4. Nominations will only be received from irrigation and water supply trusts and agricultural and horticultural societies. Each such trust or society shall have the right to nominate not more than two farms.
5. The water supplied to the irrigated land may be provided either by pumping or by gravitation, but must be from some natural source that would be capable of yielding a sufficient supply in each ordinary season.
6. Sufficient drainage must be provided for the irrigated land to remove any excess water from the fields after the irrigation is completed, and without injury to other lands, either of the irrigated farm or of lands adjacent thereto.

The first prize of £30 shall be awarded to the farm fulfilling the above conditions, which, in the opinion of the judges, exhibits the highest merit, and the second prize of £20 to the next best; but the judges may decline to award either, or both prizes, if, in their opinion, the merit of the entries is insufficient to warrant them in making the award.

In making their awards, the judges will be guided, as far as possible, by the following considerations, viz.:-

1. The land is to be so laid out, and cropped, as to fully utilize the available supply of water at all seasons of the year. Thus:-If the supply of water available in the locality be greater in winter than in summer, the land must be laid out so as to employ the greater proportion of it in the irrigation of cold-weather crops, or otherwise, so that the utmost use shall be made of the whole available water supply.
2. The farm is to be so arranged that the irrigated and unirrigated portions shall mutually contribute to the maintenance of each in the best condition of culture, and in the highest possible state of fertility.
3. The irrigated lands are to be so arranged and prepared that the water supplied to them shall be under perfect control, both as to the volume of water to be applied to any area, and as to the length of time the crops on such area shall remain under water, or wet.

First Prize, £50. Second Prize, £25.

Conditions of Competition.

1. The area of any irrigated land entered for competition for these prizes shall not be less than 12 acres in one holding.
2. No first prize will be awarded in respect of any holding the crops of which have been awarded first prize in last year's competition.
3. No second prize will be awarded in respect of any holding the crops of which have been awarded second prize in last year's competition.
4. Nominations will only be received from irrigation and water supply trusts and agricultural and horticultural societies. Each such trust or society shall have the right to nominate not more than two holdings.
5. For the purpose of computing the variety of computed crops grown on one farm, no crop shall be reckoned the net annual value of the produce of which, on the farm, is less than £5, except in the case of garden crops, grown for the use of those residing on the farm, the total net value of which may be reckoned as one item.
6. The number, value, and readiness of sale of the products shall each be taken into consideration in making the award; and all of these points will weigh in determining the relative merits of the entries.

A first prize of £50, and a second prize of £25, will be awarded to those two irrigated holdings, entered for competition, which, subject to the above conditions, exhibit the highest merit, should this be such, as in the opinion of the judges, to justify the award.

In determining the order of precedence of the entries, the judges will be further guided by the following considerations, viz.:-

1. The irrigated land is to be so laid out, arranged, and prepared that the water may be applied without waste, without injury to the crops, and without injury to any adjacent lands.

2. The crops are to be arranged so that the extent of each shall be in proportion to the quantity of water available for its irrigation at the season when it requires to be watered; and that the whole shall utilize all the available labour of the farm at each season of the year.

3. Special attention will be given to such crops as are likely to command the readiest sale, and the highest prices relatively to the amount of labour and the area of land employed in their production.

NOTE.—Irrigated holdings may be entered for competition both for a prize for the "best irrigated farm," or for the "best irrigated garden, orchard, or vineyard," as the case may be, and for a prize for the "best variety of irrigated crops." And the judges may award a prize for both causes to the same holding, should they so think fit, or may award the prizes to different holdings.

THE Commissioners of the Loddon United Water Trust, in pursuance of powers conferred by *The Water Conservation Act 1887*, do make the following Regulation:—

REGULATION No. 4.

Regulation for the imposing, levying, and receiving all rates for the year 1889 on all the rateable property in that portion of the Loddon United Water Trust District, of which notice has been given that the same has been supplied with water, and which notice was published in the *Government Gazette* of 13th August, 1889.

And whereas the Governor in Council has, by an Order made the 2nd August, 1886, under the provisions of section 93 of *The Victorian Water Conservation Act 1887*, divided the Loddon United Waterworks District into divisions, and has directed that the rates necessary for paying interest on all moneys borrowed by the Loddon United Water Trust for the construction and maintenance of their works, or to meet any other expenses in connexion therewith, shall be levied only in the following divisions, viz.:-The Shire of Marong Division, the Shire of East Loddon Division, the Shire of Gordon East Division, the Shire of Gordon West Division, and the Shire of Korong Division; and has further directed that such rates shall be levied differentially as between such several divisions.

Such person or persons as the Commissioners of the said Trust may from time to time appoint for that purpose shall be authorized to demand and receive the said rates.

NOTE.—During the third quarter of 1889, the excess of registered births over registered deaths was 5,574, viz., 2,504 of males and 3,070 of females; and the excess of recorded arrivals over recorded and unrecorded departures (the latter being estimated) was 1,396, viz., 494 of males and 902 of females. The total gain to the population was thus 6,970, viz., 2,908 males and 4,062 females, as shown in the table.

The estimated increase of population during the first nine months of the current year has been 20,389, viz., 9,257 males and 11,132 females.

The total allowance for unrecorded departures since the census of 1881 was taken has been 45,543, viz., 36,239 males and 9,284 females. Had no such allowance been made, the apparent population at the end of September would have been 1,156,801, viz., 626,849 males and 529,952 females.

The total excess of recorded arrivals over recorded departures during the quarter under review was 2,602, the greatest gain to the population being from the United Kingdom (2,642), the next from Tasmania (931), then from New Zealand (306). On the other hand, by excess of departures over arrivals, there was a loss of 1,039 to New South Wales and Queensland, 172 to South and Western Australia, and 66 to foreign countries. All the arrivals and departures referred to are by sea.

The births of 1,371 children, viz., 749 boys and 622 girls, were registered in Greater Melbourne during the month of October. In the month of September 1,452 births were registered, or 81 more than in the month under review. The births were 432 above the average of the month during the previous ten years, but only 116 above that average, if allowance be made for the increase of population.

The deaths registered in October numbered 645, viz., 363 of males and 282 of females; the births thus exceeded the deaths by 726, or 112 per cent. The deaths exceeded those in September by 3, and were above the average of October during the previous ten years by 188. If, however, allowance be made for the increase of population, they will be found to have exceeded that average by 34 only.

To every 1,000 of the population of the district, the proportion of births registered was 3.13, and of deaths registered 1.47.

The highest temperature in the shade recorded at Melbourne Observatory during the month was 84.5° on the 14th, and the lowest was 37.8° on the 12th. The mean temperature of the month (58.9°) was about 2° above the average. The greatest range of the thermometer in any one day (32.1°) took place on the 12th, the least range (5.5°) was on the 16th. The mean daily range was 17.0°. The highest atmospheric pressure recorded was 30.263 inches on the 30th, and the lowest was 29.400 inches on the 4th. The mean atmospheric pressure (29.935 inches) was slightly above the average.

