"THE FEDERAL COUNCIL OF AUSTRALASIA ACT 1885."

By His Excellency Sir ROBERT GEORGE CROOKSHANK HAMILTON, Knight Commander of the Most Honorable Order of the Bath, Governor and Commander-in-Chief in and over the Colony of Tasmania and its Dependencies.

A PROCLAMATION.

WHEREAS by the Act of the Imperial Parliament of the 48 & 49 Vict. ch. 60, intituled "An Act to Constitute a Federal Council of Australasia," it is enacted that the Sessions of the Federal Council, subsequent to the First Session thereof, shall be held in such colony as the Council shall from time to time determine; and further, that the Council shall be summoned and prorogued by the Governor of the Colony in which the Session shall be held, and shall be so summoned and prorogued by Proclamation published in the *Government Gazette* of each of the colonies in the said Act referred to in respect to which the said Act is in operation, and shall meet at such time and such place as shall be named in the Proclamation: And whereas in the Third Session of the Federal Council, held at Hobart, in the Colony of Tasmania, during the months of January and February, in the fifty-second year of the reign of Her Majesty Queen Victoria, and in the year of our Lord One thousand eight hundred and eighty-nine, it was, on the fourth day of the said month of February, determined by the said Council that the next Session thereof should be held at Hobart, in the Colony of Tasmania: Now therefore I, Sir Robert George Crookshank Hamilton, Knight Commander of the Most Honorable Order of the Bath, Governor and Commander-in-Chief as aforesaid, in pursuance of the said Act, and by virtue of the power thereby conferred upon me, do by this my Proclamation summon the Federal Council of Australasia, as constituted by the said Act, to meet at the Parliament Buildings, in Hobart, in Tasmania aforesaid, on Tuesday, the twentieth day of January, in the year of our Lord One thousand eight hundred and ninety-one, at the hour of Eleven in the forenoon, for the despatch of business.

PROCLAMATION

By His Excellency the Right Honorable John Adrian Louis, Earl of Hopetoun, Viscount Aithrie, and Baron Hope, in the Peerage of Scotland; Baron Hopetoun of Hopetoun, and Baron Niddry of Niddry Castle, in the Peerage of the United Kingdom; Knight Grand Cross of the Most Distinguished Order of Saint Michael and Saint George; Governor and Commander-in-Chief in and over the Colony of Victoria and its Dependencies, &c., &c., &c.

I, THE Governor of Victoria, do hereby declare that I have this day assented, in Her Majesty's name, to the Bills passed by the Parliament of Victoria, the titles whereof are hereinafter set forth, that is to say:—

- "An Act to amend the *Melbourne Harbour Trust Act 1890* and for other purposes."
- "An Act to consolidate and amend the Law relating to the Registration of Trade Marks."
- "An Act to amend and continue an Act intitled 'An Act to authorize the Construction of the Cape Patterson and Kilcunda Junction Railway and for other purposes.'"
- "An Act to correct further errors in the Consolidating Acts."
- "An Act to authorize the issue of Treasury Bonds."
- "An Act to apply out of 'The Railway Loan Account 1888,' or temporarily out of 'The Public Account' certain Sums of Money for Railway Works and other purposes."
- "An Act to sanction the issue and application of certain Sums of Money as Loans for Irrigation Works and Water Supply in the Country Districts and for other purposes."
- "An Act to amend the *Mines Act 1890*."
- "An Act to amend the Law relating to Partition."
- "An Act to provide for the Appointment of Commissioners for taking Declarations."
- "An Act to authorize the Sale of the Geelong and Western District Agricultural and Horticultural Society's Show Yards Site and for other purposes."
- "An Act to authorize an exchange between the Victorian Railways Commissioners and the proprietors of certain lands at North Melbourne."

HOURS DURING WHICH GOODS MAY BE LANDED WITHOUT PAYMENT OF OVERTIME.

I. Flores Sea. Non-existence of reef P. D. northward of Flores.
INFORMATION has been received that the commander of H. B. M. surveying vessel *Egeria* has made an examination of the reef P. D., northward of Flores Island, in lat. 7° 42' 30" S., long. 120° 26' E.

On this spot a sounding of 2,700 fathoms was obtained. Consequent on this examination, this danger has been removed from the charts.

II. Java Sea. Non-existence of Ocean Mail Shoal.

No indication of this shoal was found, the least depth in this vicinity being 7 fathoms.

Consequent on this examination, this danger has been removed from the chart.

WHEREAS by the *Passengers, Harbours, and Navigation Statute 1865* it was amongst other things enacted that the Governor in Council, by Proclamation published in the *Government Gazette*, might from time to time define the limits and boundaries of ports in Victoria, and frame rules and regulations for the governance and preservation of the said ports respectively, and for the regulation of shipping in the same, and also for the due protection and preservation and the good government and management of all public wharfs, and might appoint officers to carry out and enforce such rules and regulations; and that any such limits, boundaries, rules, and regulations might from time to time be in like manner altered, amended, or repealed, and others substituted in their stead: Now therefore I, the Governor of Victoria, with the advice of the Executive Council thereof, do by this my Proclamation repeal, from and after the fourteenth day of December, One thousand eight hundred and ninety, all Proclamations made under the provisions of section 40 of the *Passengers, Harbours, and Navigation Statute 1865* aforesaid, defining the limits and boundaries of ports in Victoria, and all proclamations under the said section of the said Act, making rules and regulations for the governance and preservation of the said ports respectively, and for the regulation of shipping in the same, and also for the due protection and preservation, and the good government and management of all public wharfs.

COSTAL PORTS.

Melbourne.—The port of Melbourne shall consist of all inlets, rivers, bays, and harbours contained within a line drawn from a point situated on the west shore of Hobson's Bay, opposite to the eastern end of Little Nelson-street, Williamstown, and marked by a post placed in position there by the Melbourne Harbour Trust Commissioners, to a point on the eastern shore of Hobson's Bay, where the north-western side of Fitzroy-street, St. Kilda, abuts thereon.

Geelong.—The port of Geelong shall consist of all inlets, rivers, bays, and harbours within Corio Bay, and contained within a line from Point Richards to Point Wilson.

Portland.—The port of Portland shall consist of all inlets, rivers, and bays contained within a line running due north from Point Danger to the opposite shore.

Port Fairy.—The port of Port Fairy shall consist of all inlets, rivers, and bays contained within a line running north-east from the eastern point of Rabbit Island to the opposite shore.

Warrnambool.—The port of Warrnambool shall consist of all bays, rivers, and inlets contained within a line running from the outer end of the reef lying off Saddle Island to the entrance of the Hopkins River.

Port Albert.—The port of Port Albert shall consist of all inlets, rivers, and bays contained within a line running from the easternmost part of Shallow Inlet to the south end of La Trobe Island, thence due north to the mainland.

Gippsland Lakes.—The port of Gippsland Lakes shall consist of Lakes Wellington, Victoria, King, Reeve, and Bunga (or Black Lake), and all inlets, rivers, and bays contained within a line running N.E. by E. and S.W. by W. through the mouth of the Reeves River, forming the entrance to the Gippsland Lakes.

MURRAY PORTS.

Mildura.—From the boundary of South Australia, on the 141st parallel of longitude, to Chalker Creek.

Narung.—From Chalker Creek to a point opposite to the junction of the Wakool River with the River Murray.

Swan Hill.—From the junction of the Wakool River with the River Murray to Gunbower Creek.

Echuca.—From Gunbower Creek to the Broken Creek.

Tocumwal.—From the Broken Creek to the eastern boundary of the parish of Boosey.

Wahgunyah.—From the eastern boundary of the parish of Boosey to Indigo Creek.

EUROA WATERWORKS TRUST REGULATION.

THE Commissioners of the Euroa Waterworks Trust, in pursuance of the powers conferred by the *Water Act 1890*, hereby make the following Regulation:—

The following rates and charges are those which the owners and occupiers of lands and tenements shall pay in respect of water supplied by the Trust within the Water Supply District, that is to say:—

1. For every house or tenement used either wholly or partly as a domicile of Twenty pounds annual value, and under the amount which at the rate levied for the year would be payable in respect of a tenement of Twenty pounds annual value.
2. For every house or tenement used either wholly or partly as a domicile of more than Twenty pounds annual value, the amount payable in respect of such annual value at the rate levied for the year.
3. For every water-trough supplied with water from the works of the Trust, the sum of Twenty shillings per annum.
4. For every steam boiler supplied with water from the works of the Trust, Fifteen shillings per annum for each horse-power of such steam boiler.
5. For water supplied by the Trust by measurement, except in cases of special agreement by the Trust, One shilling for every thousand gallons.
6. That for a temporary supply during the erection of new buildings, repairs, or additions, Twenty shillings per cent. shall be charged on the amount of contract for stonework, brickwork, and plastering; or, in the absence of a contract, Twenty shillings per cent. upon the sum paid for stonework, brickwork, and plastering.

The minimum quantity of water to be charged for in each case where water is supplied by measure shall be:—

- (1) If for domestic and other than domestic purposes, the quantity for which the charge at One shilling per thousand gallons would be equal to the amount of the assessed rate which would be payable for the premises so supplied if supplied otherwise than by measure.
- (2) If for other than domestic purposes only, thirty thousand gallons per half-year. No hose or pipe is to be supplied to any pipes or taps for the purpose of watering the ground or trees, or plants, or washing house, walls, or carriages, or for any similar purpose unless the water is charged for by meter.

Any person receiving water from the Trust who shall take and carry away such water from his premises, or who shall allow any person to carry or take away such water, or shall sell the same to any other person, shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding Five pounds.

Any person not having agreed to be supplied by the Trust who shall take or carry away water from any drinking tap, trough, or private or public service-pipe, shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding Five pounds.

No person shall lay any pipe or communicate with the pipes of the Trust without giving two days' notice of the day and hour when such pipe is intended to be made to communicate with the pipes of the Trust, nor shall make such communication except under the superintendence and according to the directions of a duly authorized officer of the Trust appointed for the purpose, and any person committing a breach of this regulation shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding Five pounds for every such breach.

The service-pipes for conveying water from the pipes of the Trust into the premises of the consumers shall in no case exceed the following diameters:—For the domestic supply of premises not exceeding Twenty pounds annual value, $\frac{1}{2}$ -inch diameter; for the domestic supply of premises exceeding Twenty pounds annual value, $\frac{3}{4}$ -inch diameter; for the supply of water for other than domestic purposes, and for all supplies by meter, such diameter as the Trust shall authorize in each case. The Trust may contract with any owner or occupier of any lands or tenements who is entitled to be supplied with water from its works, or who is desirous of being so supplied, for the provision and laying of a service-pipe from the pipes of the Trust to the boundary of such land or tenement abutting upon the street or road in which are the pipes of the Trust.

If any person shall waste water of the Trust by neglecting to repair any service-pipe conveying water from the pipes of the Trust into the premises of such person after having received notice from any officer of the Trust that such service-pipe requires repairing, the Trust may stop the water from flowing into such premises either by cutting off the service-pipe or otherwise, as to the Trust may seem fit, until the necessary repairs shall have been effected.

No person supplied with water by the Trust shall wilfully or negligently allow the same to run to waste, and any person committing a breach of this regulation shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding Five pounds for every such breach.

No person shall connect any service-pipe or branch service-pipe with any steam boiler, for the purpose of feeding or supplying the same with water, without first affixing a self-acting valve for preventing the pressure of the steam reversing or affecting the dial of the meter.

Overflow pipes to private baths will not be permitted.

Water-closets will not be allowed to be supplied direct from the main, but from a cistern only, so constructed that the water cannot flow continuously, and that not more than ten gallons can escape at each flush. No meter shall be affixed unless the dial of the same is capable of registering one million (1,000,000) gallons.

The fee to be paid for a plumber's licence will be One pound.

If any person supplied with water by the Trust does, or causes or permits to be done, anything in contravention of these regulations, or fails to pay his rates, or any lawful charge imposed by the Trust when due, or fails to do anything which, under any of these regulations ought to be done, or wilfully or negligently allows water to run to waste, the Trust may cut off the supply of water from the premises of such person, either by cutting the pipes by or through which water is supplied or otherwise, and may cease to supply him with water so long as the cause of complaint remains or is not remedied. The water supplied in the waterworks district of the Trust shall be received and consumed under and in accordance with these regulations, and not otherwise through pipes and meters laid, placed, and being under and in accordance with the said regulations and not otherwise.

