All candidates presenting themselves for examination must be provided with a book of logarithms, a 40-20 scale, a parallel ruler, protractor, and all necessary appliances (except paper) for plan drawing.

PRELIMINARY CONDITIONS.

I. A candidate must have passed the matriculation examination at the University of Melbourne, including English, Geography, Arithmetic, Geometry, Algebra, and Physics, or such other examination as shall, in the opinion of the Board, be equivalent thereto; and must have served with some recognized surveyor for not less than three years, two of which must have been in the field.

II. Or he must have served under articles for not less than four years some recognized surveyor, two years at least of such service to have been in the field; and must give satisfactory evidence of having received such education as will qualify him for the proper exercise of his profession.

III. Or he must have completed the third year's course in the Engineering School of the Melbourne University, and must have served in the field for two years with some recognized surveyor.

IV. Or he must have completed the full course in the Engineering School of the Melbourne University, and have served one year in the field as above.

NOTE.—By service in the field is to be understood the survey and subdivision of land.

In the event of a candidate failing to pass on first presenting himself for examination, the Board shall have the option of admitting him a second time without charge, or at a reduced fee, if he shall have obtained a certain standard in such examination.

CERTIFICATES WITHOUT EXAMINATION.

Certificates will be granted by the Board without examination to gentlemen who shall produce evidence satisfactory to the examiners that they have complied with the following conditions,

and shall have paid the prescribed fee. But such certificates shall state on the face of them that they have been granted without examination:—

I. Having passed some examination (equivalent in the opinion of the Board to that prescribed in Victoria) in Great Britain, the United States of America, India, or some British colony, and producing evidence of having successfully practised as a surveyor for not less than twelve months in some of the Australian colonies.

II. Or producing evidence satisfactory to the Board of the possession of sufficient professional qualifications and experience, and of having successfully practised as a surveyor for not less than twelve months in some of the Australian colonies.

Examinations shall be held from time to time, as the interests of the Public Service may require; and notice thereof shall be published in the *Government Gazette* of the intention to hold an examination at least one month before the date fixed upon.

PROCLAMATION.

By His Excellency Sir William Cleaver Francis Robinson, Knight Grand Cross of the Most Distinguished Order of Saint Michael and Saint George, Administrator of the Government of the Colony of Victoria and its Dependencies, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS by *The Electoral Act 1865* it was amongst other things enacted, that no election should be void in consequence only of there having been no Returning Officer at the time of the issue of the writ or of any delay in the return of the writ; and where any accidental or unavoidable impediment, misfeasance, or omission should have happened the Governor in Council might take all such measures as might be necessary for removing such impediment or rectifying such misfeasance or omission; or might declare any or all of the proceedings at or for any election valid as to and notwithstanding such impediment, misfeasance, or omission; and every such Order in Council should state specifically the nature of the impediment, misfeasance, or omission, and should be forthwith published in the *Government Gazette*: And whereas an accidental misfeasance has happened in the appointment of a polling-place for the Moira division of the Electoral District of Numurkah and Nathalia, whereby the Returning Officer for the said district and the Police Magistrate acting in the locality did, in error, certify that it was necessary to appoint Picola as a polling place within and for the Moira division of the said Electoral district: And whereas Picola was, in pursuance of such certificate, appointed by the Administrator of the Government in Council to be a polling-place for the Moira division of the said Electoral district, and was in accordance therewith inserted as such in the writ, dated the 16th day of March last, for the election of a member to serve in the Legislative Assembly for the Electoral District of Numurkah and Nathalia: And whereas the Returning Officer for the said district did, after the issue of the writ dated as aforesaid, discover that Picola was within the Nathalia division of the said district: And whereas the poll was taken at Picola for the Moira division in accordance with the writ issued as aforesaid: Now therefore I, the Administrator of the Government of Victoria, by and with the advice of the Executive Council, and under the authority given in and by the 131st section of *The Electoral Act 1865*, No. 279, do hereby declare valid all the proceedings at or for the aforesaid election for the Electoral District of Numurkah and Nathalia, notwithstanding such accidental misfeasance.

TORRUMBERRY NORTH IRRIGATION AND WATER SUPPLY TRUST.—REGULATIONS FOR ELECTION OF COMMISSIONERS.

At the Executive Council Chamber, Melbourne, the second day of April 1889.

WHEREAS by section 63 of *The Irrigation Act 1886*, No. 898, it is enacted that the Governor in Council may, subject to the provisions of the said Act, from time to time make, alter, and repeal regulations relating to any irrigation and water supply trust appointed and created under the said Act, for the purposes, among others, following:—

(a) For determining the period for which the commissioners of any trust shall hold office, the time and manner of election, and the order of their retirement from office;

(b) For determining the manner in which elections of any such commissioners shall be held, and the manner of voting thereat;

(c) For determining the manner in which any vacancies in the office of any such commissioner shall be filled up; and

(d) For determining questions as to the due election of any such commissioner.

Now therefore His Excellency the Administrator of the Government, acting by and with the advice of the Executive Council, and in pursuance of the said provisions of the now in part recited Act, doth for the purposes aforesaid, so far as these may relate to a certain irrigation and water supply trust duly appointed and created under the said Act, and known as the Torrumberry North Irrigation and Water Supply Trust, make the regulations following, viz.:—

1. *Interpretation of terms.*—In these regulations “the Minister” shall mean the Minister of Water Supply; “the trust” or “the said trust” shall mean the Torrumberry North Irrigation and Water Supply Trust; and “the district,” “the said district,” or “the irrigation district” shall mean the lands, as defined by the Order in Council appointing and creating the said trust, wherein the trust shall have authority.

2. *Period for which commissioners shall hold office.*—Subject to the provisions in reference to the first election of commissioners hereinafter contained, for securing the annual retirement of two commissioners, the period during which the commissioners of the said trust shall hold office shall be three years.

3. *Annual retirement of commissioners.*—Two commissioners shall retire annually, but the retiring commissioners shall, subject to the provisions of the said Act, be eligible for re-election.

4. *Term of office of persons elected commissioners at first election.*—At the first election of commissioners two of the persons elected commissioners shall hold office as such commissioners for the term of three years, two others of such persons shall hold office for the term of two years, and the remaining two persons elected as such commissioners shall hold office for the term of one year; and the particular term for which each such person so elected a commissioner shall hold office shall be determined in manner following (that is to say):—

(a) *How term of office is ascertained when no poll taken.*—If the first election is made without a poll, as in the case in these regulations provided, then the particular term for which each candidate elected as a commissioner shall hold office shall, immediately upon such election, be publicly determined by lot by the returning officer, in such manner as to him may seem fit, and the returning officer shall thereupon immediately, and publicly, announce the term for which each individual candidate elected as a commissioner shall hold office as so determined, and shall report the same to the Minister.

(b) *How term of office ascertained when poll taken.*—If at the first election a poll shall be held as in these regulations provided, then of the six candidates elected as commissioners the two candidates who shall have received the highest number of votes shall hold office as commissioners for the term of three years, and the two candidates who shall have received the next highest number of votes shall hold office for the term of two years, and the remaining two candidates who shall have been elected shall hold office for the term of one year; and if two or more than two candidates elected shall have obtained the same number of votes then the returning officer shall determine by lot (as hereinbefore provided in the case of the first election if decided without ballot) the term or terms of three, two, or one year or years during which such candidates shall respectively hold office. But so that no candidate elected shall hold office for a shorter time than the term during which any other candidate who shall have obtained a less number of votes shall hold office. And the returning officer shall publicly declare the respective terms during which the several candidates shall hold office as so determined, and shall report the same to the Minister.

5. *Extraordinary vacancies, how filled, and term of office.*—Should any vacancy in the office of commissioner be occasioned by death, resignation, removal, disqualification, or any other cause whatever, an election shall forthwith be held to fill such vacancy; and the provisions contained in these regulations, as to the nomination of candidates, the manner in which elections shall be held, and the mode of voting thereat, shall apply to any election in respect of such vacancy; and the person elected to fill such vacancy shall hold the office of commissioner during the unexpired portion of the term of office of the commissioner whose seat shall have become vacant.

6. *Date of first election of commissioners.*—Date of ordinary annual election.—The first election of commissioners of the said trust shall be held on the 27th day of April 1889, and the ordinary annual election shall be held on the 27th day of April in each succeeding year. Provided that whenever such date may fall upon a Sunday, or upon any day set apart as a public holiday, such election shall be held upon the day next following.

