Factories and Shops Act 1890.

IN compliance with an application in writing under the provisions of section 30 of the *Factories and Shops Act 1890* (54 Vict. 2. That each female so employed shall be paid for the extra work she is called upon to perform, the overtime rate of pay to wage workers being that mentioned in the letter notifying the suspension of the operation of the first clause of the section above mentioned.
3. That none of such females shall be so employed for more than forty-eight hours in any one week without their consent.
4. That a copy of this Order be kept conspicuously and continually posted in such factory for the information of all concerned.

BOROUGH OF PORT MELBOURNE.

BY-LAW No. 60.

A By-law of the Borough of Port Melbourne, made under the *Health Act 1890* and numbered 60, for regulating the carriage of fruit, vegetables, and other articles of food.

IN pursuance of the powers conferred by the *Health Act 1890*, the Mayor, Councillors, and Burgesses of the Borough of Port Melbourne order as follows:—

1. No person shall place, carry, or have in any vehicle containing manure or offensive matter any fruit, vegetables, or other food, or any case or other receptacle customarily used for the reception and carriage of fruit, vegetables, or other food, in such manner that such fruit, vegetables, or other food, or such case or receptacle, shall be in contact with, or be liable to be in contact with, such manure or offensive matter, or to be contaminated by moisture or effluvia therefrom.

2. Every person guilty of any breach of this by-law shall forfeit and pay, upon conviction, a penalty not exceeding Ten pounds (£10) nor less than Five shillings for each occasion of committing any such breach of this by-law.

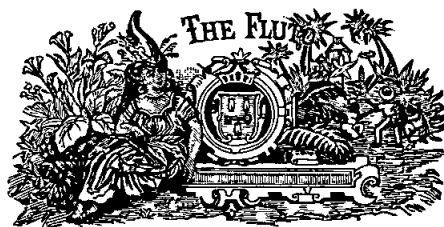

The births of 1,297 children, viz., 644 boys and 653 girls, were registered in Greater Melbourne during the month of April. In the month of March, 1,649 births were registered, or 352 more than in the month under review. The births were 145 above the average of the month during the previous ten years, but 174 below that average if allowance be made for the increase of population.

The deaths registered in April numbered 645, viz., 339 of males and 306 of females; the births thus exceeded the deaths by 652, or 101 per cent. The deaths were fewer than those in March by 217, and were also fewer by 30 than the average of April during the previous ten years; if, however, allowance be made for the increase of population, they will be found to have been less than that average by 217.

To every 1,000 of the population of the district, the proportion of births registered was 2.64, and of deaths registered 1.31.

The highest temperature in the shade recorded at Melbourne Observatory during the month was 85.3° on the 2nd, and the lowest was 40.5° on the 16th. The mean temperature of the month (57.0°) was nearly two degrees below the average. The greatest range of the thermometer in any one day (35.1°) took place on the 2nd, and the least range (5.4°) on the 28th. The mean daily range was 16.6°. The highest atmospheric pressure recorded was 30.368 inches on the 25th, and the lowest was 29.729 inches on the 30th. The mean atmospheric pressure (30.007 inches) differed from the average by a fraction only.

Rain fell on 13 days, the amount of rainfall being 5.63 inches. This was over two and a half times the average rainfall in April during the previous ten years, viz., 2.12 inches; and was much the highest recorded during that period, the next highest being 4.84 inches, viz., in April, 1887.

Males contributed 53 per cent., and females 47 per cent., to the mortality of the month. Children under 5 years of age contributed 38 per cent. to that mortality, as against 44 per cent. in 1891; 37 per cent. in 1890; 41 per cent. in 1889; 38 per cent. in 1888; 39 per cent. in 1887; and 41 per cent. in 1886.

