TONNAGE ADMEASUREMENT OF SHIPS BELONGING TO THE UNITED STATES OF AMERICA.

THE subjoined despatch and its enclosure from the Right Honorable the Secretary of State for the Colonies to His Excellency the Governor are published for general information.

SIR—With reference to the Earl of Derby’s Circular despatch of the 10th April, 1893, I have the honour to transmit to you, for information and publication in the colony under your Government, copies of an Order of the Queen in Council of the 3rd of October, 1895, respecting the tonnage admeasurement of ships belonging to the United States of America.

PRESENT:

The Queen’s Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS by an order in Council, dated the 30th July, 1868, made by Her Majesty in exercise of the powers conferred upon Her by the *Merchant Shipping Act Amendment Act 1862*, Her Majesty was pleased to direct that the merchant ships of the United States of America, the measurement whereof should after the 1st January, 1865, have been ascertained and denoted on the registers and other national papers of such ships, testified by the dates thereof, should be deemed to be of the tonnage denoted in such registers or other national papers, in the same manner, to the same extent, and for the same purpose, in, to, and for which the tonnage denoted in the certificate of registry of British ships is deemed to be the tonnage of such ships, after making therefrom the same deductions, in respect of crew space and engine room, as would, if such ships were British, be made from their gross tonnage under the laws relating to British ships.

And whereas by another Order in Council, dated the 19th March, 1883, made in exercise of the aforesaid powers, Her Majesty was pleased to direct as follows:—

1. As regards sailing ships:—That merchant sailing ships of the United States of America, the measurement whereof after the 5th August, 1882, has been ascertained and denoted in the registers and other national papers of such sailing ships, testified by the date thereof, shall be deemed to be of the tonnage denoted in such registers and other national papers, in the same manner, to the same extent, and for the same purpose, in, to, and for which the tonnage denoted in the certificate of registry of British sailing ships is deemed to be the tonnage of such ships.
2. As regards steam-ships:—That merchant ships belonging to the United States of America, which are propelled by steam or any other power requiring engine room, the measurement whereof shall, after the said 5th day of August, 1882, have been ascertained and denoted in the registers and other national papers of such steam-ships, testified by the dates thereof, shall be deemed to be of the tonnage denoted in such registers or other national papers in the same manner, to the same extent, and for the same purpose, in, to, and for which the tonnage denoted in the certificate of registry of British ships is deemed to be the tonnage of such ships. Provided, nevertheless, that if the owner or master of any such American steam-ship desires the deduction for engine room in his ship to be estimated under the rules for engine-room measurement and deduction applicable to British ships instead of under the American rule, the engine room shall be measured, and the deduction calculated according to the British rules.

And whereas by Section 84 of the *Merchant Shipping Act 1894* it is enacted that, whenever it appears to Her Majesty the Queen in Council that the tonnage regulations of that Act have been adopted by any foreign country, and are in force there, Her Majesty in Council may order that the ships of that country shall, without being remeasured in Her Majesty’s dominions, be deemed to be of the tonnage denoted in their certificates of registry or other national papers, in the same manner, to the same extent, and for the same purposes as the tonnage denoted in the certificate of registry of a British ship is deemed to be the tonnage of that ship.

And whereas it has been made to appear to Her Majesty in Council that the tonnage regulations of the *Merchant Shipping Act 1894* have been adopted by the United States of America, and such regulations are now in force there, having come into operation on the 1st day of April, 1895.

And whereas there still are or may be ships belonging to the United States of America to which the hereinbefore recited Orders of the 30th July, 1868, and the 19th March, 1883, may respectively apply, and it is expedient not to revoke the same, but to let the said recited Orders remain in force so long as there are any ships to which the same may so respectively apply.

And whereas the provisions of section 1 of the *Rules Publication Act 1893* have been complied with.

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, in pursuance and exercise of the powers hereinbefore mentioned, is hereby pleased, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to direct that the merchant ships of the United States of America, the measurement whereof shall, after the 1st day of April, 1895, have been ascertained and denoted in the registers and other national papers of such ships, shall be deemed to be of the tonnage denoted in their certificates of registry or other national papers in the same manner, to the same extent, and for the same purposes as the tonnage denoted in the certificate of registry of a British ship is deemed to be the tonnage of that ship.

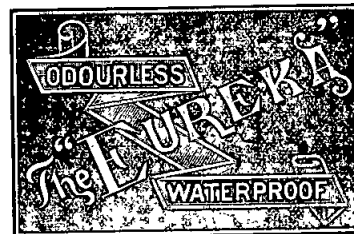

*Health Act 1890.*BOROUGH OF WANGARATTA.
BY-LAW No. 4.

IN pursuance of the powers conferred by the *Health Act 1890* (No. 1098), the Mayor, Councillors, and Burgesses of the Borough of Wangaratta make the following by-law, being By-law No. 4, for regulating the removal and disposal of night-soil, that is to say:—

1. This by-law shall come into operation on the 1st day of January, 1896.

2. By-law No. 3, made by the said Mayor, Councillors, and Burgesses of the Borough of Wangaratta, in pursuance of the *Health Act 1890* (No. 1098), and all amendments thereof, are hereby repealed. Provided that such repeal shall not affect any notice served, any order made, any charge levied, any fine imposed, any charge or other debt due, any right subsisting, or anything whatsoever done under the authority of the said by-law before the commencement of this by-law.

3. This by-law shall apply to that part of the borough bounded on the north by suburban sections 21, 72, and 74, on the east by the Ovens and King Rivers and Millard-street, on the south by Crisp-street and the One-mile Creek, on the west by the said creek, and again on the north by Evans-street and the Ovens River, and again on the west by the railway line.

4. The system of removing the contents of closet-pans at night time shall be and the same is now abolished.

5. That instead thereof every closet shall be furnished with a double-pan service.

6. That at least once in each week, or so much more frequently as the council may from time to time direct, the pan in use shall be closed with a tight-fitting lid, and removed in the day time in a suitable cart.

7. That a pan, cleansed by superheated steam or some equally efficient means approved by the council, shall be left in its place.

8. Individual householders shall not contract for the removal of night-soil, except in accordance with the by-laws and regulations of the council.

9. The council shall have power, in lieu of making a rate for the removal of night-soil, to make a charge on each occupier for service and for pans supplied, the amount, in default of payment, to be recovered in any court of petty sessions.

10. Every occupier and every person having the control or management of any premises shall use, or cause to be used, a suitable disinfectant or deodorant, and shall cause to be kept in every earth-closet belonging thereto a supply of dry powdered earth, ashes, charcoal, lime, sawdust, or some other material efficient for deodorizing night-soil, and shall cause all night-soil which may be deposited in any pan or other receptacle in such earth-closet to be immediately, on deposit thereof, covered with a quantity of such deodorizing material sufficient to thoroughly and effectually deodorize the contents of such pan or other receptacle.

*Health Act 1890.*TOWN OF NORTHCOTE.
BY-LAW No. 8.

A By-law of the Town of Northcote, made under the *Health Act 1890*, and numbered 8, for regulating the removal of night-soil.

IN pursuance of the powers conferred by the *Health Act 1890*, the Council of the Municipality of the Mayor, Councillors, and Burgesses of the Town of Northcote order as follows:—

No person except a nightman licensed by the said council or a nightman employed by any person or persons carrying out a contract with the said council for the removal of night-soil from places within the said town shall empty or remove the contents of any earth-closet, privy, cesspan, or place for the reception of night-soil.

Penalties.—If any person commit a breach of any of the provisions of this by-law he shall, for every such breach, be liable to a penalty not exceeding Five pounds, and to a further penalty of not more than One pound, nor less than Five shillings, for each day such offence is continued after any conviction.

The births of 1,063 children, viz., 537 boys and 526 girls, were registered in Greater Melbourne during the month of November. In the month of October 1,057 births were registered, or 6 less than in the month under review. The births, which were the lowest recorded for November since 1885, were 167 below the average of the month during the previous ten years, and 187 below that average if allowance be made for the increase of population.

The deaths registered in November numbered 558, viz., 300 of males and 258 of females; the births thus exceeded the deaths by 505, or 91 per cent. The deaths were fewer than those in October by 14, and below the average of November during the previous ten years by 99. If, however, allowance be made for the increase of population, they will be found to have been less than that average by 110.

To every 1,000 of the population of the district the proportion of births registered was equivalent to 29.46, and of deaths registered 15.47 per annum.

The highest temperature in the shade recorded at Melbourne Observatory during the month was 98.7° on the 25th, and the lowest was 39.0° on the 12th. The mean temperature of the month (61.4°) was three-fifths of a degree above the average. The greatest range of the thermometer in any one day (44.0°) took place on the 6th, and the least range (8.2°) on the 13th. The mean daily range was 21.2°. The highest atmospheric pressure recorded was 30.218 inches on the 15th, and the lowest was 29.635 inches on the 12th. The mean atmospheric pressure (29.984 inches) was one-twelfth of an inch above the average.

Rain fell on 5 days, the amount of rainfall being .25 of an inch. The average rainfall in November during the previous ten years was 2.75 inches, or eleven times as much as in the month under notice. During the first eleven months of the current year the rainfall was only 14.87 inches, as compared with an average of 23.05 inches.