7. *Voters' lists to be prepared.*—For the purposes of the first election of commissioners of the said trust, a voters' list shall be prepared by the persons upon whose petition the said trust has been appointed and created, and the said voters' list shall be forwarded to the Minister.

8. *Form of voters' list.*—First Schedule.—Such voters' list shall be in the form of the First Schedule hereto, and shall contain in regular numerical sequence and alphabetical order of surname the christian name or names, surname, and address, so far as these may be known, of each person entitled to vote under the provisions of *The Irrigation Act 1886*, or under the provisions of any Act amending the said *Irrigation Act 1886*, and shall also specify the extent of, and indicate with reasonable certainty, the land of each such person, and shall state the number of votes to which, under the provisions of the said Acts, each such person is entitled.

9. *Voting in respect of lands jointly owned or jointly leased.*—In the case of joint owners of land, or in the case of joint lessees of land, the name of any one of such owners or lessees (as the case may be) shall, subject to the provisions of the said Acts and of these regulations, be placed in respect of such land upon the voters' list in like manner as if such land were owned or leased solely by such one owner or lessee, and the owner or lessee whose name is so placed upon the said list or lists shall alone be entitled to vote accordingly. Provided always that if such owners or lessees jointly, by notice in writing, desire that the number of votes to which, under the said provisions, any one of such owners or lessees respectively is so entitled to give as aforesaid may be allotted between such owners or lessees in any manner they may jointly indicate, the alteration or alterations so desired to be made in the said list shall, if the same be consistent with the said provisions, be made when the list shall be revised as hereinafter provided, and such owners or lessees shall be entitled to vote accordingly.

10. *Copy of voters' list to be available for inspection.*—Second Schedule.—Objections to list to be in writing, and forwarded to Minister.—A copy of such voters' list shall be available for inspection, without payment of any fee or charge, at all reasonable hours in the day time, in some convenient place within or near to the district of the trust for a period of seven clear days; and a notice in the form, or to the like effect, of the Second Schedule hereto, setting forth the times and place at which such voters' list may be so inspected, shall be published in some newspaper ordinarily circulating within the said district, and such notice shall state that all objections to the said list must be forwarded in writing to the Minister within the time mentioned in the said notice.

11. *Grounds of objection to be stated.*—All objections to the said list shall be forwarded in writing to the Minister within eight days after the first day of the publication of such notice, and the ground or grounds of objection must be clearly set forth.

12. *Minister to revise and certify lists.*—The Minister shall revise the said list, and consider all objections thereto, and make such alterations and amendments therein as to him may seem just, and shall certify the list under his hand as correct; and no objection to the list when so certified shall be allowed.

13. *Certified list to be voters' roll.*—The list so revised and certified shall be the voters' roll for the purposes of the first election of commissioners of the trust, but shall also be available for any election in respect of any extraordinary vacancy occurring within twelve months next after the date of the said first election.

14. *Voters' list to be prepared yearly.*—Before the first day of March in each year the officers of the trust shall prepare a voters' list in the form of the First Schedule hereto, and such list shall contain, in regular numerical sequence, and in alphabetical order of surname, the christian name or names, surname, and address (so far as these may be known) of each person entitled to vote under the provisions of *The Irrigation Act 1886*, or under the provisions of any Act amending the said *Irrigation Act 1886*, and shall also specify the extent of, and indicate with reasonable certainty, the land of each such person, and shall state the number of votes to which, under the provisions of the said Act, each such person is entitled.

15. *Voting in respect of lands jointly owned or jointly leased.*—In the case of joint owners of land, or in the case of joint lessees of land, the name of any one of such owners or lessees (as the case may be) shall, subject to the provisions of the said Acts and of these regulations, be placed in respect of such land upon the voters' list in like manner as if such land were owned or leased solely by such one owner or lessee, and the owner or lessee whose name is so placed upon the said list shall alone be entitled to vote accordingly. Provided always that if such owners or lessees jointly, by notice in writing, desire that the number of votes to which, under the said provisions, any one of such owners or lessees respectively is so entitled to give as aforesaid may be allotted between such owners or lessees in any manner they may jointly indicate, the alteration or alterations so desired to be made in the said list shall, if the same be consistent with the said provisions, be made when the list or lists shall be revised as hereinafter provided, and such owners or lessees shall be entitled to vote accordingly.

16. *Copy of list to be available for inspection.*—Third Schedule.—A copy of such voters' list shall be available for inspection, without payment of any fee or charge, at all reasonable hours in the day time, at some convenient place within or near to the district of

the trust for a period of seven clear days; and a notice in the form, or to the like effect, of the Third Schedule hereto shall be published in some newspaper ordinarily circulating within the said district; and such notice shall state that all objections to the said list must be forwarded in writing to the chairman of the trust within the time mentioned in the said notice.

17. *Grounds of objections to list to be forwarded in writing to the chairman of trust.*—All objections to the said list shall be forwarded in writing to the chairman of the trust within the time mentioned in the said notice, and the ground or grounds of objection must be clearly set forth.

18. *Special meeting of trust to be held to revise list.*—List to be certified.—In the month of March in each year a special meeting of the trust shall be held for the purpose of revising the said list, and all objections which may have been forwarded to the chairman under the preceding clause shall be considered by the commissioners then present; and the chairman may make such alterations and amendments in the said list as the commissioners or a majority of the commissioners present may determine to be just and necessary, or such as by these regulations are required to be made; and the list, when so revised, altered, and amended, shall be certified as correct under the hand of the chairman, and no objection to the list when so certified shall be allowed.

19. *Revised and certified list to be voters' roll.*—The list so revised and certified shall be the voters' roll for the purposes of any election (whether ordinary or extraordinary) of trust commissioners to be held within one year from the twenty-seventh day of April then next, the said day inclusive.

20. *Minister may appoint returning officer for first election.*—Chairman of trust to be returning officer at subsequent elections.—For the purposes of the first such election, the Minister may appoint some fit and proper person, not being an owner of land within the district, to be returning officer; but for every subsequent election (whether ordinary or extraordinary) the chairman of the trust for the time being shall be the returning officer; but if at the time of any election the office of chairman of the trust should be vacant, the commissioners of the trust may, by resolution, appoint one of their number to be returning officer until the office of chairman shall again be filled; and the returning officer may appoint a deputy to assist him or to act in his room at any election, and such deputy may do all or any of the acts or things which the returning officer is hereby authorized or required to do.

21. *Notice of election.*—Nomination of candidates.—Fourth Schedule.—Fourteen clear days before any election of commissioners under these regulations, the returning officer shall give public notice of such election by advertisement inserted in some newspaper generally circulating in the said district, and by such notice shall require all candidates at such election to be nominated at some place within or near to the said district (and named in such notice) in manner hereinafter mentioned, between the hours of ten o'clock in the forenoon and four o'clock in the afternoon, on some day before a day (hereinafter called the day of nomination) not less than four nor more than seven days after the time of giving such notice, and named therein; and any person desirous of nominating a candidate shall, before four o'clock in the afternoon of the day next preceding the nomination day, cause to be delivered at the place aforesaid to the returning officer a nomination paper in the form of the Fourth Schedule, or to the like effect, stating therein the christian name and surname of such candidate, together with the other particulars required in and by the said Schedule; and such nomination paper shall be signed by not less than three persons duly qualified to vote at such elections, and also signed by the person named therein as a candidate, in token of his assent to being so named, and such candidate or some person on his behalf shall, at the time when such nomination paper is delivered to the returning officer, pay into the hands of such returning officer the sum of Ten pounds (£10), to be dealt with as by law provided. And no person who shall not have been so nominated, and by whom or on whose behalf such payment shall not have been so made, shall within the subsequent provisions of these regulations be deemed to be a candidate at any election of commissioners.

22. *Where number of candidates does not exceed number of commissioners to be elected.*—If at the expiration of the time limited as hereinbefore provided for the nominations of candidates the number of persons who have become candidates as aforesaid does not exceed the number of commissioners to be elected, the returning officer shall then declare such candidates to be duly elected, and they shall be deemed to be then duly elected accordingly.

23. *Where number of candidates exceeds number of commissioners to be elected.*—Fifth Schedule.—Notice of poll.—Hours of polling.—If at the expiration of the time limited for the nomination of candidates the number of candidates exceeds the number of commissioners to be elected, then the returning officer shall forthwith cause ballot-papers to be printed, with the christian names and surnames of all the candidates in full, in the form of the Fifth Schedule hereto, and shall also forthwith give public notice by advertisement in some newspaper generally circulating in the district stating the names of the persons so nominated, and that a poll will be taken for the election of such commissioners upon the day named in such notice, at such place within or near to the said area as the returning officer shall in and by such notice appoint; and such poll shall take place accordingly, and shall commence at eleven o'clock in the forenoon and close at three o'clock in the afternoon.

