PROTECTORATE OF THE GERMAN NEW GUINEA COMPANY.

THE following translation of an Ordinance and Regulation with regard to commercial dealings and intercourse within the Protectorate of the German New Guinea Company is published for general information.

TRANSLATION.

ORDINANCE for the Protectorate of the German New Guinea Company, regulating the commercial dealings and intercourse of shipmasters not resident in the said Protectorate. The following rules are made under the authority of His Excellency the Chancellor of the Empire:—

ARTICLE 1.

Shipmasters, not resident, but intending to trade within the Protectorate of the German New Guinea Company, either on their own behalf or in the employ of firms not resident within the said Protectorate, have, before starting their commercial operations, to enter one of the ports opened for foreign shipping (Articles 3 and 4 of the *Customs Act* of 30th June, 1888),* and to apply for a trading licence within the said Protectorate. Commercial operations are not to be commenced before the said licence has been granted. The dispositions of this Ordinance extend also to any other person on board any ship, not being master of the same, intending to trade as heretofore explained.

ARTICLE 2.

The said licence is issued by the officer in charge at the port of entry only for a limited district, and for a limited period, and generally for six months. The Captain-General of the Protectorate defines for the time being the districts to be opened for foreign trade (Article 1).

ARTICLE 3.

The fee payable for such licence is charged according to the tonnage of the vessel, viz.:—For vessels of 50 register tons or under, a fee of 150 marks; for vessels of more than 50 tons, for every additional 25 tons or part thereof, an additional fee of 50 marks, but not exceeding 1,000 marks for any vessel. Licences may be issued for a longer term than six months, but not exceeding one year. In such cases the fees are increased in proportion. The dispositions of the Ordinance of 13th January, 1887, permitting the pursuit of certain trades only after obtaining the

consent of the Captain-General, and under observation of the restrictions imposed by him, are to remain in force. However, the Captain-General may in future authorize other officers to grant such licences in his place.

ARTICLE 4.

During the term of the licence—1. Shipmasters may receive permission to export dutiable goods, especially copra purchased from the natives, without being obliged to comply with the formalities imposed by Article 11 of the Customs Ordinance for the Protectorate of the German New Guinea Company of 30th June, 1888, after paying a lump sum of money in place of the export duty. This payment to be additional to the licence-fee (Article 3). 2. In the event of repeated visits to the said Protectorate, shipmasters may be exempted from entering each time one of the ports of entry, provided that they do not import dutiable or prohibited goods. The granting of this favour may be made dependent upon the observation of certain conditions, especially upon the entering into certain engagements, or into a bond assuring the observation of existing Customs Regulations. The directions given by the officer in charge at the port of entry in connexion with the foregoing dispositions have to be inserted in the licence.

ARTICLE 5.

Shipmasters applying for such licence have, at the request of the officer in charge at the port of entry, to allow the perusal of their ship's papers in so far as the perusal of the said papers might be required with regard to the issuing of the licence. If members of the crew or any other person on board a vessel should have any disputes in their dealings with the natives, the shipmaster has to present to the officer in charge who granted his licence, as soon as possible, a detailed report exposing all the circumstances of the case, including a statement of the cause, the facts, and the result of the dispute, and describing with great exactness the locality where it took place. Shipmasters entering the port of residence of the said officer, or meeting him in some other place, have in such cases to lay their log-book before him.

ARTICLE 6.

Shipmasters intending to trade with the natives are only allowed to carry on board such arms and ammunition as by directions of the officer in charge at the port of entry are required for the protection of the vessel and the ship's boats in case of expeditions. Any surplus of arms or ammunition has to be deposited with the said officer in charge until the vessel leaves the said Protectorate. Similar dispositions have to be observed with regard to dynamite, detonators, &c., whereof only such provisions may be carried on board as required for obtaining the supply of fish for the crew.

ARTICLE 7.

Offences against the dispositions of this Ordinance are punishable either by imprisonment for any term not exceeding three months, or by confinement, or by fine not exceeding 3,000 marks, with or without imprisonment. The vessel, including its cargo, is liable for the payment of the fine and the costs of the proceedings, regardless of the ownership.

ARTICLE 8.

Such licence may be forfeited by order of the issuing officer in charge, if there were to appear sufficient proof for suspecting that the master, or the crew, or any other person on board the ship have—1. Either illegally injured or otherwise ill-used any native. 2. Or supplied any native with arms, ammunition, explosives, spirits, or opium, contrary to existing regulations. Besides, in the event of such acts being qualified as crimes or misdemeanours, judicial proceedings are to be instituted. Such licence may also be forfeited if the shipmaster does not comply

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with the regulations of Article 5, alinea 2. The fees, paid or deposited, are not to be refunded, neither totally nor partially, after forfeiting the licence. Appeals with regard to forfeited licences have to be addressed to the Captain-General; however, further proceedings are not interrupted pending the result of such appeal.

ARTICLE 9.

This Ordinance shall come into force on the 1st day of December, 1894.

TRANSLATION.

Regulations made in pursuance of Articles 2 and 3 of the Ordinance of 25th August, 1894, for the Protectorate of the German New Guinea Company with regard to commercial dealings and intercourse of shipmasters not resident within the said Protectorate. In pursuance of the Articles 2 and 3 of the Ordinance of 25th August, 1894, for the Protectorate of the German New Guinea Company with regard to commercial dealings and intercourse of shipmasters not resident within the said Protectorate (*Ordinance Gazette* for 1894, No. 1, page 7-11), I hereby issue the following directions:—

I. The said licence is issued by the officer in charge at the port of entry only for a limited district and for a limited period, and generally for six months. The Captain-General of the Protectorate defines for the time being the districts to be opened for foreign trade (Article 1).

Until further notice the following districts are opened for foreign trade:—A, in the north of the said Protectorate. The northern part of Kaiser Wilhelmsland, extending as far as Cape Croisille in the south, and including the adjacent islands, viz.—The Purdy and Admiralty Groups, St. Matthias, and Squally Island. However, the Hermit, Anchorite, and L'Echiquier Groups are reserved. B, in the south of the said Protectorate. The southern part of Kaiser Wilhelmsland extending as far as Cape Rigny in the north, with the islands of the Vitiaz and Dampier Straits, the principal part of New Pomerania extending as far as Hixon and Henry Road Bay respectively in the east, including the adjacent islands, viz., the islands Choiseul and Ysabel. However, the Gazelle Peninsula, New Mecklenburg, New Hanover, Duka, and Bougainville, with the adjacent islands, viz., the Fead, Nissan, Carteret, Mortlock, Tasman, and Lord Howe Groups, also the isles of the Bougainville Straits, are reserved.

II. The fee paid for such licence is charged according to the tonnage of the vessel, viz.:—For vessels of 50 register tons or under, a fee of 150 marks; for vessels of more than 50 tons, for every additional 25 tons or part thereof, an additional fee of 50 marks, but not exceeding 1,000 marks for any vessel. Licences may be issued for a longer term than six months, but not exceeding one year; in such cases the fees are increased in proportion. The dispositions of the Ordinance of 13th January, 1887, permitting the pursuit of certain trades only after obtaining the consent of the Captain-General, and under observation of the restrictions imposed by him, are to remain in force. However, the Captain-General may in future authorize other officers to grant such licences in his place.

The licences mentioned in Articles 1-3 of the Ordinance with regard to the pursuit of certain trades within the Protectorate of the German New Guinea Company dated 13th January, and 2nd February, 1887 (*Ordinance Gazette* for 1887, No. 3, page 10ff), are issued by the same officer in charge who issues the trading licence to the petitioner.