Thirty-six deaths of persons who had attained or exceeded the age of 75 years were recorded during the month. Of these, a shoemaker, aged 75, died of apoplexy; a female, aged 75, of paralysis; a labourer, aged 75, of syncope; a female, aged 75, of heart disease; a female, aged 75, of congestion of the lungs; a sawyer, aged 75, of obstruction of the bowels; a female, aged 76, of gout; a female, aged 76, of insanity; a contractor, aged 76, of pneumonia; a gentleman, aged 77, of cancer; a civil engineer, aged 78, of gastro-enteritis; a male of unstated occupation, aged 78, of "Bright's disease"; a secretary, aged 79, of congestion of the liver; a female, aged 80, of influenza; a female, aged 80, of apoplexy; a labourer, aged 80, of pneumonia; a female, aged 80, of gastritis; a male of unstated occupation, aged 80, of kidney disease; a gentleman, aged 81, of pneumonia; a horse-trainer, aged 82, of heart disease; a female, aged 83, of diarrhoea; a shepherd, aged 83, of rheumatism; a female, aged 83, of syncope; a cabinetmaker, aged 84, of bronchitis; a surveyor, aged 85, of pleurisy; a female, aged 87, of diarrhoea; a female, aged 93, of asthma; a publican, aged 77, a labourer and a female, each aged 78, a female, aged 80, a female, aged 82, a wheelwright and a female, each aged 83, a gentleman and a stonemason, each aged 84, of old age.

Twenty-seven deaths from external causes were registered during the month, of which 17 were set down to accident, 5 to homicide, and 5 to suicide. The following are the particulars of the accidental deaths:—A boy, aged 10, and a male of unknown occupation, aged 30, died of injuries consequent on falls; a gentleman, aged 64, was passed over by a railway train; three labourers, aged 19, 22, and 26 respectively, died of injuries received through explosion of gunpowder, and a farmer, aged 72, of injury to the spine—how caused not stated; a girl, aged 5, was burned to death; an infant, aged 2, died of irritant poisoning, and a female, aged 33, of inhalation of chloroform, properly administered; a female, aged 35, was drowned in the River Yarra, and a male of unstated occupation and a seaman, aged 35 and 36 respectively, in Hobson's Bay; a male of unknown occupation, aged 60, was found drowned in the Saltwater River; a male child, aged 2, was drowned at Box Hill; an infant, aged 3 months, was overlam, and a female, aged 32, was suffocated by food whilst vomiting. The homicidal deaths were those of a new-born male infant, who died of exposure, a new-born female infant, who was suffocated, an infant, aged 3 months, who died of starvation, a female aged 30, who was killed by her husband about the 24th December, 1891, and was buried by him under a hearthstone, and a female, aged 27, who 18 months previously was shot by her husband, who then shot himself, a verdict of wilful murder being returned in the first four cases. The suicidal deaths were those of a labourer and a sea pilot, who shot themselves, a female, aged 45, who poisoned herself by taking laudanum, a labourer, aged 24, and a female servant, aged 25, who hanged themselves.

One hundred and thirteen deaths, or 18 per cent. of the whole, took place in public institutions, viz., 46 in the Melbourne Hospital, 6 in the Alfred Hospital, 5 in the Women's Hospital, 7 in the Children's Hospital, 6 in the Homeopathic Hospital, 8 in the Austin Hospital, 12 in the Metropolitan Lunatic Asylum, 6 in the Yarra Bend Lunatic Asylum, 7 in the Immigrants' Home, 7 in the Benevolent Asylum, 1 in the Convent of the Little Sisters of the Poor, and 1 in the Melbourne Gaol.

The deaths of children under five years of age numbered 243, of which 123, or 51 per cent., were of males, and 120, or 49 per cent., were of females. Of those who died, 182 were under one year of age, 45 were between one and two, 10 were between two and three, 5 were between three and four, and 1 was between four and five.

The persons who died at a more advanced age than five years numbered 402. Of these, 216, or 54 per cent., were males, and 186, or 46 per cent., were females; 19 were between five and ten, 13 were between ten and fifteen, 11 were between fifteen and twenty, 35 were between twenty and twenty-five, 34 were between twenty-five and thirty, 28 were between thirty and thirty-five, 23 were between thirty-five and forty, 28 were between forty and forty-five, 24 were between forty-five and fifty, 22 were between fifty and fifty-five, 27 were between fifty-five and sixty, 36 were between sixty and sixty-five, 29 were between sixty-five and seventy, 37 were between seventy and seventy-five, 16 were between seventy-five and eighty, and 20 were upwards of eighty.

