W., on or after the first of January in each year, and care must be taken that the forms when filled up are returned so as to reach the Civil Service Commissioners on or before the 15th March following, as no notice will be taken of forms received after that date. The list of nominated candidates will be kept at the Admiralty.¹

4. *Age.*—Candidates must not be less than fourteen nor more than sixteen years of age on the first day of May in the year in which they are examined.

5. *Age and character, evidence of.*—Evidence of age and character will not be required before the examination, but candidates successful in it will not be eligible for appointment unless they satisfy the Civil Service Commissioners on these points.

6. *Medical examination, time and place.—Re-vaccination.*—The medical examination of the successful candidates will be held under the authority of their Lordships, as soon as possible after the result of the educational examination is made known. No candidate will be entered as an engineer student unless he is pronounced to be physically fit. Candidates in or near London will be medically examined by the Medical Director-General of the Navy, at the Admiralty. Those residing near one of Her Majesty's dockyards, or one of the first reserve ships or drill ships of the Royal Naval Reserve, or the flagship at Queenstown, will be examined by the medical officers attached thereto. The medical examination will be conducted in all respects in strict accordance with the instructions for the examination of persons for admission into the naval service. All candidates at the time of their medical examination must produce certificates to the satisfaction of the examining officers that they have been re-vaccinated, or they must be re-vaccinated before they can be considered eligible for entry into the dockyard.

7. *Educational examination, time and place.*—The educational examination will be held by the Civil Service Commissioners in London, Liverpool, Portsmouth, Devonport, Bristol, Leeds, Newcastle-on-Tyne, Edinburgh, Glasgow, Aberdeen, Dublin, Belfast, and Cork, and will take place in the month of April of each year. The exact date may be ascertained by application to the Secretary, Civil Service Commission, on or after the first of January in each year.

8. *Competitive examination.*—The following will be the subjects of the competitive examination, and the maximum number of marks for each subject:—

All candidates will be tested as to their ability to read aloud with clearness, distinctness, and accuracy, and without hesitation. Stammering, or any imperfection of utterance, will be regarded as a disqualification.

9. *Examination fee.*—A fee of One shilling will be required from every candidate attending an examination.

10. *Result of examination.*—Candidates in the competitive examination who fail to pass in the first four subjects (those marked with an asterisk), or in reading aloud, will be disqualified, and their other papers will not be examined. Successful candidates will be entered as engineer students in one of the dockyards, according to the number of appointments which it may be decided to make that year; they will be taken according to their position

on the examination list. Candidates who obtain less than 700 marks in the aggregate will not be placed upon the list.

11. *Examination for nominated candidates.*—The candidates who are nominated by their Lordships will be required to pass the same test examination in the first four subjects as the candidates who enter for the competitive examination. They will also be examined in the other subjects to ascertain the extent of their knowledge and to determine their order of merit, and no nominated candidate will be appointed as an engineer student who obtains less than 700 marks in the aggregate.

12. *Informing of result of examination.*—Candidates will be informed by letter from the Civil Service Commission of the result of their examination as soon as it has been ascertained.

13. *Bond and indenture.*—The candidates who obtain appointments will be entered as engineer students not later than the 1st July in each year, and must join with their parents or guardians in a bond for £300 to enter, if required, into Her Majesty's naval service as assistant engineers, if, at the expiration of their training, they should obtain certificates of good conduct and efficiency for entry in that capacity. These bonds and the indentures of apprenticeship must be completed in all respects before the students join the dockyard.

14. *Fees.*—The parent or guardian of each engineer student entered in future will be required to make four annual payments during the first four years of the student's training, viz.:—£30 each year for the first two years, and £20 each year for the two subsequent years. It will, however, be at the discretion of my Lords to reduce these annual payments in the case of sons of officers killed or drowned, or who have otherwise lost their lives on service. Should an engineer student leave or be dismissed from the service, the payments which have been made in his behalf will be forfeited.

15. *Payment of fees.*—The first payment is to be made before the student is entered in the yard, and the three next payments are to be made on or before the 30th day of June in each of the three succeeding years. The payments are to be made to the cashier of the yard to which the student is appointed. In case of failure of payment the student will be discharged.

16. *Clothing, washing, necessaries, board, lodging, medical attendance.*—The parents or guardians of all engineer students will also be required to provide the uniform (see paragraph 33) or other clothing, washing, and necessaries of each student. Board and lodging and medical attendance will be provided by the Admiralty. The students will be required to reside in one of the dockyards or in a vessel adjacent thereto.

17. *Pay.*—The weekly pay of engineer students during their training will be as follows, provided they are well reported on by the officers—

18. *Leave.*—Five weeks' leave (30 working days) on full pay will be granted each year to all engineer students whose conduct and progress have been satisfactory. This leave is to be taken during the school vacations at Midsummer and Christmas.

19. *Checking of pay.—Discharge, if unfit.*—The students are not to be checked pay while on leave, nor when hurt. When sick they will be checked of their pay after they have been absent for six months in the aggregate during any period of twelve months. At the expiration of this time a special report is to be made to their Lordships in each case. Students pronounced at the end of twelve months' absence on account of sickness or hurt to be permanently unfit or unlikely to be capable of entering Her Majesty's navy as engineer officers, will be discharged.

20. *Supervision.*—Engineer students will be under the supervision of the superintendent of the dockyard and a staff of officers, and subject to such rules and regulations as their Lordships may deem necessary.

21. *Distinction from workmen.*—Special regulations will be made for engineer students in the dockyards, so as to make a distinction between them and the workmen.

22. *Cancelling bonds and indentures.*—Engineer students in their first year of training, who may be desirous of leaving the service, and whose reasons are considered satisfactory, may be allowed, under their Lordships' authority, to have their indentures and bonds cancelled, but this concession is not to be claimed as a right.