SIR,—With reference to my Circular Despatches of the 25th July and 15th August last, I have the honour to transmit to you, for the information of the Colony under your Government, an extract from the *London Gazette* containing notes exchanged between Her Majesty's Ambassador at Madrid and the Spanish Minister for Foreign Affairs, confirming the Commercial Agreement now existing between Great Britain and Spain.

COMMERCIAL RELATIONS WITH SPAIN.

THE Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs has received the following Despatch from Her Majesty's Ambassador at Madrid:—

Madrid, 2nd January, 1895.

My LORD,—I have now the honour to enclose a copy of my note to the Spanish Minister for Foreign Affairs confirming the Commercial Agreement between the United Kingdom and Spain, together with a copy and translation of His Excellency's reply.

Madrid, 28th December, 1894.

MONSIEUR LE MINISTRE,—Circumstances having impeded the further negotiations for a definite Commercial Treaty, the Government of Her Majesty, my August Sovereign, are prepared to record in a more formal manner the understanding now existing* between the United Kingdom and Spain for the regulation of their mutual commercial relations. They understand that this course will for many reasons be convenient to the Government of His Catholic Majesty.

It is therefore understood between the two Governments that they maintain the agreement entered into between them in the month of June last, by the note addressed by me to Your Excellency's predecessor on the 20th of June, 1894, and the note I had the honour to receive from Señor Moret under date of the 29th of the same month. Such agreement shall remain in force until a permanent treaty be concluded, or unless it be terminated by one of the parties, who shall with this object give the other a notice of six months.

As before, it is agreed that it shall be open to any British Colony to withdraw from the present agreement, on notice to that effect being given by Her Majesty's Ambassador at Madrid to the Spanish Minister for Foreign Affairs within six months after the date of its signature.

MONSIEUR L'AMBASSADEUR,—I have had the honour to receive the note which Your Excellency communicated to me on the 28th inst., to the effect that circumstances having impeded the continuation of the negotiations for a definite Treaty of Commerce between Spain and the United Kingdom, the Government of Her Britannic Majesty is prepared to record, in a more formal manner, the understanding now existing for the regulation of their commercial relations.

The Government of His Catholic Majesty, who believe that this understanding will be, for various reasons, equally convenient to that of Her Britannic Majesty, consider that the agreement entered into by exchange of notes under date of the 20th and 29th of June last, between Your Excellency and my predecessor, Señor Moret, is maintained until the conclusion of a definite Treaty, unless it be terminated by one of the High Contracting Parties, who, with this object, give to the other a notice of six months.

As before, it is agreed that it shall be open to any British Colony to withdraw from the present agreement on notice to that effect being given by the Ambassador at Madrid to the Spanish Minister for Foreign Affairs within six months after the date of its signature.

* The following is the understanding now existing between Great Britain and Spain referred to in Sir H. Wolff's above despatch and made public in July, 1894:—

"Under the provisions of an Act recently passed by the Spanish Cortes, goods arriving in Spain and her Colonies from the United Kingdom and the British Colonies will continue to receive the same treatment as heretofore, namely, in the Peninsula and the adjacent islands the Minimum Tariff, together with the advantages conceded by treaty to Switzerland, Sweden and Norway, and the Netherlands, or other European States, except Portugal.

"In the Spanish Colonies, such goods will continue to be treated under the Minimum Column of the Colonial Tariff.

"This treatment will be maintained until a permanent Commercial Treaty is concluded between the United Kingdom and Spain, or until the negotiations now pending for the conclusion of such a treaty are formally broken off."

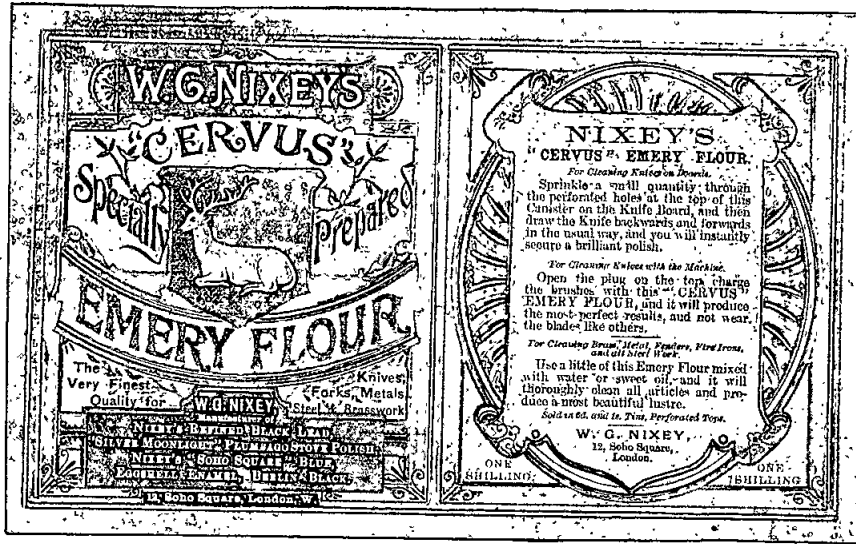

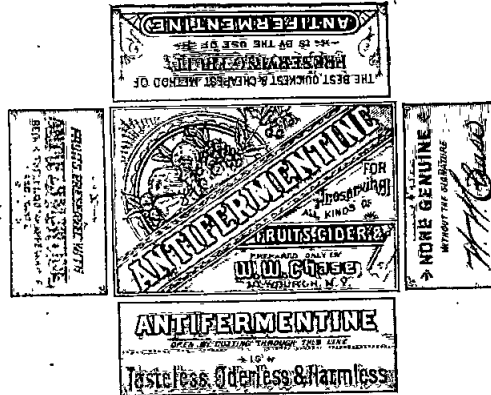

ADDITIONAL REGULATION FOR THE MANAGEMENT AND GOVERNMENT OF PILOTS.

WHEREAS section 60 of the *Marine Act 1890* provides among other things that the Marine Board of Victoria may make and alter or repeal rules and regulations for the management and government of pilots, and for the order in which they shall perform their services, and generally for all matters relative to the efficient discharge of their duties: And whereas the said Marine Board did, on the 10th day of August, 1894, make such regulations, which were duly approved by the Governor in Council on the 20th day of August, 1894: And whereas it is desirable to add to the same: Now therefore the said Marine Board, with the consent of the Governor in Council, do hereby make the following additional regulation, that is to say:—

ADDITIONAL REGULATION.

Notwithstanding anything contained in these Regulations to the contrary the Board may, whenever they deem fit, direct any sea pilot to perform the duties of a harbor and river pilot, provided that the Board, prior to directing any pilot to undertake such duties, shall satisfy themselves that such pilot is fully qualified to perform them and shall certify accordingly.

This regulation shall form portion of "The Regulations relating to Pilots and Pilotage" and be read in connexion therewith.

The foregoing additional regulation was made and passed at a meeting of the Marine Board held this 15th day of March, in the year of our Lord One thousand eight hundred and ninety-five.

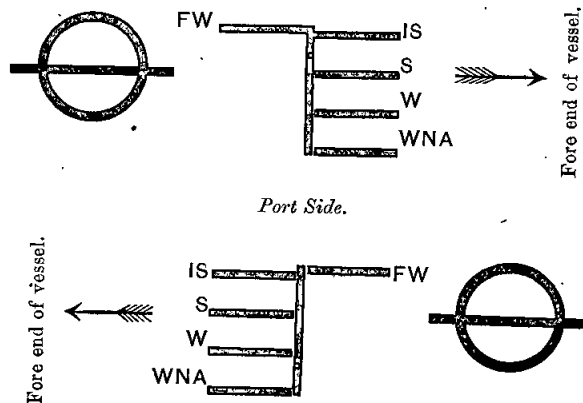
Marine Act 1890.

