The births of 1,649 children, viz., 844 boys and 805 girls, were registered in Greater Melbourne during the month of March. In the month of February, 1,443 births were registered, or 206 less than in the month under review. The births were 485 above the average of the month during the previous ten years, but only 162 above that average if allowance be made for the increase of population.

The deaths registered in March numbered 862, viz., 450 of males and 412 of females; the births thus exceeded the deaths by 787, or 91 per cent. The deaths were more numerous than those in February by 164, and exceeded the average of March during the previous ten by 129; if, however, allowance be made for the increase of population, they will be found to have been less than that average by 74.

To every 1,000 of the population of the district, the proportion of births registered was 3.35, and of deaths registered 1.75.

The highest temperature in the shade recorded at Melbourne Observatory during the month was 104.0° on the 8th, and the lowest was 43.2° on the 31st. The mean temperature of the month (65.6°) was two degrees above the average. The greatest range of the thermometer in any one day (39.3°) took place on the 7th, and the least range (4.4°) on the 9th. The mean daily range was 20.0°. The highest atmospheric pressure recorded was 30.171 inches on the 3rd, and the lowest was 29.594 inches on the 26th. The mean atmospheric pressure (29.910 inches) differed from the average by a fraction only.

Rain fell on 6 days, the amount of rainfall being 1.54 inch. The average rainfall in March during the previous ten years was 1.84 inch, or about a quarter of an inch more than in the month under notice.

Fog occurred on 1 day during the month.

Males contributed 52 per cent., and females 48 per cent., to the mortality of the month. Children under 5 years of age contributed 47 per cent. to that mortality, as against 44 per cent. in March, 1891; 44 per cent. in March, 1890; 43 per cent. in March, 1889; 44 per cent. in March, 1888; 44 per cent. in March, 1887; and 46 per cent. in March, 1886.

Thirty-seven deaths of persons who had attained or passed the age of 75 years were recorded during the month. Of these, two females, each aged 75, died of hemiplegia; a wheelwright, aged 75, of valvular disease of the heart; a contractor and an insurance agent, each aged 75, of heart disease; a female, aged 76, of apoplexy; a housewife, aged 76, and a contractor, aged 76, of heart disease; a coachbuilder, aged 76, of pneumonia; a female, aged 76, of disease of the kidneys; a plasterer, aged 77, of diarrhoea; a gentleman, aged 77, of apoplexy; a butcher, aged 77, of enteritis; a gardener, aged 78, of apoplexy; a female, aged 78, of bronchitis; a female, aged 78, of fracture of the neck; a female, aged 80, of diarrhoea; a female, aged 80, of cancer; a gentleman, aged 81, of heart disease; a gentleman, aged 82, of apoplexy; a labourer, aged 82, of bronchitis; a female, aged 83, of heart disease; a gardener, aged 83, of bronchitis; a widow, aged 85, of diarrhoea; a gentleman, aged 85, of heart disease; a carter, aged 87, of syncope; a cabinetmaker, aged 91, of heart disease; a seaman, aged 95, of pericarditis; a female, aged 78, a contractor and a housewife, each aged 81, an ex-detective, aged 83, a widow, aged 84, a carpenter, a shepherd, and a male of occupation unknown, each aged 86, and a sawyer, aged 93, of old age.

Forty-five deaths were ascribed to external causes during the month, of which 36 were set down to accident, 2 to homicide, and 7 to suicide. The following are the particulars of the accidental deaths:—A fireman, aged 24, an ironmoulder, aged 29, and a labourer, aged 37, were passed over or struck by railway trains; a boy, aged 10, was killed by falling from a goods train; a carter, aged 26, died of fracture of the skull, caused by the upsetting of a dray; a carter, aged 65, of internal injuries, the result of a fall from a dray; a wool-presser, aged 36, was killed by a waggon passing over him; a marble polisher, aged 28, a baker, aged 32, and a cabdriver, aged 60, died of internal injuries consequent on falls; an engine-driver, aged 28, was killed by a jib falling on him; two females, aged respectively 23 and 57, died of burns; two male children, each aged 1 year, and a female, aged 39, of scalds; two boys, aged respectively 10 and 11, were drowned, the former whilst bathing; eight persons were found drowned, viz., a bottle collector, aged 24, a fireman, aged 32, and a female, aged 57, in the River Yarra, a boy, aged 9, at Footscray, a clerk, aged 27, in the new canal at West Melbourne, an engineer, aged 33, in Hobson's Bay, a male of occupation unstated, aged 40, in the Merri Creek, at Clifton Hill, and a fish hawk, aged 70, in the sea, near Albert Park; a new-born male infant, and a male child, aged 1 year, died of suffocation; a boy, aged 7, was poisoned by sulphuric acid, taken in mistake for Worcestershire sauce, a medical practitioner, aged 30, by morphia; a cordial maker, aged 60, by liquid ammonia; a new-born male infant, and a female, aged 18, died of traumatic tetanus; a labourer, aged 23, of injury to the wrist, a male cook, aged 33, of rupture of a blood vessel in the lungs, and a female, aged 78, of fracture of the skull, a verdict of wilful murder being returned in both cases. The suicidal deaths were those of two new-born female infants, who died of fracture of the neck, how caused not stated. The homicidal deaths were those of a male cook, aged 33, who shot himself; a labourer, aged 63, who died of self-inflicted wounds; and of the following who poisoned themselves—a female servant, aged 17, and a carpenter, aged 61, with carbolic acid, a boy, aged 17, with a drug, the nature of which was not stated, a dressmaker, aged 45, with acetic acid, and a grazier, aged 48, with laudanum.

One hundred and thirty-one deaths, or 15 per cent. of the whole, took place in public institutions, viz., 64 in the Melbourne Hospital, 16 in the Alfred Hospital, 3 in the Women's Hospital, 5 in the Children's Hospital, 7 in the Austin Hospital, 8 in the Metropolitan Lunatic Asylum, 3 in the Yarra Bend Lunatic Asylum, 10 in the Immigrants' Home, 11 in the Benevolent Asylum, 3 in the Convent of the Little Sisters of the Poor, and 1 in the Melbourne Gaol.

The deaths of children under five years of age numbered 405, of which 208, or 51 per cent., were of males, and 197, or 49 per cent., were of females. Of those who died, 298 were under one year of age, 80 were between one and two, 13 were between two and three, 9 were between three and four, and 5 were between four and five.

The persons who died at a more advanced age than five years numbered 457. Of these, 242, or 53 per cent., were males, and 215, or 47 per cent., were females; 16 were between five and ten, 16 were between ten and fifteen, 26 were between fifteen and twenty, 33 were between twenty and twenty-five, 34 were between twenty-five and thirty, 48 were between thirty and thirty-five, 29 were between thirty-five and forty, 30 were between forty and forty-five, 28 were between forty-five and fifty, 28 were between fifty and fifty-five, 33 were between fifty-five and sixty, 50 were between sixty and sixty-five, 22 were between sixty-five and seventy, 27 were between seventy and seventy-five, 17 were between seventy-five and eighty, and 20 were upwards of eighty.

Zymotic and specific febrile diseases caused 114 deaths in the 31 days of March, as against 104 in the 29 days of February. Under this head, deaths from typhoid fever rose from 23 to 39, deaths from scarlet fever from nil to 2, and deaths from diarrhoea, dysentery, and cholera from 43 to 56. On the other hand, deaths from influenza fell from 4 to 2, deaths from whooping-cough from 14 to 5, and deaths from diphtheria combined with diphtheritic croup—the latter classed as a disease of the respiratory system—from 13 to 10. Nine deaths of child-bearing women were registered in March, as against the same number in February and 6 in January. If these numbers be compared with the births, it will be found that 1 death of a mother took place to every 183 children whose births were registered in the month under notice, as against 1 to every 160 births registered in the previous month, and 1 to every 236 births registered in January.