Rain fell on 11 days, the amount of rainfall being 2.86 inches. The average rainfall in October during the previous ten years was 2.54 inches, or slightly less than in the month under notice.

Males contributed 56 per cent., and females 44 per cent., to the mortality of the month. Children under 5 years of age contributed 40 per cent. to that mortality, as against the following proportions in the corresponding month of the years named:—35 per cent. in 1888, 36 per cent. in 1887, 32 per cent. in 1886, 29 per cent. in 1885, 46 per cent. in 1884, 30 per cent. in 1883, 31 per cent. in 1882, 33 per cent. in 1881, 37 per cent. in 1880 and 1879.

Thirty-four deaths of persons who had attained or exceeded the age of 75 years were recorded during the month. Of these a bookmaker, aged 75, died of pneumonia; a female, aged 73, of apoplexy; a male, of occupation unknown, aged 75, of congestion of the throat, caused by a cold, the result of having a tooth drawn; a tinsmith, aged 76, of heart disease; a labourer, aged 76, and a grazier, aged 77, of bronchitis; a gold miner, aged 77, of injury to the head, consequent on falling down steps; a male, of occupation unknown, aged 79, of emphysema; a female, aged 79, of pelvic cellulitis; a solicitor, aged 80, of angina pectoris; a brickmaker, aged 80, of morbus cordis; a blacksmith, aged 80, of broncho-pneumonia; a compositor, aged 81, of dilatation of the heart; a male, aged 82, of broncho-pneumonia; a female, aged 84, of bronchitis; a female, aged 85, of apoplexy; a male, aged 85, of paralysis; a female, aged 85, of heart disease; a gentleman and a gardener, each aged 76; a gentleman, aged 77, two females, each aged 79, a male and two females, each aged 80, a female, aged 81, a watchmaker, aged 82, two females, each aged 83, a gentleman, aged 84, a gardener and a female, each aged 85, and a male, of occupation unknown, aged 91, of old age.

Thirty-three deaths were ascribed to external causes during the month, of which 24 resulted from accident, 2 from homicide, 5 from suicide, and 1 from execution. The following are the particulars of the accidental deaths:—A boy, aged 14, was passed over by a tramcar; a clerk, aged 19, a laundress, aged 35, a commission agent, aged 50, a male cook, aged 63, and a goldminer, aged 77, died of injuries resulting from falls; a tailor, aged 17, was killed whilst getting into a train in motion; a carter, aged 19, and a male of occupation unknown, aged 24, were passed over by vehicles; a female, aged 58, died of injury to the abdomen—how caused not stated; a labourer, aged 60, of pressure of the brain—how caused not stated; a male and a female infant, each aged 2 years, died of injuries occasioned by scalds; a carpenter, aged 29, of burns; a female, aged 24, and a quarryman, aged 27, were poisoned by chloroform properly administered; a painter, aged 21, died of lead poisoning; a tailor, aged 26, a labourer and a publican, each aged 44, were drowned in the River Yarra; a seaman, aged 40, was drowned in Hobson's Bay; 2 male infants, aged 4 days and 7 weeks respectively, were overlain; a female infant, aged 1 hour, died of umbilical hæmorrhage; and a male, aged 75, of the result of the extraction of a tooth. The homicidal deaths were those of 2 newly-born female infants, who were suffocated—a verdict of wilful murder being returned in each case. The suicidal deaths were those of a saw-sharpener, aged 67, who shot himself; a tailor, aged 29, and a male of occupation unknown, aged 70, who drowned themselves; a juggler, aged 40, and a female, aged 58, who hanged themselves. The case of judicial hanging was that of an engineer, aged 64, who was executed in the Melbourne Gaol for murder.

One hundred and twelve deaths, or 17 per cent. of the whole, took place in public institutions, viz.:—51 in the Melbourne Hospital, 11 in the Alfred Hospital, 3 in the Homœopathic Hospital, 11 in the Children's Hospital, 5 in the Lying-in-Hospital, 4 in the Immigrants' Home, 9 in the Benevolent Asylum, 5 in the Yarra Bend Lunatic Asylum, 3 in the Metropolitan Lunatic Asylum, 2 in the Austin Hospital, 4 in the Melbourne Gaol, 2 in the Protestant Refuge, 1 in the Convent of the Little Sisters of the Poor, and 1 in the Eye and Ear Hospital.

The deaths of children under five years of age numbered 259, of which 145, or 56 per cent., were of males, and 114, or 44 per cent., were of females. Of those who died, 184 were under one year of age, 42 were between one and two, 18 were between two and three, 7 were between three and four, and 8 were between four and five.

The persons who died at a more advanced age than five years numbered 386. Of these, 218, or 57 per cent., were males and 168, or 43 per cent., were females; 24 were between five and ten, 9 were between ten and fifteen, 18 were between fifteen and twenty, 26 were between twenty and twenty-five, 32 were between twenty-five and thirty, 30 were between thirty and thirty-five, 29 were between thirty-five and forty, 22 were between forty and forty-five, 20 were between forty-five and fifty, 24 were between fifty and fifty-five, 26 were between fifty-five and sixty, 40 were between sixty and sixty-five, 25 were between sixty-five and seventy, 27 were between seventy and seventy-five, 14 were between seventy-five and eighty, and 20 were upwards of eighty.

Deaths from zymotic diseases fell from 86 in the 30 days of September to 77 in the 31 days of October. Under this head, deaths from scarlet fever fell from 3 to 1, deaths from whooping cough from 22 to 15, and deaths from diphtheria, from 37 to 21. On the other hand, deaths from cholera, diarrhœa, and dysentery increased from 8 to 21. Typhoid fever caused 6 deaths in both months. In addition to the deaths from diphtheria referred to in the last column of the table, 5 deaths were set down to diphtheritic croup (classed as a disease of the respiratory system) in the month under review, 7 in September, 8 in August, and 16 in July.

The following is a statement of the deaths set down to typhoid fever and diphtheria in each of the first ten months of the present and the two previous years:—

BYE-LAW No. 80.

THE VICTORIAN RAILWAYS COMMISSIONERS, in pursuance of the powers conferred by *The Victorian Railways Commissioners Act 1883*, do hereby make the following Bye-law, and all Bye-laws conflicting therewith are hereby repealed:—

CHARGES ON GOODS are fixed as follows:—

Storage on Inwards Cargoes discharged at the Williamstown and Port Melbourne Piers, and conveyed by Rail to Melbourne, is fixed as follows:—

1. SHED AND YARD STORAGE.—After 10 days' free storage beyond the date when the delivery of each consignment from the ship to the shed or yard is completed, a charge at the rate of One shilling per ton per week for a further seven days will be made, and afterwards the charge will be at the rate of One Shilling per ton per day.
2. INTERCOLONIAL TRAFFIC.—No charge for storage will be made if consignments are re-exported within 2 days of ship's clearance.

