THE Chairman and Commissioners of the Borough of Horsham Waterworks Trust, the waterworks district of which has been proclaimed an Urban District for the purposes of The Victorian Water Conservation Acts 1883-4, do hereby, pursuant to and in exercise of the powers and authorities conferred by The Victorian Water Conservation Acts 1883-4, repeal the Regulations numbered 1 and 2 of the Regulations made by the said Waterworks Trust dated the twenty-fifth day of March 1886 and approved by the Governor in Council on the twenty-ninth day of April 1886, and do hereby make the Regulations following in lieu thereof:—

The following are the rates and charges which the owners and occupiers of lands and tenements shall pay in respect of water supplied by the Trust within the said urban district, that is to

1. (1.) For every house or tenement used either wholly or partly as a domicile of twenty pounds annual value or under, the sum of One pound per annum.

(2.) For every house or tenement used either wholly or partly as a domicile of more than twenty pounds annual value, an amount equal to Five per cent. on the amount of the municipal valuation.

amount equal to Five per cent. on the amount of the municipal valuation.

(3.) For water supplied by the Trust by measurement, Two shillings and sixpence per thousand gallons; and the minimum quantity of water to be charged for to all owners or occupiers of troughs shall be 16,000 gallons for any trough not exceeding twelve feet in length, and 8,000 gallons for every additional five feet or fractional part thereof.

(4.) Every trough situated in a paddock shall be supplied through a meter affixed by the consumer according to the directions of the Trust, provided nevertheless that the minimum quantity of water to be charged for shall not be less than that charged for troughs supplied under the preceding clause.

(5.) For every steam boiler supplied with water from the works of the Trust by measurement the charge shall be Two shillings and sixpence per thousand gallons, and the minimum quantity to be charged for shall be 8,000 gallons for each inch of the diameter of the cylinder.

(6.) For water supplied by the Trust by measurement, Two shillings and sixpence per thousand gallons (or at such price as may be specially agreed upon), and the minimum quantity of water to be charged for to all owners or occupiers of gardens and lawns, or other lands where water is supplied by the Trust for the purpose of irrigation or for ornamental purposes, shall be as follows:—

Once-sixteenth of an acre and less, per annum, 8,000 gallons.

One-sixteenth of an acre and less, per annum, 8,000 gallons. Exceeding one sixteenth of an acre, but not exceeding one-eighth of an acre, per annum, 12,000 gallons. The Commissioners of the Lowan Shire Waterworks Trust District, portion of which district has been proclaimed an "Urban District," viz., the Town of Nhill, for the purposes of the Victorian Water Conservation Acts of 1883-4, do hereby, pursuant to and in exercise of the powers and authorities conferred by the Victorian Water Conservation Acts 1881-4, make the Regulations following.

The following rates and charges are those which the owners and occupiers of lands and tenements shall pay in respect of water supplied by the Trust within the said urban district, otherwise than by measure, with water for domestic purposes, that is to say, that the following rates and charges which the owners and occupiers of lands and tenements shall pay in respect of water supplied by this Trust in the said Nhill Urban District, that is to say:—

I.—(1.) For every house or tenement used either wholly or partly as a domicile of Twenty pounds stg. annual value or under, the sum of One pound five shillings per annum.

(2.) For every house or tenement used either wholly or partly as a domicile of more than Twenty pounds annual value, an amount equal to One shilling and threepence stg. in the pound on the amount of the municipal valuation.

(3.) For every water-trough not exceeding 12 feet in length supplied with water by the Trust, the sum of Two pounds ten shillings per annum; and for every additional 5 feet or fractional part thereof in length of such trough, a further sum of Twenty-five shillings per annum.

(4.) Every trough situated in a paddock shall be supplied through a meter affixed by the consumer according to the directions of the Trust, provided nevertheless that the minimum charge for the water supplied to such trough shall not be less than the charge made for troughs supplied under the preceding clause.

(5.) For every steam-boiler supplied with water from the

(5.) For every steam-boiler supplied with water from the works of the Trust, One pound per annum on each inch diameter of the cylinder.

I.—(1.) For water supplied by the Trust by measurement, Three shillings per 1,000 gallons (or at such price as may be specially agreed upon); and the minimum quantity of water to be charged for to all owners or occupiers of gardens and lawns or other lands where water is supplied by the Trust for the purpose of irrigation or ornamental purposes shall be as follows:—

One-sixteenth of an acre and less, per annum, 8,000 gallons.

