REGULATIONS.—APPOINTMENT TO THE
CLERICAL DIVISION.

(Act No. 773, Section 41, Sub-sections II. and III.)

WHEREAS by *The Public Service Act 1883*, section 13, it is enacted that the Clerical Division shall include all officers appointed thereto after a competitive examination as therein-after provided, and all officers whether classified or not who were performing clerical duties at the time of the passing of the said Act: And whereas it is provided by section 14 of the said Act that the Clerical Division shall be divided into five classes; and that the First, Second, and Third Classes shall be called the Higher Classes, and that the Fourth and Fifth Classes shall be called the Lower Classes: And whereas it is provided by section 36 of the said Act that there shall be two separate examinations for employment in the Clerical Division—one for the Higher Classes and one for the Lower Classes—and that it shall not be compulsory for candidates for the Lower Classes to pass a higher standard of examination than will be necessary to ensure reasonable efficiency in the work assigned to such classes by the Public Service Board; but that no person shall be afterwards eligible for promotion to the Higher Classes unless he have passed the examination prescribed for admission to those classes, and be at the time of examination an officer of the Fourth Class; but that all unclassified persons who, at the time of the passing of the said Act, had held offices in any department of the Public Service for at least a period of ten years, and all officers employed at the passing of the said Act who had previously passed the examination for admission to the Civil Service under Act No. 160, shall not be required to pass any examination for promotion to the Higher Classes: And whereas by section 38 of the said Act it is enacted that the Public Service Board may, whenever it appears necessary, cause competitive examinations to be held by the examiners appointed as in the said Act provided; and that the names of all persons who have passed the required standard of examination shall be registered by the Public Service Board, in a book kept for that purpose, in the order of their merit, and that no appointments to the Clerical Division shall be made except from the persons whose names are so registered, and in the order of such registration, taking the names first registered, and following in regular sequence: And whereas by section 39 of the said Act it is provided that the Public Service Board shall publish, as part of the notice of any such examination, the number of persons to be selected for appointments thereat, and that the successful competitors shall be registered as thereinbefore provided, in the order of merit, up to but not beyond the published number if so many are found by the examination to be qualified for appointments in the Public Service: And whereas by section 41 of the said Act it is provided that the Public Service Board shall make Regulations which shall have full force and effect as soon as approved by the Governor in Council, and may, subject to such approval, from time to time repeal, alter, and amend same: For determining the nature or character and standard of examinations or tests, according to the requirements of the higher and lower classes of each department, which candidates for employment or promotion in the Clerical Division shall undergo, and for limiting by lot the number of candidates to be examined to a number not less than three times the number of persons to be appointed, and for the examination of such persons and the granting of certificates to them: And whereas the Public Service Board did make Regulations for such purposes, which Regulations were, on the 12th January 1885, approved by the Governor in Council: And whereas it is expedient to alter the aforesaid Regulations: Now we, the undersigned, being the Members constituting the Public Service Board, in pursuance of the said powers, do make and declare the following alteration of the said Regulations, and declare that the same shall commence and come into operation as soon as approved as aforesaid:—

That for Clause 3—

“(a) Telegraph Operator.—The production of a certificate of competency from the secretary or an inspector of the Post and Telegraph Department, or the manager or senior operator of any Telegraph Office in Victoria,”

the following be substituted:—

“Clause 3.

“(a) Telegraph Operator.—The production of a certificate of competency from the secretary or an inspector of the Post and Telegraph Department, or from any postmaster or senior operator duly authorized by the secretary for the Post and Telegraph Department to sign the same.”

NOTE.—In the present estimate of population, allowance has, for the first time, been made for the unrecorded departures of persons by sea which have occurred since the Census of 1881 was taken. Such departures, between the date of the Census and the end of 1886, are estimated to have amounted to 30,000, viz., 24,000 of males and 6,000 of females, and during the first quarter of 1887 to 1,865, viz., 1,407 of males and 398 of females. Had this allowance not been made, the population of Victoria at the end of March would have apparently amounted to 1,044,373, viz., 502,921 males and 481,453 females. It may be remarked that, in order to allow for unrecorded departures, the Government of New South Wales recently reduced the official estimate of population in that colony by 28,935.

A partial check upon the estimates of population in Victoria is afforded by means of returns obtained from the municipal authorities, who, at the time of making their valuations, ought to ascertain the number of persons living upon each property rated. This is not always done correctly, and, besides, in some municipalities the properties are not visited each year for the purpose of rating, in which cases estimates, more or less wide of the truth, are made by the municipal authorities. The aggregate population obtained by means of the municipal returns is thus not so accurate as it would be, were due care exercised in every municipality. The sum of the returns for 1886, with an allowance for the population of extra-municipal districts and for the increase to the end of March 1887, is 1,016,465, or 4,057 more than the total shown in the table. It should be mentioned that, when the Census of 1881 was taken, the population according to the municipal estimate was found to be several thousands above the number then returned, although not nearly so high as the apparent population brought on in the usual way throughout the ten years which had intervened between it and the previous Census, and which was found to exceed the truth by 67,000.

During the first quarter of 1887 the recorded arrivals from New South Wales exceeded the recorded departures thereof by 1,916. This is the first quarter for many years that the excess has not been in the opposite direction. All the arrivals and departures referred to are by sea, no attempt being made to take an account of the persons coming and going overland.

NOTICE is hereby given that a new channel, in which the depth does not exceed 12 feet at low-water springs, has opened out through the South Entrance to Moreton Bay. Vessels of light draught can use it by attending to the following directions:—

When coming from the southward pass to the eastward of the Bar, and approach it on its northern side, bringing the S.E. point of Moreton Island on with the N.W. end of Mount Cotton, bearing S.W. by S. $\frac{1}{2}$ S. before crossing the Bar. Keep these marks on, and when on the outer edge of the Bar, Amity Point will be on with a dip in the N.W. end of a distant range bearing S. by W. $\frac{3}{4}$ W. Then haul up and steer for the right shoulder of the high land at the back of Amity Point, until the breakers on the west side of the channel are passed, when a course may be shaped for the Rainbow or Rous Channel as formerly.

The channel should not be taken when there is an easterly swell on the coast, as vessels using it would be broadside on to the sea while crossing the Bar.

The births were 424 above the average of the month during the previous ten years, but only 225 above that average, if allowance be made for the increase of population.

The deaths registered in April numbered 699, viz., 396 of males and 303 of females; the births thus exceeded the deaths by 517, or 74 per cent. The deaths were fewer than those in March by 130, but exceeded the average of April during the previous ten years by 196. If, however, allowance be made for the increase of population, they will be found to have exceeded that average by only 70.

To every 1,000 of the population of the district the proportion of births registered was 3.27, and of deaths registered 1.88.

The highest temperature in the shade recorded at Melbourne Observatory during the month was 90.6° on the 2nd, and the lowest was 41.3° on the 30th. The mean temperature of the month (59.5°) was seven-tenths of a degree above the average. The greatest range of the thermometer in any one day (31.0°) took place on the 1st, viz., from a maximum of 87.9° to a minimum of 56.9°. The least range (4.7°) was on the 10th, viz., from a maximum of 66.8° to a minimum of 56.1°. The mean daily range was 17.0°. The highest atmospheric pressure recorded was 30.404 inches on the 25th, and the lowest was 29.529 inches on the 2nd. The mean atmospheric pressure (30.125 inches) was slightly above the average.