24. *Retirement of candidates before polling-day.*—If at any election after a poll shall have been appointed as aforesaid any candidate for such election and two of the persons having signed the paper nominating him as aforesaid are desirous that he should retire from such candidature, such candidate and the persons aforesaid may sign and deliver to the returning officer, not later than four clear days before the day of polling, a notice, in the form

of the Sixth Schedule hereto stating that such candidate so retires; and the said candidate or his agent shall thereupon publish in some newspaper generally circulating in the district a copy of such notice, and the returning officer, on sufficient proof of such publication aforesaid, if the number of candidates is by such retirement reduced to the number of persons to be elected at such election, shall on the day appointed for the election declare the remaining candidates duly elected, and, if the said number is not so reduced, shall omit the name of the person so retiring from the ballot-papers to be used at the said election, and if such papers are already printed shall erase such name therefrom; and such person shall not be capable of being elected at such election.

25. *Polling-booth may be hired.*—At such election the returning officer shall provide a suitable place for taking a poll, and may, if necessary, cause to be hired and used as a polling-booth any room which he may deem to be suitable at the place appointed for taking the poll, and may divide such room into compartments as to him may seem most convenient.

26. *Returning officer to preside at polling-booth.*—The returning officer, or his deputy, shall preside at the polling-booth for taking the poll.

27. *Scrutineers may be appointed.*—Each candidate shall be entitled to appoint, in writing, one scrutineer to be present in the polling-booth, and the said returning officer, or his deputy, and the said scrutineers, and any voters, not exceeding four in number, actually engaged in voting, shall alone be permitted at any one time to enter or remain in the polling-booth.

28. *Pencils to be provided.*—The returning officer, or his deputy, shall provide pencils in the polling-booth for the use of the voters, and also a locked box, to be called the ballot-box, with a cleft or opening therein capable of receiving the ballot-papers; and such box shall be opened and exhibited to the scrutineers before the polling begins; and the box shall then be locked, and shall stand on a table opposite the returning officer, or deputy returning officer, who shall keep the key of such box.

29. *Mode of voting.*—Where voter is illiterate.—The returning officer shall deliver to every voter who requires the same a ballot-paper, or if such voter appears by the roll to be entitled to give more votes than one then so many ballot-papers as may be equal to the number of votes which such voter so appears to be entitled to give, such ballot-papers being in the form of Schedule Five hereto, and initialed by the returning officer; and every such voter shall, without leaving the booth, strike out from all or any of such papers the name of every candidate for whom he does not intend to vote. And in case any voter is unable to read or write, the returning officer, or his deputy, if so required, shall, in view of such one of the scrutineers as the voter may desire, strike out the name or names of such candidate or candidates as such voter may designate; and after such name or names has or have been so struck out the ballot-paper or ballot-papers (as the case may be) shall forthwith be deposited in the said box. Provided that all the ballot-papers to which any person may be entitled at the polling-booth shall be demanded and received by him at one and the same time; and no person, having once demanded and received any such ballot-paper or papers, and voted by the same, shall at the same election receive any further ballot-papers, or exercise any further right of voting.

30. *Ballot-papers to be numbered.*—Before delivering any ballot-paper to the voter, the returning officer or his deputy shall write upon the back of each such ballot-paper, as near as practicable to the lower edge thereof, the number set opposite to the voter's name in the roll; and shall thereupon, upon a copy of such roll, check off such voter's name as having voted, and mark against such name the number of ballot-papers delivered to such voter.

31. *Informal ballot-papers.*—If any voter suffer to remain upon his ballot-paper a greater number of names not struck out than the number of commissioners to be elected, the vote given on and by such paper shall be void and of no effect.

32. *What question may be asked.*—At any election of commissioners, the returning officer may, if he see fit, or if required to do so by any candidate or scrutineer, put to any person tendering his vote the question following:—

“Are you the person whose name appears as (A. B.) in the roll now in force for this trust, being enrolled therein in respect of land in the parish of _____, being (here specify land as described in the roll)?”

And no other question shall be put to any person tendering his vote; and no person who shall refuse to answer such question, or who shall not answer the same absolutely in the affirmative, shall receive a ballot-paper or be permitted to vote.

33. *False answer, polling twice, and personation.*—Every person who shall wilfully make a false answer to the question aforesaid, or who shall poll more than once or offer to poll more than once at the same election, or who shall depart or attempt to depart from any polling-booth after having received a ballot-paper without having deposited the same in the ballot-box as hereinbefore provided, or who shall personate any other person for the purpose of polling at such election, shall be guilty of a breach of these regulations; but nothing contained in this clause shall apply to any person only by reason of his exercising the right of voting as often as it appears by the roll he is entitled so to do.

34. *Result of polling, how ascertained.*—Returning officer to have casting vote.—Immediately upon the close of the poll, the returning officer shall, in the presence of and subject to the inspection of so many of the scrutineers of the candidates as please to be present, proceed to ascertain the number of votes for each candidate; and such returning officer shall abstain from inspecting the number written as aforesaid on any ballot-paper, and take care that the same is not seen by any person before being sealed up as herein provided; and the returning officer shall seal up the ballot-papers deposited in the booth; and as soon as conveniently may be on or after the day of the poll publicly declare the candidates, not exceeding the number of vacancies to be filled up, who

have received the greatest number of votes to have been duly elected commissioners of the trust; and if two or more candidates have received an equal number of votes, the returning officer shall in each case have the casting vote.

35. *Ballot-papers, how disposed of.*—The returning officer shall, in the case of the said first election of commissioners, forthwith, after the declaration of the poll, endorse with a description of the contents thereof and sign the sealed parcel of ballot-papers, and forward the same to the Minister, who shall, as soon as may be after the first meeting of trust commissioners shall have been held, forward such sealed packet to the secretary of the trust; to be by him safely and secretly kept for six months then next ensuing, and then by him caused to be destroyed in the presence of three commissioners of the trust; but in all subsequent elections the parcel of ballot-papers so sealed, endorsed, and signed shall be delivered by the returning officer to the said secretary, to be by him safely and secretly kept for six months after such delivery, and then by him caused to be destroyed in the presence of three of the commissioners of the trust.

36. *Minister to determine questions arising upon first election.*—If any question arise as to the due election of any commissioner at the first election, the returning officer shall, at the request of any voter or candidate, submit such question in writing to the Minister, who shall decide the same, and such decision shall be final and binding.

37. *Questions arising upon subsequent elections to be determined by trust.*—If any question arise as to the due election of any commissioner at any subsequent election (whether ordinary or extraordinary), such question shall be determined by the commissioners of the trust at the first ordinary meeting held after the election; but no commissioner in respect of whose election such question shall have arisen shall act as a commissioner at such meeting, or be entitled to take any part in the proceedings thereof, or in any manner or at any time to act as a commissioner until such question shall have been so determined; and the majority of the commissioners whose election is not in dispute shall form a quorum.

38. *Appeal to Minister from determination of trust.*—In event of any voter or candidate feeling aggrieved by the determination of the trust with reference to any such question as last aforesaid, he may appeal therefrom to the Minister within fourteen days from the date upon which the commissioners shall have determined the question, and the Minister may make such inquiry as to the merits of the question as may appear to him to be necessary, and determine such question in such manner as to him may appear just, and such determination of the Minister shall be final and binding.

39. *Failure to elect deemed to create extraordinary vacancies.*—If at any election of commissioners no vacancies or a number of vacancies, less than the whole number which should have been filled up at such election are filled up, then the vacancies which are not so filled shall severally be deemed extraordinary vacancies and to have occurred on the day appointed for such election. Provided always that the commissioners eventually elected to fill such vacancies shall go out of office as if elected at such election.

40. *Expenses of election to be paid by trust.*—The expenses incurred by the returning officer, or under his direction, in connection with any election shall be defrayed by the trust.

41. *Penalty for breach of regulations.*—These regulations shall also be deemed to be regulations under section 250 of *The Irrigation Act 1886*, and any person guilty of a breach of any of the provisions of these regulations shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding Ten pounds, to be recovered in a summary manner before justices of the peace.

42. *Interpretation.*—In these regulations words importing the masculine gender shall be deemed and taken to include females, unless there is something in the context repugnant to or inconsistent with this interpretation.