One-sixteenth of an acre, per annum, 12,000 gallons.

Exceeding one-sixteenth of an acre but not exceeding one-eighth of an acre, per annum, 12,000 gallons.

Exceeding one-eighth of an acre but not exceeding one quarter of an acre, per annum, 16,000 gallons.

Exceeding one quarter of an acre but not exceeding half an acre, per annum, 28,000 gallons.

Exceeding half an acre but not exceeding one acre, per annum, 40,000 gallons.

And at the rate of 40,000 gallons per acre for every additional acre, and proportionately according to the foregoing scale for every fractional part of an acre.

In livery and carriers' stables supplied by the Trust with water by measurement, the minimum quantity to be charged for shall be 2,000 gallons per stall used for stabling horses. In open sheds used for above purposes, each space of 5 feet shall be charged for as a stall.

(3.) Any person receiving water from the Trust who shall take and carry away such water from his premises, or who shall allow any person to carry away such water, or shall sell the same to any other person, shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding Five pounds.

(4.) Any person not having agreed to be supplied by the Trust who shall take or carry away from any drinking tap, trough, or public or private service pipe any water shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding Five pounds:

(5.) The Trust may cause a meter or meters to be affixed in any case where they may consider it necessary; such meter or meters to be provided and fixed at the expense of the consumer, and the water supplied to be charged for by measurement at the aforesaid rate.

No meter shall be affixed unless the dial on same is capable of registering One million gallons.

(6.) No person shall lay any pipe to communicate with the pipes of the Trust without giving two days' notice of the day and hour when such pipe is intended to be made to communicate with the pipes of the Trust with the pipes of the Trust or shall make such communication except under the superintendence and according to the directions of a duly authorized officer of the Trust appointed for the purpose; and any person committing a breach of this regulation shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding Five pounds for e

(7.) The Trust may contract with any owner or occupier of any lands or tenements, who is entitled to be supplied with water from its works, or who is desirous of being supplied, for the provision and laying of a service-pipe from the pipes of the Trust to the boundary, of such land or tenement abutting upon the street or road in which are pipes of the Trust.

(8.) No person supplied with water by the Trust shall wilfully or negligently allow the same to run to waste, and any person committing a breach of this regulation shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding Five pounds for such breach.

(9.) No person shall connect any service-pipe, or branch service-pipe with any steam-boiler for the purpose of feeding or supplying the same with water, without at first affixing a self-acting valve for preventing the pressure of the steam reversing or affecting the dial of the meter, under a penalty of Five pounds, and in the event of continuing the offence, to a penalty of Two pounds for each day after notice from the Trust.

(10.) Overflow-pipes to private baths will not be permitted.

(10.) Overtow-pipes to private baths will not be permitted. (II.) No person shall affix any service-pipe to any pipe of the Trust, or alter, or repair, or in any manner interfere with any pipe of the Trust, or any service-pipe, cock, or fitting connected with the pipes of the Trust, until he shall have obtained from the Trust a license in that behalf to execute such works. And any unlicensed person affixing, altering, or repairing, or in any manner interfering with any such pipe, service-pipe, cock, or fitting aforesaid, shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding Five pounds.

(12.) Before any license shall be granted by the Trust the

(12.) Before any license shall be granted by the Trust, the person applying for the same shall satisfy the Trust that he is a competent plumber. The Trust shall have the power of cancelling such license at any time.

(13.) Any person, whether licensed or not, who shall offend (13.) Any person, whether licensed or not, who shall offend by opening any ground, so as to uncover any pipe or pipes the property of the Trust, without giving two days' notice to the Trust of his intention so to do, or who shall in any ways tamper with or alter any pipe the property of the Trust, without the permission of the Trust in writing being first obtained, or who shall wilfully or carelessly break, injure, or open any lock, cock, valve-pipe, work or engine, the property of the Trust, shall be liable for each such offence to a penalty not acceeding Eve pounds. not exceeding Five pounds.

not exceeding Five pounds.