Males contributed 54 per cent. and females 46 per cent. to the mortality of the month. Children under 5 years of age contributed 33 per cent. to that mortality, as against 33 per cent. in November, 1894; 38 per cent. in November, 1893; 36 per cent. in November, 1892; 40 per cent. in November, 1891; 35 per cent. in November, 1890; and 55 per cent. in November, 1889. The lower proportion of children as compared with former years is partly due to the falling off in the number of births.

Forty-three deaths of persons who had attained or passed the age of 75 years were recorded during the month. Of these, a stonemason, aged 75, died of influenza; a labourer, aged 75, of paralysis; a male of occupation unknown, aged 75, of insanity; a female, aged 75, of epilepsy; three females, each aged 76, of cancer, apoplexy, and pericarditis respectively; a labourer, aged 76, was "found drowned"; a seaman, aged 77, died of paralysis; two females, each aged 78, of rheumatism and aneurism respectively; a labourer, aged 78, of bronchitis; two females, each aged 79, of influenza and apoplexy respectively; a female, aged 80, of

diarrhoea; a gentleman, aged 80, of apoplexy; a farmer, aged 81, of softening of the brain; a storekeeper, aged 82, of thrombosis; a female, aged 83, of insanity; a labourer, aged 83, of syncope; a blacksmith, aged 83, of bronchitis; a cabinet-maker, aged 84, of apoplexy; two females, each aged 85, of syncope and bronchitis respectively; two females, each aged 86, of cancer and heart disease respectively; a female, aged 89, of mitral regurgitation; a female, aged 94, of cerebral hæmorrhage; a female, aged 75, a labourer, aged 76, a laundress, aged 77, a clerk and two females, each aged 79, a coachbuilder, aged 80, a dressmaker, aged 81, a female, aged 82, a bootmaker, aged 83, a labourer, aged 84, a gentleman, aged 86, a clerk, aged 89, a female, aged 90, and a labourer, aged 91, of old age.

Twenty-eight deaths were set down to external causes during the month, of which 19 were ascribed to accident, 4 to homicide, 4 to suicide, and 1 to execution. The following are the particulars of the accidental deaths:—A gardener, aged 32, was passed over by a dray; four persons died from the effects of falls, viz., a male child, aged 1 year, of injury to the head, a female, aged 12, and a male of occupation unknown, aged 55, of fracture of the skull, and a blacksmith, aged 72, of injuries received by falling over a precipice; a female child, aged 2, died of concussion of the brain, caused by a safe falling on her; a labourer, aged 37, of fracture of the spine, consequent on a fall of earth whilst engaged on the sewerage works; a male and a female child, each aged 2, and two females, aged 43 and 52 respectively, of burns; a painter, aged 56, of chronic lead poisoning; a teacher of languages, aged 63, of poisoning with morphia injection; a brewer, aged 48, was found drowned in a vat of beer; a male of occupation unknown, aged 60, and a labourer, aged 76, were found drowned in the River Yarra; two male infants—one newly born and the other aged 1 month—were accidentally suffocated, the latter in bed; and a female, aged 26, by the inhalation of ether properly administered. The homicidal deaths were those of a new-born male infant and a female child, aged 6 months, who were suffocated; a new-born female infant, who was drowned; and a carpenter, aged 34, who died from a wound in the thigh—a verdict of wilful murder being returned in the first three cases, and of manslaughter in the last case. The suicidal deaths were those of a commercial traveller, aged 65, who cut his throat; a labourer, aged 28, who drowned himself; and two females, aged 24 and 30 respectively, who hanged themselves. The execution was that of a tailor, aged 27, who was hanged in the Melbourne Gaol for the murder of her child.

One hundred and forty-six deaths, or 26 per cent. of the whole, took place in public institutions, viz.—58 in the Melbourne Hospital, 17 in the Alfred Hospital, 3 in the St. Vincent's Hospital, 3 in the Homœopathic Hospital, 10 in the Children's Hospital, 5 in the Women's Hospital, 11 in the Immigrants' Home, 13 in the Benevolent Asylum, 6 in the Yarra Bend Lunatic Asylum, 3 in the Metropolitan Lunatic Asylum, 5 in the Austin Hospital, 1 in the Melbourne Gaol, 1 in the Eye and Ear Hospital, and 5 in the Convent of the Little Sisters of the Poor.

The deaths of children under five years of age numbered 184, of which 107, or 58 per cent., were of males, and 77, or 42 per cent., were of females. Of those who died, 135 were under one year of age, 27 were between one and two, 12 were between two and three, 5 were between three and four, and 5 were between four and five.

The persons who died at a more advanced age than five years numbered 374. Of these, 193, or 52 per cent., were males, and 181, or 48 per cent., were females; 10 were between five and ten, 8 were between ten and fifteen, 15 were between fifteen and twenty, 20 were between twenty and twenty-five, 22 were between twenty-five and thirty, 24 were between thirty and thirty-five, 26 were between thirty-five and forty, 18 were between forty and forty-five, 22 were between forty-five and fifty, 26 were between fifty and fifty-five, 29 were between fifty-five and sixty, 36 were between sixty and sixty-five, 37 were between sixty-five and seventy, 38 were between seventy and seventy-five, 20 were between seventy-five and eighty, 13 were between eighty and eighty-five, 7 were between eighty-five and ninety, and 3 were between ninety and ninety-five.

The epidemic of influenza, which is still prevalent, caused 28 deaths in November, as compared with 33 in October; whilst the total number of victims during the last four months was 97, or a far larger number than has been recorded for any similar period since the latter portion of 1891, when 397 deaths occurred. The mortality of children under 5 having increased by over one-half in the month under review as compared with the previous one, an increase is naturally to be observed under diseases peculiar to children; thus deaths from diarrhoeal diseases rose from 5 to 14, those from want of breast milk from nil to 9, and those from enteritis from 5 to 46; although premature birth showed a falling off from 19 to 9. At the same time, the lower mortality of persons over 5 years of

nearly 18 per cent. is distributed over such diseases as cancer, from which the deaths fell off from 38 to 28, phthisis from 71 to 55, heart diseases from 30 to 36, and diseases of the respiratory system from 88 to 75; as against which old age showed an increase from 14 to 21. Although local diseases caused exactly the same number of deaths in the last as in the preceding month, several fluctuations occurred in the various diseases embraced therein; thus, deaths from diseases of the nervous system fell off by 9, of the circulatory system by 14, and of the respiratory system by 13; but these decreases were counterbalanced by an increase of 36 under diseases of the digestive system. The mortality from childbirth (including puerperal fever) continues to be abnormally high, although there were 4 deaths fewer in the month under notice than in the previous one; the total number of such deaths since the commencement of the year was 37, or 8 per month.

The following is a statement of the deaths set down to influenza and diphtheria in each month of the years 1890 to 1894, and the first eleven months of 1895, from which may be traced the rise and fall of the mortality at various periods of the year:—

NOTE.—During the third quarter of 1895 the registered births numbered 8,578, and the registered deaths 3,887; the former exceeding the latter by 4,691, or by 121 per cent. As compared with the corresponding quarter of the previous year, the births were fewer by 84, but the deaths more numerous by 269.

The recorded arrivals by sea during the quarter numbered 15,266, but the recorded departures as many as 16,840, resulting in an apparent net loss by emigration of 1,574. Adding to this an estimate for unrecorded departures, viz., 1,486; the total actual loss will be found to have been 3,060; which was not so large as in the corresponding quarter of 1894 by 532.

The net increase of population during the quarter was 1,631, made up of a gain of 1,692 females, less a loss of 61 males; as compared with a net increase in the corresponding quarter of the previous year of only 1,447.

One result of the emigration now taking place is to disturb the age distribution of the people; thus, the following are approximately the losses by emigration at different ages during the quarter under review:—Infants under 1 year—63 males and 50 females; children aged 1 to 12—males 256, females 40; persons aged 12 or upwards—males 1,904, females 747.

The records for the quarter show a balance in favour of immigration from New South Wales and Queensland of 853, Tasmania of 572, and South Australia of 20; but a balance in favour of emigration to Western Australia of 2,465, New Zealand and South Seas of 130, to the United Kingdom of 47, and to foreign ports of 377. The net emigration to Western Australia was less by 173 than in the corresponding quarter of 1894; the total who left for that colony since the beginning of the current year was 6,250, whereas in the previous twelve months it was 10,145.

From the date of the Census (5th April, 1891) the allowance for unrecorded departures has been 29,777, viz., 23,165 of males

and 6,612 of females. Had no such allowance been made, the apparent population at the end of September would have been 1,211,451, viz., 628,917 males and 582,534 females.

All ships and boats should be kept at a distance of at least 800 yards to the left and 1 mile to the right of the line of fire for a distance of 6,000 yards from the battery, in accordance with Orders in Council dated 10th March, 1887.

HEALESVILLE WATERWORKS TRUST.—RATING
REGULATION FOR THE YEAR 1896.

