LIABILITY TO QUARANTINE OF VESSELS, ETC.,
ARRIVING FROM THE PORT OF COLOMBO, IN
THE ISLAND OF CEYLON.

PROCLAMATION

By His Excellency the Right Honorable John Adrian Louis, Earl of Hopetoun, Viscount Aithrie, and Baron Hope, in the Peerage of Scotland; Baron Hopetoun of Hopetoun, and Baron Niddry of Niddry Castle, in the Peerage of the United Kingdom; Knight Grand Cross of the Most Distinguished Order of Saint Michael and Saint George; Governor and Commander-in-Chief in and over the Colony of Victoria and its Dependencies, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS by the *Health Act 1890* (54 Vict. No. 1098) it is amongst other things enacted that if the Governor in Council shall, by Proclamation, notify that any place beyond the seas is infected with the cholera or other infectious or contagious disease, and that it is probable such disease may be brought from such place to Victoria, immediately after such notification all vessels whatever arriving from or having touched at any such place, and all vessels and boats receiving any person or thing whatsoever from or out of any vessel so coming from or having touched at any such infected place as aforesaid (whether such person or thing shall have come or been brought in such vessel or such person shall have gone or have been put on board the same either before or after the arrival of such vessel at any place in Victoria, and whether such vessel was or was not bound to any place in Victoria), and all persons and things whatsoever on board of any vessel so coming from or having touched at such infected place as aforesaid, shall be liable to quarantine within the meaning of Division 4 of Part VIII. of the said Act, and of any Order made by the Governor in Council and notified by Proclamation concerning quarantine and the prevention of infection from the time of the departure of such vessels from such infected place as aforesaid, or from the time such persons or things shall have been received on board respectively; and it is also enacted that all such vessels and boats as aforesaid, and all persons (as well pilots as others), and all things whether coming or brought in such vessels or boats from such infected place as aforesaid, or going or being put on board the same either before or after the arrival of such vessels or boats in any place in Victoria, and all persons and things as aforesaid on board such receiving vessel or boat as aforesaid shall, upon their arrival at any place in Victoria, be obliged to perform quarantine in such places for such time and in such manner as shall be from time to time directed by the Governor in Council, and notified by Proclamation as aforesaid: And whereas it is further enacted that until such vessels and boats, persons, and things as aforesaid shall have respectively performed and shall be duly discharged from quarantine no such persons or things shall, either before or after the arrival of such vessels or boats at any place in Victoria, come or be brought on shore or go or be put on board any other vessel or boat in order to come or be brought on shore in any such place (unless in such manner and in such cases and by such licence as shall be directed or permitted by any such Order as aforesaid): Now therefore I, the Governor of Victoria, with the advice of the Executive Council, do by this Proclamation notify that

THE PORT OF COLOMBO, IN THE ISLAND OF CEYLON,

is infected with Small-pox, and that it is probable that such disease may be brought from such port to Victoria, and vessels having touched at that port shall be liable to perform quarantine until released by the Health Officer.

NOTE.—The apparent increase of population in 1890, or that obtained by adding the excess of registered births over registered deaths to the excess of recorded arrivals over recorded departures was 35,504, as against 33,131 in 1889, and 60,019 in 1888. The actual increases are known to be less than these, in consequence of the departures by sea being imperfectly recorded. If allowance be made for the probable number of unrecorded departures in 1890, the net increase of population during that year will be reduced to 29,966, viz., 13,975 males and 15,991 females, as shown above.

The large increase in population in 1888 was exceptional, being chiefly due to the influx of persons connected with, and of visitors to, the Melbourne Centennial International Exhibition.

The registered births numbered 37,492, and the registered deaths 17,045, in 1890; thus the former exceeded the latter by 19,447, or 109 per cent. The births exceeded those in 1889 by 1,133, but the deaths were fewer than those in 1889 by 1,447.

The recorded arrivals by sea numbered 79,777, and the recorded departures by sea 63,820, in 1890. The gain to the population by excess of the former over the latter was thus apparently 15,957. The number, however, must be reduced by an allowance for unrecorded departures, estimated to amount to 5,538, which brings the probable net gain by immigration down to 10,419.

From the period of the census of 1881 to the end of 1890 the whole reduction made for supposed unrecorded departures has been 52,767. Had no such reduction been made, the population at the end of 1890 would apparently have amounted to 1,200,761.

The gain by excess of births over deaths in 1890 was greater than that in 1889 by 2,580, and by 1,331 than in 1888. The gain by excess of recorded arrivals over recorded departures in 1890 was less than in 1889 by 207, than in 1888 by 25,846, than in 1887 by 6,069, or than in 1886 by 9,345, but was greater than in 1885 and preceding years.

In 1890 the recorded arrivals from were greater than the recorded departures for Tasmania by 6,948, New South Wales and Queensland by 4,034, the United Kingdom by 3,502, Foreign countries by 1,596, and New Zealand and the South Seas by 1,239. On the other hand, the recorded departures for South and Western Australia exceeded the recorded arrivals therefrom by 1,422.

It should be stated that the figures of births and deaths during 1890, and consequently those of population, will probably be slightly altered when the returns of the Deputy Registrars are finally examined.

The births of 1,316 children, viz., 687 boys and 629 girls, were registered in Greater Melbourne during the month of January. In the month of December, 1,430 births were registered, or 114 more than in the month under review. The births were 289 above the average of the month during the previous ten years, but 31 below that average if allowance be made for the increase of population.

The deaths registered in January numbered 874, viz., 459 of males and 415 of females; the births thus exceeded the deaths by 442, or 51 per cent. The deaths exceeded those in December by 111, and exceeded the average of January during the previous ten years by 119. If, however, allowance be made for the increase of population, they will be found to have been less than that average by 116.

To every 1,000 of the population of the district, the proportion of births registered was 2.75, and of deaths registered 1.83.

The highest temperature in the shade recorded at Melbourne Observatory during the month was 103.0° on the 4th, and the lowest was 46.3° on the 3rd. The mean temperature of the month (64.7°) was two degrees below the average. The greatest range of the thermometer in any one day (43.0°) took place on the 25th, and the least range (8.0°) on the 9th, the mean daily range being 22.2°. The highest atmospheric pressure recorded was 30.184 inches on the 15th, and the lowest was 29.324 inches on the 5th. The mean atmospheric pressure (29.809 inches) differed from the average by a fraction only.

Rain fell on 7 days, the amount of rainfall being 1.21 inch. The average rainfall in January during the previous ten years was 2.08 inches, or about nine-tenths of an inch more than in the month under notice.

Males contributed 53 per cent., and females 47 per cent., to the mortality of the month. Children under 5 years of age contributed 50 per cent. to that mortality, as against 48 per cent. in January, 1890; 57 per cent. in January, 1889; 53 per cent. in January, 1888; 53 per cent. in January, 1887; 54 per cent. in January, 1886; 48 per cent. in January, 1885; 44 per cent. in January, 1884; 48 per cent. in January, 1883; 49 per cent. in January, 1882; and 45 per cent. in January, 1881.

Thirty-one deaths of persons who had attained or exceeded the age of 75 years were recorded during the month:—Of these, a female, aged 75, died of bronchitis; a farmer, aged 75, of Bright's disease; a female, aged 76, of rheumatism; a female, aged 76, of cancer; a female, aged 76, of hemiplegia; a labourer, aged 76, of paralysis; a labourer, aged 76, of pneumonia; a tailor, aged 77, of heart disease; a miner, aged 77, of bronchitis; a housewife, aged 78, of cerebral hemorrhage; a carter, aged 78, of syncope; a female, aged 78, of rupture of an ovarian abscess; a gentleman, aged 80, of heart disease; a builder, aged 83, of aneurism of the aorta; a female, aged 84, of diarrhoea; a butcher, aged 84, of dropsy; an hotelkeeper, aged 85, of pneumonia; a female, aged 89, of heart disease; a female, aged 75, a gentleman and a gardener, each aged 76, a female, aged 78, a female, aged 82, a labourer and a dyer, each aged 84, a carpenter, aged 85, a female, aged 86, a male, aged 88, a female, aged 89, a female, aged 94, and a gentleman, aged 96, of old age.

Thirty-eight violent deaths took place during the month, of which 34 were set down to accident, 3 to homicide, and 1 to suicide. The following are the particulars of the accidental deaths:—A jockey, aged 22, a fireman, aged 25, and a labourer, aged 58, were passed over by railway trains; a male child, aged 1, died of fracture of the skull, the result of being kicked by a horse; two labourers, aged 22 and 23 respectively, and a seaman, aged 38, of injuries consequent on falls; a labourer, aged 23, of rupture of the liver, the result of being jammed between two drays; a farmer, aged 24, of fracture of the pelvis; a publican, aged 30, of fracture of the cranium—how caused not stated; a boy, aged 7, of injury to the leg, consequent on becoming entangled with the wheel of a lorry; a labourer, aged 37, was killed by a fall of earth; a newly-born male infant died of injury to the skull received during birth; a boy, aged 11, of traumatic tetanus—the result of a wound on the foot; a female child, aged 4 months, a male child, aged 2 years, a female, aged 18, and a female, aged 57, died of burns; three boys, aged 5, 8, and 15 respectively, a groom, aged 19, a french polisher, aged 24, a labourer, aged 35, a billiard-marker, aged 38, and a labourer, aged 70, were drowned in the River Yarra; a male child, aged 4, was drowned at Mordialloc; a female infant, aged 4 months, was suffocated in bed; two females, aged 28 and 30 respectively, and a male cook, aged 37, were suffocated during epileptic fits; a gas purifier, aged 48, was suffocated with gas; a female, aged 60, during the administration of chloroform; a newly-born female infant died of umbilical hæmorrhage. The homicidal deaths were those of a newly-born male infant, who died of injury to the head; a newly-born male infant, who was suffocated; and a female, aged 26, whose throat was cut—a verdict of wilful murder being returned in each case. The suicidal death was that of a male patient in the Kew Lunatic Asylum, aged 30, who cut his throat.