WHEREAS by *The Irrigation Act 1886* it is provided that any Municipal Council, of Waterworks Trust, or Irrigation Trust, or any two or more together of such Councils or Trusts, or the majority in number of the ratepayers in any proposed district, or the majority in number of the owners of land within any proposed district, such majority being the owners of at least half the land in such proposed district, may petition the Governor in Council to constitute such district an Irrigation and Water Supply District, and to appoint and create a Trust therein. And it is further provided by the said Act, that, before any District or Trust can be constituted or appointed under the said Act upon a petition from any Municipal Council or Waterworks Trust, or from any two or more together of any such Councils or Trusts, or from a majority in number of ratepayers in any proposed district, or upon a petition from the majority of the owners of land within any proposed district, that a petition from owners of land, being an absolute majority of the owners of land within

the proposed district, such majority being owners of at least half the land in such proposed district, shall be presented to the Governor in Council, praying that the scheme or plan of works of such first petition, as set out in the declaration of the Minister published under the said Act, may be adopted in part or in whole. And it is further enacted that, after compliance with the provisions in the said Act, the Governor in Council may approve of the scheme proposed, either with or without any alterations, or additions, or restrictions, as he may think fit, or he may disapprove of the same; and if he approve of the same, either with or without alterations, he shall make an Order in Council accordingly. And it is further enacted that, if the Governor in Council approve of such proposed scheme, with or without alterations, or additions, or restrictions, he may, by Order in Council, constitute the proposed district an Irrigation and Water Supply District, and appoint and create an Irrigation and Water Supply Trust to construct, maintain, and continue the works described in the Order.

And whereas the majority in number of the owners of certain lands situate in the parish of Strathfieldsaye, in the county of Bendigo, in the colony of Victoria, and within the boundaries of a proposed district (shown upon the plan accompanying their petition), being the owners of at least half the land within such proposed district, have, in accordance with the provisions of the said Act, petitioned the Governor in Council to constitute the proposed district (as shown upon the plan accompanying their petition) an Irrigation and Water Supply District, and to appoint and create a Trust therein for carrying out the scheme or plan of works proposed in the said petition. And whereas all the provisions of the Act necessary to precede the declaration in writing, of the Minister upon the said petition having been complied with, the Minister duly published his declaration in the *Government Gazette* on the 10th day of August 1888, in accordance with the provisions of the said Act. And whereas, after due observance of the steps necessary under the said Act to precede such a petition, and on this 2nd day of April 1889, a petition of an absolute majority of the owners of land in the district proposed to be constituted, such majority being the owners of at least half the land in such proposed district, hath been presented to the Administrator of the Government in Council, praying that the scheme or plan of works of such first-named petition, as set out in the said declaration in writing of the Minister, might be adopted in part. Now, therefore, His Excellency the Administrator of the Government, by and with the advice of the Executive Council, and in accordance with the provisions of, and in exercise of the powers conferred by, *The Irrigation Act 1856* aforesaid, doth declare, order, and appoint:—

1. That the said proposed district shall be, and the same is hereby constituted, as from the date of this order, an "Irrigation and Water Supply District," under the said *Irrigation Act 1856*, and an Irrigation and Water Supply Trust is hereby appointed and created to construct, maintain, and continue the works in this Order described in accordance with the provisions of this Order, and of the said Act.

2. That the limits and boundaries of the district within which such Irrigation and Water Supply Trust shall have authority, and which district shall henceforth be an Irrigation and Water Supply District, shall be those contained within the limits and boundaries of the area of the said Irrigation and Water Supply District hereby constituted, as such limits and boundaries are set out in the First Schedule hereto.

3. That the name of the said Irrigation and Water Supply District shall be the "Emu Valley Irrigation and Water Supply District," and the corporate name of the said Irrigation and Water Supply Trust shall be the "Emu Valley Irrigation and Water Supply Trust."

4. That the scheme of the Emu Valley Irrigation and Water Supply Trust shall be on the offtake from the main Sandhurst aqueduct of the Coliban system, and channels for the conveyance and distribution of the water so diverted to the lands to be irrigated. All the works shall be Trust works, except the works of the Coliban system, which are National works.

5. That the source from which the said Emu Valley Irrigation and Water Supply Trust is to obtain its supply of water is the main Sandhurst aqueduct of the Coliban system. The quantity of water which the said Emu Valley Irrigation and Water Supply Trust shall be entitled to take from the said main Sandhurst aqueduct shall be three hundred and seventy millions of gallons per annum.

6. That the rate of payment to be made by the said Emu Valley Irrigation and Water Supply Trust for the water supplied from such National works shall be—during the first year, One half-penny (½d.) per thousand gallons; during the second and third years, One penny (1d.) per thousand gallons; and during the fourth and subsequent years, Three half-pence (1½d.) per thousand gallons.

7. That the total amount of money proposed to be expended by the said Emu Valley Irrigation and Water Supply Trust on Trust works is Four thousand six hundred and thirty-one pounds (£4,631) sterling.

8. That the amount of money proposed to be advanced by the Board of Land and Works to the Trust, by the way of loan, is Four thousand six hundred and thirty-one pounds (£4,631) sterling. That the rate of interest to be paid upon such loan is Four pounds ten shillings per centum per annum, being one-half per cent. higher than the rate paid by the Government upon the public loan, out of which such moneys are to be advanced. The rate of such interest to be subject to reduction in accordance with section one hundred and forty-six of the Act, in event of the interest paid by the Government upon such public loan being reduced.

9. That the number of persons to be elected as commissioners of the said Emu Valley Irrigation and Water Supply Trust shall be six, and the period for which such commissioners shall hold office shall be three years.

10. That the amount of moneys which may be borrowed by the said Emu Valley Irrigation and Water Supply Trust shall not at any time, together with any balances due, from the Trust to the Board, or upon any Trust loan, exceed the sum of Four thousand six hundred and thirty-one pounds (£4,631); and no rate made by the Emu Valley Irrigation and Water Supply Trust shall exceed the sum of Five shillings in the £ upon the annual value of the property rated within the Trust district.

11. That the maximum amount which may be paid out of a loan raised by the said Emu Valley Irrigation and Water Supply Trust in defraying the preliminary costs and expenses of application for this Order shall be Fifty pounds (£50) sterling.

WHEREAS by *The Irrigation Act 1856*, it is provided that any Municipal Council, or Waterworks Trust, or Irrigation Trust, or any two or more together of such Councils or Trusts, or the majority in number of the ratepayers in any proposed district, or the majority in number of the owners of land within any proposed district, such majority being the owners of at least half the land of the proposed district, may petition the Governor in Council to constitute such district an Irrigation and Water Supply District, and to appoint and create a Trust therein. And whereas the majority in number of the owners of certain lands situate in the parish of Strathfieldsaye, in the county of Bendigo, in the colony of Victoria, and within the boundaries of a proposed district (shown upon the plan accompanying their petition) being the owners of at least half the land within such proposed district, have, in accordance with the provisions of the said Act, petitioned the Governor in Council to constitute the proposed district, as shown upon the plan accompanying their petition, an Irrigation and Water Supply District, and to appoint and create a Trust therein for carrying out the scheme or plan of works proposed in the said petition.

And whereas all the provisions of the Act necessary to precede the declaration in writing of the Minister of Water Supply upon the said petition having been complied with, the said Minister duly published his declaration in the *Government Gazette* on the tenth day of August 1888, in accordance with the provisions of the said Act.

And whereas after due observance of the steps necessary under the said Act to precede such a petition, on this second day of April 1889, a petition of an absolute majority of the owners of the land in the district so proposed to be constituted, such majority being owners of at least half the land in such proposed district, hath been presented to the Administrator of the Government in Council praying that the scheme or plan of works of such first-named petition as set out in the said declaration in writing of the Minister might be adopted in part.

And whereas the Administrator of the Government in Council, having taken all the circumstances into consideration, and having ascertained and being satisfied that there has been a compliance with all the provisions of the said Act necessary to be observed before the approval of the scheme of the petition for the constitution of the proposed district as an Irrigation and Water Supply District, and for the appointment and creation of a Trust therein, has determined to approve of the scheme proposed by such petition.