Rain fell on 13 days, the amount of rainfall being 4.84 inches. The average rainfall during April in the past ten years was 2.08 inches, or 2.76 inches below that of the month under notice.

Males contributed 57 per cent., and females 43 per cent., to the mortality of the month. Children under 5 years of age contributed 39 per cent. to that mortality, as against 41 per cent. in April 1886, 39 per cent. in April 1885, 40 per cent. in April 1884, 33 per cent. in April 1883, 41 per cent. in April 1882, 36 per cent. in April 1881, 40 per cent. in April 1880, 43 per cent. in April 1879, 38 per cent. in April 1878, and 40 per cent. in April 1877.

The deaths of persons of the age of 75 years or upwards numbered 31, viz.:—Those of a laborer (a patient in the Metropolitan Lunatic Asylum), aged 76, who died of disease of the brain; a baker, aged 76, of kidney disease; a carpenter, aged 76, of bronchitis; a laborer, aged 76, of cystitis; a retired policeman, aged 78, and a female, aged 79, of dysentery; a blacksmith, aged 78, and a female, aged 80, of cancer; a shepherd (an inmate of the Benevolent Asylum), aged 79, of nephritis; a gentleman and a plasterer, each aged 80, a male servant (an inmate of the Convent of the Little Sisters of the Poor) and a female, each aged 82, of heart disease;

a laborer (an inmate of the Immigrants' Home), aged 76, a male lodginghouse keeper and a female, each aged 77, a gentleman, aged 78, an iron merchant and a male teacher, each aged 79, 2 females, each aged 80, a male servant and a female, each aged 84, a gardener and a female, each aged 85, 2 females, each aged 86, a female, aged 87, a female, aged 90, a female, aged 93, and a blacksmith (an inmate of the Immigrants' Home), aged 97, of old age.

Thirty-three deaths were ascribed to external causes during the month, of which 26 were set down to accident, 2 to homicide, and 5 to suicide. The following are the particulars of the accidental deaths:—A tobacconist, aged 34, died of fracture of the skull, caused by falling in a fit; a carpenter, aged 64, of fracture of the skull, occasioned by falling in the street; a ship's cook, aged 30, was killed by falling down the hold of a ship; a laborer, aged 72, died of rupture of a blood-vessel and fracture of the skull, caused by falling down stairs whilst intoxicated; a carter, aged 25, of fracture of the spine, the result of a fall whilst loading a jinker; a grocer, aged 21, of pyæmia, consequent on fracture of the skull resulting from a fall; a laborer, aged 35, of fracture of the skull, caused by injuries received through coming into contact with a circular-saw; a photographer, aged 25, and a male, of occupation unknown, aged 60, were passed over by railway trains. A male child and a female child, aged 1 and 2 years respectively, died of scalds; a female child, aged 1 year and 10 months, of heat apoplexy; and a female, aged 65, of burns. A female school teacher, aged 20, and a grocer, aged 47, were accidentally poisoned, the former by a dose of some irritant poison, and the latter by a poisonous liquid used in combination with linseed oil for polishing furniture. A girl, aged 6, an Industrial School boy, aged 11, a tinsmith, aged 21, a male, of occupation unknown, aged 27, and a bookkeeper, aged 28, were accidentally drowned; a male, of occupation unknown, aged 30, and a sheriff's bailiff, aged 70, were found drowned; two male infants and a female infant died of umbilical hæmorrhage, and a female infant of injuries received during birth. The homicidal deaths were those of a male infant, whose skull was fractured at birth, and of a compositor, aged 46, who died of tetanus; a verdict of wilful murder being brought in in each case. Of those who committed suicide, a house-painter, aged 25, shot himself in the head; a tailor, aged 43, a female, aged 53, a laborer, aged 58, and a female, aged 68, drowned themselves. The first and last of these persons were set down as being temporarily insane.

One hundred and twenty-five deaths, or 18 per cent. of the whole, took place in public institutions, viz.:—53 in the Melbourne Hospital, 23 in the Alfred Hospital, 8 in the Homœopathic Hospital, 4 in the Children's Hospital, 3 in the Women's Hospital, 12 in the Immigrants' Home, 4 in the Benevolent Asylum, 6 in the Yarra Bend Lunatic Asylum, 5 in the Metropolitan Lunatic Asylum, 4 in the Austin Hospital, 1 in the Melbourne Gaol, 1 in the Pentridge Stockade, 1 in the Eye and Ear Hospital, and 1 in the Convent of the Little Sisters of the Poor.

The deaths of children under five years of age numbered 271, of which 157, or 58 per cent., were of males, and 114, or 42 per cent., were of females. Of those who died, 205 were under one year of age, 53 were between one and two, 6 were between two and three, 6 were between three and four, and 3 were between four and five.

The persons who died at a more advanced age than five years numbered 428. Of these, 239, or 56 per cent., were males, and 189, or 44 per cent., were females; 12 were between five and ten, 16 were between ten and fifteen, 21 were between fifteen and twenty, 42 were between twenty and twenty-five, 49 were between twenty-five and thirty, 29 were between thirty and thirty-five, 24 were between thirty-five and forty, 20 were between forty and forty-five, 32 were between forty-five and fifty, 43 were between fifty and fifty-five, 34 were between fifty-five and sixty, 31 were between sixty and sixty-five, 23 were between sixty-five and seventy, 21 were between seventy and seventy-five, 14 were between seventy-five and eighty, and 17 were upwards of eighty.

In April, as compared with the previous month, deaths from specific febrile or zymotic diseases decreased from 153 to 124, and those from local diseases from 353 to 277. Under the former head, deaths from typhoid fever fell from 59 to 57, and those from diarrhœal diseases from 78 to 48. Under the head of local diseases, deaths from brain and nervous complaints fell from 104 to 71, those from lung and chest affections from 65 to 59, and those from bowel and stomach complaints from 120 to 69. On the other hand, deaths from diseases of the urinary organs rose from 18 to 30. Nine deaths of child-bearing women occurred during the month, as against 6 in March. If these numbers be compared with the births during the same months, it follows that 1 death of a mother took place to every 135 children born alive in April, and 1 to every 231 such children in the previous month.

VICTORIAN RAILWAYS.

BYE-LAW NO. 53.

THE VICTORIAN RAILWAYS COMMISSIONERS, in pursuance of the powers conferred by *The Victorian Railways Commissioners Act 1888*, do hereby make the following Bye-law, and all previous Bye-laws conflicting therewith are hereby repealed:—

CHARGES ON GOODS ARE FIXED AS FOLLOWS:—

1. Gas Manufacturing Plant from Melbourne, Williamstown, Port Melbourne, or Geelong to Country Stations to be carried under Special "B" Class Rates and Conditions.
2. Sausages and Sausage Skins to be charged 2nd Class Rates.
3. Rejected Wheat to be charged 1s. per ton from Williamstown or Port Melbourne to Melbourne.
4. Store Sheep and Cattle to be carried from Sandhurst, Ballarat, and Geelong, *down the lines*, under the same Rates and Conditions as from Newmarket, as set forth in Bye-law 17, under the heading of "Store Sheep and Cattle."

REBATES ON GOODS FOR RIVERINA.