REGULATIONS FOR THE APPOINTMENT OF SKILLED MEMBERS OF THE COURT OF MARINE INQUIRY.

WHEREAS by Section 40 of *The Marine Board Act 1887*, it is amongst other things enacted, that the Marine Board of Victoria may, with the consent of the Governor in Council, make regulations for prescribing the mode in which, and times at which, lists of persons eligible for appointment as Skilled Members of the Court of Marine Inquiry, shall be prepared, and from time to time, in like manner, alter or repeal any such regulations; and whereas the said Marine Board did on the 21st day of December, 1888, make regulations for the appointment of Skilled Members of the Court of Marine Inquiry, and such regulations were approved by the Governor in Council on the 28th day of December, 1888, and whereas it is expedient to repeal the same to the extent hereinafter mentioned. Now, therefore, the said Board, with the consent of the Governor in Council, do hereby repeal that portion of regulation 2, which relates to Class IV., and also regulation 4 of the aforesaid regulations, and in view thereof, do make and substitute the following amended regulations, namely:—

Regulation 2.—Class IV.—Port Phillip pilots or exempt masters holding a licence as such at the time of their selection by the Board as eligible for appointment as skilled members provided that for the purposes of these regulations any person who has held a licence as a Port Phillip pilot and has retired from active service shall be deemed to be a "Port Phillip pilot" within the meaning of this clause.

Regulation 4.—Such list shall be forwarded by the Secretary not later than the 14th day of June and the 14th day of December to the Minister, for submission to the Governor in Council for the purpose of making a selection of persons who are to be appointed as Skilled Members of the Court of Marine Inquiry.

The foregoing amended regulations were made and passed at a meeting of the Marine Board held the eighth day of November, in the year of our Lord One thousand eight hundred and eighty-nine.

WESTERN WIMMERA IRRIGATION AND WATER SUPPLY TRUST.—REGULATIONS FOR THE ELECTION OF COMMISSIONERS.

At the Executive Council Chamber, Melbourne, the 25th day of November, 1889.

PRESENT:

His Excellency the Administrator of the Government.

Mr. Gillies | Mr. Davies

WHEREAS by section 63 of *The Irrigation Act 1886*, No. 898, it is enacted that the Governor in Council may, subject to the provisions of the said Act, from time to time make, alter, and repeal regulations relating to any Irrigation and Water Supply Trust appointed under the said Act for the purposes, among others, following:—

- (a) For determining the period for which the commissioners of any trust shall hold office, the time and manner of election, and the order of their retirement from office;
- (b) For determining the manner in which elections of any such commissioners shall be held, and the manner of voting thereat;
- (c) For determining the manner in which any vacancies in the office of any such commissioners shall be filled up.
- (d) For determining questions as to the due election of any such commissioner; and
- (e) For prescribing, subject to the provisions of the said Act, any other matter necessary for giving effect to Part IV. of the said Act.

Now therefore His Excellency the Administrator of the Government, acting by and with the advice of the Executive Council, and in pursuance of the said provisions of the now in part recited Act, do hereby repeal certain regulations, dated respectively the 12th day of November, 1888, and the 3rd day of December, 1888,

so far as these may relate to a certain Irrigation and Water Supply Trust duly appointed under the said Act, and known as the Western Wimmera Irrigation and Water Supply Trust, and doth, in lieu of such regulations, and for the purposes aforesaid, make the regulations following, viz:—

1. *Interpretation of terms.*—In these regulations, "the Minister" shall mean the Minister of Water Supply; "the trust" or "the said trust" shall mean the Western Wimmera Irrigation and Water Supply Trust; and "the district," "the said district," "the irrigation district," or "the irrigation and water supply district" shall mean the lands as defined by the Order in Council appointing the said trust wherein the trust shall have authority.

2. *Period for which commissioners shall hold office.*—The period during which the commissioners of the said trust shall hold office shall be three years.

3. *Annual retirement of commissioners.*—Four commissioners shall retire annually, but the retiring commissioners shall, subject to the provisions of the said Act, be eligible for re-election.

4. *Extraordinary vacancies, how filled, and term of office.*—Should any vacancy in the office of commissioner be occasioned by death, resignation, removal, disqualification, or any other cause whatever, an election shall forthwith be held to fill such vacancy; and the provisions contained in these regulations as to the nomination of candidates, the manner in which elections shall be held, and the mode of voting thereat shall apply to any election in respect of such vacancy; and the person elected to fill such vacancy shall hold the office of commissioner during the unexpired portion of the term of office of the commissioner whose seat shall have become vacant.

5. *Date of annual election.*—The annual election of commissioners of the said trust shall be held on the first Wednesday of the month of March in each year. Provided that whenever such day may be set apart as a public holiday, such election shall be held upon the day next following.

6. *Voters' list to be prepared yearly.*—Before the first day of February in each year, the officers of the trust shall prepare a voters' list in the form of the First Schedule hereto; and such list shall contain, in regular numerical sequence and in alphabetical order of surname, the christian name or names, surname, and address (so far as these may be known) of each person entitled to vote under the provisions of *The Irrigation Act 1886* or under the provisions of any Act amending the said Irrigation Act, and shall also specify the extent of, and indicate with reasonable certainty, the land of each such person, and shall state the number of votes to which, under the provisions of the said Act, each such person is entitled.

7. *Voting in respect of lands jointly owned or leased.*—In the case of joint owners of land, or in the case of joint lessees of Crown lands, the name of any one of such owners or lessees (as the case may be) shall, subject to the provisions of the said Act and of these regulations, be placed in respect of such land upon the voters' list in like manner as if such land were owned or leased solely by such one owner or lessee, and the owner or lessee so placed upon the said list shall alone be entitled to vote accordingly. Provided always that if such owners or lessees jointly, by notice in writing, desire that the number of votes to which, under the said provisions, any one of such owners or lessees is so entitled to vote as aforesaid may be allotted between such owners or lessees in any manner they may jointly indicate, the alteration or alterations so desired to be made in the said list shall, if the same be consistent with the said provisions, be made when the list or lists shall be revised as hereinafter provided, and such owners or lessees shall be entitled to vote accordingly.

8. *Copy of list to be available for inspection.*—*Second Schedule.*—A copy of such voters' list shall be available for inspection, without payment of any fee or charge, at all reasonable hours in the day time, at some convenient place or places within or near to the irrigation and water supply district of the trust for a period of twenty-one clear days; and notice in the form, or to the like effect, of the Second Schedule hereto shall be published in some newspaper ordinarily circulating within the said district; and such notice shall state that all objections to the said list must be forwarded, in writing, to the chairman of the trust within the time mentioned in the said notice.

