NETTING PROHIBITED IN LAKE COOPER.

#### PROCLAMATION

By His Excellency the Right Honorable John Adrian Louis, Earl of Hopetonn, Viscount Aithrie, and Baron Hope, in the Peerage of Scotland; Baron Hopetonn of Hopetonn, and Baron Niddry of Niddry Castle, in the Peerage of the United Kingdom; Knight Grand Cross of the Most Distinguished Order of Saint Michael and Saint George; Governor and Commander-in-Chief in and over the Colony of Victoria and its Dependencies, &c., &c.

MIEREAS by the Fisheries Act. 1890 (54 Vict. No. 1093) it is amongst other things enacted that the Governor in Council may from time to time make proclamations, which shall have force and effect only in any waters or places specified therein, to provide for the more effectual government, management, protection, and improvement of fish, and any waters in which fishing may be carried on, and that every proclamation under the said Act shall be published in the Government Gazette, and may be explained, varied, revoked, annulled, or superseded by any other proclamation under the said Act: Now therefore I, the Governor of Victoria, with the advice of the Executive Council, do hereby prohibit the use of nets and fixed engines for the purpose of fishing in Lake Cooper, Corop, and the backwaters of such lake.





#### SHIRE OF BOROONDARA.

By-LAW No. 13.

BY virtue of the powers conferred by the Health Act 1890, the Council of the Shire of Boroondara, in the name and on behalf of the President, Councillors, and Ratepayers of the said shire, make the following by-law, being By-law No. 13, that is to say:

1. This by-law shall apply to and have operation within the following boundaries within the said shire:—On the north by the Whitehorse-road, on the west by Burke-road from Whitehorseroad to Toorak-road, on the south by Toorak-road, Norwood-road, Alfred-road, and Bath's-road, on the east by the eastern boundary of the shire from Bath's-road to Whitehorse-road.

2. Clause 6 of By-law No. 4, made by the Local Board of Health for the shire, on the 19th day of May, 1886, shall be and the same is hereby repealed so far as the same applies to the portion of the shire described in the next preceding clause.

3. On and after the 1st July, 1893, the ordinary system of pans for night-soil shall be abolished, and from and after that date every closet shall be furnished with a double-pan service to be provided by the council, under which at least once a week the pan in every closet shall be closed with a tight-fitting lid and removed from the premises, and a clean pan shall be left in its place.

4. The council shall have power (in lieu of making a rate for

removed from the premises, and a clean pan shall be left in its place.

4. The council shall have power (in lieu of making a rate for the removal of night-soil) to make a charge on each occupier for such service, and for the pans supplied, the amount (in default of payment) to be recovered in any court of petty sessions.

5. No person unless duly authorized and licensed in that behalf by the council shall remove or empty any privy pan used in or belonging to any closet or privy.

6. No householder shall contract for the removal of either night-soil or any other refuse except in accordance with the bylaws and regulations of the council.

7. No offal, fat, bones, or blood shall be removed or carried through or along any street except in air-tight carts and between the hours of Ten p.m. and Eight a.m., except by the express written permission of the council.

8. Any person who shall be guilty of any breach of any of the provisions of this by-law shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding (£10) Ten pounds.

BY-LAW No. 10.

IN pursuance of the powers contained in the Health Act 1890, and of every other power thereunto enabling them in that behalf, the President, Conneillors, and Ratepayers of the Shire of Waranga, for the purpose of carrying the said Act into execution within the said shire, make the following by-law, that is to

1. All former by-laws on the matters and things hereinafter provided for are hereby repealed, excepting as to acts done, penalties incurred, and proceedings at law pending at the time of this by-law soming into operation.

2. This by-law shall come into force and operation on its confirmation by the Board of Public Health, and immediately after its publication in the Government Gazette.

3. This by-law shall apply to and have operation within the boundaries of the township of Rushworth, in the Central Riding and the township of Murchison, in the Eastern Riding of the Shire of Waranga.

4. All closets or privies shall be provided with a suitable pan. No receptacle other than such a closet-pan shall be used in connexion with any premises, and the owner or the person or persons having the management and control of any premises shall furnish, at their own cost, every privy or closet in connexion with such premises with the required number of closet-pans as the council of the said shire may direct for the proper cleaning of such closets or privies. All closet-pans to be constructed of galvanized iron properly strapped, and to be water-tight, with handles thereto, and of a capacity not exceeding twelve gallons or three cubic feet.

5. The occupier of every house and, premises within the said

feet.

5. The occupier of every house and premises within the said townships shall cause the yard and ground belonging thereto or occupied in connoxion therewith to be kept as as not to be a muisance or injurious to health, and shall cause all receptacles for house refuse to be disinfected, and filth, rubbish, and refuse matter to be from time to time removed from such yard and ground, and if at any time the occupier of any premises shall neglect or fail to have such filth, rubbish, or refuse matter so removed as aforesaid the council of the said shire may cause the same to be removed at the expense of such occupier after due notice.

6. The occupier of every house, building, or tenement within the said townships shall cause every closet-pan to be emptied, cleaned, and disinfected from time to time as herein provided, between the hours of Eleven p.m. and Five a.m.

7. Every occupier and every person having the management and control of any premises shall once at least in every week cause to be emptied or cleansed every privy and place in the nature of a privy for the reception of night-soil in or belonging to such premises.

8. No person shall empty any privy or place for the reception of

to such premises.

8. No person shall empty any privy or place for the reception of might-soil except by means of a cart, carriage, or means of conveyance properly constructed and furnished with a sufficient covering so as to prevent the escape of the contents or any portion thereof, or of any effluvia therefrom.

9. All night-soil, blood, offal, or other offensive matter or thing shall be removed to and deposited in such place or places only as may be appointed by the council for the final reception of same.

thing shall be removed to and deposited in such place or places only as may be appointed by the council for the final reception of same.

10. No closet-door or trap shall abut or open upon a street, lane, or right-of-way exceeding 10 feet in width.

11. Every person who shall by any act or default be guilty of any breach of this by-law shall be liable to a penalty of Ten pounds for every such breach, or of Five pounds for each day during which such breach shall be committed or continued, unless the justices before whom the penalty is sought to be recovered shall order any portion only of either of the said penalties, such portion not being less than Five shillings, to be paid; and and person committing any such breach as aforesaid shall be liable to the penalty notwith-standing that the council may be empowered to remedy by this by-law or otherwise such breach, and whether such council has or has not taken advantage of such powers.

W HEREAS by Part I. of the Defences and Discipline Act. 1890 it is amongst other things provided that the Governor may make rules and regulations for the employment, removal, or dismissal, and for the better government of persons engaged by virtue of the said Part of the said Act, and for enforcing good order and discipline among them, and otherwise carrying out the said Part of the said Act, and from time to time annul, alter, or amend the same, and substitute others in lieu thereof: Now therefore His Excellency the Governor of Victoria, with the advice of the Executive Council thereof, doth hereby make the following Alterations in the Financial and Store Regulations (that is to say):—

Para. 214.—Free kit (clothing).—Cancel "2 kummerbunds." Para. 215.—Annual allowance of clothing.—Cancel "I kummerbund."

Para. 216.—Cancel this para., and substitute:— Recruits will be supplied with part-worn clothing, if such clothing of suitable condition is available. If not, new clothing will be supplied to them.

Para. 220.—Cancel this para., and substitute :-

#### Teachers Act 1893.

#### TEMPORARY UNCLASSIFIED SCHOOLS .-REGULATIONS.

At the Executive Council Chamber, Melbourne, the thirtieth day of May, 1893.

HEREAS by the Teachers Act 1893 (56 Vict. No. 1302), it is enacted that the Governor in Council may make regulations for certain purposes therein specified and generally for carrying out any of the provisions of the said Act: Now therefore His Excellency the Governor of Victoria, with the advice of the Executive Council thereof, doth hereby make the following Regulations, viz.:—

#### RECULATIONS.

#### Temporary Unclassified Schools.

- 1. In thinly-peopled districts a temporary unclassified school may be established in any locality where it is probable that an average attendance of ten scholars will be maintained; provided that there is no existing State school at which such scholars could attend, and provided that suitable school premises can be obtained at a reasonable rental, not exceeding £7 10s. per annum.
- 2. The buildings which may be used or erected for temporary unclassified schools shall be such as contain not less than eighty cubic feet of space for every child in average attendance, and have sufficient means of warming, light, and ventilation, and shall be approved by the Minister.
- 3. Any temporary half-time unclassified school which has not for six consecutive months maintained an average attendance of seven children, or any full-time unclassified school which has not for a like period maintained an average attendance of ten pupils,
- 4. If the average attendance at any temporary unclassified school for six consecutive months has been twenty or more, the Minister will direct that it become a classified school, provided that it appears from the number of children attending that such average attendance is likely to be maintained, and that suitable school accommodation for the attendance is available.
- 5. When the average attendance at any classified State school for six consecutive months has been less than twenty, and is likely so to continue, and it is not desirable or practicable to make it a classified part-time school, the Minister will notify to the classifiers that it is his intention to make such school a temporary unclassified school, and such order will take effect forthwith if there be no teacher in charge of the school, and, if there be a teacher, from the date of his transfer to a classified school, or of his electing to remain in the school.

6. Permits to teach in temporary unclassified schools will be granted to persons who possess the following qualifications:—

They must be not less than seventeen years of age if females, or eighteen years of age if males, of good character, sound health, and—

- (1) Hold the licence to teach or any higher certificate under the Education Department; or
- (2) Satisfy an inspector of schools that they are able to impart elementary instruction; and
  - (a) Hold an approved certificate of qualification from the Committee of Council of Education, or from any recognised board or department of education in any British possession; or
  - (b) Have passed in four subjects of the Matriculation or any higher examination of a recognised University, of which subjects two shall have been English and Arithmetic; or
  - Have passed a satisfactory examination held by the Department in reading, writing, arithmetic, grammar, geography, elementary science, and history, as specified below.

Reading.—To read fluently and with proper emphasis.

Writing.—To write any passage dictated, with correct spelling and punctuation, and with fair penmanship.

Arithmetic.—Notation, numeration, the simple and compound rules, bills of parcels, reduction, practice, proportion, interest, vulgar and decimal fractions.

Grammar. -Parsing, analysis, and the inflections.

Geography.—Easy questions on the map of the world generally; explanation of the lines marking latitude and longitude and the zones on a map of the world.

Elementary Science.—As required for the Third and Second classes of pupil teachers.

History.—As required for the Third and Second classes of pupil teachers.

- 7. When a vacancy occurs in a temporary unclassified school, the Minister will, if no teacher be recorded for transfer, appoint the person next entitled to employment as shown in the employment register under the Teachers Act 1893 (No. 1302).
- ment register under the Teachers Act 1893 (No. 1302).

  8. All such appointments, except those of pupil teachers who, by reason of completing their course, are on the register for employment in classified schools, will be temporary, and may be terminated by one month's notice on the part of either the Minister or the teacher, or by the Minister without notice in case of misconduct, inefficiency, or neglect of duty by the teacher.

  9. The fixed salaries of teachers of temporary unclassified schools from the 1st July, 1893, will be as follow:—

  (a) Junior assistants in excess in classified schools having temporary charge of unclassified schools, and teachers with trained teachers certificates obtained at examinations in 1892, 1893, or 1894, in charge of unclassified schools, males £80 per annum, females £64 per annum, (b) All other teachers, males £75 per annum, females £60 per annum.

In addition to the fixed salary, a sum equal to not more than one-half the amount of the fixed salary will be obtainable by way of results, to be determined as in the case of classified schools.

10. Teachers of temporary unclassified schools will be paid maintenance allowance for performing the services in connexion with the school buildings, &c., for which teachers of classified schools are paid a maintenance allowance.

W HEREAS by Part I. of the Defences and Discipline Act 1890 it is amongst other things provided that the Governor may make rules and regulations for the employment, removal, or dismissal, and for the better government, of persons engaged by virtue of the said Part of the said Act, and for enforcing good order and discipline among them, and otherwise carrying out the said Part of the said Act, and from time to time annul, alter, or amend the same, and substitute others in lieu thereof: Now therefore His Excellency the Governor of Victoria, with the advice of the Executive Council thereof, doth by this present Order annul from the date hereof all Dress Regulations previously made for the Victorian Military Forces, and doth hereby make the following Regulations (that is to say):—

DRESS REGULATIONS FOR THE VICTORIAN MILITARY FORCES.

#### I.—GENERAL INSTRUCTIONS.

#### OFFICERS.

Badges of Rank.—The rank of Officers is shown by badges as under:—

Lieutenant-General—Crossed sword and baton, with crown above.

Major-General—Crossed sword and baton, with star above.

Brigadier-General-Crossed sword and baton.

Colonel-Crown and two stars below.

Lieutenant-Colonel-Crown and one star below.

Major-Crown.

Captain-Two stars.

Lieutenant-One star.

Badges of rank, except when otherwise ordered, will be worn on shoulder-straps, and in certain cases, especially provided for, on saddle-cloths. In full dress to be embroidered, in undress metal or embroidery. In metal, the stars and crowns on shoulder-straps are  $\frac{3}{4}$  inch high; in embroidery 1 inch high. On saddle cloths, stars and crowns, whether in metal or embroidery, will be  $2\frac{1}{2}$  inches high. The badge of crossed sword and baton on shoulder-straps is 2 inches long; on saddle cloths about 4 inches.

#### Badges on Helmets and Forage Caps:-

For Artillery and Engineers, a gilt grenade.

For Infantry, Commissariat and Transport Corps, Ambulance Corps, Victorian Mounted Rifles, and Victorian Rangers, a badge, in gilt metal, on a seven-pointed silver star, a raised circle with cross and five stars representing Southern Cross within a laurel wreath surmounted with gilt crown, motto "Pro Deo et Patria, Victoria."

For Medical Staff, and Victorian Volunteer Cadet · Corps, special pattern badge.

Badges, Special.—No badges of a special character are allowed to be worn, except those authorized by Regulations.

Boots and Spurs.—Mounted Officers, except where otherwise specified, wear, when on mounted duties, kneeboots with crane-necked spurs fastened with straps and buckles. Officers who are not mounted wear wellington or ankle boots, and in marching order strong laced up boots. The knee boots must be, as regards shape, in accordance with the sealed pattern; but the height will depend upon the length of the leg and the relative height of the calf. The boot, which is sloped down at the back, should reach in front to about 4 inches from the top of the knee and at the back just to the top of the calf.

Majors of Garrison Artillery Batteries when dis-

mounted on parade do not wear spurs.

When spurs are worn with trousers, wellington or elastic-side boots, made plain, are to be worn; trousers to be strapped down.

Spurs fixed in laced boots are not allowed.