IN pursuance of the powers conferred by the *Water Act 1890*, the Commissioners of the Healesville Waterworks Trust hereby make the following Regulation:—

The following are the rates and charges which the owners or occupiers of lands and tenements liable to be rated within the Waterworks District of the said Trust shall pay for the year 1896 in respect of water supplied by the Trust:—

1. For every house or tenement of the annual municipal value of Twenty pounds or under, the sum of Twenty shillings.
2. For every house or tenement above the annual municipal value of Twenty pounds, the sum of One shilling in the pound sterling.
3. The rate to be paid in respect of vacant or unoccupied township or subdivisional allotments shall be Sixpence in the pound sterling of the annual municipal value, provided that no rate of less than Ten shillings shall be made.
4. Water supplied for other than domestic use shall be by measure or by special agreement, and shall be charged for at the rate of Ninepence per 1,000 gallons, or such price as may be specially agreed upon. The minimum quantity of water to be charged for shall be 20,000 per half-year, or a quantity which, at the price mentioned, would be equivalent to the quantity of water which the owner or occupier would be entitled to receive according to his assessed rate for the year if supplied otherwise than by measure.

The rates and charges herein mentioned are hereby made payable half-yearly in advance, on the 1st day of January and the

1st day of July; and such person or persons as the Commissioners of the said Trust may from time to time appoint for that purpose are hereby authorized to collect and recover the said rates and charges.

The foregoing Regulation was made and passed by the Commissioners of the Healesville Waterworks Trust this 28th day of October, 1895, and the seal of the Trust was hereunto affixed in the presence of—

TATURA WATERWORKS TRUST.—REGULATION
No. 2.

THE Chairman and Commissioners of the Tatura Waterworks Trust, the Waterworks District of which has been proclaimed an Urban District for the purposes of the *Water Act 1890*, do hereby, in pursuance of the powers conferred by the said Act, make the following Regulation:—

1. For water supplied by the Trust by measurement (except in cases of special agreement with the Trust) a charge of One shilling and fourpence for every 1,000 gallons shall be made.
2. The minimum quantity of water to be charged for in each case when water is supplied by measure shall be:—
 - (a) If for domestic and other than domestic purposes, the quantity for which the charge at One shilling and fourpence per 1,000 gallons would be equal to the amount of the assessed rate which would be payable for the premises so supplied if supplied otherwise than by measure.
 - (b) That all water used over and above the amount allowed by the rate at One shilling and fourpence per 1,000 gallons to be paid for at the end of each half-year.
3. No hose or pipe is to be applied to any pipes or taps for the purpose of watering the ground, or trees, or plants, or washing house walls, or carriages, or for any similar purpose, unless the water is charged for by measure and supplied through a meter.
4. Any person receiving water from the Trust who shall take and carry away such water from the premises, or who shall allow any person to carry or take away any such water, or shall sell the same to any other person, shall be liable to a penalty.
5. The service pipes for conveying water from the pipes of the Trust into the premises of consumers shall in no case exceed the following diameters:—

For the domestic supply of premises not exceeding Twenty pounds annual municipal value, $\frac{1}{2}$ -in. diameter; for the domestic supply of premises exceeding Twenty pounds annual municipal value, $\frac{3}{4}$ -in. diameter; and for all supplies by meter, such diameter as the Trust shall authorize in each case.

6. The Trust may contract with any owner or occupier of any lands or tenements who is entitled to be supplied with water from its works, or who is desirous of being so supplied, for the provision and laying of a service pipe from the pipes of the Trust to the boundary of such land or tenement abutting on the street or road in which are pipes of the Trust.
7. No person shall connect any service pipe or branch service pipe with any steam boiler for the purpose of feeding or supplying the same with water without first affixing a self-acting valve for preventing the pressure of the steam reversing or affecting the dial of the meter.

8. Overflow pipes to private baths will not be permitted.
9. Water-closets will not be allowed to be supplied direct from the main, but from a cistern only, so constructed that the water cannot flow continuously, and that not more than two gallons can escape at each flush.

10. No meter shall be affixed unless the same shall have been submitted to and approved by the Trust or by such officer as may be appointed for that purpose; and that no meter shall be removed without giving six days' notice to the Trust.

11. If any person supplied with water by the Trust does, or causes or permits to be done, anything in contravention of these Regulations, or fails to pay his rates or any lawful charge imposed by the Trust, when due, or fails to do anything which under any of these Regulations ought to be done, or wilfully or negligently allows water to run to waste, the Trust may cut off the supply of water from the premises of such person, either by cutting the pipes by or through which water is supplied, or otherwise, and may cause to supply him with water so long as the cause of complaint remains or is not remedied.

12. The water supplied in the Waterworks District of the Trust shall be received and consumed under and in accordance with these Regulations, and not otherwise, through pipes and meters laid, placed, and being under and in accordance with the said Regulations, and not otherwise.

13. No person other than a plumber licensed by the Trust will be permitted to tap or in any way interfere with any main, the property of the Trust. The fee for a plumber's licence shall be One pound per annum.

14. Any person infringing against any of these Regulations shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding Five pounds.

15. In the construction of these Regulations the word "person" shall be deemed to extend to and include a corporation, whether aggregate or sole; and the word "Trust" shall mean the Tatura Waterworks Trust.

DONALD WATERWORKS TRUST.—REGULATION
No. 1.

THE Commissioners of the Donald Waterworks Trust, in pursuance of the powers conferred by section 122 of the *Water Act 1890*, do make the following Regulation No. 1 for determining Rates to be paid for the supply of water for other than domestic use, for preventing waste of water, and for other purposes in connexion with water supply in the Urban District of Donald:—

1. A supply of water for domestic purposes shall not include a supply of water to any livery or carriers' stables, or a supply for any manufacturing purpose, or for irrigation (which shall mean any mechanical or artificial contrivance for conveying water to the roots of plants without labour) or for water-power, or for fountains, or for any ornamental purpose; no hose or pipe is to be applied to any pipes or taps for the purpose of watering the ground, or trees, or plants, or washing the house walls, or carriage, or for any similar purpose, unless the water is charged by meter. Syphons will not be allowed unless the water is supplied by measure.

2. The charges for water supplied by measure, except in cases of special agreement with the Trust, shall be at the rate of Two shillings per 1,000 gallons; and the minimum quantity of water to be charged for, to all owners or occupiers of gardens and lawns or other lands where water is supplied by the Trust for the purpose of irrigation or for ornamental purposes, shall be as follows:—

- (a) One-sixteenth of an acre and less, per annum 8,000 gallons.
- (b) Exceeding one-sixteenth of an acre, but not exceeding one-eighth of an acre, per annum 12,000 gallons.
- (c) Exceeding one-eighth of an acre, but not exceeding one-quarter of an acre, per annum 16,000 gallons.
- (d) Exceeding one-quarter of an acre, but not exceeding half an acre, per annum 28,000 gallons.
- (e) Exceeding half an acre, but not exceeding one acre, per annum 40,000 gallons.
- (f) And at a rate of 40,000 gallons per acre for every additional acre, and proportionately according to the foregoing scale for every fractional part of an acre.
- (g) In livery and carriers' stables supplied by the Trust with water by measurement, the minimum quantity to be charged for shall be 2,000 gallons per stall used for stabling horses. In open sheds used for the above purposes each space of 5 feet shall be charged for as a stall.

3. For every water-trough not exceeding 12 feet in length supplied with water by the Trust, the sum of Two pounds per annum, and for every additional 5 feet or fractional part thereof in length of such trough, a further sum of One pound per annum.

4. Every trough situated in a paddock shall be supplied through a meter affixed by the consumer according to the directions of the Trust, provided nevertheless that the minimum charge for the water supplied to such trough shall not be less than the charge made for troughs supplied under the preceding clause.

5. For every steam boiler supplied with water from the works of the Trust, One pound per annum on each inch of the diameter of the cylinder.

6. The minimum quantity of water to be charged for in each case (except in the cases of special agreement with the Trust), where water is supplied by measure for domestic and other than domestic purposes, shall be the quantity for which the charge at Two shillings per 1,000 gallons would be equal to the amount of the assessed water rate, payable in respect of the premises so supplied otherwise than by measure. In all cases where water is supplied for other than domestic purposes solely, not otherwise provided for in this regulation, the minimum quantity to be charged for half-yearly shall be 5,000 gallons.

7. The charges for water supplied under special agreement, or by meter or measure, shall be paid monthly or as may be agreed upon.

8. Any person receiving water from the Trust who shall take and carry away such water from his premises, or who shall allow any person to take or carry away such water, or shall sell the same to any other person, shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding Five pounds.

9. Any person not having agreed to be supplied by the Trust who shall take or carry away water from any drinking tap, trough, or private or public service-pipe, shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding Five pounds.

10. The Trust may cause a meter or meters to be affixed in any case where they may consider it necessary, such meter or meters to be provided and fixed at the expense of the consumer, and the water supplied to be charged for by measurement at the aforesaid rate. No meter shall be fixed unless the dial of the same is capable of registering 1,000,000 gallons.