9. *Grounds of objections to list to be forwarded, in writing, to the chairman of trust.*—All objections to the said list shall be forwarded, in writing, to the chairman of the trust within the time mentioned in the said notice, and the ground or grounds of objection must be clearly set forth.

10. *Special meeting of trust to be held to revise list.*—*List to be certified.*—In the month of February in each year a special meeting of the trust shall be held for the purpose of revising the said list; and all objections which may have been forwarded to the chairman under the preceding clause shall be considered by the commissioners then present; and the chairman may make such alterations and amendments in the said list as the commissioners or a majority of the commissioners present may determine to be just and necessary, or such as by these regulations are required to be made; and the list, when so revised, altered, and amended, shall be certified as correct under the hand of the chairman; and no objection to the list when so certified shall be allowed.

11. *Revised and certified list to be voters' roll.*—The list so revised and certified shall be the voters' roll for the purposes of any election (whether ordinary or extraordinary) of trust commissioners to be held within one year from the first Wednesday of March then next, the said day inclusive.

12. *Chairman of trust to be returning officer at subsequent elections.*—For the purposes of every election (whether ordinary or extraordinary) the chairman of the trust for the time being shall be the returning officer; but if at the time of any election the office of chairman of the trust should be vacant, the commissioners of the trust may, by resolution, appoint one of their number to be returning officer until the office of chairman shall again be filled;

and the returning officer may appoint a deputy or deputies to assist him or to act in his room at any election; and such deputy or deputies may do all or any of the acts or things which the returning officer is hereby authorized or required to do.

13. *Notice of election.—Nomination of candidates.—Third Schedule.*—Twenty-one clear days before any election of commissioners under these regulations, the returning officer shall give public notice of such election by advertisement inserted in some newspaper generally circulating in the said district, and by such notice shall require all candidates at such election to be nominated at some place within the said district to be named in such notice in manner hereinafter mentioned, between the hours of Ten o'clock in the forenoon and Four o'clock in the afternoon, on some day before a day (hereinafter called the day of nomination) not less than seven nor more than ten days after the time of giving such notice, and named therein; and any person desirous of nominating a candidate shall, before Four o'clock in the afternoon of the day next preceding the nomination-day, cause to be delivered at the place aforesaid to the returning officer a nomination-paper in the form of the Third Schedule, or to the like effect, stating therein the christian name and surname of such candidate, together with the other particulars required in and by the said schedule; and such nomination-paper shall be signed by not less than six persons duly qualified to vote at such elections, and also signed by the person named therein as a candidate in token of his assent to being so named; and such candidate or some person on his behalf shall, at the time when such nomination-paper is delivered to the returning officer, pay into the hands of such returning officer the sum of Twenty pounds, to be dealt with as by law provided. And no person who shall not have been so nominated, or by whom or on whose behalf such payment shall not have been so made, shall, within the subsequent provisions of these regulations, be deemed to be a candidate at any election of commissioners.

14. *Where number of candidates does not exceed number of commissioners to be elected.*—If at the expiration of the time limited as hereinbefore provided for the nominations of candidates, the number of persons who have become candidates as aforesaid does not exceed the number of commissioners to be elected, the returning officer shall then declare such candidates to be duly elected, and they shall be deemed to be then duly elected accordingly.

15. *Where number of candidates exceeds number of commissioners to be elected.—Fifth Schedule.—Notice of poll.—Hours of polling.*—If at the expiration of the time limited for the nomination of candidates the number of candidates exceed the number of commissioners to be elected, then the returning officer shall forthwith cause ballot-papers to be printed, with the christian names and surnames of all the candidates in full, in the form of the Fourth Schedule hereto, and shall also forthwith give public notice by advertisement in some newspaper generally circulating in the irrigation district stating the names of the persons so nominated, and that a poll will be taken for the election of such commissioners upon the day named in such notice, at such place within the said district as the returning officer shall in and by such notice appoint; and such poll shall take place accordingly, and shall commence at Nine o'clock a.m., and close at Four o'clock in the afternoon.

16. *Retirement of candidates before polling-day.*—If at any election after a poll shall have been appointed as aforesaid any candidate for such election and two of the persons having signed the paper nominating him as aforesaid are desirous that he should retire from such candidature, such candidate and the persons aforesaid may sign and deliver to the returning officer not later than four clear days before the day of polling a notice, in the form of the Fifth Schedule hereto, stating that such candidate so retires, and the said candidate or his agent shall thereupon publish in some newspaper generally circulating in the irrigation and water supply district a copy of such notice, and the returning officer, on sufficient proof of such publication aforesaid, if the number of candidates is by such retirement reduced to the number of persons to be elected at such election, shall on the day appointed for the election declare the remaining candidates duly elected, and if the said number is not so reduced, shall omit the name of the person so retiring from the ballot-papers to be used at the said election, and if such papers are already printed shall erase such name therefrom, and such person shall not be capable of being elected at such election.

17. *Polling-booth may be hired.*—At such election the returning officer shall provide suitable places for taking a poll, and may, if necessary, cause to be hired and used as polling-booths any rooms which he may deem to be suitable at the place appointed for taking the poll, and may divide such rooms into compartments as to him may seem most convenient.

18. *Returning officer to preside at polling-booth.*—The returning officer, or his deputy, shall preside at each polling-booth for taking the poll.

19. *Scrutineers may be appointed.*—Each candidate shall be entitled to appoint, in writing, one scrutineer to be present in each polling-booth, and the said returning officer, or his deputy, and the said scrutineers, and any voters, not exceeding four in number, actually engaged in voting, shall alone be permitted at any one time to enter or remain in any polling-booth.

20. *Pencils to be provided.*—The returning officer, or his deputy, shall provide pencils in each polling-booth for the use of the voters, and also a locked box at each booth, to be called the ballot-box, with a cleft or opening therein capable of receiving the ballot-papers; and such box shall be opened and exhibited to the scrutineers before the polling begins, and the box shall then be locked, and shall stand on a table opposite the returning officer, or deputy returning officer, who shall keep the key of such box.

21. *Mode of voting.—Where voter is illiterate.*—The returning officer shall deliver to every voter who requires the same a ballot-paper, or if such voter appears by the roll to be entitled to give more votes than one then so many ballot-papers as may be equal to the number of votes which such voter so appears to be entitled to give, such ballot-papers being in the form of Schedule five hereto, and initialed by the returning officer; and every such voter shall, without leaving the booth, strike out from all or any of such papers the name of every candidate for whom he does not intend to vote. And in case any voter is unable to read or write, the returning officer, or his deputy, if so required, shall, in view of such one of the scrutineers as the voter may desire, strike out the name or names of such candidate or candidates as such voter may designate, and after such name or names have been so struck out, the ballot-paper or ballot-papers, as the case may be, shall forthwith be deposited in the said box. Provided that all the ballot-papers to which any person may be entitled at the polling-booth shall be demanded and received by him at one and the same time, and no person, having once demanded and received any such ballot-paper or papers, and voted by the same, shall at the same election receive any further ballot-papers or exercise any further right of voting.