One hundred and thirty-one deaths, or 15 per cent. of the whole, took place in public institutions, viz.:—55 in the Melbourne Hospital, 23 in the Alfred Hospital, 4 in the Homoeopathic Hospital, 6 in the Children's Hospital, 5 in the Lying-in Hospital, 10 in the Immigrants' Home, 10 in the Benevolent Asylum, 4 in the Yarra Bend Lunatic Asylum, 4 in the Metropolitan Lunatic Asylum, 4 in the Austin Hospital, 1 in the Pentridge Stockade, 3 in the Infant Asylum, 1 in the Eye and Ear Hospital, and 1 in the Convent of the Little Sisters of the Poor.

The deaths of children under five years of age numbered 434, of which 222, or 51 per cent., were of males, and 212, or 49 per cent., were of females. Of those who died, 360 were under one year of age, 49 were between one and two, 13 were between two and three, 9 were between three and four, and 3 were between four and five.

The persons who died at a more advanced age than five years numbered 440. Of these, 237, or 54 per cent., were males, and 203, or 46 per cent., were females; 10 were between five and ten, 11 were between ten and fifteen, 16 were between fifteen and twenty, 29 were between twenty and twenty-five, 43 were between twenty-five and thirty, 36 were between thirty and thirty-five, 36 were between thirty-five and forty, 26 were between forty and forty-five, 26 were between forty-five and fifty, 26 were between fifty and fifty-five, 39 were between fifty-five and sixty, 44 were between sixty and sixty-five, 36 were between sixty-five and seventy, 31 were between seventy and seventy-five, 16 were between seventy-five and eighty, and 15 were upwards of eighty.

Typhoid fever, which caused 25 deaths in the month under notice, was less fatal in its effects than it had been in the Januaries of 1890, 1889, or 1888, in which respectively it caused 78, 71, and 39 deaths; the deaths from it, however, exceeded by 12 those in December. Diphtheria caused 7 deaths in the month under review, as against 15 in December, and 25, 15, and 5 in the three previous months of January. Deaths from diarrhoeal diseases, and from atrophy, debility, and inanition (chiefly affecting infants and young children) have been rare in the last two months, as is usually the case during the summer season. The former class of complaints caused 64 deaths in December and 79 in January, and the latter caused 74 deaths in December and 80 in January.

ARARAT MINING DISTRICT.—BY-LAW No. 9.

By-Law for Determining the Validity of disputed Elections in the Ararat Mining District.

AT a meeting of the Mining Board of the Mining District of Ararat, begun and holden at the Mining Board Room, Ararat, in the said district, on the 27th day of October, 1890, it is ordained by the said Board as follows, that is to say:—

1st. The by-law of the Mining Board of the Mining District of Ararat, No. VII., of the 18th December, 1861, gazetted on the 21st day of February, 1862, for determining the validity of disputed elections, shall be and the same is hereby repealed from and after the date on which this by-law shall become law.

2nd. If any election of any candidate to a seat at this board be disputed a petition may be presented to the board stating the reason for disputing such election, such petition shall be lodged with the clerk of the board within (21) twenty-one days from the day on which the returning officer shall have declared the member or members so petitioned against to have been duly elected.

3rd. Upon the presentation of any such petition the person or persons so petitioning shall deposit with the clerk of the board the sum of Five pounds (£5) sterling to cover any expenses not hereinafter specially provided for, and in the event of such sum proving excessive any balance remaining after payment of such expenses shall be returned to the depositor or depositors, and no petition as above shall be entertained by this board unless such sum shall have been so deposited.

4th. After the petition has been lodged the case shall be investigated at the next general meeting of the board, or, if necessary, at a special meeting called by the chairman.

5th. When any such petition has been presented against the election of a member of the board the clerk shall forward him a written notice and a copy of the petition presented, and also inform him on what day the board will sit to inquire into and give a decision on the case. The member whose election is disputed may bring any necessary witnesses.

6th. Any person desiring the attendance of any witness shall state the same to the clerk of the board, who shall issue a notice (in form of Schedule) requesting the attendance of such witness at a time and place stated in such notice.

7th. Any person desiring the attendance of any witness shall deposit with the clerk of the board an amount sufficient to allow each witness cost of transit, and a further sum not exceeding One pound (£1) sterling for the expenses of such witness during the time of his attendance, and in the event of the non-attendance of such witness the sum so deposited shall be returned by the clerk to the depositor.

8th. At the time appointed for the hearing of the dispute the objector or objectors, and also the member objected to, shall produce his or their miners' rights or business licence, and the board shall then proceed to investigate the matter, and shall hear what is alleged by either party, as also any information which may be given by any person called by either party.

9th. The decision of the board shall be arrived at by the vote of the members present, and the person so determined to be (or not) duly elected shall be declared by the chairman to be so, and such decision shall be final.

10th. A copy of the resolution giving the decision of the board shall be forwarded to the Returning Officer within seven days after such resolution has been agreed to.

By His Excellency the Right Honorable John Adrian Louis, Earl of Hopetoun, Viscount Aithrie, and Baron Hope, in the Peerage of Scotland; Baron Hopetoun of Hopetoun, and Baron Niddry of Niddry Castle, in the Peerage of the United Kingdom; Knight Grand Cross of the Most Distinguished Order of Saint Michael and Saint George; Governor and Commander-in-Chief in and over the Colony of Victoria and its Dependencies, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS by the *Chinese Act 1890* (54 Vict. No. 1073), it is amongst other things enacted that it shall be lawful for the Governor in Council from time to time, by proclamation to be published in the *Government Gazette*, to exempt any person or class of persons from the provisions of Part I. of the said Act, and to declare that such provisions shall not at any time, or for any specified period, apply to the person or class of persons mentioned in such proclamation, and that any such proclamation may at any time be revoked by the Governor in Council by proclamation to be published in the *Government Gazette*: Now therefore I, the Governor of Victoria, by and with the advice of the Executive Council thereof, do by this Proclamation exempt Chin Chack, Chinese merchant, of Melbourne, from the provisions of Part I. of the *Chinese Act 1890* aforesaid, for a period of two years, from the twenty-fourth day of February, One thousand eight hundred and ninety-one, and do declare that the provisions of the said Part of the said Act shall not, for the said period, apply to the said Chin Chack.

AMENDED.

PROCLAMATION

By His Excellency the Right Honorable John Adrian Louis, Earl of Hopetoun, Viscount Aithrie, and Baron Hope, in the Peerage of Scotland; Baron Hopetoun of Hopetoun, and Baron Midday of Niddry Castle, in the Peerage of the United Kingdom; Knight Grand Cross of the Most Distinguished Order of Saint Michael and Saint George; Governor and Commander-in-Chief in and over the Colony of Victoria and its Dependencies, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS by the *Marine Act 1890* it is amongst other things enacted that the Governor in Council, by proclamation published in the *Government Gazette*, may from time to time define the limits and boundaries of ports in Victoria, and frame rules and regulations for the governance and preservation of the said ports respectively, and for the regulation of shipping in the same, and also for the due protection and preservation of and the good government and management of all public wharfs, and may appoint officers to carry out and enforce such rules and regulations, and any such limits, boundaries, rules, and regulations may from time to time be in like manner altered, amended, or repealed, and others substituted in their stead: Now therefore I, the Governor of Victoria, with the advice of the Executive Council, do hereby make the following additions to, and alterations in, the General Rules for the Ports in Victoria, that is to say:—

ADDITIONAL RULE.

23A. For the preservation of the electric wire which connects the mainland with Phillip Island, and which is suspended across the eastern entrance to Port Western at an elevation ranging from 110 feet to 140 feet above high-water mark, no person shall navigate any vessel thereunder until he shall have first ascertained that the masts of such vessel are sufficiently low to clear the electric wire.

The wire reaches its maximum elevation between the buoy and Griffith's Point wharf.

ADDITIONAL RULES.

45A. Every person in charge of a vessel to which the "Regulations for Preventing Collisions at Sea" for the time being in force do not apply, shall, whenever under way in any port in Victoria between sunset and sunrise, and approaching or being approached by any other vessel, exhibit a bright white light which shall be capable of being seen from such other vessel at a distance of at least half-a-mile.

45B. Every person in charge of any vessel which is required by 45A to show a white light, and which is anchored or moored in any port in Victoria in such a position that such vessel may possibly form a danger to navigation, shall exhibit between sunset and sunrise where it can be best seen a white light in a globular lantern, and so constructed as to show a clear uniform and unbroken light visible all round the horizon at a distance of at least half-a-mile.

45C. When any vessel to which the Regulations for Preventing Collisions at Sea for the time being in force do not apply is being towed by any steamship between sunset and sunrise in any port in Victoria, the person in charge of such vessel shall exhibit a white light thereon. Such light shall be capable of being seen at a distance of at least half-a-mile all round the horizon.