(14.) If any person shall neglect to repair any service-pipe conveying water from the pipes of the Trust into the premises of such person, after having received notice from any officer of the Trust that such service-pipe requires repairing, the Trust may stop the water from flowing into such premises, either by cutting off the service-pipe or otherwise as the Trust may seen fit, unless the necessary repair shall have been effected. The service-pipes from the main being the property of the owners or occupiers of the tenements supplied by such service-pipes, the occupier, if any, and if, none, the owner shall in every instance in which damage shall be caused by reason of such service-pipe being leaky, or otherwise out of repair or broken, be liable to a penalty not exceeding Five pounds, and in the event of continuing the offence to a further penalty of Two pounds for each day after notice of the offence from the Trust.

(15.) Before any licensed person shall break up any foot-

after notice of the offence from the Trust.

(15.) Before any licensed person shall break up any footpath for the purpose of laying on water from the main to any house or premises, he shall deposit with the Trust the sum of Two pounds, and in case he shall not immediately after laying on the water as aforesaid make good and restore the said footpath to the satisfaction of the Trust, then the said sum of Two pounds shall be absolutely forfeited to the Trust, which shall be at liberty to expend the same in making good and restoring the said footpath or otherwise as the Trust may seem best

(16.) Any person watering any street or footpath by means of a hose, except under the direction of the officers of the Trust, shall be liable to a penalty of Two pounds for each

(17.) If any person supplied with water by the Trust does (17.) If any person supplied with water by the Trust does, or causes or pennits to be done, anything in contravention of these regulations, or fails to pay his rates or any lawful charge imposed by the Trust when due, or fails to do anything which under any of these regulations ought to be done, or wilfully or negligently allows water to run to waste, the Trust may cut off the supply of water from the premises of such person, either by cutting the pipes by or through which water is supplied, or otherwise, and may cease to supply him with water so long as the cause of complaint remains, or is not remedied.

(18.) The water supplied in the waterworks district of the Trust shall be received and consumed under and in accordance with these regulations, and not otherwise, through pipes and meter, laid, placed, and being in accordance with the said regulations, and not otherwise.

(19.) In the construction of these regulations, the word person shall extend to and be deemed to include a corporation, whether aggregate or sole, and the word Trust shall mean The Lowan Shire Waterworks Trust.

BYE-LAW No. 1.

Byr-LAW No. 1.

(Adopted by the Local Board of Health on the 8th day of Docember 1886.)

For keeping free from noisome matter yards, stables, and places used for noxious trades, slaughter-yards, c. and for regulating management of earth-closets, privies, c., disinfecting and deo dorizing night-soil and other affensive matter, and for regulating its removal and find deposit; and for the registration of conkerpers, dairymen, and purveyors of milk.

THE Local Board of Health in and for the Shire of Lexton,
in the Colony of Victoria, being the Municipal Council
thereof, by virtue of the powers contained in "The Public Health
Amendment Statute 1883," and every other power enabling the
said Local Board in this behalf, and for the purpose of carrying the said Act into execution within the jurisdiction of the said
local board, doth hereby make the following bye-law, being
Bye-law No. 1 of the said Local Board of Health, that is to
say:—

say:—

1. This bye-law shall come into full force and operation on its confirmation by the Central Board of Health, and immediately after its publication in the Government Gazette.

2. This bye-law shall apply to and have operation in the whole of the said Shire of Lexton.

Premises to be kept so as not to be a Nuisance, and Removal of

Premises to be kept so as not to be a Nuisance, and Remoral of Refuse.

3. The occupier of every house and premises within the said shire shall cause the yard and ground belonging thereto, or occupied in connection therewith, to be kept so as not to be a nuisance or injurious to health, and shall cause all filth, rubbish, and refuse matter to be from time to time removed from such yard and ground. And if at any time the occupier of any premises shall neglect or fail to have such filth, rubbish, or refuse matter so removed as aforesaid, the local board may cause the same to be removed at the expense of such occupier.

4. The occupier of any land in the said shire on which there shall be crected any stable or pigsty shall cause such premises to be kept in such a state, in respect of cleanliness, as not to be a nuisance or injurious to health, and shall cause all soil, dung, or other manure produced or accumulated therein to

be from time to time removed from such premises as often as the quantity of the same so produced or accumulated shall amount to two cubic yards. And if at any time the occupier of such premises shall neglect or fail to have such dung, soil, or other manure removed therefrom as aforesaid, the same shall be removed by the said local board at the expense of such occupier.