The growth of the population of Greater Melbourne in the ten years ended with 1891 was at the rate of nearly 21,000 per annum, but according to estimates carefully prepared by the municipal authorities, this increase has received a severe check, the augmentation between the 5th April and the end of December, 1891, being only 1,046, or at the rate of about 1,400 per annum.

By reference to the table, it will be found that in the 8 months and 25 days following the date of the Census, a falling off of population amounting in the aggregate to 5,632 is estimated to have taken place in the following municipalities:—

In the Town of Brunswick and in the Shipping, it is believed that the population remained about stationary, therefore the Census figures are repeated in these cases.

Of the population of Greater Melbourne, as enumerated at the Census, 476,849, or 97 per cent., were living in places under the jurisdiction of the Metropolitan Board of Works. A similar proportion would give the number as 477,184 at the end of the year.

In Greater Melbourne as a whole, the registered births exceeded the registered deaths by 92 per cent. in both 1890 and 1891, but excluding the births and deaths which occurred in hospitals, asylums, &c., the excess of the former over the latter was 123 per cent. in both years.

In 181 instances twins, and in one instance triplets, were born in Greater Melbourne during the year under notice. As the births in the same period numbered in all 18,018, the confinements must have numbered 17,835. Thus one mother in 98 gave birth to more than one infant.

The births set down as illegitimate in 1891 numbered 1,368, or 122 more than in 1890. Nearly a third of these took place in the Women's Hospital or in buildings under the supervision of the officers of that institution. The proportion of illegitimate births to the whole number of births registered was 1 in 13, as against 1 in 14 in the two previous years.

Subjoined are the birth and death rates in each sub-district in 1891. Births and deaths in hospitals, asylums, &c., are excluded, and the sub-districts are arranged in order, the sub-district with the highest birth-rate and the highest death-rate being placed first and the rest in succession:—

In calculating the rates for the above table, the births and deaths occurring in hospitals, asylums, &c., have been excluded as already stated. If these should be included, the proportion per 1,000 of the mean population of Greater Melbourne would be—births, 36.64; deaths, 19.05.

According to the table, both the birth and the death rate are highest in Footscray; whilst the former is much lower in Melbourne, and the latter much lower in Kew than in any other sub-district. It should be pointed out that in determining the relative healthfulness of various localities a reference to the order of the death-rates alone will not suffice, as, in consequence of the excessive mortality which attends the period of infancy, a high death-rate is generally found to be concurrent with a high birth-rate, as in the case of Footscray, Port Melbourne, and Brunswick, which stand first in regard to death-rates, and are also first, or nearly so, in regard to birth-rates. Then, again, Oakleigh, Essendon, Northcote, Flemington, and Williamstown have birth-rates considerably above but death-rates below the average, and, consequently, may be ranked amongst the most salubrious districts; whereas Melbourne, with a death-rate slightly above the average, but a birth-rate below that in any of the other sub-districts, is, in reality, much more insanitary than the former indicates. In districts where like birth-rates prevail, the position of the death-rates may generally be relied upon as an adequate guide to their relative hygienic condition.

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In Greater Melbourne, taken as a whole, there was an average of three persons to the acre at the end of 1891, but the density of the population varies considerably in the different sub-districts, ranging from 37 persons to the acre in North Melbourne Town, to less than 2½ persons to the acre in Kew Borough, and about 1 person to every 2½ acres in the portion of the district situated in shires. The following table shows the area of, and density of the population living in, each sub-district:—

It should be remarked that in some of the sub-districts extensive parks, gardens, and other public reserves exist, so that the population is really living in closer proximity than the figures indicate. Melbourne City contains 1,723 acres of such reserves; Kew, 634 acres; portion of the district situated in shires, 569 acres; South Melbourne, 474 acres; Williamstown, 446 acres; Flemington and Kensington, 307 acres; St. Kilda, 250 acres; Richmond, 190 acres; Brighton, 167 acres; Port Melbourne, 80 acres; Essendon, 54 acres; Fitzroy, 41 acres; and smaller areas in the other municipalities.

The births in Greater Melbourne were more numerous in 1891 than in any previous year named in the table, but their proportion to the total population was exceeded in the four years ended with 1890.

The deaths in 1891 were more numerous than in any previous year except 1889, but their proportion to the population was lower than in any other year since 1880.

The proportion by which the births exceeded the deaths was higher in 1890 and 1891 than in any other year since 1872. All the figures in this table relating to births and deaths include those which occurred in hospitals, asylums, &c., which accommodate large numbers of persons coming from country districts. Should these be eliminated, the number of births would be somewhat less and that of deaths would be considerably less, whilst the excess of births over deaths would be very much higher.

The highest temperature in the shade recorded at Melbourne Observatory during the year 1891 was 103.0° on the 4th January; and the lowest was 33.9° on the 31st July. The mean temperature of the year (57.6°) was about equal to the average of the decade. The greatest range of the thermometer in any one day (46.3°) took place on the 5th March, and the least range (4.5°) on the 25th June and on the 28th July. The mean daily range was 17.3°. The highest atmospheric pressure recorded was 30.514 inches on the 1st May; and the lowest was 29.231 inches on the 12th December. The mean atmospheric pressure (29.98 inches) was about the average. Rain fell on 126 days, and the amount of rainfall was 26.73 inches, the latter was nearly an inch and a half above the average. The number of days in which fog occurred was 16.

Of the births registered in Greater Melbourne during 1891, 51 per cent. were of males, and 49 per cent. were of females. Of the deaths during the year, 54 per cent. were of males, and 46 per cent. were of females. Children under the age of 5 years contributed 40 per cent. to the total mortality, as against 39 per cent. in 1890, 44 per cent. in 1889, 42 per cent. in 1888 and 1887, 41 per cent. in 1886, 38 per cent. in 1885, 41 per cent. in 1884, 36 per cent. in 1883, 40 per cent. in 1882, and 38 per cent. in 1881.

The deaths of 2,662 infants under 1 year of age occurred in Greater Melbourne during 1891, the proportion being 15.88 to every 100 births. This was the third lowest infantile death-rate that has occurred in the district during the last 19 years, the highest being 19.43 in 1889, and the lowest 14.40 in 1890. The corresponding proportion in 1888 was 17.18; in 1887, 17.51; and in 1886, 17.84. In the 18 years ended with 1890, the mean proportion to every 100 infants born of those who died before completing their first year of life was 17.04.

The deaths of 557 persons, viz., 286 males and 271 females, of the age of 75 years or upwards occurred during 1891, or 110 more than in the previous year. Of these, 270 were between 75 and 80, 167 between 80 and 85, 86 between 85 and 90, 31 between 90 and 95, 2 between 95 and 100, and 1 at 102. Before the fifteenth and after the thirty-fifth year of age, deaths of males were more numerous than those of females; but between the ages of 15 and 35, deaths of both sexes were about equal. The following were the numbers of those of either sex who died at various periods of age in 1891, and the proportion of the deaths at each period to the total number during the year:—

The following are the numbers of deaths in 1891 which took place in Public Institutions:—731 in the Melbourne Hospital, 192 in the Alfred Hospital, 44 in the Homoeopathic Hospital, 69 in the Children's Hospital, 48 in the Women's Hospital, 104 in the Immigrants' Home, 21 in the Infant Asylum, 126 in the Benevolent Asylum, 82 in the Yarra Bend Lunatic Asylum, 100 in the Metropolitan Lunatic Asylum, 62 in the Austin Hospital, 30 in the Melbourne Gaol, 3 in the Pentridge Stockade, 2 in the Eye and Ear Hospital, 18 in the Protestant Refuge, and 45 in the Convent of the Little Sisters of the Poor. The number is 1,677 in all, which figures, compared with the total deaths (9,368), furnish a proportion of 18 per cent., or, in other words, 1 person in every 5.6 who died in Greater Melbourne during 1891 ended his days in a hospital, an asylum, or a gaol.