For the construction of these regulations, the word "person" shall be deemed to extend and include a corporation whether aggregate or sole, and the word "Trust" shall mean the Euroa Waterworks Trust.

EUROA WATERWORKS TRUST.—RATING REGULATION FOR 1891.

THE Commissioners of the Euroa Waterworks Trust, in pursuance of the powers conferred by the *Water Act 1890*, hereby make the following Rating Regulation:—

A rate of One Shilling and sixpence in the pound sterling shall be imposed and levied on all rateable property in the Waterworks District of the Euroa Waterworks Trust supplied otherwise than by measure, and liable in respect of rates levied by the said Trust according to the valuation for the time being of such rateable property for the municipal rate of the municipal district in which such rateable property is situate, for one year, commencing on the 1st day of January, 1891, and ending on the 31st day of December, 1891. Such rate shall be payable and collected in two equal portions or instalments, and the first instalment shall be due and payable on the 1st day of January, 1891, and the second instalment on 1st day of July, 1891. Such person or persons as the Commissioners of the Euroa Waterworks Trust may from time to time appoint for that purpose shall be authorized to demand and receive and collect and recover the said rate.

HEALESVILLE WATERWORKS TRUST. REGULATION No. 1.

THE Commissioners of the Healesville Waterworks Trust, the Waterworks District of which has been proclaimed an Urban District under the provisions of the *Water Act 1890*, do hereby, pursuant to and in exercise of the powers and authorities conferred by the said Act, make the following Regulation, viz.:—

1. The rates and charges hereinafter specified are those which the owners and occupiers of land and tenements, liable to be rated within the waterworks district of the Healesville Waterworks Trust, shall pay for the year 1891 in respect of water supplied otherwise than by measure for domestic purposes, such rates to be payable half-yearly in advance, in equal moieties, on the 1st day of January and the 1st day of July in such year:—

- (1) On every house or tenement of the annual value of Twenty pounds or under, according to the municipal valuation of such house or tenement during the said year, the sum of Twenty shillings.

- (2) On every house or tenement above the annual value of Twenty pounds, according to the municipal valuation of such house or tenement during the said year, the sum of One shilling in the pound of such valuation.

2. The following shall be the charges payable in respect of water supplied by measure:—

- (1) Water supplied by measure shall be charged for at the rate of Ninepence for every One thousand gallons (or at such price as may be specially agreed upon). The minimum quantity of water to be charged for in each case where so supplied shall be twenty thousand gallons per half year, or a quantity which, at Ninepence per thousand gallons, would be equivalent to the quantity of water which the owner or occupier would be entitled to receive according to his assessed rate for the year if supplied otherwise than by measure.
- (2) For stand-pipe or hydrant water, for each load of two hundred and fifty gallons or under, Sixpence.
- (3) For a temporary supply during the erection of new buildings, Twenty shillings per cent. on the amount of contract for stonework, brickwork, and plastering; or in the event of there not being any contract, Twenty shillings per cent. on the amount charged or paid for the stonework, brickwork, and plastering.

3. All accounts for water supplied under special agreement, or by measure, shall be paid quarterly, or as may be agreed upon.

4. Such person or persons as the Commissioners of the said Trust may from time to time appoint for that purpose are hereby authorized to collect and recover the said rates and charges.

HEALESVILLE WATERWORKS TRUST. REGULATION No. 2.

THE Commissioners of the Healesville Waterworks Trust, the Waterworks District of which has been proclaimed an Urban District under the provisions of the *Water Act 1890*, do hereby, pursuant to and in exercise of the powers and authorities conferred by the said Act, make the following Regulation:—

1. Any person receiving water from the Trust who shall take and carry away such water from the premises to which water is supplied, or who shall allow any person to take or carry away such water, or shall sell the same to any other person, shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding Five pounds.

2. Any person not having agreed to be supplied by the Trust, who shall take or carry away water from any stand-pipe, hydrant, or any public or private service-pipe, shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding Five pounds.

3. No person shall lay any pipe to communicate with the pipes of the Trust without giving two days' notice of the day and hour when such pipe is intended to be made to communicate with the pipes of the Trust; nor shall make such communication except under the superintendence and according to the directions of a duly authorized officer of the Trust appointed for that purpose; and any person committing a breach of this regulation shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding Five pounds for every such breach.

4. Where water is supplied for domestic use, except when paid for by meter or under special agreement, the supply shall be through service-pipes of the following diameter, according to the assessed annual municipal value of the premises supplied, viz.:—

- (1) For premises so assessed at or under £20 (2-in.) half-inch pipe.
- (2) And over £20 per annum (2-in.) three-quarters of an inch pipe.

Except where a special agreement is made.

5. A supply of water for domestic purposes shall not include a supply of water to any livery or carrier's stables, or for manufacturing purposes, or for any other purpose not provided in these regulations.

6. No person shall apply a hose or pipe to any pipes or taps for the purpose of watering the ground, or trees, or plants, or washing the house walls, or a carriage, or for any similar purpose, unless where the water is charged for by meter, between the hours of seven o'clock a.m. and five o'clock p.m., except by the written authority of the Trust, and any person committing a breach of this regulation shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding Five pounds for every such breach.

7. Before any person shall affix any service-pipe to any pipe of the Trust, or alter, or repair, or in any manner interfere with any pipe, or any service-pipe, cock, or fitting connected with the pipes of the Trust, he shall obtain from the Trust a licence in that behalf to execute such works; and any unlicensed person affixing, altering, repairing, or in any manner interfering with any such pipe, service-pipe, cock, or fitting as aforesaid shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding Five pounds.

8. Before any such licence shall be granted by the Trust, the person applying for the same shall satisfy the Trust that he is a competent person, and shall also hold a licence issued to him by the Public Health Department. The Trust shall have the power of cancelling such first-named licence at any time.

9. The quality of materials required in laying private services shall be as follows:—

(1) The whole of the pipes, tees, thimbles (except those connecting the service-pipes and the mains), bends, reduced couplings, plugs, &c., to be of the best galvanized iron.

(2) All pipes and pieces to be true in sectional form, straight longitudinally, and of equal strength and thickness throughout the entire body of the same.

(3) All ends of pipes, bends, &c., to be properly and truly threaded and capable of being screwed into thimbles, tees, &c.

(4) The whole of the pipes, tees, bends, &c., to be sound and free from all defects, and capable of a hydrostatic pressure equal to a column of water 400 feet.

(5) All delivery cocks and thimbles for connecting the service-pipes and the mains to be high pressure, and made of brass of the best quality and workmanship, and of approved pattern, to screw into elbows, bends, &c.; all cocks and thimbles to stand the same pressure as the pipes.

(6) No service-pipes shall be laid at a depth below the surface of the ground less than ten inches.

10. No meter shall be affixed until it shall have been examined, tested, and approved by a duly authorized officer of the Trust. Each meter must be capable of registering at least one million (1,000,000) gallons.

11. Meters affixed to services shall not be removed or interfered with except upon written application to, and with the approval of, the Trust. Any person offending against this regulation shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding Five pounds.

12. Overflow-pipes to private baths will not be permitted.

13. No person shall, without the written permission of the Trust, water streets or thoroughfares by means of hydrants and hose attached to fire-plugs. Any person offending against this regulation shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding Five pounds.

14. The fire-plugs shall not be used except for the purpose of extinguishing fires, unless any other use of them is allowed in writing by the Trust, and they shall at all times be under the control of the officers of the Trust.

15. The Trust may contract with any owner or occupier of premises, or of any land and tenements, who is entitled to be supplied with water from its works, or who is desirous of being so supplied, for the provision and laying on of a service-pipe from the pipes of the Trust to the boundaries of such land, premises, or tenement abutting on the street or road in which are the pipes of the Trust.

16. No person supplied with water by the Trust shall wilfully or negligently allow the same to run to waste. Any person committing a breach of this regulation shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding Five pounds.

17. If any person supplied with water by the Trust does, or causes, or permits to be done anything in contravention of these regulations, or fails to pay his rates or any lawful charge imposed by the Trust when due, or fails to do anything which, under these regulations, ought to be done, or wilfully or negligently allows water to run to waste, the Trust may cut off the supply of water from the premises of such person, either by cutting the pipes by or through which water is supplied, or otherwise, and may cease to supply him with water so long as the cause of complaint remains or is not remedied.

18. The officers of the Trust shall have power at all reasonable times to enter any house, building, or lands, to, through, or into which water is supplied by the Trust by measure or otherwise, in order to inspect the meters, instruments, pipes, and apparatus for the measuring, conveyance, reception, or storage of water, or for the purpose of ascertaining the quantity of water supplied, or consumed, or preventing waste, and to inspect and examine if there be any waste or misuse of such water; and may from time to time enter any house, building, or lands for the purpose of removing any meter, instrument, pipe, or apparatus the property of the Trust; and if any person hinder such officer from entering or making such inspection, or effecting such removal, he shall for every such offence be liable to a penalty not exceeding Five pounds.

19. The water supplied in the waterworks district of the Trust shall be received and consumed under and in accordance with these regulations, and not otherwise, through pipes and meters laid, placed, and being under and in accordance with the said regulations, and not otherwise.

20. In the construction of these regulations, the word "person" shall be deemed to extend to and include a corporation or company, whether aggregate or sole; the word "officer" shall be

deemed and be taken to mean an officer or servant of the Trust duly authorized in that behalf; and word "Trust" shall be deemed to mean the "Healesville Waterworks Trust."

KOROIT WATERWORKS TRUST REGULATION.

THE Chairman and Commissioners of the Koroit Waterworks Trust, the Waterworks District of which has been proclaimed an Urban District for the purposes of the *Water Act 1890*, do hereby, pursuant to and in exercise of the powers and authorities conferred by the said Act, make the following Regulations, viz:—

1. The Trust may supply water for the making and mixing of concrete, and for masonry and brickwork, at the rate of Sixpence per cubic yard, as measured in the work.

2. Water supplied by the Trust by measurement will be charged for at the rate of One shilling and sixpence per One thousand gallons, and in cases where the supply is solely for purposes other than domestic the minimum charge will be for 25,000 gallons per quarter.

3. The minimum quantity of water to be charged for by meter, where water is supplied for domestic and for other than domestic purposes, shall be the quantity which, at One shilling and sixpence per thousand gallons, equals the amount of the assessed rate which would be payable for the premises so supplied if supplied otherwise than by measure, and for domestic purposes solely.

4. The Trust may grant permission to persons requiring water for domestic and for other than domestic purposes to affix two service-pipes, one for domestic supply, without meter, for which the ordinary assessed rate shall be paid, and one for other than domestic purposes with meter, the water used therefrom to be paid for at the rate of One shilling and sixpence per thousand gallons, but subject to such regulations as may be approved by the Trust against the use or re-use of water from the domestic service for irrigation or any other purpose not domestic. Provided, however, that when water is supplied under this regulation the regulations 2 and 3, hereinafter contained, shall not apply, and the consumer shall, with respect to the water taken by measure, be only chargeable for the quantity actually taken, without respect to the minimum fixed by the said regulations 2 and 3 hereof.

5. Any person receiving water from the Trust who shall take and carry away such water from his premises, or who shall allow any person to take or carry away such water, or shall sell the same to any other person, shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding Five pounds.

6. Any person not having agreed to be supplied by the Trust who shall take or carry away water from any drinking tap, trough, or private or public service-pipe, shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding Five pounds.

7. Upon requisition from any owner or occupier of property immediately abutting upon any road or street along which the line of mains is laid, the Trust will supply, free of cost, sufficient piping of the required size, with stop-cock and cover, to lay on water between the main and the boundary line between such property and such road or street, but such owners and occupiers shall be responsible for the repairing or the renewal of such piping for all time.

8. Before any person shall affix any service-pipe of the Trust, or in any manner interfere with any pipe of the Trust, or any service-pipe, cock, or fitting connected with the pipes of the Trust, he shall obtain from the Trust a licence in that behalf to execute such works, and any unlicensed person affixing, altering, repairing, or in any manner interfering with any such pipe, service-pipe, cock, or fitting as aforesaid shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding Ten pounds.

9. Such licence shall be for such period, and shall be from time to time renewable, as the Trust shall see fit, and the Trust may at any time cancel such licence in the event of the holder thereof, by himself or his employees, committing any breach of these regulations.

10. Before any such licence shall be granted by the Trust the person applying for the same shall satisfy the trust that he is a competent plumber.