REGULATIONS RELATING TO THE MARKING OF
LOAD-LINES ON SHIPS.

WHEREAS sections 120 and 121 of the *Marine Act 1890* enact that the provisions therein specified shall have effect in respect to the marking of a load-line on foreign-going and home-trade ships by means of a circular disc with a horizontal line drawn through its centre: And whereas it is further enacted by the *Marine Act 1892* that the centre of such disc shall be placed at such level below the deck line marked under the provisions of the said Act as may be approved by the Marine Board of Victoria, and shall indicate the maximum load-line in salt water to which it shall be lawful to load the ship: And whereas by section 5 of the said Act it is further enacted that the Marine Board, with the consent of the Governor in Council, may make regulations for determining the lines or marks to be used in connexion with the disc in order to indicate the maximum load-line under different circumstances, and at different seasons, and declaring that the provisions of the *Marine Act 1890* shall have effect as if any such line were drawn through the centre of the disc, for determining the mode in which the disc and the lines or marks to be used in connexion therewith are to be marked or affixed on the ship, whether by painting, cutting, or otherwise, for determining the mode of application for and form of certificates under the said Act, for requiring the entry of such certificates and other particulars as to the draught of water and free-board of the ship in the official log-book of the ship or other publication thereof on board the ship, and as to delivering copies of such entries: Now therefore the said Board, with the consent of the Governor in Council, doth hereby make the following Regulations (that is to say):—

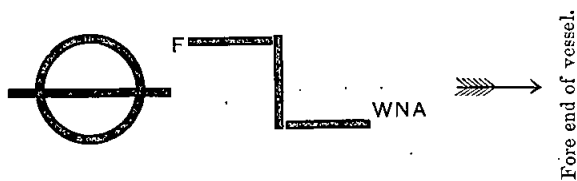
1. *Regulations.*—These Regulations may be cited as “The Regulations relating to the Marking of Load-lines,” and shall come into operation on the first day of September, 1895.
2. *Load-lines.*—The lines to be used to indicate the maximum load-line under different circumstances, and at different seasons, shall be 9 inches in length and 1 inch in thickness, and the maximum load-line shall be the upper edge of each of such lines.
3. *Position of Load-lines.*—The said lines shall be horizontal lines marked on both sides of the ship, extending from and at right angles to a vertical line marked 21 inches forward of the centre of the disc prescribed by sub-section (1) of section 120 of the *Marine Act 1890*. The maximum load-line in fresh water shall be marked abaft such vertical line, and the maximum load-lines in salt water shall be marked forward of such vertical line, as shown in the following diagrams:—

FOR STEAM-SHIPS.

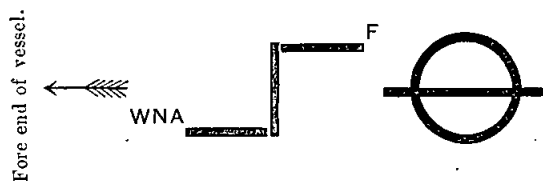


FOR SAILING VESSELS.

Starboard Side.



Port Side.



The arrow (→) points in the direction of the vessel's head.

The provisions of the *Marine Act 1890* shall have effect as if any such maximum load-line were drawn through the centre of the disc.

4. *Designation of Load-lines.*—Such maximum load-lines shall be as follows, viz:—

- For fresh water,
- „ Indian summer,
- „ summer,
- „ winter,
- „ winter, North Atlantic,

and shall be distinguished by initial letters conspicuously marked opposite such horizontal lines as aforesaid, such initial letters being as follows:—

- F.W.—Fresh water.
- I.S.—Indian summer.
- S.—Summer.
- W.—Winter.
- W., N.A.—Winter, North Atlantic.

The upper edge of the horizontal line passing through the centre of the disc shall always indicate the summer freeboard in salt water.

5. *Marking of Steam-ships and Sailing Ships.*—Steam-ships shall be marked with such of the horizontal lines as aforesaid as are applicable to the nature of their employment, and sailing ships shall be marked with such of the above-mentioned lines, in addition to the summer load-line, as indicate the maximum load-line for fresh water and for North Atlantic winter; but sailing ships engaged solely in the coasting trade shall only be marked, in addition to the summer load-line, with the line indicating the maximum load-line in fresh water.

6. *Colour and Marking of Load-lines.*—The said disc, and the lines or marks to be used in connexion therewith, shall be painted white or yellow on a dark ground, or black on a light ground, and the position of the disc and of each of the lines shall in the case of iron and steel vessels be permanently marked by centre punch marks, and shall in the case of wooden vessels be sunk for their breadths into the planking a depth of not less than one-quarter of an inch.

7. *Application for Certificate, &c.*—Application for a certificate of approval of the position of the disc or any alteration thereof shall be made by the registered owner of the ship, or in the case where there is more than one registered owner by any one of such owners, or by the builder of the ship, to the Marine Board of Victoria. Every application shall be made in the form marked L.L. 1 in the schedule hereto.

8. *Duration of Certificates.*—With respect to certificates of approval and their duration, the following rules shall prevail:—

- (a) As regards iron and steel ships, whether classed or un-classed, and classed wooden ships, the certificate shall cease to have effect if and so soon as the class of the ship (if classed) is either changed or withdrawn, or if and so soon as any deterioration has taken place in the

structural condition of the ship, whether classed or unclassified. Such certificate shall be in one of the forms L.L. 2 or L.L. 3 in the schedule hereto, as the case may be.

- (b) As regards unclassified wooden ships which have been opened out for survey, the certificate shall be granted for a fixed time varying with the age and condition of the ship, at the expiration of which it shall cease to have effect. Such certificate shall be in the form L.L. 3A in the schedule hereto.
- (c) As regards unclassified wooden ships which have not been opened out for survey, no limit of time shall be imposed in the certificate, which shall be in the form L.L. 3B in the schedule hereto.

9. *Certificate to be issued in duplicate.*—Every certificate of approval shall be issued in duplicate; one part shall be delivered to the applicant, and the other part shall be furnished to and retained by the Secretary to the Marine Board.

10. *Expiration of Certificates.*—On a certificate of approval ceasing to have effect, application shall at once be made by the registered owner of the ship, or in the case where there is more than one registered owner by any one of such owners, for the granting of a new certificate of approval, and the old certificate shall be delivered up to the Marine Board, who shall cancel the same.

11. *Entries in Official Log.*—The master of every British ship shall, before such ship leaves any dock, wharf, port, or harbor in Victoria, for the purpose of proceeding to sea, enter in the official log all the particulars stated in the certificate so issued as aforesaid if not previously entered.

12. *Certificate to be conspicuously exhibited on board.*—The owner or master shall also forthwith, on the delivery to him or his agent of any such certificate as aforesaid, cause the same to be framed and put up in some conspicuous part of the ship so as to be visible to all persons on board the same, and shall cause it to be continued so put up so long as such certificate remains in force and such ship is in use.

13. *Amidships.*—For the purpose of these regulations the expression "amidships" shall mean the middle of the length of the load water line as measured from the fore side of the stem to the aft side of the stern post.

The foregoing Regulations were made and passed at a meeting of the Marine Board of Victoria held this first day of March, in the year of our Lord One thousand eight hundred and ninety-five.