In April, as compared with March, deaths from influenza increased from 2 to 6, and deaths from whooping-cough from 5 to 8. On the other hand, deaths from diphtheria fell from 7 to 6, deaths from typhoid fever from 39 to 28, and deaths from diarrhoeal diseases from 56 to 21. Deaths from diseases of the respiratory system, which have generally increased concurrently with those from influenza, did not do so on this occasion, but fell from 53 to 48. Ten women died of child-bearing in the month under notice, and 9 in the previous month, both of which numbers are much above the average. From them it follows that 1 mother died to every 130 children whose births were registered in April, as against 1 to every 183 registered in March.

The following is a statement of the deaths set down to typhoid fever and diphtheria in each month of 1892 and the two previous years:—

TREE RESERVE IN THE BOROUGH OF PORT MELBOURNE.

WHEREAS by the Local Government Act 1890 (54 Vict. No. 1112, sec. 417) it is enacted that the Governor in Council, at the request of the council of any municipality, including the City of Melbourne and the Town of Geelong, may, by Order to be published in the Government Gazette, direct that any portion of a street or road in the municipal district shall be a Tree Reserve, so that the portion of such street or road remaining available for traffic upon both sides of such Tree Reserve, including footpaths, shall in no place be reduced by any such Tree Reserve to less than forty-six feet, and so that no such Reserve be a greater length than ten chains, and the Governor in Council may revoke any such Order, and that the council of the municipality shall have charge of such reserve, and may fence and plant the same with trees, and may tend and cultivate the same: And whereas on the 1st day of March, 1892, the Council of the Borough of Port Melbourne requested that certain portions of Evans-street, in the said borough, be declared a Tree Reserve: Now therefore His Excellency the Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, in pursuance of the said in part recited Act, and in compliance with the request made as aforesaid, doth by this Order declare the portion of the street hereinafter mentioned to be a Tree Reserve within the meaning of section 417 of the Act aforesaid, and doth furthermore authorize the said Council to take charge of, and fence, plant, and cultivate the same, that is to say:—

All that piece of land commencing at the intersection of the north side of Railway Crescent with the east side of Evans-street; thence along Evans street north-east to Graham-street two hundred and twenty links and four-tenths; thence along Graham-street south-east one hundred links to a road known as Little Evans-street; thence south-west along Little Evans-street to Railway Crescent one hundred and ninety-three links and seven-tenths; thence westerly along Railway Crescent by a curve of eight chains radius one hundred and three links and a half to the commencing point, being the land shown by red tint on a plan deposited at the Office of Public Works, Melbourne.

WHEREAS by section 150 of the Customs Act 1890 it is provided that the Governor in Council may by any Order from time to time specify the articles on which a drawback of duty paid on importation into Victoria may be allowed on exportation therefrom, and the amount of drawback to be so allowed; and may alter or cancel any such Order; and may approve of regulations and conditions for the repacking of dutiable goods, whether such goods be in bond or be entitled to drawback; and for the due protection of the revenue under which or upon which drawbacks may be allowed: Now therefore His Excellency the Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, doth hereby make the following alterations in the Regulations relating to Drawbacks made on the twenty-ninth day of September, 1890 (that is to say):—

In Schedule 2 of the Regulations aforesaid the condition under which drawback is payable on advertising matter, &c., and paper bags is hereby cancelled, and the following condition is substituted therefor, viz.:—Subject to the condition that such advertising matter, &c., or paper bags are exported in original packages as imported, or repacked from the same in the presence of an officer.

In Schedule 2 aforesaid the footnote "When in original packages only" is hereby cancelled, and in lieu thereof and in respect

of the goods to which the same relates the following footnote is substituted, viz.:—"Only when exported in original packages as imported, or repacked from the same in the presence of an officer."

In Schedule 3 of the said Regulations the words hereunder are hereby repealed, viz.:-

At the end of para. 11, section II., the following is added:—

Officers for appointment as Instructor in the Naval Brigade are to be selected by the Naval Commandant from amongst those in the Permanent Naval Force and Naval Brigade for their ability as Instructors and general efficiency, apart from their seniority as Gunners.

They will be appointed for a probationary period of six months, at the conclusion of which they will, if found suitable, be confirmed in the appointment, and will continue to hold it so long as they maintain their efficiency in the latest drills and exercises, and carry out their duties to the satisfaction of the Commandant.

Every three years Instructors will be required to go through a re-qualifying course under the Officer carrying out the Gunnery duties in the Permanent Force.