5. The occupier of every house, building, or tenement within the said shire shall cause every cesspool already in existence, and until its abolition, to be emptied and cleansed from time to time as soon as any portion of the contents of such cesspool shall have so accumulated therein as to be within a distance of one foot from top of the sides, walls, or lining of such cesspool. Provided that the contents of any cesspool shall not be removed or discharged therefrom except between the hours of Eleven p.m. and Five a.m. And provided also that the contents of any cesspool shall not be removed or discharged therefrom until such contents shall have had mixed therewith carbolic acid or some other efficient deodorizer.

6. Every occupier and every person having the management and control of any premises shall, once at least in every week, empty and cleanse, or cause to be emptied and cleansed, every earth-closet, privy, and place in the nature of an earth-closet for the reception of night-soil on or belonging to such premises.

7. No person shall empty any earth-closet, privy, cesspool, or place for the reception of night-soil except by means of a cart, carriage, or means of conveyance, properly constructed and furnished with a sufficient covering so as to prevent the escape of the contents or any portion thereof, or of effluvia therefrom.

8. All night-soil, blood, offal, or other offensive matter or thing shall be removed to and deposited in such place or places only as may be appointed by the local board from time to time for the final reception of the same.

9. Every person placing or depositing, or causing or suffering to be placed or deposited or spread, or assisting in placing or depositing or spreading, on any land, whether by way of manure or otherwise, any night-soil, offal, blood, or other refuse matter removed from any earth-closet, privy, cesspool, or other place, shall, immediately on the deposit or spreadi

10. IN pursuance of the powers contained in "The Public Health Amendment Statute 1883," and of every other power enabling them in that behalf, the Local Board of Health for the Shire of Minhamite, being the Municipal Council thereof, for the purpose of carrying the said Act into execution within its jurisdiction, doth hereby make the bye-law following, that is to

say:—
1. Interpretation of terms—In the construction and for the purposes of this bye-law the following terms shall, if not inconsistent with the context or subject-matter, have the respective meanings

with the context or subject-matter, have the respective meanings hereby assigned to them—
"House" shall mean and include dwellings of any kind, schools, hotels, licensed public-houses, factories, work-rooms, common or other lodging-houses, or other buildings or premises.
"Cesypool" shall mean any receptacle for night-soil or for noxious or offensive matter below or above the ground.
"Street" shall mean and include any highway, and any public bridge, and any road, lane, footway, square, court, alley, or passage, whether a thoroughfare or not.

2. Every occupier or person having the management or control of any house or premises shall cause the same to be kept in such a state as not to be a nuisance or injurious to health.

3. Every occupier of a house or premises shall remove therefrom all dust, mud, ashes, rubbish, fifth, or such other refuse matter produced or accumulated thereon once every week, and in the case of default of such occupier the Local Board of Health may remove same.

4. Every occupier of a house or premises shall provide and keep thereon a box or some other covered receptacle for the temporary deposit of house refuse, which box or receptacle shall be of such dimensions as that the same may, with the contents thereof, when full, be readily and conveniently movable by one man, or so many such boxes or receptacles as may be necessary to contain all the house refuse produced or accumulated on such premises during one week; and shall cause all house refuse to be deposited as soon as conveniently may be in some such box or receptacles.

6. Nothing contained in the foregoing bye-law shall be taken to prevent the occupier of any premises from causing any dung, soil, or other refuse matter produced or accumulated on any premises to be at any time removed or to be used as manure on any garden or land contiguous to such premises as manure, so that the same be not so removed, kept, or used as to contravens any bye-law of the Local Board of Health, or so as to be a nuisance or injurious to health.

7. Every occupier and every person having the management or control of premises used for the purpose of any noxious or officusive trade, business, or manufactory whatsoever, shall cause all rubbish, filth, offal, soil, or other offensive matters, and all waste products of such manufacture from which effluvia may

arise, to be removed from such premises once at least in every twenty-four hours, and to be in the meantime kept so as not to be a nuisance or injurious to health, and so that no noxious or offensive effluvia arise therefrom; and if any such occupier or person shall neglect or fail to have removed any such offensive matter or waste products as aforesaid, the same may be removed by the Local Board of Health.

Every occupier, licensee, or person having the management or control of an abattoir, slaughter-house, or place where any cattle or other animals are killed, shall cause all the blood from the animals killed therein, as soon as conveniently may be, to be collected in a fit receptacle to be provided for that purpose, and be effectually deodorized by mixing therewith commercial sulphate of iron or chloride of lime in the proportion of 11b. to the gallon, or some other efficient deodorizer sufficient to effectually deodorize the same, and to be removed from the premises within twenty-four hours after such blood is shed.