45D. For the purpose of the preceding regulations, numbers 45A, B, and C, the word "vessel" shall mean and include every ship, lighter, barge, boat, launch, wherry, punt, canoe, and any kind of navigable vessel or craft whatsoever.

45E. The Port Officer, or any person acting under his orders, may carry out and enforce the four last preceding rules and regulations.

Rule 78 shall be amended by the substitution of the words "any explosive" for the word "gunpowder" where it occurs in the said rule.

Rule 80 shall be repealed, and the following rule substituted therefor:—

80. No explosive shall be shipped on board any vessel as cargo within any port in Victoria, unless such vessel shall be lying within the anchorage provided for incoming vessels having more than 20 lbs. of explosives on board, and no explosives shall be shipped on board any vessel as stores within the limits of any port in Victoria, except in the quantities and according to the manner approved of or prescribed by the Inspector of Explosives, and all explosives shipped as stores shall be placed in properly constructed copper magazines, to be approved by the Inspector of Explosives.

GENERAL RULES UNDER THE "TRADE MARKS ACT 1890 (No. 2)."

WHEREAS by an Act of the Parliament of the Colony of Victoria, passed in the 54th year of the reign of Her present Majesty Queen Victoria, No. 1183, intituled the *Trade Marks Act 1890 (No. 2)*, it was among other things enacted, by section 43, that the Governor in Council might from time to time make rules (not inconsistent with the Act) for regulating the practice of registration under the Act; for classifying goods for the purposes of trade marks; for regulating the procedure under the Act before the Commissioner; for prescribing the period within which appeals from the decision of the Commissioner to the Law Officer must be lodged, and for prescribing when and to whom notices of such appeal shall be given, and for regulating the procedure and practice on appeals to a law officer; for providing a scale of costs in all such proceedings; and generally for the purpose of regulating the business at the office of the Commissioner, and the doing of all things to be done under the said Act, and for giving effect to the Act. And by the said Act, section 34, such fees are directed to be paid in respect of applications, registrations, appeals, and other matters under that Act as should from time to time be prescribed by the Governor in Council. Now therefore His Excellency the Governor, by and with the advice and consent of the Executive Council, doth hereby, in exercise of the powers conferred by the above recited Act, make the following general rules, and prescribe the following fees to be paid (that is to say):—

PRELIMINARY.

1. These Rules may be cited as the "Trade Marks Rules 1891," Title, and shall come into operation on the 1st day of March, 1891.

INTERPRETATION.

2. In the construction of these Rules any words used herein, defined by the said Act, shall have the meanings thereby assigned to them respectively.

FEES.

3. The fees to be paid in pursuance of the said Act shall be the fees specified in the First Schedule hereto.

CLASSIFICATION OF GOODS.

4. For the purpose of trade marks registration and of these Rules, goods are classified in the manner appearing in the Second Schedule hereto. If any doubt arise as to what class any particular description of goods belongs to, the doubt shall be determined by the Commissioner.

APPLICATION FOR REGISTRATION.

5. An application for registration of a trade mark shall be made in the Form A in the Third Schedule hereto.

All applications shall be addressed to the Commissioner of Trade Marks, and be sent to the Patent Office (Trade Marks Branch), Lonsdale-street west, Melbourne.

6. An application for registration of a trade mark, if made by any firm or partnership, may be signed by some one or more members of the firm or partnership, as the case may be.

7. If the application be made by a body corporate it may be signed by the secretary or other principal officer of such body corporate.

Agency.	8. An application for registration, and all other communications between the applicant and the Commissioner, may be made by or through an agent duly authorized to the satisfaction of the Commissioner, such authority may be in Form D in the Third Schedule hereto.
Address for service.	9. When an applicant is out of Victoria he shall with his application lodge an address, for service in the Form E in the Third Schedule hereto.
Acknowledgment of application.	10. On the receipt of the application the Commissioner shall furnish the applicant with an acknowledgment thereof.
Contents of form of application.	11. Where an application is made to register a trade mark which was used by the applicant or his predecessors in business before the 19th day of September, 1876, the application shall contain a statement of the time during which and of the person by whom it has been so used in respect of the goods mentioned in the application.
Size, &c., of documents.	12. Subject to any other directions that may be given by the Commissioner all applications, notices, and counter statements, representations of marks, papers having representations affixed, or other documents required by the said Act or Rules to be left with or sent to the Commissioner, shall be upon strong foolscap paper, on one side only, of a size of 13 inches by 8 inches, and shall have on the left-hand side thereof a margin of not less than two inches.
Representations of trade mark.	13. Subject to any other directions that may be given by the Commissioner, three representations of each trade mark must be supplied upon paper of the size aforesaid, and must be of a durable nature, one such representation must be made upon or affixed to the form of application, the others upon separate sheets of the size aforesaid. In the case of trade marks exceeding the limits of the paper of the size aforesaid, such marks may be mounted upon linen affixed and folded upon such application.
Specimen copy.	14. Where a drawing or other representation or specimen cannot be given in manner aforesaid, a specimen or copy of the trade mark may be sent either of full size or on a reduced scale, and in such form as the Commissioner may think most convenient.
Fresh copy.	15. The Commissioner may, if dissatisfied with the representation of a trade mark, require a fresh representation, either before he proceeds with the application or before he registers the trade mark.
Deposited copy.	16. The Commissioner may also, in exceptional cases, deposit in the Patent Office (Trade Marks Branch) a specimen or copy of any trade mark which cannot conveniently be shown by a representation, and may refer thereto in the register in such a manner as he may think fit.
Representation of a series of trade marks.	17. When an application relates to a series of trade marks differing from one another in respect of the particulars mentioned in section 10 of the Act, a representation of each trade mark of the series shall be made or affixed upon the form of application and also upon each of the separate sheets of paper aforesaid.
Translation of foreign characters.	18. Wherever a mark consists of or includes words printed in other than Roman character, there shall be given at the foot or on the back of each representation a translation of such words, signed by the applicant or his agent.
Mode of sending notices, &c.	19. Any application, statement, notice, or other document authorized or required to be left, made, or given at the Patent Office (Trade Marks Branch), or to the Commissioner, or to any other person under these Rules, may be sent by a prepaid letter through the post, and if so sent shall be deemed to have been left, made, or given respectively at the time when the letter containing the same would be delivered in the ordinary course of post.
Proof of service.	In proving such service or sending, it shall be sufficient to prove that the letter was properly addressed and put into the post.

EXERCISE OF DISCRETIONARY POWERS.

Hearing by Commissioner.	20. Before exercising any discretionary power given to the Commissioner by the said Act adversely to the applicant for registration of a trade mark, the Commissioner shall give to him or his agent ten days' notice, or such longer notice as he may think fit of his intention.
Notice of wish to be heard before the Commissioner.	21. Within five days from the date when such notice would be delivered in the ordinary course of post, or within such longer time as the Commissioner may in such notice appoint, the applicant shall notify to the Commissioner whether or not he intends to be heard upon the matter. Such notice may be in Form F in the Third Schedule hereto.
Attendance of applicant.	22. Whether the applicant desires to be heard or not, the Commissioner may at any time require him to submit a statement in

writing within a time to be notified by the Commissioner, or to attend before him and make oral explanations with respect to his application.

23. The decision of the Commissioner in the exercise of such discretionary power as aforesaid shall be notified to the applicant. Notification of decision.

APPEAL TO LAW OFFICER.

24. When any person intends to appeal to the Law Officer from a decision of the Commissioner in any case in which an appeal is given by the said Act, he shall, within one month from the date of the decision appealed against, leave at the Patent Office a notice (in Form G in the Third Schedule hereto) of such his intention. Notice of appeal.

25. Such notice shall contain a statement in writing of the grounds of appeal. Grounds of appeal to be stated.

26. A copy of such notice of intention to appeal shall also be forthwith sent to the Law Officer, and, where there has been an opposition before the Commissioner, to the opponent or applicant, as the case may be. Transmission of notice.

27. The Law Officer may thereupon give such directions (if any) as he may think fit, with respect to evidence or otherwise, for the purpose of the hearing of the appeal, or for the purpose of referring the appeal to the Supreme Court to hear and determine the same. Directions by Law Officer.

28. Where the Law Officer intends to hear the appeal, seven days' notice, or such shorter notice as the Law Officer may in any particular case direct, of the time and place appointed for the hearing, shall be given to the Commissioner and the appellant, and, where there has been an opposition before the Commissioner, to the opponent or applicant as the case may be. Hearing of appeal.

29. No appeal shall be entertained of which notice has not been given within one month from the date of the decision appealed against, or such further time as the Commissioner may allow, except by special leave of the Law Officer. No appeal unless notice duly given.

30. Subject to the directions and leave of the Law Officer, the evidence to be used on an appeal to him in the matter of an opposition shall be the same as that used at the hearing before the Commissioner. Evidence on appeal.

ADVERTISEMENT OF APPLICATION.

31. Every application shall be advertised by the Commissioner in the *Government Gazette* during such times and in such a manner as the Commissioner may direct, unless he refuse to entertain the application. Advertisement of application.

32. If no representation of the mark be inserted in connexion with the advertisement of an application, the Commissioner shall refer in such advertisement to the place or places where a specimen or representation of the mark is deposited for exhibition. Where no representation advertised.