11. No person shall lay any pipe to communicate with the pipes of the Trust, without giving two days' notice of the day and hour when such pipe is intended to be made to communicate with the pipes of the Trust, nor shall make any such communication, except under the superintendence and according to the directions of a duly authorized officer of the Trust appointed for the purpose, and any person committing a breach of this regulation shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding Five pounds for every such breach.

12. The Trust may contract with any owner or occupier of any lands or tenements who is entitled to be supplied with water from its works, or who is desirous of being supplied for the provision and laying of a service-pipe from the pipes of the Trust to the boundary of such land or tenement abutting upon the street or road in which are pipes of the Trust.

13. No person supplied with water by the Trust shall wilfully or negligently allow the same to run to waste, and any person committing a breach of this regulation shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding Five pounds for such breach.

14. No person shall connect any service or branch service-pipe with any steam boiler for the purpose of feeding or supplying same with water, without first affixing a self-acting valve for preventing the pressure of steam reversing or affecting the dial of the meter, under a penalty of Five pounds, and in the event of continuing the offence, to a penalty of Two pounds for each day after notice from the Trust.

15. Overflow pipes to private baths will not be permitted.

16. No person shall affix any service-pipe to any pipe of the Trust, or alter or repair or in any manner interfere with any pipe of the Trust until he shall have obtained from the Trust a licence in that behalf to execute such works, and any unlicensed person affixing, altering, or repairing, or in any manner interfering with any such pipe, service-pipe, fitting or cock, or fitting aforesaid, shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding Ten pounds.

17. Before any such licence shall be granted by the Trust, the person applying for same shall satisfy the Trust that he is a competent plumber. The Trust shall have the power of cancelling the licence at any time. All persons so licensed shall conform to such conditions as are specified on such licence.

18. Any person, whether licensed or not, who shall offend by opening any ground so as to uncover any pipe or pipes the property of the Trust without giving two days' notice to the Trust of his intention so to do, or who shall in any way tamper with or alter any pipe the property of the Trust, without the permission of the Trust, in writing, being first obtained, or who shall wilfully or carelessly break, injure, or open any lock, cock, valve, pipe, work, or engine the property of the Trust, shall be liable for each such offence to a penalty not exceeding Twenty pounds.

19. If any person shall neglect to repair any service-pipe conveying water from the pipes of the Trust into the premises of such person, after having received notice from any officer of the Trust that such service-pipe requires repairing, the Trust may stop the water from flowing into such premises either by cutting off the service pipes or otherwise as the Trust may deem fit, unless the necessary repair has been effected. The service-pipes from the main being the property of the owner or occupiers of the tenements supplied by such service-pipes, the occupier, if any, and if none, the owner shall in every instance in which any damage shall be caused by reason of such service-pipe being leaky or otherwise out of repair or broken, be liable to a penalty not exceeding Five pounds, and in the event of continuing the offence, to a further penalty of Two pounds for each day after notice of the offence from the Trust.

20. Before any licensed person shall break up any footpath for the purpose of laying on water from the main to any house or premises, he shall deposit with the Trust the sum of Two pounds, and in case he shall not immediately after laying on the water as aforesaid make good and restore the said footpath to the satisfaction of the Trust, then the said sum of Two pounds shall be absolutely forfeited to the Trust, which shall be at liberty to expend the same in making good and restoring the said footpath or otherwise as to the Trust may seem best.

21. Any person watering any street or footpath by means of a hose, except under the direction of the officers of the Trust, shall be liable to a penalty of Two pounds for each offence.

22. If any person supplied with water by the Trust, does or causes, or permits to be done, anything in contravention of these regulations, or fails to pay his rates or any lawful charge imposed by the Trust when due, or fails to do anything which under any of these regulations ought to be done, or wilfully or negligently allows water to run to waste, the Trust may cut off the supply of water from the premises of such person, either by cutting the pipes by or through which water is supplied or otherwise, and may cease to supply him with water so long as the cause of complaint remains or is not remedied.

23. The water supplied in the waterworks district of the Trust shall be received and consumed under and in accordance with these regulations, and not otherwise through pipes and meter laid, placed, and being in accordance with the said regulations and not otherwise.

24. In the construction of these regulations the word "Trust" shall mean the Donald Waterworks Trust.

The foregoing Regulation No. 1 was made by the Commissioners of the Donald Waterworks Trust this 7th day of November, 1895.

REGULATIONS FOR 1896.**

THE Commissioners of the Nhill Waterworks Trust, in pursuance of the powers conferred by the *Water Act 1890*, do hereby make the following Regulations:—

The following are the rates and charges which the owners and occupiers of lands and tenements shall pay in respect of water supplied by this Trust within the Nhill Waterworks Trust District, that is to say:—

1. For every house or tenement used either wholly or partly as a domicile of Eleven pounds sterling annual value or under, the sum of One pound per annum.
2. For every house or tenement used either wholly or partly as a domicile of more than Eleven pounds annual value, an amount equal to One shilling and ninepence in the pound on the amount of the municipal valuation.
3. For all tenements in the said district situate otherwise than on streets in which the pipes for the supply of water have been laid down, and which tenements are not supplied with water by reticulation from such pipes, and being within a quarter of a mile of any stand-pipe for the supply of water, one-half of the before-mentioned rates; and where such tenements are over a quarter of a mile from such stand-pipe and within half-a-mile thereof, one-fourth of the before-mentioned rates.
4. For every steam boiler supplied with water from the works of the Trust, One pound per annum on each inch diameter of the cylinder.
5. For water supplied by the Trust by measurement, One shilling and sixpence per 1,000 gallons (or at such price as may be specially agreed upon). And the minimum quantity of water to be charged for to all owners or occupiers of gardens and lawns, or other lands where water is supplied by the Trust for the purpose of irrigation or ornamental purposes, shall be as follows:—

- One-sixteenth of an acre or less, per annum, 8,000 gallons.
- Exceeding one-sixteenth of an acre, but not exceeding one-eighth of an acre, per annum, 12,000 gallons.
- Exceeding one-eighth of an acre, but not exceeding one-quarter of an acre, per annum, 16,000 gallons.
- Exceeding one-quarter of an acre, but not exceeding half-an-acre, per annum, 28,000 gallons.
- Exceeding half-an-acre, but not exceeding one acre, per annum, 40,000 gallons per acre. For every additional acre and proportionately, according to the foregoing scale, for every fractional part of an acre.

That the before-mentioned rate is made for one year, commencing on the 1st day of January, 1896, and ending on the 31st day of December, 1896, and shall be payable half-yearly in advance, on the 1st day of January, 1896, and the 1st day of July, 1896.

Such person or persons as the Commissioners of the Trust may from time to time appoint for that purpose shall be authorized to demand and receive and collect and recover the said rate.

REGULATION No. 7.

A Regulation of the Shire of Winchelsea Waterworks Trust, made under the *Water Act 1890*, for the purpose of imposing, levying, and receiving a rate.

IN pursuance of the powers granted and conferred by the *Water Act 1890*, the Commissioners of the Shire of Winchelsea Waterworks Trust make the following Regulation:—

A rate of One shilling and sixpence in the pound sterling shall be imposed and levied on all the rateable property in the Waterworks District of the Shire of Winchelsea Waterworks Trust, according to the valuation for the time being of all lands and tenements for the municipal rate of the shire of Winchelsea, in which such lands and tenements are situated, for one year, commencing on the 1st day of January, 1896, and ending on the 31st day of December, 1896; provided that the sum of Ten shillings shall be the minimum amount of rates to be paid annually by every owner or occupier of any such lands or tenements.

Such rate shall be payable and collected in two equal portions or instalments of Ninepence each, and the first portion or instalment shall be due and payable on the 1st day of January, 1896, and the second portion or instalment shall be due and payable on the 1st day of July, 1896.

Such person as the Commissioners of the Shire of Winchelsea Waterworks Trust may from time to time appoint for that purpose shall be authorized to demand and receive, collect, and recover the said rate.

RATING REGULATION FOR 1896, No. 1.**

THE following are the rates and charges which the owners or occupiers of lands and tenements liable to be rated shall pay for the year 1896 in respect of water supplied by the Bet Bet Shire Waterworks Trust within the district supplied by water as described in the *Government Gazette* of 24th December, 1886, viz., the township of Bealiba, that is to say:—

1. For every house or tenement of Twenty pounds annual municipal value or under, the sum of One pound sterling.
2. For every house or tenement of Twenty-one pounds annual municipal value or upwards, an amount of One shilling in the pound per annum upon the annual municipal value of such property.

That the before-mentioned rate shall be payable in advance, on the 1st day of January, 1896, and shall be for domestic purposes only.

Such person or persons as the Commissioners of the Bet Bet Shire Waterworks Trust may from time to time appoint for that purpose shall be authorized to demand, receive, collect, and recover the said rate.

RATING REGULATION FOR 1896, No. 2.

THE following are the rates and charges which the owners or occupiers of lands and tenements shall pay in respect of water supplied by the Bet Bet Shire Waterworks Trust within the said Trust District (excepting those supplied by pipe in the township of Bealiba) as described in the *Government Gazette* of 20th December, 1889, viz., the whole of the said Waterworks Trust District, that is to say:—

BOROUGH ECHUCA WATER TRUST.
RATING REGULATION FOR 1895.—No. 11.