The outbreak of a severe form of influenza, accompanied with a large increase in the deaths from throat and lung affections, viz., bronchitis, laryngitis, pneumonia, pleurisy, congestion of the lungs, &c., forms an important feature in the mortality returns of 1891, deaths from all these complaints having been much more numerous than in any other year. The mortality from cancer and heart disease also exceeded that in any former year. Deaths from diseases of the brain and nerves were exceeded only in 1887 and 1889, and those from diseases of the digestive system only in 1889. The mortality from diphtheria and croup was less than in any year since 1887, and that from typhoid fever than in any year since 1885.

According to the experience of the eight years named, the general mortality and the mortality from diarrhoeal diseases are greatest between November and April, the worst months being December and January; the mortality from typhoid fever is greatest between January and June, the worst months being February, March, and April; and the mortality from diphtheria and croup is greatest between April and September, the worst month being July. It will be noticed that the last is the only one of the complaints named which appears to be more destructive in winter than in summer.

The estimated mean population, the births and deaths, and their proportions to population, and the excess of births over deaths, in each of the metropolitan cities of Australasia in 1891 were as follow :—

It will be noticed that the birth-rate was higher in Melbourne than in Sydney, Adelaide, Hobart, or Wellington; but lower than in Brisbane or Perth; that the death-rate in Melbourne was lower than in Perth or Hobart, but higher than in any of the other cities; and that the proportion of excess of births over deaths was lower in Melbourne than in any, except Perth and Hobart.

It should be mentioned that the death-rate of Melbourne is much swelled by the large number of country residents who are admitted to and die in the Metropolitan hospitals. In some of the other colonies it is the custom to eliminate such entries, and it is probable that in Melbourne such deaths bear a higher proportion to the total number of deaths recorded than they do in any of the other cities named.

WHEREAS by the Local Government Acts it is amongst other things enacted that, subject to the provisions of the said Acts, the Governor in Council may, from time to time, make Orders amongst other things to subdivide or re-subdivide any municipal district into any number of subdivisions not exceeding eight, and to determine and alter, within the limits prescribed by the said Acts, the number of Councillors assigned to any municipality; and that every Order under the provisions of Part II. of the *Local Government Act 1890* shall be published in the *Government Gazette*; and shall take effect as from the day of such publication: And whereas a petition purporting to be signed by more than one-fourth of the ratepayers whose names are for the time being inscribed on the municipal roll of the Shire of Mildura has been presented to the Governor in Council, the substance and prayer of which petition were published in the *Government Gazette* of the 18th day of March, 1892, and no counter petition received: Now therefore His Excellency the Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, doth by this present Order, in compliance with the prayer of the petition hereinbefore mentioned, subdivide the said Shire of Mildura into four separate ridings, the names and boundaries of which shall be those severally hereunder set forth and described, and doth hereby further order that a council consisting of twelve members be elected accordingly.

#### MILDURA RIDING.

Commencing at a point on the River Murray found by the continuation of a line along the centre of Riverside-avenue; thence south-westerly to and by said avenue to its intersection with Fourteenth-street; thence south-easterly along that street to its intersection with Etiwanda-avenue; thence north-easterly along that avenue to its intersection with the Crescent; thence north-easterly by the Crescent to its intersection with Cureton-avenue; thence south-easterly by that avenue to its intersection with Etiwanda-avenue; thence north-easterly by the avenue last named and a line in continuation thereof to the River Murray; thence westerly and northerly by said river to the point of commencement.

#### SANDALONG RIDING.

Commencing at a point on the River Murray found by the continuation of a line along the centre of Etiwanda-avenue; thence south-westerly to and by said avenue to its intersection with Cureton-avenue; thence north-westerly by that avenue to its intersection with the Crescent; thence south-westerly by said Crescent to its intersection with Etiwanda-avenue; thence south-westerly by said avenue to its intersection with Fourteenth-street; thence north-westerly by that street to its intersection with Deakin-avenue; thence south-westerly by said avenue to its intersection with Dow-avenue; thence south-easterly by that avenue to its intersection with the Red Cliff-avenue; thence east by the avenue last named and a direct line in continuation thereof to the River Murray; thence northerly and westerly by said river to the point of commencement.

#### LAKE RIDING.

Commencing at a point on the River Murray found by the continuation of a line along the centre of Riversdale-avenue; thence south-westerly to and by said avenue to its intersection with Fourteenth-street; thence south-easterly by said street to its intersection with Deakin-avenue; thence south-westerly and south by said avenue and a line in continuation thereof to the southern boundary of the shire; thence following the shire boundary westerly, northerly, and easterly to the point of commencement.

#### KOORLONG RIDING.

Commencing at the intersection of Deakin-avenue with Dow-avenue; thence south-westerly and south by Deakin-avenue and a line in continuation thereof to the southern boundary of the shire; thence following the shire boundary easterly and northerly to a point where Red Cliff-avenue intersects the eastern boundary of the shire; thence west by said avenue to its intersection with Dow-avenue; thence north-westerly by the avenue last named to the point of commencement.

Wherever the line described as aforesaid runs beside or along a river, creek, or road, whether specifically described or not, the centre of such river, creek, or road shall be taken to be the boundary line.

The shire boundary referred to above is that described in the *Government Gazette* of the 23rd May, 1890.

*Fire Brigades Act 1890.*

REGULATIONS OF THE COUNTRY FIRE BRIGADES  
BOARD AMENDED.

WHEREAS by section 39 of the *Fire Brigades Act 1890* (54 Vict. No. 1200) it is enacted that the Governor in Council may, as to the whole or any part of Victoria, make regulations for the purposes therein specified: And whereas by section 40 of the said Act it is further enacted that after the first meeting of the Country Fire Brigades Board all regulations as to any country fire district shall be prepared by such Board and submitted to the Minister for approval prior to being made by the Governor in Council: And whereas the Regulations following has been prepared by the Country Fire Brigades Board, and submitted to the Minister for approval in the manner provided by the now in part recited Act: Now therefore His Excellency the Governor of Victoria, acting with the advice of the Executive Council thereof, doth hereby rescind the Regulations made by Orders in Council, dated respectively the 3rd day of August and the 10th day of November, 1891, and doth make the Regulations following in lieu thereof, that is to say:—

REGULATIONS MADE UNDER THE 39TH SECTION  
OF THE "FIRE BRIGADES ACT 1890."

PRELIMINARY.

These Regulations shall apply to those parts of the colony of Victoria known as the nine country fire districts, as set forth in the First Schedule of the *Fire Brigades Act 1890* and in the several Proclamations by His Excellency the Governor published in the *Government Gazette* under the provisions of sections 4 and 5 of the said Act, and to any part of the colony of Victoria that may hereafter be added to or included in any country fire district, and shall apply to all fire brigades so far as the extinguishing of fires and the protection of life and property from fire is concerned.

For the enrolment and registration of all permanent fire brigades, volunteer brigades, municipal brigades, insurance companies' brigades, private brigades, or brigades established or formed under any other description whatever, and also for prescribing the various engines, apparatus, and appliances for the extinguishment of fire and the saving of life at fires to be kept and maintained by all such brigades.

ENROLMENT OF BRIGADES.

1. Prior to the registration of any fire brigade the secretary of every such fire brigade shall send a detailed statement of the names in full of each effective working member, with date of enrolment and length of service, present age, occupation, and place of abode, to the secretary of the Country Board.

NON-REGISTERED BRIGADES NOT RECOGNISED.

2. No fire brigade, or the members thereof, shall be recognised unless registered by the Country Board.

EFFECTIVE COMPLEMENT.

3. The effective complement of any brigade now established, or hereafter to be established and registered, shall not be less than ten or more than thirty registered members.