23. *Employment and instruction of engineer students.*—Engineer students will remain for six years at one of the dockyards for practical training in the workshops, and to receive instructions in iron shipbuilding. While the engineer students are being instructed in iron shipbuilding they are to be under the direction of the chief constructor. They will attend the dockyard schools for such periods, and to pursue such studies as may from time to time be determined on; they will also pass a portion of their time in the drawing office. Means will be afforded them of acquiring the groundwork of the knowledge required by a naval engineer respecting the working of marine engines and boilers, including those repairs which can be carried out afloat, the practical use of the various instruments used in the engine-room, including the indicator, and of becoming generally acquainted with the duties of a naval engineer.

24. *Examination of engineer students.*—Engineer students will be examined once a year under the direction of the president of the Royal Naval College. They will be examined by the engineer officers of the Admiralty at the end of the fourth, fifth, and sixth years of their service as to their practical acquirements and knowledge of steam machinery. Prizes will be given annually at each dockyard to the engineer students most highly reported on as regards their skill as workmen. Practical engineering will be considered an essential subject at examinations, and in the

lists showing the results of examinations the numbers obtained in practical subjects will be shown distinct from those obtained in educational subjects. No engineer student will be granted a qualifying certificate for entry at the Royal Naval College unless he obtains at least 50 per cent. of the total number of marks for practical engineering on his final examination, and also displays a competent knowledge of the subjects taught in the dockyard schools.

25. *Appointments as acting assistant engineers.*—The examination of the sixth year students is to be held in time for the necessary certificates to be forwarded to the Admiralty on or before the 23rd June in each year, and it will include tests of their skill as workmen. Those found qualified will, on the completion of their term of service at the dockyards, be entered as acting assistant engineers on probation, and proceed to the Royal Naval College at Greenwich, on the 1st October succeeding the examination, where they will pass through a course of higher instruction.

26. *Engineer students who fail at final examination.*—Those engineer students who fail to pass the examination at the end of their six years' service will be allowed to remain one year longer at the dockyards, and will then be re-examined, when, if they are unable to pass, they will cease to be eligible for the rank of naval engineer. The pay of a student during such year of probation will be the same as during the sixth year.

27. *To be able to swim and to be physically fit for service.*—Engineer students will not be entered as acting assistant engineers until they have been pronounced fit for Her Majesty's naval service by the medical officers, and have learned to swim.

28. *Acting assistant engineer's pay, &c.*—The pay of acting assistant engineers while at the reserves will be 6s. a day, and they will receive 1s. 6d. a day in lieu of provisions, &c. While at Greenwich they will be provided with quarters, and during their first session they will be paid 6s. a day and 1s. 6d. a day towards the mess expenses. Those selected for further study will receive their full pay and 1s. 6d. a day towards the mess.

29. *Examination of acting assistant engineers.*—The period of study at Greenwich will be one session extending from the 1st October to the 30th June following. All will be examined under the direction of the president of the Royal Naval College, on the completion of their course at Greenwich, and will receive certificates according to their merit, in three classes. Those who obtain first class certificates will receive commissions dated the same day as their acting appointments. Those who obtain second class certificates will receive commissions dated six months after the date of their acting appointments, and those who obtain third class certificates will receive commissions dated the day after their discharge from the Royal Naval College. The additional time given for first class certificates and second class certificates will reckon in all respects as time served as assistant engineer. In the event of any acting assistant engineer failing to pass satisfactorily at the final examination at Greenwich, his commission will be withheld for such a period as may be determined on by their Lordships.

30. *Assistant engineers selected for further period of study at Greenwich.*—Two assistant engineers will be selected annually from those who take the highest place at the examination on the completion of their course at Greenwich, to pass through a further course of scientific instruction if they desire it. These two will be allowed to remain two more sessions at Greenwich, on the completion of which they will be sent to sea as assistant engineers, and, after one year's service at sea, they will be considered eligible to fill vacancies occurring in the dockyards and at the Admiralty.

31. *Employment during vacations.*—Those passing the second and third sessions at Greenwich will be attached during the vacations between the 30th June and 1st October to the dockyards or steam reserves, where they will be employed sketching machinery, attending trials of new and repaired engines, and gaining such professional information as will be most useful to them for the purposes of engine design.

32. *Assistant engineers desirous of resigning appointments.*—No assistant engineer who has passed three sessions at Greenwich will be allowed to leave Her Majesty's service within seven years of the completion of his term at Greenwich, unless he shall pay the sum of £500 to defray the charges of his education. Such resignation to be subject in each case to their Lordships' approval.

UNIFORM, BOOKS, ETC.

33. *Uniform, &c.*—Engineer students are to be provided with—

Eight buttons placed by four to be worn on the breast of the tunic, and a single purple velvet stripe round the sleeve of the tunic.

Patterns of the several articles of uniform are kept and can be seen at the Admiralty, Whitehall, and at the offices of the Naval Commanders-in-Chief at Sheerness, Portsmouth, and Devonport.

34. *Text books.*—Copies of the authorized text books necessary for use in the dockyard schools will be supplied gratuitously to the engineer students, but all losses will have to be made good. The books will become the property of the engineer students when they leave school, free of charge.

35. The foregoing regulations will be generally followed, but my Lords will modify them from time to time as may be considered desirable.

MEDICAL EXAMINATIONS.

36. *Medical examinations.*—With a view to prevent parents and guardians from incurring the inconvenience and expense of preparing candidates for entry as engineer students in Her Majesty's dockyards who may be physically unfit for Her Majesty's service, it is suggested that the candidates be submitted to examination by the medical adviser of the family, or any other qualified medical practitioner, to whom the following points may be submitted as those upon which they will be physically examined by naval medical officers. It is to be understood that this private examination is merely suggested as a guide to parents and guardians, and to lessen the chances of disappointment, and that it is by no means intended to take the place of, or to influence in any way, the regular official physical examination.