33. The official paper for the purposes of these rules shall be the *Government Gazette*, or such other paper as the Commissioner may from time to time direct. Definition of official paper.

34. For the purposes of such advertisement the applicant may be required to furnish to the Government Printer, or to the printer of such other paper, a wood block or electrotype (or more than one if necessary) of the trade mark, of such dimensions as may from time to time be directed by the Commissioner, or with such other information or means of advertising the trade mark as may be required by the Commissioner; and the Commissioner, if the Government or other printer be dissatisfied with the block or electrotype furnished by the applicant or his agent, may require a fresh block or electrotype before proceeding with the advertisement. Means of advertising trade mark to be supplied to official paper.

35. When an application relates to a series of trade marks differing from one another in respect of the particulars mentioned in section 10 of the Act, the applicant may be required to furnish to the Government Printer or to the printer of such other paper a wood block or electrotype (or more than one if necessary) of any or of each of the trade marks constituting the series; and the Commissioner may, if he thinks fit, insert with the advertisement of the application a statement of the manner in respect of which the several trade marks differ from one another. Advertisement of series.

OPPOSITION TO REGISTRATION.

36. Every notice of opposition to the registration of a trade mark shall state the ground or grounds on which the opponent intends to oppose the registration, and be signed by him or by his agent, Notice of opposition.

	and shall also contain an address for service in Victoria, and shall be in the Form H in the Third Schedule to these Rules, with such variations as circumstances may require.
Opposition on the ground of trade mark already on the register.	37. Where the ground or one of the grounds of opposition is that the applicant is applying for the registration of a mark identical with one already on the register, with respect to the same goods or description of goods, or having such resemblance to a mark already on the register with respect to such goods or description of goods as to be calculated to deceive, the notice shall state the date of registration, and the number on the register of such trade mark already on the register.
Opponent's evidence.	38. Within two months after the expiration of one month or such further time, not exceeding three months, as the Commissioner may allow from the date of the advertisement of the application, the opponent shall leave at the Patent Office, Trade Marks Branch, such evidence by way of statutory declaration as he may desire to adduce in support of his opposition, and deliver to the applicant copies thereof.
Applicant's evidence—evidence in reply.	39. Within one month* from the delivery of the opponent's copies of his statutory declarations, the applicant shall leave at the Patent Office (Trade Marks Branch) his evidence by way of statutory declaration in answer, and deliver to the opponent copies thereof, and within seven days from such delivery the opponent shall leave at the said office his evidence by way of statutory declaration in reply, and deliver to the applicant copies thereof. Such last-mentioned evidence shall be confined to matters strictly in reply.
Closing of evidence.	40. No further evidence shall be left on either side except by leave of the Commissioner, upon the written consent of the parties duly notified to him, or by special leave of the Commissioner given on an application made to him.
Applications for leave to adduce further evidence.	41. Either party making such application shall give notice thereof to the opposite party, who shall be entitled to oppose the application.
Appointment of time for hearing.	42. On the completion of the evidence, the Commissioner shall appoint a time for the hearing of the case, and shall give the parties at least seven days' notice of such appointment.
Disallowance of opposition in certain cases.	43. On the hearing of the case no opposition shall be allowed in respect of any ground not stated in the notice of opposition, and where the ground or one of the grounds of opposition is that registration is being applied for in respect of a trade mark identical with one already on the register with respect to the same goods or description of goods, or having such resemblance to a trade mark already on the register with respect to such goods or description of goods as to be calculated to deceive, the opposition shall not be allowed upon such ground, unless the date of registration and the number on the register of the said trade mark already on the register have been duly specified in the notice of opposition.
Decision to be notified to parties.	44. The decision of the Commissioner in the case shall be notified to the parties.

REGISTER OF TRADE MARKS.

Time of registration.	45. As soon as may be after the expiration of one month from the date of the advertisement of the application the Commissioner shall, subject to opposition of the application and the determination thereof, if he is satisfied that the applicant is entitled to registration, and on payment of the prescribed fee, enter the name, address, and description of the applicant in the Register of Trade Marks as the registered proprietor of the trade mark in respect of the particular goods or class of goods described in his application.
Where applicant dies before registration, the trade mark may be registered for successor to good-will of business.	46. In case of the death of any applicant for a trade mark after the date of his application, and before the trade mark applied for has been entered upon the register, the Commissioner, after the expiration of the prescribed period of advertisement, may, on being satisfied of the applicant's death, enter on the register, in place of the name of such deceased applicant, the name, address, and description of the person owning the good-will of the business, if such ownership be proved to the satisfaction of the Commissioner.
Entries to be made in register.	47. Upon registering any trade mark the Commissioner shall enter in the register the date on which the application for registration was received by the Commissioner, and such other particulars as he may think necessary. Upon payment of the prescribed fee at the expiration of 14 years entry of the continuance of the trade mark shall be made in the register.

* Note.—The counter statement required by section 13 must also be delivered by the applicant within one month from the date of the receipt of the opponent's notice of opposition, or such further time as the Commissioner may allow.

48. The Commissioner shall send notice to the applicant of the registration of his trade mark, together with a reference to the advertisement of such trade mark in the official paper. Notice of registration.

49. Where a person becomes entitled to a registered trade mark by assignment, transmission, or other operation of law, a request, in the Form I in the Third Schedule hereto, for the entry of his name in the register as proprietor of the trade mark shall be addressed to the Commissioner, and left at the Patent Office (Trade Marks Branch). Request by subsequent proprietor.

50. Such request shall, in the case of an individual, be made and signed by the person requiring to be registered as proprietor, and in the case of a firm or partnership, by some one or more members of such firm or partnership, or in either case by his or their agent respectively, duly authorized to the satisfaction of the Commissioner, and in the case of a body corporate, by the secretary or other principal officer of such body corporate. Signature of request.

51. Every such request shall state the name, address, and description of the person claiming to be entitled to the trade mark (hereinafter called the claimant), and the particulars of the assignment, transmission, or other operation of law, by virtue of which he requires to be entered in the register as proprietor, so as to show the manner in which and the person or persons to whom the trade mark has been assigned or transmitted, and so as to show further that it has been so assigned or transmitted in connexion with the good-will of the business concerned in the particular goods or classes of goods for which the trade mark has been registered. Contents of request.

52. Every such request shall be accompanied by a statutory declaration to be thereunder written, verifying the several statements therein, and declaring that the particulars above described comprises every material fact and the material part of every document affecting the proprietorship of the trade mark as claimed by such request. Declaration to accompany request.

53. The claimant shall furnish to the Commissioner such other proof of title and of the existence and ownership of such good-will as aforesaid as he may require for his satisfaction. Further proof of title if required.

54. A body corporate may be registered as proprietor by its corporate name. Body corporate.

55. The term applicant shall include each of several persons claiming to be registered as proprietor of the same trade mark. Definition applicant.

56. Whether all such persons so claiming require to be heard before the Commissioner or not, he may, before exercising the discretion vested in him by section 15 of the Act, require such persons or any or either of them to submit a statement in writing within a time to be notified by him, or to attend before him and make oral explanations with respect to such matters as the Commissioner may require. Commissioner may require statement from rival claimants.

57. Where each of several persons claims to be registered as proprietor of the same trade mark, and the Commissioner refuses to register any of them until their rights have been determined according to law, the manner in which the rights of such claimants may be submitted to the Supreme Court by the Commissioner, or if the Commissioner so require, by the claimants, shall, unless such court otherwise order, be by a special case; and such special case shall be filed and proceeded with in like manner as any other special case submitted to the said court, or in such other manner as such court may direct. Submission to court of conflicting claims.

58. Where the special case is to be submitted by the parties it may be agreed to by them, or, if they differ, may be settled by the Commissioner on payment of the prescribed fees. Settlement of special case.

59. Where an order has been made by the Supreme Court in either of the following cases, viz.:— Order of court.

- (a) Allowing an appeal under section 6 of the said Act;
- (b) Disallowing an opposition to registration under section 13; or
- (c) Under the provisions of sections 16, 29, or 33 of the said Act;

the person in whose favour such order has been made, or such one of them, if more than one, as the Commissioner may direct, shall forthwith leave at the Patent Office (Trade Marks Branch) an office copy of such order. The register shall thereupon be rectified or altered, or the purport of such order shall otherwise be duly entered in the register, as the case may be.

60. Where a trade mark has been removed from the register for non-payment of the prescribed fee or otherwise, the Commissioner shall cause to be entered in the register a record of such removal and the cause thereof. Removal of mark from register.

61. If the registered proprietor of a trade mark send to the Commissioner, together with the prescribed fee, notice of an Alteration of address in register.

alteration in his address, the Commissioner shall alter the register accordingly. Such notice may be in the Form J in the Third Schedule hereto.

Notice to Commissioner of applications to rectify register.
Publication of rectification or variation of register.

62. Four clear days' notice of every application to the Supreme Court for rectification of the register shall be given to the Commissioner.

63. Whenever an order is made by the court for making, expunging, or varying an entry from or in the register, the Commissioner shall, if he thinks that such rectification or variation should be made public, and at the expense of the person applying for the same, publish by advertisement or otherwise, and in such a manner as he thinks just, the circumstances attending such rectification or variation in the register.

Notice to Commissioner of order of court for alteration of trade mark.