THE Commissioners of the Borough Echuca Water Trust do hereby, pursuant to and in exercise and execution of the powers and authorities conferred by the *Water Act 1890*, make the following Regulation, viz.—

1. The rates and charges hereinafter specified are those which the owners or occupiers of lands and tenements liable to be rated within the Waterworks District of the Borough Echuca Water Trust shall pay for the year 1895. Such rates and charges shall be due and payable on the 24th December, 1895.
2. On every house or tenement of the annual value of Twenty-five pounds or under, the sum of Twenty-five shillings.
3. On every house or tenement above the annual value of Twenty-five pounds, in addition to the Twenty-five shillings named in clause 2, a sum of Four pounds per centum for every pound annual value from Twenty-six pounds to One hundred pounds inclusive, and a sum of Three pounds per centum for every pound annual value from One hundred pounds upwards.
4. On every shop or place of business not used wholly or partly as a domicile, a sum of Three pounds per centum on the annual value. The minimum charge under this clause will be Twenty-five shillings.
5. On every hotel, a sum of Five pounds per centum on the annual value up to One hundred and fifty pounds, and for every pound annual value from One hundred and fifty pounds upwards, a sum of Three pounds per centum.
6. On every cordial or aerated water factory or other factory using water, a sum of Seven pounds ten shillings per annum; on every flour-mill, a sum of Fifteen pounds per annum; and on every livery-stable, a sum of Seven pounds ten shillings per annum.
7. On every steam-engine, a charge of Twenty shillings; not to include any steam-engine working any factory or mill named in clause 6.
8. On every horse-trough, a sum of Ten shillings.
9. The charge for every private house shall include one-quarter acre of land. Should any larger quantity of land be attached to a private house an extra charge of Ten shillings for cultivated land and Two shillings and sixpence for uncultivated land shall be paid for every quarter of an acre or part of a quarter of an acre.
10. For a temporary supply of water during the erection of new buildings, Ten shillings per centum on the amount of contract for stonework, brickwork, and plastering, or, if there be no contract, then upon the value of or the amount charged or paid for such stonework, brickwork, and plastering. All persons about to build must notify the Trust.
11. On every house, tenement, hotel, factory, &c., not supplied with water, a charge of Two pounds ten shillings per centum on the annual value of the same shall be paid. The minimum charge under this clause will be Twelve shillings and sixpence.
12. On each allotment or piece of land rated separately from any tenement, a charge of Two pounds ten shillings per centum on the annual value of the same, provided that no allotment or piece of land shall be charged less than Two shillings and sixpence.
13. Any owner or occupier of property wishing to have the water turned off, by giving due notice in writing, will be charged at the minimum rate as provided for in clause 11, such minimum rate to take effect after the expiration of the quarter then current.
14. The charge for water supplied to market gardens and nurseries from which produce is sold shall be One shilling per thousand (1,000) gallons; such supply to be in every case by or through a meter to be provided and affixed by the consumer and approved by the Trust, provided that the charges under this clause shall not be less than those hereinbefore made. The water supply may be cut off if the charges are not paid punctually when due. A 1-in. service pipe may be allowed.
15. The charge for water supplied from the Trust's stand-pipes shall be Three shillings per thousand (1,000) gallons.
16. Such person or persons as the Commissioners of the said Trust may from time to time appoint for that purpose are hereby authorized to collect and recover the said rates and charges.
17. In the construction of this Regulation the word "person" shall be deemed to extend to and include a corporation or company, whether aggregate or sole; and the words "annual value" shall mean the municipal annual valuation in force on the 1st January, 1895; and the word "Trust" shall mean the Borough Echuca Water Trust.

RATING REGULATION FOR 1896.—No. 12.

THE Commissioners of the Borough Echuca Water Trust do hereby, pursuant to and in exercise and execution of the powers and authorities conferred by the *Water Act 1890*, make the following Regulation, viz.—

1. The rates and charges hereinafter specified are those which the owners or occupiers of lands and tenements liable to be rated within the Waterworks District of the Borough Echuca Water Trust shall pay for the year 1896. Such rates and charges shall be due and payable in advance, in four equal instalments, on the 1st January, 1st April, 1st July, and 1st October in such year.
2. On every house or tenement of the annual value of Twenty-five pounds or under, a sum of Twenty-five shillings.

3. On every house or tenement above the annual value of Twenty-five pounds, in addition to the Twenty-five shillings named in clause 2, a sum of Four pounds per centum for every pound annual value from Twenty-six pounds to One hundred pounds inclusive, and a sum of Three pounds per centum for every pound annual value from One hundred pounds upwards.
4. On every shop or place of business not used wholly or partly as a domicile, a sum of Three pounds per centum on the annual value. The minimum rate under this clause to be Twenty-five shillings.
5. On every hotel, a sum of Five pounds per centum on the annual value up to One hundred and fifty pounds, and for every pound annual value from One hundred and fifty pounds upwards, a sum of Three pounds per centum.
6. On every cordial or aerated water factory or other factory using water, a charge of Seven pounds ten shillings; on every flour-mill, a charge of Fifteen pounds; and on every livery-stable, a charge of Seven pounds ten shillings.
7. On every steam-engine, a charge of Twenty shillings; not to include any steam-engine working any factory or mill named in clause 6.
8. On every horse-trough, a charge of Twenty shillings.
9. The area of land allowed for every private house shall be one quarter of an acre. Should any larger quantity of land be attached to a private house, an extra charge of Ten shillings for cultivated land and Two shillings and sixpence for uncultivated land shall be paid for every quarter of an acre or part of a quarter of an acre.
10. For a temporary supply of water during the erection of new buildings, Ten shillings per centum on the amount of contract for stonework, brickwork, and plastering; or, if there be no contract, then upon the value of or the amount charged or paid for such stonework, brickwork, and plastering. All persons about to build must notify the Trust.

Cases where water is not laid on.

11. On every house, tenement, hotel, factory, &c., not supplied with water by the Trust, a charge of Two pounds ten shillings per centum on the annual value of the same shall be paid. The minimum charge under this clause to be Twelve shillings and sixpence.
12. On each allotment or piece of land rated separately from any tenement a charge of Two pounds ten shillings per centum on the annual value of the same, provided that no allotment or piece of land shall be charged less than Two shillings and sixpence.
13. Any owner or occupier of property supplied with water by the Trust, who wishes to be charged at the minimum rate as provided for in clause 11, must give notice in writing to the Trust secretary. The water will then be turned off, and the minimum rate will take effect after the expiration of the quarter then current. No allowance will be made unless the water has been turned off for a full quarter.

Water supplied by measure.

14. The charge for water supplied to market gardens and nurseries from which produce is sold shall be One shilling per thousand (1,000) gallons; such supply to be in every case by or through a meter which may either be provided and affixed by the consumer, after approval of the Trust, or the Trust may provide and affix same, and charge a rental of One shilling and sixpence per quarter. The minimum quantity of water to be charged for under this clause shall be twenty thousand (20,000) gallons. A 1-in. service-pipe may be allowed.
 15. The Trust may require meters to be used in any case where it is deemed necessary. In any such case the provisions of clause 14 shall apply.
 16. The Trust will not in any way be held liable to supply water under clauses 14 and 15, until all consumers are supplied for domestic purposes.
 17. The charge for water supplied from the Trust's stand-pipes shall be Sixpence for each two hundred (200) gallons.
 18. In any case where rates and charges are six months in arrears, or where the meter charges are not paid when due, the water may be cut off until such amounts are paid.
 19. Such person or persons as the Commissioners of the said Trust may from time to time appoint for that purpose are hereby authorized to collect and recover the said rates and charges.
 20. In the construction of this Regulation the word "person" shall be deemed to extend to and include a corporation or company, whether aggregate or sole; the words "annual value" shall mean the municipal annual valuation in force on the 1st January, 1896; and the word "Trust" shall mean the Borough Echuca Water Trust.

REGULATION No. 13.

THE Commissioners of the Borough Echuca Water Trust do hereby, pursuant to and in exercise and execution of the powers and authorities conferred by the *Water Act 1890*, make the following Regulation, viz.—

1. Any person supplied with water by the Trust (except by meter) who shall, between the hours of Seven o'clock a.m. and Six o'clock p.m., use the water of the Trust for the purpose of watering the ground, trees, or plants by means of hose, pipe,

or drain (except with the written authority of the Trust), or who shall cause or suffer the water to be so used, shall be liable to a fine not exceeding Five pounds for the first offence, and for any subsequent such offence to a further penalty not exceeding One pound for every day on which such offence is repeated or continued after notice of the offence from the said Trust.

2. Any person supplied with water by the Trust who shall wilfully or negligently allow the same to run to waste, or who shall use the same in earthen drains for irrigation purposes (except where the supply is by meter), shall be liable for each offence to a penalty not exceeding Five pounds.

3. If any person supplied with water by the Trust does, or cause to be done, anything in contravention of this Regulation, or fails to pay his or her rates when due, or fails to do anything which under this Regulation ought to be done for the prevention of the waste, misuse, undue consumption, or contamination of the water, or wilfully or negligently allows the water to run to waste, the Trust may cut off the water supply from the premises of such person by cutting the pipes by or through which the water is supplied, and may discontinue the supply so long as the cause or injury remains, or is not remedied to the satisfaction of the Trust.