REGULATION No. XXXI.

REGULATIONS FOR THE ORDERING, PURCHASE, AND ISSUE OF STORES.

THE ACTING VICTORIAN RAILWAYS COMMISSIONERS, in pursuance of the powers conferred by the *Railways Act 1890*, do hereby make the following Regulations for the Ordering, Purchase, and Issue of Stores for the Victorian Railways, and all previous Regulations relating thereto are hereby repealed:—

1. The purchase of all general supplies shall, as hereinafter specified, be under the control of the Railway Storekeeper (subject, so far as the Engineer-in-Chief, Engineer for Existing Lines, Chief Mechanical Engineer, and Telegraph Superintendent's Branches are concerned, to the provisions of clause 4 below), and in all matters relating thereto he shall be directly responsible to the Accountant, acting under the authority of the Commissioners, from whom he will receive instructions as from time to time may appear necessary.
 2. Whenever contracts are required for supplies, lists shall be prepared showing a classified schedule and correct description, by reference to samples or otherwise, of the several articles of probable requirement, and also, where practicable, of the quantities at which the contract rates are to be tendered for per ton, per gross, &c., &c., with blank columns for the insertion of the rates and amounts.
 3. All tenders for supplies shall be placed in the Tender Box, and, after being opened and scheduled, shall be submitted to the Commissioners for the necessary authority to enter into contracts for the same. The Accountant shall see that the contracts are duly executed by the Contractor.
 4. All orders on Contractors or others for supplies shall be on the form provided (Form A), and shall be signed and issued by the Railway Storekeeper, but in the case of supplies for the Engineer-in-Chief, Engineer for Existing Lines, Chief Mechanical Engineer, and Telegraph Superintendent's Branches orders shall only be so signed and issued by the Railway Storekeeper on the authority of the heads of those branches, or such officers as they may appoint, a list of whom shall be furnished to the Railway Storekeeper. Orders for supplies, common to more than one Branch, shall only be signed and issued by the Railway Storekeeper on the authority of the Accountant, who, when he thinks necessary, shall consult with the Heads of Branches concerned before authorizing orders.
 5. All requisitions issued by heads of branches or other officers for articles in stock shall be forwarded direct to the Railway Storekeeper upon the form provided (Form B). Before purchasing fresh supplies to satisfy any order, the Railway Storekeeper will carefully assure himself that neither the articles ordered nor similar articles which might be adapted are in stock. The Railway Storekeeper will further take care that articles are only supplied when required for immediate use, except where it may be deemed necessary to keep a small stock on hand to meet urgent cases, or where a periodical supply has been arranged for.
 6. Articles not specified in contract schedules may be ordered by the Railway Storekeeper, but the gross amount of any such order shall not exceed £100. Before ordering such articles, the Railway Storekeeper shall obtain and submit prices to the Accountant, attached to a statement on Form G, showing the nature of the goods, the branch for which they are to be purchased, the purposes for which they are required, the price agreed upon, and the person or firm from whom they are to be obtained. If prices are not obtained or if there is anything unusual or exceptional in connexion with the proposed purchase, the Railway Storekeeper shall give a full explanation on the face of Form G. In cases where the expenditure involved is more than £25, the Accountant will pass the papers to the Secretary for submission for the approval of the Commissioners, unless the Accountant is satisfied that the Commissioners' approval is not specially called for.
 7. Contractors will be required to furnish with each delivery of stores a complete bill of parcels in duplicate (Form C) together with the departmental order for the goods; and in no case will receipts for goods be given, either as to quantity or value, until the said bills of parcels are furnished.
 8. Claims by Contractors and others for goods supplied and delivered under these Regulations shall be made on the usual Government Account Forms (L2, see Regulations respecting Public Accounts). These claims, after certification in accordance with Clause 9, shall be forwarded to the Accountant.
 9. The Railway Storekeeper shall fully check and certify to the correctness of—
 1. All accounts for supplies for the Traffic Branch, and for general supplies common to more than one Branch.
 2. Accounts for all Branches other than the Traffic, for—
 - (a) Supplies under the periodical general stores contracts.
 - (b) Supplies by the periodical general stores Contractors of articles not specified in their contract schedules, subject to the following exception:—
Exception.—When a special contract for supplies not provided for above is advertised and entered into, the Railway Storekeeper shall not certify the accounts, but they will be checked and certified in the Engineering Accounts Office.
 3. Accounts for supply of fuel.
 4. Accounts for supply of water.
 5. Accounts for supply of gas.
- All accounts (for supplies) other than those provided for above shall be checked and certified in the Engineering Accounts Office.*
10. The Railway Storekeeper shall have full power to reject any goods which he may consider to be not in accordance with contract (Form F).
 11. The Railway Storekeeper shall prepare, whenever he may deem necessary, or whenever instructed by the Accountant, an inventory of all stores unserviceable or not required which may be on hand, and forward the same to the Accountant, who will pass it, with his recommendation, to the Secretary, for the information of the Commissioners, who shall take such steps for the survey and disposal of the same as they may think fit.

12. Stock of all perishable articles shall be taken annually at the 30th June, and of all other articles at least once in every two years, and a return thereof showing the quantity and value of each article on hand shall be prepared and certified by the Railway Storekeeper, and submitted through the Accountant and Secretary for the inspection and information of the Commissioners.

13. As often as may be necessary, the Railway Storekeeper shall, with the concurrence of the Head of the Branch concerned and the Accountant, average the several prices of any one article to a uniform rate; provided always that such rate, when computed on the total stock of that article, shall represent the total cost of the same.

14. All stores in stock (including fuel) at the various locomotive depôts shall be under the control of the Railway Storekeeper, and a daily return of the issues shall be furnished on the form provided (Form E), by the person in charge at each depôt, to the Railway Storekeeper, who will pass it to the Loco. Accounts Branch. A monthly return showing the consumption by each engine shall also be supplied direct to the Loco. Accounts Branch on Form D.

15. No stores whatever shall be lent, sold, or exchanged, except on the authority in writing of the Commissioners (Form G).

16. The Railway Storekeeper shall be held responsible only for such stores as are in or may be delivered into store, and not for any stores delivered direct to heads of branches or those whom they may appoint to receive the same.

17. It will be the duty of the Railway Storekeeper, or such officer (acting under his instructions) as he may appoint, to inspect as often as he may deem necessary the stores under his control at all depôts, making inspections without previous notice, checking the stock of certain items by ascertaining the weight, tale, or measurement thereof, and generally taking measures to insure the correct record of receipts and issues.

18. The Railway Storekeeper shall exercise strict supervision over all stores in stock and accounts, as well as returns relating to the same; and report generally upon any irregularities, defects, or omissions in the working of these Regulations.

19. All rails, fish-plates, fastenings, and points and crossings required for the construction of new lines or for the maintenance of existing lines shall be under the control of the Railway Storekeeper, who will be held responsible for the correct receipt and issue of the same.

20. All orders on the Agent-General, &c., for material not obtainable in the colony shall be sent to the Railway Storekeeper for report as to what quantity of materials of the class in question or similar materials which might be adapted is in stock. He will then forward his report to the Accountant, who will pass it to the Secretary for submission to the Commissioners.

21. All officers and servants engaged in the receipt, custody, or issue of stores shall, so far as those duties are concerned, be under the control of the Railway Storekeeper.

MELBOURNE AND METROPOLITAN BOARD OF WORKS.

BY-LAW No. 5.*

REGULATIONS for the construction and use of Sewers and Drains within the area under the control of the Melbourne and Metropolitan Board of Works.