5. Goods forwarded to a destination north of or intersected by a line hereinafter described are entitled to the Rebates set forth in Bye-laws Nos. 28, 36, and 40. Line referred to:—From Jingellie on the Murray to Gerogery on the New South Wales line; thence to the south-east corner of Coree Station, the following stations forming the Southern boundary:—Table Top, Gerogery, Burgunderi, Burrumbuttock, Goombargama, Mahonga, Coreen, Wongamong, Narrow Plains, Barrigan-Momalong, and Booroobarilly; thence in a northerly direction to Burrabogie Blocks, to include in that line Coree, Moonbria, Steam Plains, Willurah, Warwillah, Wargam, and Nyanga Stations; thence in a westerly direction along the South boundary of the River Back Blocks to the intersection of the Murrumbidgee River at Balranald.

"THE IRRIGATION ACT 1886."

IN the matter of the petition of the President, Councillors, and Ratepayers of the shire of Echuca, in the colony of Victoria, praying for the constitution of a certain district as an Irrigation and Water Supply District within the meaning of *The Irrigation Act 1886*, and for the appointment and creation of a Trust in and for the same, such said district comprising lands situate within the parishes of Wanurp, Milloo, Pannooobamawm, Pannoomilloo, Warragamba, Diggorra, and Rochester West, in the county of Bendigo, and within the parishes of Echuca South, Rochester, Nanneela, and Bonn, in the county of Rodney, all in the colony of Victoria.

Pursuant to section 18 of the said Act, I hereby declare upon the said petition the matters following, viz.:—

1. That the scheme is for the irrigation of an area of one hundred and thirty thousand acres of land, situate on the eastern and western sides of the Campaspe River, in the shire of Echuca, and for the water supply of the township of Rochester for domestic and sanitary purposes, by means of a timber weir across the Campaspe, offtakes, regulators, main and distributory channels, conduit and service tank for township supply, drainage channels, bridges, crossings, and other minor works.

2. That the whole of the works shall be Trust works.
3. That the amount of money which it is proposed that the Board of Land and Works shall advance, by way of loan, to the Trust for the purposes of the works thereof as hereinbefore mentioned, is Fifty thousand pounds sterling (£50,000).
4. That the rate of interest to be paid by the Trust upon such loan shall be Four pounds ten shillings per centum per annum.
5. That the source of supply will be the River Campaspe, and that the quantities of water which the Trust is to take therefrom in each year shall be from the first day of July to the thirtieth day of November, both days inclusive, eight thousand cubic feet per minute; and from the first day of December to the thirtieth day of June following, both days inclusive, five hundred cubic feet per minute, subject to such limitations and conditions as the Governor in Council may by order direct.
6. The powers of rating to be given to the Trust shall not exceed twelve and a half per centum on the annual value of the property rated.

CASTLEMAINE AND SANDHURST WATER SUPPLY DISTRICT.—RULES AND REGULATIONS.

THE Governor in Council, in pursuance of and in exercise of the powers and authorities conferred by *The Waterworks Act 1845*, has made the following Rules, Regulations, and Orders respecting the Castlemaine and Sandhurst District Water Supply, the same being a work constructed under the authority of the said Act, viz. :—

1. The district which shall be rated for the Castlemaine and Sandhurst District Water Supply shall be the whole of the Borough of Castlemaine, the whole of the Borough of Chewton, the whole of the United Shire of Mount Alexander, the whole of the United Shire of Metcalfe, the whole of the City of Sandhurst, the whole of the Borough of Eaglehawk, the whole of the Shire of Marong, the whole of the Shire of Huntly, the whole of the Shire of Strathfieldsaye, and the whole of the Shire of Maldon.

2. The following rates and charges are those which the owners and occupiers of lands and tenements shall pay in respect of water supplied by the board within the said district, that is to say :—

- (1.) On every house or tenement of £20 annual value and under, One pound per annum.
- (2.) On every house or tenement above the annual value of £20, a rate of Five pounds per centum on the amount of the valuation up to £300 inclusive, Three pounds per centum on the amount of the valuation in excess of £300 up to £700, and Two pounds five shillings per centum on the amount of the valuation in excess of £700.
- (3.) On every shop not used as a domicile above the annual value of £20, a rate of Four pounds per centum on the amount of the valuation up to £300 inclusive, Two pounds per centum on the amount of the valuation in excess of £300 up to £700, and One pound five shillings per centum on the amount of the valuation in excess of £700.
- (4.) The rates to be charged for water supplied from stand-pipes shall be One shilling per 100 gallons.
- (5.) The rate to be charged for water supplied by the board from the mains by measure shall be One shilling per 1,000 gallons, except in the cases hereinafter specially mentioned.
- (6.) For water supplied from the mains for mining purposes including sluicing, the rate shall be Fourpence per 1,000 gallons.
- (7.) For water supplied from the channels to crushing-mills, pyrites works, &c., the rate shall be Threepence per 1,000 gallons.
- (8.) For water supplied from the mains to gardens, nurseries, vineyards, or other lands cultivated for trade purposes, and to cricket grounds, the rate shall be Sixpence (6d.) per 1,000 gallons. For water supplied from the channels for like purposes, the rate shall be Twopence (2d.) per 1,000 gallons. All such supplies from the channels shall be continuous, or regularly intermittent, for periods of not less than one year; the minimum charge shall be for not less than 120,000 gallons per month; delivery shall be made of not less than 60,000 gallons at one time; and the water shall be delivered from the channels at such times and in such manner as may from time to time be directed by regulations to be made by the Minister of Water Supply.
- (9.) For water supplied to any cemetery, the rate shall be Fourpence per 1,000 gallons.
- (10.) For water supplied to any public parks or gardens, the rate shall be Sixpence per 1,000 gallons.

(11.) The rate to be charged for water supplied for sluicing purposes from the main aqueducts, and from any of the branch aqueducts which diverge therefrom, shall be One half-penny (½d.) per 1,000 gallons, provided that the minimum charge to any consumer shall be for not less than 1,000,000 gallons per month. Water supplied from the aqueducts for sluicing purposes shall be delivered at such times, and in such manner, as the Minister of Water Supply may from time to time direct.

(12.) For water supplied to any water trough, the rate shall be Twenty shillings (20s.) per annum.

3. The minimum quantity of water to be charged for in each case where water is supplied from the mains or pipes shall be :—

- (1.) If for domestic and other than domestic purposes, the quantity for which, the charge at 1s. per 1,000 gallons, would be equal to the amount of the assessed rate which would be payable for the premises so supplied, if supplied otherwise than by measure; and
- (2.) If for other than domestic purposes only, 25,000 gallons per quarter.

4. A supply of water for domestic purposes shall not include a supply of water to any livery or carrier's stables, or a supply for any manufacturing purposes, or for irrigation (which shall mean any mechanical or artificial contrivance for conveying water to the roots of plants without labor), or for water-power, or for fountains, or for any ornamental purposes. No hose or pipe is to be applied to any pipes or taps for the purpose of watering the ground or trees or plants, or washing the house walls or a carriage; or for any similar purpose, unless the water is charged for by meter. Syphon pumps will not be allowed unless the water is supplied by measure.

5. Any person receiving water from the board who shall take and carry away such water from his premises, or who shall allow any person to take or carry away such water, or shall sell the same to any other person, shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding Five pounds.

6. Any person not having agreed to be supplied by the board who shall take or carry away water from any drinking tap, trough, or private or public service-pipe shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding Five pounds.