Should the officers selected for the appointment be found unsuitable at the end of their probation, or after being confirmed in such appointment, or should they fail to re-qualify as directed, they shall be replaced by other officers selected by the Commandant, and shall return on board for duty afloat, or be dealt with as detailed below.

Officers selected from the Permanent Force proving unsuitable will, on returning to ordinary duty, take up the seniority and pay they would be entitled to had they remained on service afloat.

Officers selected from the Naval Brigade proving unsuitable will, at the end of their probation, be discharged, but they may, on being recommended by the Naval Commandant as qualified, be appointed for ordinary duty as 2nd Class Gunners in the Permanent Forces provided that the establishment is not thereby increased.

REGULATION.

Leases under Part I., Division 6, of the *Land Act 1890*, for land forming part of the Condah Swamp Lands, shall be in the form prescribed in the Schedule hereto.

shall from time to time be required by the Governor in Council for the formation of public roads highways or bridges and also such parts of the said land as shall from time to time be required for the construction of railways railway works or stations already or hereafter authorized to be constructed To have and to hold the premises hereby demised with their appurtenances unto the said h executors administrators and permitted assigns for the term of twenty-one years from the day of the date of these presents Yielding and paying therefor during the said term the yearly rent of by four equal quarterly payments in advance of on the day of the day of the day of in each year clear of all deductions the first of such quarterly payments having been already made as aforesaid And the said lessee doth hereby for h self h heirs executors and administrators covenant with Her Majesty her heirs and successors that he the said lessee h executors administrators or permitted assigns will during the said term pay the said rent in manner aforesaid clear of all deductions And shall and will during the said term pay and discharge all and all manner of taxes rates duties charges assessments and impositions whatsoever whether the same be payable by landlord or tenant or partly by each in respect of the land hereby demised And also will not assign sublet subdivide or part with the possession of the said land without the consent in writing of the Board of Land and Works being previously had and obtained And further that he the said lessee h executors administrators and permitted assigns shall and will at all times during the said term keep open and free from obstruction and to the satisfaction of the Board of Land and Works all canals ditches drains cuts channels water-courses sewers and works now existing and being or which shall at any time during the continuance of this demise exist and be upon abutting or bounding the said land hereby demised or any part thereof and that he and they shall not nor will do or cause or permit to be done upon the said land or any part thereof any act deed or thing whereby such canals ditches drains cuts channels water-courses sewers and works may be injured or endangered And further that he and they shall and will forthwith fence off to the satisfaction of the Board of Land and Works all such canals ditches drains cuts channels water-courses sewers and works on each side thereof with a substantial fence and prevent all sheep and cattle from having access to the banks thereof and shall to the like satisfaction similarly fence the land hereby demised on any side frontage or portion thereof which is not bounded by any such canal ditch drain cut channel water-course sewer or work and all such fences keep in good and substantial repair and to the like satisfaction during the whole of the said term And that he and they shall not nor will water h or their sheep or cattle on the land hereby demised at the said canals ditches drains cuts channels water-courses sewers or works except by means of one or more side cuttings leading therefrom to be made by and at the expense of the lessee h heirs executors or administrators Provided always that if any such canal ditch drain cut channel water-course or sewer now forms or at any time hereafter during the continuance of this demise shall form and be the boundary between the land hereby demised and any other swamp land demised to any other lessee as swamp land within the meaning of *Land Act 18* it shall not be obligatory on the lessee h executors administrators or permitted assigns so long as such other swamp land is the subject of a demise to any other person or persons to clear out keep open or fence off under any preceding covenant of this Indenture more than that portion of such boundary canal ditch drain cut channel or water-course on which the land hereby demised abuts or of which it forms the boundary to the centre thereof And the said lessee doth hereby for h self h executors administrators and permitted assigns further covenant with Her Majesty her heirs and successors that he and they shall and will at the expiration or sooner determination of the said term hereby granted peaceably deliver up to Her Majesty or her successors the premises hereby demised together with all houses fences and improvements that now are or may be made erected or constructed thereon in good and sufficient order and repair and also shall and will permit any person appointed by the Board of Land and Works in that behalf to enter on the land hereby demised to ascertain if the conditions and covenants of this lease are being performed by the lessee h executors administrators or permitted assigns Provided always and it is hereby agreed and declared and these presents are upon this condition that if and whenever there shall be a breach of or non-compliance with any of the covenants by the lessee herein contained and the Governor with the advice afore-