Braid, Buttons, &c.—Unless otherwise specified, loops, frogs, and buttons on the front of tunics, &c., will be at equal distances. Buttons, generally, will be an inch in diameter; small buttons \( \frac{3}{4} \) of an inch. When loops of lace or cord are worn across the breast, the top loops will reach to the sleeve seams, and those at the waist will be 4 inches long.

Buttons.—Universal pattern, gilt, with badge, Southern Cross and motto "Pro Deo et Patria, Victoria," for all arms except Artillery who will wear buttons, Royal Artillery pattern, but without the crown. For Volunteer Cadet Corps, buttons of special pattern.

Cocked Hats.—Cocked hats will be of black beaver or silk, and of the following dimensions:---

The left side 7 inches high, the right side  $6\frac{1}{4}$  inches; each corner  $4\frac{3}{4}$  inches long.

On the right side, a black silk cockade with a loop and button over it; and, at each corner, a bullion tassel, 12 inches long exclusive of the head.

Collars.—The collars of tunies, frock coats, and jackets will, unless otherwise stated, be rounded at the top in front, and the height is not to exceed 2 inches.

Depth of Shirts.—The skirts of tunics for officers 5ft. 9in. high will be 9 inches.

The skirts of frock coats will be 17 inches deep for all Officers 5ft. 9in. high.

The proportionate variation for each inch of difference in height is about  $\frac{1}{4}$  inch in the skirts of frocks and  $\frac{1}{8}$  incle in the skirts of tunics.

Forage Caps.—Round forage caps with peaks will be 3 inches high; without peaks  $2_8^6$  inches.

Gloves.—White gloves to be worn by all branches of the service in full, ball, or levée dress, and by the Staff in Review Order. For undress, as specified hereafter under the several headings.

Great Coats and Capes.—Great coats will be made according to the following description:—

Milled cloth, double-breasted, to reach within a foot of the ground. Stand-and-fall collar, 4½ inches deep, with a fly to cover the band of the cape when buttoned on. Loose round cuffs, 6 inches deep. Two pockets with flaps at the waist in front, two openings behind at the side-seams, with pointed flaps 11 inches long; a pocket inside the left breast. A slit in the left side for hilt of sword to pass through. An opening behind, 19 inches long, with a fly. Two rows of buttons down the front, six in each row; the top buttons 6 inches apart, the bottom ones 4 inches; three buttons on each skirtflap, the centre one to close the pocket; four small buttons at the opening behind; and five flat buttons under the fly at the collar. A cloth back-strap, attached to the top button of the skirt flap, to confine the coat at the waist; two looks and eyes to the collar. Shoulder-straps on the coat of the same material as the garment; a small button of the pattern authorized for the respective services at the top.

Badges of rank in gold. Cape of the same cloth as the coat, and long enough to cover the knuckles; four small buttons in front; to fasten at the neck with a leather strap, runner, and buckle. Four cloth tabs with button-holes in the lining at the bottom, one on either side in front and two in the rear, so as to secure the cape to the bottom buttons of the coat in front and to the top buttons on the flaps behind. Staff Officers and Victorian Engineers wear velvet collar of Garter blue. Medical Staff, black velvet collars. For all other branches the collar will be of cloth.

In the case of the Mounted Officers, for whom the above pattern of coat is authorized, the following modifications will be made:—The opening of the coat behind will be long enough to reach to the cantle of the saddle, and a gusset will be introduced commencing at the top of the slit and extending downwards to about 24 inches, with about 19 inches width at the bottom. A tab with buttonhole at the bottom of the gusset to close it when the coat is worn on foot. A small pocket with a flap at the back of the left sleeve. On the inside of each skirt, a cloth band with button to secure the skirts over the knees when the coat is worn on mounted duties. The four buttons at the opening behind are omitted. The coat to reach to the ankles when worn on foot.

On the line of march and during manœuvres dismounted officers will wear the great coat rolled.

Haversachs.—Need not be worn, except on service in the field or at extended manœuvres.

Honorary Aides-de-Camp.—Officers of the Victorian Military Forces who are Honorary Aides-de-Camp to His Excellency the Governor will wear the aiguillete when in attendance on His Excellency.

Infantry Officers.—The full dress tunic, gold-laced trousers, dress sash and sword-belt, and blue helmet are appointed to be worn at levées, balls, &c., and not on any parade unless specially ordered.

Medical Officers.—Medical Officers drawing horse allowance are to provide themselves with chargers and horse furniture, and to be mounted when required to attend parades.

Mess Dress.—Except where otherwise specified the following to be carried out:—Officers to wear stand-up collars and black silk or satin ties. The waistcoat to be cut just to show centre shirt stud, except where otherwise specified. Low shoes or "pumps" not to be worn with moss dress.

Military Decorations and Medals.—Medals are to be worn with the full dress only, and on the left breast.

They are to be worn in a horizontal line, suspended from a single bar, the buckle of which is not, to be seen.

The bar is to be placed between the first and second buttons from the bottom of the collar of the tunic. The riband is not to exceed 1 inch in length, unless the number of clasps require it to be longer. In the absence of a bar the medals may be stitched on.

Medals are to be worn over the sash and under the pouch-belt.

In undress or mess dress uniform ribands only may be worn by Commissioned Officers. These ribands should be stitched on to the cloth of the coat or jacket without intervals. They should not be allowed to overlap.

Miniature War medals, or decorations given for active service, will be worn in plain clothes (evening dress) in the presence of members of the Royal Family, &c. See Army Order 341, of October, 1890.

Retired officers are authorized to wear Miniature War medals, or decorations given for active service, in evening dress, on all public and official occasions.

Military medals will be worn in the order of the dates of the campaigns for which they have been conferred; the first decoration or medal obtained being placed farthest from the left shoulder.

Medals won for good shooting at gunnery or rifle competitions may be worn on the right breast only, and badges on the left arm, when taking part in such competitions, or during presentations of prizes in connexion with Artillery or Rifle meetings; but on no account are these medals to be worn on any other occasion.

Mourning.—Officers in uniform, when in mourning or attending funerals, are to wear a piece of black crape, 3½ inches wide, round the left arm, above the elbow. This is the only mourning to be worn in uniform, unless when otherwise specially ordered. It will never be worn at levées or drawing-rooms except when the Court is in mourning.

Officers attending funerals, unless ordered to dress otherwise, will attend in review order, except that, in the case of Officers of Mounted Corps, trousers will be substituted for pantaloons. In bad weather, cloaks or great coats may be worn.

Orders of Dress.—See Appendices at end of book.

Patrol Jackets.—Patrol jackets, except those otherwise specified, will be made according to the following description:—

Blue cloth, 28 inches long from the bottom of the collar behind, for an officer 5ft. 9in. in height, with a proportionate variation for any difference in height, rounded in front, and edged with inch black mohair braid all round and up the openings at the sides. On each side in front, four double drop loops of 1-in. flat plait, with eyes in the centre of each loop; the top loops extend to the shoulder seams, and the bottom to 4 inches; four netted olivets on the right side to fasten through the loops on the left. On each sleeve an Austrian knot of flat plait 7 inches high from the bottom of the cuff. Double flat plait on each back seam, with crow's foot at top and bottom, and two double eyes at equal distances. Pockets fitted with flaps in and out. Hooks and eyes in front. Shoulder-straps of the same material as the garment, edged with 12-in. black mohair braid, except at the base; black netted button at the top. Badges of rank in gold.

Retired List, Officers on.—Officers retired with permission to wear uniform will wear the uniform of the regiments in which they last served, but with the letter R on the shoulder-straps below the badge of rank. The letter R to be in silver embroidery on garments for which gold shoulder-straps are authorized, and in gilt metal or in gold embroidery on garments for which cloth straps are authorized.

Sabretaches.—Staff Officers will wear, when mounted, Russia-leather sabretaches with three slings of staff pattern. Mounted Officers of Engineers, Infantry Regiments (not equipped with brown accourtements), Commissariat and Transport Corps, Ambulance Corps, and Militia Medical Staff wear, when on mounted duties, black leather sabretaches of similar pattern, with three slings, 3-in. wide, of patterns to match their sword-belts. Ornaments of special pattern similar in design to universal badge in gilt. Size not to exceed 3-inches wide by 3-inches high.

Majors of Garrison Artillery Batteries when dismounted on parade do not wear the sabretache.

Sashes.—Sashes are worn by General Officers round the waist, the tassels hanging from the left side. By Infantry Officers the sashes are worn diagonally over the left shoulder, under the left shoulder-strap, and over the sword-belt; the ends are crossed through a runner at the waist. Sashes will be of such length that the ends of the tassels shall just reach the bottom of the skirt of the tunic.

Shoulder-straps.—Shoulder-straps, except when otherwise provided, are worn on tunics, stable jackets, shell jackets, frock coats, patrol jackets, cloaks, and great coats. A description of the shoulder-straps is included in that of the articles on which they are worn.

Sleeves.—The sleeves of the tunic and jacket are not to be of excessive width.

Straps.—Whenever spurs are worn with trousers straps are to be worn also.

Swords.—Swords, unless otherwise described, will be made according to the following description:—

Half-basket hilt and back-piece of steel or gilt metal, black fish-skin grip, bound with silver wire when the hilt is of steel, or with gilt wire when the hilt is of gilt metal; slightly-curved blade, grooved and spear-pointed. Full size—blade 35 inches long and inch wide at the shoulder; extreme length, including the hilt, 41 inches; weight, without scabbard, 2 lbs. Second size—blade 33 inches long and an inch wide at the shoulder; extreme length, including hilt, 38½ inches; weight, without scabbard, 1lb. 12oz.

How Worn.—When dismounted, the front sling should be of such length that the point of the scabbard just rests on the ground when standing at attention; sword-knots must invariably be worn with swords. When mounted, the length of the front sling should be such that when passing the sword-arm over the bridle-hand to draw swords the hilt should come easily into the hand, i.e., about a hand's breadth below the bridle-arm elbow. The sabretache should hang so that when mounted the top edge can be just taken hold of by the fingers of the bridle-hand. Swords are never to be hooked up when mounted.

Sword-belts.—The sword-belt will be worn over the tunic, except by Staff Officers, and over frock coats and under all jackets, unless otherwise specified.

In those Corps in which the "Sam Browne" belt is not part of the regular equipment, Officers may wear it in Camps of Exercise or on active service, but all Officers of a Corps must be uniform.

- Tunics and Jackets.—All tunics and jackets will be singlebreasted, unless otherwise stated.
- Waterproof Cloak.—For Commissioned and Warrant Ranks in accordance with the patterns for mounted and dismounted services respectively, as worn in the Imperial army. Length of the cloak to vary according to height of wearer.
- Whistle for Officers of Infantry—White metal, "Metropolitan" pattern, to be attached by a crimson silk cord to the third button of jacket, and carried in the breast pocket.

#### Wearing of Uniform.—

- (a) Officers dining or attending evening parties at Government House will appear in mess dress unless otherwise ordered. Those who are not in possession of mess dress must appear in full dress:
- (b) When mess dress is directed to be worn on other occasions than at Government House, Officers not in possession of mess dress will appear in Review Order, but with undress belts.
- (c) Officers attending inspections or general parades as spectators will appear in undress uniform with swords, except Queen's Birthday parade, when they will appear in Review Order.
- (d) Officers on probation whose commissions are not confirmed are only required to provide themselves with undress uniform. They are permitted to appear in the evening, at entertainments, &c., in plain clothes, when full dress uniform is ordered to be worn.

Watch-chains.—Watch-chains and trinkets are not to be worn outside the uniform.

#### Horse Furniture.

(Except where otherwise specified.)

Saddles .- Hunting, plain stirrups and blue girths.

Wallets .- Brown leather, with brown leather covers.

Bridle and Breastplate.—Brown leather with gilt bosses, head-stall, and steel chain reins according to sealed pattern. On the bosses the universal badge. When encamped head-ropes will be carried instead of steel chain reins.

#### KHARI CLOTHING.

Jacket.—Khaki, of sealed pattern. Jacket to be perfectly plain and (except where specified) without lace, trimmings, or padding, and to have plain lining only. The collar stand up and square in front, and fastened with two hooks, and sufficiently loose to admit of three fingers being inserted between it and the wearer's neck. The skirt square in front. Seven large gilt buttons, universal pattern, in front. The sword-belt to be worn ontside in Review and Marching Orders, and to come between sixth and seventh buttons, and in Drill Order underneath the jacket. The "Sam Browne" belt will always be worn outside. A hook on the left side to support belt. Shoulder-straps of the same material as jacket, except for Infantry Militia, who will wear shoulder-straps of the distinguishing colour of the Regiment, with a small universal-pattern button on the top. Badges of rank in metal, with designation of Corps in gilt metal underneath, to be worn. Cuffs pointed. Two outside patch poekets, one on each breast, with a pleat 1½ inches wide, flap on top of pocket fastened with a small universal-pattern button.

Trousers.—Khaki, of sealed pattern. For Infantry and Victorian Rangers, scarlet welt down the side seams.

Pantaloons.—Khaki cord, of sealed pattern, without stripe or welt.

Helmets.—Khaki, with khaki puggaree according to sealed pattern.

Puggaree for Militia Infantry Regiments to have distinguishing colour of Regiment at top edge, viz.:—Blue for 1st Regiment, red for 2nd Regiment, green for 3rd Regiment. New pattern universal badge to be worn in front, just above puggaree.

Felt Hats.—Khaki felt, with three-plait grey puggaree according to sealed pattern.

The puggaree for Infantry Militia to have a gold line running through, and the hat to be looped up at the right side with gold cord and new pattern universal badge. Infantry Militia will in addition have a ribbon § inch wide of the distinguishing colour of Regiment (as described for helmets) running through the puggaree.

Boots for Mounted Duties.—Brown leather knee-boots, laced at the instep, with a small waterproof tongue underneath, spur-straps and guard to match.

White Linen Collars.—May be worn with khaki by Officers, but not more than  $\frac{1}{6}$  inch of the collar to show above the uniform. All Officers of a Corps to be uniform.

#### II.-GENERAL INSTRUCTIONS.

WARRANT OFFICERS, NON-COMMISSIONED OFFICERS, AND MEN.

Badges on Helmets and Forage Caps.—As described for Officers, but in brass. For Warrant Officers as for Officers. Volunteer Cadet Corps, special pattern.

Badges for Proficiency and Good Conduct.—Gunnery,
Musketry, and Engineering badges gained in a year's
course will be worn till the best shots, marksmen,
first-class gunners, and engineers for next year's course
are published in General or Regimental Orders. Signalling badges can be worn for a year from the date of
Order granting them. After a year holder will again
be examined, and if allowed to continue to wear the
badges the same will be notified in Orders.

Good Conduct badges will be worn by the Victorian Permanent Artillery and Permanent Section Victorian Engineers.