22. *Ballot-papers to be numbered.*—Before delivering any ballot-paper to the voter, the returning officer or his deputy shall write upon the back of each such ballot-paper, as near as practicable to the lower edge thereof, the number set opposite to the voter's name in the roll, and shall thereupon, upon a copy of such roll, check off such voter's name as having voted, and mark against such name the number of ballot-papers delivered to such voter.

23. *Informal ballot-papers.*—If any voter suffer to remain upon his ballot-paper a greater number of names not struck out than the number of commissioners to be elected, the vote given on and by such paper shall be void and of no effect.

24. *What question may be asked.*—At any election of commissioners, the returning officer may, if he see fit, or if required to do so by any candidate or scrutineer, shall put to any person tendering his vote the question following:—

“Are you the person whose name appears as (A.B.) in the roll now in force for this trust, being enrolled therein in respect of land in the parish of _____, being (here specify land as described in the roll)?”

And no other question shall be put to any person tendering his vote; and no person who shall refuse to answer such question, or who shall not answer the same absolutely in the affirmative, shall receive a ballot-paper or be permitted to vote.

25. *False answer, polling twice, and personation.*—Every person who shall wilfully make a false answer to the question aforesaid, or who shall poll more than once or offer to poll more than once at the same election, or who shall depart or attempt to depart from any polling-booth after having received a ballot-paper without having deposited the same in the ballot-box as hereinbefore provided, or who shall personate any other person for the purpose of polling at such election, shall be guilty of a breach of these regulations; but nothing contained in this clause shall apply to any person only by reason of his exercising the right of voting as often as it appears by the roll he is entitled so to do.

26. *Result of polling, how ascertained.—Returning officer to have casting vote.*—Immediately upon the close of the poll, the returning officer shall, in the presence of and subject to the inspection of so many of the scrutineers of the candidates as please to be present, proceed to ascertain the number of votes for each candidate; and such returning officer shall abstain from inspecting the number written as aforesaid on any ballot-paper, and take care that the same is not seen by any person before being sealed up as herein provided; and the returning officer shall seal up the ballot-papers deposited in the booth, and as soon as conveniently may be on or after the day of the poll publicly declare the candidates, not exceeding the number of vacancies to be filled up, who have received the greatest number of votes to have been duly elected commissioners of the trust; and if two or more candidates have received an equal number of votes, the returning officer shall in each case have the casting vote.

27. *Ballot-papers, how disposed of.*—The returning officer shall, in the case of the said first election of commissioners, forthwith after the declaration of the poll endorse with a description of the contents thereof and sign the sealed parcel of ballot-papers, and forward the same to the Minister, who shall, as soon as may be after the first meeting of trust commissioners shall have been held, forward such sealed packet to the secretary of the trust, to be by him safely and secretly kept for six months then next ensuing, and then by him caused to be destroyed in the presence of three commissioners of the trust; but in all subsequent elections the parcel of ballot-papers so sealed, endorsed, and signed shall be delivered by the returning officer to the said secretary, to be by him safely and secretly kept for six months after such delivery, and then by him caused to be destroyed in the presence of three of the commissioners of the trust.

28. *Minister to determine questions arising upon first election.*—If any question arise as to the due election of any commissioner at the first election, the returning officer shall, at the request of any voter or candidate, submit such question, in writing, to the Minister, who shall decide the same; and such decision shall be final and binding.

29. *Questions arising upon subsequent elections to be determined by trust.*—If any question arise as to the due election of any commissioner at any subsequent election (whether ordinary or extraordinary), such question shall be determined by the commissioners of the trust at the first ordinary meeting held after the election; but no commissioner in respect of whose election such question shall have arisen shall act as a commissioner at such meeting, or be entitled to take any part in the proceedings thereof, or in any manner or at any time to act as a commissioner until

such question shall have been so determined; and the majority of the commissioners whose election is not in dispute shall form a quorum.

30. *Appeal to Minister from determination of trust.*—In event of any voter or candidate feeling aggrieved by the determination of the trust with reference to any such question as last aforesaid, he may appeal therefrom to the Minister within fourteen days from the date upon which the commissioners shall have determined the question; and the Minister may make such inquiry as to the merits of the question as may appear to him to be necessary, and determine such question in such manner as to him may appear just; and such determination of the Minister shall be final and binding.

31. *Failure to elect deemed to create extraordinary vacancies.*—If at any election of commissioners no vacancies, or a number of vacancies less than the whole number which should have been filled up at such election, are filled up, then the vacancies which are not so filled shall severally be deemed extraordinary vacancies, and to have occurred on the day appointed for such election. Provided always that the commissioners eventually elected to fill such vacancies shall go out of office as if elected at such election.

32. *Expenses of election to be paid by trust.*—The expenses incurred by the returning officer, or under his direction, in connexion with any election shall be defrayed by the trust.

33. *Penalty for breach of regulations.*—These regulations shall also be deemed to be regulations under section 250 of *The Irrigation Act 1886*, and any person guilty of a breach of any of the provisions of these regulations shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding Ten pounds, to be recovered in a summary manner before justices of the peace.

34. *Interpretation.*—In these regulations words importing the masculine gender shall be deemed and taken to include females, unless there is something in the context repugnant to or inconsistent with this interpretation.

Description of land.—One acre, county of Delatite, town of Mandamplo, being allotments 1 and 2 of section 8: Commencing at the north-west angle of allotment 1 aforesaid, being a point formed by the junction of the east side of Church-street with the south side of Main-street; bounded thence by Main-street bearing S. 88° 47' E. two chains; thence by allotment 3 bearing S. 1° 13' W. five chains; thence by Dickens-street bearing N. 88° 47' W. two chains; and thence by Church-street aforesaid bearing N. 1° 13' E. five chains to the point of commencement.

Names of trustees.—The Church of England Trusts Corporation for the Diocese of Melbourne.

Power of disposition.—Power to sell, lease, mortgage, or exchange all or any part of such land, subject to the approval of the Bishop of Melbourne for the time being, or, during the absence of the Bishop from the diocese or the vacancy of the see, to the approval of the person for the time being administering the affairs thereof. The land, until otherwise disposed of, to be used for the purposes for which it was granted or reserved by the Crown.

RULES AND REGULATIONS.