NOTE.—The sections quoted are those contained in the "Melbourne and Metropolitan Board of Works Act 1890."

Preamble.—Whereas by the *Melbourne and Metropolitan Board of Works Act 1890* (hereinafter called "the Act") it is amongst other things enacted—that, subject to the provisions of the Act, and in order to secure the efficient maintenance of the main and general sewerage of the metropolis, the Board created by the Act, and hereinafter called "the Board," may from time to time make by-laws in relation to the levels, dimensions, construction, maintenance, ventilation, and cleansing of sewers; subject, however, to the approval of the Governor in Council before any by-law as to the construction, ventilation, or cleansing of sewers shall be of force or effect, and that the Board may by any such by-laws prescribe the form of any notices or orders under the Act, which notices or orders may be used in the form so prescribed or to the like effect, varied as the circumstances may require, and shall be sufficient in law, and that by such by-laws the Board, with the approval of the Governor in Council, may impose reasonable penalties, not in any case exceeding the sum of Twenty pounds, for the violation of any such by-laws or regulations:

* Re-published in lieu of the By-law in *Gazette* of 22nd February, 1895, page 747.

And whereas by Part III. of the Act provision is made with regard to main sewerage and drainage, and the sewerage and drainage of private premises, and by section 100 thereof it is provided that every person intending to make or branch any sewer or drain into a sewer vested in the Board shall, seven clear days before commencing any works for that purpose, make written application to the Board, accompanied by a plan showing such particulars as may be required by any by-law or resolution of the Board, and that no such work shall be commenced until the sanction in writing of the Board has been given:

And whereas it is expedient that regulations with regard to the construction of sewers and drains in the metropolis, more especially in relation to their connexion with the main sewers and to water-closets, sinks, traps, and other house sewerage fittings, appliances, and apparatus, should be prescribed; and that the same, and also the terms and conditions upon which the sanctions, permissions, authorities, and consents which the Board is empowered to give for connecting private sewers and drains with the sewers and drains of the Board and otherwise will be accorded and given, should be declared and known:

Now, therefore, the Board doth hereby, pursuant to and in exercise of the power and authority conferred upon it as aforesaid, make the following by-law (that is to say):—

GENERAL.

1. The sewerage system of the metropolis consists of main and lateral conduits of salt-glazed vitrified stoneware, Portland cement concrete, brickwork in cement, wrought iron, cast iron, or of these materials combined in various ways.—[Section 79.]

They are designed to carry off all the water passing through water-closets, lavatories, baths, and urinals; all chamber slops; water used in cooking, washing food, clothes, floors, &c., and generally from sinks in kitchens, cellars, and sculleries, from stables, cow-houses, and other out offices, together with all liquid refuse which in the opinion of the Board will not prejudicially affect the sewers, sewerage machinery, or the sewage farm.

Washings from paved yards will only be admitted as herein-after provided.

2. All connexions of plumbing work, drains, or sewers with the sewerage system of the metropolis, and all work connected in any way with the drainage of any premises, shall be executed in accordance with these rules and regulations.—[Section 100.]

CONSTRUCTION OF SEWERS AND DRAINS.

3. The Board will construct, maintain, and repair all the main and lateral sewers. The drains must be constructed, maintained, repaired, and cleansed by or at the cost of the owners.—[Section 79.]

All the works of sewerage and drainage will be carried out in accordance with the provisions of Part III. of the Act, being sections 76 to 119 thereof, both inclusive.

In case of any obstruction taking place in a combined drain, draining two or more premises, the Board will determine between the respective owners of the premises so drained by whom and in what proportion the cost of removing any such obstruction shall be paid; and the proportion so determined must be paid by and will be recoverable from each such owner at the instance of such one or more of the other owners as shall have paid for the work, or of the Board if the work shall have been done by it.

Every person who by a notice from the Board issued in accordance with the Act shall be required to do or not to do anything, including therefore a requirement to make any sewer or drain, or branches, works, or arrangements for the better sewerage or draining of his house, building, or ground, and who fails to comply with such notice, will, under the provisions of section 165 of the Act, become guilty of an offence against the Act, and for every such offence he will be liable, unless other penalty be prescribed, besides any costs or expenses which may be incurred in taking proceedings against him, as well as any costs or expenses which may be incurred in remedying any default of his, to a penalty not exceeding Twenty pounds, and to a penalty not exceeding Five pounds, nor less than One pound, for each day during which such offence is continued by him, and such penalty will be recoverable, notwithstanding that the Board may not have chosen to exercise any power given to it by the Act to remedy such default.—[Section 165.]

With a view to obviate the incurring of liability to such penalties, and to insure uniformity and efficiency of work by reason of its being done by skilled and experienced workmen, supervised by the Board's inspectors, and for economy, because of the cheaper price at which fittings and apparatus can be obtained under contracts for large quantities thereof by the Board, the Board will, in exercise of its powers, contract and agree with the owners of houses, buildings, or ground that the constructing, altering, or enlarging any sewer or drain connected with such premises shall be done by the Board on payment of the cost of the same by the owners; and the Board will, in like manner, on payment of all expenses and cost, undertake to perform any work which may be required to be done by any notice issued by the Board to any owner.—[Section 105.]

LICENSED PLUMBERS.

4. No consent will be given to any person, firm, or corporation to do any kind of work connected with the laying of house drains or plumbing, or making any repairs, additions to, or alterations of any drain or plumbing work connected or designed to be connected with the sewerage system, unless through an employer or working plumber licensed by the Board.—[Section 99.]

The conditions upon which the Board will consent to the making or branching, or the causing to be made or branched, any sewer, or to the making or causing to be made any opening into any sewer, vested in the Board, or to the fixing of any

fittings or apparatus, or to the doing of any other work in connexion with the sewers or drains within the metropolis, are and shall be:—

(1) That every person contracting or undertaking to do any such work by the agency of workmen employed by or under him must himself be the holder of a licence from the Board called an "Employer's Licence," or of a licence from the Board called a "Working Plumber's Licence."

(2) That no person shall be engaged or employed as a workman in the actual performance of any such work unless he is the holder of a "Working Plumber's Licence" from the Board.

The conditions upon which "Employers' Licences" and "Working Plumbers' Licences" will be issued by the Board are—

(1) That every such licence will be subject to suspension or cancellation at the will of the Board; and that all such licences will be granted to expire on the 30th day of June of each year.

(2) "Employers' Licences" will qualify their holders to carry out work under the Board's Regulations, by the agency of licensed working plumbers; but such licences will not authorize their holders to do practical work under the said Regulations, unless they be also themselves holders of "Working Plumbers' Licences."

(3) A special condition of every licence issued to an employer shall be that, if a licensed workman in his employment upon any such work prove, according to the judgment of the Board's inspecting officer, to be incapable as a workman, or transgress the Regulations of the Board, and the "Working Plumber's Licence" of such workman be for any such cause suspended or cancelled by the Board, and notice of such suspension or cancellation, in the Form A to this By-law annexed, or to the like effect, be given by the Board in writing, by registered letter, addressed in accordance with the registered address in the licence issued to the said employer, the employer shall cease to employ such workman upon any such work immediately after and during the continuance of such suspension or cancellation. And any holder of an "Employer's Licence" who shall neglect or fail to comply with this condition shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding Ten pounds, and to a continuing penalty of not more than Two pounds nor less than One pound for every day during which such neglect or failure shall continue after service of the hereinbefore mentioned notice upon such employer. And the "Employer's Licence" of such employer shall thereupon become liable to suspension or cancellation by the Board. [Form A.]

