A PLACE FOR THE PERFORMANCE OF QUARANTINE.

PROCLAMATION

By His Excellency Sir HENRY BROUGHAM LOCH, Knight Commander of the Most Honorable Order of the Bath, Governor and Commander-in-Chief in and over the Colony of Victoria and its Dependencies, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS by *The Public Health Statute 1865* (28 Vict. No. 264) it is amongst other things enacted that the Governor in Council may from time to time, by any Order notified by Proclamation, appoint certain stations or places within or near any harbor or place within Victoria for the performance of quarantine under the said Act, where all vessels liable to quarantine, and the crews, passengers, and persons on board thereof shall perform the same; and also (if necessary) appoint lazarets and other places where the crews, passengers, and other persons, and the things which shall or may be on board the said vessels shall be detained and kept for the performance of quarantine: Now therefore I, the Governor of Victoria, with the advice of the Executive Council, do by this Proclamation notify that the establishment in the parish of Cut-Paw-Paw, in the Shire of Wyndham, in the said colony (commonly known as *The Sanatorium*), the boundaries of which are more particularly set out and defined in a certain deed of conveyance, dated the twelfth day of July 1882, from James Warnes to Her Majesty the Queen, and filed in the office of the Crown Solicitor of the said colony, shall be and shall be deemed to have been from and after the twenty-sixth day of September 1887 a place where the crews, passengers, and other persons, and the things which shall or may be on board vessels shall be detained and kept for the performance of quarantine.

SMALL-POX IN TASMANIA.

ILLEGAL LANDING IN VICTORIA OF A PASSENGER FROM THE S.S. *MANGANA*.

At the Executive Council Chamber, Melbourne, the tenth day of October 1887.

PRESENT:

His Excellency the Governor in Council.

THE Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, in pursuance of the provisions of *The Public Health Statute* (No. 28 Vict., No. 264), has directed that Alexander Pirrie, who arrived in Victorian waters from Launceston, in the island of Tasmania, on the seventh day of October instant, by the steamship *Mangana*, and was conveyed thence to the Sanatorium at Cut-Paw-Paw, in the parish of Wyndham, be detained in the said Sanatorium for medical inspection and observation, for a period of not less than fifteen days from the day of his departure from the said island, or until released by the directions of the Chief Secretary of Victoria; and further, that all persons, except the keeper, surgeon, nurses, and attendants, be prohibited from going, under any pretence whatever, within the limits of the said Sanatorium.

And the Honorable Duncan Gillies, for Her Majesty's Chief Secretary for Victoria, shall give the necessary directions herein accordingly.

IN pursuance of the provisions contained in the eighty-eighth section of *The Public Service Act 1885*, and in the fifth section of *The Bank Holidays Act 1873*, I, the Governor of Victoria, with the advice of the Executive Council, do by this my Proclamation appoint

- WEDNESDAY THE 12TH DAY OF OCTOBER INSTANT
to be observed as a Public and Bank Holiday within the Shires of Avoca and Huntly, and at Dunolly ;
- THURSDAY THE 13TH DAY OF OCTOBER INSTANT
to be observed as a Public and Bank Holiday within the Shire of Huntly ;
- WEDNESDAY THE 19TH DAY OF OCTOBER INSTANT
to be observed as a Public and Bank Holiday within the Shire of Avon ;
- THURSDAY THE 20TH DAY OF OCTOBER INSTANT
to be observed as a Public Holiday within the North Ovens Shire ; and as a Public and Bank Holiday at Echuca, Murchison, Rushworth, and within the Shire of Chiltern ;
- WEDNESDAY THE 26TH DAY OF OCTOBER INSTANT
to be observed as a Public and Bank Holiday within the Shire of Creswick ;
- THURSDAY THE 27TH DAY OF OCTOBER INSTANT
to be observed as a Public and Bank Holiday at Maryborough, St. James, Tungamah, and within the Shires of Avoca and Rodney ;
- WEDNESDAY THE 2ND DAY OF NOVEMBER NEXT
to be observed as a Public and Bank Holiday within the North Riding of the Shire of Huntly, and Central and Western Ridings of the Shire of Waranga ;
- THURSDAY THE 3RD AND FRIDAY THE 4TH DAYS OF NOVEMBER NEXT
to be observed as Public and Bank Holidays at Omeo ;
- MONDAY THE 14TH DAY OF NOVEMBER NEXT
to be observed as a Public and Bank Holiday within the East Riding of the Shire of Gordon.

1. That no person or persons shall employ in the said workrooms more than seven females, being dressmakers, for more than fifty-four hours in any one week in preparing or manufacturing articles for trade or sale.
2. That none of such females shall be so employed for more than forty-eight hours in any one week without her consent.
3. That a copy of this Order be kept conspicuously and continually posted in such workrooms for the information of all concerned.

2. That none of such females shall be so employed for more than forty-eight hours in any one week without her consent.
3. That a copy of this Order be kept conspicuously and continually posted in such workrooms for the information of all concerned.