WHEREAS by *The Irrigation Act 1886* it is provided that any Municipal Council, or Waterworks Trust, or Irrigation Trust, or any two or more together of such Councils or Trusts, or the majority in number of the ratepayers in any proposed district, or the majority in number of the owners of land within any proposed district, such majority being the owners of at least half the land in such proposed district, may petition the Governor in Council to constitute such district an Irrigation and Water Supply District, and to appoint and create a Trust therein. And it is further provided by the said Act that, before any district or Trust can be constituted or appointed under the said Act upon a petition from any Municipal Council or Waterworks Trust, or from any two or more together of any such Councils or Trusts, or from a majority in number of ratepayers in any proposed district, or upon a petition from the majority of the owners of land within any proposed district, that a petition from owners of land, being an absolute majority of the owners of land within such proposed district, such majority being owners of at least half the land in the proposed district, shall be presented to the Governor in Council praying that the scheme or plan of works of such first petition, as set out in the declaration of the Minister, published under the said Act, may be adopted in part or in whole.

4. That the scheme of the said Bacchus Marsh Irrigation and Water Supply Trust shall be—

(a.) A channel, with head sluice from the Werribee River, about three miles above Bacchus Marsh, for irrigating about 700 acres of land, and a service reservoir at Maddingley, supplied from the channel, for the domestic supply of the township of Bacchus Marsh; the town reticulation being connected with the reservoir.

(b.) A weir across the Parwan Creek, in the parish of Parwan, from whence will be cut a head channel to maintain a supply in two distribution channels, which will irrigate about 250 acres of land in the flats on both banks of the creek.

All the works of the scheme shall be Trust works.

5. That the sources from which the said Bacchus Marsh Irrigation and Water Supply Trust is to obtain its supplies of water shall be:—1st. The Werribee River, the quantity taken therefrom to be at the rate of 130 cubic feet per minute throughout the year, provided that the Trust shall at all times permit a volume of at least 65 cubic feet per minute to flow down the river. 2nd. The Parwan Creek, two-thirds of the volume of which may at any season be diverted, but not in excess of 45 cubic feet per minute.

6. That the total amount of money proposed to be expended by the said Bacchus Marsh Irrigation and Water Supply Trust on Trust works is Ten thousand five hundred pounds (£10,500) sterling.

7. That the amount of money proposed to be advanced by the Board of Land and Works to the Trust by way of loan is Ten thousand five hundred pounds (£10,500); that the rate of interest to be paid upon such loan is Four pounds ten shillings per centum per annum, being one-half per cent. higher than the rate paid by the Government upon the public loan, out of which such monies are to be advanced, the rate of such interest being subject to reduction in accordance with section 146 of the Act, in event of the interest paid by the Government upon such public loan being reduced.

8. That the number of persons to be elected as Commissioners of the said Bacchus Marsh Irrigation and Water Supply Trust shall be six, and the period for which such Commissioners shall hold office shall be three years.

9. That the amount of moneys which may be borrowed by the said Bacchus Marsh Irrigation and Water Supply Trust shall not at any time, together with any balances due from the Trust to the Board, or upon any Trust loan, exceed the sum of Ten thousand five hundred pounds (£10,500), and no rate made by the Bacchus Marsh Irrigation and Water Supply Trust shall exceed the sum of [Two shillings in the £ upon the annual value of the property within the reticulation area of the township of Bacchus Marsh, and Four shillings in the £ upon the annual value of the remaining portions of the Irrigation and Water Supply district.]

10. That the maximum amount which may be paid out of a loan raised by the said Bacchus Marsh Irrigation and Water Supply Trust in defraying the preliminary costs and expenses of application for this Order shall be Two hundred pounds (£200) sterling.

REGULATION.

The Commissioners of the Werribee Irrigation and Water Supply Trust, in pursuance of the powers conferred by section 95 of *The Irrigation Act 1886*, do make the following Regulation:

No. 1.—REGULATION OF PROCEEDINGS AT MEETINGS OF THE WERRIBEE IRRIGATION AND WATER SUPPLY TRUST, ETC.

1. *General conduct of business.*—In all cases not herein provided for, resort shall be had to the rules, forms, and usages of Parliament, which shall be followed as far as the same are applicable to the proceedings of the Trust.

2. *Minutes of meeting to be read at next subsequent meeting.*—At every meeting of the Trust, the first business thereof shall be the reading and putting a question for the confirmation of the minutes of the proceedings at the preceding meeting, and no discussion shall be permitted thereon except as to their accuracy as a record of the proceedings; and the said minutes of the proceedings at the preceding meeting shall be signed by the chairman; and the rough minutes of the proceedings of the Trust at any meeting shall be read at the close of such meeting, if required.

3. *Order of business at meetings.*—After the signing of the minutes as aforesaid, the order of business of an ordinary meeting shall be as follows, or as near thereto as may be practicable, but for the greater convenience of the Trust at any particular meeting thereof, it may be altered by resolution to that effect:

- (i.) Reading of copies of letters sent by the authority of the Trust.
- (ii.) Reading letters received, and considering and ordering thereon.
- (iii.) Reception and reading of petitions and memorials.
- (iv.) Presentation of reports of committees.
- (v.) Payments.

- (vi.) Ordinary business.
 - (vii.) Orders of the day, including subjects continued from proceedings of former meetings.
 - (viii.) Extraordinary business and new rules and regulations.
 - (ix.) Other motions of which previous notice has been given.
 - (x.) Notices of motion.
 - (xi.) Reading rough minutes (if required).
- And the order of business at a special meeting shall be the order in which such business stands in the notice thereof.

4. *Addresses to Governor.*—All addresses to the Governor shall be presented by the chairman and secretary of the Trust, unless otherwise ordered by the Trust.

5. *Motions.*—All notices of motion shall be dated, and given by the intending mover to the secretary at the close of the meeting of the Trust, or delivered to him at his office personally or by post, provided that he receive them at least four days before the meeting at which they are to be proposed; and such secretary shall number and enter the same in the notice of motion book in the order in which they may be received.

6. *Notice of motion to be given.*—No commissioner shall make any motion initiating a subject for discussion but in pursuance of notice given, as prescribed in the last preceding clause.

7. *Petitions.*—No motion, except that for receiving the same, shall, unless under most urgent circumstances, be made on any petition, memorial, or other like application until the next ordinary meeting of the Trust after that at which it has been presented.

8. *Motions to be moved in order in motion book.*—Except by leave of the Trust, motions shall be moved in the order in which they have been received and recorded by the secretary in the notice of motion book, or they may be postponed by vote of the Trust, and if not so moved or postponed shall be struck out.

9. *Motion to be proceeded with by commissioner giving same, except with consent.*—No motion entered in the notice of motion book shall be proceeded with in the absence of the commissioner who gave notice of the same, unless by some other commissioner producing written authority from him to that effect.

10. *Draft of address or petition to be submitted at previous meeting.*—No motion for an address or petition shall be entertained unless the mover shall at some previous meeting have submitted a draft of the same.

11. *Order, &c., of debate.*—Any commissioner desirous of making a motion or amendment, or taking part in discussion thereon, shall rise and address the chairman, and shall not be interrupted unless called to order, when he shall sit down until the commissioner (if any) calling to order shall have been heard thereon, and the question of order disposed of, when the commissioner in possession of the chair may proceed with the subject.

12. *Nature of motion to be stated.*—Any commissioner desirous of proposing an original motion or amendment must state the nature of the same before he addresses the Trust thereon.

13. *Motion not to be withdrawn without leave.*—No motion or amendment shall be withdrawn without the leave of the Trust.

14. *Motion to be seconded.*—No motion or amendment shall be discussed or put to the vote of the Trust unless it be seconded, but a commissioner may, however, require the enforcement of any standing order of the Trust by directing the chairman's attention to the infraction thereof.

15. *Mover of motion.*—A commissioner moving a motion shall be held to have spoken thereon, but a commissioner merely seconding a motion shall not be held to have spoken upon it.

16. *Designation of commissioners.*—The commissioners in meeting of Trust shall designate each other by their official title, namely, that of chairman or commissioner, as the case may require.

17. *Priority of commissioners.*—If two or more commissioners rise to speak at the same time, the chairman shall decide which is entitled to priority.

18. *Chairman to rise in addressing Trust.*—The chairman shall rise in addressing the Trust to discuss any question, and shall not leave the chair on such occasions.

19. *Commissioner not to speak a second time on same question.*—No commissioner shall speak a second time on the same question, unless entitled to reply or in explanation when he has been misrepresented or misunderstood.

20. *Points of order.*—The chairman, when called upon to decide on points of order or practice, shall state the provision, rule, or practice which he deems applicable to the case, without discussing or commenting on the same, and his decision as to order or explanation in each case shall be final, except when an appeal is made to the Trust immediately upon the chairman giving his decision. On such an appeal no commissioner shall speak more than once, and the question shall be put thus—shall the decision of the chair be maintained.