"Working Plumbers' Licences" will be issued to candidates who shall have successfully passed an examination by examiners appointed by the Board in the following subjects (that is to say):—

Materials.—The use of lead, tin, copper, and their alloys, wrought and cast iron, stoneware, bricks, tiles, Portland cement, and other materials used by the plumber and drainer.

Plumbing Practice.—As to solder and soldering, lead burning, lead laying, pipe and joint making, pipe bending, and general plumbers' practice.

Water Supply Work.—Knowledge of the Board's Water Supply By-laws, general water supply work, water supply fittings, hot-water connexions.

Sewerage Work.—Knowledge of the Board's Sewerage Regulations, construction and use of traps, soil, waste and vent pipes, house fittings, water-closets, kitchen, sinks, baths, lavatories, housemaids' sinks, urinals, latrines, and other sewerage apparatus and appliances.

General Principles of Sanitary Work.—Flushing, ventilation, disconnection.

Candidates for examination in plumbing practice must provide themselves with their own tools, and must submit samples of work done by themselves, and also make any pipe, bend, joint, or other plumbing appliance which may be required to satisfy the examiners.

Candidates for "Working Plumbers' Licences" must give notice in writing to the Secretary of the Board of their intention to submit themselves to examination at such time as shall be appointed for the same by the Board's examiners.

Every candidate who shall have successfully passed the before-mentioned examination, and given proof to the satisfaction of the examiners of practical ability as a plumber, will be furnished with a licence from the Board to do practical work as a plumber upon and in connexion with the sewers, drains, and all necessary fittings, appliances, and apparatus appertaining thereto within the metropolis, subject to and in accordance with the Board's Regulations. And he will likewise be furnished with a certificate from the Board that he is duly qualified to do work in connexion with the water supply and sewerage systems under the control of the Board, and in accordance with the Board's Regulations.

"Working Plumbers' Licences" will, at the discretion of the Board, be issued without previous examination to any practical plumber who shall be the holder of and shall produce a licence from any other sewerage or water supply authority equal in value to the standard established by the Board's examination according to the judgment of the Board's examiners, which shall be final, subject only to review by the Board.

Prior to the issue of any "Employer's Licence," or "Working Plumber's Licence," the person to whom the same is to be issued must sign a register containing a declaration that he accepts such licence subject to and in conformity with the conditions thereof and with the Regulations of the Board, and that he will conform to and comply therewith.

The holder of an "Employer's Licence," or of a "Working Plumber's Licence," is hereinafter called a "licensee."

CONSENTS.

5. Application for the Board's consent to connect with the sewerage system, or to do plumbing work connected therewith, must be made in writing by a licensee for the owner of the property to be drained or his authorized agent. Such application shall give the precise location of the property, the name of the owner, and the name of the person employed to do the work, and shall be made in Form B hereto attached, or to the like effect. No consent shall be deemed to authorize anything not stated in the application, and for any misrepresentation in such application the licence of the applicant may be suspended for such time as the Board shall order; and if such misrepresentation appears to be wilful his licence shall be cancelled.—[Section 99, Form B.]

Consents to make connexions with the sewerage system will be issued only when the plumbing in the property to be connected is in accordance with the rules for plumbing hereinafter prescribed, and has been inspected and approved of by an inspector of plumbing appointed by the Board for the purpose, or, in case of new buildings, when a proper plan of the plumbing has been approved of in writing by the Board, which shall define the position of the Y branch in the sewer to which the work must be connected. All connexions with the drains or sewers, and all plumbing connected therewith, shall be made under the direction of the Engineer-in-Chief or other superintending officer of the Board.—[Section 100.]

PLAN OF PLUMBING.

6. Seven days before a consent is issued for doing plumbing work in a property or before any alterations or additions are made, excepting necessary repairs, a plan and description of the work, signed by a licensee on forms to be furnished for the purpose, shall be filed in the office of the Board; and no such work shall be commenced until such plan and description shall be sanctioned, and no alterations shall be made in any way in the plan or any work without a special consent in writing from the Board. Such plan will be furnished by the Board upon application and payment for the same as follows:—

Plan of drainage, including survey,	5s. 0d.
&c., for every house	2s. 6d.
Plan of any alterations or additions	2s. 6d.
Copy of drainage plan	2s. 6d.

—[Sections 100 and 101.]

Where the work is done by the Board, a plan of the work done, when it is completed, will be forwarded to the owner for his information, and the cost of making such plan shall be included in and form part of the cost of the work which shall be paid for to the Board by the owner.

INSPECTION.

7. The plumber is to give notice to the Board when any work is ready for inspection, and all work must be left uncovered and convenient for examination until inspected and approved of by an inspector appointed by the Board. Such inspection shall be made within twenty-four hours of such notification being received at the office of the Board, except on Saturday, when forty-eight hours must be allowed. The inspecting officer may apply the ether, peppermint, water, or smoke test, and the plumber shall furnish all the necessary tools, labour, and assistance for such tests. The plumber shall remove or repair any defective material or labour when so ordered by the inspecting officer.—[Section 107.]

Any drain pipe, soil pipe, trap, water-closet, urinal, sink, or other fitting laid, used, or constructed otherwise than in accordance with these regulations, or which shall, in the opinion of the Board, be or become of bad or defective quality, shall, upon notice in writing from the Board, be removed or repaired in the manner determined and within the time fixed by the Board; and the Board will, if it think fit, remove or repair the said defective fitting, and charge the owner or occupier of the premises with the cost incurred.—[Section 111.]

STATEMENT OF WORK DONE.

8. The plumber shall, on the completion of the work, file in the office of the Board, on forms furnished for the purpose, a correct statement of the work done under the consent furnished for the same.—[Section 99.]

INJURY TO SEWERS.

9. No municipal council, corporation, firm, or person shall interfere with, break up, or remove any gully, ventilating shaft, man-hole, lamp-hole, flush-tank, catch-basin, or any part of the sewerage system, except by a special permit in writing of the Board, or throw or deposit, or cause to be thrown or deposited, in any drain or sewer, opening or receptacle connected with the sewerage system, any garbage, offal, dead animals, vegetable parings, ashes, cinders, rags, or any other matter or thing except the materials which, according to section 1 of these Regulations, the sewers and drains are designed to receive.—[Sections 92, 93, and 98.]

SUB-SOIL DRAINAGE.

10. Every person who shall erect a new building shall cause the sub-soil of the site of such building to be effectually drained by means of suitable earthenware pipes properly laid to a suitable out-fall, whenever the dampness of the site renders such a precaution necessary in the opinion of the Board.

He shall not lay any such pipes in such a manner or in such a position as to connect directly with any drain or sewer, but shall discharge into an open shaft made of earthenware pipes, and fitted with a dirt box which shall communicate with the sewer by a proper trap with a ventilating pipe on the sewer side.

CELLAR DRAINAGE.

11. Where any house heretofore built shall have its lowest floor at a lower level than the sewer of the Board into which such house would otherwise drain, pending pulling down or alteration of such house, the owner shall cause the drainage from such lowest floor to be raised by means of a syphon, or some automatic method approved by the Board, so that it shall discharge into a drain communicating with the sewer of the Board. The water seal of the trap in the drain pipe leading from the cellar shall be constantly maintained by means of an automatic flushing cistern.—[Sections 107 and 109.]

PLUMBING RULES.—GENERAL.

12. All materials used must be of good quality and free from all defects. The work must be executed in a thorough and workmanlike manner, and to the satisfaction of the Board.