In pursuance of the powers vested in them, the Trustees of the Brighton General Cemetery rescind the Rules and Regulations

published previously in the *Government Gazette*, and make the following Rules and Regulations, to commence from 1st April, 1890, that is to say:—

1. All fees and charges shall be paid when applications are made or orders given.

2. Any person desiring ground for a private grave or a vault, tomb, monument, cenotaph, tombstone, or for any other purpose in the cemetery under the above Act, shall apply to the trustees thereof. If approved, the trustees, on the payment of the required fees, shall issue to such person so applying a certificate of right of burial in the form specified in Schedule A.

3. Any person desiring to construct a brick grave, vault, or tomb, or to erect a monument, tombstone, cenotaph, wall, fence, or any other erection in any part of the cemetery, shall apply in writing to the trustees for permission to do so, and at the same time submit a plan, design, or drawing of such with full particulars for approval. Such permission will be subject to Clause 22 of *The Cemeteries Statute 1864* and Clause 4 of the *Amending Act 1880*; and no label is to be removed from any grave without written permission from the surveyor or other officer, and must be again replaced under their direction.

4. Any order for interment shall be given at the office of the trustees at least eight working hours prior to the time fixed for the burial, otherwise an extra charge of 10s. 6d. shall be made.

5. The name, age, late place of residence, probable cause of death of the deceased, and other particulars mentioned in Schedule B, shall be furnished at the time of giving the order.

6. The trustees shall cause all ordinary graves to be dug; but any person wanting a brick grave or vault shall be permitted to construct the same, under directions of the surveyor or other officer on payment of the required fees, and every coffin placed therein shall be bricked in, cemented, and covered by a slab of stone, slate, or iron.

7. Every grave shall be at least seven feet deep, and no interment shall be allowed in any grave with a less depth than three feet from the top of the coffin to the original surface of the ground after such interment.

8. No interment shall be permitted in any private grave or vault without the production of the certificate of right of burial, or other satisfactory evidence that the person desiring to bury therein is entitled to do so, except as provided for in the next rule.

9. In the case of an application for interment in any private grave or vault, to which during life the deceased person had no claim, the written consent of the owner shall be given in with the order.

10. No burial shall be permitted to take place in said cemetery without a certificate from a deputy registrar of deaths, coroner, or justice of the peace. Such certificate shall be delivered to the gatekeeper before the funeral enters the cemetery.

11. Any public grave may, on approval of the trustees, be converted into a private grave on payment of the fees or balance of fees as per Scale of Charges.

12. In case of it being desired to exhume any body, the same shall only be done on the production, at the office of the trustees, of the licence of the Minister of the Crown authorized in that behalf, and at such hours and on the payment of such charges as the trustees may determine.

13. In case of re-interment or removal from another cemetery or burial ground a verified copy of the licence of the Minister of the Crown authorized in that behalf must be produced at the office of the trustees and the usual fees paid before such re-interment.

14. Until otherwise ordered, the usual hours fixed for the performance of funerals will be from Ten a.m. to Six o'clock p.m. in the months of September to April inclusive, and from Ten a.m. to half-past Four o'clock p.m. in the other four months, except on Sundays when the only hours for funerals will be from Two to Five o'clock p.m. throughout the year.

15. No burials shall be allowed to take place between the hours of Seven p.m. and Seven a.m., except by special permission of the trustees.

16. The time fixed for any burial shall be the time when the funeral is to be at the cemetery, and the same shall be punctually observed.

17. Every funeral shall enter by the principal entrance gates to the cemetery, and no vehicle, except the hearse and mourning coaches, shall be permitted to pass the said entrance. Breaking out of the procession after passing the said gates is forbidden. Horses shall not be allowed to proceed faster than at a walking pace within the cemetery.

18. Any person desiring to place any inscription or epitaph in any part of the cemetery shall apply to the trustees for permission to do so, and at the same time submit a copy thereof.

19. Any person putting up any erection or placing any inscription or epitaph in any part of the cemetery without the permission of the trustees shall be liable to the penalties imposed by the above Act for so doing, and to be further dealt with as a trespasser.

20. Every erection shall be placed on proper and substantial foundations (extending to the bottom of the grave when ordered). No Bath, Caen, Oamaru, or other soft stone shall be allowed to be used in any work. All stones, refuse, and rubbish remaining after any work is completed shall be removed at once. Copper cramps only shall be allowed in the erection of tablets or other exposed stone work.

21. All materials required in the completion of any stone or other work shall be fully prepared before being taken into the cemetery, and shall be admitted only at the principal entrances.

22. No catacombs shall be allowed.

23. No wooden erection shall be allowed.

24. No dogs shall be admitted into the cemetery, and any found there are liable to be destroyed.

25. Any person violating the rules of propriety and decorum, or committing any nuisance or trespass, or injuring any tree, shrub, flower, border, or any erection, or otherwise infringing the above Act, or any rule, regulation, or by-law made for protecting the cemetery, shall be prosecuted as the law directs.

26. No person shall be allowed to take any flower or plant out of the cemetery.

27. No person other than the owner or his agent, duly authorized in writing, shall be permitted to interfere in any way whatever with a grave or enclosure, unless by special direction of the trustees.

28. The surveyor or other officer so directed shall exercise a general supervision and control, under the trustees, over all matters pertaining to the cemetery.

29. No servant or other person employed by or engaged in any duty on behalf of the trustees will be permitted to receive any gratuity for the discharge thereof.

30. A plan of the cemetery, showing the situation of the purchased and other graves, is kept at the office, and may be inspected there; and registers of all grants are kept by the secretary.

31. The trustees reserve the right to make any alterations from time to time in these charges and regulations.

32. The rules and regulations shall commence and take effect on and after the first day of April, 1890.

RULES AND REGULATIONS, AND SCALE OF FEES AND CHARGES.

THE subjoined Rules and Regulations have been submitted to the Administrator of the Government in Council, in accordance with section 9 of *The Cemeteries Statute 1864* (27 Vict. No. 201), and the subjoined Scale of Fees and Charges has been made in accordance with Section 15 of the said Statute.

Rules and Regulations made by the Trustees, 7th November, 1889, in pursuance of "The Cemeteries Statute 1864."

1. The rules and regulations numbered 1 to 32 shall be the rules and regulations of the Port Campbell General Cemetery, after publication hereof in the *Government Gazette*.

2. The office of the trust shall be open daily (Sundays, Christmas, and Good Friday excepted), from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m.

3. No burial shall, under any circumstances, be permitted in the cemetery until an application has been made, name, age, late place of residence, occupation, and probable cause of death of the deceased given at the office of the trust, an order in the form Schedule A obtained, and the fees where not remitted paid.

4. The fees mentioned in Schedule B shall be the fees payable under the Act, and shall be paid at the time of making application for an order.