said shall determine that this lease shall be avoided (and the production of the minute of proceedings of the Executive Council whereat such determination was arrived at shall be conclusive evidence thereof) or if the land hereby demised or any part thereof is assigned whether by operation of law or otherwise except as hereinbefore is mentioned or as in *Land Act 18* otherwise expressly provided then these presents and the term hereby created shall be void and of no effect and immediately thereupon it shall be lawful for any bailiff of Crown lands or for any other agents or officers authorized in that behalf by Her Majesty or by the Governor with the advice aforesaid without any demand whatsoever to enter upon the land hereby demised and the lessee h executors administrators and assigns and all persons claiming under h or them for ever to expel and remove therefrom without any legal process whatever and as effectually as any sheriff might do in case Her Majesty had obtained judgment in ejectment for recovery of possession of the said land or in an action for the recovery of land and a writ of *habere facias possessionem* or writ of possession or other process had issued on such judgment directed to such sheriff in due form of law and that in case of such entry and any action being brought or other proceeding taken for or on account of the same by any person whomsoever the defendants or defendant to such action may plead leave and licence in bar thereof and these presents shall be conclusive evidence of the leave and licence of the lessee h executors or administrators and all persons claiming under h or them to any bailiff of Crown lands and all persons acting in the matters complained of in such action or other proceeding And lastly it is hereby agreed and declared that notwithstanding anything hereinbefore contained it shall be lawful for the Governor with the consent aforesaid to resume for any purpose not hereinbefore stated possession of the whole or any part of the land hereby demised on payment of or tender to the lessee h executors administrators or permitted assigns or other the person lawfully in occupation of the land hereby demised full compensation for all improvements made by the lessee h executors administrators or permitted assigns upon the land hereby demised and thereupon these presents shall in the case of the resumption of the whole of the land hereby demised absolutely cease and determine and in the case of a resumption of part of such land shall as to such part and the obligation to pay rent as to such part shall absolutely cease and determine and the value of such compensation and the amount of the reduced rent as the case may be shall be absolutely fixed and determined by the Board of Land and Works whose award shall be final and conclusive And it is hereby agreed and declared that the term Governor in these presents shall mean the Governor or the administrator of the Government for the time being of the Colony of Victoria unless such meaning shall be inconsistent with the context.

CARISBROOK WATERWORKS TRUST CONSTITUTED.

WHEREAS by the *Water Act 1890* it is amongst other things enacted that at the expiration of two months after the notice of any application should have been first advertised in the *Government Gazette*, the Minister, if satisfied that the provisions of the now in part recited Act have been substantially complied with, should submit such application and the general plan and description therein referred to, and all petitions which have been received in respect of such application, to the Governor in Council, together with any recommendations as to the granting of the application or as to any alterations or additions he might think desirable in the proposed waterworks; and the Governor in Council might thereupon approve of the construction of such proposed waterworks with or without any alterations or additions in the general plan and description thereof, or might disapprove of the construction of such waterworks, and should make an Order in Council accordingly: And it was further enacted that if the Governor in Council should approve of the construction of such waterworks with or without alterations or additions or restrictions of any such general plan and description, a Waterworks Trust should be constituted to construct, maintain, and continue the whole or any part of the waterworks therein described, in accordance with the provisions of such Order and of the now in part recited Act: And every Order approving the construction

any proposed waterworks and of the constituting of a Waterworks Trust or the purpose should—

(a) State the amount of money which the Governor in Council will grant as a loan for the purpose of carrying out such proposed waterworks, and of paying the cost and expense of preparing the general plan and description of the same, and the costs of the application for the constituting of such Waterworks Trust; and also the rate of interest which will be charged for such loan, such rate being at least one-half per centum more than the rate payable by the Government on the Public Loan out of which such loan might be granted;

(b) Specify the limits of the lands, whether within or without the municipal districts of the council or councils applying for the proposed waterworks, within which such Waterworks Trust shall have authority, to be called a Waterworks District;

(c) State what are the principal works to be constructed;

(d) Assign a corporate name to such Waterworks Trust; and

(e) Contain such provisions (not inconsistent with this Act) as, according to the nature of the application and the facts and circumstances of each case, the Governor in Council thinks fit.