A weak constitution, arising from imperfect development or weakness of the physical powers of the body, either hereditary or from chronic disease, wounds, or injuries.

Chronic eruptions on the skin or scalp.
Malformation of the head, with a dry, harsh, divergent state of the hair of the scalp, fracture or depression of the bones of the skull, disordered intellect, imbecility, epilepsy, paralysis, or impediment of speech.

Blindness or defective vision, as tested by Snellen's test types, in one or both eyes, fistula lachrymalis, and ptosis.

Impaired hearing, or discharge from one or both ears, disease or thickening of the lining membrane of the external ear.

Disease of the bones of the nose or of its cartilages, and polypus.

Disease of the throat, palate, or tonsils; unsound teeth, offensive breath from constitutional causes, unhealthy gums, scrofulous diseases of the glands of the throat or neck, external cicatrices from scrofulous sores.

Functional or organic disease of the heart or blood vessels, deformity or contraction of the chest, flattening of the sub-clavicular regions, phthisis, hæmoptysis, bronchitis, dyspnoea, aphonia, chronic cough, or other symptoms of tubercular exudation into the pulmonary tissues.

Swelling or distension of the abdomen, undue obesity, disease or enlargement of the liver, spleen, or kidneys. Rupture, weakness, or distension of the abdominal rings; vesical weakness, or incontinence.

The existence of any congenital defect, or of varicocele. Any disease of or pertaining to the alimentary canal.

Paralysis, weakness, impaired motion, or contraction of the upper or lower extremities, from whatever cause; aneurism, a varicose state of the veins, especially of the leg. Bunions, distortion, malformation of the feet, or malposition of the fingers or toes.

Distortion of the spine, of the bones of the chest, or pelvis, from injury or constitutional defect.

PROCLAMATION

By His Excellency Sir HENRY BROGHAM LOCH, Knight Commander of the Most Honorable Order of the Bath, Governor and Commander-in-Chief in and over the Colony of Victoria and its Dependencies, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS by a Proclamation under the hand of the Governor and the seal of the colony bearing date the thirteenth day of December One thousand eight hundred and eighty-six, and issued in pursuance of *The Public Health Statute 1865*, it was notified that the Island of Sumatra, a portion of the colony known as Netherlands-India, was infected with Cholera, and that it was probable that such disease might be brought from the islands forming the said colony to Victoria: And whereas the circumstances which led to the issue of such Proclamation have ceased to exist: Now therefore I, the Governor of Victoria, with the advice of the Executive Council, do hereby revoke the said Proclamation.

Given under my Hand and the Seal of the Colony, at Melbourne, this fifteenth day of March, in the year of our Lord One thousand eight hundred and eighty-seven, and in the fiftieth year of Her Majesty's reign.

The estimated population of Melbourne and suburbs (Greater Melbourne) about the end of the third quarter of 1886 was 371,630, the increase upon the estimate made twelve months previously being 26,250.

The births in Greater Melbourne during 1886 numbered 12,941, or 34.82 to every 1,000 of the population. The birth-rate was a fraction lower than that in 1885, but with that exception was higher than in any year since 1871.

The number of cases of twin-births registered during 1886 was 110. As the whole number of births during the same period was 12,941, there must have been 12,831 confinements in the year, and one mother in 118 gave birth to twins.

The number of children set down as being born out of wedlock during 1886 was 909, or 1 such birth in every 14 births registered.

The deaths in Greater Melbourne in 1886 numbered 7,590, or 20.42 to every 1,000 of the population. This death-rate was very slightly above the average of the decade 1871 to 1880, and was above that in all the years since 1880, except 1882 and 1884.

The deaths exceeded by 630 those in the previous year, viz.:—308 of males, and 322 of females. The increase in respect of males was made up of 194 under, and 114 over, 5 years of age; and that in respect to females was made up of 270 under, and 52 over, 5 years of age.

The highest temperature in the shade recorded at the Melbourne Observatory during the year was 104.1° on the 19th February; and the lowest temperatures were 28.2° on the 7th, and 28.1° on the 8th July. These are the lowest temperatures recorded in Melbourne since 1869, the next lowest temperature being 29.9° in July 1884, and again in July 1885. The mean temperature of the year 1886 (57.1°) was exactly the same as in 1885 and 1881, and accorded closely with the average mean temperature during the 10 years ended with 1880. The greatest range of the thermometer in any one day (43.9°) took place on the 28th March, viz., from a maximum of 91.2° to a minimum of 47.3°. The least range (3.8°) was on the 13th August, viz., from a maximum of 45.3° to a minimum of 41.5°. The mean daily range was 18.15°. The highest atmospheric pressure recorded was 30.573 inches, on the 15th July; and the lowest was 29.123 inches, on the 6th September. The mean atmospheric pressure (29.958 inches) was slightly above the average. Rain fell

on 128 days, as against 126 days in 1885, and 130 days over a series of years. The amount of rainfall was 23.99 inches, as against 26.90 in 1885, and 25.46 inches over a series of years.

Of the births registered in 1886, 51 per cent. were of males, and 49 per cent. were of females. Of the deaths registered, 54 per cent. were of males, and 46 per cent. were of females. Children under 5 years of age contributed 41 per cent. to the total mortality, as against 33 per cent in 1885, 41 per cent. in 1884, 36 per cent. in 1883, 40 per cent. in 1882, 38 per cent. in 1881, 40 per cent. in 1880 and 1879, 37 per cent. in 1878, 42 per cent. in 1877, 40 per cent. in 1876, 48 per cent. in 1875, 43 per cent. in 1874, and 42 per cent. in 1873.