7. Before any person shall affix any service-pipe to any pipe of the board, or alter, repair, or in any manner interfere with any pipe of the board, or any service-pipe, cock, or fitting connected with the pipes of the board, he shall obtain from the board a license in that behalf to execute such works; and any unlicensed person affixing, altering, repairing, or in any manner interfering with any such pipe, service-pipe, cock, or fitting as aforesaid shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding Ten pounds.

8. Before any such license shall be granted by the board, the person applying for same shall satisfy the board that he is a competent plumber.

9. Any person, whether licensed as aforesaid or not, who shall offend by opening any ground so as to uncover any pipe or pipes the property of the board, without giving two days' notice to the board of his intention so to do, or who shall in any way tamper with or alter any pipe the property of the board, without the permission in writing of the board being first obtained, or who shall wilfully or carelessly break, injure, or open any lock, cock, valve, pipe, work, or engine, the property of the board, shall be liable for each such offence to a penalty not exceeding Twenty pounds.

10. Any person, whether licensed as aforesaid or not, who shall lay any pipe to communicate with the pipes of the board or service-pipes therefrom, without giving two days' notice of the day and hour when such pipe is intended to be made to communicate with the pipes of the board, or who shall make such communication except under the superintendence and according to the directions of some officer of the board, or who shall lay any leaden or other pipe to communicate with the pipes of the board of a strength and material not sanctioned by the board, shall be liable for each such offence to a penalty not exceeding Five pounds; and in the event of continuing the offence, to a further penalty of Two pounds for each day after notice of the offence from the board. Wrought-iron piping, of approved quality, and lead piping of the following weights only, will be allowed to be fixed for either internal or external services.

No service of a larger bore than ½-inch will be permitted, unless by special consent of the board.

11. If any person shall neglect to repair any service-pipe conveying water from the pipes of the board into the premises of such person, after having received notice from any officer of the board that such service-pipe requires repairing, the board may stop the water from flowing into such premises, either by cutting off the service-pipe, or otherwise as to the said board may seem fit, until the necessary repairs shall have been effected. The service-pipes from the main being the property of the owners or occupiers of the tenements supplied by such service-pipes, the occupier (if any), and if none, the owner, shall in every instance in which any damage shall be caused by reason of such service-pipe being leaky, or otherwise out of repair or broken, be liable to a penalty not exceeding Five pounds; and in the event of continuing the offence, to a further penalty of Two pounds for each day after notice of the offence from the board.

12. Any person supplied with water by the board, who shall wilfully or negligently allow the same to run to waste, shall be liable for each offence to a penalty not exceeding Five pounds;

and, in the event of continuing the offence, to a further penalty of Two pounds for each day after notice of the offence from the board.

13. If any meter should cease registering, and, during the time it is undergoing repairs, the board shall estimate and charge for the water consumed by taking an average of the quantity used during the previous quarter, or during the corresponding period of the preceding year.

14. Any person, whether licensed as aforesaid or not, connecting any service-pipe or branch service-pipe with any steam boiler for the purpose of feeding or supplying the same with water, without first affixing a self-acting valve for preventing the pressure of the steam reversing or affecting the dial of the meter, shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding Five pounds; and, in the event of continuing the offence, to a further penalty of Two pounds for each day after notice of the offence from the board.

15. No meter shall be affixed unless the dial of the same is capable of registering one million (1,000,000) gallons.

16. Overflow pipes to private baths will not be permitted.

17. Water-closets will not be allowed to be supplied direct from the main, but from a cistern only, so constructed that the water cannot flow continuously, and that not more than two gallons can escape at each flush.

18. If any person supplied with water by the board does or causes to be done anything in contravention of any of these regulations, or fails to pay his rates when due, or fails to do anything which under any of these regulations ought to be done, or wilfully or negligently allows water to run to waste, the board may cut off the supply of water from the premises of such person, either by cutting the pipes by or through which water is supplied or otherwise, and may cease to supply him with water so long as the cause of injury remains or is not remedied.

19. The streets shall not be watered from hydrants or fire-plugs by means of a hose, but the water is to be applied to the streets by carts or by manual labor, or by special stand-pipes of approved size and form.

20. The water supplied in the above-named district shall be received and consumed under and in accordance with these regulations, and not otherwise, through pipes and meters laid, placed, and being under and in accordance with the same regulations and not otherwise.

21. In the construction of these rules and regulations the word "person" shall be deemed to extend to and include a corporation whether aggregate or sole, and the word "board" shall mean the "Board of Land and Works."

22. The Rules, Regulations, and Orders affecting the Castle-maine and Sandhurst District Water Supply, made on the 16th July 1883, are hereby repealed.

SHIRE OF SEYMOUR WATERWORKS TRUST.

THE Governor in Council has approved of the subjoined Regulation, made by the Shire of Seymour Waterworks Trust under the provisions of section 20 of *The Victorian Water Conservation Act 1884*.

REGULATION No. 1.

THE Chairman and Commissioners of the Shire of Seymour Waterworks Trust do hereby make the regulation following for that portion of the Waterworks District which has been proclaimed an urban district.

The following charges are those which the owners and occupiers of lands and tenements shall pay in respect of water supplied by the Trust by measure within the urban district, that is to say:—

1. For every water trough supplied with water from the works of the Trust, the sum of Two pounds per annum.

2. For every steam boiler supplied with water from the works of the Trust, Ten pounds per annum.

3. For water supplied by measure (except in cases of special agreement) from the works of the Trust, Two shillings and sixpence for every One thousand gallons.

4. The minimum quantity of water to be charged for in each case when the water is supplied by measure shall be—

(1.) If for domestic and other than domestic purposes, the quantity for which the charge of Two shillings and sixpence per thousand gallons would be equal to the amount of the assessed rate which would be payable for the premises so supplied if supplied otherwise than by measure.

(2.) If for other than domestic purposes only, Thirty thousand gallons per half-year, excepting as follows:—

Gardens and lawns, $\frac{1}{2}$ acre and less, 8,000 galls. per annum.	12,000	"	"
" " " " " "	16,000	"	"

Livery and carriers' stables, for each stall or space of five feet 3,000 " "

Stand-pipes or hydrant, water for each load of 100 gallons or under ... One shilling.

And for each additional 100 gallons, or fraction of 100 gallons, after the first or any one load, to be paid for at the time of taking ... Sixpence.

(3.) All charges for water supplied by measure to be paid quarterly.

5. Every person who is supplied by the Trust with water by measure shall, at his own expense, provide a meter (which meter shall be submitted to and examined by the proper officer of the Trust, who, if he shall find the same correct and in proper working order, shall give his certificate to that effect), which when fixed shall be maintained and kept in proper working order by such person. The meter must be so placed as to be open for inspection and so as to be protected from injury, and with means of access thereto; the key of the meter shall be in the possession of the Trust. No meter shall be connected with more than one separate and distinct inlet-pipe leading from the service-pipe, unless otherwise permitted by order of the Trust.

6. All service-pipes with the necessary stop-cocks shall be supplied and fixed at the cost of the person or persons requiring the same, under the direction and supervision of such officer or servant as the Trust may appoint.

7. All delivery-cocks to be of high pressure, and of strong hard brass, and all exposed places to be open and shut by a movable key or handle.

8. Plumbers or other persons employed to lay on service-pipes and to fix meters, or to refix or relay the same, must satisfy the proper officer of the Trust that they are competent to perform the same in a workmanlike manner.