64. Whenever the registered proprietor of any trade mark intends to apply for the leave of the court to add to or alter such trade mark, under section 33 of the Act, the notice to be given to the Commissioner shall be given fourteen days at least before such application. If leave be granted on such application, the applicant shall forthwith supply to the Commissioner such a number of representations of the trade mark as altered as he may deem sufficient.

INSPECTION OF REGISTER.

Hours of inspection.

65. The register of trade marks shall be open to the inspection of the public, on payment of the prescribed fee, on every week day during ordinary office hours, except on the—

- (a) Days notified as public holidays;
- (b) Days which may from time to time be notified by a placard posted in a conspicuous place at the Patent Office;
- (c) Times when the register is required for any purpose of official use.

POWER TO WAIVE REQUIREMENTS.

Dispensing with requirements.

66. Where under these Rules any person is required to do any act or thing, or to sign any document, or to make any declaration on behalf of himself or of any body corporate, or any document or evidence is required to be produced to or left with the Commissioner, or at the Patent Office, and it is shown to the satisfaction of the Commissioner that from any reasonable cause such person is unable to do such act or thing, or to sign such document, or make such declaration; or that such document or evidence cannot be produced or left as aforesaid, it shall be lawful for the Commissioner, upon the production of such other evidence, and subject to such terms as he may think fit, to dispense with such act or thing, document, declaration, or evidence.

AMENDMENTS.

Amendment of documents.

67. Any document or drawing or other representation of a trade mark, for the amending of which no special provision is made by the said Act, may be amended, and any irregularity in procedure, which, in the opinion of the Commissioner may be obviated without detriment to the interests of any person, may be corrected, if the Commissioner think fit, and on such terms as he may direct.

ENLARGEMENT OF TIME.

Commissioner may enlarge time.

68. The time prescribed by these Rules for doing any act or taking any proceeding thereunder may be enlarged by the Commissioner if he think fit, and upon such notice to other parties and proceedings thereon, and upon such terms as he may direct.

CERTIFICATES.

Certificate by Commissioner.

69. The Commissioner, when required to give any certificate as to any entry, matter, or thing which he is authorized by the Act or any of these Rules to make or do, may, on the receipt of a request in writing, and on payment of the prescribed fee, give such certificate; but every certificate of registration shall have specified on the face thereof whether the same is to be used in legal proceedings or for the purpose of obtaining registration in any other colony or country, or for purposes other than use in legal proceedings or obtaining registration elsewhere.

DECLARATIONS.

70. The statutory declarations required by the said Act and these Rules, or used in any proceeding thereunder, shall be made and subscribed as follows :—

- (a) In Victoria before any person authorized by law in any part of Victoria to take a declaration ;
- (b) In any other part of Her Majesty's dominions before any court, judge, justice of the peace, or any officer authorized by law to administer an oath or take a declaration there ; and
- (c) If made out of Her Majesty's dominions before a British Minister or person exercising the functions of a British Minister, or a Consul, Vice-Consul, or other person exercising the functions of a British Consul or a notary public, or before a judge or magistrate.

Manner in which and persons before whom declaration is to be taken.

71. Any document purporting to have affixed, impressed, or subscribed thereto or thereon the seal or signature of any person hereby authorized to take such declaration, in testimony of such declaration having been made, subscribed before him, may be admitted by the Commissioner without proof of the genuineness of any such seal or signature, or of the official character of such person or of his authority to take such declaration.

Notice of seal of officer taking declaration to prove itself.

REPEAL.

72. All general Rules as to the registration of trade marks heretofore made by the Governor in Council, and in force on the 1st day of March, 1891, shall be and they are hereby repealed as from that date, without prejudice, nevertheless, to anything done under such Rules, or to any application pending at the said date.

The main pipes in the said streets being laid down, the owners of all tenements situated as under are hereby required, on or before the 15th day of March next, to cause a proper pipe and stopcocks to be laid so as to supply water from the main pipe within such premises.

MELBOURNE WATER SUPPLY.

By-LAWS.

THE Board of Land and Works doth hereby, pursuant to and in exercise and execution of the powers and authorities conferred on such Board by the *Water Act 1830*, No. 1156, make the by-laws following:—

1. All by-laws heretofore made relating to the Melbourne Water Supply shall be and the same are hereby repealed, except as to anything done or committed or the recovery of any rates due and payable thereunder.

2. The following rates and charges are those which the owners and occupiers of lands and tenements shall pay in respect of water supplied by the Board, that is to say:—

I. On every house or tenement of £20 annual value and under, Ten shillings per annum.

II. On every house or tenement above the annual value of £20, a rate of Sixpence for each pound sterling on the amount of the valuation up to £300 inclusive, and One pound ten shillings per centum on the amount of the valuation in excess of £300.

III. Tenements built and used for storage purposes only, such as bonded stores, a rate of Sixpence for each pound sterling on the amount of the valuation up to £300, and One pound per centum on the amount of such valuation in excess of £300.

IV. Private water troughs will be charged for at the rate of Forty shillings per annum each, except where in the opinion of the Board a meter shall be necessary.

V. Water for steam boilers will be charged for at the rate of Ten shillings per annum for each horse-power of such steam boiler, except where in the opinion of the Board a meter shall be necessary.

VI. For water supplied to shipping the charge will be—at the Melbourne wharves, Three shillings per one thousand gallons; at other places, Four shillings per one thousand gallons.

VII. Water for horses, where the number kept on one tenement does not exceed two, will be charged for at the rate of Ten shillings per annum for each horse, and water for cows up to three in number; kept or partially kept on premises, at the rate of Five shillings for each cow, but it shall be optional for the owners of same to take the supply by measure.

In instances where the above numbers are exceeded, the supply of water must be by measure.

VIII. The Board may supply water for the making and mixing of concrete at the rate of Two pence per cubic yard, and for masonry and brickwork at the rate of Three halfpence per cubic yard, as measured in the work.

IX. Water supplied by the Board by measurement will be charged at the rate of One shilling per one thousand gallons; and in cases where the supply is solely for purposes other than domestic the minimum charge will be 25,000 gallons per quarter.

3. The minimum quantity of water to be charged for by meter where water is supplied for domestic purposes, as well as for purposes other than domestic, shall be the quantity which at One shilling per thousand gallons equals the amount of the assessed rate which would be payable for the premises so supplied if supplied otherwise than by measure.

4. The Board may grant permission to persons requiring water for "domestic" and for "other than domestic purposes" to affix two service-pipes, one for domestic supply without meter, for which the ordinary assessed rate shall be paid, and one for other than domestic purposes with meter, the water used therefrom to be paid for at the rate of One shilling per thousand gallons, but subject to such regulations as may be approved by the Board against the use or re-use of water from domestic service for irrigation or any other purpose not domestic.

5. Any person receiving water from the Board who shall take and carry away such water from his premises, or who shall allow any person to take or carry away such water, or shall sell the same to any other person, shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding Five pounds.

6. Any person not having agreed to be supplied by the Board who shall take or carry away water from any drinking-tap, trough, or private or public service-pipe, shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding Five pounds.

7. Before any person shall affix any service-pipe to any pipe of the Board, or alter, repair, or in any manner interfere with any pipe of the Board, or any service-pipe, cock, or fitting connected with the pipes of the Board, he shall obtain from the Board a licence in that behalf to execute such works; and any unlicensed person affixing, altering, repairing, or in any manner interfering with any such pipe, service-pipe, cock, or fitting as aforesaid shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding Ten pounds.

8. Such licence shall be for such period and be from time to time renewable as the Board shall see fit, and the Board may at any time cancel such licence in the event of the holder thereof, by himself or his employes, committing any breach of these by-laws.

9. Before any such licence shall be granted by the Board, the person applying for the same shall satisfy the Board that he is a competent plumber.

10. Any person, whether licensed as aforesaid or not, who shall offend by opening any ground, so as to uncover any pipe or pipes the property of the Board, without giving two days' notice to the Board of his intention so to do, or who shall in any way tamper with or alter any pipe the property of the Board, without the permission in writing of the Board being first obtained, or who shall wilfully or carelessly break, injure, or open any lock, cock, valve, pipe, work, or engine the property of the Board, shall be liable for each such offence to a penalty not exceeding Twenty pounds.

Any person, whether licensed as aforesaid or not, who shall lay any pipe to communicate with the pipes of the Board without giving two days' notice of the day and hour when such pipe is intended to be made to communicate with the pipes of the Board, or who shall make such communication except under the superintendence and according to the directions of some officer of the Board, or who shall lay any leaden or other pipe to communicate with the pipe of the Board of a strength and material not sanctioned by the Board, shall be liable for each such offence to a penalty not exceeding Five pounds; and in the event of continuing the offence, to a further penalty of Two pounds for each day after notice of the offence from the Board. and galvanized-iron piping of approved quality only will be allowed for external and internal services.

Ordinary connexions with sub-mains must be made with proper stop-cock ferrules, to which, for iron services, a length of not less than three feet of lead pipe must be attached. One service-pipe only for domestic supply to each tenement will be permitted, and for houses rated at Twenty pounds per annum and under the bore of such service-pipe must not exceed $\frac{1}{2}$ inch.

12. All connexions with lead and iron pipes must be made with brass union couplings. All joints connecting lead pipes must be "wiped" joints, and in no case will "bolt" or "copper-bit" joints be allowed on water service-pipes, either in the interior or on the exterior of any building or tenement, on pain of cancellation of licence. A high-pressure screw-down stop-cock shall be fixed on each house service between the main and the building line, and at a uniform distance of 3 feet from the building line, to be properly secured and covered with an approved cast-iron cap.