The deaths of 349 persons, viz., 201 males and 148 females, of the age of 75 years or upwards occurred during 1886, or 8.1 less than in the previous year. Of these, 170 were between 75 and 80, 39 between 80 and 85, 63 between 85 and 90, 11 between 90 and 95, 3 between 95 and 100, 1 aged 100, and 2 said to be aged 102 and 103 respectively. Of the deaths recorded during the year, 368—of which 288 were of males and 80 of females—were from external causes; 298 being ascribed to accident, 27 to homicide, 42 to suicide, and 1 to judicial hanging. The deaths of children under five years of age numbered 3,119, of which 1,652, or 53 per cent., were of males, and 1,467, or 47 per cent., were of females. Of those who died, 2,393 were under one year of age, 540 were between one and two, 123 were between two and three, 77 were between three and four, and 70 were between four and five.

The persons who died at a more advanced age than five years numbered 4,471. Of these, 2,480, or 55 per cent., were males, and 1,991, or 47 per cent., were females; 201 were between five and ten, 114 were between ten and fifteen, 189 were between fifteen and twenty, 345 were between twenty and twenty-five, 430 were between twenty-five and thirty, 333 were between thirty and thirty-five, 285 were between thirty-five and forty, 284 were between forty and forty-five, 318 were between forty-five and fifty, 407 were between fifty and fifty-five, 374 were between fifty-five and sixty, 318 were between sixty and sixty-five, 305 were between sixty-five and seventy, 219 were between seventy and seventy-five, 170 were between seventy-five and eighty, and 179 were upwards of eighty.

"THE IRRIGATION ACT 1886."—REGULATIONS.

IN pursuance of *The Irrigation Act 1886*, section 64, the Governor in Council has made the subjoined Regulations providing for the examination of persons desirous of obtaining certificates as Engineers of Water Supply.

REGULATIONS.

Intending candidates must give notice, in writing, of their intention to present themselves for examination, and must forward to the Board documentary evidence that they are eligible under one of the following preliminary conditions. Upon their application being approved by the Board, candidates shall pay the prescribed fee of 13 3s. into the Treasury, Melbourne, or any Receipt and Pay Office, and forward receipt for same to the Secretary to the Board.

PRELIMINARY CONDITIONS.

1. A candidate must be a member, or an associate member, of the Institute of Civil Engineers of London; or a certificated engineer, or master of engineering, of one of the universities of the Australian colonies or New Zealand, or of one of the universities of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, or of some university whose degrees are recognised by the University of Melbourne, and whose graduates are admitted by it *ad eundem gradum*.

2. Or he must produce evidence satisfactory to the Board that he has been properly educated and trained for the profession of a civil engineer, and that he has been engaged for not less than two years, exclusive of any period of training or pupillage, in the active practice of the profession, and that one year, at least, of such practice has been in connection with hydraulic works demanding the exercise of technical knowledge and skill.

QUALIFICATIONS.

I. Candidates whose applications have been approved under preliminary condition 1 will be required to show, to the satisfaction of the Board, that they have been employed for not less than five years, in some responsible professional capacity, in the design, construction, and supervision of hydraulic works, and that the works carried out by them have been of a successful and satisfactory character.

II. Candidates whose applications have been approved under preliminary condition 2 shall be required to pass an examination in the following subjects:—

Subjects of Examination.

I.—*Surveying.*

Topographical surveying.
Engineering trial surveys.
Permanent engineering surveys, including the setting out of work.
Quantities surveying.

Note.—Candidates who have obtained the certificate of the Board of Examiners for Land Surveyors, or of the Board of Examiners for Mining Surveyors, in Victoria, will be exempt from the examination in surveying.

II.—*General Principles of Civil Engineering.*

Strength of materials.
Production and transmission of strains in structures.
General laws of statics.

III.—*Engineering Structures.*

Principles of engineering construction.
Special structures in stone masonry, brickwork, carpentry, cast and wrought iron.
Combined structures.
Composition and use of lime and cement mortars and concretes.

Note.—Candidates who have obtained the certificate of the Municipal Surveyors' Board, in Victoria, will be exempt from the examination in general principles of civil engineering, and in engineering structures.

IV.—*Hydraulic Engineering.*

Gauging of natural and artificial streams, and flow of water over weirs.
Computation of the flow of water in channels.
Computation of the flow of water in pipes and closed conduits.
Construction of reservoir embankments in masonry and earthwork.
Outlet works, waste weirs, and bye-washes.
Relation of bye-wash capacity to catchment area and rainfall.
Construction of weirs in river channels.
Pumping machinery, including motors.

Candidates for examination must provide themselves with a book of logarithms, plotting scales, parallel ruler, and all necessary appliances (except paper) for drawing and computing. They will also be permitted to use any ordinary manual of reference, or book of tables, which they may bring with them into the examination room; but they will not be permitted to leave the room during the progress of the examination.

Any candidate who shall have proved, to the satisfaction of the Board, that he is possessed of qualification I., or who shall have successfully passed the examination prescribed for qualification II., shall be entitled to, and shall receive, the certificate of the

Board that he is duly qualified to act as an Engineer of Water Supply, under the provisions of *The Irrigation Act 1886*.

Every such certificate shall show whether it has been issued in respect of sufficient service, the grantee being also the holder of some one of the qualifications referred to in preliminary condition 1, or in virtue of his having satisfactorily passed the examination prescribed by these regulations.

BOROUGH OF HORSHAM WATERWORKS TRUST.
REGULATIONS.