5. A burial right (Schedule C) shall give the holder and his representatives for ever the exclusive right of burial or interment in the portion of ground allotted as a family or private burial place, and the right on obtaining the permission of the trustees as hereafter mentioned to erect and maintain any monument, cenotaph, tablet, or other erection therein.

6. A permit (Schedule D) will, on application of the holder of a burial right, and deposit of a plan, design, or drawing of the proposed erection, or a copy of the proposed inscription or epitaph thereon, be granted to construct a vault or grave, and to erect a monument, cenotaph, tablet, or other erection thereon if approved by the trustees, and subject to such terms and conditions as they see fit to impose.

7. Any application for ground exceeding twelve feet in width shall be reserved for the special decision of the trustees.

8. The trustees will cause all ordinary graves to be dug, but any person having paid the fee for a private grave, and requiring a grave or vault, shall be permitted to construct same subject to the approval of the trustees. Every coffin placed therein shall be bricked in, cemented, and covered by a slab of stone, slate, or iron securely cemented.

9. Any tomb, monument, or material requiring to be removed on re-opening a grave or vault must be removed and re-erected or replaced by the owner.

10. No person other than the owner or his agent duly authorized in writing shall be permitted to interfere in any way whatsoever with a grave or enclosure, unless by special direction of the trustees.

11. Every grave or vault, tombstone, or other erection shall be maintained and kept in repair and proper condition by and at the expense of the owner.

12. Any grave may, on approval of the trustees, be converted into a private grave on payment of the fees or balance of fees provided for herein.

13. Every grave shall be six feet deep for an adult's body, and not more than two adults, unless the grave be of greater depth or of extra width, shall be interred in each. Two infants being considered equal to an adult.

14. Notice of any burial shall be given at the cemetery eight working hours prior to the time fixed for the burial.

15. Before a private grave shall be re-opened, the consent in writing of the person entitled to give the same shall be given.

16. No order for burial shall be issued until there has been deposited at the Trust Office a certificate from a coroner, justice of the peace, or registrar of deaths, and in case of re-interment, on removal from another cemetery, verified copies of such certificate and of the licence of the Minister of the Crown authorized in that behalf and on payment of the usual fees.

17. The hours for burial, unless by special permission of the trustees, shall be—On week days, September to April inclusive, 10 a.m. to 6 p.m.; May to August inclusive, 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. On Sundays, throughout the year, from 8 to 10 a.m. or from 2 to 5 p.m.

18. The time fixed for any burial shall be the time when the funeral is to be at the cemetery, and the same shall be punctually observed.

19. Hearses and mourning carriages only are allowed within the cemetery, and the drivers are to observe such directions of the trustees, their officers and servants, as may be found necessary from time to time for the regulating of the traffic.

20. Every coffin shall have on the lid a lead plate, with the distinguishing number of the order for burial stamped thereon.

21. No catacomb or wooden erection shall be allowed within the cemetery.

22. No tree or shrub shall be planted in any portion of the cemetery, except as approved by the trustees.

23. Licensed exhumations shall be made between the hours of 6 and 8 a.m.; and in all cases of exhumation, the trustees may, where necessary, impose special conditions, any non-compliance therewith being a breach of these rules.

24. An additional fee, according to the circumstances of the case, shall be paid for any exhumation or sinking involving extra labour.

25. No smoking shall be allowed, nor any firearms discharged within the cemetery.

26. No person shall be permitted to pluck any flower or take any tree, shrub, or plant from the cemetery, unless by authority of the trustees first had and obtained.

27. No dogs shall be allowed within the cemetery.

28. The cemetery shall, unless otherwise ordered, be open to the public from sunrise to sunset daily throughout the year; but the trustees shall have the right by themselves, their officers, and servants, to remove from the cemetery all persons misconducting themselves or violating the rules of propriety or decorum, or committing any nuisance, or trespass, or injuring any erection or tree, shrub, flower, or border, or otherwise infringing the Act 201, or any Act made or to be made amending the same.

29. No person employed by the trustees shall accept any gratuity whatever in the discharge of his duty, nor shall be allowed to be pecuniarily interested in any work in the cemetery other than that for which he receives payment or special authority from the trustees.

30. Any workman employed in the cemetery, though not in the employment of the trustees, shall be required to comply with such general directions of the trustees, or their secretary as may be necessary for the control and good order of the cemetery.

31. Sculptors, stonemasons, and others desirous of erecting tombstones, monuments, tablets, or railings, or of constructing vaults, or of placing inscriptions and epitaphs, shall obtain licences in the form of Schedule E from the trustees.

32. All material required in the completion of any stone or other work shall be fully prepared before being taken into the cemetery. Stones, refuse, and rubbish, remaining after the work is completed, shall be removed at once by the person employed on the work.

Printed forms of tender and conditions of contract may be obtained from the Secretary, Tender Board, Treasury, Melbourne, or from the officer in charge at any station, by whom also information or explanation will be afforded to persons tendering.

As much forage as can be stored at any station where the storage is small will, for the convenience of the contractor, be ordered at one time.

The price, which must be expressed in words as well as in figures, and without alterations, erasures, or discrepancies, must be per cental of 100 lbs. (net weight), including delivery at the stations, and all charges except the bags, which will remain the property of the contractor. At stations where the bags can be at once emptied the contractor will be required to remove them when delivery is taken. At other stations, notice will be sent to the contractor when the bags are empty. Bags to be removed at contractor's expense.

Tenders, which should be upon the printed form, will be received for either oats, bran, hay, or straw (the particular kind of hay or straw offered to be stated); but if all be included in one tender it may be accepted for one article only, if advisable. Oaten hay will be preferred. If sheaf hay be tendered for, it must be so stated in the tender.

Telegrams or tenders not complying with the terms of advertisement will not be entertained.

The successful tenderer will be required to enter into a bond for one-third of the estimated amount of the contract within ten days after the acceptance is notified. Two approved sureties are required for contracts amounting to £150 and upwards, and one surety for contracts under £150.

Tenderers failing to take up their accepted tenders, or failing to carry out their contract satisfactorily, will be ineligible to again hold contracts for Government supplies.

Tenders must be enclosed in an envelope, marked "Tender for Forage," and deposited in the Tender-Box, Pay Office, Treasury, Melbourne; or, if sent by post, they must be addressed to the Chairman of the Tender Board, Treasury, Melbourne.

The Government will not necessarily accept the lowest or any tender.

The decision of the Government will be made known by *Gazette* notice, and by letter to accepted tenderers.

CONDITIONS OF CONTRACT.

1. The hay to be good, sound, and sweet, and properly trussed, except when otherwise specified in the contract; the straw to be wheat or oat, and both to be in all respects of the best quality; oats, clean white (Victorian grown) and bran to be sound and sweet, and of the best description; chaff to be made from oat hay of the best quality; the maize to be of the best quality. The hay tenders must specify whether they are for oat or wheat hay.