13. No extensions of private services will be allowed except by consent of the Board.

14. If any person shall neglect to repair any service-pipe conveying water from the pipes of the Board into the premises of such person, after having received notice from any officer of the Board that such service-pipe requires repairing, the Board may stop the water from flowing into such premises either by cutting off the service-pipe or otherwise as to the said Board may seem fit, until the necessary repairs shall have been effected. The service-pipes from the main being the property of the owners or occupiers of the tenements supplied by such service-pipes, the occupier (if any), and if none the owner, shall in every instance in which, after notice that service-pipe requires repairing, any damage shall be caused by reason of such service-pipe being leaky or otherwise out of repair or broken be liable to a penalty not exceeding Five pounds; and in the event of continuing the offence, to a further penalty of Two pounds for each day after notice of the offence from the Board.

15. Any person supplied with water by the Board who shall wilfully or negligently allow the same to run to waste shall be liable for each offence to a penalty not exceeding Five pounds; and in the event of continuing the offence, to a further penalty of Two pounds for each day after notice of the offence from the Board.

16. No meter shall be affixed until it shall have been examined, tested, and approved by a duly authorized officer of the Board. Each meter must be capable of registering at least one million gallons.

17. If any meter should cease registering, or be reported by the inspector as out of repair or registering inaccurately, the Board shall estimate and charge for the water consumed during the period such meter was not in working order, and until it is repaired and refixed, either by taking an average of the quantity used during the previous quarter or during the corresponding period of the previous year, or the Board may insert a check-meter on the service-pipe.

18. Meters affixed to services shall not be removed or interfered with except upon written application to, and with the approval of, the Board.

19. Baths to be fitted must not exceed 6ft. 3in. in length along the centre line by a mean width of 2 feet and a depth of 1ft. 9in.; the section of bottom to be a segment of a circle, the ends to be circular in shape and sloping inwards. Overflow pipes will not be permitted.

20. Any person, whether licensed as aforesaid or not, connecting any service-pipe or branch service-pipe with any steam boiler for the purpose of feeding or supplying the same with water, without first affixing a self-acting valve for preventing the pressure of the steam reversing or affecting the dial of the meter, shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding Five pounds; and in the event of continuing the offence, to a further penalty of Two pounds for each day after notice of the offence from the Board.

21. No person shall, without the written permission of the Board, water streets or thoroughfares by means of hydrants and hose attached to fire-plugs. Any person offending against this by-law shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding Five pounds.

22. The water supply to all public parks and gardens shall be exclusively under the control and direction of the officers of the Water Supply Branch of the Department of Public Works, and any person not duly authorized turning on the water or otherwise interfering with such water supply shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding Five pounds.

23. No person shall use a hose attached to any tap or pipe (used for the purpose of supplying the water of the Board for domestic purposes to any house or premises) for watering any garden, laying dust, or for any other purpose whatsoever, unless where a water-meter is fixed and the water supplied by measure; and any person offending against this by-law shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding Five pounds.

24. No tap shall be placed in any garden or yard, or to or outside of any dwelling or premises supplied with the water of the Board, unless a water-meter is fixed and the water supplied by measure; and any person offending against this by-law shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding Five pounds.

25. In the construction of these by-laws, the word "person" shall be deemed to extend to and include a corporation, whether aggregate or sole.

BOARD OF LAND AND WORKS.—BY-LAWS.— GEELONG WATER SUPPLY.

THE Board of Land and Works doth hereby, pursuant to and in exercise of the powers and authorities conferred on such Board by the *Water Act 1890*, make the By-laws following:—

1. All by-laws heretofore made relating to the Geelong Water Supply shall be and the same are hereby repealed, except as to anything done or committed, or the recovery of any rates due and payable thereunder.

2. The following rates and charges are those which the owners and occupiers of lands and tenements shall pay in respect of water supplied by the Board, that is to say:—

- (i.) On every house or tenement of £10 annual value and under, Ten shillings per annum.
- (ii.) On every house or tenement above the annual value of £10, a rate of Five pounds per centum on the amount of the valuation up to £100 inclusive; Four pounds per centum on the amount of the valuation in excess of £100 up to £300; Three pounds per centum on the amount of the valuation in excess of £300 up to £500; and Two pounds ten shillings per centum on the amount of the valuation in excess of £500.
- (iii.) Buildings used for storage purposes only, such as bonded stores, shall be subject to a rate of Two pounds ten shillings per centum on the amount of the valuation.
- (iv.) Private water-troughs shall be charged at the rate of Twenty shillings per annum each.
- (v.) For water supplied by the Board by measure, except in cases of special agreement with the Board, the rate shall be One shilling per thousand gallons.
- (vi.) The rate to be charged for water supplied from stand-pipes shall be Twopence per hundred gallons.
- (vii.) Horses shall be charged for at the rate of Seven shillings and sixpence each per annum.
- (viii.) Water for steam-boilers shall be charged at the rate of Fifteen shillings per horse-power per annum, except in such cases as the Board shall require that the supply shall be by measure at the rate of One shilling per thousand gallons.
- (ix.) Water for gas-engines shall be charged for at the rate of Ten shillings per annum for each engine, except in such cases as the Board shall require that the supply shall be by measure, at the rate of One shilling per thousand gallons.
- (x.) On all buildings in course of erection where water is required for building purposes the rate to be charged shall be Five shillings per centum on the contract price of the work, excepting in such cases as the Minister of Water Supply shall direct that the supply shall be by measure, at the rate of One shilling per thousand gallons, or by special agreement.
- (xi.) For water supplied to shipping the charge shall be One shilling per hundred gallons for the first three hundred gallons; above three hundred gallons and not in excess of four hundred gallons the charge shall be Ninepence per hundred gallons; above four hundred gallons and not in excess of five hundred gallons the charge shall be Eightpence per hundred gallons; in excess of five hundred gallons the charge shall be at the rate of Six shillings per thousand gallons.

3. The minimum quantity of water to be charged for in each case where water is supplied by measure shall be—(1.) If for domestic and other than domestic purposes, the quantity of which the charge is One shilling per thousand gallons would be equal to the amount of the assessed rate which would be payable for the premises so supplied if supplied otherwise than by measure; and (2.) If for other than domestic purposes only twenty-five thousand gallons per quarter.

4. The Board may grant permission to persons requiring water for "domestic" and for "other than domestic purposes" to affix two service-pipes, one for domestic supply without meter, for which the ordinary assessed rate shall be paid, and one for other than domestic purposes with meter, the water used therefrom to be paid for at the rate of One shilling per thousand gallons, but subject to such regulations as may be approved by the Board against the use or re-use of water from the domestic service for irrigation or any other purpose not domestic.

5. Any person receiving water from the Board who shall take and carry away such water from his premises, or who shall allow any person to take or carry away such water, or shall sell the same to any other person, shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding Five pounds.

6. Any person not having agreed to be supplied by the Board who shall take or carry away water from any drinking-tap, trough, or private or public service-pipe, shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding Five pounds.

7. Before any person shall affix any service-pipe to any pipe of the Board, or alter or repair, or in any way interfere with any pipe of the Board, or any service-pipe, cock, or fitting connected with the pipes of the Board, he shall obtain from the Board a licence in that behalf to execute such works; and any unlicensed person affixing, altering, repairing, or in any manner interfering with any such pipe, service-pipe, cock, or fitting, as aforesaid, shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding Ten pounds.

8. Such licence shall be for such period, and be from time to time renewable as the Board shall see fit; and the Board may at any time cancel such licence in the event of the holder thereof, by himself or his employes, committing any breach of those by-laws.

9. Before any such licence shall be granted by the Board, the person applying for same shall satisfy the Board that he is a competent plumber.

10. Any person, whether licensed as aforesaid or not, who shall offend by opening any ground so as to uncover any pipe or pipes, the property of the Board, without giving two days' notice to the Board of his intention so to do, or who shall in any way tamper with or alter any pipe, the property of the Board, without the permission, in writing, of the Board being first obtained, or who shall wilfully or carelessly break, injure, or open any lock, cock, valve, pipe, work, or engine, the property of the Board, shall be liable for each such offence to a penalty not exceeding Twenty pounds.

11. Any person, whether licensed as aforesaid or not, who shall lay any pipe to communicate with the pipes of the Board without giving two days' notice of the day and hour when such pipe is intended to be made to communicate with the pipes of the Board, or who shall make such communication except under the superintendence and according to the directions of some officer of the Board, or who shall lay any leaden or other pipe to communicate with the pipe of the Board of a strength and material not sanctioned by the Board, shall be liable for each such offence to a penalty not exceeding Five pounds; and, in the event of continuing the offence, to a further penalty of Two pounds for each day after notice of the offence from the Board. Wrought-iron piping of approved quality, and lead piping of the following weights only, will be allowed to be fixed for either internal or external services:—

Ordinary connexions with sub-mains must be made with proper stop-cock ferrules. One service-pipe only for domestic supply for each tenement will be permitted. No service of a larger bore than ½ inch will be permitted unless by special consent of the Board.