And it was further enacted that the Governor in Council might, where a waterworks district is either wholly or, with the exception of the waterworks or proposed waterworks thereof, within one municipal district, appoint the municipal council for the time being of such municipal district, together with one or more persons not being members of such municipal council, to be the Waterworks Trust of such waterworks district: Now therefore His Excellency the Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council and in pursuance of the provisions of the said Act, has approved of a general plan and description as set forth in a certain application of the Carisbrook Borough Council for a loan of Eight thousand six hundred and fifty pounds sterling (£8,650), for the purpose of carrying out a scheme of water supply for the township of Carisbrook, as shown on the general plan and description accompanying the said application, deposited in the Department of Victorian Water Supply; and doth hereby order and appoint as follows:—

(1) The construction of the said waterworks.

(2) The Municipal Council of the borough of Carisbrook for the time being and one other commissioner to be the Waterworks Trust of such Waterworks District.

(3) That the amount of loan hereby granted shall be Eight thousand four hundred pounds sterling (£8,400), for the purpose of carrying out approved works and paying the cost and expense of the plans and application for the same; and that the interest to be charged for such loan shall be at the rate of Four pounds ten shillings per centum per annum, payable half-yearly.

(4) That the limits of the land within which the said Waterworks Trust shall have authority shall be those comprised within the following boundaries:—

Portion I.—Commencing at the north-east angle of allotment 24, parish of Carisbrook; thence west by the northern boundaries of allotments 24 and 4, and a line in continuation thereof across road to the north-east angle of allotment 5; thence south by the east boundaries of allotments 5 and 6 to the south-east angle of the latter; thence west by the south boundary of allotment 6 and portion of the south boundary of allotment 6B a distance of sixty-six chains; thence south by a line three miles forty-six chains to the south boundary of the parish of Carisbrook; thence east by said parish boundary to the Mount Greenock Creek; thence by that creek in a general northerly direction to the south-west angle of allotment 15; thence east by the south boundary of allotment 15 to the south-east angle thereof; and thence by a line bearing north, being the eastern boundary of allotments 15, 16, 17, the Town Reserve of Carisbrook, and allotments 22, 23 and 24, to the commencing point aforesaid.

Portion II.—All the lands required for the purposes of a storage reservoir, near the boundary of the parishes of Carisbrook and Maryborough, including portion of allotment 1, section E, parish of Maryborough, and adjoining lands in the parishes of Maryborough and Carisbrook, forming part of a timber reserve in said parishes; thence from the outlet of said storage reservoir a strip one chain wide running in a north-easterly direction through allotment 1, section E, parish of Maryborough, and allotment 30, section 3, parish of Carisbrook; thence farther in a north-easterly direction through timber reserve to the borough of Carisbrook boundary, near the intersection of said boundary with the northern boundary of section 3, parish of Carisbrook.

And whereas by an Order in Council bearing date the 12th March, 1889, a Waterworks Trust known and incorporated as the Carisbrook and Majorca United Waterworks Trust was duly constituted, and the boundaries of the land comprising the Waterworks District of the said Trust were in and by the said Order in Council defined and limited:

And whereas it is expedient to diminish the extent of the said Waterworks District: Now therefore His Excellency the Governor, by and with the advice of the Executive Council, and in pursuance of the provisions of the said Act, doth order that the Waterworks District of the said Carisbrook and Majorca United Waterworks Trust shall be decreased by the excision therefrom of the lands comprised within the following boundaries:—

Commencing at the north-east angle of allotment 24, parish of Carisbrook; thence west by the northern boundaries of allotments 24 and 4 and a line in continuation thereof across road to the north-east angle of allotment 5; thence south by the east boundaries of allotments 5 and 6 to the south-east angle of the latter; thence west by the south boundary of allotment 6 and portion of south boundary of allotment 6B a distance of sixty-six chains; thence south by a line three miles forty-six chains to the south boundary of the parish of Carisbrook; thence east by said parish boundary to the Mount Greenock Creek; thence by that creek in a general northerly direction to the south-west angle of allotment 15; thence east by the south boundary of allotment 15 to the south-east angle thereof; and thence by a line bearing north, being the eastern boundary of allotments 15, 16, 17, the Town Reserve of Carisbrook, and allotments 22, 23, and 24, to the commencing point.