Lowest good-conduct badge to be ½ inch from top of Austrian knot, or 1 inch from point of sleeve on left fore-arm.

Gunnery, Musketry, Engineering, or Signalling badges to be 1 inch above point of sleeve or Austrian knot, or ½ inch above good-conduct badges on left forearm. Assistant Instructors in Signalling will wear a Signalling badge over chevrous.

In the case of a Non-commissioned Officer or Man holding two or more badges, they will be worn in the following order, commencing from the point of cuff, each 1 inch above the other :-

> Gunnery Engineering Musketry Signalling. Ambulance.

According to arm to which soldier belongs.

The following is a description of the above badges, and to whom issued:-

#### Artillery Badges.

To best first-class Gunner in each of the Horse and Field Artillery, the Vic-torian Permanent Ar-tillery, and Garrison Artillery

A badge of cross guns worked in gold, with star and crown above.

To best first-class Gunner' in each battery of Horse, Field, and Garrison Artillery, and the second best in the Victorian Permanent Artillery

A badge of cross guns worked in gold, with crown above.

First-class Gunners

A badge of cross guns worked in gold. For number allowed see Artillery pamphlet, An-nual Gunnery Course.

Best Driver of each bat-tery of Horse and Field Artillery

Cross whips in gold, with star above.

Second best Driver of) each battery of Horse and Field Artillery

Cross whips in gold.

#### Engineering Badge.

Best men of Field Com-pany Victorian Engi-neers, not exceeding-10 per cent, of strength

A badge in gilt metal of a gabion surmounted with felling axe, crossed with pick and shovel, rifle with bayonet and pontoon anchor. Scroll motto at base of badge "Pro Deo et Patria, Victoria."

#### Musketry Badges.

Best shot in the Forces Best shot in regiment

A silver medal worn on right breast. Cross rifles worked in gold, with

Best shot of a company Marksmen

star and crown above. Cross rifles worked in gold, with

Best shooting company of Militia Infantry

Cross rines worked in gold, with crown above.
Cross rifles worked in gold.
Sergeants will wear cross rifles worked in gold, with crown above, to be worn on right forearm.

#### Signalling Badges.

Certified Army Signal- Cross flags worked in gold, with S on each flag and crown above the flags.

Certified Flag Signallers Cross flags worked in gold, with S in blue on each flag.

#### Ambulance Badges.

Officers and men who have passed through an Ambulance Course and "First Aid" Instruction

Circular badge of a Geneva Cross, in red, on a white ground (Imperial pattern).

Non-commissioned Officers and men who are winners of badges in the Queen's Prize of the Victorian Rifle Association may wear them when in uniform, but not more than one badge at a time may be worn, viz., the one last issued by the V.R.A. The badge will be worn on the left arm, midway between the shoulder and elbow, and above all Military badges for efficiency.

- Badges of Rank, Appointment, and Chevrons.—Will be of gold lace or worked in gold (on a scarlet ground for blue or khaki uniforms, and on a blue ground for scarlet uniforms) for tunics and jackets (except where otherwise specified), and of worsted for great coats. For Mounted Rifles on a crimson ground similar to facings.
- Warrant Officers.—Wear a crown or star on right fore-arm, viz., Garrison, Brigade, and Regimental Sergeant-Majors, a crown; Quartermaster-Sergeants, a star.
- Non-commissioned Officers.—Wear chevrons as follows:—
  Lauce-Corporals and Bombardiers, one chevron; Corporals, two chevrons; Battery and Company Sergeant-Majors, Battery Quartermaster-Sergeants, Colour-Sergeants, and Sergeants, three chevrons; Regimental Quartermaster-Sergeants (below rank of Warraut Officer) and Drum-Majors, four chevrons.
- Badges of Appointment, Rank, &c.—The following also will be worn:—Bandmasters and Bandsmen (on established strength of Band), a lyre; Battery Sergeant-Majors, a gun and crown; Company Sergeant-Majors and Staff Sergeants, a crown; Drum-Majors and Drummers, a drum (Imperial pattern); Colour-Sergeants, crossed colours; Artillery-Sergeants, a gun; Farrier-Sergeants and Farriers, a horseshoe; Armourer-Sergeants, Armourers, and Blacksmiths, cross pincers; Collarmaker-Sergeants and Collarmakers, a "bit"; Roughrider, a spur; Trumpeters, cross trumpets; Buglers, same as Drummers in Militia Infantry; in V. Rangers and Cadet Corps, cross bugles.

Chevrons (except for Regimental Quartermaster-Sergeants and Drum-Majors) will be worn on the right upper arm, midway between the shoulder and elbow. For Regimental Quartermaster-Sergeants and Drum-Majors on the right fore-arm, above the cuff, and with point uppermost. On great coats, badges of rank and ehevrons will be worn on the right fore-arm, so that they may be seen below the cape.

Badges of appointment for Non-commissioned Officers will be worn above the chevrons; for men, Trumpeters, Buglers, &c., on the right upper arm, midway between the shoulder and elbow.

- Badges, Special.—No badges of a special character are allowed to be worn except those authorized by Regulations.
- Boots and Spurs.—For mounted branches (except Victorian Mounted Rifles), knee-boots, black leather, with crane-necked spurs, fastened with straps and buckles. When spurs are worn with trousers, wellington or elastic-side boots with plain fronts are to be worn, trousers to be strapped down. Spurs fixed in laced boots are not allowed. For dismounted branches and Victorian Mounted Rifles, strong laced-up boots, with plain fronts, same pattern as the "ammunition boot;" boots to have square toes, with broad thick soles and flat heels. On no account are light, fancy, button, or cloth-topped boots with pointed toes to be worn in uniform.
- Buttons.—Brass, universal pattern, with badge—Southern Cross and motto "Pro Deo et Patria, Victoria" for all arms except Artillery, who will wear buttons, Royal Artillery pattern, but without crown. For Warrant Officers, gilt as for Officers. For Volunteer Cadet Corps, buttons of special pattern.
- Collars.—The collars of tunics and jackets, except for khaki clothing, will be stand-up and slightly rounded in front, and height not to exceed li inches. For khaki jackets, to be square in front, and fastened with two hooks, and sufficiently loose to admit of three fingers being inserted between it and the wearer's neck.
- Depth of Skirt.—Skirts for tunics for men 5ft. 9in. high will be 9 inches. The proportionate variation for each inch of difference in height is  $\frac{1}{8}$  inch in the skirt.

Designation of Corps.—The designation of Corps will be worn in brass letters and numerals on the shoulder-straps as follows. For Warrant Officers in gilt:—

Forage Caps.—With peak, 3 inches high; without peaks, 23 inches high. For Warrant Officers, as for Officers.

Forage caps with peaks to be worn straight on the head, and without peaks to be worn with a cock to the right and about 1 inch above the right eye.

Gloves.—As specified under the headings of various Corps.

Great Coats and Capes.—For all ranks (except Officers).

According to sealed pattern as issued by Ordnance Store. Great coats and capes may be worn separately or both together, as may be ordered. When folded to show only two folds and strapped on to the braces. Top of coat to be in line with top of collar of tunic or jacket, buckles of the coat straps on top edge of great coat. Size when folded to be 16 inches by 11 inches.

Growth of Hair.—In all ranks the hair of the head should be neatly cut and kept short. Moustacles are to be worn. Beards and whiskers when worn to be of moderate length, and neatly trimmed. Those who shave must never on any account appear unshaved in uniform.

Haversacks.—According to sealed pattern as issued, and will be worn as follows:—

For all corps except Mounted Corps the haversack, when worn, is to be slung across the right shoulder. The haversack sling (both front and hind strap) will be worn under the waist-belt.

When empty, the haversack is to be neatly folded and resting on the left hip under the frog, with the top edge of the haversack touching the bottom edge of the waist-belt. When unfolded the haversack to be let down, the scabbard of the side-arm to be under the haversack; the top of the latter being I inch below top of scabbard, the front strap of haversack to cross between second and third button of the tunic or frock.

The Horse and Field Artillery and those wearing "Sam Browne" belts will wear the haversack over the left shoulder.

Helmets.—As specified under the headings of various Corps.

The helmets are not to be worn on one side, but are to be placed evenly on the head, and brought well down on the forchead, with the chin-strap or chain on the chin sufficiently short to prevent it slipping underneath.

Medals.—See General Instructions for Officers. The medal for "Long and Efficient Service" to be worn after all other medals.

Mourning.—For Warrant Officers. See General Instructions for Officers.

- Orders of Dress .- See Appendices at end of book.
- Reserve.—Warrant and Non-commissioned Officers and Men of the Reserve will wear the letter R in metal over the designation of the Corps to which they belong.
- Sashes.—Sashes are worn by Warrant Officers, Staff Sergeants, and Sergeants of Infantry, and Ambulance Corps, the sash being worn over the right shoulder crossing the tunic or jacket between the second and third buttons, and to be of such length that the tassels shall just reach the bottom of the skirt of tunic or jacket. For Sergeants, crimson worsted sashes; for Warrant Officers and Staff Sergeants, crimson silk net.
- Shoulder-straps.—To be of the same material and colour as the tunic and jacket, except for Infantry Militia, and to have the numeral or letter distinguishing Corps as already specified.
- Side-arms.—The bayonet is to hang on the left hip and not too far to the front. Side-arms are not to be worn off duty by any one under the rank of Sergeant; waistbelts to be worn by all below that rank.
- Sleaves.—See General Instructions for Officers.
- Straps.—Whenever spurs are worn with trousers, straps are to be worn also.
- Swords.—When dismounted, the front sling should be of such length that the point of the scabbard just rests on the ground when standing at attention; sword-knots must invariably be worn with swords. When mounted, the length of the front sling should be such that, when passing the sword-arm over the bridle-hand to draw swords, the hilt should come easily into the hand, i.e., about a hand's-breadth below the bridle-arm elbow. Swords are never to be hooked up when mounted.
- Tunics and Jackets.—All tunics and jackets will be single-breasted unless otherwise stated.
- Valise Equipment.—To be worn according to special instructions in General Orders and Standing Orders.
- Whistles for Infantry Sergeants.—White metal, "Metro-politan" pattern. To be attached by a crimson cord to the third button of jacket and carried in the breast pocket.
- Watch-chains.—Watch-chains and trinkets are not to be worn outside the uniform.
- Waterproof-cloak.—For Warrant Officers. See General Instructions for Officers.
- Water-bottles (Cairneross).—To be worn on the waist-belt, in the centre of the back, by all branches, except Victorian Horse Artillery, Mounted Warrant and Non-Commissioned Officers and Men, and Field Artillery, who wear it on the rolled cloak. Mounted Rifles carry water-bags on near side of saddle, neck to rear. Other patterns as may be ordered in General Orders.
- Wearing of Uniform.—Warrant Officers, Non-commissioned Officers, and Men of the Militia, Mounted Rifles, Victorian Rangers, and Cadets are never to appear in uniform for any purpose unconnected with military duties, unless permission has first been given.

#### KHAKI CLOTHING.

Jacket.—Khaki serge of sealed pattern. Jacket to be perfectly plain without any lace, trimmings, or padding (except where otherwise specified), and to have plain lining only if so desired, and to be loose fitting so that a sleeved waistcoat when required may be worn underneath. Collar stand-up and square in front, and fastened with two hooks and sufficiently loose to admit of three fingers being inserted between it and the wearer's neck. The skirt square in front. Seven large buttons, brass, universal pattern, down the front (gilt for Warrant Officers). The waist-belt to come

between the sixth and seventh buttons, and to be worn outside of jacket by all ranks. Warrant Officers and Staff Sergeants will always wear the belt outside the jacket. A hook on the left side to support belt. Shoulder-straps of the same material as jacket, except for Infantry Militia, who will wear shoulder-straps of the distinguishing colour of the Regiment, with a small universal pattern button on top. Designation of Corps in metal numerals and letters to be worn on shoulder-straps. Cuffs pointed. Two outside patch pockets, one on each breast, with a pleat and flap on top, fastened with a small universal pattern button.

Trousers.—Khaki serge of sealed pattern. See General Instructions for Officers.

Pantaloons.—(For Mounted Branches) khaki cord of sealed pattern.

Helmet.—Khaki, with khaki puggaree, according to sealed pattern as issued. Puggaree for Infantry Regiments to have distinguishing colour of Regiments at top edge, viz., blue for 1st Regiment, red for 2nd Regiment, green for 3rd Regiment.

No badge in front to be worn at present. For Warrant Officers as for Officers.

Felt Hats.—Khaki felt, with three-plait grey puggaree, according to sealed pattern as issued. The hat to be looped up at the right side with badge as at present. Infantry Regiment will, in addition, have a ribbon g of an inch wide of the distinguishing colour of Regiment running through the puggaree, the cord looping up the hat to be of the same colour as the hat. For Warrant Officers as for Officers.

White Linen Collars.—For Warrant Officers. See General Instructions for Officers.

#### III.—HEAD-QUARTERS STAFF.

Officers of the Head-Quarters Staff will wear the uniform, &c., of their respective ranks as laid down in the Dress Regulations for the Imperial Army.

See General Instructions.

#### · KHAKI CLOTHING.

Jacket.—Special pattern with yoke and pleated back. Shoulder-straps of the same material. On the collar in front a scarlet tab, 1½ inches long from point of collar, coming to a point 2½ inches from point of collar, edged at the ends with gold tracing braid, with a small eye at the point and a double row of braid close together down the centre. Cuffs pointed. Patch pockets as described in General Instructions for Officers.

Trousers .- Khaki, without stripe.

Pantaloons.—Khaki cord, without stripe.

Boots and Spurs.—Brown russet or Russia leather jack boots, with brass jack spurs.

Sword-belt.-" Sam Browne" pattern, brown leather.

Helmet.—Khaki, with khaki puggaree as worn in India, and with spike and gilt chin-chain. In camp, a button and brown leather chin-strap will be worn.

Gloves.—When mounted, brown leather gauntlets. When dismounted, brown dogskin or buckskin.

#### Horse Furniture.

As for Staff, Imperial Army, except on the gilt bosses, the universal badge; and for wallets, brown leather covers in lieu of bearskin.

#### IV.—PERMANENT STAFF.

Officers, Warrant Officers, and Non-commissioned Officers of the Permanent Staff attached to Corps will wear the uniform of such Corps, with the following exceptions:—

Forage Caps.—Company Sergeant-Majors attached to Infantry Regiments are permitted to wear the blue forage cap with drooping peak as for Officers, with universal badge in front and numeral of Regiment below it. Battery Sergeant-Majors of Artillery may wear same pattern cap as for Officers, but without the figured scroll of gold tracing lace on the crown—gold purl button only.

Gloves.—Brown leather, except for Artillery and Engineers, who wear buff leather in full dress.