  9. Every occupier of any premises on which may be any offal shall forthwith effectually deodorize the same, and remove the same from the premises within twenty-four hours.

  10. No person shall construct or cause to be constructed any privy except in the form of an earth-closet, which shall consist of a suitable privy building, the floor whereof is at no point less than three (3) inches above the surface of the adjoining ground; and every such building shall be constructed with proper openings or flues to provide sufficient means of ventilation, and shall be provided with a suitable pan or other movable receptacle for night-soil, the contents whereof does not exceed five (5) cubic feet, and with the necessary and requisite apparatus for the application of dry earth or some other deodorizing material to the contents thereof, and shall be constructed and placed so as to afford easy means of access for the purpose of removing the pan or receptacle and the contents thereof, and emptying and cleansing the same. Every privy attached to any school, hotel, licensed public house, factory, work-room, or common lodging-house, and every public privy, shall be flagged or paved with some non-absorbent material, laving a fall or inclination tow
- or other opening of at least half-an-inch to the toot.

Every occupier and every person having the management or control of any premises shall cause to be kept in every earth-closet belonging thereto a supply of dry powdered earth, ashes, charcoal, lime, or some other material efficient for deulorizing night-soil, and shall cause all night-soil which may be deposited in any pan or other receptacle in such earth-closet to be immediately, on the deposit thereof, covered with a quantity of such deedorizing material sufficient to thoroughly and effectually deodorize the contents of the pan or other receptacle.

- 12. Every occupier and every person having the management or control of any premises, once at least in every week, shall empty or cleanse, or cause to be emptied or cleansed, every cartheloset, privy, cesspool, or place for the deposit of night-soil on or belonging to such premises.

No person shall empty, cause or permit to be emptied, or assist in emptying, any earth-closet, privy, cesspool, or place for the deposit of night-soil, except by means of a cart, carriage, or means of conveyance properly constructed and furnished with a sufficient covering so as to prevent the escape of the contents or of any portion thereof, or of effluvia therefrom.

No person shall empty, assist in emptying, or cause or permit'to be emptied, any earth-closet, privy, cesspool, or place for the deposit of night-soil, except between the hours of ten and twelve o'clock at night, or until the contents thereof have been properly deodorized; and every person emptying, or causing to be emptied, any earth-closet, privy, cesspool, or place for the deposit of night-soil, shall cause the night-soil taken therefrom to be removed so soon as the same is emptied.

Every cesspool shall be furnished with a water-tight cover Devery occasion shall be intrinsed with a water-tight cover or roof, and every cesspool which shall be made or formed below the surface of the ground shall be constructed with water-tight walls or sides, which project on all sides at least six (6) inches above the surface of the ground.

No person shall empty, cause or permit to be emptied, or assist in emptying, any earth-closet, privy, cesspool, or place for the deposit of night-soil, offal, blood, or other refuse matter into any drain or sewer, or so that the contents thereof may find its way, or be likely to find its way, into any drain or sewer.

22. No person shall place, assist in placing, or cause or permit to be placed, in or so that the same may be likely to find its way into any water used or likely to be used by man for drinking or domestic purposes, or for manufacturing drinks for the use of man, or used or likely to be used in any dairy, any matter or thing likely to endanger the health of any persons using such water or drinks, or milk, or other produce of such dairy.

23. No person shall empty, cause or permit to be emptied, or assist in emptying, any cesspool or place for the deposit of offal, blood, or other refuse matter into any water supplied, used, or likely to be used by man for drinking or domestic purposes, or for manufacturing drinks for the use of man, or used or likely to be used in any dairy, or so that the contents or any portion of the contents thereof may find its way, or be likely to find its way, into any such water.

24. Every accumulation or deposit of offensive natter so situated as to find its way, or be likely to find its way, into any water used or likely to be used in any dairy, shall be deedorized and removed by the owner of the property upon which such accumulation or deposit is situated within one week of notice given by the local board or by one of its officers.

25. No person shall keep any animal of any kind so as to be a nuisance or injurious to health.

26. No person shall keep any animal in such a manner as to pollute any water used or likely to be used by man for drinking or domestic purposes, or for manufacturing drinks for the use of man, or used or likely to be used in any dairy, so as to endanger the health of any person using such water or drinks or milk or other produce of such dairy.