REGULATIONS FOR THE CARE, PROTECTION, AND MANAGEMENT OF THE RESERVE FOR A RACE-COURSE AND OTHER PURPOSES OF PUBLIC RECREATION IN THE BOROUGH OF CARISBROOK.

WHEREAS by the Crown grant issued in favour of Ambrose Chalk, George Henry Cambridge, Thomas Major, Francis Stewart, William Ray Smith, Frederick James Field, and Henry Richard Warton (hereinafter and hereinafter designated the said trustees) in respect of the Reserve for a Race-course and other purposes of public recreation in the borough of Carisbrook, it is provided and declared that the land thereby granted, and the buildings, for the time being thereon shall be maintained and used as and for a Race-course and other purposes of public recreation and offices and conveniences connected therewith, under and in accordance with such regulations as shall from time to time be made by the said trustees as therein set forth. And whereas by section 137 of the *Land Act 1890*, it is provided that where any such land has been vested in trustees, or jointly with the Board of Land and Works and trustees, it shall be lawful for the trustees of any such land, with the approval of the Governor in Council, from time to time to make, alter, and rescind rules and regulations for all or any of the purposes mentioned in clause 1 of the said section. Now therefore the survivors of the said trustees do hereby make the Regulations following in respect of the said Reserve for a Race-course and other purposes of public recreation in the Borough of Carisbrook:—

REGULATIONS.

1. The reserve, which is parcelled out into the following divisions, shall be open to the public free of charge from sunrise to sunset, except for training or exercising horses, on such days (not to exceed twelve in any one year) as the reserve may be set apart by the said trustees for the holding therein of races:—

1. The grand stand, lawn, saddling paddock, and weighing yard, all of which are enclosed partly by a close fence and partly by a picket fence.
2. Inside the running course.
3. The remainder of the reserve, excepting such parts (if any) as may hereafter be enclosed and set apart for plantation.

2. The scale of charges or fees which may be levied and taken for training or exercising horses in the reserve and for admission on the occasion of races to the first and third divisions of the reserve and the buildings thereon shall be as follows:—

For admission of every horse to the reserve for training or exercising, One pound per annum.

For admission to the first division of every person, Five shillings.

For admission to the third division of every person, whether on horseback or on foot or in a vehicle, a sum not exceeding Two shillings.

Provided always that the said trustees may exempt any member of a racing club wholly or partially from the payment of all or any such charges or fees; and that the money so received shall, after deducting necessary expenses, be applied towards the permanent improvement of the reserve for racing purposes, or the erection, maintenance, or repair of buildings and fences, or the planting of trees and shrubs in the reserve, or prizes for any race, or for the owner of any horse engaged in in any race, or in such other manner in or upon the reserve as shall be necessary or expedient for the purpose of rendering the same more convenient for racing or other purposes of public recreation.

3. No horse except a racehorse engaged in the races, nor any vehicle of any kind whatsoever, shall be admitted to the first division of the reserve, and no horse or vehicle shall be admitted to the second division thereof.

4. No person, unless otherwise permitted under these regulations, shall enter upon the reserve, or any division or part thereof, unless such person shall have a ticket duly authorizing him on that behalf.

5. No person, who has been proved to the satisfaction of the said trustees to have been guilty of malpractice or dishonorable conduct in connexion with racing, or to be a defaulter, shall enter upon the reserve, or any division or part thereof.

6. Every member of the Maryborough and Carisbrook Racing Club, and every person paying for admission to the first or third division, shall be supplied with a ticket of admission, which he shall upon demand produce, and (if required) surrender to any gatekeeper, servant, or other person having authority from the said trustees, to demand the production or surrender of the same.

7. Persons renting or hiring for any race meeting the grand stand, or any portion thereof, or any booth upon the reserve, shall abide by any order given by the said trustees in reference to the reserve and the buildings and other erections thereon.

8. No person shall bring any dog into the reserve or into any division or part thereof or into any building thereon.

9. Any person committing in the reserve, or any division or part thereof, or in any of the buildings or erections for the time being thereon, any of the following offences, shall be liable to be removed from the reserve, notwithstanding such person may have purchased, and is or may be in possession of, a ticket of admission:—

1. Assaulting any other person.
2. Being drunk.
3. Riding, crossing, or trespassing upon the course, or any part thereof, during a race meeting, or when the horses are preparing or prepared to start, or are running for any race.