#### V.—GARRISON SERGEANT-MAJOR.

#### FULL DRESS.

Tunic.—Scarlet cloth; same pattern as for Infantry Officers, but trimmed as follows:—On the top of collar ½-in. flat gold lace; on the bottom gold tracing lace ½ inch wide; around the cuff ½-in. flat gold lace, with ½-in. gold tracing lace outside, forming a crow's foot at point of cuff; the shoulder-straps edged with tracing lace with V.R. seroll puttern worked in in gold wire.

Trousers.—Blue cloth, with a scarlet welt \( \frac{1}{4} \) inch wide down each side seam.

Helmet, White, with gilt claw on top, and gilt spike, gilt chain, and universal badge.

Sword and Scabbard.-As for Infantry Officers.

Sword-knot. - Buff leather, with gold acorn.

Sword-belt.—White patent leather, 1½ inches wide, with slings an inch wide, side flap, gilt universal clasp with badge.

Sash .- Crimson silk net.

Haversack.-White canvas, as issued by Ordnance Store.

Leggings .- Brown canvas, as issued by Ordnance Store.

Gloves .- Buff leather.

Boots.-Half-wellingtons or ankle boots.

Great Coat and Cape.—As issued by Ordnance Store.

#### Undress.

Jacket.—Khaki; pattern as described in General Instructions, with seven buttons in front. Shoulder-straps to have V.R. worked in gold, scroll pattern.

Trousers .- Khaki, without welt.

Helmet.—Khaki; as described in General Instructions, with universal badge in front above puggaree.

Sword-belt.—Brown leather, of same pattern as described for full dress.

Sword-knot.-Brown leather, with acorn.

Forage Cap.—Blue cloth, straight up 3 inches high, with black patent leather drooping peak ornamented with \frac{1}{2}-in. full gold embroidery. Band of gold lace 1\frac{3}{4} inches wide round cap and universal badge in front, and gold purl button on crown.

Field Service Cap.—Blue cloth folding cap, 4½ inches high, with scarlet cloth top and blue cloth side flaps 3½ inches deep, to turn down when required. Gold French braid welts on cap and flaps, and at front and back seams. Universal badge on left side.

Boots .- Laced.

#### VI.-MILITARY STAFF CLERKS.

Jacket.—Khaki; pattern as described in General Instructions. Shoulder-straps to have V.R. worked in gold, scroll pattern.

Trousers .- Khaki, without welt.

Helmet, White, with gilt mountings, chain, and spike. Universal badge in front.

Sword-belt.—Brown leather, as described for Garrison Sergeant-Major.

Forage Cap, Sash, Gloves, Sword, Leggings, and Great Coat, as for Permanent Staff of Infantry.

#### VII.—ARTILLERY.

#### STAFF OFFICERS.

Officers on the Staff of the Artillery.—Uniform, dress and undress, and horse furniture, in every respect as for Officers holding similar appointments on the General Staff of the Imperial Army, except that the tunic and jacket are blue with searlet cloth collar and cuffs, the mess waistcoat is searlet, the sword-knot, cloak, and cape of regimental pattern, the shoulder-straps, the lace on the tunic, and that of the dress trousers, the forage cap, and the belts, and the scarlet stripes of the undress pantaloons and trousers are of Artillery pattern and width. The full dress Royal Artillery pouchbelt and pouch will be worn in both dress and undress uniform. The peak to forage cap will be the same as that for the General Staff, both as regards shape and embroidery. The sabretache for mounted duties will be that described for Staff Officers, but with slings of Artillery pattern.

Colonels on the Staff of the Artillery and Colonel Commanding Artillery.—In full dress wear regimental uniform with cocked hat and plume; when mounted in Review Order, gold-laced pantaloons and steel spurs. In undress, as detailed above for Staff of the Royal Artillery. In mess dress, regimental uniform. Horse furniture as prescribed for Colonels on the Staff. The regimental sword and scabbard are worn in all orders of dress.

#### VICTORIAN HORSE ARTILLERY.

#### OFFICERS.

#### FULL DRESS.

Jacket.—Blue cloth, edged all round with gold cord forming a figure 8 at the bottom of each back seam. Scarlet cloth collar, square in front, but slightly rounded at the corners; hook and eye at the bottom, black silk tab. The collar edged all round with gold cord; laced as described below, according to rank; and with a grenade embroidered in frosted silver 28 inches long at each end. On each side in frent, loops of gold cord, 18 inches apart from centre to centre, fastening with ball buttons, and a crow's foot at the top of the loops. Gold cord along the back seams, forming a crow's foot at the top of each seam, and an Austrian knot at each side of the waist. Shoulder-straps of plaited gold wire cord, lined with blue. A small button of regimental pattern at the top. Badges of rank embroidered in silver.

with blue. A small outton of regimental pattern at the top. Badges of rank embroidered in silver. Field Officers have  $\frac{6}{8}$ -in, lace all round the collar, within the cord; and a chevron of  $1\frac{1}{2}$ -in, lace on each cuff, with figured braiding above and below the lace, extending to 11 inches from the bottom of the cuff.

Captains and Lieutenants have lace round the top only of the collar; and an Austrian knot of gold cord on each sleeve, 7 inches deep, traced round with gold braid 8 inches deep and figured, for Captains; 73 inches deep and plain, for Lieutenants.

Lace.—Gold, of regimental pattern.

Buttons.—Gilt, burnished, with a gun, ball pattern.

Trousers, &c .- Blue cloth, with 12-in. lace down the side seams; wellington boots, and brass spurs.

Pantaloons and Spurs for Mounted Duties .- Blue cloth, with scarlet stripes 13 inches wide down side seams; knee-boots and steel spurs as described at page 2, except that there is a V cut at the top in front of the knee-boots.

Helmet, White .- Scaled pattern, with grenade on a scarlet edging of cloth in front over puggaree; puggaree folded as in Indian Army. Gilt mountings, with chain and ball, the chain booking inside helmet. Size of grenade, 21 inches.

Gloves .- White leather.

Sword .- Half-basket steel hilt, with two fluted bars on the outside; black fish-skin grip, bound with silver wire; slightly curved blade  $35\frac{1}{2}$  inches long, and  $1\frac{1}{4}$  inches wide, grooved and spear-pointed.

Scabbard.—Steel, with a large shoe at the bottom and a

trumpet-shaped mouth.

Sword-knot. - Gold cord, with a gold acorn.

Sword-belt.—Gold lace, an inch wide, lined with blue morocco leather, sword slings of the same width without swivels, and tache-slings 2 inch wide; gilt S hook fastening, with "Victoria" on the hook, and two oval gilt plates bearing the Royal Crest.

Sabretache.—Blue morocco leather, faced with blue cloth; 11-in. lace round the face, 1 inch from the edge. An embroidered device within the lace of the Royal Arms above and a gun below, with an oak and laurel wreath, and "Victoria" above the gun, and "Pro Deo et Patria" below it.

Pouch.-Blue morocco leather collapsing pouch with two pockets; the leaf 5g inches long and 2g inches deep, covered with blue cloth, and edged with 4-in. lace. An embroidered device within the lace similar to that on the sabretache.

Pouch-belt.-Gold lace, 2 inches wide, lined with blue morocco leather; gilt ornamented buckle and slide, and a grenade encircled with a wreath, at the end.

#### Undress.

- \* Patrol Jacket .- Blue cloth, rounded in front, and edged with inch black mohair braid all round and up the openings at the sides; five loops of flat plait on each side in front, fastening with netted olivets, and with crow's feet and olivets at the ends. Stand and fall collar. The sleeves ornamented with flat plait, forming crow's feet, 6 inches from the bottom of the cuffs. Double flat plait on each back seam, with crow's foot at top and bottom, and two eyes at equal distances. Pockets edged with flat plait, forming a crow's foot at each end and an eye top and bottom in the centre. Shoulder-straps, of the same material as the garment, edged with ½-in. black mohair braid, except at the base; black netted button at the top. Badges of rank in gilt metal.
- \* Trousers. Blue cloth, with scarlet stripes, 13 inches wide, down the side seams; wellington boots and steel spurs.

Pantaloons, &c., for Mounted Duties .- As for full dress.

Forage Cap.-Blue cloth, with band of 15-in. gold lace, gold button and braided figure, of special pattern, on the crown. The cap to be  $2\frac{6}{5}$  inches high, with gilt grenade in front. Size of grenade,  $1\frac{1}{4}$  inch.

Field Service Cap.—Blue cloth folding cap, 4½ inches high, with blue side flaps 4 inches deep, to turn down when required. Gold French braid welts on cap and flaps, and at front and back seams. A grenade embroidered in gold in front.

Stable or Mess Jacket .- Blue cloth, with scarlet collar (square in front with top corners slightly rounded, two hooks and eyes, black silk tab) and pointed scarlet cuffs, laced all round, including top of collar, with \(\frac{3}{4}\) in. gold lace, regimental pattern, forming a bull's eye at

the bottom of each back seam; small gold tracing on collar seam; hooks and eyes down the front, a row of small gilt studs on the left side, scarlet lining. Shoulder straps with badges of rank as for tunic.

Field Officers have a flat chevron of inch lace,

Field Officers have a flat chevron of inch lace, extending to 6 inches from the bottom of the cuff, with braided eyes above and below the lace, the bottom of the braiding to reach just over the top of the scarlet cuff

Captains have on each sleeve an Austrian knot of  $\frac{1}{4}$ -in. gold Russia braid, traced with  $\frac{1}{8}$ -in. braid. A further tracing of eyes above and below the knot. The Austrian knot extends to  $7\frac{1}{2}$  inches from the bottom of the sleeve; the figured braiding to 8 inches.

Lieutenants.—As for Captains, but without the

tracing of eyes.

A silver embroidered grenade to be worn on the collar, as laid down for the dress jacket, but only

13 inches long.

Mess Waistcoat.—Scarlet cloth with collar, ½-in. gold lace, regimental pattern, all round—including collar—row of gold Russia braid to form eyes, down the front, inside the lace, with figures according to pattern. Pockets edged with gold Russia tracing braid forming a crow's foot and eye at each end, and crow's feet in centre. To fasten with hooks and eyes, small gilt studs up front.

Gloves .- Brown dogskin, with plain backs.

Sword-belt.—Black patent leather, 1 inch wide, with mountings similar to those of the dress belt.

Sword-knot.—Brown leather, with acorn.

Sabretache.—Black patent leather, with Royal coat-ofarms and Victorian motto in gilt metal.

Binocular Case.—Black patent leather, to hold a binocular field-glass, R.A. pattern. A gun in gilt metal on the flap.

Pouch-belt and other Articles .- As in full dress.

Cloak and Cape.—Blue cloth, with sleeves of the pattern described at page 4,\* lined with scarlet rattinet, plain cloth collar. Shoulder-straps of the same material as the garment, a small gilt button at the top. Badges of rank in gold.

#### KHAKI CLOTHING.

Jacket.—Khaki serge, same pattern as described at page 10, with gold grenades on each end of collar and V.H.A. in metal on shoulder-straps under badges of rank.

Pantaloons.—Khaki cord, without stripe.

Boots and Spurs.—For mounted duties, black as described for full dress.

Sword-belt.—Webb, with brown leather slings and carriages.

#### REGIMENTAL STAFF OFFICERS.

The same uniform as for the other Officers of their respective rank.

#### NON-COMMISSIONED OFFICERS AND MEN.

#### FULL DRESS.

Jacket.—Blue tartan, edged all round with yellow worsted cord forming a figure 8 at the bottom of each back scam. Scarlet cloth collar, square in front, but slightly rounded at the corners; hook and eye at the bottom, and black leather tab. The collar edged all round with yellow worsted cord, and a small brass grenade at each end. On each side in front of jacket loops of yellow worsted cord, 1§ inches apart from centre to centre, fastening with brass ball buttons and a crow's foot at the top of the loops. Yellow worsted cord along the back seams, forming a crow's foot at the top of each seam, and an Austrian knot at each side of waist. Shoulder-straps of yellow worsted cord. A small button of regimental pattern at the top. An Austrian knot of yellow worsted cord on each sleeve. Chevrons of rank to be worn.

Buttons.-Brass, ball pattern, with a gun.

Trousers.—Blue tartan, with scarlet stripes 13 inches wide down side seams. Wellington boots and steel spurs. Straps to be worn.

Pantaloons and Spurs, when mounted.—Blue tartan, with scarlet stripes 13/4 inches wide down side seams. Kneeboots with a V cut at the top in front. Steel spurs fastened with strap and buckle.

Helmet, White.—Sealed pattern, with grenade on a scarlet edging of cloth, ball mountings and brass chain, the chain hooking inside the helmet. Size of grenade, 2½ inches.

Haversack.—White canvas, as issued by Ordnance Store. Great Coat and Cape.—As issued by Ordnance Store. Gloves.—Buff leather, for all ranks.

#### Undress.

Jachet.—Khaki serge, as described in General Instructions. Buttons as for full dress. Designation of Corps in brass on shoulder-straps.

Pantaloons.-Khaki cord, without stripe.

Boots and Spurs.—For mounted duties as described for full dress.

Sword-belt for Foot Parade.—Webb, with brown leather slings and carriages.

Forage Caps.—For Warrant Officers as for Officers. For Staff Sergeants and Sergeants, blue cloth with band of 1-in. gold lace and small gold purl button on top. Grenade in front, size 1½ inch. For rank and file as above, but with band of yellow worsted lace and small yellow worsted button.

Field Service Cap.—Blue cloth, R.A. pattern. For Warrant Officers as for Officers.

Gloves.—For Warrant Officers and Battery Sergeant-Majors, brown dogskin, with plain backs. For other ranks, white gloves.

#### VII.—FIELD ARTILLERY.

#### OFFICERS.

#### FULL DRESS.

Tunic.—Blue cloth, with scarlet cloth collar, square in front, but slightly rounded at the corners; hook and eye at the bottom, black silk tab. The collar and sleeves laced and braided according to rank, with a grenade at each end of the collar, as detailed for Horse Artillery. The skirt square in front, open behind, with a blue cloth flap on back of each skirt. Flaps edged with round gold cord, traced inside with gold Russia braid. Skirt lined with black. Scarlet cloth edging down the front and at the opening behind, nine buttons down the front, three buttons on each flap behind, and two at the waist behind. Shoulder-straps with badges of rank as laid down for Horse Artillery.

Buttons .- Gilt, with gun.

Helmet, White .- As described for Horse Artillery.

Sword-belt.—Gold lace, 1½ inches wide, lined with blue morocco leather, and with mountings as for Horse Artillery. Sword slings and tache slings as for V.H.A. fastened to a flat steel bar covered with blue morocco leather, and attached to the inside of the belt by four flat steel hooks.

