PUBLIC AND BANK HOLIDAYS.

PROCLAMATION

By His Excellency the Right Honorable John Adrian Louis, Earl of Hopetoun, Viscount Aithrie, and Baron Hope, in the Peerage of Scotland; Baron Hopetoun of Hopetoun, and Baron Niddry of Niddry Castle, in the Peerage of the United Kingdom; Knight Grand Cross of the Most Distinguished Order of Saint Michael and Saint George; Governor and Commander-in-Chief in and over the Colony of Victoria and its Dependencies, &c., &c., &c.

IN pursuance of the provisions contained in the *Public Service Act 1890* (54 Vict. No. 1133, Part VI., section 135) and in the *Banks and Currency Act 1890* (54 Vict. No. 1164, Part III., section 20), I, the Governor of Victoria, with the advice of the Executive Council, do by this my Proclamation appoint the days and dates hereunder mentioned to be observed as Public Holidays or Bank Holidays (as the case may be) at the places respectively specified, viz.:-

WEDNESDAY, THE 14TH DAY OF NOVEMBER INSTANT,

as a Public Holiday throughout the Shire of Goulburn,\* and as a Bank Holiday at Heidelberg;

THURSDAY, THE 15TH DAY OF NOVEMBER INSTANT,

as a Public Holiday throughout the Shires of Borung, Rosedale, and Templestowe; and as a Public Half Holiday, from the hour of Twelve o'clock noon, throughout the Town of Warrnambool;

THURSDAY, THE 15TH, AND FRIDAY, THE 16TH, DAYS OF NOVEMBER INSTANT,

as Public Holidays throughout the Shire of Heidelberg;

FRIDAY, THE 16TH DAY OF NOVEMBER INSTANT,

as a Bank Holiday at Learmonth;

WEDNESDAY, THE 21ST DAY OF NOVEMBER INSTANT,

as a Public Holiday throughout the Borough of Maryborough, the Shires of Glenlyon, Kyneton, and Metcalfe, and the North Riding of the Shire of Huntly;\* and as a Bank Holiday at Yarram Yarram;

THURSDAY, THE 22ND DAY OF NOVEMBER INSTANT,

as a Bank Holiday at Kilmore;

FRIDAY, THE 30TH DAY OF NOVEMBER INSTANT,

as a Public Holiday throughout the Shire of Buninyong.