REGISTRATION MAY BE SUSPENDED.

4. Whenever and as soon as any registered brigade, by reason of deaths, resignations, or expulsions, shall have reduced its roll to less than its minimum effective complement, the registration of the said brigade may be suspended, and any allowances or salaries payable thereto, or payable to any members thereof, may at once be forfeited to the Country Board.

NOTICE BEFORE DISBANDMENT.

5. If after one month's notice from the Country Board any registered brigade still remains below its effective complement, the said board may at once cancel the registration of such brigade and declare it disbanded.

STATIONS NOT TO BE REMOVED.

6. No brigade shall extend its stations or branches, or remove to any other place, city, town, borough, district, ward, or shire without the sanction of the Country Board.

REGISTRATION OF NEWLY-FORMED BRIGADES.

7. The Country Board may, upon application from the council of any municipal district outside any country fire district, place the name of any newly-formed fire brigade on a probationary register, provided that the cost, or such portion thereof as the board may determine, of suitable fire-extinguishing apparatus has been raised locally. The apparatus to be to the satisfaction of the said board, and vested in trustees approved of by the said board for the public benefit. Provided in all cases that an efficient brigade of the proper class be maintained to work the apparatus to the satisfaction of the said board. After such period of probation as the Country Board may consider necessary, the said board may proceed under section 4 of the Act, and after proclamation in the *Government Gazette* may transfer such brigade to the regular register, and maintain it under the provisions of the Act.

## CLASSIFICATION OF BRIGADES.

8. For the efficient and economical working of all fire brigades the Country Board shall place each brigade under such class and grade as the said board may from time to time determine. For the present such classification and grade shall be as follows, that is to say:—

(1) The establishment allowed for each brigade shall be as stated below, viz.:—

Class A.—A complement of not more than fifteen effective registered members, graded as follows:—One captain, one lieutenant, one foreman, one secretary, and eleven firemen.

Classes B and C.—A complement of not more than twenty effective registered members, graded as follows:—One captain, one lieutenant, one foreman, one apparatus officer, one secretary, and fifteen firemen.

Classes D and E.—A complement of not more than twenty-five effective registered members, graded as follows:—One captain, one lieutenant, one foreman, one apparatus officer, one secretary, one station-keeper, and nineteen firemen.

Classes F and G.—A complement of not more than thirty effective registered members, graded as follows:—One captain, one lieutenant, one foreman, one apparatus officer, one secretary, one station-keeper, and twenty-four firemen.

Classes H, I, and J.—Such complement and grades as the Country Board may from time to time determine for the Geelong, Bendigo, and Ballarat Divisions.

(2) Brigades having members in excess of the complement allowed under the foregoing classification shall not enrol or admit any more members, but shall reduce to the maximum of their class by ordinary means, such as resignations, removals from brigade district, &c. Members in excess of the complement may be registered by the Country Board, and must attend the requisite number of practices and fires to become effective, failing which they may be dealt with as the said board may determine.

(3) Brigades whose grades of rank differ from the foregoing classification shall alter their list of officers and adopt the grades shown in the said classification with as little delay as possible. Under no circumstances will officers other than those shown in the said classification be recognised or registered as effective members of a brigade.

## CONTROL OF FIRE STATIONS AND FIRE APPARATUS.

9. The Country Board may require that before a brigade be registered, the owner or owners of any building used as a fire station or reel house, and the owner or owners of any apparatus used for extinguishing fires in the possession of or used by any fire brigade, shall place the same at the service of the said board for fire protection purposes for the public benefit. The said board may refuse to recognise or register any brigade unless the aforesaid owner or owners agree in writing to so place the said buildings, houses, and apparatus under the control of the said board.

*For ensuring discipline and good conduct amongst members of brigades, and for ensuring their speedy attendance with engines, fire escapes, and all necessary apparatus and implements on the occasion of any alarm of fire, and generally for the maintenance of brigades in a due state of efficiency.*

## QUALIFICATIONS FOR MEMBERSHIP.

1. No person shall be registered on the effective staff of any fire brigade unless—

- 1st. He is of good health, and sound in body and mind.
- 2nd. He is of good moral character and habits.
- 3rd. He is over the age of 18 years, and not over the age of 40 years. (For exceptions, the clauses 2 and 3.)

## MAXIMUM AGE OF NEW MEMBERS.

2. No person shall be enrolled over the age of 40 years unless he has been previously engaged as an active fireman, in which case the limit may be extended to any age the Country Board may determine.

## SPECIAL EXCEPTIONS.

3. No person over the age of 55 years shall be allowed to remain on the effective working staff of any brigade unless under special circumstances, and with the approval of the Country Board.

## DISMISSED MEMBERS NOT ELIGIBLE.

4. No person shall be eligible for re-election to any brigade who has been dismissed from any other brigade for cause, unless with the consent of the Country Board.

## PRESENT MEMBERS' PRIORITY.

5. Persons who, at the time of the publication of these regulations in the *Government Gazette*, are members of any brigade, shall, as against persons who are not members of a brigade, have a prior claim to be registered on the roll of a fire brigade.

## MEMBERS TO BE REGISTERED.

6. No person shall be recognised as a member of any fire brigade until his name has been approved of by the Country Board and registered on the roll of such brigade by authority of the said board.

## NEW MEMBERS.

7. In each case of persons joining, after a brigade has been first registered by the Country Board, if the candidate complies with the requirements set forth in clause 1, and the brigade approves of him, the name and particulars of such candidate shall be submitted to the said board, in such form as the said board may from time to time direct, for approval or otherwise, and no person's name shall be registered on the effective strength of any brigade unless so approved of.

## ANNUAL ELECTION OF OFFICERS.

8. Every fire brigade shall meet on the first Monday in December, or on such other day, within the first week in December, as the brigade may determine, in each and every year, and elect by ballot the complement of officers allotted to each brigade under their respective classification. All officers so chosen shall be effective registered members of their respective brigades, and shall hold office for the term of one year from their election, and until their successors shall be chosen as aforesaid, unless sooner removed from office.

## ELECTION OF THE PRINCIPAL OFFICER.

9. No election of the principal officer hereafter to be held by any fire brigade shall be valid unless the same is approved by the Country Board, and it shall be the duty of the secretary of each of said brigades to transmit to said board a certificate of his election, within seven days after every such election shall have taken place, stating the name of the person elected.

## ELECTIONS TO BE NOTIFIED TO THE BOARD.

10. It shall be the duty of the secretary of each fire brigade to transmit to the Country Board a certificate of all elections hereafter to be held by said brigades respectively, within seven days after every such election shall have taken place, stating the names of the persons elected and the offices to which they have severally been chosen.

## TRANSFERS AND RESIGNATIONS.

11. Members may be transferred from one brigade to another, provided the complement of the brigade permits of such transfer, on production of a certificate of discharge from their former brigade, and with the approval of the Country Board. Members desiring to retire from the membership of any brigade will require to send in their resignation in writing to the said board through the brigade, so that their names may be removed from the register.

## SUPERINTENDENT OF DIVISION.

12. There shall be a superintendent for each of the divisions of Ballarat, Bendigo, and Geelong. The superintendent of each division shall have the sole and entire command at all fires and alarms of fire (in the absence of the chief officer), drills, practices, and parades, over all officers and members of the brigades and salvage corps, and all apparatus and appurtenances and fire stations belonging to or in charge of same in his division. He shall exercise supervision over the brigades and salvage corps, and see that the regulations are faithfully observed. He shall visit the fire stations and reel-houses at least once a week, and oftener if practicable, and report to the Country Board such suggestions and recommendations as he may deem necessary. He shall be responsible to the said board for the discipline and good conduct of the brigades and salvage corps within his division at all times, and for the good order and condition of their stations and apparatus. He shall on the first day of each month report to the said board the result of his inspections, and on the condition and efficiency of the brigades and salvage corps in his division. He shall report to the said board any officer or member, if any there may be, delinquent in the performance of the duties assigned to them. He shall have power to suspend any officer or member of the brigades or salvage corps in his division for insubordination, disorderly conduct, or neglect of duty, said suspension to continue pending the action of the said board. He shall be appointed by the said board under these regulations, and shall receive such allowances or expenses as the said board shall determine, and the said board may at any time suspend, remove, or dismiss such superintendent.