Sabretache, Knee-boots, Spurs, Pantaloons, Pouch, Pouchbelt, Trousers, Sword, Scabbard, Sword-knot, and Gloves.—As described for Horse Artillery.

#### MESS DRESS.

Stable or Mess Jacket.—As described for stable jacket, Victorian Horse Artillery.

Mess Waistcont.—Scarlet cloth, edged all round, including collar, with ½-in. gold lace, regimental pattern; pockets edged with gold Russia tracing braid, forming a crow's foot and eye at each end, with crows' feet in centre—to fasten with hooks and eyes, small gilt studs up front.

Trousers.—As described for full dress, Victorian Horse Artillery.

#### Undress.

Sword-belt.—White patent leather,  $1\frac{7}{10}$  inches wide, with sword slings, gilt, universal clasp, and badge "Southern Cross."

Sword-knot.-Brown leather, with acorn.

Pouch-belt .- White patent leather, 2 inches wide.

Patrol Jacket, Trousers, Pantaloons, Forage Cap, Field Service Cap, Jacket, Sabretache, Binocular Case, Gloves, Cloak and Cape.—As described for Horso Artillery.

Serge Patrol Jacket.—(For summer wear.) Blue serge; welted seams, stand-up collar square in front fastened with hook and eye, a grenade 2½ inches long in gold embroidery at each end. Shoulder-straps of the same material as jacket fastened at the top with a small black netted button half-an-inch in diameter. Badges of rank embroidered in gold. Five gilt ball buttons down the front, a slit on each side of jacket. Sleeves ornamented with flat plait forming a crow's foot 6 inches from bottom of cuff. Two outside breast-pockets and watch-pocket inside breast. White linen collar to be worn.

#### REGIMENTAL STAFF OFFICERS.

The same uniform as the other officers of their respective rank, but the Officer Commanding and Adjutant, Horse and Field Artillery, are permitted to wear khaki uniform in undress, with brown knee-boots and "Sam Browne" belts.

# WARRANT OFFICERS, NON-COMMISSIONED OFFICERS, AND MEN.

#### FULL DRESS.

Tunic.—Blue cloth, edged down the front with scarlet cloth. Collar, scarlet cloth, rounded at the corners, edged all round with yellow worsted Royal cord, with brass grenade at each end, hook and eye at the bottom, black leather tab. Fastened with nine large buttons of regimental pattern. Shoulder-straps of the same material as the tunic, with small buttons of regimental pattern at the top, and designation of corps. Austrian knots on sleeves, the cord finishing at the back seam. Skirts square in front, and divided back skirt, edged with scarlet cloth, with a flap on the back of each skirt edged with scarlet cloth, and three buttons on each flap. Two buttons at the waist behind, and a hook on the left side of waist to support the waist-belt. Staff-Sergeants' and Sergeants' tunic to have gold cord round collar and on Austrian knot on sleeves. Warrant Officers' tunic in addition to have tracing lace inside of gold cord round collar and sleeves, and the flap on the back of each skirt edged with gold cord. Shoulder-straps edged with tracing lace.

Buttons .- Brass, with gun.

Trousers.—Blue tartan, with scarlet stripes  $1\frac{1}{4}$  inches wide down side seams. Warrant Officers' trousers of cloth.

Pantaloons and Spurs when mounted.—As described for Horse Artillery.

Helmet, White.—As described for Horse Artillery. For Warrant Officers as for Officers.

Haversack .- White canvas, as issued by Ordnance Store.

Great Coat and Cape.—According to sealed pattern issued by Ordnance Store.

Gloves .- White.

Leggings .- For Rank and File, black leather.

#### UNDRESS UNIFORM.

Jacket.—For Warrant Officers and Battery Sergeaut-Majors, blue cloth, rounded in front, and edged with 1-in. black mohair braid all round, side pockets and cuffs of sleeves also edged. Hooks and eyes in front. Shoulder-straps of the same material as the garment edged with ½-in. black mohair braid except at the bottom, black netted button on top. One-in. black mohair braid down back seams from shoulders to bottom of jacket. Warrant Officers will, in addition to above, have black tracing lace round the mohair braid.

For Staff Sergeants, Sergeants, and Rank and File, blue tartan jacket, with scarlet collar slightly rounded at the corners. Skirt rounded in front and scarlet edging down the front and all round and on the cuff which is pointed. Five large buttons in front. Shoulderstraps of the same material as garment, with scarlet edging and small button on top and designation of corps.

Trousers .- As for full dress.

Forage Cap .- As described for Horse Artillery.

Field Service Cap.—As described for Horse Artillery.

Gloves.—For Warrant Officers and Battery Sergeant-Majors, brown dogskin, with plain backs. For other ranks, white cotton.

N.B.—The Brigade Sergeant-Major, Horse and Field Artillery, is permitted to wear khaki uniform in undress, and "Sam Browne" sword-belt and brown knee-boots.

#### VICTORIAN PERMANENT ARTILLERY.

#### OFFICERS.

#### FULL DRESS.

Tunic and Buttons .- As described for Field Artillery.

Helmet, White.—As described for Horse Artillery. In "Drill Order" a white button and brown leather chinstrap in lieu of mountings.

Sword-belt .-- As described for Field Artillery.

(Sabretache, Knee-boots, Spurs and Pantaloons for Field Officer only), Pouch, Pouch-belt, Trousers, Sword, Scabbard, Sword-knot, and Gloves.—As described for Horse Artillery.

#### MESS DRESS.

Mess Jacket, Mess Waistcoat, and Trousers.—As described for Field Artillery.

#### Undress.

Sword-belt, Binocular Case and Belt.—As described for Field Artillery, except belts of buff leather.

Stable Jacket, Patrol Jacket, Trousers (Pantaloons and Sabretacke for Field Officers only), Forage Cap. Field Service Cap, Gloves, Cloak and Cape.—As described for Horse Artillery.

Sword-hnot.—Buff leather,  $\frac{1}{3}$  inch wide, with runner and gold acorn.

Serge Patrol Jacket .- As described for Field Artillery.

N.B.—White patent leather sword-belts and pouch-belts in possession may continue to be worn until they require to be replaced.

Sword-belt.—Brown leather, "Sam Browne" pattern.

Sword-knot .- Brown leather, with acorn.

#### FULL DRESS.

Tunic, Buttons, Trousers, Haversack, Great Coat and Cape.—As described for Field Artillery.

Helmet.—As described for Officers, V.P.A., except that helmet mountings and grenade for rank and file are in brass. For Warrant Officers as for Officers.

Gloves.—Buff leather, for all ranks

Boots.—Laced up, "ammunition" pattern. For Warrant Officers, half-wellingtons, with straps.

#### Hyppess

Jacket.—Khaki drill, same pattern as described in General Instructions, except only five buttons, ball pattern, down the front. V.P.A. in metal letters on shoulder-straps as for tunic. Staff Sergeants are permitted to wear a blue serge jacket of the above pattern, to be provided at their own expense out of the compensation allowed for tunic, and Warrant Officers a blue cloth patrol jacket, as described for Warrant Officers, Field Artillery.

Trousers.-Khaki drill, without stripe.

Forage Cap.—As described for Horse Artillery.

#### ARMOURER-SERGEANTS, BLACKSMITH-SERGEANT, AND ASSISTANTS.

#### PARADE DRESS.

Jacket.—Dark-blue serge, double-breasted, with four large buttons (artillery pattern) on each side, and two small buttons at side of cuff on each sleeve, two side-pockets with flaps, and a pocket on left breast.

Waistcoat.—Dark-blue serge, slightly open at the top, and with seven small brass buttons (artillery pattern).

Trousers .- Dark-blue serge, plain.

Cap.—Dark-blue cloth cap with soft crown and drooping peak of patent leather, black leather strap fastened at each side of cap with small brass button. Band of gold lace 13 inches wide round cap. Brass grenade in front, over peak. Assistants do not wear gold-lace band around cap.

Distinctive Badge.—For Sergeants, a gold crossed hammer and pincers above chevrons on right upper arm. For Assistants, a gold crossed hammer and pincers, without chevrons, on right upper arm.

N.B.—White linen shirts, turned-down collars, black silk bow tie to be worn with above dress.

#### WORKING DRESS.

Jumper.—White canvas.

Trousers .- White canvas.

#### COXSWAIN AND ENGINEER OF LAUNCH.

Same dress as described for Armourer-Sergeants, but without distinctive badge.

#### DECK-HANDS AND FIREMAN.

Same dress as worn by A.B.'s, Victorian Navy.

#### GARRISON ARTILLERY.

#### OFFICERS.

#### FULL DRESS.

Tunic, Buttons, and Sword-belt.—As described for Field Artillery.

Helmet (Sabretache, Knee-boots, Spurs, and Pantaloons for Field Officers only), Pouch, Pouch-belt, Trousers, Sword, Scabbard, Sword-knot, and Gloves.—As described for Field Artillery.

#### MESS DRESS.

Mess Jacket, Mess Waistcoat, and Trousers.—As described for Field Artillery.

#### Undress.

Sword-belt, Sword-knot, Binocular Case and Belt.—As described for Field Artillery.

Patrol Jacket, Trousers (Pantaloons and Sabretache for Field Officers only), Forage Cap, Field Service Cap, Gloves, Cloak and Cape.—As described for Horse Artillery.

#### REGIMENTAL STAFF OFFICERS.

The same uniform as for other Officers of their respective ranks.

#### KHARI CLOTHING.

Jacket.—Khaki; same pattern as described for V.H.A.
Badges of rank with designation of Branch on shoulderstraps.

Trousers.-Khaki, without stripe.

# WARRANT OFFICERS, NON-COMMISSIONED OFFICERS, AND MEN.

#### FULL DRESS.

Tunic.—For Warrant Officers, and Battery Sergeant-Majors, Permanent Staff, as described for Field Artillery.

Jacket.—For Militia Sergeants and Rank and File, as described for undress jacket, Field Artillery, except seven large buttons down the front. Numeral of Battery and designation on shoulder-straps.

Boots.—As described in General Instructions.

Buttons, Trousers, Helmet, Haversack, Gloves, Great Coat and Cape.—As described for Field Artillery.

#### UNDRESS.

Jacket.—For Warrant Officers and Battery Sergeant-Majors, Permanent Staff, as described for Field Artillery. For Militia Sergeants and Rank and File, as described for full dress.

Trousers .- As described for full dress.

Gloves.—As described for Field Artillery.

Forage Cap.—As described for Horse Artillery.

#### KHAKI CLOTHING.

Jacket.—Khaki serge, same pattern as described in General Instructions. Numeral of Battery and designation on shoulder-straps.

Trousers.-Khaki serge, without stripe.

Armourer-Sergeants V.G.A.—Same dress as V.P.A.

#### VIII.—ENGINEERS.

#### PERMANENT SECTION.

#### OFFICERS.

Tunic.—Scarlet cloth, with collar and cuffs of Garter blue velvet. The collar edged all round with round-back gold cord; \(\frac{3}{4}\)-in. lace all round within the cord for Field Officers, round the top only for Captains and Lieutenants; at each end a grenade embroidered in silver. The cuffs pointed and ornamented as described below, according to rank. Nine buttons in front and two at the waist behind. The skirt rounded off in front, closed behind, with a plait at each side, and lined with white. The front, skirt, and plaits edged with Garter blue velvet. Shoulder-knots of treble twisted round-back gold cord, lined with scarlet. A small button of universal pattern at the top. Badges of rank in silver.

versal pattern at the top. Badges of rank in silver.
Field Officers have 1½-in. lace round the top of the cuff, and figured ½-in Russia braiding above and below the lace, extending to 11 inches from the bottom of the cuff.

Captains have an Austrian knot of round-back gold cord on each sleeve, traced all round with braided eyes, the braid extending to 8 inches from the bottom of the cuff

Lieutenants have a similar knot, but without the figured braiding.

Lace.—Of R.E. pattern. Buttons of universal pattern.

Dress Trousers.—Blue cloth, with 13-in. lace down the side seams; wellington boots.

Helmet, White.—As described for Victorian Horse Artillery.

Sword.—As described at page 8, with hilt of gilt metal, pierced and engraved according to special pattern.

Scabbard.—For Field Officers, brass; other Officers, steel.

Sword-knot.—Gold cord, with gold acorn, for full dress, brown leather, with acorn, for undress.

Sword-belt.—Russia leather, 1½ inches wide; with removable flap. Removable slings an inch wide, the front sling lined with Russia leather; and a double swivel on the eye of dee of front sling for hooking up sword; running carriage for back sling; two stripes of gold embroidery on belt and slings. Round billets for sword slings, and flat billets for sabretache slings. Three dees on inside of belt, with Russia leather protecting flap, to attach sabretache slings. Square gilt wire buckles for sword and sabretache slings. Gilt burnished plate, with device in silver.

Belts of plain bridle leather, with the mountings described above; may be worn on active service.

Shoulder-belt.—Russia leather, 2 inches wide, with three stripes of gold embroidery, the centre one wavy, the other straight; gilt engraved buckle, tip, and slide.

Binocular Case.—Black patent leather, to hold a binocular field-glass; solid leather flap, with gilt universal badge.

Patrol Jacket.—As described at page 6, with the following exceptions:—

Stand-up collar and cuffs of blue velvet. Five loops of flat plait on each side in front, with crows' feet at the ends, and three rows of olivets, pockets edged with flat plaits, forming an eye at each end. Crow's foot on each sleeve (instead of the Austrian knot), 6½ inches deep from the bottom of the cuff. Shoulder-straps with badges of rank as for frock.

Undress Trousers, &c.—Blue cloth, with scarlet stripes 2 inches wide down the side seams.

Forage Cap.—Blue cloth, straight up, 3 inches high, with band of 1\frac{3}{4}-in. gold lace and small gilt grenade, size 1\frac{1}{4} inch. Black patent leather drooping peak and chinstraps. The peak ornamented with \frac{1}{2}-in. full gold

embroidery. A gold netted button on the crown. Field Officers will have a gold French braid welt round the crown; Officers under the rank of Field Officer, a blue cloth welt.

Field Service Cap, or when officers are actually employed in boat work, or when proceeding on duty direct to or from boats.—Blue cloth folding cap 5 inches high, with blue cloth side flaps 4 inches deep to turn down when required. Gold French braid welts on cap and flaps, and at front and back seams. Gilt grenade on the left side.

Mess Jacket .- Scarlet cloth, with Garter blue velvet collar and cuffs. Gold Russia braid, & inch wide, all round the jacket and along the bottom of the collar, with small eyes at the ends of the collar and bottom of the front, and a crow's foot at the centre of collar seam and of waist. At each end of the collar, a grenade embroidered in gold. Hooks and eyes and gilt studs down Pointed cuffs, 5 inches deep, edged-for the front. Field Officers, with 1-in. lace, traced above with -in. Russia braid, forming a crow's foot at the top; for Captains, with & in. Russia braid, forming a crow's foot at the top, a row of small eyes above and below the braid, terminating in plain braid round the crow's foot; for Lieutenants, with plain 1/8-in. Russia braid, forming a crow's foot at the top, scarlet silk sorge lining. Shoulder-knots with badges of rank as for tunic.