9. No meter shall be affixed unless the dial of the same is capable of registering one million (1,000,000) gallons.

10. The Trust may contract with any owner or occupier of premises or of any lands or tenements who is entitled to be supplied with water from the works of the Trust, or who is desirous of being so supplied, for the provision and laying on of a service-pipe from the pipes of the Trust to the boundaries of such land, premises, or tenements abutting on the street or road in which are the pipes of the Trust.

11. If any person shall waste water of the Trust by neglecting to repair any service-pipe conveying water from the pipes of the Trust into the premises of such person after receiving notice from any officer of the Trust that such service-pipe requires repairing, the Trust may stop the water from flowing into such premises, either by cutting off the service-pipe or otherwise as the Trust may seem fit, until the necessary repairs shall be effected.

12. No person supplied with water by the Trust shall wilfully or negligently allow the same to run to waste, and any person committing a breach of this regulation shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding Five pounds for every such breach.

13. No person shall connect any service-pipe or branch service-pipe with any steam boiler for the purpose of feeding or supplying the same with water, without first affixing a self-acting valve for preventing the pressure of the steam reversing or affecting the dial of the meter.

14. No pipes shall be affixed to the main pipe, nor to any service-pipe or apparatus connected therewith, nor shall any alteration be made in any existing pipes or apparatus without notice in writing of the intention so to do being given to the Trust, and the consent of the Trust thereto first had and obtained.

15. Overflow-pipes to private baths will not be permitted, the inlet-pipe to which must be visible and accessible, and attached to the bath above the bottom thereof, and the bath provided with a proper well-fitted and watertight ground outlet plug or cock.

16. All water-troughs must be fitted with approved self-acting taps to prevent overflow.

17. Water closets will not be allowed to be supplied direct from the main, but from a cistern only, so constructed that water cannot flow continuously, and not more than two gallons can escape at each flush.

18. Any person receiving water from the Trust who shall take and carry away such water from his premises, or who shall allow any person to take or carry away such water, or shall sell the same to any other person, shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding Five pounds.

19. Any person not having agreed to be supplied by the Trust, who shall take or carry away water from any drinking tap, trough, private or public service-pipe, shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding Five pounds.

20. No person shall lay any pipe to communicate with the pipes of the Trust without giving two days' notice of the day and hour when such pipe is intended to be made to communicate, except under the superintendence and according to the directions of a duly authorized officer of the Trust appointed for the purpose; and any person committing a breach of this regulation shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding Five pounds for every such breach.

21. The service-pipe for conveying water from the pipes of the Trust into the premises of the customers shall have a stop-cock at the main, and shall in no case exceed the following diameter:—For the domestic supply of premises not exceeding Twenty pounds annual value, $\frac{3}{4}$ -inch diameter; for the domestic supply of premises exceeding Twenty pounds annual value, $\frac{1}{2}$ -inch diameter; for the supply of water for other than domestic purposes and for all supplies by meter, such diameter as the Trust shall authorize in each case.

22. The water supplied in the urban district of the Trust shall be received and used under and in accordance with these regulations, and the Victorian Water Conservation Acts 1881-1883, and such parts of *The Public Works Statute 1865* as are incorporated therewith.

23. If any person whether supplied with water by the Trust or otherwise shall commit a breach of these regulations, such person shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding Five pounds for each such offence, and any such person, if supplied with water by the Trust, shall be liable to have the water cut off from his premises, either by cutting the pipes by or through which such water is supplied or otherwise as the Trust may

think fit, and such supply shall cease so long as the cause of complaint remains or is not remedied.

24. In the foregoing regulations, wherever the word "officer" or "servant" appears, the same shall be deemed to be taken and mean an officer or servant of the Trust duly authorized in that behalf.

The foregoing regulation, numbered (1) one, was made by the Commissioners of the Shire of Seymour Waterworks Trust, under and by virtue of section 44 of *The Victorian Water Conservation Act 1881*, this fifteenth day of November One thousand eight hundred and eighty-six.

The Victorian Water Conservation Acts 1881-85.

WIMMERA UNITED WATERWORKS TRUST.

THE Commissioners of the Wimmera United Waterworks Trust, in pursuance of the powers conferred by section 20 of *The Victorian Water Conservation Act 1884*, do make the following Regulation:—

No. 9.—REGULATION FOR DETERMINING RATES

To be paid for Supply of Water for other than domestic use, for preventing Waste of Water, and for other purposes in connection with water supply in urban districts situated within the Wimmera United Waterworks District.

1. A supply of water for domestic purposes shall not include a supply of water to any livery or carriers' stables, or troughs, or a supply for steam boilers or for any manufacturing purpose, or for irrigation (which shall mean any mechanical or artificial contrivance for conveying water to the roots of plants without labor), or for water power, or for fountains, or for any ornamental purpose. No hose or pipe is to be applied to any pipes or taps for the purpose of watering the ground, or trees, or plants, or washing the house walls or carriage, or for any similar purpose, unless the water is charged by meter. Syphon pumps will not be allowed unless the water is supplied by measure.

2. The charges for water supplied by measure, except in cases of special agreement with the Trust, shall be at the rate of Two shillings per thousand gallons; and the minimum quantity of water to be charged for to all owners or occupiers of gardens and lawns or other lands where water is supplied by the Trust for the purpose of irrigation or for ornamental purposes shall be as follows:—

- (a.) One-sixteenth of an acre and less, per annum, 8,000 gallons.
- (b.) Exceeding one-sixteenth of an acre but not exceeding one-eighth of an acre, per annum, 12,000 gallons.
- (c.) Exceeding one-eighth of an acre but not exceeding one quarter of an acre, per annum, 16,000 gallons.
- (d.) Exceeding one quarter of an acre but not exceeding half an acre, per annum, 28,000 gallons.
- (e.) Exceeding half an acre but not exceeding one acre, per annum, 40,000 gallons.
- (f.) And at the rate of 40,000 gallons per acre for every additional acre, and proportionately according to the foregoing scale for every fractional part of an acre.
- (g.) In livery and carriers' stables supplied by the Trust with water by measurement, the minimum quantity to be charged for shall be 2,000 gallons per stall used for stabling horses. In open sheds used for the above purposes, each space of 5 feet shall be charged for as a stall.

3. The minimum quantity of water to be charged for in each case, except in the cases of special agreement with the Trust where water is supplied by measure, shall be the quantity for which the charge at Two shillings per thousand gallons would be equal to the amount of the assessed water-rate if water was supplied otherwise than by measure.

4. The charges for water supplied under special agreement or by meter or measure shall be paid monthly, or as may be agreed upon.

5. Any person receiving water from the Trust who shall take and carry away such water from his premises, or who shall allow any person to take or carry away such water, or shall sell the same to any other person, shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding Five pounds.

6. Any person not having agreed to be supplied by the Trust, and who shall not be rated or liable to be rated for water in respect of property situated in any urban district, who shall take or carry away water from any private or public service-pipe shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding Five pounds.

7. The commissioners may, if they see fit, allow persons not residing within any urban district to have water from any public service-pipe in such urban district at the rate of One shilling and sixpence for each tank of four hundred gallons or for any less quantity.