27. Every occupier or licensee or person having the management or control of a slaughter-house or a battoir shall cause the same to be supplied with a sufficient quantity of water for all purposes.

28. Every person erecting or causing to be erected any new buildings shall cause the foundations thereof, and the ground over which such building is to be placed, to be rendered dry, sound, and well drained, so that no water soakage or damp shall

sound, and well drained, so that no water soakage or damp shall lodge there.

29. Every owner of a building shall cause the same to be provided with proper and sufficient drains, so constructed as to prevent any nuisance arising therefrom, and to secure the health-fulness of the innates of such building; and every tenant of a building under a lease of which fourteen years or upwards is unexpired shall be deemed an owner within the meaning of this section.

30. Every person carrying on the trade of a cowkeeper, dairyman, or purveyor of milk shall, on or before the first day of March in every year, registor himself with the Local Board of Health in manner following, that is to say, by signing and forwarding to the secretary of the Local Board of Health an application in the form hereunder written, and every such person shall, with every such application, pay a fee of Ten shillings.

This bye-law, number one, and numbered by sections one to thirty-five, shall apply to and have operation in the whole of the place or places within the jurisdiction of the Local Board of Health for the Shire of Minhamite, and shall come into full force and operation on its confirmation by the Central Board of Health, and immediately after its publication in the Government Gastele.

The occupier of any land in the said shire on which there shall be creeted any stable, cow-yard, cattle-shed, or pig-sty shall cause such premises to be kept in such a state in respect of cleanliness as not to be a nuisance or injurious to health, and shall cause all soil, dung, or other manure produced or accumulated therein to be from time to time removed from such premises as often as the quantity of the same so produced or accumulated shall amount to one cubic yard; and if at any time the occupier of such premises shall neglect or fail to have such dung, soil, or other manure removed therefrom as aforesaid, the same shall be removed by the said local board at the expense of such occupier.

9. All nightsoil, blood, offal, or other offensive matter or thing shall be removed to and deposited in such place or places only as may be appointed by the local board from time to time for the final reception of the same.

10. Every person placing or depositing, or causing or suffering to be placed or deposited or spread, or assisting in placing or otherwise, any nightsoil, offal, blood, or other refuse matter removed

11. The occupier of any premises within the shire used for the purpose of any noxious or offensive trade, business, process, or manufacture whatever, or used for the purpose of slaughtering, whether it be an abattoir or otherwise, shall cause any rubbish, blood, offal, bones, water, liquid, soil, or other offensive matter produced or accumulated thereon to be removed therefrom twice at least in every week, and to be in the meantime kept so as not to be a nuisance or injurious to health, or to exhale any offensive effluvia; and if such occupier shall neglect or fail to have removed therefrom any offensive matter whatever, it may be removed by the said local board at the expense of such occupier.

12. Every closet-pan shall be constructed of galvanized iron, properly riveted and soldered, so as to be water-tight, and with handles thereto, and of a capacity not exceeding three cubic feet.

13. No closet-door or trap shall abut or open upon a street, lane, or right-of-way exceeding ten feet in width.

14. Every person who shall by any act or default be guilty of any breach of this bye-law shall be liable to a penalty of Ten pounds for every such breach, or of Five pounds for each day during which such breach shall be committed or continued, unless the justices before whom the penalty is sought to be recovered shall order any portion only of either of the said penalties—such portion not being less than Five shillings—to be paid. And any person committing any such breach as aforesaid shall be liable to the penalty, notwithstanding that the Local Board has or has not taken advantage of such powers.

If any person or any member of the family of any person registered as a foresaid or not so registered, but employed as a cowkeeper, dairyman, or purveyor of milk, or any visitor or member of the family of any visitor to any such person, shall be attacked by typhoid fever, or any dangerous infectious disease, the occupier of the house in which such person shall be, or (if he be the person attacked) his wife or other person in charge shall immediately give notice thereof to the local board or officer of health, or to the nearest member of police, who shall immediately inform the Local Board of Health; and thereupon it shall and may be lawful for the said local board or the officer of health, by order served as aforesaid, to prohibit absolutely the sale and vending and forwarding of milk for sale from any premises in the use and occupation of any such cowkeeper, dairyman, or purveyor of milk until danger, in the opinion of such local board or officer of health, no longer exists. And in any such case it shall not he lawful to allow any person so suffering, or having recently been in contact with a person so suffering, or having recently been in contact with a person so suffering, or having recently to take part or assist in the conduct of such trade or business. Nor, if the person registered or conducting such business be himself the person suffering, shall he take any part whatever in the conduct of such trade or business until, in either case, all danger therefrom of the communication of infection to the milk or of its contamination has ceased.