4. Any person supplied with water by the Trust, when the supply is not by measure, who shall allow any person to take or carry away such water, or shall sell the same to any other person (except with the written authority of the Trust), shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding Five pounds.

5. Any person not having agreed to be supplied by the Trust, who shall take or carry water away from any public or private service-pipe, shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding Five pounds.

6. Before any person shall affix any service-pipe to any pipe of the Trust, or alter or repair, or in any manner interfere with any service-pipe, cock, or fitting connected with the pipes of the Trust, he shall obtain from the Trust a licence in that behalf to execute such works, and any unlicensed person affixing, altering, or repairing, or in any manner interfering with such pipe, service-pipe, cock, or fitting, as aforesaid, shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding Five pounds.

7. Any person, whether licensed as aforesaid or not, who shall offend by opening any ground so as to uncover any pipe or pipes the property of the Trust, without giving at the least twelve hours' written notice to the Trust secretary, or who shall in any way tamper with or alter any pipe, the property of the Trust, without the permission of the Trust, in writing, being first obtained, or who shall wilfully or carelessly break, injure, or open any lock, cock, valve-pipe, work, or engine, the property of the Trust, shall be liable for such offence to a penalty not exceeding Five pounds.

8. Only one service-pipe connexion with the Trust's mains will be allowed to each house or tenement, each house or tenement to have a separate service-pipe. Stand-pipes will not be allowed of a less height than 2 feet above the ground. Any person acting in contravention of this clause (except with the written authority of the Trust) shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding Five pounds; and any licensed person, as aforesaid, so acting shall be liable to have his licence cancelled.

9. All horse-troughs to be fitted with ball-cocks (self-acting), and to be enclosed in a proper box under lock and key.

10. In all cases not herein provided for the Trust may make such special provisions as may be deemed necessary.

11. In the construction of this Regulation the word "person" shall be deemed to extend to and include a corporation or company, whether aggregate or sole, and the word "Trust" shall mean the Borough Echuca Water Trust.

MARYBOROUGH WATERWORKS TRUST.— RATING REGULATION FOR 1896.

THE Chairman and Commissioners of the Maryborough Waterworks Trust, the Waterworks District of which has been proclaimed an Urban District for the purpose of the *Water Act 1890*, do hereby, pursuant to and in exercise of the powers and authorities conferred by the said Act, make the following Regulation, viz.:—

REGULATION No. 16.

The following are the rates and charges which the owners or occupiers of lands and tenements liable to be rated shall pay for the year 1896 in respect of water supplied by the Trust within the said Urban District.

1. For every house or tenement of Twenty pounds annual municipal value or under, the sum of One pound sterling.
2. For every house or tenement of Twenty-one pounds annual municipal value and upwards, an amount of five per cent. per annum upon the annual municipal value of such property.
3. For every house or tenement not being used as a domicile of Twenty pounds annual municipal value or under, the sum of One pound sterling.
4. For every house or tenement not being used as a domicile of Twenty-one pounds annual municipal value and upwards, an amount of four per cent. on the annual municipal value of such property, provided that in any case the rate shall not be less than the sum of One pound sterling.

5. For every unoccupied piece or allotment of land of Twenty pounds annual municipal value or under, the sum of One pound sterling.

6. For every unoccupied piece or allotment of land of Twenty-one pounds annual municipal value or upwards, an amount equal to four per cent. per annum on the annual municipal value of such piece or allotment of land, provided that in any case the rate shall not be less than the sum of One pound sterling.

7. For every water-trough, Twelve shillings per annum will be charged, and the minimum quantity of water to be charged for to all owners or occupiers of troughs supplied through a meter shall be 12,000 gallons.

8. For water supplied by the Trust by measurement, One shilling per 1,000 gallons (or at such price as may be specially agreed upon), and the minimum quantity of water to be charged to all owners or occupiers of gardens (except market gardens) and lawns, or other lands where water is supplied by the Trust by measurement, for the purpose of irrigation or for ornamental purposes, shall be as follows:—

Exceeding one-quarter of an acre, but not exceeding half-an-acre, per annum, 40,000 gallons; exceeding half-an-acre, but not exceeding one acre, per annum, 60,000 gallons; for every additional acre, and proportionately according to the foregoing scale for any fractional part of an acre.

In livery, bait, and carriers' stables supplied by the Trust with water by measurement the minimum quantity to be charged for shall be 5,000 gallons per stall used for stabling horses. In open sheds used for the above purposes each space of 5 feet shall be charged for as a stall.

9. The minimum quantity of water to be charged for by meter where water is supplied for domestic purposes as well as for purposes other than domestic shall be the quantity which, at One shilling per 1,000 gallons (or Sixpence per 1,000 gallons for market gardens), equals the amount of the assessed rate which would be payable for the premises so supplied if supplied otherwise than by measure.

10. The Trust will, if it so think fit, but not otherwise, let for hire water meters, the rent for which shall be at the rate of Five shillings each per annum, which rent shall be exclusive of and in addition to the amount of rate chargeable for the recorded consumption of water, and shall be due and must be paid half-yearly, in advance, on the 1st day of January and the 1st day of July in each year.

11. For a temporary supply during the erection of new buildings, Ten shillings per cent. on the amount of contract for stonework, brickwork, and plastering; or, if there be no contract thereupon, the value of or the amount charged or paid for such stonework, brickwork, or plastering.

12. For water supplied to market gardens the charge shall be Sixpence per 1,000 gallons. The minimum quantity to be charged for shall be 200,000 gallons per acre, and proportionately for every fractional part of an acre. The supply to be by meter only.

13. For water supplied to breweries the charge shall be Ten pounds per annum, in addition to the rate hereby made for a supply for domestic or other purposes.

14. For water supplied to cricket or bowling clubs, One shilling per 1,000 gallons.

15. For every steam boiler supplied with water from the works of the Trust by measurement the charge shall be One shilling per 1,000 gallons, and the minimum quantity of water to be charged for shall be 10,000 gallons for each inch of the diameter of the cylinder of the engine.

16. For water supplied to syphon pumps, Twenty shillings each per annum, in addition to the rate hereby made for a supply for domestic or other purposes.

17. For water supplied to private fountains, Twenty shillings each per annum, in addition to the rate hereby made for a supply for domestic or other purposes.

That the before-mentioned rates and charges shall be payable half-yearly, in advance, on the 1st day of January and the 1st day of July, 1896, excepting the charges for water supplied by measure, which shall be paid for quarterly.

Such person or persons as the Commissioners of the Maryborough Waterworks Trust may from time to time appoint for that purpose shall be authorized to demand, receive, collect, and recover the said rates and charges.

A Regulation of the Lancefield Waterworks Trust, made under the *Water Act 1890*, for the purpose of imposing, levying, and receiving a rate.

A rate of One shilling and sixpence in the pound sterling shall be imposed and levied on all the rateable property in the Waterworks District of the Lancefield Waterworks Trust, according to the valuation for the time being of all lands and tenements for the municipal rate of the Shire of Lancefield, in

which such lands and tenements are situated, for one year, commencing on the 1st day of January, 1896, and ending on the 31st day of December, 1896.

Such rate shall be payable and collected in two portions or instalments, and the first portion or instalment of Nineteenpence shall be due and payable on the 2nd day of January, 1896, and the second portion or instalment of Nineteenpence shall be due and payable on the 2nd day of July, 1896.

The minimum rate to be paid for the year 1896, where water is supplied, shall be Twenty shillings.

Such person as the Commissioners of the Lancefield Waterworks Trust may from time to time appoint for that purpose shall be authorized to demand and receive, collect, and recover the said rate.

WIMMERA UNITED WATERWORKS TRUST.— RATING REGULATION.

THE Commissioners of the Wimmera United Waterworks Trust, in pursuance of the powers conferred by section 75 of the *Water Act 1890*, do make the following Regulation:—

No. 51.

Regulation for the making of a rate for the year 1896 on all rateable property in that portion of the Wimmera United Waterworks Trust District, of which notice has been given that the same has been supplied with water under the provisions of the Victorian Water Act, and which notice was published in the *Government Gazette* of 12th March, 1896.

Whereas the Governor in Council has, by an Order made the 17th day of October, 1892, under the provisions of section 100 of the *Water Act 1890*, divided the Wimmera United Waterworks District into divisions, and directed that the necessary rates for paying interest on all moneys borrowed by the Wimmera United Waterworks Trust for the construction and maintenance of their Waterworks, or to meet any other expenses in connexion therewith, shall be levied in such divisions, viz.:—The Shire of St. Arnaud Division, the Shire of Borung Division, the Shire of Kara Kara Division, the Shire of Dunmunkle Division, and the Shire of Stawell Division; and has further directed that such rates be levied differentially as between such several divisions, and that the proportion in which such divisions shall be rated respectively one to another shall be as follows, that is to say:—That the respective ratings in the pound sterling on the annual value of rateable property rated for municipal purposes in the said several divisions shall be:—Shire of St. Arnaud Division, Twenty-four pence; Shire of Borung Division, Twenty-four pence; Shire of Kara Kara Division, Nineteen pence; Shire of Dunmunkle Division, Twenty-four pence; Shire of Stawell Division, Fifteen pence.

