ACTS OF PARLIAMENT.

PROCLAMATION

By His Excellency the Right Honorable John Adrian Louis, Earl of Hopetoun, Viscount Aithrie, and Baron Hope, in the Peerage of Scotland; Baron Hopetoun of Hopetoun, and Baron Niddry of Niddry Castle, in the Peerage of the United Kingdom; Knight Grand Cross of the Most Distinguished Order of Saint Michael and Saint George; Governor and Commander-in-Chief in and over the Colony of Victoria and its Dependencies, &c., &c., &c.

I, THE Governor of Victoria, do hereby declare that I have this day assented, in Her Majesty's name, to the Bills passed by the Parliament of Victoria, the titles whereof are hereinafter set forth, that is to say:—

- "An Act to amend the *Tramways Act 1890* and to extend the provisions thereof to the Corporation of the City of Melbourne and the Councils of the Municipalities of Prahran and Saint Kilda within certain limits."
- "An Act to amend the *Employers and Employés Act 1890* and for other purposes."
- "An Act to amend the *Companies Act 1890*."

Given under my Hand and the Seal of the Colony, at Melbourne, this seventh day of December, in the year of our Lord One thousand eight hundred and ninety-one, and in the fifty-fifth year of Her Majesty's reign.

PROCLAMATION

By His Excellency the Right Honorable John Adrian Louis, Earl of Hopetoun, Viscount Aithrie, and Baron Hope, in the Peerage of Scotland; Baron Hopetoun of Hopetoun, and Baron Niddry of Niddry Castle, in the Peerage of the United Kingdom; Knight Grand Cross of the Most Distinguished Order of Saint Michael and Saint George; Governor and Commander-in-Chief in and over the Colony of Victoria and its Dependencies, &c., &c., &c.

I, IN pursuance of the provisions contained in the *Public Service Act 1890* (54 Vict. No. 1183, Part VI., section 135) and in the *Banks and Currency Act 1890* (54 Vict. No. 1164, Part III., section 20), I, the Governor of Victoria, with the advice of the Executive Council, do by this my Proclamation appoint

THURSDAY, THE 10TH DAY OF DECEMBER INSTANT,

to be observed as a Public Holiday throughout the Borough of Port Fairy and the Shire of Belfast;

SATURDAY, THE 12TH DAY OF DECEMBER INSTANT,

to be observed as a Public Holiday throughout the Shire of Colac, and as a Bank Holiday at Beac, Colac, and Dandenong;

TUESDAY, THE 15TH DAY OF DECEMBER INSTANT,

to be observed as a Public Holiday throughout the Shire of Glenelg;

MONDAY, THE 23TH DAY OF DECEMBER INSTANT, AND

SATURDAY, THE 2ND DAY OF JANUARY NEXT,

to be observed as Public Holidays and Bank Holidays throughout Victoria.