21. *Commissioners not to digress, &c.*—No commissioner shall digress from the subject-matter of the question under discussion, or comment upon the words used by any other commissioner in a previous debate; and all imputations of improper motives and all personal reflections on commissioners shall be deemed highly disorderly.

22. *Commissioners to apologize for disorderly, &c., expressions.*—Whenever any commissioner shall make use of any expression disorderly or capable of being applied offensively to any other commissioner, the commissioner so offending shall be required by the chairman to withdraw the expression, and to make a satisfactory apology to the Trust.

23. *Commissioner called to order to sit down.*—A commissioner called to order shall sit down, unless permitted to explain.

24. *Commissioner twice offending guilty of an offence.*—Any commissioner using offensive or disorderly language, and having been twice called to order or to withdraw and apologize for such conduct, and refusing so to do, shall be liable to the penalty imposed for a breach of any of the provisions of this regulation.

25. *Strangers.*—Any person, not being a commissioner, who having been admitted to any meeting of the Trust, shall be guilty thereof of any improper or disorderly conduct, or who shall not leave when lawfully requested by the chairman so to do, may be forthwith removed by him, and shall be liable to the penalty imposed for a breach of any of the provisions of this regulation.

26. *Committees of the whole.*—Whenever a majority of the Trust determine, any matter before the Trust may be referred to a committee of the whole for consideration and report to the Trust; and such report may be received and adopted, or otherwise, as the Trust may think fit. When the Trust resolves itself a committee of the whole, the public shall be ordered to withdraw by the chairman, and the doors shall be closed, unless a majority of the committee determine otherwise.

27. *Commissioner not attending order for call.*—Any commissioner not attending in compliance with an order for call of the whole Trust, without reasonable excuse to the satisfaction of the majority thereof, shall be liable to the penalty imposed for a breach of any of the provisions of this regulation.

28. *Commissioners may demand documents.*—Any commissioner may of right demand the production of any documents of the Trust applying to the question under discussion, and he may at any time, during business hours, require the officers of the Trust to produce for his inspection or examination any books or documents belonging to the Trust, but such books or documents shall not be removed from the offices without the permission of the chairman, and then only for short and limited periods.

29. *Voting.*—The Trust shall vote by show of hands, and any commissioner present and not voting, and not being disabled by law from so doing, shall be liable to the penalty imposed for a breach of any of the provisions of this regulation. Divisions shall be taken upon any question submitted to the vote of the Trust, provided any commissioner demand it, before the next business has been proceeded with. When a division is taken, the secretary shall call the names of those commissioners who are present, and enter in his minute book how each vote, whether affirmatively or negatively, and the result shall be declared by the chairman.

30. *Question, how declared.*—The chairman shall, in taking the sense of the Trust, put the question first in the affirmative, then in the negative, and the result thereof shall be recorded in the minutes.

31. *Motions, &c., to be in writing.*—At every meeting of the Trust all motions, whether original motions or amendments, shall be reduced into writing, signed by the mover, and delivered to the chairman immediately on their being moved and seconded.

32. *Amendments.*—(1.) No second or subsequent amendment, whether upon an original proposition or on an amendment, shall be taken into consideration until the previous amendment is disposed of. (2.) An amendment destroying or altering the intention of a motion shall be in order, but an amendment relating to a different subject shall not be in order. (3.) On an amendment to "strike out and insert" the paragraph to be amended shall first be read as it stands, then the words proposed to be struck out and inserted, and finally, the paragraph as it would stand if so amended.

33. *Effect of rejection of original motion.*—If any words of an original question be rejected, the insertion of other proposed words shall form the next question, whereupon any further amendment to insert other words may be moved.

34. *If amendment be negatived a second one may be moved.*—If an amendment be negatived then a second amendment may be moved to the question to which the first-mentioned amendment was moved, but only one amendment shall be submitted to the Trust for discussion at a time.

35. *Mover of motion to have right of reply.*—The mover of every original proposition, but not of any amendment, shall have a right to reply, immediately after which the question shall be put from the chair; but no commissioner, with the above exception, shall be allowed to speak more than once on the same question, unless permission be given to explain, or the attention of the chair be called to a point of order.

36. *Adjournment.*—(1.) No discussion shall be allowed on any motion for adjournment of the Trust, but if, on the question being put, the motion be negatived, the subject then under consideration or the next on the notice-paper shall be discussed, or any other that may be allowed precedence, before any subsequent motion for adjournment be made. (2.) A motion to adjourn shall always be in order except—1st, when a commissioner is in possession of the floor; 2nd, when the commissioners are voting; 3rd, when adjournment was the last preceding motion; 4th, when it has been decided that the previous question shall be taken. (3.) A motion simply to adjourn cannot be amended, but a motion to adjourn may be amended, and is open to debate.

37. *Protests.*—Any commissioner may protest against any resolution of the Trust, and notice of intention to protest shall, in every case, be given forthwith on the adoption of the resolution protested against; and the protest shall specify the reasons for protesting, and shall be entered three days, at least, before the next ordinary meeting of the Trust by the protesting commissioner in a book to be kept for that purpose in the office of the secretary, and signed by such commissioner, and shall be also entered in the minutes of the meeting at which notice of the intention to protest shall have been given previously to the confirmation thereof; but such protest may be expunged from the minutes if declared by a majority of the Trust to be not in accordance with truth or in its terms disrespectful to the Trust.

38. *Lapsed questions.*—If a debate on any motion moved and seconded be interrupted by the number of the commissioners present becoming insufficient for the transaction of business, such debate may be resumed at the point where it was so interrupted on motion upon notice.

39. *Explanations.*—While a member is speaking no one shall interrupt, except for the purpose of calling to order, or asking of the chairman leave to explain, or to call the previous question. A commissioner allowed to explain shall only have the right to explain an actual misunderstanding of language, and shall be strictly prohibited from going into debate on the merits of the case.

40. *Privileged questions.*—(1.) When a question is before the Trust the only motions in order shall be—1st, to adjourn; 2nd, the previous question; 3rd, to lay on the table; 4th, to postpone indefinitely; 5th, to postpone to a definite period; 6th, to refer; 7th, to divide, if the sense will permit of it; 8th, to amend; to take precedence as herein arranged, and the first three to be decided without debate. (2.) When the previous question is moved and seconded, it shall be put in this form—"Shall the main question now be put?" If this is carried, all further amendments and debates shall be excluded, and the question be put without delay. If the question has been amended, the question shall be taken on the amendment first. It shall not be in order to reconsider the agreement to take the previous question. (3.) When a motion and amendment are under discussion, it will be in order for any member to give notice of another amendment which he intends to move in the event of the amendment being lost. Upon such notice no debate will be allowed at that stage. (4.) When a motion is postponed indefinitely, it shall not come up again during that meeting.

41. *Resolutions, how revoked or altered.*—No resolution at any meeting of the Trust shall be revoked or altered at any subsequent meeting, unless notice of the intention to propose such resolution or alteration be given to each of the commissioners seven days at least before holding the meeting, nor unless such revocation or alteration be determined upon by a majority consisting of two-thirds of the commissioners present at such subsequent meeting, if the number of commissioners present at such subsequent meeting be not greater than the number present when such resolution was come to, or by a majority, if the number of commissioners present at such subsequent meeting be greater than the number present at such former meeting.

42. *Special meetings.*—The Trust may hold special meetings, and the chairman or any three or more of the commissioners may call a special meeting, but no such meeting shall be held unless four clear days' notice thereof at least be given.

43. *Notices of meetings.*—All notices of any meeting or adjourned meeting of the Trust shall be in writing, and shall be delivered or sent by the post or otherwise to the place of abode or place of business of each of the commissioners two clear days at least previous to such meeting; and every such notice shall specify the time of meeting; and in case of a special meeting shall specify the object thereof; and no business shall be transacted at any special meeting except such as is stated in the notice thereof.

44. *Power to suspend officers.*—The Trust may, at any ordinary or special meeting, resolve that a special meeting be called to consider the removal from his office of any officer appointed by the Trust, and may direct that notice of such special meeting be given, and thereupon may suspend such officer from his office pending the holding of such meeting, and may appoint some other person to perform the duties of such office in the meanwhile.

45. *Committees of Trust, and quorum.*—The Trust may from time to time, as they may see fit, appoint occasional or standing committees, and may fix the quorum of every such committee, and every such committee shall appoint one of the commissioners thereof to be chairman of such committee; and the Trust may from time to time continue, alter, or discontinue such committee, and such committee may from time to time remove such chairman, and every such committee shall report to the Trust. The chairman of the Trust shall be *ex officio* member of all committees, and shall preside at all meetings at which he is present.

