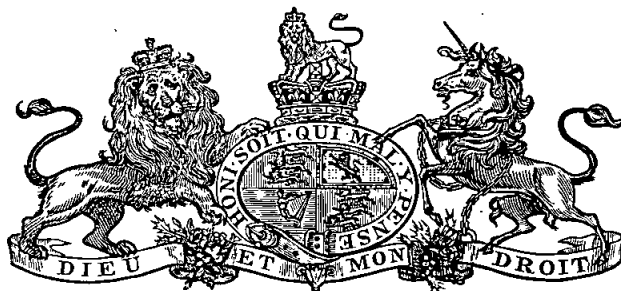

PUBLIC AND BANK HOLIDAYS.

PROCLAMATION

By His Excellency the Right Honorable John Adrian Louis, Earl of Hopetoun, Viscount Aithrie, and Baron Hope, in the Peerage of Scotland; Baron Hopetoun of Hopetoun, and Baron Niddry of Niddry Castle, in the Peerage of the United Kingdom; Knight Grand Cross of the Most Distinguished Order of Saint Michael and Saint George; Governor and Commander-in-Chief in and over the Colony of Victoria and its Dependencies, &c., &c., &c.

IN pursuance of the provisions contained in the *Public Service Act 1890* (54 Vict. No. 1133, Part VI., section 135) and in the *Banks and Currency Act 1890* (54 Vict. No. 1164, Part III., section 20), I, the Governor of Victoria, with the advice of the Executive Council, do by this my Proclamation appoint the days and dates hereunder mentioned to be observed as Public Holidays or Bank Holidays (as the case may be) at the places respectively specified, viz.:-

WEDNESDAY, THE 2ND OF MAY INSTANT,
as a Public Holiday at Castlemaine and within a radius of twelve miles thereof;

THURSDAY, THE 3RD OF MAY INSTANT,
as a Public Holiday throughout the Shires of Bairnsdale and Tambo, and as a Bank Holiday at Bairnsdale and Bruthen;

WEDNESDAY, THE 9TH OF MAY, INSTANT,
as a Bank Holiday at Rochester;

THURSDAY, THE 10TH OF MAY, INSTANT,
as a Bank Holiday at Casterton and Merino.

Given under my Hand and the Seal of the Colony, at Melbourne, this first day of May, in the year of our Lord One thousand eight hundred and ninety-four, and in the fifty-seventh year of Her Majesty's reign.

WHEREAS by Section 37 of the Constitution Statute it is provided that the appointment to Public Offices under the Government of Victoria hereafter to become vacant or to be created, whether such offices be salaried or not, shall be vested in the Governor with the advice of the Executive Council:

And whereas by the *Public Service Act 1893* (No. 1324) it is enacted that the Public Service Board shall consist of the Commissioners of Audit for the time being: His Excellency the Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, has therefore been pleased to appoint:-