12. No cowkeeper, dairyman, or purveyor of milk shall keep, or permit or suffer to be kept, any pigs in the sheds, buildings, or milking-yards in which any dairy cows may be kept or sheltered.

14. Every person guilty of any breach of this bye-law, or of any of its provisions, shall be liable, in the discretion of the convicting justices, to a penalty not exceeding Ten pounds nor less than Five shillings for each day during which such breach shall be committed or continued.

For the purpose of those provisions of any Statute now or hereafter to be in force whereby any person may be authorized to destroy goats, land shall be deemed to be securely enclosed and fenced if the same be enclosed or fenced with a substantial three-railed fence of the usual height, and the openings in which (if any) shall at the time of treepass be secured or barred with gates or other fastenings of like closeness and strength with the fence; or if such land be enclosed or fenced with any fence and gates or fastenings of equivalent closeness and strength with such first-mentioned fence.

3. The council, from time to time, shall provide one secure enclosure for the keeping and custody of goats for the purpose of this subdivision, and forthwith when any such enclosure shall have been provided shall notify the same and the situation thereof in some newspaper generally circulating in the neighbourhood.

4. Every goat found at large in any street, road, or public place may by the proper officer of the council be forthwith seized and confined in such enclosure as aforesaid until dealt with as hereinafter provided.

5. Whenever a goat having on the neck a collar purporting to bear the name and address of a person resident within the municipal district registered as aforesaid shall be seized herenuder, the proper officer of the council shall forthwith cause notice of such address.

6. Subject to the provisions hereinafter in this bye-law con-

Subject to the provisions hereinafter in this bye-law contained, every goat so seized and confined as aforesaid which shall not have upon the neck a collar purporting to bear the name and address of some person registered as aforesaid, may by the proper officer of the council be destroyed at or after noon of the day following the day of such seizure; and every such goat which shall have on the neck such a collar as aforesaid, may by the said officer be destroyed at or after noon of the day following next but one the day of such seizure.

7. The owner of any goat which shall have been seized as aforesaid may apply ex parte to any justice that such goat be restored to such owner, and such goat shall, if a justice shall so order, and not otherwise, be, unless the same has been destroyed, restored to such owner accordingly; and such order of a justice, or any minute thereof under the hand of such justice, shall for all purposes of this subdivision, be conclusive evidence that the person so applying was the owner of such goat.

8. The owner, whether registered hereunder or not, of every goat found at large in any street, road, or public place shall, whether such goat re descriptions of the municipal district in which it shall not be lawful for the council, from time to time, to make regulations for appointing by limits to be set forth therein portions of the municipal district in which it shall not be lawful to keep any swine; and if any person shall keep any swine within any such prescribed limits, he shall forfeit for every day during which he shall so offend a sun not exceeding Five pounds.

10. Every person who shall empty any privy, or load, carry, move, or deposit any nightsoil, offal, or other offensive refuse or matter, save between such hours of the night, or shall deposit the same save at such places as respectively shall have been appointed by some regulation of the council in that behalf, or who shall use for any such purpose any cart or carriage not having a covering proper for preventing the escape of the contents of such cart or of the stench thereof, shall forfeit for every such offence a sum not exceeding Five pounds; and it shall be lawful for the council, from time to time, to make regulations for appointing such hours and places as aforesaid.

Every person who, without having such license as aforesaid in force, uses as a slaughter-house any place within the municipal district other than a slaughter-house which was in use at the time of the coming into operation of the Act numbered one hundred and eighty-four, and has so continued to be used ever since, shall for each such offence be liable to a penalty not exceeding Five pounds, and a like penalty for every day after conviction upon which he shall so offend.

13. Every place which at the time of the coming into operation of the last-mentioned Act was in use as a slaughter-house, and has so continued ever since, shall within three months after the coming into operation of this subdivision be registered by the owner or occupier thereof at the office of the council, and on application to the council for that purpose, and on payment of such sum, not exceeding Twenty shillings, as shall have been appointed by regulation on that behalf, they shall, from time to time, cause every such slaughter-house to be registered in a book to be kept for that purpose, and such registration shall be of effect for one year after the making