46. *Meetings, chairman, &c., of committee.*—Every committee so appointed may meet from time to time, and may adjourn from place to place as they may think proper, but no business shall be transacted at any meeting of the committee unless the quorum of members (if any) fixed by the Trust, and if no quorum be fixed, three members be present; and at all meetings of the committee, if the chairman be not present, one of the commissioners present shall be appointed chairman; and all questions shall be determined by a majority of the votes of the commissioners present, and in case of an equal division of votes, the chairman shall have a casting vote in addition to his vote as a member of the committee.

47. *Seal.*—The seal of the Trust shall be in the custody of the secretary, and shall not be impressed except by direction of the Trust, and in the presence of at least two commissioners.

48. *Lapsed order of the day may be restored.*—If a debate on any order of the day be interrupted by such insufficiency of number as aforesaid happening, such order may be restored to the notice-book for a future day, on motion upon notice, and then such debate shall be resumed at the point where it was so interrupted.

49. *Committees.*—Minutes of all proceedings of committees, as well as their reports, numbered in consecutive order, shall be entered in the committee's minute-book, and, being signed by the chairman of the committee, shall be presented to the Trust; and the secretary, when practicable, shall attend all meetings of the committee.

50. *Meetings of committee.*—The secretary shall convene every committee within ten days of its first appointment, or at any time thereafter by order of the Trust, or on the written order of the chairman of the committee or of any two members of the committee.

51. *Petitions.*—No petition shall be presented after the Trust shall have proceeded to the orders of the day.

52. *Petitions to be respectful.*—It shall be incumbent on every commissioner presenting a petition to acquaint himself with the contents thereof, and to ascertain that it does not contain language disrespectful to the Trust, and that the contents do not violate any bye-law or any provision hereof.

53. *Commissioners to affix their names.*—Every commissioner presenting a petition to the Trust shall write his name at the beginning thereof.

54. *Petition to be in writing.*—Every petition shall be in writing, and not printed or lithographed, and shall contain the prayer of the petitioners at the end thereof; and the petition shall be prepared in a way similar to that adopted with regard to petitions presented to Parliament.

55. *To be signed by the petitioners.*—Every petition shall be signed by the persons whose names are appended thereto by their names or marks, and by no one else, except in cases of incapacity by sickness.

56. *No letters, &c., to be attached.*—No letters, affidavits, or other documents shall be attached to any petition.

57. *No letters or memorials to be dealt with.*—No letters or memorials shall be dealt with at any meeting of the commissioners unless received at the offices of the Trust, or the office of the chairman, not later than the day preceding the day of meeting.

58. *Deputations to signify intention.*—Deputations can only be received by the Trust when they have signified their intention of waiting upon the Trust, and stated their object at least one day beforehand.

59. *Letters or memorials returned for amendments.*—When letters or memorials do not accurately indicate the localities by giving the number of the subdivisional lot, allotment, and section, and name of the parish, or other technical description, it shall be in order to return the documents for amendment.

60. *Commissioners confined to statement of certain facts.*—Every commissioner presenting a petition to the Trust shall confine himself to a statement of the persons from whom it comes, of the number of signatures attached to it, of the material allegations contained in it, and to the reading of the prayer thereof.

61. *Appointment, &c., of officers.*—No appointment to any permanent office at the disposal of the Trust, except those appointments made at the first meeting of the Trust and before the adoption hereof, shall take place until seven clear days' public notice shall have been given, by advertisement, in one or more newspapers circulating in the irrigation district, and such other newspapers, if any, as the Trust may determine, inviting applications from qualified candidates for the same.

62. *Salaries of officers, &c.*—The salary or allowance attached to all offices and places at the disposal of the Trust shall, in all cases, be fixed before they proceed to appoint any person to fill the same by advertisement inviting applications as aforesaid, and shall be specified in such advertisement, except when the Trust, by special resolution, which may be moved without notice, orders otherwise.

63. *No commissioner, &c., to be surety for officer.*—No commissioner or officer of the Trust, and no assessor or auditor of the Trust, shall be received as surety for any officer appointed by the Trust, or for any work to be done for the Trust.

64. *Expense of preparing security.*—In all cases of security being given for the faithful performance of any duty or contract, except otherwise determined by the Trust, the expense of preparing such security shall be borne by the person providing the same.

65. *Suspension of rules.*—Any one or more of the rules and regulations contained herein may be suspended for a special purpose, on motion upon notice duly given, and shall not otherwise be suspended except by a unanimous vote of the Trust.

66. *Penalty.*—If any person commit a breach of any of the provisions of this regulation, he or she shall be liable for every such offence to a penalty of not exceeding Five pounds.

The foregoing regulation, number one, was made by the Commissioners of the "Werrabee Irrigation and Water Supply Trust," under and by virtue of section 95 of *The Irrigation Act 1886*, this sixteenth day of March 1889.

"THE IRRIGATION ACT 1886."

IN the matter of the petition of the President, Councillors, and Ratepayers of the Shire of Shepparton, praying for the constitution of certain lands situate in the parishes of Marioka, Waaia, Muntoona, Barwo, Kajimba, Drummanure, Dunbulbalane, Tallygaroopna, Congupna, Katandra, Shepparton, Kialla, Arcadia, and Molka, in the county of Moira, in the colony of Victoria, as an Irrigation and Water Supply District within the meaning of the said Act, and for the appointment and creation of a Trust for such district.

Pursuant to section 18 of the said Act, I hereby declare upon the said petition the matters following, viz.—

1. That the scheme or plan of the proposed works shall be—the construction of a weir on the Goulburn River; a main

channel thence to the Waranga Swamp; a storage reservoir at Waranga; a main supply channel from the weir on the east side of the river, main branch channels, minor channels, distributaries, and all subsidiary works connected therewith.

2. That the weir, the main channel to Waranga, the reservoir, and the main channel on the east side of the river, shall be National works; all the other works shall be Trust works.

3. That the amount which it is proposed the Board of Land and Works shall advance by way of loan for Trust works is One hundred and seventy-five thousand six hundred pounds (£175,600) sterling.

4. That the rate of interest to be paid by the Trust on such loan shall be Four pounds ten shillings per centum per annum.

5. That the rate at which the Trust shall pay for water to be supplied from National works shall be Eight shillings for every cubic foot per minute delivered throughout the winter season, and Ten shillings for every cubic foot per minute delivered throughout the summer season.

6. That the quantity of water which the Trust shall be entitled and required to take from National works shall be 15,000 cubic feet per minute throughout the winter season, from 11th June to 15th November inclusive, and 7,500 cubic feet per minute throughout the summer season, from 16th November to 15th April inclusive, in each year.

7. That the Trust will not obtain any water except from National works.

8. That the powers of rating to be given to the Trust shall be Five shillings in the £ upon the annual valuation of the rateable property within the Trust district.

9. That in the meantime, and pending the final allotment of the balance of the water to be conveyed by the main channel, on the east side of the river, the Trust shall be entitled to take from National works a supply of 10,000 cubic feet per minute throughout the summer season, provided it can use and pay for such supply.

- The Baringhup East, Leader Downs, and Laanecoorie United Farmers' Common,
- The Baringhup West Farmers' Common,
- The Bradford Common,
- The Maldon United Town and Goldfield Common,
- The Muckleford Farmers' Common,
- The Ravenswood Common, and
- The Walmer Farmers' Common,

are hereby united and re-proclaimed as a Common under the designation of

THE MALDON SHIRE COMMON,

subject to the provisions of the hereinbefore in part recited Act. —(S.M.50605.)

CONDITIONS OF CONTRACT.

1. All the articles are to be of the best quality of the several kinds, in the best condition, and to be delivered in sound packages, free from all charges for cartage, freight, &c.

2. Supplies for country stations for which no local contract may have been taken, or for which the contract has been terminated, may be ordered under the Melbourne contract.

3. Packages suitable for transport of goods supplied must be provided by the contractor free of expense, and the value of these packages, whether in bulk or otherwise, is to be included in the price demanded, except brandy casks, porter cases, hogheads, butter firkins, and soap boxes (not including fancy soaps), flour, meal, and potato bags, which will remain the property of the contractor, and only the actual net weight or quantity received will be paid for. The empties to be removed at the contractor's expense.