11. Any person, whether licensed as aforesaid or not, who shall offend by opening any ground so as to uncover any pipe or pipes the property of the Trust, without giving two days' notice to the Trust of his intention to do so, or who shall in any way tamper with or alter any pipe the property of the Trust without the permission in writing of the Trust being first obtained, or who shall wilfully or carelessly break, injure, or open lock, cock, valve, pipe, work, or engine, the property of the Trust, shall be liable for each such offence to a penalty not exceeding Twenty pounds.

12. Any person, whether licensed as aforesaid or not, who shall lay any pipe to communicate with the pipes of the Trust without giving two days' notice of the day and hour when such pipe is intended to be made to communicate with the pipes of the Trust, or who shall make such communication except under the superintendence and according to the directions of some officer of the Trust, or who shall lay any leaden or other pipe to communicate with the pipes of the Trust of a strength and material not sanctioned by the Trust, shall be liable for each such offence to a penalty not exceeding Five pounds, and in the event of continuing the offence to a further penalty of Two pounds for each day after notice of the offence from the Trust.

13. Lead piping of the following weights:—

and galvanized-iron piping of approved quality only will be allowed for external and internal services.

14. Ordinary connexions with submains must be made with proper stop-cock ferrules to (which for iron services a length of not less than 3 feet of lead pipe if the Trust so order must be attached) one service-pipe only for domestic supply to each tenement will be permitted, and for houses rated at Twenty pounds per annum and under the bore of such service-pipe must not exceed half-an-inch.

15. All connexions with lead and iron pipes must be made with brass union couplings. All joints connecting lead pipes must be wiped joints, and in no case will bolt or copper bit joints be allowed on water service-pipes either in the interior or on the exterior of any building or tenement on pain of cancellation of licence. A high-pressure screw-down stop-cock shall be fixed on each house service between the main and the building line, to be properly screwed and covered with approved cast-iron cap.

16. No extensions of private services will be allowed except by consent of Trust.

17. If any person shall neglect to repair any service-pipe conveying water from the pipes of the Trust into the premises of such person after having received notice from any officer of the Trust that such service-pipe requires repairing, the Trust may stop the water from flowing into such premises either by cutting off the service-pipe or otherwise as to the said Trust may seem fit until the necessary repairs shall have been effected. The service-pipes from the main being the property of the owners or occupiers of the tenements supplied by such service-pipes the occupier (if any), and if none the owner, shall, in every instance in which after notice that service-pipe requires repairing any damage shall be caused by reason of such service-pipe being leaky or otherwise out of repair or broken, be liable to a penalty not exceeding Five pounds, and in the event of continuing the offence to a further penalty of Two pounds for each day after notice of the offence from the Trust.

18. Any person supplied with water by the Trust who shall wilfully or negligently allow the same to run to waste shall be liable for each offence to a penalty not exceeding Five pounds, and in the event of continuing the offence to a further penalty of Two pounds for each day after notice of the offence from the Trust.

19. No meter shall be affixed until it shall have been examined, tested, and approved by a duly-authorized officer of the Trust. Each meter must be capable of registering at least one million gallons.

20. If any meter should cease registering or be reported by the inspector as out of repair, or registering inaccurately, the Trust shall estimate and charge for the water consumed during the period such meter was not in working order, and until it is repaired and refixed, either by taking an average of the quantity used during the previous quarter or during the corresponding period of the previous year, or the Trust may insert a check-meter on the service-pipe.

21. Meters affixed to services shall not be removed or interfered with, except upon written application to and with the approval of the Trust.

22. Baths to be filled must not exceed 6 feet 3 inches in length along the centre line, by a mean depth of 1 foot 9 inches, and a width of 2 feet, the section of bottom to be a segment of a circle, the ends to be circular in shape and sloping inwards. Overflow pipes will not be permitted.

23. Any person, whether licensed as aforesaid or not, connecting any service-pipe, or branch service-pipe with any steam boiler for the purpose of feeding or supplying the same with water, without first affixing a self-acting valve for preventing the pressure of the steam reversing or affecting the dial of the meter, shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding Five pounds, and in the event of continuing the offence to a further penalty of Two pounds for each day after notice of the offence from the Trust.

24. No person shall, without the written permission of the Trust, water streets or thoroughfares by means of hydrants and hose attached to fire-plugs. Any person offending against this regulation shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding Five pounds.

25. The water supply of all public parks and gardens shall be exclusively under the control and direction of the officers of the Water Trust, and any person, not duly authorized, turning on the water or otherwise interfering with such water supply shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding Five pounds.

26. No person shall use a hose attached to any tap or pipe used for the purpose of supplying the water of the Trust for domestic purposes to any house or premises for watering any garden, laying dust, or any other purpose whatsoever, unless where a water-meter is fixed and the water supplied by measure, and any person offending against this regulation shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding Five pounds.

27. In the construction of these regulations the word "person" shall be deemed to extend to and include a corporation whether aggregate or sole.

Such rate shall be payable and collected in two equal portions or instalments, and the first instalment shall be due and payable on the 1st day of January, 1891, and the second instalment upon the 1st day of July in the same year. Such person or persons as the Commissioners of the Kyneton Shire Waterworks Trust may from time to time appoint for that purpose shall be authorized to demand and receive and collect and recover the said rate.

**MARYBOROUGH WATERWORKS TRUST.—RATING
REGULATION FOR 1891.**

THE Chairman and the Commissioners of the Maryborough Waterworks Trust, the waterworks district of which has been proclaimed an Urban District for the purpose of the *Water Act 1890*, do hereby, pursuant to and in exercise of the powers and authorities conferred by the said Act, make the following Regulation, viz:—

REGULATION No. 10.

The following are the rates and charges which the owners or occupiers of lands and tenements liable to be rated shall pay, for the year 1891, in respect of water supplied by the Trust within the said Urban District:—

1. For every house or tenement of Ten pounds annual municipal value, or under, the sum of One pound sterling.
2. For every house or tenement above Ten pounds, and not exceeding Fourteen pounds annual municipal value, an amount of Ten per cent. on the annual municipal value of such property.
3. For every house or tenement above Fourteen pounds, and not exceeding Nineteen pounds annual municipal value, the sum of One pound ten shillings.
4. For every house or tenement of Twenty pounds, and not exceeding Twenty-five pounds annual municipal value, an amount of Eight and three-quarters (8 $\frac{3}{4}$) per cent. per annum upon the annual municipal value of such property.
5. For every house or tenement of Twenty-six pounds, and not exceeding Thirty-five pounds annual municipal value, the sum of Two pounds five shillings.
6. For every house or tenement of Thirty-six pounds annual municipal value, and upwards, an amount equal to Six and a quarter (6 $\frac{1}{4}$) per cent. upon the annual municipal value of such property.
7. For every house or tenement not being used as a domicile of Twenty pounds annual municipal value, and under, One pound sterling.
8. For every house or tenement not being used as a domicile of above Twenty pounds annual municipal value, an amount of Five per cent. on the annual municipal value of such property.
9. For every unoccupied piece or allotment of land of Ten pounds annual municipal value, or under, the sum of One pound sterling.
10. For every unoccupied piece or allotment of land of Eleven pounds annual municipal value, and upwards, an amount equal to five per cent. on the annual municipal value of such piece or allotment of land. Provided that in any case the rate shall not be less than the sum of One pound.
11. For every water trough One pound per annum will be charged, and the minimum quantity of water to be charged for to all owners or occupiers of troughs supplied through a meter shall be 8,000 gallons.
12. For water supplied by the Trust by measurement, Two shillings and sixpence per 1,000 gallons (or at such price as may be specially agreed upon), and the minimum quantity of water to be charged to all owners or occupiers of gardens (except market

gardens) and lawns, or other lands where water is supplied by the Trust by measurement for the purpose of irrigation, or for ornamental purposes, shall be as follows:—

Exceeding one-quarter of an acre, but not exceeding half an acre, per annum, 16,000 gallons; exceeding half an acre, but not exceeding one acre, per annum, 24,000 gallons; for every additional acre, and proportionately according to the foregoing scale, for every fractional part of an acre.

In livery and carriers' stables supplied by the Trust with water by measurement, the minimum quantity to be charged for shall be 2,000 gallons per stall used for stabling horses. In open sheds used for the above purposes, each space of 5 feet shall be charged for as a stall.

13. For a temporary supply during erection of new buildings, Ten shillings per cent. on the amount of contract for stonework, brickwork, and plastering; or, if there be no contract, then upon the value of or the amount charged or paid for such stonework, brickwork, or plastering.

14. For water supplied to market gardens; the charge shall be Two shillings and sixpence per 1,000 gallons; the minimum quantity to be charged for shall be 40,000 gallons per acre, and proportionately for every fractional part of an acre.

15. For water supplied to cricket and bowling clubs, Sixpence per 1,000 gallons.

16. For every steam boiler supplied with water from the works of the Trust by measurement, the charge shall be Two shillings and sixpence per 1,000 gallons, and the minimum quantity to be charged for shall be 4,000 gallons for each inch of the diameter of the cylinder of the engine.

17. For water supplied to syphon pumps, Twenty shillings each per annum, in addition to the rate hereby made for a supply for domestic or other purposes.

18. For water supplied for private fountains, Twenty shillings each per annum, in addition to the rate hereby made for a supply for domestic or other purposes.

That the before-mentioned rates and charges shall be payable half-yearly in advance on the 1st day of January and on the 1st day of July, 1891, excepting the charges for water supplied by measure, which shall be paid for quarterly.

Such person or persons as the Commissioners of the Maryborough Waterworks Trust may from time to time appoint for that purpose shall be authorized to demand and receive, and collect and recover the said rates and charges.

MURCHISON WATERWORKS TRUST REGULATIONS.

THE Commissioners of the Murchison Waterworks Trust, the waterworks district of which has been proclaimed an urban district, do hereby, in pursuance of the powers conferred by the *Water Act 1890*, make the following Regulation:—

REGULATION No. 1.

The following charges are those which the owners and occupiers of lands and tenements shall pay in respect of water supplied by the Trust within the Water Supply District.

1. For water supplied by the Trust by measurement (except in cases of special agreement with the Trust) One shilling and sixpence for every one thousand gallons.
2. The minimum quantity of water to be charged for in each case when water is supplied by measure shall be:—
 - (1) If for domestic and other than domestic purposes, the quantity for which the charge at One shilling and sixpence per thousand gallons would be equal to the amount of the assessed rate which would be payable for the premises so supplied if supplied otherwise than by measure.
 - (2) If for other than domestic purposes, twenty thousand gallons per half-year.
3. No hose or pipe is to be applied to any pipes or taps for the purpose of watering the ground, or any garden, trees, or plants, or washing any house, walls, or carriages, or for any similar purpose, unless the water is charged for by meter. Any person offending against this regulation shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding Five pounds.
4. Any person receiving water from the Trust who shall take and carry away such water from the premises, or who shall allow any person to carry or take away such water, or shall sell the same to any other person, shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding Five pounds.
5. The service-pipes for conveying water from the pipes of the Trust into the premises of consumers shall in no case exceed the following diameter:—

For the domestic supply of premises not exceeding Twenty pounds annual value, $\frac{1}{2}$ -inch diameter.

For the domestic supply of premises exceeding Twenty pounds annual value, $\frac{3}{4}$ -inch diameter.

For the supply of water for other than domestic purposes, and for all supplies by meter, such diameter as the Trust shall authorize in each case.

6. The Trust may contract with any owner or occupier of any lands or tenements who is entitled to be supplied with water from its works, or who is desirous of being so supplied for the provision and laying of a service-pipe from the pipes of the Trust, to the boundary of such land or tenement abutting on the street or road in which are the pipes of the Trust.

7. No person shall connect any service-pipe, or branch service-pipe, with any steam boiler, for the purpose of feeding or supplying the same with water, without affixing a self-acting valve for preventing the pressure of the steam reversing or affecting the dial of the meter. Any person committing a breach of this regulation shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding Five pounds.

8. Overflow pipes to private baths will not be permitted.

9. No meter shall be affixed unless the dial of the same is capable of registering one million gallons.

10. If any person supplied with water by the Trust does, or causes or permits to be done, anything in contravention of these regulations, or fails to pay his rates, or any lawful charge imposed by the Trust when due, or fails to do anything which under any of these regulations ought to be done, or wilfully or negligently allows water to run to waste, the Trust may cut off the supply of water from the premises of such persons either by cutting the pipes by or through which the water is supplied, and may cease to supply him with water.

11. The water supplied in the waterworks district of the Trust shall be received and consumed under and in accordance with these regulations, and not otherwise through pipes and meters laid placed and being under and in accordance with the said regulations and not otherwise.