12. All connexions with lead and iron pipes must be made with brass union couplings. All joints connecting lead pipes must be "wiped" joints, and in no case will "bolt" or "copper-bit" joints be allowed on water service-pipes, either in the interior or on the exterior of any building or tenement, on pain of cancellation of licence. A high-pressure screw-down stop-cock shall be fixed on each house service between the main and the building line, and at a uniform distance of three (3) feet from the building line, to be properly secured and covered with an approved cast-iron cap.

13. No extension of private services will be allowed except by consent of the Board.

14. If any person shall neglect to repair any service-pipe conveying water from the pipes of the Board into the premises of such person, after having received notice from any officer of the Board that such service-pipe requires repairing, the Board may stop the water from flowing into such premises either by cutting off the service-pipe or otherwise as to the said Board may seem fit, until the necessary repairs shall have been effected. If any meter shall cease registering, or be reported by the inspector or any authorized officer of the Board as out of repairs or registering inaccurately, the Board shall estimate and charge for the water consumed during the period such meter was not in working order, and until it is repaired and re-fixed, either by taking an average of the quantity used during the previous quarter, or during the corresponding period of the previous year, or the Board may insert a check-meter on the service-pipe.

18. Meters affixed to services shall not be removed or interfered with except upon written application to and with the approval of the Board.

19. A separate meter shall, in every case, be provided for each tenement where the supply is by measure.

20. Baths supplied from the pipes, except where the supply is by meter, shall not exceed six feet three inches in length along the centre line, by a mean width of two feet, and a depth of one foot nine inches, the ends sloping inwards. Overflow pipes will not be permitted.

21. Any person, whether licensed as aforesaid or not, connecting any service-pipe, or branch service-pipe, with any steam boiler for the purpose of feeding or supplying the same with water, without first affixing a self-acting valve for preventing the pressure of the steam reversing or affecting the dial of the meter, shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding Five pounds; and in the event of continuing the offence, to a further penalty of Two pounds for each day after notice of the offence from the Board.

22. Water-closets will not be allowed to be supplied direct from the main, but from a cistern only, so constructed that the water cannot flow continuously, and that not more than two gallons can escape at each flush.

23. No person shall use a hose attached to any tap or pipe (used for the purpose of supplying the water of the Board for domestic purposes to any house or premises) for watering any garden, laying dust, or for any other purpose whatsoever, unless where a water meter is fixed, and the water supplied by measure; and any person offending against this by-law shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding Five pounds for each such offence.

24. If any person supplied with water by the Board does, or causes to be done, anything in contravention of any of these regulations, or fails to pay his rates when due, or fails to do anything which under these regulations ought to be done, or wilfully or negligently allows water to run to waste, the Board may cut off the supply of water from the premises of such person, either by cutting the pipes by or through which water is supplied or otherwise, and may cease to supply him with water so long as the cause of injury remains or is not remedied.

25. The streets shall not be watered from hydrants or fire-plugs by means of a hose, but the water is to be supplied to the streets by carts, or by manual labour, or by special stand-pipes of approved size and form.

26. Channel flushing and filling of public baths shall only be permitted between the hours of Ten o'clock p.m. and Six o'clock a.m.

27. The water supplied in the above district shall be received and consumed under and in accordance with these regulations, and not otherwise, through pipes and meters laid, placed, and being under and in accordance with the same regulations, and not otherwise.

28. In the construction of these by-laws the word "person" shall be deemed to extend to and include a corporation, whether aggregate or sole; and the word "Board" shall mean the Board of Land and Works.

PROCLAMATION

By His Excellency the Right Honorable John Adrian Louis, Earl of Hopetoun, Viscount Aithrie, and Baron Hope, in the Peerage of Scotland; Baron Hopetoun of Hopetoun, and Baron Niddry of Niddry Castle, in the Peerage of the United Kingdom; Knight Grand Cross of the Most Distinguished Order of Saint Michael and Saint George; Governor and Commander-in-Chief in and over the Colony of Victoria and its Dependencies; &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS by the *Water Act 1890* (No. 1156) it is amongst other things enacted that the Governor in Council may proclaim any city, town, borough, or populous place comprising the whole or any portion of a Waterworks District to be an "Urban District" for the purposes of the said Act, and may name the limits thereof: Now therefore I, the Governor of Victoria, with the advice of the Executive Council, do hereby proclaim the whole of the Waterworks District of the Kyabram Waterworks Trust, as such district is limited and defined by a certain Order in Council, bearing date the 14th October, 1889, and published in the *Government Gazette* of the 18th October, 1889, page 3448, to be an "Urban District" for the purposes and within the meaning of the said Act.

SEYMOUR WATERWORKS TRUST.
REGULATION No. 1.

THE Commissioners of the Seymour Waterworks Trust do hereby, in pursuance of the provisions of the *Water Act 1890*, and in exercise of the powers and authorities conferred by the said Act, make the following Regulations:

The following Regulations shall apply to that portion of the Waterworks district of the Seymour Waterworks Trust proclaimed an urban district by the Governor in Council on the 3rd day of February, 1891, the boundaries of which urban district are fully described in the *Government Gazette* of the 6th February, 1891, page 764:

1. The rates and charges hereinafter specified are those which the owners or occupiers of land and tenements situated within the aforesaid water district and liable to be rated, shall pay for the year 1891, in respect of water supplied otherwise than by measure for domestic purposes, such rate to be payable half yearly, in advance, in equal instalments, on the 1st day of January and on the 1st day of July in each year:

- (1) On every house and tenement of the annual value of Twenty pounds or under, according to the municipal valuation of such house or tenement during the said year, the sum of Twenty shillings.
- (2) On every house or tenement above the annual value of Twenty pounds, according to the municipal valuation of such house or tenement during the said year, the sum of One shilling in the pound of such valuation.

2. The following shall be the charges payable in respect of water supplied by measure:

- (1) Water supplied by measure shall be charged for at the rate of One shilling for every one thousand gallons (or at such price as may be specially agreed upon). The minimum quantity of water to be charged for in each case where so supplied shall be Twenty thousand gallons per half year, or a quantity which at One shilling per thousand gallons would be equivalent to the quantity of water which the owner or occupier would be entitled to receive, according to his assessed rate for the year, if supplied otherwise than by measure.
- (2) The stand pipe or hydrant water for each load of two hundred and fifty gallons or under, One shilling.
- (3) For a temporary supply during the erection of new buildings, Twenty shillings per cent on the amount of contract for stonework, brickwork, and plastering; or, in the event of there not being any contract, Twenty shillings per cent on the amount charged or paid for the stonework, brickwork, and plastering.

3. All accounts for water supplied under special agreement or by measure shall be paid quarterly, or as may be agreed upon.

4. Such person or persons as the Commissioners of the said Trust may from time to time appoint for the purpose are hereby authorized to collect and recover the said rates and charges.

REGULATION No. 2.

THE Commissioners of the Seymour Waterworks Trust do hereby, in pursuance of the provisions of the *Water Act 1890*, and in exercise of the powers and authorities conferred by the said Act, make the following Regulations:

1. Any person receiving water from the Trust who shall take and carry away such water from the premises to which it is supplied; or who shall allow any person to take or carry away such water, or shall sell the same to any other person, shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding Five pounds.

2. Any person, not having agreed to be supplied by the Trust, who shall take or carry away water from any stand pipe, hydrant, or any public or private service pipe, shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding Five pounds.

3. No person shall lay any pipe to communicate with the pipes of the Trust without giving two days' notice of the day and hour when such pipe is intended to be made to communicate with the pipes of the Trust; nor shall make such communication except under the superintendence and according to the directions of a duly authorized officer of the Trust appointed for that purpose; and any person committing a breach of this Regulation shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding Ten pounds for every such breach.

4. When water is supplied for domestic use, except when paid for by meter, or under special agreement, the supply shall be through service pipes of the following diameter, viz: all pipes (½ in.) three-quarters of an inch, except where a special agreement is made.

5. A supply of water for domestic purposes shall not include a supply of water for any livery stables or carriers' stables, or for manufacturing purposes.

6. No person shall apply a hose or pipe to any pipes or taps for the purpose of watering the ground, or trees, or plants, or washing the house walls, or a carriage, or for any similar purposes, unless where the water is charged for by meter; except by the written authority of the Trust; and any person committing a breach of this Regulation shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding Five pounds for every such breach.

7. Before any person shall affix any service pipes to any pipes of the Trust, or alter, or repair, or in any manner interfere with any pipes or service pipes, cocks, or fittings connected with the pipes of the Trust, he shall obtain from the Trust a licence in that behalf to execute such works; and any unlicensed person affixing, altering, repairing, or in any manner interfering with any such pipes, service pipes, cocks, or fittings as aforesaid, shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding Ten pounds.

8. Before any such licence being granted by the Trust, the person applying shall satisfy the Trust that he is a competent person. The Trust shall have the power of cancelling such licence at any time.

9. The quality of material required in laying private services shall be as follows:

- (1) The whole of the pipes, tees, thimbles (except those connecting the service pipes and mains), bends, reducing couplings, plugs, &c., to be of the best galvanized iron.
- (2) All pipes and pieces to be true in sectional form, straight longitudinally, and of equal strength and thickness throughout the entire body of the same.
- (3) All ends of pipes, bends, &c., to be properly and truly threaded, and capable of being screwed into thimbles, trees, &c., &c.
- (4) The whole of the pipes, tees, bends, &c., to be sound and free from all defects, and capable of a hydrostatic pressure equal to a column of water 400 feet.
- (5) All delivery cocks and thimbles for connecting the service pipes and mains to be high pressure, and made of brass of the best quality and workmanship, and of approved pattern, to screw into elbows, bends, &c. All cocks and thimbles to stand the same pressure as the pipes.
- (6) No service pipes shall be laid at a depth below the surface of the ground less than 10 inches.

