PUBLIC AND BANK HOLIDAYS.

PROCLAMATION

By His Excellency Sir HENRY BROUGHAM LOCH, Knight Commander of the Most Honorable Order of the Bath, Governor and Commander-in-Chief in and over the Colony of Victoria and its Dependencies, &c., &c., &c.

IN pursuance of the provisions contained in the eighty-eighth section of *The Public Service Act 1883*, and the fifth section of *The Bank Holidays Act 1873*, I, the Governor of Victoria, with the advice of the Executive Council, do by this my Proclamation appoint

WEDNESDAY THE 26TH DAY OF JANUARY INSTANT
to be observed as a Public and Bank Holiday within the Shire of Swan Hill ;
WEDNESDAY THE 2ND AND THURSDAY THE 3RD DAYS OF FEBRUARY NEXT
to be observed as Public and Bank Half-Holidays at Ararat, from the hour of Twelve o'clock noon on each day ;
THURSDAY THE 3RD DAY OF FEBRUARY NEXT
to be observed as a Public and Bank Holiday at Dandenong ;
WEDNESDAY THE 9TH DAY OF FEBRUARY NEXT
to be observed as a Public and Bank Holiday at Frankston, Hastings, and Mornington ;
WEDNESDAY THE 16TH DAY OF FEBRUARY NEXT
to be observed as a Public and Bank Holiday at Warracknabeal and within the West Riding of the Shire of St. Arnaud ;
THURSDAY THE 17TH DAY OF FEBRUARY NEXT
to be observed as a Public and Bank Holiday within the Shire of Cranbourne ;
THURSDAY THE 10TH DAY OF MARCH NEXT
to be observed as a Public and Bank Holiday within the Borough of Flemington and Kensington.

Given under my Hand and the Seal of the Colony, at Melbourne, this twenty-fifth day of January, in the year of our Lord One thousand eight hundred and eighty-seven, and in the fiftieth year of Her Majesty's reign.