12. In the construction of these regulations the word "person" shall be deemed to extend to and include a corporation, whether aggregate or sole, and the word "Trust" shall mean "The Murchison Waterworks Trust."

REGULATION No. 2.

THE Chairman and Commissioners of the Tatura Waterworks Trust, the waterworks district of which has been proclaimed an urban district for the purposes of the *Water Act 1890*, do hereby, in pursuance of the powers conferred by the said Act, make the following Regulation:—

1. For water supplied by the Trust by measurement (except in cases of special agreement with the Trust), a charge of Two shillings for every one thousand gallons shall be made.

2. The minimum quantity of water to be charged for in each case when water is supplied by measure shall be:—

(a) If for domestic and other than domestic purposes, the quantity for which the charge at Two shillings per thousand gallons would be equal to the amount of the assessed rate which would be payable for the premises so supplied if supplied otherwise than by measure.

(b) If for other than domestic purposes, twenty thousand gallons per half-year.

3. No hose or pipe is to be applied to any pipes or taps for the purpose of watering the ground, or trees or plants, or washing house walls or carriages, or for any similar purpose, unless the water is charged for by measure and supplied through a meter.

4. Any person receiving water from the Trust who shall take and carry away such water from the premises, or who shall allow any person to carry or take away any such water, or shall sell the same to any other person, shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding Five pounds.

5. The service-pipes for conveying water from the pipes of the Trust into the premises of consumers shall in no case exceed the following diameters:—For the domestic supply of premises not exceeding Twenty pounds annual municipal value, $\frac{3}{4}$ -inch diameter; for the domestic supply of premises exceeding Twenty pounds annual municipal value, $\frac{1}{2}$ -inch diameter; for the supply of water for other than domestic purposes, and for all supplies by meter, such diameter as the Trust shall authorize in each case.

6. The Trust may contract with any owner or occupier of any lands or tenements who is entitled to be supplied with water from its works, or who is desirous of being so supplied, for the provision and laying of a service-pipe from the pipes of the Trust to the boundary of such land or tenement abutting on the street or road in which are the pipes of the Trust.

7. No person shall connect any service-pipe or branch service-pipe with any steam boiler for the purpose of feeding or supplying the same with water, without first affixing a self-acting valve for preventing the pressure of the steam reversing or affecting the dial of the meter.

8. Overflow-pipes to private baths will not be permitted.

9. Water-closets will not be allowed to be supplied direct from the main, but from a cistern only, so constructed that the water cannot flow continuously, and that not more than two gallons can escape at each flush.

10. No meter shall be affixed unless the same shall have been submitted to and approved by the Trust, or by such officer as may be appointed for that purpose.

11. If any person supplied with water by the Trust does, or causes or permits to be done, anything in contravention of these regulations, or fails to pay his rates or any lawful charge imposed by the Trust when due, or fails to do anything which under any of these regulations ought to be done, or wilfully or negligently allows water to run to waste, the Trust may cut off the supply of water from the premises of such person, either by cutting the pipes by or through which water is supplied or otherwise, and may cease to supply him with water so long as the cause of complaint remains or is not remedied.

12. The water supplied in the waterworks district of the Trust shall be received and consumed under and in accordance with these regulations and not otherwise, through pipes and meters laid, placed, and being under and in accordance with the said regulations and not otherwise.

13. No person, other than a plumber licensed by the Trust, will be permitted to tap or in any way interfere with any main the property of the Trust. The fee for a plumber's licence shall be £1.

14. In the construction of these regulations the word "person" shall be deemed to extend to and include a corporation whether aggregate or sole, and the word "Trust" shall mean the Tatura Waterworks Trust.

ALTERATION OF TRAINS.

DEFINITION OF LIMITS AND BOUNDARIES OF PORTS IN VICTORIA.

PROCLAMATION

By His Excellency the Right Honorable John Adrian Louis, Earl of Hopetoun, Viscount Aithrie, and Baron Hope, in the Peerage of Scotland; Baron Hopetoun of Hopetoun, and Baron Niddry of Niddry Castle, in the Peerage of the United Kingdom; Knight Grand Cross of the Most Distinguished Order of Saint Michael and Saint George; Governor and Commander-in-Chief in and over the Colony of Victoria and its Dependencies, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS by the *Marine Act* 1890 it is amongst other things enacted that the Governor in Council by proclamation published in the *Government Gazette* may from time to time define the limits and boundaries of ports in Victoria, and frame rules and regulations for the governance and preservation of the said ports respectively and for the regulation of shipping in the same, and also for the due protection and preservation and the good government and management of all public wharfs, and may appoint officers to carry out and enforce such rules and regulations; and any such limits, boundaries, rules and regulations may from time to time be in like manner altered, amended, or repealed, and others substituted in their stead: Now therefore I, the Governor of Victoria, with the advice of the Executive Council, do hereby define the limits and boundaries of the following ports to be as follow:—

The port of Port Phillip shall consist of all inlets, rivers, bays, and harbours within a line drawn from Point Lonsdale to Point Nepean, and not included in the ports of Melbourne and Geelong respectively.

The port of Melbourne shall consist of all inlets, rivers, bays, and harbours contained within a line drawn from a point situated on the west shore of Hobson's Bay opposite to the eastern end of Little Nelson-street, Williamstown, and marked by a post placed in position there by the Melbourne Harbour Trust Commissioners, thence to a point on the eastern shore of Hobson's Bay where the north-western side of Fitzroy-street, St. Kilda, abuts thereon.

The port of Geelong shall consist of all inlets, rivers, bays, and harbours within Corio Bay, and contained within a line drawn from Point Richards to Point Wilson.

The port of Portland shall consist of all inlets, rivers, and bays contained within a line running due north from Point Danger to the opposite shore.

The port of Belfast shall consist of all inlets, rivers, and bays contained within a line running north-east from the eastern point of Rabbit Island to the opposite shore.

The port of Warrnambool shall consist of all bays, rivers, and inlets contained within a line running from the outer end of the reef lying off Saddle Island to the entrance of the Hopkins River.

The port of Western Port shall consist of all inlets, rivers, and bays contained within a line drawn from Black-head to Point Grant, and from Cape Woolamai to Point Griffiths.

The port of Corner Inlet shall consist of all inlets, rivers, and bays contained within a line running from Entrance Point to north end of La Trobe Island, thence due north to the main land.

The port of Port Albert shall consist of all inlets, rivers, and bays contained within a line running from the easternmost part of Shallow Inlet to the south end of La Trobe Island, thence due north to the main land.

The port of Gippsland Lakes shall consist of Lakes Wellington, Victoria, King, Reeve, and Bunga (or Black Lake), and all inlets, rivers, and bays contained within a

line running N.E. by E. and S.W. by W. through the mouth of Reeves River forming the entrance to the Gippsland Lakes.

Anderson's Inlet. The port of Anderson's Inlet shall consist of all rivers, lakes, and inlets contained within a line drawn from Eagle's Nest Head to Point Smythe.

Snowy River. The port of Snowy River shall consist of all rivers, lakes, bays, creeks, and inlets contained within a line running E. by N. and W. by S. through the entrance to the Snowy River.

PROCLAMATION

By His Excellency the Right Honorable John Adrian Louis, Earl of Hopetoun, Viscount Aithrie, and Baron Hope, in the Peerage of Scotland; Baron Hopetoun of Hopetoun, and Baron Niddry of Niddry Castle, in the Peerage of the United Kingdom; Knight Grand Cross of the Most Distinguished Order of Saint Michael and Saint George; Governor and Commander-in-Chief in and over the Colony of Victoria and its Dependencies, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS by the *Marine Act* 1890 it is amongst other things enacted that the Governor in Council by proclamation published in the *Government Gazette* may from time to time define the limits and boundaries of ports in Victoria, and frame rules and regulations for the governance and preservation of the said ports respectively and for the regulation of shipping in the same, and also for the due protection and preservation of and the good government and management of all public wharfs, and may appoint officers to carry out and enforce such rules and regulations; and any such limits, boundaries, rules and regulations may from time to time be in like manner altered, amended, or repealed, and others substituted in their stead: Now therefore I, the Governor of Victoria, with the advice of the Executive Council, do hereby make the following rules for the ports in Victoria.

GENERAL RULES AND ORDERS FOR ALL PORTS AND HARBOURS IN VICTORIA.

The person in charge of any ship from other than Australasian ports shall, when entering any port of Victoria, hoist and keep an ensign and a blue flag flying at the mainmast-head until the vessel has been boarded and cleared by the Health Officer, when the ensign shall be hauled down, but the blue flag shall be kept flying until the ship has been cleared by the Immigration Officer, if such vessel have passengers on board; if there be no passengers on board such ship, the blue flag may be hauled down at the same time as the ensign.

Flag for vessels
from Australasian
ports.

2. The person in charge of any ship having passengers on board from any Australasian port (not in Victoria), shall, when entering any port in Victoria, hoist a blue flag at the mainmast-head, and keep it flying until such ship has been cleared by the Immigration Officer.

Boarding vessels.

3. No person, except the Pilot and Health and Immigration Officers, and boatmen employed to convey them, shall, with any vessel or boat whatever, go alongside of any ship

from other than an Australasian port, when entering or within any port in Victoria, before she has been cleared by the Health Officer, nor shall any person except the Pilot or the Officer of Health, board any such ship before she has been so cleared.

4. No person, except the Pilot and duly authorized Boarding vessels. officers of Government, and such reporters for the press and shipping clerks as may be authorized in writing by the Secretary for Trade and Customs, shall go on board of or leave any ship carrying passengers entering or within any port until such vessel has been cleared by the Immigration Officer, which clearance shall be indicated by the blue flag being hauled down: Provided, nevertheless, that agents of ships and their authorized clerks, may, by written permission from the Secretary of Trade and Customs, go on board vessels consigned to them *after* the clearing officer has boarded, and with his concurrence, notwithstanding that the blue flag may be still flying.

5. The master of any ship entering any port in Victoria shall furnish the Health Officer, Pilot, or Immigration Officer with a written report of his voyage, cargo, and passengers, and such information relating to the same as Master to report to boarding officer. may be required.

The Pilot, on boarding any vessel arriving at Port Phillip Heads from other than Australasian ports, shall deliver to the master or person in charge of such vessel a form containing the questions relating to Health prescribed by section 168 of the *Health Act* 1890; and shall carefully examine the written replies given to such questions by the master or person in charge of such vessel.

If it shall appear to the Pilot from the answers to such questions that such vessel has arrived from, or touched at, any port which shall have been declared by the Governor in Council to be infected, under section 160 of the *Health Act* 1890, or that there is then on board or that there has occurred on board during the voyage, any case of small-pox or any other form of eruptive skin disease, fever, plague, cholera, or any other dangerous, infectious, or contagious disease, the Pilot shall cause such vessel to be at once anchored as close as may be convenient to the Sanatory Station Jetty, for inspection by the Health Officer.

In all other cases the Master or Pilot shall cause such vessel to be taken direct either to the Port of Melbourne or the Port of Geelong, as the case may be, for inspection by the Health Officer there.

Mail steamers carrying mails for the Western District which require to be landed at Queenscliff shall be inspected and cleared by the Health Officer before such mails are landed.

6. If, and so soon as, the Pilot finds from the answers to Health questions answered to pilot. the health questions that it is necessary that the vessel be taken to the Sanatory Station for inspection, he shall hoist and keep flying a yellow flag at the foremast head, and the Signal-master at Queenscliff shall thereupon telegraph to the Health Officer at the Sanatory Station that a vessel requires health inspection.

Any vessel arriving at the Heads during the night time, and requiring health inspection, shall be anchored in the Quarantine anchorage, Point Nepean, for inspection on the following morning.

So soon as the Health Officer places a ship in quarantine, the master of such vessel shall forthwith cause a yellow flag to be hoisted and kept flying at the mainmast head; and if a vessel shall be placed in quarantine by the Health Officer of the Port of Melbourne or the Port of Geelong, the master of such vessel shall cause such vessel to be at once taken to the Quarantine anchorage at Point Nepean.

Vessels calling at Australasian ports on their way to Victoria, vessels from Australasian ports declared by the Governor in Council to be infected under section 160 of the *Health Act* 1890, and vessels having any person on board at the time of arrival suffering from or affected with any contagious or infectious disease and arriving from any Australasian port shall not be considered or deemed to be vessels coming from Australasian ports within the meaning of these rules.