## DUTIES OF OFFICERS.

13. The duties of the respective officers of every registered brigade shall be as follow, viz.:—

(1) *The Captain.*—The captain of each brigade shall see that the fire stations, reel-houses, stables, horses, feed, harness, waggons, fire apparatus, fuel, carts, reels, hose, hydrants, and branches, and all other property belonging to or in charge of the brigade, are kept in good condition and repair, ready for service; shall take command of the brigade at all fires, practices, drills, and parades; shall see that the members or persons employed do their duty faithfully; and shall enforce the rules and regulations. He shall have power to suspend members for disobedience of orders, or for delinquency in the performance of their duties.

(2) *The Lieutenant.*—The lieutenant shall aid and assist the captain in the discharge of his duties, and obey promptly all orders he may receive from him, and in his absence shall assume command of the brigade, and be vested with every power of the captain, and in all cases his duties shall be the same.

(3) *The Foreman.*—The foreman shall act with and under the direction of the captain and lieutenant, and in their absence perform their duties; shall see that all orders issued by them are properly carried out; where a station-keeper is not provided he shall take charge of engines, reels, hose, hydrants, branches, and other accessories, and generally shall be responsible for the cleanliness and good order of the fire station and appliances, and in the event of there being any defect to immediately report same to the captain or lieutenant.

(4) *Apparatus Officer.*—The apparatus officer shall aid and assist the senior officers of the brigade at all times. He shall take charge of the apparatus carriage and all ladders and fire escapes, and shall be responsible for the prompt despatch of same upon the alarm of fire at all times.

(5) *The Secretary.*—The secretary of each brigade shall attend all meetings of the brigade, and shall enter the minutes of resolutions and proceedings in a minute-book to be kept for that purpose. He shall perform, to the satisfaction of the brigade

and of the Country Board, all such duties as may be imposed upon him, and shall, subject to the control of the board, have charge of all books, papers, and other documents of the board that may be in the custody of the brigade. He shall cause to be kept an accurate record, in convenient form for reference, of all business transacted by the brigade. He shall attend promptly to all communications received from and use despatch in forwarding reports and returns to the secretary of the Country Board and of the local committee. He shall forward a return of the roll of attendances at all fires, drills, and practices of his brigade, countersigned by the captain on the proper forms, on the first day in each quarter, to the secretary of the Country Board. He shall keep a register of the names of all persons who now are or who may hereafter become members of the brigade. He shall send a return to the secretary of the said board, on the first day of each month, notifying the removal or resignation of any member of the brigade. He shall do such other things as the said board or the regulations may require, and shall receive such remuneration as the said board may determine. He shall be under the general direction of the secretary of the Country Board in all matters relating to office routine and management. He shall be liable to suspension, removal, or dismissal by the said board.

#### DUTIES OF EMPLOYEES.

14. (1) *The Station-keeper.*—Where the classification of brigades provides for a station-keeper it shall be his duty to reside at the head fire station, wherever practicable. He shall attend to and be responsible for the cleanliness, good order and condition of the fire stations and the various fire-extinguishing appliances and appurtenances belonging to or in the charge of the brigade. He shall at all times be under the direction of the senior officer of the brigade present for the time being. He shall receive such remuneration as the Country Board may determine, and shall be liable to suspension, removal, or dismissal by the said board.

(2) *The Watchman.*—Where the classification of brigades provides for a watchman, it shall be his duty to keep watch in such buildings or places, and at such hours as the Country Board may from time to time direct. He shall not sleep while on duty, but devote his time to keeping a strict watch for fires. He shall be prompt in giving the alarm in cases of fire. He shall perform such other duties as are consistent with the position and are required by the said board. He shall at all times be under the direction of the senior officer of the brigade present for the time being. He shall receive such remuneration as the Country Board may determine, and shall be liable to suspension, removal, or dismissal by the said board.

15. *Duties of Members.*—The members of each registered brigade shall, upon an alarm of fire, proceed promptly with the fire appliances to the place of the fire in an orderly manner, report to the senior officer present, and perform any duty that may be required of them. They shall remain on duty until relieved by orders, which shall be given only by the officer in command. Members shall reside within easy sound of the alarm bell.

16. *Roll Call at Fires.*—Upon returning from a fire, or an alarm of fire, the officer in command shall cause the roll to be called, and record the absence of any member, and a copy of such roll, together with a report of the fire, signed by the officer in command at the fire and the secretary of the brigade, shall be forwarded by the secretary of the brigade to the secretary of the Country Board within 48 hours of the time of such fire.

#### DUTIES AT FIRES.

17. At all fires the senior officer of any registered brigade arriving shall, in the absence of the chief officer, superintendent, or captain, and until his arrival, act as in chief command, and be obeyed and respected accordingly; the men are required to move quickly and obey orders promptly and without criticism. Where there are more than one such brigade, the officers in charge of the several brigades shall, immediately on their arrival at a fire, report to the officer in command and remain for orders. No brigade shall leave the fire ground, or take the apparatus of which they have charge therefrom, without the order or permission of the officer in command.

All disputes which may arise between brigades or individual firemen when on duty shall be inquired into by the officer in command, and if not settled shall be referred to the Country Board. Members of brigades that are not in service at fires will not enter the buildings, unless ordered, but remain convenient to the fire, equipped and ready for orders.

No member of a brigade shall be permitted to interfere, or handle, or move any part or portion of any stores or goods contained in any premises on fire, or in danger of fire, unless by order or permission of the officer in command.

#### EFFECTIVE MEMBERS.

18. Every member of a registered brigade must make himself effective in attendances and work at fires and practices. An effective member shall mean one who has, each half-year, attended at least 50 per cent, of the fires, or alarms of fire, and recognised monthly practices in his brigade district. Any member who has failed to make himself effective in such attendances, without leave or sufficient excuse from his brigade, shall be struck off the register.

#### PRACTICES.

19. The members of each brigade shall be practised in their duties at engine, reel, and other apparatus drill, at least once each calendar month, under the supervision of their officers, and at such other time as the Country Board, chief officer, superintendent, or captain may direct.

Each brigade shall have the same system of drill, as far as the different appliances will admit. The system of drill must conform to the direction of the board.

Each brigade may appoint its own day for practice, provided it does not delay the return being sent in to the board on the first day of each quarter.

A recognised practice shall mean a continuous drill at practical work in fire extinction for at least half-an-hour. Wet practices must be the rule where water is available.

#### ALLOWANCES FOR EXPENSES AT FIRES AND PRACTICES.

20. An allowance will be granted by the board to every effective registered brigade for the purpose of defraying the incidental expenses of such brigade, and for expenses while on duty at fires and recognised practices; such allowance shall be at the following rate, viz. :—

Brigades classed A,	£11 per annum.
" " B,	£13 "
" " C,	£24 "
" " D,	£31 "
" " E,	£34 "
" " F,	£42 "
" " G,	£45 "

and brigades classed H, I, and J, in the Geelong, Bendigo, and Ballarat Divisions, shall receive such allowances as the board may from time to time determine.

#### BRIGADES TO REQUISITION FOR APPLIANCES, ETC.

21. All plant and appliances and supplies required by any registered brigade shall be requisitioned for, on forms supplied for that purpose, to the Country Board. Requisitions shall be sent in on the authority of a properly constituted meeting of the brigade only, and shall be signed by the captain and secretary of the brigade. Requisitions may be made once a month, and forwarded on the first day of each month to the said board for approval.