4. Using any profane, indecent, or obscene language.
5. Using any threatening, abusive, or insulting words.
6. Behaving improperly or riotously.
7. Being found in the first or third division and not producing upon demand, or not surrendering (if required) to any gatekeeper, servant, or other person, having authority from the said trustees, to demand production of the same, a ticket duly authorizing admission to such division, unless the person so found shall forthwith satisfy the said trustees that the proper charge for admission has been paid by him and that his ticket has been lost or surrendered.
8. Obtaining admission to the reserve or any part or division thereof when disentitled to such admission under these regulations.
9. Remaining in the reserve, or any division or part thereof, after having been warned off any part of the reserve.
10. No person shall, after the 20th day of March, 1892, carry on any trade, business, or calling whatever, on any portion of the reserve other than upon such portions as may be set apart by the said trustees for the carrying on of such trade, business, or calling, and then only when he shall have obtained the consent, in writing, of the said trustees.
11. No person shall, after the 20th day of March, 1892, carry on the trade, business, or calling of a bookmaker on any portion of the reserve unless he shall comply with the following conditions:—

1. That he be registered annually as a bookmaker by the said trustees or by the committee or stewards of the Maryborough and Carisbrook Racing Club, or those authorized by such trustees, committee, or stewards.

2. That, during the time he shall be upon the reserve carrying on his trade, business, or calling of a bookmaker, he shall wear a ticket to be supplied by the said trustees or the committee or stewards of the Maryborough and Carisbrook Racing Club, or those authorized by such trustees, committee, or stewards, which ticket shall be visible to the public and shall have thereon his name.

12. No person shall climb or jump over the gates or fences, stick bills thereon, or cut names on the fences, trees, or seats, or roll or throw stones in the reserve.

13. No person shall damage in any way the trees, shrubs, flowers, buildings, or fences in and around the reserve, nor shall fires be lighted therein, except with the consent, in writing, of the said trustees.

14. No person shall, except as hereinbefore provided, bring any horse or vehicle into the reserve for any cause without the permission, in writing, of the said trustees.

15. No person shall put in the reserve any cattle, goats, or pigs, without the permission, in writing, of the said trustees. Provided always that the moneys received for agistment shall be expended in the maintenance and improvements of the reserve, and that an account thereof shall be furnished annually to the Board of Land and Works.

16. No person shall engage in the games of cricket and football except in those portions of the reserve which may be set apart by the said trustees for the purpose.

17. No person except labourers or workmen employed by the said trustees in the reserve shall enter any plots therein which may be enclosed for plantations of young trees or shrubs.

Every person offending against these regulations shall, in accordance with section 137 of the *Land Act 1890*, on conviction before any justice, forfeit and pay a penalty not exceeding Five pounds for each offence; and every person who so offends and who, after he has been warned by any officer or servant of the said trustees or by any constable, does not desist from so offending, may be forthwith apprehended by such officer, servant, or constable, and taken before some justice of the peace, and shall, on conviction, forfeit and pay a penalty not exceeding Ten pounds.

3. Coffins to be sufficiently long, deep, and wide for the corpse to lie extended at full length, and to be fastened down with screws. The contractor shall provide two inches of sawdust for the bottom of the coffin; a small block of wood to keep the head of the deceased in position, and sufficient white calico to cover the body. In the event of a body being decomposed, or whenever it may be considered necessary by the member of the Police Force issuing the order for the burial, a coffin must be supplied sufficiently large to leave at least 2 inches between the body and the sides and top and bottom of the coffin, and this space must be filled up round the body with pine or phenyle sawdust by the contractor at his own expense; and in the event of any neglect in so providing or filling up the coffin it will be competent for the Tender Board to inflict a fine not exceeding £5 to be deducted as in Condition 9. Coffins to be properly lowered into the graves, and the graves filled up again.

4. The graves to be dug of the proper depth, and in conformity with the Cemetery Regulations.

8. The account is to be rendered monthly to the officer ordering the service for payment at the Treasury, Melbourne. The charge for the minister's fee should be included in the account for the funeral.

9.