- Blue flag.** 7. No boat, except steam-tugs and such boats as may be duly authorized by the Government, shall make fast to or tow alongside of any inward-bound ship carrying passengers under weigh within any port before such ship is properly anchored and the blue flag hauled down.
- Heave to for boarding officer.** 8. The Pilot, or Master, of any vessel within, entering, or departing from, any port, shall by every means in his power, consistent with the safety of such ship, assist every duly authorized Government officer in boarding or leaving such ship, and no person on board of any such ship shall interfere with or obstruct any Government officer or any Pilot while such officer or pilot shall be engaged in the execution of his duty.
- Fishermen not to take passengers. Queenscliff.** 9. No fisherman, waterman, or other person shall, within the port of Port Phillip, take off in any boat to any outward-bound ship passing Queenscliff and trading to any place beyond the Australasian colonies, any passenger or other person, unless such passenger or other person has in his possession a passenger list containing his name duly entered thereon, and signed by the Emigration Officer at Queenscliff.
- National colours.** 10. Every ship shall, between sunrise and sunset, hoist and keep flying her national colours under the following circumstances:—
- (1) When entering any port, from the time of entering such port until the vessel has arrived at her final destination.
 - (2) On Sundays and public holidays, weather permitting.
 - (3) On leaving port.
- Show number.** 11. The master or pilot in charge of any vessel entering or departing from any port shall, as the vessel approaches any signal station, hoist the vessel's number or distinguishing flag; and, further, if inward bound, the number of the port the vessel is from. Such flags shall be kept flying until answered from the station, or so long as the vessel shall be within signalling distance of such station.
- Crew on board.** 12. All ships plying within any port shall be in charge of a competent master, and shall also be manned by a sufficient number of experienced seamen.
- Anchor buoys.** 13. All ships shall have proper buoys and sufficient buoys-ropes for their anchors. Any anchor, kedge, cable, or mooring slipped, parted, or cut from, if not weighed within twenty-four hours, may be weighed by order of the Port Officer, at the risk and expense of the owner, unless the permission in writing of the Port Officer to allow such anchor, kedge, cable, or mooring to remain unweighed, has been previously obtained.
- Firearms.** 14. All vessels shall unshot their guns immediately after entering any port, and no guns or firearms shall be discharged by any person on board any ship or boat, within any port, nor shall any blue-lights, rockets, or other combustibles be burned on any ship or boat within any port unless permission, in writing, has been previously obtained from the Port Officer, except only when assistance is urgently required.
- Vessels moored.** 15. Vessels moored with two anchors shall always have both cables clear. Vessels lying at single anchor shall have the second anchor clear. In both cases the cable shall be kept in readiness to be slipped, veered, or hove in, in case of fire or other accident.
- Government boats.** 16. All boats alongside of ships, wharfs, jetties, or landing places shall give way to Government boats on duty.
- Work on Sundays.** 17. No vessel (except steamers plying with passengers only) shall be unmoored or got underweigh on Sundays from her anchorage, or from her berth alongside any quay, wharf, pier, or jetty; and no work shall be done on any ship in harbour on Sundays except such as may be necessary for the cleanliness and safety of the ship, or for the navigation of the steamers aforesaid, unless by the express permission, in writing, of the Port Officer.
- Boats, &c., astern of vessels.** 18. The master or person in charge of any vessel at anchor within the ports of Port Phillip, Melbourne, or Geelong, shall not permit any boat or lighter to ride astern of, and be attached to, such vessel at a greater distance from such

vessel than three fathoms, nor shall the master or such person as aforesaid permit any deeply-laden boat, log or logs of timber, or other floating object likely to injure other vessels or boats, to remain astern of and be attached to any vessel.

19. No lighter or boat shall anchor at a less distance than one hundred fathoms from any wharf or jetty, except for the purpose of immediately hauling alongside. Boats near wharfs.

20. No boat shall be allowed to remain at any landing-place after discharging her cargo and passengers (or be made fast to the steps or handrail belonging thereto) unless there be some person in charge ready to remove such boat when required to do so by the Port Officer or a person deputed by him. Boats at landing place.

21. For the preservation of the submarine cable at Western Port, no vessel shall anchor off Flinders during the night within the arc of the *white* light exhibited to seaward from the end of the Flinders jetty, nor shall any vessel anchor during the day within the same area, viz., with the end of such jetty bearing between W. $\frac{1}{2}$ S. and N.W. $\frac{1}{2}$ N. Submarine cable preservation.

22. For the preservation of the submarine electric cable laid between Swan Island and Observatory Point, Point Nepean, no vessel shall anchor within four (4) cable's length on either side of an imaginary line crossing Port Phillip Bay from Swan Beacon to Pope's Eye Fort, and thence to Observatory Point. Submarine cable preservation.

23. For the preservation of the submarine electric cable laid down between the South Channel Fort and Sorrento, and crossing the South Channel about one cable's length to the westward of buoys Nos. 4 and 5, no vessel shall anchor within three-quarters of a mile on either side of an imaginary line from Point King to the South Channel Fort. Submarine cable preservation.

24. All foreign ships of war arriving in Victoria shall occupy a special anchorage, viz.:—an anchorage situate near the western entrance to the South Channel, Port Phillip Bay, and about six (6) cables to the westward of the chequered buoys on Nicholson's Knoll. Special place of anchorage for foreign ships of war in time of peace.

Foreign ships of war on entering the port of Port Phillip shall proceed to such anchorage, unless otherwise notified by the Commissioner of Trade and Customs.

Commanding officers in charge of foreign war ships who may be desirous of proceeding to any other anchorage in Victoria, shall make application, in writing, to the Commissioner of Trade and Customs who may grant permission to any such war ship to occupy any other anchorage should he deem it advisable to do so, but no person will be allowed to land near or approach the vicinity of any of the forts.

Foreign ships, whether of war or transport, shall not land armed parties. Unarmed parties may, however, be landed for drill or exercise upon permission being previously obtained from the Commissioner of Trade and Customs.

25. No pitch, tar, resin, oil, or other such like combustible matter shall be heated by fire on board any vessel or boat without the permission, in writing, of the Port Officer. Provided that this rule shall not extend to prevent the burning of any lamp or candle for giving light on board any vessel or boat, or the lighting of any fire for the purpose of cooking or working the machinery of any vessel or boat, although such permission as aforesaid may not have been given. Boiling pitch, tar, &c.

26. Between the hours of Ten o'clock p.m. (10 p.m.) and Four a.m. (4 a.m.) no fires, except the furnaces of steamers, shall be lighted, nor shall any unenclosed lights be allowed to burn on board any vessel in any port or harbour where vessels lie for the purpose of loading and discharging cargo or effecting repairs; nor shall any vessel be fumigated or smoked, except such vessel be moored at a safe and sufficient distance from other vessels, and permission, in writing in that behalf, be obtained from the Port Officer. All fires and lights allowed shall be properly enclosed. Fires—Smoking ships.

27. The master or owner of every vessel under four hundred tons gross registered tonnage shall provide such vessel with fire-buckets in the proportion of four to each hundred tons, and two for each additional hundred tons. Fire buckets.

above four hundred, one half of which buckets shall be constantly hung up in some convenient place, with lanyards attached ready for drawing water.

Lights must be enclosed.

28. The master of every ship shall see that no artificial light is used in any part of any vessel, except the same be securely enclosed, and in charge of some trustworthy person.

Lights out.

29. After work has ceased for the day on board any vessel all hatches shall be put on and properly closed to prevent accidents, and before closing the hatches an officer shall go into the hold and into the between decks and satisfy himself that—(1) there are no signs of fire; (2) that all lights have been put out except those authorized in clause 26; and an entry thereof shall be made in the log-book.

Ship on fire.

30. In the event of fire occurring on board any vessel in port, all persons in charge of or otherwise belonging to any vessel or boat then in such port shall afford such assistance towards extinguishing the fire and the protection of neighbouring vessels as the Port Officer or person deputed by him may demand.

Beacons not to be made fast to.

31. No person in charge of any vessel shall moor or make fast any such vessel to any buoy or beacon not being a compass adjusting mooring or warping buoy or beacon.

Dead animals.

32. No person shall throw, place, or leave any dead animal within the boundary of any port, or on the shores thereof.

Death on board.

33. In the event of the death of any person on board of any vessel in port, the master of such vessel shall immediately report the particulars of such death to the police, and shall then cause the body to be buried on shore, according to law.

Watch on board.

34. All vessels in port shall always have at least one seaman at watch on deck, with the following exceptions:—(1) Vessels laid up, coal hulks, ballast or other lighters lying within such limits as the Port Officer shall have authorized them to occupy; but such vessel or vessels shall always have one person on board. (2) Vessels (not being vessels moored to or lying at any pier or jetty) and boats lying within the limits, specified in schedule A. All persons on watch or on board as aforesaid, and all persons in charge of boats, shall answer the challenge of the police or other public officer.

Careening, &c.

35. Masters requiring to careen, heave down, or haul their vessels or boats on shore for the purpose of inspection or repairs, shall first obtain the permission of the Port Officer so to do, except where such work is proposed to be done on private property.

Gangway ladder or stage.

36. Every vessel lying in the bay and not alongside any pier shall be provided with a good and sufficient gangway ladder. Every vessel lying alongside any pier or wharf, or alongside any vessel moored to any pier or wharf, shall be provided with a good and sufficient stage for the use of persons coming from or going on board such vessel, and every such stage shall be made of not less than two (2) inch planks, and be at least three (3) feet broad, with cross battens and ropes on both sides from the vessel to the wharf or from vessel to vessel, supported by wooden or iron stanchions not less than three (3) feet high, and also with a good and sufficient net, placed underneath the stage to prevent accidents, of not less than the following dimensions, viz.:—Length eighteen (18) feet, breadth eight (8) feet, to be made of one and a half (1½) inch rope, to be seven and a-half (7½) inches from seizing to seizing so as to form fifteen (15) inch meshes. At night a good and sufficient light shall be provided for every such gangway, ladder, and stage.

Report of accidents

37. Accidents involving personal injury, loss of life or property, from loss or collision of vessels or boats, within the limits of any port, shall be reported, in writing, by the persons in charge of the vessels or boats concerned to the Port Officer or nearest officer of customs as soon as possible.

Landing steerage passengers.

38. Masters of vessels arriving from ports beyond the Australasian colonies shall not compel their steerage passengers to leave their vessels for the purpose of landing at Melbourne or Geelong after Two o'clock p.m. during the months of April, May, June, July, August, and September, nor after Three o'clock p.m. during the remaining months of the year, unless with the consent of the Immigration Officer.

39. The Port Officer, or a person deputed by him, shall ^{Berthing vessels} appoint the places where all vessels, lighters, and boats shall lie within any port.

40. All ships and steam-ships within any port being at ^{Port Officer, &c.,} any of the public piers, jetties, or wharfs thereof, shall be ^{to berth.} placed as the Port Officer, Pier-master, or officer in charge of such public pier, jetty, or wharf may direct, and shall be subject to the orders of the Port Officer, Pier-master, or officer in charge as aforesaid in regard to moving or shifting, and in regard to the extent of the accommodation such ships or steam-ships may require from each other.

41. The Port Officer, or a person deputed by him, may ^{Removing vessels.} at any time order any vessel, lighter, boat, timber, or other article to be removed from any berth alongside any quay or from any anchorage to any other part of the harbour.

42. All masters or pilots in charge of vessels shall, when ^{General order,} called upon by the Port Officer, or a person deputed by him, immediately strike their topgallant yards and masts, have their jib, spanker, and all booms rigged close in, top up, and brace fore and aft all yards and moor with two anchors, or clear hawse, and further shall obey all lawful orders of the Port Officer or Pier-master, and generally follow such directions as the weather, the crowded condition of the port, or other circumstances may render necessary or expedient in the judgment of the Port Officer or Pier-master, for the safety and interests of the whole shipping.

43. In the event of any hostile attack or other emergency ^{Compulsory removal of vessels.} rendering necessary, in the Port Officer's opinion, the immediate removal of any vessel from one part to any other part of any harbour, the Port Officer may order such vessel to be removed at once; and should the owner or master, on being called upon, not immediately take the most prompt measures to carry the Port Officer's orders into effect, the Port Officer may hire such steam-tugs and men, tackle or ballast, as may be required, and effect such removal; and the expenses of such removal shall be paid by the owner or master of such vessel; and no such vessel shall be cleared out at the Custom-house until the expenses so incurred in such removal shall have been paid to the Collector of Customs, due notice thereof having been given to the Collector of Customs; and no responsibility shall attach to the Port Officer for any damage that may be occasioned by his act done in such emergency in accordance with this rule.