2. The supplies are for police, telegraph, and other horses, and are to be delivered on the order of the officer in charge of the district or station. The quantities stated in the schedule being only approximate, it must be understood that the Government may draw either more or less than those mentioned; and should new telegraph stations be formed, or additional horses required to be stationed at any of the stations, the contractor will be required to supply the additional forage. Should the additional number of horses, however, exceed two, the contractor may, if he desires it, terminate the contract by supplying at once the whole quantity due at the station under the contract according to the foregoing schedule.

3. Notwithstanding anything contained in the preceding condition, the contractors for the supply to the Botanic and Domain Gardens may be called upon to supply any other Government Departments within a radius of six miles from Melbourne, and for which no contracts have been taken, at the same rates.

4. The forage, when delivered, must be accompanied by the particulars of quantity, showing the net weight, to be endorsed on the back of the order, which, when signed by the officer in charge of the station, for the net quantity received, will be returned to the contractor, and by him rendered in support of his account.

5. Each contractor will be required to prepare his own account in the prescribed form, and, on presentation thereof to the officer in charge of the station or district, it will be forwarded for payment at the Treasury, Melbourne, or the Pay Office of the district, as may be indicated by the contractor on the account.

6. Should forage duly ordered under these contracts not be delivered within forty-eight hours of the time specified in the order for delivery, it will be competent for the department (should circumstances require it) to purchase the same at the risk of the contractor, from whose account any expense over and above the contract price is to be deducted.

7. In the event of a difference of opinion between the contractor and the officer receiving the forage as to the quality of the same, it is to be decided by a board of survey, composed of persons named by the head of the department ordering the supply, and the decision of the Board is to be considered final.

8. If the Board shall decide that the forage is not of proper quality, it must be immediately replaced by the contractor, failing which it will be procured elsewhere, and the extra cost, if any, will be charged as in clause 6.

9. When a board of survey cannot be conveniently assembled, or when, from some other cause, injury would accrue either to the public service or to the contractor by waiting for a board of survey, the officer in charge will have the power to reject such supplies as are obviously of inferior quality, it being understood that he will be responsible to the Government for so doing; and the contractor must take back the rejected forage, and supply good in its stead, failing which it will be obtained by the officer requiring it, and the expense will be charged as in clause 6.

10. A repetition of irregularity in the quantity or quality of the forage, or of the delay in delivering or replacing it when required, or refusal to execute orders, will subject the contractor, upon report from the Tender Board, to such mulct, not exceeding £20, as the Treasurer of the colony for the time being may direct. It will also be in the power of the said Treasurer, upon such repetition, to terminate the contract forthwith.

11. Contractors are not at liberty to transfer their contracts under cover of power-of-attorney, coupled with an interest or otherwise; and no such transfer will be recognized by the Government.

12. BOROUGH OF PORTLAND.

BY-LAW No. 38.

A By-law of the Borough of Portland, made under Section 213 of the "Local Government Act 1874," numbered 33, for the purpose of adopting Sections 5, 6, 7, and 8 of Subdivision 2, of Part 5 of the Thirteenth Schedule of the "Local Government Act 1874."

IN pursuance of the powers conferred by the "Local Government Act 1874," the mayor, councillors, and burgesses of the Borough of Portland, order as follows:—

That Sections 5, 6, 7, and 8 of Subdivision 2, of Part 5 of the "Local Government Act 1874" be adopted, viz.:—

Ruinous or Dangerous Buildings, &c.

5. *Notice to owner, &c., of ruinous buildings.*—If any building or wall or anything affixed thereon be deemed by the proper officer of the council to be in a ruinous state, and dangerous to passengers or to the occupiers thereof, or of the neighbouring buildings, such officer shall immediately cause a proper board or fence, and if he shall deem it necessary props, to be put up for the protection of passengers and of such occupiers, and shall also if he shall deem it necessary, cause the neighbouring buildings to be properly shored up, and shall cause notice in writing to be given to the owner of such building or wall, if he be known and resident within the borough, and shall also cause such notice to be put on the door or other conspicuous part of the said premises, or otherwise to be given to the occupier thereof (if any), requiring such owner or occupier forthwith to take down, secure, or repair such building, wall, or other thing as the case may require.

6. *Justices may limit time for removal, repair, &c.*—And in default, &c., council may do act.—If such owner or occupier do not begin to take down, repair, or secure such building, wall, or other thing within the space of three days after such notice shall have been given, or put up as aforesaid and complete such taking down, repairs, or securing as speedily as the nature of the case will admit, such officer may make complaint thereof to two justices, and it shall be lawful for such justices to order the owner or in his default the occupier (if any) of such building, wall, or other thing to take down, rebuild, repair, or otherwise secure to the satisfaction of such officer the same or such part thereof as appears to them to be in a dangerous state within a time to be fixed by such justices; and in case the same be not taken down, rebuilt, repaired, or otherwise secured within the time so limited, or if no owner or occupier can be found on whom to serve such order, the council shall with all convenient speed cause all or so much of such building, wall, or other thing as shall be in a ruinous condition and dangerous as aforesaid to be taken down, rebuilt, repaired, or otherwise secured in such manner as shall be requisite; and all the expenses of putting up every such board, fence, and props, and of shoring up such buildings, and of taking down, rebuilding, repairing, or securing such building, wall, or other thing shall be paid by the owner thereof, and any two justices may order such payment.

7. *Materials may be sold.*—If any such building or wall as aforesaid or any part of the same be pulled down by virtue of the powers aforesaid, the council may sell the materials thereof, or so much of the same as shall be pulled down, and apply the proceeds of such sale in payment of the expenses incurred in respect of such building or wall, and the council shall restore any overplus arising from such sale to the owner of the building or wall on demand.

8. *Land may be taken and sold in certain cases.*—If such owner cannot be found within the borough, or sufficient distress of his goods and chattels within the borough cannot be made, and the said expenses or any part thereof remain unpaid, the council, after giving twenty-eight days' notice of their intention to do so by posting a notice in a conspicuous place on such building or wall or on the land whereon such building or wall stood, may take such building or land, provided that such expenses or so much as remains due be not paid or tendered to them within the said twenty-eight days, making compensation to the owner of such building or land in the manner provided by the "Boroughs Statute 1869" in the case of lands taken otherwise than with the consent of the owners and occupiers thereof; and the council shall be entitled to deduct out of such compensation the amount of the expenses so unpaid as aforesaid, and may sell or otherwise dispose of the said building or land for the purposes hereof.

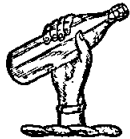

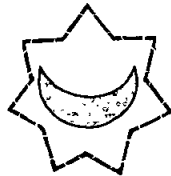