A receipt for all plant and appliances and supplies received shall be forwarded to the secretary of the Country Board, and particulars of same entered in a book to be kept for that purpose by the secretary of each brigade.

Ordinary repairs to plant and appliances must be requisitioned for in the same way as for plant.

Urgent repairs to plant may be effected by the brigade without requisition, provided the cost does not exceed Two pounds.

#### BRIGADES MAY PURCHASE MINOR SUPPLIES, ETC.

22. An allowance will be granted to every registered brigade by the board for the purchase of such minor supplies, and repairs to plant, as may be required for the ordinary maintenance of the brigade, and as per schedule of expenditure estimated by the board annually, and such allowance shall be expended as nearly as possible thereto as circumstances will permit, provided always that the total amount estimated is not exceeded in any one year. Such allowance shall be payable quarterly, and the vouchers for such expenditure, showing full particulars of the purchases made, duly certified by the captain and secretary of the brigade, and receipted in proper form, must be forwarded to the secretary of the board for examination, not later than the 21st day in the months of January, April, July, and October in each and every year; and such expenditure shall be subject to the approval of the board, who may allow, or disallow, any, or part or all of such expenditure, if in the board's opinion such is irregular.

#### CORRESPONDENCE, RETURNS, AND REPORTS.

23. All correspondence shall be forwarded to the secretary of the Country Board, unless otherwise directed by the board.

If any secretary of any brigade makes default in transmitting any report or return within fourteen days after it shall have become due, or within fourteen days from notice sent by the secretary of the Country Board of the non-receipt of such report or return, such secretary shall be liable to be suspended or removed.

#### BRIGADE BOOKS.

24. The following is a list of books to be kept by the secretary of each registered brigade :—

All entries made therein are to be examined by the captain of the brigade, and must be produced at all meetings of the brigade, and whenever required by any officer of the Country Board.

1. A book, alphabetically arranged, in which shall be entered, in the following order, the names of every member of the brigade, together with his age, birth-place, occupation, residence, registered number, brigade rank, date of admission, date of leaving, and remarks, and containing the record of attendances at all practices, drills, and

parades, and the attendances at all fires and alarms of fires, together with particulars of losses, insurance, &c.; also containing the signatures of all registered members to an agreement to abide by and conform to all the regulations established, or which may be hereafter established by the Country Board, and the rules of the brigade, and that they will be subject to the penalties therein.

2. A file of all regulations and general and special circulars issued by the board, and all inwards correspondence.
3. A book containing the minutes of resolutions and proceedings of the brigade.
4. A book containing records of the horses, hose, and apparatus of the brigade.
5. Books for requisitions for supplies and repairs for the brigade.

#### CONDUCT.

25. Members of brigades are required, in their intercourse with each other, social or official, to observe a courteous demeanour, and officers or men in addressing each other will do so in a respectful manner. While on duty at fires, practices, and parades the greatest degree of silence, compatible with a proper discharge of duty, will be required.

Any member of a brigade guilty of intoxication, disobedience of orders, insubordination, abusive or obscene language, wanton destruction of property, undue interference with fire plugs and fire appliances, or other unseemly conduct, shall be at once suspended from duty by the officer in charge at any place or time, who shall report particulars of the case to the Country Board for their action, and the said board shall deal with such member as it thinks fit.

#### GENERAL.

26. Each brigade shall have its own rules of internal and general working, which must in all cases be subject to the approval of the Country Board. All proposed alterations or additions must be submitted to the said board for approval or otherwise. No rule must be contrary or antagonistic to the said board's regulations or to any regulation or action thereunder. No member shall be permitted to lend his uniform to any person not a member of his own brigade. All members must wear a badge, mark of distinction, or number, in order that they may be recognised. All such marks, badges, and numbers must be approved by the Country Board before being brought into use. Every officer and member shall conform to the regulations established, or which may be hereafter established, by the board for the government of the various fire brigades, and shall be subject to the duties, conditions, and penalties named. All allowances and salaries shall in all cases be subject to stoppages or absolute forfeiture in the event of wilful violation of the regulations, at the discretion of the board. The secretary of the Country Board shall be the officer appointed to lay information under these regulations.

*For dividing the metropolitan district, or any country district, into sections or divisions, and for establishing stations and companies or divisions of brigades.*

#### DIVISIONS OF BRIGADES.

1. For the purposes of regulating and controlling the various fire brigades and salvage corps in the municipal districts of the city of Ballarat, the town of Ballarat East, the city of Bendigo, the town of Geelong, and the boroughs of Geelong West and Newtown and Chilwell, the Country Board shall divide the aforesaid municipal districts into divisions, and shall comprise and include each and every registered fire brigade and salvage corps within the said municipal districts of the city of Ballarat and the town of Ballarat East into a division to be known as and designated the Ballarat Division of the Central District; and shall comprise and include each and every registered fire brigade and salvage corps in the said municipal district of the city of Bendigo into a division to be known as and designated the Bendigo Division of the Northern District; and shall comprise and include each and every registered fire brigade and salvage corps in the said municipal districts of the town of Geelong and the boroughs of Geelong West and Newtown and Chilwell into a division to be known as and designated the Geelong Division of the Southern District.

#### BRIGADES TO HAVE DEFINED DISTRICTS.

2. Each brigade in the Ballarat, Bendigo, and Geelong divisions, on being registered, shall have a certain district assigned to it, to be known as and designated the Brigade District, by the Country Board for its operations, and shall not be permitted to attend to any calls outside the same unless directed to do so by the superintendent of the division or under the regulations, or in cases where the cause of the alarm is just over the boundary of the assigned district, and nearer to the brigade's station than to the station of the adjacent brigade. In all cases when one brigade has arrived at a scene of fire, and can without further help extinguish the fire, the other brigades shall return at once to their respective stations.

#### BRIGADE DISTRICT.

3. Outside of the Ballarat, Bendigo, and Geelong divisions, the district within which each registered brigade shall be liable to do duty shall be those portions that are within the boundaries of the municipal district or township in which the brigade is established, and on the rateable property of which the council of the said municipal district is assessed under the Act.

Such municipal district or township, as the case may be, shall be known and designated as the Brigade District under the name of the said municipal district or township, as the case may be.

*For permitting, when occasion requires, any portion of a brigade, or any of its officers or men, or engines, escapes, or other property, to proceed or be taken beyond the limits of the metropolitan or any fire district for the purpose of attending fires.*

#### FIRES OUTSIDE OF FIRE DISTRICTS.

1. Any registered brigade or portion thereof, or any of its officers or members, or engines or other apparatus, on the authority of the senior officer present at any time, may proceed or be taken beyond the limits of any fire district for the purpose of attending fires.

The scale of expenses and charges for such attendance at any fire shall be those mentioned in the Second Schedule of the Act, and such expenses and charges shall be payable to the secretary of the Country Board, and shall be rateably apportioned between the owners or occupiers of the property endangered by such fire.

*For regulating and controlling the carriage of members of brigades and their engines, apparatus, and appliances to and from fire brigade demonstrations and competitions, and for the regulation of all fire brigade demonstrations and competitions.*

#### DEMONSTRATIONS AND COMPETITIONS.

1. Brigades shall at no time attend fire brigades' competitions or demonstrations outside a radius of five miles from the head station without leaving a sufficient number of effective registered members within their respective districts—that is to say, five members of a brigade classed A, seven of a brigade classed B and C, eight of a brigade classed D and E, and ten of any class above E. Neither will any of the apparatus (with the exception of a competition reel and appliances) be permitted to attend a competition or demonstration without the written consent of the Country Board.