44. No wharf, pier, jetty, tramway, landing, wool or hide ^{Obstructions to be removed.} washing stage, or fencing of any description, shall be erected by any person on the margin of any bay, river, or navigable creek in any port without the permission of the Port Officer; and any such wharf, pier, jetty, tramway, landing, wool or hide washing stage, fencing or any obstruction whatever, which in the opinion of the Port Officer interferes with or is likely to interfere with the free and safe navigation of any port, may be removed by the Port Officer; or, if the Port Officer so directs, such wharf, pier, jetty, tramway, landing, wool or hide washing stage, fencing or obstruction, shall be removed by the owner thereof, who in either case shall pay all the expenses incurred in such removal; and such owner shall exhibit, on or near such wharf, pier, jetty, tramway, landing, wool or hide washing stage, fencing or obstruction, such flags, masts, or lights as the Port Officer may direct, until it is removed to his satisfaction.

FAIRWAYS, CHANNELS, AND RIVERS.

45. No ship, lighter, boat, or raft shall be anchored near the ^{No vessel to lie in fairways.} middle of any fairway, channel, or river; but when detained in any such fairway, channel, or river, all such ships, lighters, boats, or rafts shall lie close over on either side of such fairway, channel, or river; nor shall any cable, chain, hawser, or rope, or other obstruction be placed across any such fairway, channel, or river, without the permission of the Port Officer; and such Port Officer may define by bearings or otherwise as he may deem most convenient, the limits of the fairway channel or river, in any port or place within his jurisdiction within which no ship or vessel shall bring up, provided that public notice be given thereof.

- Vessels not to lie in fairways. 46. Masters of vessels exempt from pilotage shall comply with clause 45, so far as relates to the anchorage within Hobson's Bay.
- Fairway to be kept clear. 47. The person in charge of any vessel compelled by unavoidable circumstances to let go an anchor in the middle of any fairway, channel, or river shall, as soon as possible, lift the same, and place it in such a situation as not to interrupt or interfere with the free passage of other vessels.
- Berth alongside wharfs. 48. No vessel shall be taken alongside any wharf or jetty without the authority of the Port Officer or Pier-master.
- Geelong channel. 49. No sailing vessel shall enter the new channel leading into Geelong whilst any other vessel is passing through it in the opposite direction.
- Ships to be berthed in rotation. 50. All vessels, on application being made to the Port Officer or Pier-master, shall be provided with vacant berths in rotation, according to their time of arrival in the port. Any vessel on being appointed to a discharging berth shall immediately proceed to occupy it, otherwise the berth may be given to the vessel next in turn.
- Hatches to be on. 51. All vessels, when not engaged in loading or unloading, shall uniformly have their hatchways and coal scuttles securely closed.
- Stray boats, &c., to be handed to police. 52. All stray boats, timber, or other articles found within any port shall be immediately delivered up to the police, in whose custody they shall remain until claimed by the proper owner, who shall pay all reasonable expenses thereon.

PUBLIC WHARFS AND JETTIES.

- Time allowed ships at wharfs. 53. The time allowed vessels with full cargoes on board to occupy berths at public quays, for the purpose of discharging cargo, shall be (exclusive of Sundays and holidays) as follows:—

and so on at the rate of one (1) day for each additional hundred tons register. Vessels not having full cargoes on board shall be allowed time in proportion.

- Taking in cargo. 54. Vessels taking in cargo shall be removed to any berth pointed out for that purpose by the Port Officer or Pier-master.
- Discharging. 55. Vessels discharging cargo shall have prior claim to the wharf to vessels taking in cargo.
The cargo of any vessel loading or discharging at any wharf shall not occupy a greater space on any such wharf than the length of such vessel, except by special permission of the Port Officer.
- Outside berths. 56. Vessels discharging or taking in cargo at outside berths shall be allowed two days for one of the scale set forth in clause 53.
- Outside berth. 57. Cargo may be discharged from or taken in by any ship lying outside over and across the deck of any vessel lying alongside of any quay.
- Placing goods on jetty. 58. All goods or other articles landed on any wharf or jetty shall be so placed as to keep the mooring posts or rings free, and allow a clear passage of at least five feet from the edge of the wharf nearest the vessel, upon which space no goods shall be allowed to remain.
- Space around cranes to be kept clear. 59. No goods shall be allowed to remain after being landed upon any wharf or wharf-road within the radius of any of the public cranes, nor shall any goods or other articles be deposited for shipment or otherwise upon any wharf or wharf-road within the above-named radius and an approach of twenty-five (25) feet wide of the wharf-roads in front of and in line with the public cranes, which shall at all times be kept clear, and upon which no goods, carts, carriages, or other articles shall be placed or deposited so as to prevent the free use and working of the cranes.

60. No vessel shall be removed from the wharf until the portion of it opposite to or required for the use of such vessel has been thoroughly cleared of all rubbish, and swept clean to the satisfaction of the Port Officer or Pier-master, by some person belonging to such vessel or hired by the master or owner thereof.

wharfs to be cleared.

61. In the event of any goods which shall have been landed or placed for shipment on any of the public wharfs being allowed to remain on such wharf for more than twenty-four hours, notice shall be served on the owner, consignee, or exporter of such goods, and if the owner, consignee, or exporter of such goods cannot be ascertained or found, a notice shall be posted upon or affixed to some conspicuous part of such goods; and if they are not removed within three days from the date of such notice, the goods shall be taken by the officer discharging the duties of wharfinger to the Customs Reserve, or some other place duly appointed for that purpose, and there dealt with according to section II of the *Marine Act* 1890.

Removing goods from wharfs.

62. No goods shall be placed on any of the public wharfs for shipment until the vessel for which the goods have been entered outwards has been berthed at the wharf.

Goods outwards

63. No person shall carry on any retail trade in timber or other goods on the wharf or wharf-land.

Trading on wharfs, &c.

64. No sorting, bulking, or repacking of timber or other goods, nor screening of coals, shall be permitted on any portion of the wharf, and no coals shall be placed on any wharf except in bags, nor shall any goods or other articles be put on any wharf which, in the opinion of the Port Officer, are likely to occasion damage to such wharf, nor shall any goods or other articles be placed on any wharf so as to be an impediment to the wharf approaches or an obstacle to the removal of other goods from the wharf.

Improper use of wharfs.

65. For the preservation of good order, and for the convenience of the shipping generally, all watermen, stevedores, porters, carters, and others engaged on any wharf, jetty, or pier, shall obey the lawful orders of the Port Officer or Pier-master; and no owner or driver of any carriage, cab, dray, or other vehicle drawn by horses or other animals, shall ply on any pier or jetty without the permission of the Port Officer or Pier-master; nor shall any person without such permission bring or leave any carriage, cab, dray, or other vehicle, or any animal upon any pier, jetty or wharf.

Good order on piers, &c.

No person shall take, lead, drive, or conduct any horse or other animal, or any carriage, cab, dray, lorry, or any vehicle whatever drawn by any horse or horses, animal or animals, upon or along any public pier, jetty, or wharf, without the permission of the Port Officer or Pier-master, in charge of such public pier, jetty, or wharf; and no owner or person in charge of any carriage, cab, dray, lorry, or vehicle shall, without the permission of the said Port Officer or Pier-master, leave the same or allow or permit or suffer the same to be left on such pier, jetty, or wharf.

Traffic on piers.

66. The Government shall not in any way be responsible for the charge of any vessels or boats lying within any port, and their security and safety, whether at anchor or moored alongside any pier or jetty, shall be at the risk of the owners.

Ship at owners' risk.

67. No ballast, rubbish, gravel, earth, stone, wreck, filth, or refuse, or any other material whatsoever, shall be thrown by any person into any port, river, or anchorage, or be placed, landed, or shipped in any port, except at the places and in the manner pointed out by the Port Officer; and all such ballast, gravel, rubbish, earth, stone, wreck, filth or refuse, or other material, shall be removed at such times and to such places as the Port Officer may direct.

Rubbish.

68. No master of any ship within the meaning of the *Marine Act* 1890, nor any person under his command, shall permit any steam machinery to be used on any public wharf for hoisting cargo into or out of such ship, nor for any other purpose in connexion with such ship, unless the owner of such steam machinery shall have obtained a certificate from the Port Officer, which certificate shall be uncanceled, that such machinery is in good order, and that the person in charge thereof is duly qualified; and every such owner shall on demand deliver up to such master such certificate; and such

Steam hoisting machinery.

master or other person shall, while such machinery is being so used hold and keep possession of such certificate and shall produce it on demand to the Port Officer or Pier-master in charge of the wharf, pier, or jetty. Such certificate may be issued by the Port Officer, subject to the following conditions:—

(1) All steam hoisting-engines, and the persons in charge thereof, shall be examined by some competent person to be approved of by the Commissioner of Trade and Customs, and passed by him as being qualified.

(2) Such engines shall be examined once every six months.

(3) A fee of Twenty shillings (20s.) shall be paid for each survey of an engine, and a fee of Twenty shillings (20s.) for each person so examined and passed.

Cancellation or suspension of certificates.

69. Such certificates may be cancelled or suspended when it shall be found to the satisfaction of the Port Officer that any engine is out of repair, or that any engine-driver has been guilty of any misconduct which in the opinion of the Port Officer constitutes a sufficient cause for the cancellation or suspension of any certificate issued under the preceding clause.

BALLAST.

Sand ballast.

70. No sand ballast or other material shall be raised from below high-water mark, except under conditions approved of and at places appointed by the Port Officer.

Tarpaulins to be used.

71. Proper tarpaulins or shoots shall be used in discharging or taking in ballast, coal, rubbish, gravel, earth, or filth, so as to effectually prevent any part thereof falling overboard; and no ballast shall be taken on board or discharged from any vessel after dark without the special permission of the Port Officer.

Ballast vessels and persons in charge to be licensed.

72. The master or pilot in charge of any ship within the meaning of the *Marine Act* 1890 shall not receive ballast into any ship under his command unless the owner of the lighter supplying it shall have obtained a certificate from the Port Officer, which certificate shall be uncanceled, that such lighter has been duly measured and marked, and is in good order, and that the person in charge of such lighter is duly licensed; and every such owner shall on demand deliver up to such master such certificate; and such master or other person shall, while such lighter is employed supplying ballast to the ship under his command, hold and keep possession of such certificate, and shall produce it on demand to the Port Officer, or any other officer deputed by him; and no ballast shall be supplied by a ballast lighter except such lighter, as well as the person in charge thereof, is duly licensed by the Port Officer. Provided that this regulation shall be of no force or effect as regards ballast lighters, and persons in charge thereof duly licensed under the provisions of the *Harbor Trust Act* 1890.

Conditions upon which certificates will be granted.

73. Certificates may be issued by the Port Officer subject to the following conditions:—

(1) All ballast lighters and persons in charge thereof shall be examined by an officer acting under the orders of the Port Officer, and passed by him.

(2) All ballast lighters shall be surveyed once in every twelve months or within such shorter period as may be found necessary by the Port Officer.

(3) Every ballast lighter shall have the number of her certificate painted on both bows in figures (white on black ground) of not less than twelve (12) inches deep and two (2) inches wide.

(4) Every ballast lighter shall have an iron batten three (3) inches wide secured to the sides of the stem and stern posts, or other convenient place to be decided by the Port Officer or other officer acting under his orders, and so marked as to show the draught of water for every five (5) tons weight of ballast carried or discharged, such marks to be in white figures where practicable of not less than one and a-half (1½) inches in length, or of such dimensions as may be approved by the Port Officer.

(5) Every ballast lighter shall have two (2) grooves cut into the planking from the stem to the stern post of not less than two (2) inches in width, and painted white, to denote the loaded and light draught lines; the lower edge of these grooves to be on a level with the water's edge to mark these measurements; such marks and corresponding draught of water shall be indorsed upon the certificates.

(6) Such licences may be cancelled or suspended when it shall be found to the satisfaction of the Port Officer that the owner or master has defrauded or attempted to defraud the master, owner, or charterer of any ship, by altering the marks or figures on any ballast lighter, or by delivering or attempting to deliver short weight of ballast to any vessel, or has been guilty of any such misconduct which in the opinion of the Port Officer constitutes a sufficient cause for the cancellation or suspension of any such licence or certificate. Masters of vessels shall have power to inspect any lighter bringing ballast alongside such vessel for ballasting purposes, and to test the accuracy of the measurement of the ballast lighter, and the weight of ballast she supplies; and no master or owner of any lighter shall refuse to allow such master or owner of a ship to examine such lighter, or test the weight of the ballast during her discharge, or to pump out water from the said lighter, when requested to do so.