...Mess Waistcoat.—Scarlet cloth, with hooks and eyes and gilt studs down the front, and edging of gold braid all round and on collar seams. Open at neck, top of opening to be 4 inches from band of linen collar. Pockets edged with gold braid forming crows' feet at ends and centre.

Great Coat and Cape.—Blue cloth, of the pattern described at page 3, lined with scarlet shalloon. Shoulder-straps of the same material as the garment; a small button of universal pattern at the top. Badges of rank in gold.

#### WORKING DRESS.

For Officers when actually employed on Submarine mining or Field duties.

Pea Jacket .- R.E. pattern, with universal buttons.

Jacket.—Plain blue serge, of special quality, short, with standing collar, five small buttons (universal pattern), shoulder-straps and badges of rank, and two patch pockets on breasts, two flat pockets in skirt.

Cap .- As for active service.

Trousers.—Blue serge, of quality as for jacket, with red stripe 2 inches wide down the side seams. Two cross pockets.

Coat, Waterproof.—Naval pattern, without badges of rank, cashmere, best quality.

Boots, Knee. - Canada pattern.

Tunic.—Scarlet tartan cloth, with collar and cuffs of darkblue velvet or plush. Collars square in front but
slightly rounded at the corners, hook and eye at the
bottom, black leather tab. The collar edged all round
with yellow worsted cord. An Austrian knot of yellow
worsted cord on each sleeve. Skirt square in front.
Dark-blue edging down the front and round tunic.
Nine large buttons in front, two at the waist behind.
Shoulder-straps of yellow worsted cord, with a small
universal button at the top. Badges of rank or
chovrons to be worn.

For Warrant Officers, Staff Sergeants, and Sergeants, gold cord on collar and sleeve. Warrant Officers' tunies to be of cloth, and to have gold tracing lace inside the cord.

Buttons .- Brass, universal pattern.

Trousers.—Blue tartan, with scarlet stripes 13 inches wide down each side seam. Warrant Officers' trousers to be of cloth.

Helmet, White.—As described for Officers, but with brass mountings and brass grenade. For Warrant Officers as for Officers.

Haversack .- White; as issued by Ordnance Store.

# OFFICERS.

Tunic.—Scarlet cloth, with dark-blue cloth collar and cuffs. The collar ornamented with §-in. lace along the top, and gold Russia braid at the bottom; the cuffs pointed, with ½-in. lace round the top, and a tracing in gold Russia braid ¼ inch above and below the lace, the lower braid having a crow's foot and eye, and the upper an Austrian knot at the top. Eight buttons in front and two at the waist behind. The skirt closed behind, with a plait at each side, and lined with white. The front, collar, and skirt-plaits edged with white cloth ¼ inch wide, a hook and eye inside the bottom of the collar. Shoulder straps of twisted round gold cord, universal pattern, lined with scarlet. A small button of universal pattern at the top. Badges of rank in silver. Field Officers have a row of braided eyes below the

Field Officers have a row of braided eyes below the lace on the collar; two bars of lace along the top of the cuff, showing  $\frac{1}{4}$  inch of the facings between the bars; and the braiding on the sleeve is in the form of eyes, above and below the lace for Colonels and Lieutenant-Colonels, and above the lace only for Majors. The lace on the sleeve extends to 8 inches and the Austrian knot to 10 inches from the bottom of the cuff.

Captains have no braided eyes on the collar. The lace and braiding on the sleeves are the same as those of Field Officers, except that the tracing is plain, without eyes.

Licutenants have one bar of lace only on the cuff, the lace extending to  $7\frac{1}{2}$  inches and the Austrian knot to  $9\frac{1}{2}$  inches from the bottom of the cuff. In other particulars the lace and braiding are the same as those of Captains:

Facings .- Blue cloth.

Lace for Tunics.—Gold, § inch wide, rose pattern, as for Imperial Regiments.

Lace for Full Dress Trousers and Sword-belt.—Gold lace as for Imperial Infantry.

Buttons.—Gilt, of universal pattern.

Trousers.—Blue cloth, with gold lace  $1\frac{1}{8}$  inch wide, and with  $\frac{1}{8}$ -in. crimson silk stripe in the centre, down the side seams.

Spurs.—For Field Officers, brass; for Adjutants, steel.

Helmet.—Cork, covered with blue cloth in four seams, two on each side; peaks, front and back, stiffened and covered with cloth without a seam; the front peak bound with gilt metal \(\frac{3}{16}\) inch wide, the back peak with patent leather \(\frac{1}{2}\) inch wide. Above the peaks and going round the helmet a cloth band \(\frac{2}{2}\) inch wide, and stitched top and bottom. Back peak to centre of crown 10\(\frac{1}{2}\) inches; front peak to centre of crown 10\(\frac{1}{2}\) inches; side to centre of crown 8 inches. Gilt curbchain chin-strap, the links \(\frac{2}{2}\) inch wide and the strap lined with black velvet. Gilt rose fastenings at the sides; gilt convex bar \(\frac{1}{4}\) inch wide down the centre of the back and to the bottom of the back peak. The bar is in one piece, and is fastened to the helmet by means of two studs and a flattened prolongation of the bar under the back peak. At the top of the helmet, a gilt spike mounted on a cross-piece base.

The cross-piece base is of gilt metal, there is a rose on the top into which the spike is screwed, and a smaller rose on each of the four terminations of the base; a gilt hook at the back of the base, to which the chin-strap is attached when not required to be worn under the chin. The width of the base from the point of the front termination to the point of the rear termination, measured in a straight line underneath, 4% inches, that from side to side 3½ inches. The base is attached to the helmet by four screws and nuts. For ventilation, the base is perforated with four holes. A gilt collet inserted in the crown of the helmet.

A gilt badge as follows to be worn in the front of helmet:—In gilt, two wreaths of laurel on an all-round star, surmounted with a crown; within the laurel wreaths a circle with motto, "Pro Deo et Patria, Victoria," within the circle a cross, on which is the Southern Cross.

Size of badge, across  $3\frac{1}{4}$  inches; from base to top of crown  $3\frac{3}{4}$  inches.

Sword.—As described at page 8; the hilt of gilt metal with device of Royal Cypher and Crown.

Scabbard.—For Field Officers, brass; for others, steel.

Sword-knot .- Gold and crimson strap, with gold acorn.

Undress Sword-knot.—Brown leather, with acorn.

Undress Sword-belt.—White patent leather, Imperial pattern, 1½ inches wide, with slings an inch wide, flap, and gilt hook. In Regiments equipped with brown value equipment, Officers will wear brown leather sword-belt.

Waist-plate.—Round gilt clasp, universal badge on centre piece, universal ends.

Sabretache.—See page 7; but is not worn in Regiments equipped with brown leather accoutrements.

Full Dress Sword-belt to be worn at Balls, Levées, &c.—Gold lace 1½ inch wide, of the same pattern as that for the full dress trousers, lined with crimson morocco leather; slings of similar lace ¼ inch wide. Waistplate, round gilt clasp, with Southern Cross and motto, "Pro Deo et Patria, Victoria."

Sash.—Crimson silk net on ordinary occasions. At Balls, Levées, &c., gold and crimson net, 2½ inches wide, in ½-in. stripes of gold and crimson silk alternately; gold and crimson runner and tassels. The crimson ribbon sash may be worn instead of the silk net sash provided all officers of a Regiment are uniform.

Forage Cap.—Blue cloth, straight up, 3 inches high, with black patent leather drooping peak and chin strap. The peak ornamented with 1-in. full gold embroidery.

Band 12 inches wide, of black oak-leaf lace. Field Officers have a gold French braid welt instead of blue cloth round the top of the cap. Badge in front of cap, with numeral of Regiment under it.

Field Service Cap.—Blue cloth folding cap,  $4\frac{1}{2}$  inches high, with blue side flaps 4 inches deep, to turn down when required. Gold French braid welts on cap and flaps, and at front and back seams. Badge and numeral of Regiment to be worn on the left side and in the same way as on the forage cap, and to be placed  $1\frac{1}{2}$  inches from point of cap to nearest edge of numeral.

Mess Jacket.—Scarlet cloth, with collar and pointed cuffs of royal blue facings. Gold braid edging all round, including the top and bottom of the collar. A loop of gold braid at bottom of collar to fasten across the neck. A row of gilt studs and hooks and eyes down the front. Scarlet lining. Shoulder-straps with badges of rank as for tunic.

Field Officers have a row of braided eyes on the collar below the upper line of braid. Colonels and Lieutenant-Colonels have two chevrons of braid on each sleeve,  $\frac{3}{4}$  inch apart, the upper forming an Austrian knot extending to 10 inches from the bottom of the cuff, and the lower braid a crow's foot and eye; a row of braided eyes above and below the chevrons as on the tunic. Majors have the same braiding on the sleeve, omitting the lower row of braided eyes.

Captains have similar braiding, but without the braided eyes; the Austrian knot extends to 9 inches only.

Lieutenants have a single chevron of braid forming an Austrian knot 8 inches high, and a crow's foot and eye below it.

Mess Waistcoat.—Blue cloth, gold braid edging round the top, down the front, and along the bottom to the side seams. The pockets edged with braid, forming crows' feet and eyes at top and bottom and at the ends. A row of gilt studs and hooks and eyes down the front.

Whistle.—Metropolitan pattern. See General Instructions. Great Coat and Cape.—See General Instructions.

Leggings.—Brown leather, sealed pattern, as in Ordnance Store.

Boots.—For full dress, wellington or ankle boots; for undress, laced-up boots.

N.B.—The provision by Officers of the scarlet tunic, gold-laced trousers, full-dress sash, gold sword-belt, gold sword-knot, and blue helmet for levées, balls, &c., and the mess jacket, mess waistcoat for other occasions, is optional, but Officers wishing to attend balls, levées, &c., at which Full Dress is ordered to be worn, must appear in Full Dress.

# OFFICERS.

#### FULL DRESS.

Tunic.—Blue cloth, with collar and cuffs of white cloth. The collar rounded in front and ornamented with  $\frac{3}{4}$ -in. lace round the top, gold cord similar to shoulder-strap along the bottom. Eight buttons in front and two at the waist behind. The skirt rounded off in front and closed behind with a plait at each side and lined with black silk, white cloth edging  $\frac{1}{8}$  inch wide all round and up the skirt plaits. Shoulder-straps of twisted round gold cord, universal pattern, lined with blue, and a small universal pattern button at the top. Badges of rank in silver.

Assistant Commissary-General has a row of braided eyes below the lace on the collar, a chevron of lace 1½ inch on the cuff with figured ½-in. Russia braiding above and below the lace, and extending to 11 inches from the bottom of the cuff.

Deputy Assistant Commissary-General.—The braided eyes on collar are omitted; on the cuff an Austrian knot of round-back gold cord traced, all round with braided eyes.

Sub-Assistant Commissary-Generals have an Austrian knot on cuff, but without braided eyes.

Lace.—Gold, staff pattern for tunic, jacket, and mess waist-coat, and regimental pattern, with  $\frac{1}{8}$ -in. dark-blue stripe in the centre, for cap and dress trousers.

Buttons .- Of universal pattern.

- Trousers, Boots, and Spurs.—Blue cloth, with 1½-in. lace down the side seams; wellington boots. Steel spurs for Mounted Officers, except at levées and in the evening in mess or full dress when brass spurs will be worn.
- Pantaloons, &c., for Mounted duties.—Blue cloth, with two stripes of white cloth, each \(^3\) inch wide and \(^1\) inch apart, down each side seam. Knee-boots and steel spurs, as described in page 2.
- Helmet, White, with white puggaree, gilt ball mountings, and chain. Badge in front above puggaree. Officers at present in possession of cocked hats may wear them at levées, &c., but not on parade.
- Sword.—Half-basket, steel hilt, with two fluted bars on the outside; black fish-skin grip, bound with silver wire; slightly curved blade, 35½ inches long and 1½ inches wide, grooved and spear-pointed.
- Scabbard.—Steel, with a large shoe at the bottom and a trumpet-shaped mouth. For Field Officers, brass.
- Sword-knot.—Gold and blue cord, with gold and blue acorn.
- Sword-bett.—Pale Russia leather, 1½ inches wide, with removable slings an inch wide, the front sling lined with Russia leather; a swivel-hook on the eye of dee of front sling for hooking up sword, running carriage for back sling; two stripes of gold embroidery on belt and slings; flat billets for sword and sabretache slings with square gilt-wire buckles; three dees on inside of belt, with Russia leather protecting flap to attach sabretache slings. Universal clasp with badge of Southern Cross.
- Sabretache for Mounted Officers.—As described in General Instructions, page 7.
- Shoulder-belt.—Pale Russia leather, 2 inches wide, with three stripes of gold embroidery, each \(\frac{1}{4}\) inch wide; gilt chased buckle, tip, and slide.
- Binocular Case.—Black patent leather, to hold a binocular field-glass, solid leather flap reaching to the lower edge of the case, ornamented with universal badge in gilt.

#### Undress.

- Patrol Jacket.—Blue cloth, rounded in front, and edged with 1 inch black mohair braid all round and up the openings at the side; five loops of flat plait on each side in front, fastening with olivets, and with crows' feet and olivets at the ends; stand-up collar. The sleeves ornamented with flat plait, forming crows' feet, 6 inches from the bottom of the cuffs. Double flat plait on each back seam, with crow's foot at top and bottom, and two eyes at equal distances. Pockets edged with flat plait forming a crow's foot at each end and an eye in the centre, top and bottom. Shoulderstraps of the same material as the garment, edged with \( \frac{1}{2} \)-in. black mohair braid, except at the base. Black netted button at the top. Badges of rank in gold. The jacket to be long enough to reach the saddle when the officer is mounted.
- Trousers, Boots, and Spurs.—Blue cloth, with stripes, pattern as for pantaloons; wellington boots, steel spurs for Mounted Officers.
- Pantaloons, &c., for Mounted Duties .- As for full dress.
- Forage Cap.—Blue cloth, with gold embroidery  $\frac{2}{4}$  inch wide on peak, and band of  $1\frac{1}{2}$ -in. lace of regimental pattern. Gold purl button and braided figure on crown. Badge in front of cap.
- Field Service Cap, &c.—Blue cloth folding cap, 5 inches high, with white cloth top, and blue side flaps 4 inches deep, to turn down when required. Black mohair welts on cap and flaps, and at front and back seams. Badge on the left side.
- Mess Jacket.—Blue cloth, edged all round with \(\frac{3}{4}\)-in. gold lace, forming a bull's-eye or ring at the bottom of each back seam; white collar and cuffs; a line of \(\frac{1}{8}\)-in. gold braid along the collar seam; cuffs pointed and edged with \(\frac{3}{2}\)-in. lace, a loop of gold braid at bottom of collar

to fasten across the neck; a row of gilt studs down the front on the left side, fastened with hooks and eyes, white silk lining. Shoulder-straps with badges of rank as for tunic.