8. The Trust may cause a meter or meters to be affixed in any case where they may consider it necessary; such meter or meters to be provided and fixed at the expense of the consumer, and the water supplied to be charged for by measurement at the aforesaid rate. No meter shall be affixed unless the dial on the same is capable of registering One million gallons.

9. No person shall lay any pipe to communicate with the pipes of the Trust without giving two days' notice of the day and hour when such pipe is intended to be made to communicate with the

pipes of the Trust, nor shall make any such communication except under the superintendence and according to the directions of a duly authorized officer of the Trust appointed for the purpose; and any person committing a breach of this regulation shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding Five pounds for every such breach.

10. The Trust may contract with any owner or occupier of any lands or tenements, who is entitled to be supplied with water from its works, or who is desirous of being supplied, for the provision and laying of a service-pipe from the pipes of the Trust to the boundary of such land or tenement abutting upon the street or road in which are pipes of the Trust.

11. No person supplied with water by the Trust shall wilfully or negligently allow the same to run to waste, and any person committing a breach of this regulation shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding Five pounds for such breach.

12. No person shall connect any service-pipe or branch service-pipe with any steam boiler for the purpose of feeding or supplying the same with water, without first affixing a self-acting valve for preventing the pressure of the steam reversing or affecting the dial of the meter, under a penalty of Five pounds, and, in the event of continuing the offence, to a penalty of Two pounds for each day after notice from the Trust.

13. Overflow-pipes to private baths will not be permitted.

14. No person shall affix any service-pipe to any pipe of the Trust, or alter, or repair, or in any manner interfere with any pipe of the Trust, or any service-pipe, cock, or fitting connected with the pipes of the Trust, until he shall have obtained from the Trust a license in that behalf to execute such works. And any unlicensed person affixing, altering, or repairing, or in any manner interfering with any such pipe, service-pipe, cock, or fitting aforesaid, shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding Ten pounds.

15. Before any such license shall be granted by the Trust, the person applying for the same shall satisfy the Trust that he is a competent plumber. The Trust shall have the power of cancelling such license at any time.

16. Any person, whether licensed or not, who shall offend by opening any ground, so as to uncover any pipe or pipes the property of the Trust, without giving two days' notice to the Trust of his intention so to do, or who shall in any way tamper with or alter any pipe the property of the Trust, without the permission of the Trust, in writing, being first obtained, or who shall wilfully or carelessly break, injure, or open any lock, cock, valve, pipe, work, or engine, the property of the Trust, shall be liable for each such offence to a penalty not exceeding Twenty pounds.

17. If any person shall neglect to repair any service-pipe conveying water from the pipes of the Trust into the premises of such person, after having received notice from any officer of the Trust that such service-pipe requires repairing, the Trust may stop the water from flowing into such premises, either by cutting off the service-pipe or otherwise as to the Trust may seem fit, unless the necessary repair shall have been effected. The service-pipes from the main being the property of the owners or occupiers of the tenements supplied by such service-pipes, the occupier, if any, and if none, the owner, shall, in every instance in which any damage shall be caused by reason of such service-pipe being leaky, or otherwise out of repair or broken, be liable to a penalty not exceeding Five pounds, and in the event of continuing the offence to a further penalty of Two pounds for each day after notice of the offence from the Trust.

18. Before any licensed person shall break up any footpath for the purpose of laying on water from the main to any house or premises, he shall deposit with the Trust the sum of Two pounds, and in case he shall not, immediately after laying on the water as aforesaid, make good and restore the said footpath to the satisfaction of the Trust, then the said sum of Two pounds shall be absolutely forfeited to the Trust, which shall be at liberty to expend the same in making good and restoring the said footpath or otherwise as to the Trust may seem best.

19. Any person watering any street or footpath by means of a hose, except under the direction of the officers of the Trust, shall be liable to a penalty of Two pounds for each offence.

20. If any person supplied with water by the Trust does, or causes or permits to be done, anything in contravention of these regulations, or fails to pay his rates or any lawful charge imposed by the Trust when due, or fails to do anything which under any of these regulations ought to be done, or wilfully or negligently allows water to run to waste, the Trust may cut off the supply of water from the premises of such person, either by cutting the pipes by or through which water is supplied, or otherwise, and may cease to supply him with water so long as the cause of complaint remains, or is not remedied.

21. The water supplied in the waterworks district of the Trust shall be received and consumed under and in accordance with these regulations, and not otherwise, through pipes and meter, laid, placed, and being in accordance with the said regulations, and not otherwise.

22. In the construction of these regulations the word "Trust" shall mean "The Wimmera United Waterworks Trust."

The foregoing Regulation, No. 9, was made by the Commissioners of the Wimmera United Waterworks Trust this nineteenth day of April 1887.

AVOCA WATER TRUST.—REGULATIONS.

THE Governor in Council has approved of the subjoined Regulations made by the Avoca Water Trust under the provisions of *The Water Conservation Acts 1881-1884*.

REGULATIONS.

THE Chairman and Commissioners of the Avoca Water Trust part of the Water Works district of which has been proclaimed an urban district for the purposes of *The Victorian Water Conservation Acts 1883 and 1884*, do hereby, pursuant to and in exercise of the powers and authorities conferred by *The Victorian Water Conservation Acts 1881 and 1884*, make the Regulations following:—

No. 1. Water-troughs, and persons plying for hire with horse and dray, shall be supplied with water by measure only, provided that the minimum quantity of water to be charged for shall in each case be 6,000 gallons per year.

No. 2. The valuation of lands and tenements for the purpose of water rates shall be the same as the valuation of such lands and tenements during the same or the previous year by the Council of the municipal district in which such lands or tenements are situated, or (if there be no such valuation) the valuation of such lands or tenements by a police magistrate; and that no such rate shall exceed the amount of Ten pounds per centum on such valuation. Provided that the charge for the supply of water aforesaid shall not in any case be less than the sum of Twenty shillings per annum.

No. 3. The rate or charge for water supplied by meter shall be Fourpence per 100 gallons.

No. 4. The Trust may cause a meter or meters to be affixed in any case where they may consider it necessary. Such meter or meters to be provided and fixed at the expense of the consumer, and the water supplied to be charged for by measurement at the aforesaid rate. No meter shall be affixed unless the dial on the same is capable of registering one million gallons. Except in the case of special agreements with the Trust, or in cases not otherwise specially provided for, the minimum quantity of water to be charged for in any case where water is supplied by measure shall be a quantity equal to that quantity which the amount of the assessed water-rates of the lands or tenements so supplied would purchase at Fourpence per (100) hundred gallons, had such rates been levied.

No. 5. If any meter should cease to register, or be reported by any officer of the Trust as out of repair or registering inaccurately, the Trust shall estimate and charge for the water consumed during the period such meter was not in working order, and until it is repaired and refixed either by taking an average of the quantity used during the previous quarter or during the corresponding period of the previous year, or they may insert a check-meter on the service-pipe.

No. 6. Overflow-pipes to any vessel will not be permitted.

No. 7. Any person receiving water from the Trust who shall take and carry away from his premises such water, or who shall allow any person to take or carry away such water, or shall sell the same to any other person, shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding Five pounds.

No. 8. Any person not having agreed to be supplied by the Trust who shall take or carry away from any tap, trough, or public or private service-pipe any water shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding Five pounds.