74. Masters of ships having any complaint shall report the same to the Port Officer. Complaints to be made to Port Officer.

75. The Port Officer, or any person acting under his orders, may inspect or remeasure any ballast lighters, or test the accuracy of such measurement, and appoint the place and method where and how such measurement shall be made.

76. The expense of measuring and marking ballast lighters shall be borne and paid by the owner or owners of such ballast lighters. Lighters to be inspected.

EXPLOSIVES.

77. Ships and boats shall not approach any licensed explosives-hulk nearer than 200 yards, unless duly authorized; and every person in charge of a ship or boat shall observe due caution when approaching any vessel having the gunpowder flag hoisted. Gunpowder flag.

78. No fire or light shall be lighted or be allowed to continue burning, on board any ship or boat during the time gunpowder is being discharged from or taken on board such ship or boat. No fire allowed.

79. All explosives retained on board any ship as stores shall, during the time such ship is within any port, be securely kept in a suitable copper magazine, to be approved of by the Inspector of Explosives. Stores.

80. No explosive shall be shipped on board any vessel as cargo within any port in Victoria, unless such vessel shall be lying within the anchorage provided for incoming vessels having more than 20lbs. of explosives on board, and all such explosives shipped as aforesaid shall be placed in a properly constructed copper magazine to be approved of by the Inspector of Explosives; and no explosives shall be shipped on board any vessel as stores within the limits of any port in Victoria, except in the quantities and according to the manner approved of or prescribed by the Inspector of Explosives.

81. All boats specially licensed to convey explosives either to or from ships, wharfs, or other places, shall be subject to all the regulations, so far as the same may be applicable, in force for the time being for the management of hulks containing explosives; and no boat having explosives on board shall be towed by a high-pressure open-decked steambot whose furnaces are exposed, nor shall any such boat be towed by any other steamer with less tow line between her and the steamer than 60 feet. Conveyance of explosives.

82. Boats conveying explosives to or from any vessel or magazine shall not remain at anchor, except as provided for in the *Explosives Act* 1890; but, if unable to discharge all Anchorage of boats conveying explosives.

the explosives with which they may be laden into the magazine or vessel in which such explosives are intended to be discharged, as the case may be, between the hours of Seven a.m. and Five p.m. or Seven a.m. and Four p.m. respectively, they shall return and anchor within the limits prescribed for the anchorage of vessels having on board more than twenty pounds of gunpowder under the *Explosives Act* 1890.

**Explosives
anchorage.**

83. No vessel having more than twenty pounds of explosives on board arriving in or off or being or remaining in any of the under-mentioned ports or harbours of Victoria shall be permitted to anchor within the limits hereinafter specified, viz :—

Port of Port Phillip.—Within three-quarters of a mile of Gellibrand's Point, nor to the northward of the line bearing E. from the Gellibrand Lightship.

Port of Geelong (Inner Harbour).—Within three-quarters of a mile from Limeburner's Point, nor to the westward of a line bearing N.N.W. from the Powder-magazine.

Port of Geelong (Outer Harbour).—Within two miles of the shore, nor to the northward of a line bearing E. from Point Henry.

Port of Portland Bay.—Within three-quarters of a mile of the shore, nor to the northward of a line bearing E. from Observatory Point.

Port of Port Fairy.—Within three-quarters of a mile of the shore, nor to the westward of a line bearing N.N.E. from the Lighthouse.

Port of Warrnambool.—Within half-a-mile of the shore, nor to the westward of a line bearing S.S.W. from the Beach Lighthouse.

Port of Port Albert.—Within two miles of the wharfs, nor to the northward of Sandy Island.

Port of Corner Inlet.—Within one mile of any wharf, nor outside the limits of Franklin Channel.

The bearings are magnetic.

DANGEROUS CARGOES.

84. No vessel having as cargo any oils, chemicals, or other materials of a dangerous or inflammable character shall be permitted to anchor within any port, except in such anchorage as may be prescribed by the Port Officer; and no such vessel shall discharge any such cargo except at the landing place or anchorage and in the manner prescribed by such Port Officer, nor shall any such cargo be carried or waterborne by any vessel, lighter, or vehicle unless such vessel, lighter, or vehicle shall have been previously approved of by the Port Officer aforesaid.

It shall be the duty of the master of any vessel carrying any such cargo to take every precaution against loss or damage by fire or otherwise to any of the shipping, wharves, piers, jetties, or buildings in any port during the time such cargo remains on board his vessel, or while it is being discharged therefrom.

MAILS.

Mail flags

85. All vessels having mails on board for Melbourne or any other port of Victoria except the port of Geelong shall, on approaching their anchorage, hoist a white flag at the foremast-head, which flag shall be kept flying until the mails are taken out of the vessel.

**Mails for
Geelong.**

86. All vessels having mails on board for Geelong shall, on entering between the heads of Port Phillip, hoist a white flag at the foremast-head, as a signal for the mail boat to come off, and shall heave to or anchor within a reasonable distance of Queenscliff until such mails are taken out of the vessel.

Mail boats.

87. All mail boats shall have a preference of berth, whether alongside vessels or wharfs, during such time as they are occupied in shipping or landing mails.

REGULATIONS FOR STEAMBOATS, AND FOR VESSELS MEETING AND PASSING.

88. The masters of steam-vessels shall, so soon as their vessels are berthed, cause the furnaces and dampers to be so regulated as to prevent as far as possible accidents by fire, and shall so adjust their furnace doors and temper their furnace fires as that no more than the smallest practicable quantity of smoke shall pass therefrom. Steamer's furnace.

89. When steamers have vessels in tow, and are steering opposite courses, the steamer towing a vessel bound inwards before meeting the steamer with a vessel in tow bound outwards shall slack her speed, when practicable, until the other shall have passed her. Steamers with vessels in tow.

90. Steamers about to pass any dredging-machine at work in any river or channel, or any licensed ferry, or public work in progress, shall slow their engines to less than half-speed for at least 100 yards before arriving abreast of the dredge, ferry, or work, and shall keep their engines so slowed until they shall have passed such dredge, ferry, or work. Steamers to go slow.

91. All vessels passing any dredge shall pass on the side indicated by a red ball by day and by a red light by night; when the ball is down they may pass on either side without slackening their speed. Dredge.

92. Steamers must proceed at moderate speed whilst navigating amongst the shipping in any port. Steamers, moderate speed.

93. When two or more steamers having passengers or goods on board arrive at any public pier, jetty, or wharf at or about the same time, and have occasion to land or take on board passengers or goods, the steamer last in arriving shall stop not less than 50 yards from the other steamer, and remain until the operations of the latter shall be completed, which operations shall be carried out with all despatch. Steamers at piers.

94. The master or pilot in charge of all steamships carrying passengers shall depart punctually from any public pier, jetty, or wharf at the hour publicly advertised and fixed for sailing, excepting always in case of accidents actually happening to the machinery or hull, which shall be immediately reported to the Pier-master or officer in charge of such public pier, jetty, or wharf; when any steamer is prevented from sailing at the hour originally announced, the Port Officer, Pier-master, or officer in charge may have such steamer removed in order to make way for the next vessel in turn for the berth. Punctuality in sailing.

PILOTAGE.

95. No unqualified person shall assume or continue in charge of a vessel after a licensed pilot has offered to take charge of her; and no person shall use a licence which he is not entitled to use for the purpose of making himself appear to be a qualified pilot. Pilot in charge.

96. All steamers or boats employed to tow, or in any way move or assist any vessel in charge of a licensed pilot, shall be (whilst employed on such service) under the orders of such pilot in all matters connected with the navigation of such vessel. Tugs under pilots' orders.

97. The master of every vessel not by law exempt from the necessity of employing the services of a pilot shall place her in charge of the first licensed pilot that may come alongside. Masters not exempt.

98. The master of every ship on entering any port in Victoria for which a pilot or pilots is or are licensed, unless such ship or such master is exempt from pilotage by law, or unless there be a licensed pilot on board such ship, shall until a licensed pilot has come on board, display and keep flying the usual sign for a pilot; and such master shall, by every means in his power, consistent with the safety of his ship, facilitate such pilot getting on board, and shall not enter such port without a pilot being on board and in charge of such ship. Signal for pilot.

99. The master of every ship which by law is exempt from payment of pilotage shall, on entering any port or harbour in Victoria, cause a white flag to be hoisted (below Master exempt.

the blue flag mentioned in clause 1) at the mainmast-head, and keep it flying until such ship is anchored within the port.

100. No ship which is liable to pilotage on entering or leaving a port shall be moved from any place or position in any port to any other place or position in such port unless such ship shall be in charge of the Harbour Master or of a pilot duly licensed for that port.

White flag.

101. No inward-bound vessel shall exhibit a white flag at the mainmast-head unless the master of such vessel holds an exemption certificate as defined by section 3 of the *Marine Act 1890*.

Certificate of pilotage.

102. Certificates of pilotage shall be filled up and signed by the master or person in charge of each vessel piloted, and delivered to the pilot.

MISCELLANEOUS REGULATIONS.

White flag.

103. The master of any ship outward bound requiring his clearance shall hoist a white flag at the mainmast-head when the ship is ready for sea.

Clearance.

104. No passenger shall be taken on board any ship outward bound after the clearance has been delivered to the master of such ship.

Ships to have copy of regulations and report of Health Officer.

105. A copy of these regulations, together with the Health Officer's report, shall be delivered to the master of every inward bound ship which shall take a pilot on board, by such pilot, who shall take a receipt for the same, which receipt such master is hereby required to give on demand; provided that in all cases where a copy of these regulations has been previously furnished it shall not be necessary to supply a further copy unless the first has been lost.

Every ship to have a copy of regulations.

106. The master of every ship not required to take a pilot shall have a copy of these regulations delivered to him by the boarding officer; provided that it shall not be necessary in any case to issue a second copy of the regulations to the master, unless proof be given that the regulations previously issued have been lost. Every master or other officer of a ship or vessel to whom a copy of these regulations shall have been delivered shall give, on demand, an acknowledgment in writing to the officer delivering the same.

Complaints to be made to Port Officer.

107. All complaints against any person connected with the Harbour Department shall be made in writing to the Port Officer.

108. *Port of Geelong.—Bathing of Horses.*—Horses may be bathed between the west side of the Yarra-street pier and the reclamation works on the east side of the Moorabool Jetty, but except at such place no person shall bathe horses within 500 yards of any bathing establishment on the foreshore of Geelong.

109. *Bathing of Dogs.*—Bathing of dogs is prohibited from any public wharf or jetty, or from any part of the foreshore, within 100 yards of any public wharf or jetty.

110. In every case in the above regulations where any act is forbidden or required to be done in relation to any ship or vessel, the duty of performing such act or forbearance shall rest upon the master of such ship or vessel unless where otherwise expressly directed to the contrary.

Interpretation.
"Australasian."

111. In the foregoing regulations the expression "Australasian" shall apply to ports in New Zealand and Tasmania, as well as in Australia proper; the expression "immigration officer" shall include any immigration or emigration agent or officer, or any assistant immigration or emigration agent or officer duly appointed to carry out these regulations; words importing the masculine gender shall be deemed and taken to include females, the singular to include the plural and the plural the singular, unless the contrary as to gender or number is expressly provided; the word

"Masculine gender."
"Singular number."

"Explosives."

"explosives" shall, except where otherwise expressly stated to the contrary, include gunpowder, and all such substances as may be included in the term "explosives" under the provisions of the *Explosives Act 1890*, or any act amending the same; the term "ship" shall include vessel and *vice versa*, unless expressed to the contrary. "Master" shall include the person in charge of any ship except the pilot.

"Ship."

112. The above regulations shall not in any way be taken to repeal, vary, or interfere with any rules or regulations made or to be made under the authority of the *Melbourne Harbor Trust Act 1890*, or any Act amending the same, or of any rules or regulations made by the Melbourne Harbour Trust Commissioners, and in force at the time of the coming into operation of the first-mentioned Act and not subsequently repealed, and shall have no force or effect in any case where they are contrary to, or are inconsistent with, any such rule or regulation lawfully made by the Melbourne Harbour Trust Commissioners.

SCHEDULE A.

(1) A line drawn from the end of the Port Melbourne town pier to the south end of the steamboat jetty on the east side of the Port Melbourne railway pier.

(2) A line drawn from the south end of the steamboat jetty on the west side of the Port Melbourne railway pier to the red dolphin at the northern side of the entrance to the River Yarra Yarra.