And whereas the Governor of the Colony of Victoria, by Proclamation dated 28th June, 1886, proclaimed a certain area in and around the township of Murtoa to be an Urban District under the provisions of *The Victorian Water Conservation Act 1883* (No. 778).

The following rate is made on the annual value of all the rateable property in the said several divisions of the Wimmera United Waterworks District, excepting in the said Urban District of Murtoa, according to the valuation on all such lands and tenements for the municipal rates of the shires of St. Arnaud, Borung, Kara Kara, Dunmunkle, and Stawell respectively, that is to say:—On rateable property within the Shire of St. Arnaud Division, a rate of Twenty-four pence in the pound sterling of such valuation; in the Shire of Borung Division, a rate of Twenty-four pence in the pound sterling of such valuation; in the Shire of Kara Kara Division, a rate of Nineteen pence in the pound sterling of such valuation; in the Shire of Dunmunkle Division, a rate of Twenty-four pence in the pound sterling of such valuation; and in the Shire of Stawell Division, a rate of Fifteen pence in the pound sterling of such valuation.

Such rate is hereby made for the year 1896, commencing on the 1st January, 1896, and terminating on the 31st December, 1896, and shall be payable on the 1st day of January, 1896.

Such person or persons as the Commissioners of the said Trust may from time to time appoint for that purpose shall be authorized to demand and receive the said rates or such portion thereof as they may be appointed to demand and receive.

The inspector shall ascertain from time to time, through the officers of the department under his direction, by visitation or otherwise, the condition and general welfare of the wards of the department boarded out, placed, or apprenticed under section 30, sub-sections 2, 3, 4, and 5 of the *Neglected Children's Act 1890*.

PART XI.

In Regulation No. 109, after the word "resides," the following proviso is added:—

Provided that if there be no clergyman of the denomination of the applicant, or for other cause approved by the secretary, the certificate herein required may be dispensed with.

Sydney excursion tickets will not be available by the express train on the New South Wales line, except on payment of 15s. first class and 10s. second class, and the journey cannot be broken on that line. Adelaide and Brisbane excursion tickets will be available by the express and ordinary trains, and the journey may be broken.

Luggage.—Excursion passengers to and from stations in Victoria will only be allowed to carry such luggage free as can be stowed under the seats without inconvenience to other passengers, and those who have luggage for the van are required to be at the station half-an-hour before the starting time of train. Stamped parcels rates will be charged for it. All luggage should be plainly addressed with the owner's name and the station it is for, and the address should be affixed in such a way that it will not come off.

PROCLAMATION

By His Excellency the Right Honorable Thomas, Baron Brassey, Knight Commander of the Most Honorable Order of the Bath; Governor and Commander-in-Chief in and over the Colony of Victoria and its Dependencies, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS by the *Marong Reserve Mining Act 1895* (59 Vict. By His Excellency the Right Honorable Thomas, Baron Brassey, Knight Commander of the Most Honorable Order of the Bath; Governor and Commander-in-Chief in and over the Colony of Victoria and its Dependencies, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS by the *Land Act 1890* it is amongst other things enacted that the Governor in Council may, by Proclamation to be published in the *Government Gazette*, from time to time increase or diminish the area of land comprised in any of the classes mentioned in section 6 of Part I. of the said Act, except increasing lands which may be sold by auction: And whereas by the *Land Act 1892* it is amongst other things further enacted that where any portion of Crown lands not exceeding twenty acres, and not contiguous or adjacent to any other Crown lands, is so situated as to make it desirable in the opinion of the Governor in Council that the same should be sold, or where any portion of Crown lands not exceeding three acres is required for a site for a church or for any charitable purpose for which land cannot legally be reserved, the Governor in Council may direct the sale of such portion of Crown lands, and for such purpose may increase the area of land described in the Second Schedule to the *Land Act 1890* as lands which may be sold by auction by adding such portion thereto: And whereas by the *Land Act 1893* it is amongst other things further enacted that, notwithstanding anything contained in section 6 of the *Land Act 1890* aforesaid, the Governor in Council may increase the area of land described in the Second Schedule to the said last-mentioned Act as lands which may be sold by auction by adding thereto any portion of the Crown lands described in the said Schedule as Swamp lands: Now therefore I, the Governor of Victoria, by and with the advice of the Executive Council thereof, do hereby increase or diminish (as the case may be) the areas of Crown lands comprised in Classes 2, 3, and 4 of section 6 of the *Land Act 1890* aforesaid to the extent set forth in the subjoined Schedules respectively (that is to say):—

WHEREAS by the Crown Grant issued in favour of the Board of Land and Works and the Mayor, Councillors, and Citizens of the City of Richmond, in respect of Richmond Park, in the said City of Richmond, it is provided and declared that the land thereby granted, and the buildings for the time being thereon, shall be maintained and used as and for a Public Park and Place of Recreation, and offices and conveniences connected therewith, under and in accordance with such Regulations as shall from time to time be made by the Governor or other officer for the time being administering the Government of the Colony of Victoria, with the consent of the Executive Council thereof, and in the meantime under and in accordance with such rules, orders, by-laws, and regulations as shall from time to time be made by the Board of Land and Works and the Mayor, Councillors, and Citizens of the said City of Richmond.

And whereas by section 137 of the *Land Act 1890* it is provided that where any such land has been vested in trustees, or jointly with the Board of Land and Works and trustees, it shall be lawful for the trustees of any such land, with the approval of the Governor in Council, from time to time to make, alter, and rescind rules and regulations for all or any of the purposes mentioned in clause 1 of the said section.

Now therefore the Board of Land and Works and the Council of the City of Richmond do hereby make the Regulation following in respect of the said Richmond Park.

REGULATION.

The undermentioned gentleman shall be a member of the Committee of Management to exercise control over the said Richmond Park:—

Patrick Joseph O'Connor,

in the room of Samuel John Oglesby resigned. Provided nevertheless that the said Patrick Joseph O'Connor shall hold office as a member of the Committee of Management of the said Richmond Park so long only as he may continue a Councillor of the said City of Richmond.

REGULATIONS FOR THE CARE, PROTECTION, AND MANAGEMENT OF THE RESERVE FOR A PUBLIC PARK AND GARDEN, IN THE TOWNSHIP OF CASTLE DONNINGTON.

THE Council of the Shire of Castle Donnington, the duly appointed Committee of Management for the Reserve for a Public Park and Garden in the Township of Castle Donnington, having framed the following Regulations for the care, protection, and management thereof, and for the preservation of good order and decency therein, submit the said Regulations to the Board of Land and Works to be made by such Board in pursuance of the powers conferred by section 136 of the *Land Act 1890*—

REGULATIONS.

1. The reserve shall be open to the public from sunrise to sunset.
 2. No person shall enter or remain in the reserve who may offend against decency as regards dress, language, or conduct.
 3. No person shall damage in any way the trees, shrubs, or flowers in the reserve, nor shall fires be lighted therein.
 4. No person shall climb or jump over the fences or gates, or stick bills thereon, or cut names on the fences or seats, or roll or throw stones in the reserve.
 5. No person shall put in the reserve any cattle, goats, or pigs.
 6. No person shall bring into the reserve any dog, unless led by a chain or cord, without the authority, in writing, of the committee of management.
 7. No person shall erect any dwelling in the reserve, or any booth or other structure for the purpose of offering for sale any article, without the consent, in writing, of the committee of management first obtained.
 8. No person, except labourers and workmen employed in the reserve, shall enter any plots therein which may be enclosed for plantations of young trees or shrubs.
- Every person offending against these Regulations shall, in accordance with section 136 of the *Land Act 1890*, on conviction before any justice, forfeit and pay a penalty not exceeding Five pounds for each offence; and every person who knowingly and wilfully offends against any such Regulations, and who, after he has been warned by any bailiff of Crown lands or any constable, does not desist from so offending, may be forthwith apprehended by such bailiff or constable and taken before some justice of the peace, and shall, on conviction, forfeit and pay a penalty not exceeding Ten pounds.

Alternative tenders are required for white and Algerian oats.

Printed forms of tender and conditions of contract may be obtained from the Secretary, Tender Board, Treasury, Melbourne, or from the officer in charge at any station, by whom also information or explanation will be afforded to persons tendering.

As much forage as can be stored at any station where the storage is small will, for the convenience of the contractor, be ordered at one time.

The price, which must be expressed in words as well as in figures, and without alterations, erasures, or discrepancies, must be per cental of 100 lbs. (net weight), including delivery at the stations, and all charges except the bags, which will remain the property of the contractor. At stations where the bags can be at once emptied the contractor will be required to remove them when delivery is taken. At other stations, notice will be sent to the contractor when the bags are empty. Bags to be removed at contractor's expense.