The drain outside of the house or building, or from isolated water-closets, to the street sewer shall be of first-quality salt-glazed vitrified stoneware pipes, unless laid less than 2 feet deep from the surface to the centre line of the pipe, in yards or places liable to heavy traffic, when it shall be of heavy cast or wrought iron. Heavy cast-iron pipes must be used if the ground has been made up or filled in, or adjoins a cellar.

PIPES.

13. All drain pipes are to be at least 4 inches in diameter, except where otherwise ordered by the Board. Where the drain pipes are laid more than 10 feet from the surface, the pipes must be taken to one of the Board's store yards, unless obtained from there, to be there tested by an officer appointed by the Board in the machines provided for the purpose.

All cast-iron pipes must be sound, free from holes or cracks, and coated with tar or asphaltum.

The following weights will be accepted as standards:—

2 inch diameter	5½ lbs. per lineal foot.
3 " "	9½ " " "
4 " "	13 " " "
5 " "	17 " " "
6 " "	20 " " "

All wrought-iron pipes must be of approved standard weight and quality, and galvanized or coated to the satisfaction of the Board.

All fittings used in connexion with such pipe shall correspond with it in weight and quality. All junctions must be curved; right-angled junctions must not be made. Where lead pipe is used to connect fixtures with vertical soil or waste pipes, or to connect traps with vertical vent pipes, such pipes must not be lighter than of 7-lb. lead, but where, in the opinion of the Board, a heavier weight may be required, its instructions shall be complied with.

The arrangements of soil and waste pipes must be as direct as possible.

The drain pipes shall be laid on an even grade of not less than 1 in 40 if a 4-in. pipe be used, or of 1 in 60 if a 6-in. pipe be used, unless by special permission of the Board, in which case special provision must be made for regular and efficient flushing. As far as possible, all drains shall be laid in straight lines; where changes of direction occur, they shall be made either by suitably curved pipes or in man-holes.

PIPE TRENCHES.

14. The trenches for the drains from all properties shall be dug so as to meet the public sewers at the position of the Y branches indicated by the Board. The material thrown from the trench shall be placed so as not to obstruct and so as to cause the least inconvenience to the public. Proper barriers and lights must be maintained on the banks of the trench to guard the public against accident during the progress of the work. In refilling the trench the earth shall be carefully rammed or flooded, so as to keep the pipe in position and avoid settling. No stone shall be used in refilling until there has been a depth of at least 2 feet of earth or gravel placed over the pipe.

PIPE LAYING.

15. The cover of the Y branch on the sewer shall be carefully removed so as not to injure the socket.

The first length of the pipe attached to the Y branch shall be curved and set so as to give a good fall into the sewer.

The joints of the stoneware pipes shall be made with Stamford joints, or cement joints with gaskets.

Joints of iron pipes shall be made with gasket and lead if cast-iron pipes be used, or screwed joints with white lead if wrought iron be used.

The ends of all private drains not immediately connected with the plumbing fixtures shall be securely closed with water-tight imperishable materials. If lead pipe, the end must be soldered; if wrought-iron pipe, a plug must be screwed on the end; if cast-iron pipe, a cast-iron plug must be caulked in with lead.

All pipes shall be carefully bedded in the solid ground. If the ground, in the opinion of the Board, is not sufficiently solid, cast-iron pipes must be used, or stoneware pipes bedded in concrete composed of 1 of Portland cement, 2 of clean sand, and 5 of stone of 1½-in. gauge or gravel approved by the inspector.

Where there is a sewer in the street or right-of-way adjoining, every property must be separately and independently connected with it.

Whenever possible, such connexion must be made directly at the rear of, or in the front of, the house.

Where there is no sewer in the street, or it is necessary to construct a private drain to connect either one or several properties with a sewer in an adjoining street, the drain must be laid under the roadway or right-of-way, and not through the yards or under the houses if possible to avoid it.

Sub-soil drains shall be of earthenware field pipes.

CESSPOOLS, OVERFLOWS.

16. No cesspool, overflow, or privy vault shall be connected with any drain or sewer.

DRAINS, SOIL AND WASTE PIPES.

17. At the head of every connecting drain, at or near the boundary of the premises or building, a boundary trap must be fixed, with or without a man-hole. All the drains must, wherever considered necessary by the Board, join in a man-hole at least 3 feet long and 2 feet wide, fitted with an open grating. The portions of the drains crossing the floor of the man-hole must be connected with the boundary trap, either in a straight line or by curved junctions in the floor of the man-hole. The boundary trap must be provided with a seal 2½ inches deep, and an inspection cap on the sewer side of the trap.

All soil pipes shall be at least 4 inches diameter.

The soil and waste pipes and traps must, where practicable, be exposed to view at all times, where necessary, for ready inspection and for convenience of repairing. When unavoidably placed within partitions, or recesses of walls, soil and waste pipes must be covered with woodwork so fastened with screws as to be readily removed.

No soil or waste pipe shall be fixed within any building or tenement unless the special authority of the Board has been previously obtained.

No material may be used within the building for soil or waste pipes other than wrought or cast iron pipes with securely screwed or leaded joints, or lead pipes with soldered or wiped joints. Cement or putty joints, tin or sheet iron pipes, whether galvanized or not, shall not be used.

In all cases the upward extension from the soil pipe for ventilation must pass in as direct a manner as possible above, and if necessary through, the roof.

Traps must be ventilated, and waste and soil pipes must have an approved fall.

Where an open grating is inadvisable, the man-hole must be provided with a fresh air inlet, fitted with a mica flap valve, and the man-hole must be fitted with an iron air-tight cover. A ventilation pipe of such size and materials, and so placed as the Board may desire, shall be provided and fixed wherever considered necessary.—[Section 79.]

Separate internal wastes shall be provided for each of the following classes of polluted waters, viz. :—

- (1) Dirty water from baths, pantry and china closet sinks, lavatories, and wash troughs, and other waters with a small proportion of soap and dirt.
- (2) Greasy water from kitchen and scullery sinks.
- (3) Sludge water from manufactures, stables, cow-houses, cab-stands, and other specially polluted surfaces for which consents have been granted by the Board.
- (4) Urinal water from housemaids' slop sinks, public and private urinals.
- (5) Soil water from closets, and other water containing faecal matter.

Each one of these separate waste pipes, except for soil water, must be connected with the drains through a gully or disconnector trap.

A main waste-pipe, into which lavatories, baths, or kitchen sinks discharge, must be at least 2 inches in diameter, with at least 1½-in. branches.

JOINTS.

18. All joints in iron drain pipes, soil pipes, and waste pipes, except where screw joints are used, must be so filled with gasket and lead and caulked as to make them gas tight.

All connexions of lead pipes with iron pipes must be made with a brass sleeve or ferrule of the same size as the lead pipe put in the socket of the branch of the iron pipe and caulked with lead.

The lead pipe must be attached to the ferrule by a wiped joint.

All connexions of lead waste and vent pipes shall be made by means of wiped joints.

INSPECTION.

19. Before the fixtures are placed in connexion with the plumbing of any house or building, and before the soil pipe is connected with the sewer, the outlet of the soil pipe and all openings into it below the top shall be hermetically sealed, the pipe shall then be filled with water to the top, and every joint carefully examined for leaks. Work already in place will be examined by the peppermint or ether test. Defective pipes must be removed and replaced by sound ones, and all defective joints made tight, and every part of the work made to conform to these Rules and Regulations, and subject to the approval of an inspector of plumbing appointed by the Board.

TRAPS.