No. 9. No person shall lay any pipe to communicate with the pipes of the Trust without giving two days' notice of the day and hour when such pipe is intended to be made to communicate with the pipes of the Trust, nor shall make such communication except under the superintendence and according to the directions of a duly authorized officer of the Trust appointed for that purpose. And any person committing a breach of this regulation shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding Five pounds for every such breach.

No. 10. No person supplied with water by the Trust shall wilfully or negligently allow the same to run to waste, nor shall any person not supplied with water by measure at any time use water by hose. And any person committing a breach of this regulation shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding Five pounds, and also to have his supply of water cut off for a period not exceeding one month.

No. 11. Water is supplied by the Trust for domestic purposes only, unless by measure.

No. 12. No person shall connect any service-pipe or branch service-pipe with any steam-boiler for the purpose of feeding or supplying the same with water without affixing a self-acting valve for preventing the pressure of the steam reversing or affecting the dial of the meter under a penalty of Five pounds, and in the event of continuing the offence to a penalty of Two pounds for each day after notice from the Trust.

No. 13. No person shall affix any service-pipe to any pipe of the Trust, or alter or repair, or in any manner interfere with any of the Trust, or any service-pipe, cock, or fitting connected with the pipe of the Trust, until he shall have obtained from the Trust a license in that behalf to execute such work. And any unlicensed person affixing, altering, or repairing, or in any way interfering with any such pipe, service-pipe, cock, or fitting aforesaid shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding Ten pounds.

No. 14. Before any such license shall be granted by the Trust the person applying for the same shall satisfy the Trust that he is a competent plumber. The Trust shall have power of cancelling such license at any time.

No. 15. Any person, whether licensed or not, who shall offend by opening any ground so as to uncover any pipe or pipes the property of the Trust without giving two days' notice to the Trust of his intention so to do, or shall in any way tamper with or alter any pipe the property of the Trust without the permission of the Trust in writing being first obtained, or who shall wilfully or carelessly break, injure, or open any lock, cock, valve, pipe, work, or engine, the property of the Trust, shall be liable for each such offence to a penalty not exceeding Twenty pounds.

No. 16. If any person shall neglect to keep in proper repair any service-pipe conveying water from the pipes of the Trust into the premises of such person, the Trust may stop the water from flowing into such premises, either by cutting off the service-pipe or otherwise as to the Trust may seem fit, unless the necessary repair shall have been effected. The service-pipe from the main being the property of the owners or occupiers of the tenements supplied by such service-pipe, the occupier, if any, and if none, the owner shall in every instance in which any damage shall caused by reason of such service-pipe being leaky, or otherwise out of repair, or broken, be liable to a penalty not exceeding Five pounds. And, in the event of continuing the offence, to a further penalty of Two pounds for each day after notice of the offence from the Trust.

No. 17. In the construction of these bye-laws, the word person shall be deemed to extend to and include a Corporation whether aggregate or sole. And the word Trust shall mean the Avoca Water Trust.

THE Commissioners of the Maryborough Waterworks Trust, in pursuance of the powers conferred by section 44 of *The Victorian Water Conservation Act 1881*, do make the following Regulation:—

No. 3.

Regulation for making a Rate on all the Rateable Property in the Maryborough Waterworks District.

1st. A rate of One shilling in the pound sterling, except as hereinafter mentioned, on the annual value of all the rateable property in the Maryborough Waterworks District, according to the valuation for the time being of all lands and tenements comprised within the said waterworks district for the municipal rates of the Borough of Maryborough, is hereby made for the year commencing on the first day of January 1887 and ending on the thirty-first day of December 1887. Provided that, in pursuance of an Order of His Excellency the Governor in Council dated the twenty-ninth day of March 1887, and made by virtue of the powers conferred by section 95 of *The Victorian Water Conservation Act 1883*, the sum of One pound sterling shall be the minimum amount of rates to be paid annually by every owner of any house or tenement liable to be rated by the Maryborough Waterworks Trust when the valuation in respect to such house or tenement shall not exceed the sum of Twenty pounds sterling per annum.

2nd. Such rate to be paid in two equal instalments, the first of which instalments shall be due and payable on the first day of July 1887, and the second instalment shall be due and payable on the first day of January 1888.

3rd. Such person or persons as the Commissioners of the said Trust may from time to time appoint for that purpose shall be authorized to demand and collect the said rate.

4th. The foregoing Regulation, No. 3, was made by the Commissioners of the Maryborough Waterworks Trust under and by virtue of "sub-section 4" of section 44 of *The Victorian Water Conservation Act 1881* on the 22nd day of April 1887.

REGULATION.

THE Governor in Council has approved of the subjoined Regulation made by the Wimmera United Waterworks Trust, under the provisions of section 44 of *The Victorian Water Conservation Act 1881* :—

The Commissioners of the Wimmera United Waterworks District, in pursuance of the powers conferred by section 44 of "The Victorian Water Conservation Act 1881," do make the following Regulation :—

No. XI.

Regulation for the making of a rate for the year 1887 on all rateable property in that portion of the Wimmera United Waterworks District, of which notice has been given that the same has been supplied with water, under the provisions of *The Victorian Water Conservation Act 1881-1885*, and which notice was published in the *Government Gazette* of March 12th 1886, wherein the portion of the district so described as supplied with water is as follows, that is to say—the whole of the area of the Wimmera United Waterworks District, except in the parishes of Hindmarsh, Joop, Jeparit, Batyik, Tarranyurk, Willenabrina, Yellangip, Katyil, and Dimboola.

Whereas the Governor in Council has, by an order made the thirteenth day of April 1886, under the provisions of section 93 of *The Victorian Water Conservation Act 1883*, divided the Wimmera United Waterworks District into divisions, and directed that the necessary rates for paying interest on all moneys borrowed by the Wimmera United Waterworks Trust for the construction and maintenance of their waterworks, or to meet any other expenses in connection therewith, shall be levied in the following only of such divisions, viz.:—The Shire of St. Arnaud division, the Shire of Kara Kara division, the Shire of Dummunkle division, the Shire of Stawell division, the Shire of Wimmera division, and the Shire of Dimboola A division; and has further directed that such rates be levied differentially as between such said several divisions, and that the proportion in which such several divisions shall be rated respectively one to another shall be as follows, that is to say, that the respective ratings in the pound sterling on the annual value of rateable property rated for municipal purposes in the said several divisions shall be—Shire of St. Arnaud division, Seven pence; Shire of Kara Kara division, Fifteen pence; Shire of Dummunkle division, Fourteen pence; Shire of Stawell division, Nine pence; Shire of Wimmera division, Thirteen pence; Shire of Dimboola A division, Twenty-four pence.

And whereas the Governor of the colony of Victoria, by Proclamation dated 28th June 1886, proclaimed certain areas in and around the townships of Murtoa and Warracknabeal to be respectively Urban Districts under the provisions of *The Victorian Water Conservation Act 1883*, No. 778.

And whereas the Governor in Council by an Order dated the 13th day of December 1886, diminished the extent of the said Wimmera United Waterworks District by excising therefrom the territory described above as the Shire of Wimmera division.