10. No meter shall be affixed until it shall have been examined, tested, and approved by a duly authorized officer of the Trust; each meter must be capable of registering at least one million (1,000,000) gallons.

11. Meters affixed to services shall not be removed or interfered with except upon written application to and with the approval of the Trust. Any person offending against this regulation shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding Five pounds.

12. Overflow pipes to private baths will not be permitted.

13. No person shall, without the written permission of the Trust, water streets or thoroughfares by means of a hydrant and hose attached to fire plugs. Any person offending against this regulation shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding Five pounds.

14. The fire-plugs shall not be used except for the purpose of extinguishing fires, unless any other use of them is allowed in writing by the Trust, and they shall at all times be under the control of the officers of the Trust.

15. The Trust may contract with any owner or occupier of premises, or of any land or tenements, who is entitled to be supplied with water from its works, or who is desirous of being so supplied, for the provision and laying on of a service pipe from the pipes of the Trust to the boundaries of such land, premises, or tenements abutting on the street or road in which are the pipes of the Trust.

16. No person supplied with water by the Trust shall wilfully or negligently allow the same to run to waste. Any person committing a breach of this regulation shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding Five pounds.

17. If any person supplied with water by the Trust does, or causes or permits to be done, anything in contravention of these regulations, or fails to pay his rates or any lawful charges imposed by the Trust when due, or fails to do anything which under these regulations ought to be done, or wilfully or negligently allows water to run to waste, the Trust may cut off the supply of water from the premises of such person, either by cutting the pipes by or through which water is supplied, or otherwise, and may cease to supply him with water so long as the cause of complaint remains or is not remedied.

18. The officers of the Trust shall have power at all reasonable times to enter any house, building, or land through or into which water is supplied by the Trust by measure or otherwise in order to inspect the meters, instruments, pipes, and apparatus for the measuring, conveyance, reception, or storage of water; or for the purpose of ascertaining the quantity of water supplied or consumed, or preventing waste, and to inspect and examine if there be any waste or misuse of such water, and may from time to time enter any house, building, or land for the purpose of removing any meter, instrument, pipe, or apparatus, the property of the Trust, and if any person hinders such officer from entering or making such inspection or effecting such removal, he shall for every such offence be liable to a penalty not exceeding Five pounds.

19. The water supply in the waterworks district of the Trust shall be received and consumed under and in accordance with these regulations, and not otherwise, through pipes and meters laid, placed, and being under and in accordance with the said regulations, and not otherwise.

20. In the construction of these regulations the word "person" shall be deemed to extend to and include a corporation or company, whether aggregate or sole. The word "offer" shall be deemed and be taken to mean any officer or servant of the Trust duly authorized in that behalf; and the word "Trust" shall be deemed to mean the Seymour Waterworks Trust.

The foregoing regulations were made and passed by the Commissioners of the Seymour Waterworks Trust this 20th day of February, 1891, and the seal of the Trust was hereunto affixed in the presence of—

No. 1106) it is amongst other things enacted that the local committee of any vermin district may, in the month of January in each and every year, recommend to the Governor an annual rate, to be called a "fencing rate," specifying the amount thereof to be paid by all owners, lessees, or occupiers of land within its vermin district upon whose boundaries any vermin-proof wire net fence has been erected by the Board, for the purpose of paying the interest upon the cost of the erection of such fence, or any portion thereof, and for the repair and maintenance of the same: And whereas the local committee duly appointed for the Middle Vermin District has recommended a rate of Two pounds ten shillings per mile of fencing to be the fencing rate payable under the provisions of Part II. of the Act aforesaid: Now therefore I, the Governor of Victoria, with the advice of the Executive Council, do hereby proclaim an annual rate of Two pounds ten shillings per mile of fencing to be the fencing rate payable for the current year by all owners, lessees, or occupiers of land within the Middle Vermin District whose lands abut on the vermin-proof fence.

No. 1106) it is amongst other things enacted that the local committee for the destruction of vermin of any vermin district shall within thirty days from its appointment, and thereafter in the month of January in each and every year, recommend to the Governor an annual rate or assessment, specifying the amount thereof to be paid by the owners, lessees, or occupiers of land within its vermin district, in respect of each square mile of land owned, held under lease, or occupied under the provisions of the said Part of the said Act; and also in respect of the sheep or cattle depasturing thereon; and it is further enacted that such rate or assessment on being proclaimed by the Governor in Council in the *Government Gazette* shall be the rate payable by the owners, lessees, and occupiers of land within the vermin district for the current year for the purposes of the said Part of the said Act, and shall be paid to the Minister at the same time as the rent payable by such lessees and occupiers: And whereas the local committee duly appointed for the Middle Vermin District has recommended a rate of Eleven shillings per square mile upon all lands within the boundaries of the said vermin district: Now therefore I, the Governor of Victoria, with the advice of the Executive Council, do hereby proclaim an annual rate of Eleven shillings per square mile to be the rate payable by the owners, lessees, or occupiers of lands within the Middle Vermin District aforesaid for the current year.

4. Vehicles shall approach the entrance to the Zoological and Acclimatisation Society's Gardens from the south, and after setting down passengers, shall be removed to the site set apart as a carriage stand. No horse shall stand within the gardens, or be attached to any of the fences around them.

5. No person shall ride or drive on the grass or on the footways, and all persons using the carriage ways shall keep the proper side of the road as on public roads.

6. No person shall enter the park for the purpose of breaking in horses, or training or exercising horses, or break in, train, or exercise horses within the park, or jump horses over any of the fences, or drive cattle or sheep through the park.

7. No person shall climb any of the fences or trees, or damage the same by cutting or otherwise defacing the same, or stick bills on the trees, fences, or gates, or lie on the seats, or, without the sanction of the trustees, remove any wood, gravel, stone, sand, earth, or other material from the park.

8. No person shall bring any dog into the park unless held by a chain or cord, or discharge firearms, or throw stones, or use any projectile whatever, or molest any of the animals in the park, or, without the sanction of the trustees, kindle any fire therein.

9. No person shall be allowed in the park with firearms of any sort, bows and arrows, shanghais, slings, or other such implements.

10. No person shall take birds' nests, or enter upon plots of ground enclosed for plantations or other purposes.

11. No public meeting or assemblage of people for any purpose shall be held in the park without the sanction of the trustees.

12. No person taking part in sports of any kind (or under any other circumstances) shall appear in the park except in decent costume.

13. No person shall (unless by permission in writing of the trustees) sell or offer for sale any article of merchandise or trade within the park.

14. No person shall leave empty bottles, or broken glass, or crockery, paper, or any other litter in the park, or beat carpets, or dry clothes, or commit any nuisance.

15. Preaching or public harangues, whereby a crowd is collected, shall not be permitted within the park.

16. All goats and poultry found within the park shall be liable to be destroyed.

17. Cricket, football, or other athletic sports, shall not be played or take place in any part of the park on Sundays.

18. Any person found in a state of intoxication, or behaving in a disorderly manner, or taking part in a fight or disturbance, or committing in the park any act of indecency, or appearing in indecent costume, or making use of foul, indecent, threatening, or abusive language to or within hearing of any other person, may be forthwith removed by any Crown lands bailiff or police constable.

19. Any person offending against any of the foregoing Rules and Regulations shall, in accordance with section 137 of *Land Act 1890*, No. 1106, on conviction before any justice forfeit and pay a penalty not exceeding five pounds for each offence; and every person who so offends and who after he has been warned by any bailiff of Crown lands, or officer, or servant, of the Trustees, or by any constable does not desist from so offending may be forthwith apprehended by such bailiff, officer, or servant, or constable, and taken before some justice of the peace, and shall, on conviction, forfeit and pay a penalty not exceeding ten pounds.

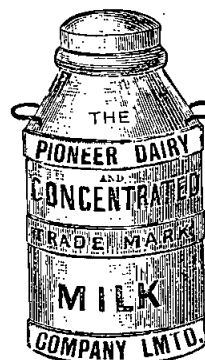

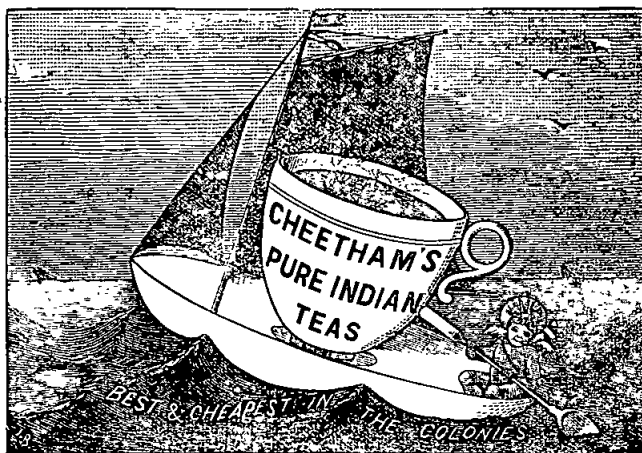