#### REGULATIONS MADE UNDER THE 62ND SECTION OF THE "FIRE BRIGADES ACT 1890."

*For granting authority to collect contributions or subscriptions for the purposes of any brigade.*

#### SOLICITING OR COLLECTING CONTRIBUTIONS.

1. No brigade shall be permitted to solicit or collect contributions or subscriptions for the purposes of any brigade without being in possession of an authority in writing or in print from the Country Board. Such authority shall terminate on the 31st December of the year of issue, but may be renewed on application to the board from year to year; and such authority may at any time be called in or cancelled.

2. The secretary of each brigade shall, in the first week in the month of January in each and every year, furnish the Country Board with a statement showing particulars of all amounts received from contributions or subscriptions, and the disbursements made in connexion therewith by such brigade for the preceding year ended 31st December, verified by the captain and countersigned by the treasurer and secretary of the brigade.

And the Honorable Allan McLean, Her Majesty's Chief Secretary for Victoria, shall give the necessary directions herein accordingly.

No. 1106), section 142, power is given to the Governor in Council from time to time to make, alter, and rescind rules, regulations, and orders for the various purposes therein specified: Now therefore His Excellency the Governor, acting by and with the advice of the Executive Council, doth hereby order that the condition specified hereunder shall be inserted in all licences issued under section 99 of the Land Act 1890 aforesaid, for the purpose of obtaining limestone within the Warrnambool Land Officer's District, that is to say:—

#### CONDITION.

That all excavations made by the licensee within the boundaries of his licensed area be filled up by him to the satisfaction of the Crown Lands Bailiff.

And the Honorable Allan McLean, Her Majesty's Commissioner of Crown Lands and Survey for Victoria, shall give the necessary directions herein accordingly.

### REGULATION No. 9.

*Regulation for graduating rate by the Western Wimmera Irrigation and Water Supply Trust under the "Water Act 1890."*

WHEREAS the moneys received during the year 1890 by the Western Wimmera Irrigation and Water Supply Trust were not sufficient to provide for the payment of the sums due by such Trust to the Board of Land and Works for the payment of the interest due upon the loan contracted by such Trust, and for all the other lawful expenses incurred by such Trust in the control and management of the said Western Wimmera Irrigation and Water Supply Trust.

And whereas it is anticipated that the moneys receivable by the said Irrigation and Water Supply Trust during the year 1891, will not without a rate be sufficient to meet the estimated expenditure and liabilities of the said Trust of the year 1891, and it is therefore necessary to make a rate to meet as well the said deficiency in the revenue of the year 1890 as the estimated expenditure and liabilities of the year 1891. And whereas, by an Order made by the Governor in Council on the 6th day of October, 1890, the district of the said Western Wimmera Irrigation and Water Supply Trust was divided into four divisions, numbered and named in the said Order:—

1. The Township of Dimboola Division;
2. The Township of Jung Jung Division;
3. The Natimuk Division; and
4. The Wimmera Division,

With the several boundaries to such divisions set out in the said Order.

And by the said Order in Council it is directed that the necessary rates for paying interest on all moneys borrowed by the Western Wimmera Irrigation and Water Supply Trust for the construction and maintenance of their works, or to meet any other expenses in connexion therewith, shall be levied differentially as between such said divisions, and to determine that the proportions in which such divisions shall be rated respectively one to another, regard being had to the cost and expenses of the works constructed wholly or in part for the benefit of such divisions respectively, shall be as follows, that is to say:—

That the respective rating in the pound sterling on the annual value of rateable property rated for municipal purposes in the said divisions shall be—

The Township of Dimboola Division, Two shillings.  
The Township of Jung Jung Division, Two shillings.  
The Natimuk Division, Two shillings.  
The Wimmera Division, Eightpence.

And whereas the Commissioners of the said Western Wimmera Irrigation and Water Supply Trust have, in accordance with the said recited Order in Council, determined for the several purposes authorized in the said Act to make the rate set out in the following regulation; and have in accordance with the provisions of the said Act, submitted such rate and regulation for the approval of the Governor in Council, who has, by Order in Council made on the 6th day of October, 1890, given his approval to the same, and such approval was published on the 10th day of October, 1890, in the *Victorian Government Gazette*, and was also published in the *Horseman Times* newspaper, being a newspaper circulating in the said district. Now therefore the Commissioners of the said Western Wimmera Irrigation and Water Supply Trust, in pursuance and exercise of the powers and for the several purposes authorized by the said *Water Act 1890*, and in accordance with the Order in Council of the 6th day of October, 1890, do upon this 7th day of November, 1890, make the regulation to which the Governor in Council has given his approval by Order in Council as above recited by the regulation following, that is to say:—

The rate hereinafter specified is that which the owners and occupiers of lands and tenements within the aforesaid divisions shall pay in respect of the term of one year from the 1st day of

January to the 31st day of December, 1891, on all lands and tenements according to the municipal valuation for the time being on all such lands and tenements during the said year, that is to say:—

On rateable property within the Township of Dimboola Division a rate of Two shillings in the pound sterling of such valuation;

On rateable property within the township of Jung Jung Division a rate of Two shillings in the pound sterling of such valuation;

On rateable property within the Natimuk Division a rate of Two shillings in the pound sterling of such valuation; and

On rateable property within the Wimmera Division a rate of Eightpence in the pound sterling of such valuation.

Such rate is hereby made payable on the 1st day of January, 1891.

Such person or persons appointed by the Trust for that purpose shall be authorized to collect and recover said rates.

The foregoing regulation, numbered nine, was made by the Commissioners of the Western Wimmera Irrigation and Water Supply Trust under and by virtue of section 254 of the *Water Act 1890*, this 7th day of November, 1890.

*Regulation for graduating rate by the Western Wimmera Irrigation and Water Supply Trust, under the "Water Act 1890."*

WHEREAS under and by virtue of an Order made by the Governor in Council on the 28th day of April, 1892, the divisions into which the Irrigation and Water Supply District of the Western Wimmera Irrigation and Water Supply Trust is already divided, as in a certain Order in Council of the 6th day of October, 1890, are named, shall remain the same as therein mentioned; and that the respective ratings in the pound sterling on the annual value of rateable property rated for municipal purposes in the said divisions shall remain the same for the year 1892 as in the said Order of the 6th day of October, 1890, are mentioned, with the exception of the Wimmera Division, the rate in which said division was by the now reciting Order directed to be increased from Eightpence in the pound to the sum of One shilling in the pound as therein mentioned: And the Governor in Council has also directed, by an Order in Council dated this 28th day of April, 1892, that the sum of One pound should be the minimum rate payable on all rateable property situate in the Dimboola Division, the Jung Jung Division, and the Natimuk Division under the annual value of Ten pounds, and within the Wimmera Division under the annual value of Twenty pounds, according to the municipal value of such rateable property in each of such divisions: And whereas the Commissioners of the Western Wimmera Irrigation and Water Supply Trust, in accordance with the said Order of the 6th day of October, 1890, did decide, for the several purposes authorized by the *Water Act 1890*, to make the rate set out or mentioned in a certain regulation dated the 18th day of November, 1890, and better known as Regulation No. 9, as made by the said Commissioners, whereby the rate specified therein was that which the owners and occupiers of lands and tenements within the divisions of the Western Wimmera Irrigation and Water Supply Trust (as the same were divided by the said Order in Council of the 6th day of October, 1890), should pay on all rateable property in manner therein mentioned: Now therefore, in pursuance of the said recited Order of the Governor in Council dated the 28th day of April, 1892, and also in pursuance of the powers conferred upon them by the provisions of the *Water Act 1890*, the Commissioners of the Western Wimmera Irrigation and Water Supply Trust do make the following regulations, namely:—

The rate hereinafter specified is that which the owners and occupiers of lands and tenements within the Wimmera Division of the Western Wimmera Irrigation and Water Supply Trust shall pay in respect of the term of one year from the 1st day of January, 1892, to the 31st day of December, 1892, on all lands and tenements, according to the municipal valuation for the time being on all such lands and tenements during the said year (that is to say):—

On all rateable property (except as hereinafter mentioned) within the Wimmera Division a rate of One shilling in the pound sterling of such valuations, instead or in the place of Eightpence in the pound sterling, as in the said Regulation No. 9 is made and mentioned.