The following rate is made on the annual value of all the rateable property in the said several divisions of the Wimmera United Waterworks District, excepting in the said parishes of Hindmarsh, Joop, Jeparit, Batyik, Tarranyurk, Willenabrina, Yellangip, Katyil, and Dimboola, and in the said Urban Districts of Murtoa and Warracknabeal, according to the valuation for the time being on all such lands and tenements for the municipal rates of the Shires of St. Arnaud, Kara Kara, Dummunkle, Stawell, and Dimboola respectively, that is to say—on rateable property within the Shire of St. Arnaud division, a rate of Seven pence in the pound sterling of such valuation on rateable property; in the Shire of Kara Kara division, a rate of Fifteen pence in the pound sterling of such valuation; in the Shire of Dummunkle division, a rate of Fourteen pence in the pound sterling of such valuation; in the Shire of Stawell division, a rate of Nine pence in the pound sterling of such valuation; and in the Shire of Dimboola A division, a rate of Twenty-four pence in the pound sterling of such valuation.

Such rate is hereby made payable on the first day of June 1887. Such person or persons as the Commissioners of the said Trust may from time to time appoint for that purpose shall be authorized to demand and receive the said rates.

The foregoing Regulation, No. 11, was made by the Commissioners of the Wimmera United Waterworks Trust under and by virtue of section 44 of *The Victorian Water Conservation Act 1881*, this nineteenth day of April 1887.

SHIRES OF WARANGA AND RODNEY.—BOUNDARIES ADJUSTED AND RE-DEFINED.

At the Executive Council Chamber, Melbourne, the twenty-third day of May 1887.

WHEREAS by *The Local Government Act Amendment Act 1883* (47 Vict. No. 786, sec. 3) it was amongst other things enacted that the Governor in Council might make orders altering, for the purpose of adjustment, the boundaries of continuous municipal districts or subdivisions without any petition: And whereas it has been deemed expedient to adjust the terminous boundaries of the Shires of Waranga and Rodney: Now therefore the Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, doth hereby adjust the boundaries of the said Shires of Waranga and Rodney, and doth declare the boundaries of the said shires as hereunder described and set forth to be in lieu of those previously proclaimed, which are hereby cancelled, that is to say :—

THE SHIRES OF WARANGA AND RODNEY RE-DEFINED.—THE SHIRE OF RODNEY.

Commencing at a point in the centre of the Goulburn River north of the north-west angle of the parish of Undera; thence south-easterly by the centre of that river to a point bearing N. 23° 52' E. six chains fifty links from an angle in the south-western side of the main road from Echuca to Shepparton, whereon the straight line forming a part of the east boundary of the most eastern timber reserve, in the parish of Mooroompa, impinges; thence south-westerly by a direct line to that angle; thence easterly by the southern side of the said road to the centre of the Goulburn River; thence southerly by that river to

a point east of the boundary between the parishes of Murchison and North Murchison; thence following such boundary north-westerly, south-westerly, westerly, northerly, and west to the south-west angle of the parish of North Murchison; thence north by the road forming the west boundary of said parish to the road forming the south boundary of the parish of Girgarre East at the south-east angle thereof; thence west by said road to the south-west angle of said parish; thence north by the road on the west boundaries of Girgarre East and Kyabram East to the north-west angle of the parish last named; thence east by the road on the north boundary of the said parish to the south-east angle of the parish of Taripta; and thence north by the road on the east boundary of the said parish to the commencing point.

THE SHIRE OF WARANGA RE-DEFINED.

Commencing at the centre of the Campaspe River opposite the road bounding portion 34, parish of Bonn, on the west; thence to and by that road south to the centre of a road bounding allotment 34, parish of Bonn, on the south; thence east by that road, and thence north-easterly by a road bounding the said allotment on the east, being the main road from Rannymede to Echuca, to a road bounding allotments 44 to 46, parish of Bonn, on the north; thence east along that road to the western boundary of the parish of Corop; thence further east by that road to the east boundary of Corop parish; thence north by the said east boundary to the north-west angle of portion 45, parish of Carag Carag; thence east by a road bounding allotments 45, 48, and 49 of the last-named parish to the north-east angle of allotment 49; thence further east by that road to the eastern boundary of the parish of Girgarre; thence south by that boundary to the south-east corner of said parish; thence east by the road forming the south boundary of the parish of Girgarre East to the north-west angle of the parish of North Murchison; thence south by the west boundary of said parish to its south-west angle; thence following the boundary between the parishes of North Murchison and Murchison East southerly, easterly, north-

easterly, and south-easterly to the Goulburn River; thence southerly by that river to its junction with Sandy Creek; thence westerly and northerly by that creek to a point bearing S. 81° 30' E. from the east angle of allotment 2A of section 23 (C. P. Davies'), parish of Redcastle; thence north-westerly by a direct line to that angle; thence north-westerly by the said allotment to the road forming the north-west boundary thereof; thence south-westerly by that road to the road along the south side of allotment 23A of section 23 (E. Barker's), and allotment 1A, parish of Crosbie (D. Wilkie's); thence westerly by that road to a road along the west side of allotment 3 of section D (H. C. Johnson's); thence north by that road to the north boundary of the last-named parish; thence west by that boundary and the north boundary of the parishes of Weston and Axedale to the Campaspe River aforesaid; and thence north-easterly by that river to the point of commencement.

The bearings are given with reference to the true meridian.

THE EAST RIDING OF WARANGA SHIRE RE-DEFINED.

Commencing at a point on the Goulburn River due south of the south-west angle of the parish of Murchison; thence north to and by the west boundary of that parish, and easterly by the boundary between the parishes of North Murchison and Murchison as above described to the shire boundary in the centre of the Goulburn River; thence southerly and south-westerly by the shire boundary to the commencing point.

Whenever the line described herein runs beside or along a river, creek, or road, whether specifically described or not, the centre of such river, creek, or road shall be taken to be the boundary-line.

And the Honorable John Nimmo, Her Majesty's Commissioner of Public Works for Victoria, shall give the necessary directions herein accordingly.

PROCLAMATIONS PARTLY REVOKED

By His Excellency Sir HENRY BROUGHAM LOCH, Knight Commander of the Most Honorable Order of the Bath, Governor and Commander-in-Chief in and over the Colony of Victoria and its Dependencies, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS by a Proclamation under the hand of the Governor and the seal of the colony, made in pursuance of *The Land Act 1867*, and bearing date the thirteenth day of July One thousand eight hundred and seventy-four, it was declared that no person, although he be duly licensed or otherwise authorized, should cut, dig, or remove live or dead timber, or bark, stone, gravel, sand, loam, brick, or other earth from

such portions of Crown lands as are permanently reserved around any lakes, lagoons, rivers, creeks, bays, or fronting the Southern Ocean or Bass' Straits: And whereas by a further Proclamation under the hand of the Governor and the seal of the colony made in pursuance of the said Act, and bearing date the twenty-third day of July One thousand eight hundred and seventy-seven, it was declared that no person, although he be duly licensed or otherwise authorized, should remove stone, gravel, sand, loam, brick, or other earth from the foreshore of Port Phillip Bay, or from any Crown land situate within a distance of one chain from high-water mark in the said bay: And whereas it is expedient to revoke in part the said Proclamations: Now therefore I, the Governor of Victoria, with the advice of the Executive Council, do hereby revoke the said Proclamations bearing date respectively the thirteenth day of July One thousand eight hundred and seventy-four and the twenty-third day of July One thousand eight hundred and seventy-seven, so far only as they affect the removal of shells from the Crown lands in the parish of Moorpanyal, county of Grant, situate on the shore of Corio Bay.

WHEREAS by *The Local Government Act 1874* (38 Vict.