(3) A line drawn from the black dolphin at the southern side of the entrance to the River Yarra Yarra to the end of the Ann-street wharf, and thence to the end of the railway and breakwater piers at Williamstown.

2. The quantity mentioned in the schedules will be required from the contractor, who will be bound, however, to supply any further quantities, at the scheduled price, that may be ordered by the Government Printer during the currency of the contract. Six (6) months' notice of the ADDITIONAL REQUIREMENTS will be given to the contractor by the Government Printer.

3. In the event of the supplies not being delivered by the time specified in the schedule or order as the case may be, it will be competent for the Government Printer to purchase the same, or such articles as may be suitable for the service, at the risk of the contractor, from whose account any expense that may be incurred over and above the contract price will be deducted.

4. The supplies on delivery will be surveyed by a board appointed by the Government for that purpose, and the decision of the board is to be considered as final. Payment will be made on the board's certificate that the goods are of contract quality and in good order and condition.

6. 7. Printed forms of tender and conditions of contract may be obtained from the Secretary, Tender Board, Treasury, Melbourne, or from the officer in charge at any station, by whom also information or explanation will be afforded to persons tendering.

As much forage as can be stored at any station where the storage is small will, for the convenience of the contractor, be ordered at one time.

The price, which must be expressed in words as well as in figures, and without alterations, erasures, or discrepancies, must be per cental of 100 lbs. (net weight), including delivery at the stations, and all charges except the bags, which will remain the property of the contractor. At stations where the bags can be at once emptied the contractor will be required to remove them when delivery is taken. At other stations, notice will be sent to the contractor when the bags are empty. Bags to be removed at contractor's expense.

Tenders, which should be upon the printed form, will be received for either oats, bran, hay, or straw (the particular kind of hay or straw offered to be stated); but if all be included in one tender it may be accepted for one article only, if advisable. Oaten hay will be preferred. If sheaf hay be tendered for, it must be so stated in the tender.

Telegrams or tenders not complying with the terms of advertisement will not be entertained.

The successful tenderer will be required to enter into a bond for one-third of the estimated amount of the contract within ten days after the acceptance is notified. Two approved sureties are required for contracts amounting to £150 and upwards, and one surety for contracts under £150.

Tenderers failing to take up their accepted tenders, or failing to carry out their contract satisfactorily, will be ineligible to again hold contracts for Government supplies.

Tenders must be enclosed in an envelope, marked "Tender for Forage," and deposited in the Tender-Box, Pay Office, Treasury, Melbourne; or, if sent by post, they must be addressed to the Chairman of the Tender Board, Treasury, Melbourne.

The Government will not necessarily accept the lowest or any tender.

The decision of the Government will be made known by *Gazette* notice, and by letter to accepted tenderers.

CONDITIONS OF CONTRACT.

1. The hay to be good, sound, and sweet, and properly trussed, except when otherwise specified in the contract; the straw to be wheaten or oaten, and both to be in all respects of the best quality; oats, clean white (Victorian grown) and bran to be sound and sweet, and of the best description; chaff to be made from oaten hay of the best quality; the maize to be of the best quality. The hay tenders must specify whether they are for oaten or wheaten hay.

2. The supplies are for police, telegraph, and other horses, and are to be delivered on the order of the officer in charge of the district or station. The quantities stated in the schedule being only approximate, it must be understood that the Government may draw either more or less than those mentioned; and should new telegraph stations be formed, or additional horses required to be stationed at any of the stations, the contractor will be required to supply the additional forage. Should the additional number of horses, however, exceed two, the contractor may, if he desires it, terminate the contract by supplying at once the whole quantity due at the station under the contract according to the foregoing schedule.

3. Notwithstanding anything contained in the preceding condition, the contractors for the supply to the Police Depot may be called upon to supply any other Government Departments within a radius of six miles from Melbourne, and for which no contracts have been taken, at the same rates.

4. The forage, when delivered, must be accompanied by the particulars of quantity, showing the net weight, to be endorsed on the back of the order, which, when signed by the officer in charge of the station, for the net quantity received, will be returned to the contractor, and by him rendered in support of his account.

5. Each contractor will be required to prepare his own account in the prescribed form, and, on presentation thereof to the officer in charge of the station or district, it will be forwarded for payment at the Treasury, Melbourne, or the Pay Office of the district, as may be indicated by the contractor on the account.

6. Should forage duly ordered under these contracts not be delivered within forty-eight hours of the time specified in the order for delivery, it will be competent for the department (should circumstances require it) to purchase the same at the risk of the contractor, from whose account any expense over and above the contract price is to be deducted.

7. In the event of a difference of opinion between the contractor and the officer receiving the forage as to the quality of the same, it is to be decided by a board of survey, composed of persons named by the head of the department ordering the supply, and the decision of the Board is to be considered final.

8. If the Board shall decide that the forage is not of proper quality, it must be immediately replaced by the contractor, failing which it will be procured elsewhere, and the extra cost, if any, will be charged as in clause 6.

9. When a board of survey cannot be conveniently assembled, or when, from some other cause, injury would accrue either to the public service or to the contractor by waiting for a board of survey, the officer in charge will have the power to reject such supplies as are obviously of inferior quality, it being understood that he will be responsible to the Government for so doing; and the contractor must take back the rejected forage, and supply good in its stead, failing which it will be obtained by the officer requiring it, and the expense will be charged as in clause 6.

10. A repetition of irregularity in the quantity or quality of the forage, or of the delay in delivering or replacing it when required, or refusal to execute orders, will subject the contractor, upon report from the Tender Board, to such mulct, not exceeding £20, as the Treasurer of the colony for the time being may direct. It will also be in the power of the said Treasurer, upon such repetition, to terminate the contract forthwith.

11. Contractors are not at liberty to transfer their contracts under cover of power-of-attorney, coupled with an interest or otherwise; and no such transfer will be recognised by the Government.

12. It will be competent for the Secretary of the Tender Board, on behalf of the Government, or for the contractor on his own behalf, to terminate the contract, by giving, in writing, a notice of three full calendar months to that effect, it being understood that such notice can only be given from the 1st day of a month, and provided that no such notice can be given before the 30th September 1891, and in the event of a station being discontinued or any change in the supplies required, the contractor will receive the earliest possible intimation.

TENDERS FOR GRAZING LANDS.

Tenders must be sent in on proper form, which can be obtained on application to the Lands Department, Melbourne, or any of the Survey Offices in the country.

Tenders must be placed in the Crown Lands Office Tender-box not later than Twelve noon on Tuesday, 30th December, 1890.

NOTE.—The fee for the period from 1st January, 1891, to 31st December, 1891, and fee of Five shillings for licence, must accompany each tender.

TENDERS will be received by the Board of Land and Works up to Noon of Tuesday, 30th December, 1890, for the occupation for Grazing purposes only of the following unappropriated portions of land, subject to the Regulations approved by the Governor in Council and also the subjoined special conditions.

Every licence granted under section 123 of the *Land Act 1890* shall be subject to the conditions set forth in the schedule hereto, and to such special conditions and payment in advance of such fee as the Minister may determine, and shall be issued by an officer of the Department of Lands and Survey duly authorized in that behalf.

Under section 7 of the *Vermin Destruction Act 1890*, all licensees under the section for which these licences will issue are liable for the destruction of rabbits within the boundaries of their licences.

Conditions:

1. The issue of this licence shall not prevent the land comprised therein, or any part or parts thereof, being sold, leased, licensed, alienated, or dealt with under any of the provisions of the *Land Act 1890*, except under the 123rd section thereof, under which the licence is issued, or being resumed by order of the Governor or Administrator of the Government of Victoria, with the advice of the Executive Council, for any of the purposes for which land may be reserved under section 10 of the *Land Act 1890*, or for mining purposes.

2. In case the said land, or any part or parts thereof, shall be sold, leased, licensed, alienated, dealt with, or resumed as aforesaid, the licensee shall not be entitled to any compensation other than the return of such portion of his licence-fee paid by him as the responsible Minister of the Crown for the time being administering Division II. of the *Land Act 1890* may think fit. This licence is also subject to the rights of the holders of miners' rights or of mining leases now issued or hereafter to be issued to enter upon the allotment hereby licensed, and to search for gold, and to mine therein, and to erect and occupy mining plant and machinery, without making any compensation for surface or other damage.

3. Subject to these conditions, the licensee shall be entitled to use the land for the purposes for which the licence has been granted, until notice has been given in the *Government Gazette* that such land, or any part thereof, has been sold, leased, licensed, alienated, dealt with, or resumed as aforesaid; and, immediately upon such notice being given, all the interest of the licensee in the licensed land described in such notice shall cease and be determined, and any person entitled to occupy the licensed land, or any part thereof, may lawfully make entry upon and hold the same, without the permission or sanction of the licensee or any one claiming under her, him, or them.

4. No land comprised in roads from time to time surveyed and marked out within the boundaries of the land comprised in this licence shall be deemed within its operation.

5. This licence entitles the holder thereof, during the period for which it is granted, to use the land therein comprised for depasturing purposes only, but does not confer any right to build thereon, or to cultivate, or to fence any portion thereof.

6. If the licensee desire a renewal of this licence, notice to that effect must be given to the responsible Minister aforesaid one month prior to the expiration thereof, but nothing herein contained shall be deemed to confer the right to any renewal.

7. The interest in this licence may not be transferred without the consent of the Minister aforesaid and the payment of a fee of £1.

8. No claim whatever shall be made or entertained by reason of the licence not being renewed or transferred.

9. This licence is to be used under and in accordance with the regulations made or to be made under the provisions of the said Act and for the time being in force.

10. This licence may be forfeited if the licensee commit a breach of or neglect to comply with any of these conditions.

11. The publication of a notice in the *Government Gazette* purporting to declare that the Governor or Administrator, with the advice aforesaid, has forfeited this licence shall be conclusive evidence that the licence is forfeited.

Special Conditions:

1. The period of occupation will be from 1st January, 1891, to 31st December, 1891.

2. The licence-fee must be paid in advance. The fee for the period from 1st January, 1891, to 31st December, 1891—for which the licence will be issued—must accompany the tender, or be paid by the successful tenderer or his agent immediately on the declaration of the acceptance of the tender, otherwise the offer of the next highest tenderer who may be prepared to comply with this condition may be accepted.

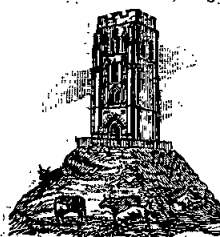

SMALL-POX ON BOARD THE SHIP *KELTON*.

At the Executive Council Chamber, Melbourne, the thirty-first day of December, 1890.

WHEREAS by the *Public Health Act 1890* it is amongst other things enacted that the Governor in Council may make such Order as may be deemed expedient upon any unforeseen emergency with respect to any vessel arriving in Victoria under any alarming or suspicious circumstances as to infection or contagion, and also with respect to the persons and things on board the same: And whereas the ship *Kelton* has arrived in Victorian waters with persons suffering from Small-pox on board: And whereas it is expedient to make an Order to prevent as far as possible the spread of such contagious disease in Victoria: Now therefore I, the Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, do by this Order direct that the said ship shall be detained and anchored off the Quarantine Station at Point Nepean, and shall fly and keep flying the yellow flag at the mainmast-head. And I do further direct that while the said ship is in Victorian waters no person whatever, nor any article, cargo, goods, or letters shall leave the said ship, nor be taken, or allowed or suffered to be taken, and removed from her, nor shall any boat put off from the said ship except only that, after careful disinfection and under the supervision of the Health Officer at the said Quarantine Station, and with his permission, her mails and cargo for Victoria (if any) may be discharged into lighters to be afterwards conveyed to shore under the like precautions: And further, that cargo, luggage, provisions, and mails may be slung or hoisted on board the said ship; but no person engaged in such slinging or hoisting shall go on board the said ship or approach her nearer than may be absolutely necessary: And further, that no other person shall be permitted to approach her, nor shall any one remain unnecessarily in her vicinity: And further, that all persons engaged in conveying any cargo, passengers' luggage, provisions, or mails to or from the said ship shall be immediately afterwards, together with their clothing, fumigated and disinfected to the satisfaction of the Health Officer on duty at the said station: And lastly, that the passengers and crew landed, or when landed from the said ship at the Quarantine Station, shall be detained in quarantine until severally released by the Health Officer aforesaid.

And the Honorable George David Langridge, Her Majesty's Minister of Health for Victoria, shall give the necessary directions herein accordingly.