And the owners and occupiers of all rateable property (except as hereinafter mentioned) within the other divisions of the Western Wimmera Irrigation and Water Supply Trust shall pay the same rate in respect of the term of one year from the 1st day of January, 1892, to the 31st day of December, 1892, on such rateable property as levied or made in and by the said Regulation No. 9.

And the owners and occupiers of all rateable property (except as aforesaid) situate within the Dimboola Division, the Jung Jung Division, and the Natimuk Division under the annual value of Ten pounds shall pay a minimum rate of One pound on such rateable property; and the owners and occupiers of all rateable property (except as aforesaid) situate within the Wimmera Division under the annual value of Twenty pounds, shall pay a minimum rate of One pound, according to the municipal value of such rateable property in each of the said divisions.

Such rates as aforesaid are hereby made on the 1st day of April, 1892, and are payable on the 1st day of May, 1892.

In all other respects the said Regulation No. 9 shall have full force and effect, and be deemed to be part hereof, and inserted herein.

## PROCLAMATION

By His Excellency the Right Honorable John Adrian Louis, Earl of Hopetoun, Viscount Aithrie, and Baron Hope, in the Peerage of Scotland; Baron Hopetoun of Hopetoun, and Baron Niddry of Niddry Castle, in the Peerage of the United Kingdom; Knight Grand Cross of the Most Distinguished Order of Saint Michael and Saint George; Governor and Commander-in-Chief in and over the Colony of Victoria and its Dependencies, &c., &c., &c.

**W**HEREAS by the Land Acts it is amongst other things enacted that the Governor in Council may, by Proclamation to be published in the *Government Gazette*, from time to time increase or diminish the area of land comprised in any of the classes mentioned in section 6 of Part I. of the *Land Act 1890*, except increasing lands which may be sold by auction: And whereas it is further enacted that where any portion of Crown lands not exceeding twenty acres, and not contiguous or adjacent to any other Crown lands, is so situated as to make it desirable in the opinion of the Governor in Council that the same should be sold, or where any portion of Crown lands not exceeding three acres is required for a site for a church or for any charitable purpose for which land cannot legally be reserved, the Governor in Council may direct the sale of such portion of Crown lands, and for such purpose may increase the area of land described in the Second Schedule to the *Land Act 1890* as lands which may be sold by auction by adding such portion thereto: Now therefore I, the Governor of Victoria, by and with the advice of the Executive Council thereof, do hereby increase or diminish (as the case may be) the areas of Crown lands comprised in Classes 2, 3, and 4 of section 6 of the *Land Act 1890* aforesaid to the extent set forth in the subjoined Schedules respectively, that is to say:—

Printed forms of tender, giving estimates of the probable requirements, may be obtained from the Secretary to the Tender Board, Melbourne, the Receivers and Paymasters at Ballarat and Geelong, and the Officer Commanding Artillery, Queenscliff, by whom also any information or explanation will be afforded to persons tendering.

Security will be required in cash, Government debentures, or bank deposit-receipt in favour of the Secretary, Tender Board.

Tenders must be accompanied by the preliminary deposit above mentioned in bank notes, or a bank draft payable to the order of the Secretary of the Tender Board (cheques will in no case be received), which will be returned within ten days to unsuccessful tenderers. Such deposit to be forfeited in the event of the successful tenderer failing to complete the security within the prescribed period.

The security must be completed and contract signed within ten days of acceptance of the tender, failing which the contract may be again advertised or another tender accepted.

Tenders must express the prices in words as well as in figures, and without alterations or erasures.

Tenderers failing to take up their accepted tenders will be disqualified from tendering for Government supplies for a period of twelve months.

The Government will not necessarily accept the lowest or any tender.

Tenders, enclosed in a separate envelope, and having the words "Tender for House and Smiths' Coal and Coke at written thereon, must be deposited in the Tender-box at the Pay Office, Treasury, Melbourne.

#### CONDITIONS OF CONTRACT.

1. The house coal must be the best of its kind, free from shale, small coal, dust, or other impurities. The smiths' coal must be free from dust, ashes, shale, or other impurities.

2. The orders will be issued by the departments requiring the supplies; and the requirements shall be delivered as may be directed by the officer issuing the order. At the time of delivering the supplies, the contractor shall produce the order for the same to the officer authorized to accept delivery, and such officer shall acknowledge thereon the receipt of the supplies accepted and shall return the order to the contractor. The acceptance of the supplies shall be subject to the approval of the officer authorized to take delivery, or such other officer as shall be named in the conditions. If, after the delivery of the supplies has been taken, any deficiency or defect is discovered therein, such supplies may be returned to the contractor. In case of the rejection or return of any supplies the contractor shall bear the whole cost of replacing the supplies so rejected or returned. Should an order not be complied with within forty-eight hours, it will be competent for the department concerned to purchase at the contractor's risk, and to deduct from the contractor's account or the security money the extra expense (if any) over and above the contract price.

3. The contractor will be bound to weigh the coal on delivery at such establishments as are provided with weighbridges. In other cases the tickets of the public weighbridges are to be accepted as the weight to be charged for. Coal to be delivered in the places set apart therefor.

4. As soon as the orders shall have been completed, the contractor will be required to furnish to the department supplied his account in the prescribed form, with the receipted delivery order attached thereto. Accounts will be payable at any Receipt and Pay Office that the contractor may desire.

5. In the event of a difference of opinion between the contractor and the officer receiving the supply as to the quality, the same is to be decided by a board of survey, composed of persons named by the head of the department, and the decision of the board is to be considered final.

6. If the board shall decide that the article is not of proper quality, it must be immediately replaced by the contractor, failing which it will be procured elsewhere, and the extra expense (if any) will be deducted from the contractor's account or the security money.

7. If from any cause injury would accrue to the public service by waiting for a board of survey, the head of the department, or officer in charge of station, will have the power to reject such supplies as are obviously of inferior quality, it being understood that he will be responsible to the Government for so doing; and the contractor must take back the rejected article, and supply good in its stead, failing which it will be procured elsewhere, and the extra expense (if any) will be charged as in condition 6.

8. A refusal to execute orders, or a repetition of irregularity in the quality or quantity of the supplies, or of delay in delivering or replacing them when required, will subject the contractor to such mulct, not exceeding £50, as the Treasurer of the colony for the time being may direct, and the amount may be deducted as in condition 6. It will also be in the power of the said Treasurer, upon such refusal or repetition, to terminate the contract forthwith and forfeit the whole or any portion of the security money.

9. Contractors are not at liberty to transfer their contracts under cover of power-of-attorney, coupled with an interest or otherwise; and no such transfer will be recognised by the Government.

10. Under no circumstances will a contractor be permitted to abandon his contract. In the event of the contractor failing to carry on the contract, the contract security money will in that case be absolutely forfeited, and in addition the contractor will be held liable for any loss which the Government may sustain in consequence of such failure.

11. In the event of a general strike occurring at the collieries, or in the event of war breaking out between Great Britain and any other large maritime power, any contract entered into under these conditions after the expiry of one calendar month from notice being given may be suspended, such contract to come into full force and effect again ten (10) days after such cause of suspension shall be discontinued.

12. The contracts entered into under this notice are not to be considered as being broken, infringed, or vitiated by the purchase of coal by the Victorian Government from any mine or mines within the colony of Victoria for any of the Departments of the Public Service.

13. In the event of any alteration in the tariff affecting any of the items included in these contracts, the Government will neither claim any decrease upon the contract price, nor entertain any application from a contractor for any increase to it.