Mess Waistcoat.—White cloth, with collar, edged with \frac{1}{2}-in. gold lace all round, including collar; to fasten with hooks and eyes; gilt studs down the front on the left side. The pockets edged with Russia braid, with crows' feet at ends and centre.

Sword-belt.—White buff leather, 1½ inches wide, with sword slings 1 inch wide, sewn into gilt rings—(tache slings for Mounted Officers)—three dees on belt for sabretache slings. Flat billets for sword and tache slings, with square gilt wire buckles. Gilt universal clasp, with badge "Southern Cross" and motto.

Shoulder-belt.—White buff leather, 2 inches wide; no buckle, tip, or slide.

Sword-knot.—Buff leather, ½ inch wide, with runner and acorn.

Cloak.—Blue cloth with sleeves. Stand-and-fall collar, with three black hooks and eyes in front, and three small flat silk buttons at the bottom to fasten the cape. Round loose cuffs, 6 inches deep. A pocket in each side seam outside and one in the left breast inside. Four buttons down the front. A cloth back-strap, to fasten with a large flat silk button at the top of each pocket; a similar button in front on the right to hold the end of the back-strap when it is not buttoned across behind. Blue ratinett lining. The cloak to reach within 8 inches of the ground. Shoulder-straps of the same material as the garment; a small button of universal pattern at the top. Badges of rank in gilt metal.

Cape.—Blue cloth, long enough to cover the knuckles, lined with blue ratinett; a cloth band round the top to fasten with a cloth strap and black buckle, and a fly inside the band, with three button-holes for attaching cape to cloak. Three buttons down the front.

N.B.—The provision by Officers of the full dress tunic, gold-laced trousers, white helmet, full dress sword-belt, sword-knot, and shoulder-belt for levées, balls, &c., and the mess jacket, mess waistcoat, blue patrol jacket, and blue cloth trousers for other occasions, is optional. See page 52, for Infantry Officers.

# KHARI CLOTHING.

To be worn in camp and when parading with the men. Jacket.—Khaki, as described in General Instructions, page 10. Letters C and T in gilt metal to be worn below badges of rank on the shoulder-straps.

Trousers .-- Khaki, without welt.

Pantaloons, Boots, and Spurs for Mounted duties.—As described for Mounted Officers of Infantry, page 10.

Helmet.—Khaki, as described in General Instructions, page 10.

Sword-belt (when mounted).—Brown leather; "Sam Browne" pattern, with sword-knot of brown leather with acorn.

Gloves .- Brown dogskin, plain backs.

### Horse Furniture.

As described for Mounted Officers of Infantry Regiments. White patent leather sword-belts and white patent leather shoulder-belts in possession may continue to be worn until they require to be replaced.

Black velvet collar and cuffs; the collar ornamented with \(\frac{3}{4}\)-in. lace at the top, gold Russia braid at the bottom, and a row of gold braided eyes between; the cuffs pointed, with two bars of \(\frac{1}{2}\)-in. lace round the top, showing \(\frac{1}{4}\)-in. black velvet between the bars; a row of gold braided eyes above and below the lace, the lower braid having a crow's foot and eye, and the upper an Austrian knot, at the top; the cuffs 8 inches deep to the top of the lace, and 10 inches deep to the top of the Austrian knot. The rows of braided eyes on the collar and sleeves are \(\frac{1}{4}\) inch from the lace, the eyes \(\frac{1}{2}\) inch in diameter, and \(\frac{1}{16}\) inch apart. Eight buttons down the front, and two at the waist behind, about 3 inches apart. The skirt rounded off in front and closed behind, with a plait at each side, and lined with white. The front collar and skirt plaits edged with white cloth, \(\frac{1}{4}\) inch wide. Shoulder-straps of twisted round gold cord, universal pattern, lined with scarlet; a small button of pattern at the top. On each stap a crown with one star below in silver.

Lace.—Gold, Staff pattern, for tunies and shell jackets, and special pattern (with two lines of black silk) for cap, dress trousers, dress pantaloons, and saddle cloth.

Buttons .- Gilt, universal pattern.

Badge.—For forage cap and khaki, or white helmet. Gold embroidered badge, similar in pattern to new universal badge, but with a red Southern Cross.

Dress Trousers and Pantaloons.—Blue cloth, with  $1\frac{3}{4}$ -inch lace down the side seams.

Cocked Hat for Brigade-Surgeon only.—As described at page 2, with loop of <sup>3</sup>/<sub>4</sub>-in. lace; tassels, flat netted gold purl head, eight small gold bullions, with seven crimson bullions under them.

Plume.—Black cock's-tail feathers, drooping outwards, 6 inches long.

Helmet, White, Summer Wear.—With white puggaree, gilt mountings, chain, and spike. Medical staff badge in front above puggaree.

Spurs.—Brass.

Sword.—As described at page 8, the hilt of gilt metal, with device of Royal Cypher and Crown, and lined with black patent leather.

Scabbard .- Brass.

- Sword-knot.—Gold and black lace strap, with gold and black acorn for full dress. Brown leather for undress.
- Sword-belt.—Black morocco leather  $1\frac{1}{2}$  inches wide with slings 1 inch wide. Two stripes of gold embroidery,  $\frac{3}{8}$  inch wide on belt and  $\frac{3}{16}$  inch wide on slings, a gilt hook to hook up sword. A chased gilt clasp with the Southern Cross on centrepiece.
- Sabretache for Mounted Officers.—Black patent leather, as described at page 7, with gilt universal badge.
- Pouch-belt.—Black morocco leather, 2 inches wide, with three stripes of gold embroidery, § inch wide; gilt chased buckle, tip, and slide.
- Fouch for Instruments.—Black morocco leather of special pattern to contain the Regulation instrument case; the flap  $6\frac{1}{2}$  inches long and 4 inches deep, with two stripes of gold embroidery,  $\frac{2}{8}$  inch wide, round the bottom and sides; in the centre, a gilt universal badge.
- Patrol Jacket.—Blue cloth, as described in General Instructions, with stand-up collar, edged with inch black mohair braid. Cloth shoulder-straps, edged with ½-in. black mohair braid, except at the base; black netted button at the top. Badges of rank in gold.
- Mess Jacket.—Scarlet cloth, edged all round with inch gold lace, forming a bull's eye or ring at the bottom of each back seam; black velvet collar and cuffs; §-in. gimp lace on the collar seam; cuffs pointed and edged with inch lace; a loop of gold braid at bottom of collar to fasten across the neck; a row of gilt studs down the front on the left side, fastened with hooks and eyes. Scarlet silk lining. Shoulder-straps with badges of rank as for tunic.
- Mess Waistcoat.—Blue cloth, edged with 13g-in. gold Russia braid all round on collar seam. Pockets edged with similar braid forming a crow's foot at each end. A row of gilt studs and hooks and eyes down the front.
- Undress Trousers and Pantaloons.—Blue cloth, with scarlet stripes  $.2\frac{1}{2}$  inches wide, and welted at the edges, down the side seams.
- Forage Cap.—Blue cloth, with gold embroidered Staff peak, and band of 2-in. lace; gold and black purl button and gold braided figure on the crown. Medical Staff, badge over lace in front.
- Field Service Cap.—Blue cloth folding cap, 5 inches high, with black cloth top, blue side flaps, 4 inches deep, to turn down when required; gold French braid welts on cap and flaps and at front and back seams. Medical Staff, badge on the left side.
- Great Coat and Cape.—Blue milled cloth, of pattern described for Mounted Officers at page 3, lined with searlet ratinett; the collar lined with black velvet. Shoulderstraps of the same material as the garment; a small button at the top. Badges of rank in gold.

#### KHAKI CLOTHING.

Jacket.-Khaki, as described at page 10.

Trousers .- Khaki, without stripe down side seams.

Pantaloons for Mounted Duties.—Khaki cord, with brown knee-boots.

Helmet.—Khaki, as described at page 10, with Medical Staff badge in front over puggaree.

Gloves.—Brown dogskin, plain backs.

#### OFFICERS ON RESERVE.

(See General Instructions.)

#### Horse Furniture.

Saddle.-Hunting, plain stirrups and blue girths.

Wallets .- Brown leather, with brown leather covers.

Saddle Cloth for Brigade-Surgeon only.—Blue cloth, 3 feet long and 2 feet deep, with stripe of 1-in. lace all round; at each hind corner a crown with one star below, in silver.

Bridle.—Brown leather Cavalry pattern; with brown leather front and rosettes; steel chain reins; gilt bosses on bit and breast-plate, having the universal badge. In camp head ropes will be carried.

#### SURGEON-MAJOR.

Uniform and horse furniture as for Brigade Surgeon, with the following exceptions:-

Badge of Rank. - Crown.

Tunic.—The braid below the lace on the sleeves is plain, without eyes.

#### SURGEON.

Uniform, &c. (including Pantaloons, Knee-boots, and Horse Furniture, when required to be mounted), as for Surgeon-Major, with the following exceptions:—

Badges of Rank .-- Two stars.

Tunic.—The braided eyes on the collar are omitted; the braid above as well as below the lace on the sleeve is plain, without eyes.

Scabbard.—Steel.

Forage Cap.-Lace, 11 inches wide.

Spurs for Mounted Officers.-Dress, brass; undress, steel.

### VICTORIAN MOUNTED RIFLES.

Medical Officers will wear the uniform of their Corps according to their relative rank; but with black leather sword-belts, "Sam Browne" pattern; and pouch and pouch-belt of black morocco and gold for full dress. The Medical Staff badge to be worn.

### VICTORIAN RANGERS.

Medical Officers will wear the uniform of their Corps according to their relative rank, but with belts, badge, &c., as for Militia Medical Staff.

#### AMBULANCE CORPS.

#### OFFICERS.

Uniform and horse furniture as laid down for Medical Officers of their respective ranks in the Medical Staff (Militia).

# NON-COMMISSIONED OFFICERS AND MEN.

Jacket.—Khaki serge, universal pattern, as described at page 19. On the left arm a red Geneva Cross on white ground, Imperial Army pattern; and at each end of collar a small red Geneva Cross on a white ground.

Trousers.—Khaki serge, as described at page 20, with scarlet welt.

Helmet .- Khaki, as issued by Ordnance Store.

Felt Hat.—Grey felt, with three-plait grey puggaree, according to sealed pattern in Ordnance Store. The hat looped up at the right side, with new universal badge in metal. In front of hat a small red Geneva Cross within a circle of white.

Forage Cap.—For Warrant Officer and Quartermaster-Sergeant, as described at page 51, but without numeral.

Glengarries .- Blue, Imperial pattern.

Haversack .- Brown canvas.

Great Coat and Cape, Leggings, and Boots.—As described for Infantry.

#### XII.—VICTORIAN MOUNTED RIFLES.

#### OFFICERS.

#### FULL DRESS.

Jacket.—Khaki cloth, with crimson cloth collar and cuffs.

The collar slightly rounded, and ornamented top and bottom with gold Russia braid \(\frac{1}{2}\) inch wide. The cuffs pointed, the point reaching to 6 inches from the bottom, and the cuff edged with gold braid as on collar, with an Austrian knot on top, the lace extending to 10 inches from bottom of cuff; and on the lower part of cuff a crow's foot and eye of the same braid. The skirt rounded in front and five small buttons down front of jacket, none at the waist behind. Two outside patch pockets, one on each breast, with a pleat 1\(\frac{1}{2}\) inches wide, and with rounded flap on top; bottom corners of pockets to be square. Shoulder cord of gimp lined with khaki, a small button, universal pattern at the top.

Lieutenant-Colonel has a row of braided eyes of gold Russia braid,  $\gamma_0^*$  inch wide, at top and bottom of collar. On the cuff, a second stripe of gold braid  $\frac{3}{4}$  inch from the braid on edge, with a row of braided eyes below and above lace and around the Austrian knot.

Majors have a row of braided eyes only at the top of collar, and braided eyes round top of cuff and Austrian knot.

Captains have no braided eyes on the collar or cuff, but on the cuff the second stripe of gold lace as described for Field Officer.

Lieutenants do not have the second stripe of gold braid on the cuff.

Facings.—Crimson cloth.

Buttons.—Gilt, small, universal pattern.

Trousers.—Khaki cloth, with gold lace 11 inches wide, and with 11-in. crimson silk stripe in the centre down the side seams.

Pantaloons and Boots.—Khaki cord; brown leather kneeboots laced over the instep, with small waterproof tongue underneath, V cut out of boot in front at the top.

Spurs.—With knee-boots: steel swan-necked, fastened with straps, buckles, and steel chains. When trousers are worn: brass, box pattern.

Felt Hat.—Khaki soft felt, with three-plait puggaree of the same colour. Hat looped up at the right side with cord same colour as hat, and fastened with badge.

Sword.—Plain cut and thrust sword, steel hilt, infantry pattern, with V.M.R. and Imperial Crown embossed thereon.

Scabbard.—Brown leather over wood, with small brass shoe.

Sword-knot.-Brown round leather, with acorn.

Sword-belt.-Brown leather, "Sam Browne" pattern.

Pouch-belt.—Brown leather, 21 inches wide, with gilt metal ornament of a shield, and two arrows and quivers, with gilt chains attached, fastening to a gilt rose 61 inches from top of shield. Gilt slide and tip.

Pouch.—Brown leather, bound with gilt metal, \( \frac{1}{4} \) inch wide, and gilt metal universal badge.

Gloves. - Brown leather gauntlets.

# Undress. .

- Jacket, Trousers, and Pantaloons.—As for full dress, with the exception that the shoulder-straps of jacket are of khaki cloth, edged with gold Russia braid with a small universal pattern button on top, and V.M.R. in gilt letters below badges of rank.
- Forage Cap.—Crimson cloth; same pattern as for Artillery, with band of 1\frac{2}{3}-in. gold lace, special pattern, gold button and braided figure on crown.
- Field Service Cap.—Crimson cloth; same pattern, trimmed, and with badge as described for Infantry Officers, page 51.
- Mess Jacket.—Khaki cloth, with collar and pointed cuffs of the regimental facings; a row of gilt studs, and hooks and eyes down the front. The jacket trimmed and with shoulder-straps as for full dress:
- Mess Waistcoat.—Crimson cloth, same pattern, and trimmed with 4-in. lace as for Infantry, page 51. Top of waistcoat to be open sufficient to show top shirt stud.
- Cloah and Cape.—Blue cloth, of the same pattern as described for Mounted Officers, page 4, and lined with scarlet shalloon. Stand and fall collar.