Tenders, which should be upon the printed form, will be received for either oats, bran, hay, or straw (the particular kind of hay or straw offered to be stated); but if all be included in one tender it may be accepted for one article only, if advisable. Oaten hay will be preferred. If sheaf hay be tendered for, it must be so stated in the tender.

Telegrams or tenders not complying with the terms of advertisement will not be entertained.

The successful tenderer will be required to enter into a bond for one-third of the estimated amount of the contract within ten days after the acceptance is notified. Two approved sureties are required for contracts amounting to £150 and upwards, and one surety for contracts under £150.

Tenderers failing to take up their accepted tenders, or failing to carry out their contract satisfactorily, will be ineligible to again hold contracts for Government supplies.

Tenders must be enclosed in an envelope, marked "Tender for Forage," and deposited in the Tender-Box, Pay Office, Treasury, Melbourne; or, if sent by post, they must be addressed to the Chairman of the Tender Board, Treasury, Melbourne.

The Government will not necessarily accept the lowest or any tender.

The decision of the Government will be made known by *Gazette* notice, and by letter to accepted tenderers.

CONDITIONS OF CONTRACT.

1. The hay to be good, sound, and sweet, and properly trussed, except when otherwise specified in the contract; the straw to be wheaten or oaten, and both to be in all respects of the best quality; oats, white or Algerian (Victorian grown), of the best description of their respective kind, full kernel, clean, and free from wild oats or other objectionable seeds; bran to be sound and sweet, and of the best description; chaff to be made from oaten hay of the best quality; the maize to be of the best quality. The hay tenders must specify whether they are for oaten or wheaten hay.

2. The supplies are for police, telegraph, and other horses, and are to be delivered on the order of the officer in charge of the district or station. The quantities stated in the schedule being only approximate, it must be understood that the Government may draw either more or less than those mentioned; and should new telegraph stations be formed, or additional horses required to be stationed at any of the stations, the contractor will be required to supply the additional forage. Should the additional number of horses, however, exceed two, the contractor may, if he desires it, terminate the contract by supplying at once the whole quantity due at the station under the contract according to the foregoing schedule.

3. Notwithstanding anything contained in the preceding condition, the contractors for the supply to the Police Depot may be called upon to supply any Government Departments within a radius of six miles from Melbourne, for which no contracts have been taken, at the same rates.

4. The forage, when delivered, must be accompanied by the particulars of quantity, showing the net weight, to be indorsed on the back of the order, which, when signed by the officer in charge of the station, for the net quantity received, will be returned to the contractor, and by him rendered in support of his account.

5. Each contractor will be required to prepare his own account in the prescribed form, and, on presentation thereof to the officer in charge of the station or district, it will be forwarded for payment at the Treasury, Melbourne, or the Pay Office of the district, as may be indicated by the contractor on the account.

6. Should forage duly ordered under these contracts not be delivered within forty-eight hours of the time specified in the order for delivery, it will be competent for the department (should circumstances require it) to purchase the same at the risk of the contractor; from whose account any expense over and above the contract price is to be deducted.

7. In the event of a difference of opinion between the contractor and the officer receiving the forage as to the quality of the same, it is to be decided by a board of survey, composed of persons named by the head of the department ordering the supply, and the decision of the Board is to be considered final.

8. If the Board shall decide that the forage is not of proper quality, it must be immediately replaced by the contractor, failing which it will be procured elsewhere, and the extra cost, if any, will be charged as in clause 6.

9. When a board of survey cannot be conveniently assembled, or when, from some other cause, injury would accrue either to the public service or to the contractor by waiting for a board of survey, the officer in charge will have the power to reject such supplies as are obviously of inferior quality, it being understood that he will be responsible to the Government for so doing; and the contractor must take back the rejected forage, and supply good in its stead, failing which it will be obtained by the officer requiring it, and the expense will be charged as in clause 6.

10. A repetition of irregularity in the quantity or quality of the forage, or of the delay in delivering or replacing it when required, or refusal to execute orders, will subject the contractor, upon report from the Tender Board, to such mulct, not exceeding £20, as the Treasurer of the colony for the time being may direct. It will also be in the power of the said Treasurer, upon such repetition, to terminate the contract forthwith.

11. Contractors are not at liberty to transfer their contracts under cover of power-of-attorney, coupled with an interest or otherwise; and no such transfer will be recognised by the Government.

12. Under no circumstances will a contractor be permitted to abandon his contract, and in the event of his failing to carry on his contract he will be held liable for any loss which the Government may sustain in consequence of such failure. In the event of a station being discontinued or any change in the supplies required, the contractor will receive the earliest possible intimation.

13. The contracts entered into under this notice are not to be considered as broken, infringed, or vitiated by the purchase by any Department of forage grown at any Government establishment.

CONVEYANCE OF MAILS, 1896-99.

FIRST DIVISION.—292 SERVICES.

TENDERS are hereby invited, and will be received until Noon on Tuesday, the 21st day of January, 1896, for the Conveyance of Post Office Mails, viz., Letters, Packets, Parcels, and Newspapers, as undermentioned, FOR ONE OR THREE YEARS, from the 1st July, 1896.

1. Tenders are required to be written on a form, printed copies of which may be had gratuitously on application at any post office in the colony, and are to be forwarded (if by post, PREPAID AND REGISTERED) for receipt at the General Post Office by the hour and date first above mentioned, addressed to the Honorable the Postmaster-General, with the words "Tender for Mail Service No. _____" indorsed on the cover, or placed in the Tender-box at the General Post Office.

2. *Tenderers are requested to describe by their numbers, as below, the mail services for which they tender.*

3. *The amount of the tender must be stated AT RATE PER ANNUM in words as well as figures.*

4. Every tender must bear the *bona fide* signature and address of the tenderer, and bear the names of two responsible persons willing to become bound for the fulfilment of the contract in such sum as the Government may direct, not exceeding the gross amount of the contract.

5. Every tender must be accompanied by cash, bank cheque, bank draft, or a bank deposit-receipt to the credit of the Deputy Postmaster-General for a sum equal to TEN PER CENT. of the annual amount named in the tender; this deposit to be absolutely forfeited to the Government in case the person whose tender may be accepted shall fail to complete the usual bond and contract to the satisfaction of the Government within ten days of being notified that the documents are ready for execution. The notice of acceptance, if delivered at the address named in the tender, shall be deemed sufficient.

6. The money or other security deposited by successful tenderers will be returned to them upon application, on the bond and contract being duly signed.

7. The money or other security deposited by unsuccessful tenderers will be returned to them upon application, and on their signing receipts for the respective amounts.

8. In the event of a new line of railway, or a new railway station on an existing line being opened for traffic, and it being decided that the mails shall be conveyed by rail, the Postmaster-General shall have the power of cancelling the contract for any mail service running in the vicinity of the railway without compensation to the contractor, or shall have power to alter the points of arrival and departure of the mails; and, in the event of the travelling distance on any mail line being in such manner increased or diminished, all payments for the service subsequent to the alteration shall be computed on the basis of the average mileage-rate of the contract.

9. In the event of it being found necessary, from any cause, to absolutely cancel a contract, the Postmaster-General shall have full power to do so, provided that, unless the contract be cancelled on account of any fault on the part of the contractor, or on account of the opening of a railway line or a new railway station, payment shall be made to the contractor as compensation of a sum equal to ten per cent. of the moneys which would have become due on the unexpired period of the contract if the latter had been continued for the full term for which it was accepted.

10. Tenderers are requested to state the mode by which they propose to convey mails, whether by vehicle, on horseback, or by man on foot. If by vehicle, the description of vehicle and number of horses by which it is to be drawn to be given.

11. Tenderers are informed that the Department undertakes to carry parcels up to 7 lbs. in weight by all services for which tenders are accepted for conveyance of mails by vehicle.

Parcels up to 3 lbs. in weight are conveyed by horseback services.

12. Tenderers for services to and from Post Offices and Railway Stations are required to name a lump sum per annum for the number of trips specified in the call for tenders, and also state a rate per trip as a basis of payment for additional trips, or for reduction in the payment, should the number of trips be increased or lessened during the currency of the contract.

A "trip" to mean a journey from the Post Office to the Railway Station, and from the Railway Station to the Post Office, *carrying mails each way.*

The carriage of mails one way, viz., either from a Post Office to a Railway Station or from a Railway Station to a Post Office, shall be regarded as half a trip, and payment made accordingly. Where tenders are invited for a service to and from a Post Office and Railway Station "as often as required," tenderers are required to name a lump sum per annum for the work, and such sum shall not be liable to alteration either through increase or diminution in the number of trips.

13. A separate *bona fide* tender must be sent in for each service.

14. The attention of tenderers is drawn to the condition which requires that in cases where vehicles are used, Members of Parliament shall be conveyed free of charge between the districts they represent and the districts in which they reside and Melbourne.

15. The contractor shall not be entitled to claim any extra payment on account of the establishment of any new Post Office, or the removal of any existing Post Office, during the term of his contract, unless such establishment or removal shall increase the distance to be travelled by such contractor on any one day to the extent of one mile.

16. No application for the transfer of a contract will be entertained until a fee has been paid of Ten shillings on a contract not exceeding £50 per annum, and Twenty shillings on a contract above £50 per annum.