THE Chairman and Commissioners of the Borough of Horsham Waterworks Trust, the waterworks district of which has been proclaimed an Urban District for the purposes of *The Victorian Water Conservation Acts 1883-4*, do hereby, pursuant to and in exercise of the powers and authorities conferred by *The Victorian Water Conservation Acts 1883-4*, repeal the Regulations numbered 1 and 2 of the Regulations made by the said Waterworks Trust dated the twenty-fifth day of March 1886 and approved by the Governor in Council on the twenty-ninth day of April 1886, and do hereby make the Regulations following in lieu thereof:—

The following are the rates and charges which the owners and occupiers of lands and tenements shall pay in respect of water supplied by the Trust within the said urban district, that is to say:—

1. (1.) For every house or tenement used either wholly or partly as a domicile of twenty pounds annual value or under, the sum of One pound per annum.

(2.) For every house or tenement used either wholly or partly as a domicile of more than twenty pounds annual value, an amount equal to Five per cent. on the amount of the municipal valuation.

(3.) For water supplied by the Trust by measurement, Two shillings and sixpence per thousand gallons; and the minimum quantity of water to be charged for to all owners or occupiers of troughs shall be 16,000 gallons for any trough not exceeding twelve feet in length, and 8,000 gallons for every additional five feet or fractional part thereof.

(4.) Every trough situated in a paddock shall be supplied through a meter affixed by the consumer according to the directions of the Trust, provided nevertheless that the minimum quantity of water to be charged for shall not be less than that charged for troughs supplied under the preceding clause.

(5.) For every steam boiler supplied with water from the works of the Trust by measurement the charge shall be Two shillings and sixpence per thousand gallons, and the minimum quantity to be charged for shall be 8,000 gallons for each inch of the diameter of the cylinder.

(6.) For water supplied by the Trust by measurement, Two shillings and sixpence per thousand gallons (or at such price as may be specially agreed upon), and the minimum quantity of water to be charged for to all owners or occupiers of gardens and lawns, or other lands where water is supplied by the Trust for the purpose of irrigation or for ornamental purposes, shall be as follows:—

One-sixteenth of an acre and less, per annum, 8,000 gallons.

Exceeding one sixteenth of an acre, but not exceeding one-eighth of an acre, per annum, 12,000 gallons.

Exceeding one-eighth of an acre, but not exceeding one-quarter of an acre, per annum, 16,000 gallons.

Exceeding one-quarter of an acre, but not exceeding half an acre, per annum, 28,000 gallons.

Exceeding half an acre, but not exceeding one acre, per annum, 40,000 gallons per acre; for every additional acre, and proportionately, according to the foregoing scale, for every fractional part of an acre.

In livery and carriers' stables supplied by the Trust with water by measurement, the minimum quantity to be charged for shall be 2,000 gallons per stall used for stabling horses.

In open sheds used for the above purposes each space of five feet shall be charged for as a stall.

2. That each syphon-pump must have a meter affixed, and that Two shillings and sixpence per thousand gallons be charged for all water registered at such meter.

The before-mentioned rate is made for one year, commencing on the first day of January One thousand eight hundred and eighty-seven and ending on the thirty-first day of December One thousand eight hundred and eighty-seven, and shall be payable half-yearly in advance fourteen days after demand. Such persons as the Commissioners of the Borough of Horsham Waterworks Trust may from time to time appoint for that purpose shall be authorized to demand, receive, and collect and recover the said rate.

**LOWAN SHIRE WATERWORKS TRUST.—
REGULATIONS.**

THE Governor in Council has approved of the subjoined Regulations made in pursuance of *The Victorian Water Conservation Act 1884* (No. 829).

REGULATIONS.

THE Commissioners of the Lowan Shire Waterworks Trust District, portion of which district has been proclaimed an "Urban District," viz., the Town of Nhill, for the purposes of the Victorian Water Conservation Acts of 1883-4, do hereby, pursuant to and in exercise of the powers and authorities conferred by the Victorian Water Conservation Acts 1881-4, make the Regulations following:—

The following rates and charges are those which the owners and occupiers of lands and tenements shall pay in respect of water supplied by the Trust within the said urban district, otherwise than by measure, with water for domestic purposes, that is to say, that the following rates and charges which the owners and occupiers of lands and tenements shall pay in respect of water supplied by this Trust in the said Nhill Urban District, that is to say:—

I.—(1.) For every house or tenement used either wholly or partly as a domicile of Twenty pounds stg. annual value or under, the sum of One pound five shillings per annum.

(2.) For every house or tenement used either wholly or partly as a domicile of more than Twenty pounds annual value, an amount equal to One shilling and threepence stg. in the pound on the amount of the municipal valuation.

(3.) For every water-trough not exceeding 12 feet in length supplied with water by the Trust, the sum of Two pounds ten shillings per annum; and for every additional 5 feet or fractional part thereof in length of such trough, a further sum of Twenty-five shillings per annum.

(4.) Every trough situated in a paddock shall be supplied through a meter affixed by the consumer according to the directions of the Trust, provided nevertheless that the minimum charge for the water supplied to such trough shall not be less than the charge made for troughs supplied under the preceding clause.

(5.) For every steam-boiler supplied with water from the works of the Trust, One pound per annum on each inch diameter of the cylinder.

II.—(1.) For water supplied by the Trust by measurement, Three shillings per 1,000 gallons (or at such price as may be specially agreed upon); and the minimum quantity of water to be charged for to all owners or occupiers of gardens and lawns or other lands where water is supplied by the Trust for the purpose of irrigation or ornamental purposes shall be as follows:—

One-sixteenth of an acre and less, per annum, 8,000 gallons.

Exceeding one-sixteenth of an acre but not exceeding one-eighth of an acre, per annum, 12,000 gallons.

Exceeding one-eighth of an acre but not exceeding one quarter of an acre, per annum, 16,000 gallons.

Exceeding one quarter of an acre but not exceeding half an acre, per annum, 28,000 gallons.