4. Bread.—A sample of the best ordinary retailed to the public will be considered as a test loaf for first quality. Third quality (that issued to prisoners of the Crown) to be made of flour, fine sharps, the produce of prime, strong, thin-skinned, good colored wheat, to be perfectly free from coarse pollard or other offal.

5. Milk.—The milk must be fresh, pure, and of the best quality, and subject to test when required by the department. Should the supply prove to be not of contract quality, any expense incurred will be charged to the contractor.

6. Fresh meat is to be supplied in such proportions as may be required, and, when the quantity admits, to be delivered in fore and hind quarters alternately, also buttocks only when ordered. When shins of beef form a portion of the supply, a fair proportion of the bone, not less than ten inches, must have been cut off. The sticking pieces must be removed from the fore quarters of beef.

7. Potatoes to be dry and free from dirt. Contractors to supply 105 lbs. of potatoes for each cental credited to them, and, in addition, to take back all rejected before being cooked.

8. The supplies coming under the head of Rations and Medical Comforts are to be delivered direct to the establishment entitled thereto on the written order of the officer in charge. All other supplies will be ordered by the head of department concerned.

9. The order issued by the head of department must accompany the goods, and the account is to be rendered simultaneously with the delivery of the supplies. For the supplies coming under the head of Rations and Medical Comforts, the account is to be rendered monthly for such quantities only as are issued, the difference between the supply and issue to be kept at the contractor's credit. Supplies not issued at the termination of the contract to be removed by the contractor. The rates or quantities quoted in the orders cannot be exceeded.

10. Should the contractor fail to supply any articles at the time mentioned in the order, they will be otherwise procured, and the expense over and above the contract price will be deducted from his account.

11. In the event of a difference of opinion between the contractor and the officer receiving the supplies as to the quality, the same to be decided, in cases where the article is not of a perishable nature, by a board of survey composed of persons named by the head of the department, and the decision of the board is to be considered final. In the event of the decision being against the contractor, the survey fees and expenses (if any) will be deducted as in clause 10.

12. If the board shall decide that the article is not of proper quality, it must be immediately replaced by the contractor; failing which, it will be procured by the officer requiring it, and the expense charged as in clause 10.

13. In the case of supplies for lunatic asylums, it will also be competent for two or more of the official visitors, in conjunction with the medical superintendent, to reject any supplies that they may consider not in accordance with contract; and in such cases the reference to a board of survey will not be deemed to be necessary on the part of the contractor.

14. In the case of supplies for lunatic asylums, it will be competent for a board of survey, consisting of the medical superintendent (or, in his absence, of the deputy medical superintendent) and any two officers named by him, to examine and reject any supplies that may be objected to. It must be distinctly understood, however, that the contractor will have a right of appeal to the Treasurer of the colony for the time being; but, pending such appeal, he must take back the rejected articles and at once supply others of approved quality; failing which, the supplies required may be obtained by the officer concerned, and the expense charged to the contractor.

15. As the exact quantity of any article of provisions which may be required cannot be stated, the estimate being approximate only, the Government will not be bound by the quantity stated in the schedule, but will be at liberty to order more or less, according to circumstances, and the contractor will be bound to supply the same as ordered.

16. In cases where the article is of a perishable nature, or when from some other cause injury would be sustained either by the persons to whom the rations are due or to the contractor in waiting for a board of survey, the head of the department, or officer in charge of the station, will have power to reject such article or articles as are obviously of inferior quality, it being understood that he will be responsible to the Government for so doing, and that the contractor must take back the rejected article and supply good in its stead; failing which, it will be obtained by the officer requiring it, and the expense charged as in clause 10.

17. A repetition of irregularity in the quantity or quality of the supplies, or of delay in delivery or replacing them when required, or refusal to execute orders, will subject the contractor, upon report from the Tender Board, to such mulct, not exceeding £50, as the said Treasurer may direct. It will also be in the power of the said Treasurer to terminate the contract forthwith and forfeit the whole or any part of the security.

18. CITY OF BALLAARAT.
BYE-LAW No. 69.

A Bye-law of the City of Ballarat for preventing the commission of any nuisance in or upon any carriage or against any premises belonging to the Ballarat Tramway Company Limited, and for regulating the traffic in or upon such carriage, &c. Numbered 69.

WHEREAS by an Act of the Parliament of Victoria, No. 786, intitled "The Local Government Amendment Act 1883," the promoters of any tramway may from time to time in manner provided by Part X. of "The Local Government Act 1874" make alter and repeal bye-laws. Now therefore, in pursuance of the powers conferred by the said Acts, the Mayor, Councilors, and Citizens of the City of Ballarat, order as follows:—

1. The bye-laws and regulations hereinafter set forth shall extend and apply to all carriages of the Ballarat Tramway Company Limited, and to all places with respect to which the Council of the said city have power to make bye-laws or regulations.

2. Every passenger shall enter or depart from the carriage by the hindmost or conductor's platform, and not otherwise, and no more than two passengers shall ride on the back platform, nor more than four on the front platform.

3. No passenger shall smoke inside any carriage or on the hindmost platform.

4. No passenger or other person shall, while riding in or upon any carriage, play or perform upon any musical instrument.

5. No person in a state of intoxication shall be allowed to enter or mount upon any carriage; and, if found in or upon any carriage, shall be immediately removed by or under the direction of the conductor or any officer of the company.

6. No person shall swear or use obscene or offensive language whilst in or upon any carriage, or commit any nuisance in or upon or against any carriage, or wilfully interfere with the comfort of any passenger.

7. No person shall in any way soil or damage the seats of any carriage, or remove or deface any number, plate, printed notice, or writing on the panels, or break or scratch any window of, or otherwise wilfully damage any carriage. Any person acting in contravention of this regulation shall be liable to the penalty prescribed by these bye-laws and regulations, in addition to the liability to pay the amount of any damage done.

8. Any person whose dress or clothing might, in the opinion of a conductor of a carriage, soil the dress or clothing of any passenger, or any person who, in the opinion of the conductor, might for any other reason be offensive to passengers, shall not be entitled to enter or remain in or upon any carriage, and may be prevented from entering any carriage, and shall not enter any carriage after having been requested not to do so by the conductor; and if found in or upon any carriage, shall, on the request of the conductor, leave the carriage, upon the fare, if previously paid, being returned.

9. Each passenger shall, at the end of or during the journey, upon demand, deliver up his ticket or pay to the conductor, or other duly authorized officer of the company, the fare legally demandable for the journey.

10. Personal or other luggage (including the tools of workmen) not exceeding in weight 15 lbs., or bulk 3 cubic feet, shall, unless otherwise permitted by the conductor, be placed on the platform, and not in the interior or on the roof of any carriage.

11. No passenger or other person, not being a servant of the company, shall be permitted to travel on the steps or back stairs

of any carriage, or stand on the roof, or sit or lean against the outside rail on the roof of any carriage, or on the rail of the platform.

12. No person, except a passenger or intending passenger, shall enter or mount any carriage, and no person shall hold or hang on by or to any part of any carriage.

13. No person shall leave, or attempt to leave, any carriage whilst in motion.

14. No person shall travel in or on any carriage of the company with loaded firearms.

15. No person shall wilfully obstruct or impede any officer or servant of the company in the execution of his duty upon or in connection with any carriage or tramway of the company.

16. No dog or other animal shall be allowed in or on any carriage.

17. The conductor of each carriage shall enforce these bye-laws and regulations to the best of his ability, and if any such conductor fails to enforce the same, as aforesaid, he shall be deemed to have committed a breach of these bye-laws and regulations.

18. Any person wilfully offending against or committing a breach of any of these bye-laws and regulations shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding five pounds.

19. The expression "Conductor" shall include any officer or servant in the employment of the Company and having charge of a carriage.

20. That each driver and conductor of a tramcar shall wear a distinctive badge fastened on the front part of his coat with the words "Ballarat Tramway Company, Limited," Driver No. — or Conductor No. — marked thereon.

21. Any driver of a carriage fearing an accident from persons or vehicles being on the lines shall sound a bell or gong or whistle to caution them to remove out of the way.

22. Any driver or conductor who may be in a state of intoxication when engaged on any carriage shall be deemed to have committed a breach of these bye-laws.

23. Any driver or conductor who shall fail to display sufficient vigilance to prevent accidents to persons or vehicles in consequence of trainways' traffic shall be deemed to have committed a breach of these bye-laws.

24. There shall be placed and kept placed in a conspicuous position, inside of each carriage in use, a printed copy of these bye-laws and regulations.

25. These bye-laws shall come in force on the sixth day of April 1889.