Haversach .- Brown canvas.

Gloves .- Brown dogskin, plain backs. ·

### REGIMENTAL STAFF OFFICERS.

Will wear the uniform of their respective ranks.

#### HORSE FURNITURE.

- Saddle.—Hunting, plain square stirrups, hide girth.
- Bridle.—Brown leather, plain, with double ended brass buckles, and Pelham bit, standing or jointed.
- Wallets.—Brown leather (without covers), attached to saddle by sureingle.

# WARRANT OFFICERS, NON-COMMISSIONED OFFICERS, AND MEN.

Jacket.—Khaki serge, with crimson cloth collar and cuffs.

Jacket to be of the same pattern as described for Officers, but without trimming. Shoulder-straps of same material as jacket, with small universal pattern button on top, and V.M.R., with letter of company above in brass.

Warrant Officers wear  $\frac{1}{2}$ -in. flat gold lace round top of collar.

Buttons .- Brass, small, universal pattern,

Trousers.—Khaki serge, with crimson welt 4 inch wide down side seams.

Pantaloons and Boots.—Khaki cord; laced up boots same pattern as for Infantry.

- Felt Hat.—Khaki soft felt, with three-plait puggaree of the same colour. Hat looped up at the right side with cord same colour as hat, and fastened with lion's head badge in brass.
- Forage Cap.—Crimson cloth; same pattern as for Artillery, with band of yellow braid 1 inch wide, and yellow button on top. Sergeants will wear on cap a gold lace band 1 inch wide, with small gold purl button on top. Warrant Officers and Company Sergeant-Majors will wear same pattern as for Officers, but without braided figure on top.
- Field Service Cap.—As described for Officers, but without gold French braid welts. Universal badge in brass on left side 1½ inches from front. For Warrant Officers, as for Officers.
- Gloves.—For Warrant Officers and Non-commissioned Officers, brown dogskin with plain backs.
- Spurs.—Steel, or nickel, straight short necked hunting spurs, with brown leather straps and buckles.
- Leggings .- Brown leather, sewn all round, no fastenings.

Haversack .-- As issued by Ordnance Store.

Boots.—As described in General Instructions.

Great Coat and Cape .- As issued by Ordnance Store,

#### XIII.-VICTORIAN RANGERS.

#### OFFICERS.

#### Full Dress.

Full Dress Jacket.—Khaki cloth, with scarlet cloth collar and cuffs of the same pattern as described on page 10, but not so loose fitting, and without patch pockets. The collar ornamented with gold Russia braid ¼ inch wide top and bottom. The cuffs pointed and edged with gold Russia braid, and an Austrian knot on top. Five large git buttons, universal pattern, down the front. Shoulder-straps, special pattern, lined with scarlet, small universal pattern button at the top.

A Lieutenant-Colonel has a row of braided eyes top and bottom of collar. On the cuff a second stripe of gold braid § inch from inside of edge of cuff, and below this second stripe a scroll of gold braid on the cuff, a row of braided eyes above and below lace on cuff and around the Austrian knot.

Majors have a row of braided eyes only at the top of collar and braided eyes only round top of cuff and Austrian knot.

Captains have no braided eyes on the collar or cuff.

Lieutenants do not have the second stripe of gold braid on the cuff.

Facings.—Scarlet.

Buttons.—Gilt, universal pattern.

Trousers.-Khaki cloth, and laced as for Infantry.

Pantaloons and Spurs for Mounted Duties.—Khaki cord, as described for Mounted Officers of Infantry, and brown leather knec-boots of same pattern.

Felt Hat.—As described at page 67 for V.M. Rifles.

Sword.—Scabbard and full dress sword-knot as described for Officers, Infantry, page 50.

Sword-belt.—Worn under tunic, as in undress, but with dress slings 1 inch wide of red Russia leather, trimmed with three stripes of gold Russia braid.

Pouch-belt.—Brown leather, with a double stripe of gold lace, special pattern, with red morocco leather stripe \( \frac{1}{2} \) inch wide, in centre. Gilt mounts, lion's head, maltese cross, universal badge, whistle and chain.

Pouch.—Brown leather, trimmed round with  $\frac{1}{2}$  inch wide lace, special pattern, and universal badge in gilt.

Gloves.—Brown leather dogskin, with plain backs. For levées or balls, white kid.

Boots.-Laced or ankle (black).

#### Undress.

Jacket.—Khaki; as described in General Instructions, but with 5 buttons only down the front. Designation of Regiment in gilt letters on shoulder straps (see page 16) below the badges of rank.

Trousers.—Khaki, as described at page 10, with scarlet welt. Pantaloons, &c.—As described for full dress, without welt. Felt Hat.—As described for full dress.

Field Service Cap.—Khaki cloth folding cap,  $4\frac{1}{2}$  inches high, with a searlet edging on top  $\frac{1}{2}$  inch deep. Khaki cloth side flaps, 4 inches deep, to turn down when required. Gold French braid welts on cap and flaps, and at front and back seams. Badge to be worn on left side, and to be placed  $1\frac{1}{2}$  inches from point of cap.

Mess Jacket.—Khaki cloth, with collar and pointed cuffs of scarlet cloth, and scarlet lining to jacket. Jacket to be embroided as for full dress jacket.

Mess Waistcoat.—White drill, without lappels, fastened with four small gilt buttons, universal pattern.

Cloak.—Black regulation pattern waterproof cloak, with cape combined.

Gloves.—See Full Dress.

Leggings .- As described for Infantry Officers.

Pouch-belt.-Brown leather, 2 inches wide.

Pouch.—Brown leather, with gilt universal badge.

Sword-belt.—Brown leather, 1½ inches wide, with sword-slings 1 inch wide, and belt fastened with a gilt clasp, badge on centrepiece "Southern Cross."

Sword-knot.-Brown leather, with acorn.

Haversack .- Brown canvas, with small universal button.

N.B.—The provision by Officers of the full dress and mess uniforms is optional, but Officers will not be allowed to attend balls or levées where full uniform is to be worn in any other dress but full dress.

# 40-PR. BATTERY, HASTINGS.

#### OFFICERS.

#### FULL DRESS.

Full Dress Jacket.—Khaki cloth, same as described for Victorian Rangers, Infantry, but the braiding on the sleeve and collar to be the same as worn on Artillery Mess Jackets.

Helmet.—Khaki, as described at page 10, with badge in front above puggaree. Helmet to have gilt ball mountings as for Field Artillery, with gilt chain.

Sword and Scabbard, Gloves and Boots.—As described for . Officers, Victorian Rangers.

Sword-belt, Sword-knot, and Pouch-belt.—As described for Officers, Artillery; but pouch of brown leather trimmed as for Victorian Rangers, with gilt metal gun.

### Undress.

Jacket.—Khaki, as for Officers, undress, Victorian Rangers, Infantry; but with a gilt metal grenade at each end

Trousers.—Khaki, with 11-in. scarlet stripe on side seams.

Forage Cap.—Khaki, with lace, &c., as for Artillery. Badge in front.

Mess Jacket.—Khaki cloth, same pattern and trimmed as for Artillery.

Mess Waistcoat.—White, with four small buttons, universal pattern, and without lappels.

Pouch-belt and Pouch.—As for Officers, undress, Victorian Rangers; but with gilt gun on pouch as for Artillery.

Sword-knot .- Brown leather, with acorn.

Sword-belt, Cloak, Haversack.—As for Officers, Victorian Rangers.

N.B.—See foot-note to Officers, Victorian Rangers, for articles of dress, which are optional.

#### REGIMENTAL STAFF OFFICERS.

Will wear the uniform of their rank. The Commanding Officer and Adjutant are permitted to wear, on special occasions, with full dress, a khaki helmet, special pattern.

HORSE FURNITURE.

As for Officers, Victorian Mounted Rifles.

# WARRANT OFFICERS, NON-COMMISSIONED OFFICERS, AND MEN.

Jacket.—Khaki serge, universal pattern, as described in General Instructions, but five buttons only down the front, with collar and pointed cuffs of scarlet. Non-commissioned Officers and Men wear on shoulder-straps the letter of their Company in metal above Rangers, see page 16. Instructors of the Permanent Staff may, for travelling, &c., wear a jacket of the above pattern without the facings of scarlet. Warrant Officers to have top of collar (with the facings) trimmed with ½-in. flat gold lace.

Buttons.—Brass, universal pattern.

Trousers .- Khaki serge, with scarlet welt.

Felt Hat. As described for V.M. Rifles, page 69.

Field Service Cap.—As described for Officers, but without gold French braid welts. Badge in metal on left side  $1\frac{1}{2}$  inches from front. For Warrant Officers. as for Officers.

Pouch and Pouch-belt.—For Instructors, Permanent Staff, brown leather as described for Officers undress, universal badge in brass.

Gloves .- Warrant Officers and Sergeants as for Officers.

Great Coat and Cape.—According to sealed pattern issued by Ordnance Store.

Haversack .- Brown canvas.

Leggings and Boots.—As described for Infantry, page 53.

#### 40-PR. HASTINGS BATTERY.

### NON-COMMISSIONED OFFICERS AND MEN.

Jacket.—Khaki serge, as described for Victorian Rangers, but with a small brass grenade on each end of collar, with yellow cord round collar and Austrian knot on sleeve as for Field Artillery.

Trousers.—Khaki serge, with 12-in. searlet stripe.

Helmet.—Khaki, as described at page 20, with badge in front above puggaree, and with brass ball mountings as for Artillery, and brass chin chain.

Forage Cap.—Khaki, with braid, &c., as for Artillery; badge in front.

Gloves .- As for Victorian Rangers.

Great Coat and Cape, Haversacks, Leggings, and Boots.—
As described for Victorian Rangers.

Pouch and Pouch-belt.—For Instructor, Permanent Staff, brown leather, with brass gun.

- Boots .- As described for Infantry.
- Helmet.—As described at page 10, with gilt Cadet badge over puggaree. Puggaree has no distinguishing colour as for Infantry.
- Sword and Scabbard.—Cadet pattern, as issued by Ordnance Store.
- Sword-knot.—Black leather, with black leather acorn.
- Sword-belt.-Black leather, Infantry pattern.
- Gloves.—Full dress, buff leather; undress, brown dogskin with plain backs.
- Undress Jacket.—Khaki serge, universal pattern, as described at page 10.
- Forage Cap.—As described for Officers, Infantry, page 50° but with the letter "C" below Cadet badge.
- Cloak.-Black waterproof, with cape.

### OFFICERS'.—CADET BATTALIONS.

- Tunic, Trousers, Felt Hat.—As described for Staff Officers, Cadets.
- Forage Cap.—As described for Staff Officers, Cadets, but the band round cap to be of khaki braid, instead of gold lace, and the letter "C" in gold embroidery to be worn in front of cap.

Trousers.—Black cloth, with black braid 1<sup>2</sup>/<sub>4</sub> inches wide down the side seams.

Forage Cap.—Black cloth; with black patent leather drooping peak, ornamented with  $\frac{2}{3}$ -in. black embroidery, band  $1\frac{3}{4}$  inches wide, of black lace staff pattern; black netted button and braided figure on crown. A Maltese Cross worked in black and gold on the band in front.

Field Service Cap.—Black cloth folding cap 5 inches high, with side flaps 4 inches deep to turn down when required. Black mohair braid welts on cap and flaps; and on front and back seams. Badge, as on forage cap, on the left side.

Gloves.-Black leather.

Great Coat and Cape.—Black cloth of the pattern described at page 3, but with badges of rank in black and gold.

Note.—During the first quarter of 1893 the registered births numbered 8,752, and the registered deaths 4,319; thus the former exceeded the latter by 4,433, or 103 per cent. As compared with the first quarter of 1892, the births in the quarter under notice were fewer by 557, and the deaths by 324.

The recorded arrivals by sea numbered 19,706, but the recorded and unrecorded departures (the latter being estimated) numbered 23,684. The loss by excess of departures over arrivals was thus 3.978.

Taking the difference between the excess of births over deaths, and the excess of departures over arrivals, the total increase during the quarter is shown to have been 455, made up by a gain to the population of 1,208 females, less a loss of 753 males.

From the date of the census (5th April, 1891) the allowance for unrecorded departures has been 11,134, viz., 8,616 of males and 2,518 of females. Had no such allowance been made, the apparent population at the end of March would have been 1,178,962, viz., 615,664 males and 563,298 females.

During the quarter the recorded arrivals from were more numerous than the recorded departures for Tasmania by 1,177. Any person, being the occupier of any shop or premises, having an awning or verandah extending over any public footway or roadway, who being required by a notice in writing, under the hand of the Surveyor of the City of South Melbourne, to remove from such awning or verandah any screen or other appendage or any goods, wares, or other matters or things whatsoever, shall after forty-eight hours from the time of the service of such notice, at such shop or premises, fail or neglect to comply with the requirements of such notice as aforesaid, shall upon conviction thereof before any one or more of the justices of the peace for the said city forfeit and pay a penalty not exceeding the sum of Five pounds, and a further penalty of One pound for every day after such period of forty-eight hours that such notice shall remain uncomplied with.

2. No person shall pluck any of the flowers, or walk on the beds or borders, or climb upon or get over the fences, or remove any of the tallies, or disturb, damage, or destroy any property or thing in the gardens.

3. No person shall carry firearms through the gardens, or shoot, snare, or destroy any wild fowl either in the gardens or in or on any water adjacent thereto.

4. No cart or other vehicle shall, without the authority of the proper officer of the council, be driven into or through the gardens.

To the order of the council, be driven into or through the gardens.

5. Such plants, seeds, or cuttings as are commonly purchasable at nurseries in Victoria shall not be supplied from the gardens to any person unless in exchange, or for public institutions, or for benevolent purposes, and then only upon an order from the mayor of the said city.

6. No visitors shall interrupt the gardeners or labourers by conversation or otherwise.

onversation or otherwise.

7. Children under the age of ten years, not being under the control of some competent person, may be removed from the

control of some competent person, may be removed from the gardens.

8. All dogs and goats, and all poultry found within the gardens shall be destroyed, and the owner shall make compensation, to be recovered before any justice, for any damage done.

9. No person shall misconduct himself or herself within the enclosure of any gardens at any time, either by day or by night.

10. In addition to the provisions herein contained it shall be lawful for the council, from time to time, to make such regulations for the proper maintenance and management of the gardens as shall seem to them fit.

11. Any person offending against any of the provisions of this by-law, or of any such regulation, shall forfeit a sum not exceeding Ten pounds.