Exceeding half an acre but not exceeding one acre, per annum, 40,000 gallons.

And at the rate of 40,000 gallons per acre for every additional acre, and proportionately according to the foregoing scale for every fractional part of an acre.

In livery and carriers' stables supplied by the Trust with water by measurement, the minimum quantity to be charged for shall be 2,000 gallons per stall used for stabling horses. In open sheds used for above purposes, each space of 5 feet shall be charged for as a stall.

(2.) That each syphon-pump must have a meter affixed, and that Two shillings and sixpence be charged per thousand gallons for all water registered at such meter.

That the before-mentioned rate is made for one year, commencing on the first day of January 1887, and ending on the thirty-first day of December 1887, and shall be payable half-yearly in advance on the first of January and on the first of July 1887; such persons as the Commissioners of the Lowan Shire Waterworks Trust may from time to time approve of for that purpose shall be authorized to demand and receive and collect and recover the said rate.

(3.) Any person receiving water from the Trust who shall take and carry away such water from his premises, or who shall allow any person to carry away such water, or shall sell the same to any other person, shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding Five pounds.

(4.) Any person not having agreed to be supplied by the Trust who shall take or carry away from any drinking tap, trough, or public or private service-pipe any water shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding Five pounds.

(5.) The Trust may cause a meter or meters to be affixed in any case where they may consider it necessary; such meter or meters to be provided and fixed at the expense of the consumer, and the water supplied to be charged for by measurement at the aforesaid rate.

No meter shall be affixed unless the dial on same is capable of registering One million gallons.

(6.) No person shall lay any pipe to communicate with the pipes of the Trust without giving two days' notice of the day and hour when such pipe is intended to be made to communicate with the pipes of the Trust, nor shall make such communication except under the superintendence and according to the directions of a duly authorized officer of the Trust appointed for the purpose; and any person committing a breach of this regulation shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding Five pounds for every such breach.

(7.) The Trust may contract with any owner or occupier of any lands or tenements, who is entitled to be supplied with water from its works, or who is desirous of being supplied, for the provision and laying of a service-pipe from the pipes of the Trust to the boundary of such land or tenement abutting upon the street or road in which are pipes of the Trust.

(8.) No person supplied with water by the Trust shall wilfully or negligently allow the same to run to waste, and any person committing a breach of this regulation shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding Five pounds for such breach.

(9.) No person shall connect any service-pipe, or branch service-pipe with any steam-boiler for the purpose of feeding or supplying the same with water, without at first affixing a self-acting valve for preventing the pressure of the steam reversing or affecting the dial of the meter, under a penalty of Five pounds, and in the event of continuing the offence, to a penalty of Two pounds for each day after notice from the Trust.

(10.) Overflow-pipes to private baths will not be permitted.

(11.) No person shall affix any service-pipe to any pipe of the Trust, or alter, or repair, or in any manner interfere with any pipe of the Trust, or any service-pipe, cock, or fitting connected with the pipes of the Trust, until he shall have obtained from the Trust a license in that behalf to execute such works. And any unlicensed person affixing, altering, or repairing, or in any manner interfering with any such pipe, service-pipe, cock, or fitting aforesaid, shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding Five pounds.

(12.) Before any license shall be granted by the Trust, the person applying for the same shall satisfy the Trust that he is a competent plumber. The Trust shall have the power of cancelling such license at any time.

(13.) Any person, whether licensed or not, who shall offend by opening any ground, so as to uncover any pipe or pipes the property of the Trust, without giving two days' notice to the Trust of his intention so to do, or who shall in any way tamper with or alter any pipe the property of the Trust, without the permission of the Trust in writing being first obtained, or who shall wilfully or carelessly break, injure, or open any lock, cock, valve-pipe, work or engine, the property of the Trust, shall be liable for each such offence to a penalty not exceeding Five pounds.

(14.) If any person shall neglect to repair any service-pipe conveying water from the pipes of the Trust into the premises of such person, after having received notice from any officer of the Trust that such service-pipe requires repairing, the Trust may stop the water from flowing into such premises, either by cutting off the service-pipe or otherwise as the Trust may seem fit, unless the necessary repair shall have been effected. The service-pipes from the main being the property of the owners or occupiers of the tenements supplied by such service-pipes, the occupier, if any, and if none, the owner shall in every instance in which damage shall be caused by reason of such service-pipe being leaky, or otherwise out of repair or broken, be liable to a penalty not ex-

ceeding five pounds, and in the event of continuing the offence to a further penalty of two pounds for each day after notice of the offence from the Trust.

(15.) Before any licensed person shall break up any footpath for the purpose of laying on water from the main to any house or premises, he shall deposit with the Trust the sum of two pounds, and in case he shall not immediately after laying on the water as aforesaid make good and restore the said footpath to the satisfaction of the Trust, then the said sum of two pounds shall be absolutely forfeited to the Trust, which shall be at liberty to expend the same in making good and restoring the said footpath or otherwise as the Trust may seem best.

(16.) Any person watering any street or footpath by means of a hose, except under the direction of the officers of the Trust, shall be liable to a penalty of two pounds for each offence.

(17.) If any person supplied with water by the Trust does, or causes or permits to be done, anything in contravention of these regulations, or fails to pay his rates or any lawful charge imposed by the Trust when due, or fails to do anything which under any of these regulations ought to be done, or wilfully or negligently allows water to run to waste, the Trust may cut off the supply of water from the premises of such person, either by cutting the pipes by or through which water is supplied, or otherwise, and may cease to supply him with water so long as the cause of complaint remains, or is not remedied.

(18.) The water supplied in the waterworks district of the Trust shall be received and consumed under and in accordance with these regulations, and not otherwise, through pipes and meter, laid, placed, and being in accordance with the said regulations, and not otherwise.

2. Tenderers are requested to describe by their numbers, as below, the mail services for which they tender.

3. The amount of the tender must be stated AT RATE PER ANNUM in words as well as figures.

4. Every tender must bear the *bona fide* signature and address of the tenderer, and bear the names of two responsible persons willing to become bound for the fulfilment of the contract in such sum as the Government may direct, not exceeding the gross amount of the contract.

5. Every tender must be accompanied by cash, marked cheque, bank draft, or a bank deposit-receipt to the credit of the Deputy-Postmaster General for a sum equal to TEN PER CENT. of the annual amount named in the tender; this deposit to be absolutely forfeited to the Government in case the person whose tender may be accepted shall fail to complete the usual bond and contract to the satisfaction of the Government within ten days of being notified that the documents are ready for execution. TENDERS are hereby invited, and will be received until Noon on Tuesday the 19th day of April 1887, for the Conveyance of Post Office Mails, *viz.*, Letters, Packets, Parcels, and Newspapers, as undermentioned, FOR THREE YEARS, from the 1st July 1887 to 30th June 1890.

1. Tenders are required to be written on a form, printed copies of which may be had gratuitously on application at any post office in the colony, and are to be forwarded (if by post, PREPAID AND REGISTERED) for receipt at the General Post Office by the hour and date first above mentioned, addressed to the Honorable the Postmaster-General, with the words "Tender for Mail Service No. " endorsed on the cover, or placed in the tender-box at the General Post Office.

2. Tenderers are requested to describe by their numbers, as below, the mail services for which they tender.

3. The amount of the tender must be stated AT RATE PER ANNUM in words as well as figures.

4. Every tender must bear the *bona fide* signature and address of the tenderer, and bear the names of two responsible persons willing to become bound for the fulfilment of the contract in such sum as the Government may direct, not exceeding the gross amount of the contract.

5. Every tender must be accompanied by cash, marked cheque, bank draft, or a bank deposit-receipt to the credit of the Deputy Postmaster-General for a sum equal to TEN PER CENT. of the annual amount named in the tender; this deposit to be absolutely forfeited to the Government in case the person whose tender may be accepted shall fail to complete the usual bond and contract to the satisfaction of the Government within ten days of being notified that the documents are ready for execution. The notice of acceptance, if delivered at the address named in the tender, shall be deemed sufficient.

6. The money or other security deposited by successful tenderers will be returned to them upon application, on the bond and contract being duly signed.

7. The money or other security deposited by unsuccessful tenderers will be returned to them upon application, and on their signing receipts for the respective amounts.

8. In the event of a new line of railway, or a new railway station on an existing line being opened for traffic, and it being decided that the mails shall be conveyed by rail, the Postmaster-General shall have the power of cancelling the contract for any mail service running in the vicinity of the railway without compensation to the contractor, or shall have power to alter the points of arrival and departure of the mails; and in the event of the travelling distance on any mail line being in such manner increased or diminished, all payments for the service subsequent to the alteration shall be computed on the basis of the average mileage-rate of the contract.

9. In the event of it being found necessary, from any cause, to absolutely cancel a contract, the Postmaster-General shall have full power to do so, provided that, unless the contract be cancelled on account of any fault on the part of the contractor, or on account of the opening of a railway line or a new railway station, payment shall be made to the contractor as compensation of a sum equal to ten per cent. of the moneys which would have become due on the unexpired period of the contract if the latter had been continued for the full term of three years.

10. Tenderers are requested to state the mode by which they propose to convey mails, whether by vehicle, on horseback, or by man on foot. If by vehicle, the description of vehicle and number of horses by which it is to be drawn to be given.

11. Tenderers are informed that from the 1st of July this year the Department will, in addition to the carriage of English and Indian parcels as at present, institute a Victorian parcel post system, and undertake to carry parcels up to 7 lbs. in weight by all services for which tenders may be accepted for conveyance of mails by vehicle.

Packets up to 3 lbs. in weight will be conveyed by horseback services as at present.

12. Tenderers for services to and from Post Offices and Railway Stations are required to name a lump sum per annum for the number of trips specified in the call for tenders, and also state a rate per trip as a basis of payment for additional trips, or for reduction in the payment, should the number of trips be increased or lessened during the currency of the contract.

A "trip" to mean a journey from the Post Office to the Railway Station, and from the Railway Station to the Post Office, *carrying mails each way.*

The carriage of mails one way, *viz.*, either from a Post Office to a Railway Station, or from a Railway Station to a Post Office, shall be regarded as half a trip, and payment made accordingly. Where tenders are invited for a service to and from a Post Office and Railway Station "as often as required," tenderers are required to name a lump sum per annum for the work, and such sum shall not be liable to alteration either through increase or diminution in the number of trips. Contracts for services to and from Post Offices and Railway Stations are liable to be discontinued at one month's notice from the department.

13. A separate *bona fide* tender must be sent in for each service.

14. The attention of tenderers is drawn to the condition which requires that, in cases where vehicles are used, Members of Parliament shall be conveyed free of charge between the districts they represent and the districts in which they reside and Melbourne.

15. The contractor shall not be entitled to claim any extra payment on account of the removal of any post office during the term of his contract, unless such removal shall increase the distance to be travelled by such contractor on any one day to the extent of one mile.

16. The general conditions referred to in the printed form of tender, and upon which the tender is to be made, can be inspected by persons proposing to tender, either at the General Post Office or at any post office in the colony.

Public Health Amendment Statute 1883.

SHIRE OF MOUNT FRANKLIN.

BYE-LAW No. 2.—AS TO DAIRIES, DAIRY CATTLE, AND MILK.

THE Local Board of Health in and for the Shire of Mount Franklin, in the colony of Victoria, being the Municipal Council thereof, by virtue of the powers contained in "The Public Health Amendment Statute 1883," and every other power enabling the said local board in this behalf, and for the purpose of carrying the said Act into execution within the jurisdiction of the said local board, doth hereby make the following bye-law, being Bye-law 2 of the said Local Board of Health, that is to say:—

1. All former bye-laws on the matters and things hereinafter provided for are hereby repealed.

2. This bye-law shall come into full force and operation on its confirmation by the Central Board of Health, and immediately after its publication in the *Government Gazette*.

3. This bye-law shall apply to and have operation in the said Shire of Mount Franklin.

Registration of Cowkeepers, Dairy-men, and Purveyors of Milk.

4. Every person carrying on the trade of a cowkeeper, dairyman, or purveyor of milk shall, on or before the first day of May in every year, register himself with the Local Board of Health in manner following, that is to say, by signing and forwarding to the secretary of the Local Board of Health an application in the form hereunder written, and every such person shall with every such application pay a fee of One shilling.

5. Upon receipt of every such application and fee, the secretary for the Local Board of Health shall indorse the same with a memorandum of the date on which it is received, and of the payment of the fee, and shall file the same, and shall enter the particulars in the schedule of such application in a book to be kept for that purpose, and cause the same to be properly indexed.

6. All paddocks, grounds, lands, and enclosures used as grazing ground for dairy cattle shall, whenever necessary, be inspected by any member or officer of the said local board, or by any person authorized in writing by the chairman or secretary of the said local board; and if, on inspection, such paddocks, grounds, or enclosures, or any one of them, are, or is likely, in the opinion of the officer or person so inspecting to be prejudicial to health, by affecting the milk or otherwise, the said local board may, by an order in writing signed by the secretary, and served personally or left at the dwelling-house of the registered person, or, in the case of an unregistered person, served personally, or left at his dwelling-place, or posted upon the land, prohibit the use of the same for the purpose of feeding dairy cattle, either absolutely or for any time named in such order. All cattle in dairies shall also be similarly inspected by a veterinary surgeon or other competent person, and any cows found to be diseased, or from poverty or weakness, are, in the opinion of the inspector, likely to be unfit for use for dairy purposes, shall be forthwith removed from such dairy if ordered by such inspector or other officer as aforesaid. And any such order as aforesaid the said local board may revoke, but upon every fresh inspection a similar order may from time to time be made.

7. All houses, dairies, cowsheds, milk stores, milk shops, or other buildings or structures in the occupation of any person following the trade of cowkeeper or dairyman, whether registered or not, shall be kept in such a state in respect of cleanliness as not to be a nuisance or injurious to health, and shall be thoroughly and effectively lighted and ventilated; and the drainage of all such buildings shall be so arranged that no stagnant water or refuse matter of any kind shall remain or lie in any way whatever in or upon or contiguous to any premises of such person following the trade of a cowkeeper or dairyman, whether registered or not.

8. All yards, sheds, or other places used for keeping or holding dairy cows shall be regularly swept, and be kept perfectly clean, and shall, within twenty-four hours of any order to such effect from the health officer or inspector of nuisances, be fumigated, disinfected, or lime-washed, as may be in any such order so directed.

9. All vessels used for containing milk shall be thoroughly scalded and scoured daily.

10. If any person, or any member of the family of any person registered as aforesaid, or not so registered, but employed as a cowkeeper, dairyman, or purveyor of milk, or any visitor or member of the family of any visitor to any such person, shall be attacked by typhoid fever or any dangerous infectious disease, the occupier of the house in which such person shall be, or (if he be the person attacked) his wife or other person in charge, shall immediately give notice thereof to the local board or officer of health, or to the nearest member of the police force, who shall immediately inform the Local Board of Health, and thereupon it shall and may be lawful for the said local board or the officer of health, by order served as aforesaid, to prohibit absolutely the sale and vending and forwarding of milk for sale from any premises in the use and occupation of any such cowkeeper, dairyman, or purveyor of milk, until danger, in the opinion of such local board or officer of health, no longer exists. And in any such case it shall not be lawful to allow any person so suffering, or having recently been in contact with a person so suffering, to milk cows or to handle vessels used for containing milk for sale, or in any way to take part or assist in the conduct of such trade or business. Nor, if the person registered or conducting such business be himself the person suffering, shall he take any part whatever in the conduct of such trade or business until, in either case, all danger therefrom of the communication of infection to the milk or of its contamination has ceased.

11. If at any time disease exists in the dairy or among the cows or cattle in any cowshed or dairy, or in the herds of any cowkeeper, dairyman, vendor or purveyor of milk, the registered person, owner, occupier, or other person in charge, as the case

may be, shall immediately give notice to the local board, officer of health, or nearest member of the police force; and the milk of a diseased cow shall not be used in any way whatsoever.

12. No cowkeeper, dairymen, or purveyor of milk shall keep, or permit or suffer to be kept, any pigs in the sheds, buildings, or milking-yards in which any dairy cows may be kept or sheltered.

13. In the interpretation of this bye-law words imputing the masculine gender shall be deemed and taken to include females, and the singular the plural, and the plural the singular, and the word "person" shall include a corporation.

14. Every person guilty of any breach of this bye-law, or of any of its provisions, shall be liable, in the discretion of the convicting justices, to a penalty not exceeding Ten pounds nor less than Five shillings, or in the like discretion to a penalty not exceeding Five pounds nor less than Five shillings, for each day during which such breach shall be committed or continued.

The foregoing bye-law was duly made, ordered, and passed by the Local Board of Health (being the Municipal Council) in and for the Shire of Mount Franklin this sixth day of December, in the year of our Lord One thousand eight hundred and eighty-six.