20. Every water-closet, urinal, lavatory, slop sink, kitchen sink, bath, and every tub or set of tubs, must be separately and effectively trapped.

Traps must be placed as near the fixtures as possible, and in no case shall a trap be more than 2 feet from a fixture.

All lead traps must be drawn.

Traps of three (3) classes will be used—

- (a) "Traps," for intercepting gases only, to be of round section and self-cleansing form, but not so easy as to empty by momentum or suction.

- (b) "Silt traps," for intercepting both gases and solids, to have slightly tapered sides, flat bottoms, and rounded not sharp angles, and provided with trays fitted with handles for catching and removing solids.

- (c) "Grease traps," for solidifying and collecting grease or other semi-fluid matter liable to foul the pipes, must be of such form as may from time to time be approved.

The term "gully" will be applied to traps (a) and (b) in cases where they are to be used externally, and fitted with dished tops and gratings. In such cases the dish must be in one piece with the trap or jointed thereto spigot and faucet, and the depth of the dish from the top to the grating must not be less than half the diameter of the pipe, and the grating must be removable.

The term "disconnector" will be applied to traps in cases where provision has to be made for inlet ventilation to the pipe or pipes discharging therein.

Where soil pipes from pedestal or other closets are to be disconnected from the house-drain, a Y piece for the air inlet must be fixed, and the term "Y disconnector trap" will be used.

All traps must have a water seal of at least half the diameter of the outlet pipe, but in no case less than 2½ inches.

The P form of traps, with wastes above the floor, and joints visible and accessible all round, must be used in all internal fittings where possible.

The S form of trap or waste under floors must not be used, except with special permission and facilities for periodical inspection.

In detached closets and urinals, approved S forms in earthenware, with joints visible and accessible all round, may be used.

Sinks in all food-packing houses, butchers' shops, lard-rendering establishments, hotels, restaurants, boarding-houses, and laundries, or wherever ordered by the Board, shall be provided with suitable approved grease traps. Wash-rooms for carriages must have silt traps provided, with proper means of intercepting mud.

Stables, dairies, cab-stands, markets, &c., and paved back yards for which drainage consents have been granted, must be provided with suitable approved silt traps.

VENT PIPES.

21. Every vent pipe extending upwards from a soil or waste pipe must extend, to such a height as may be deemed necessary by the Board, at least 2 feet above the highest part of the roof or coping. It must be of undiminished size without return bend, with basket end or educt or induct cowls as ordered. It must not open near a window, a chimney, nor an air shaft which ventilates living rooms.

All vent pipes, in an extension of a main building, must be extended, to such a height as may be deemed necessary by the Board, above the roof of the main building, when otherwise they would open within 30 feet of the windows of the main house or of the adjoining house.

The main drain leading to the boundary trap is to be vented at its upper end by a pipe or shaft erected vertically to such a height that the mouth of the pipe or shaft shall be at least 6 feet higher than any window or door situated within a distance of 30 feet therefrom. Branch drains need not be vented if the gully traps are within less than 15 feet from the main drain, or unless otherwise ordered by the Board, and then must be vented according to such order.

Traps must be prevented from syphonage, or the waste pipe leading from them be ventilated by a special pipe taken from such a position that the vent pipe entrance will not be fouled by the discharge of the trap.

The vents must not be less than 2 inches for water-closets, and not less than 1½ inches for other traps. The combined vertical vent pipes for traps of water-closets in buildings must be at least 3 inches in diameter, with branches 2 inches diameter to each trap, and for traps of other fixtures not less than 2 inches in diameter, unless the trap is smaller, in which case the diameter of the branch vent pipe must be at least equal to the diameter of the trap.

In all cases vent pipes must be of cast or wrought iron or lead inside a building, dipped and folded galvanized-iron vent pipes may be used where they are entirely outside a building, and shall be connected with the traps with brass or lead ferrules.

Vent pipes must extend 2 feet at least above the highest part of the roof or coping. The extension must not be reduced in diameter. The various vent pipes may be branched into a soil or waste pipe of the same class above the inlet from the highest fixture. They may be combined by branching together those which serve several traps of the same class.

These vent pipes must always have a continuous slope, to avoid collecting water by condensation.

No vent pipe shall be used as a waste or soil pipe. No brick, earthenware, or house chimney flue shall be used as a sewer ventilator, nor to ventilate any drain, soil, or waste pipe.

All inlets to drains or openings for ventilating shall be efficiently protected by proper gratings of ample area. The aggregate area of the apertures in any grating covering a ventilation opening shall not be less than the sectional area of the pipe or drain to which such grating is fixed. All openings for ventilation made in accordance with these regulations, or by order of the Board, shall at all times be kept open and perfectly free from obstruction.

SAFES, OVERFLOWS, ETC.

22. Every lead safe under a water-closet, urinal, lavatory, bath, refrigerator, sink, or other fixture must be drained by a special pipe not directly connected with any waste pipe, soil pipe, drain, or sewer. They must be provided at the outlet into the open air with flap valves of brass or other approved metal.

The drip pipe from refrigerators shall not be connected with the soil or waste pipes, drains, or sewers.

No steam exhaust, blow-off, or drip pipe shall be connected with a drain or sewer, or with any soil or waste pipe. Such pipes must discharge into the rain-water channels.

RAIN WATER AND PAVED YARDS.

23. Rain-water conductors must not be connected with the sewers. All stables, dairies, paved yards, market-places, cab-stands, or other places for which the Board may from time to time grant consent to be connected with the sewers or drains, must be properly graded, cemented, flagged, or well paved, and properly drained, and must be trapped with an approved gully silt trap, connected with the drain inside the boundary trap.

WATER-CLOSETS.

24. Every water-closet in a building shall, where practicable, be constructed in such a position that one of its sides at least shall be an external wall. Every water-closet, that is every closet consisting of a single or not more than two soil-pans, constructed in connexion with a building, whether the situation of such water-closet be or be not within the building, shall have in the walls of such water-closet a window of not less dimensions than 2 square feet in aperture, exclusive of frame, and, where practicable, opening directly into the external air.

In addition to such window such water-closet must be provided with adequate means of constant ventilation by at least one air brick built in an external wall of such water-closet, or by an air shaft, or by some other effectual method or appliance for ventilation.

Every water-closet in connexion with a building shall be furnished with a separate flushing cistern of at least 3 gallons capacity, which shall be so constructed, fitted, and placed as to admit of the supply of water for use in such water-closet without any direct communication between any service-pipe upon the premises and any part of such water-closet other than such cistern or flushing box. A suitable apparatus must be provided for the effectual application of water to the basin of the water-closet, and for the effectual flushing and cleansing of such basin, and for the prompt and effective removal therefrom of any solid or liquid filth which may from time to time be deposited therein. Such water-closet shall be furnished with a basin of non-absorbent material of such shape, capacity, and mode of construction as to receive and contain a sufficient quantity of water, and to allow all filth which may from time to time be deposited in such basin to fall free of the sides thereof and directly into the water received and contained in the basin.

Latrines, or a group of closets, may, by special permission, be supplied from one flushing tank of approved size; but water-closets on different floors must not be flushed from one tank. In houses occupied by different tenants in separate rooms, or suites of rooms, there must be a separate cistern to each water-closet. In no case will water-closet accommodation be allowed in the cellar or basement. Water-closets of the description known as "pan closets" are absolutely prohibited. At any time after the date fixed by notice from the Board to the owner of any house, building, or ground, requiring him to connect the same with any sewer of the Board, no privy closet, other than a water-closet approved by the Board, shall be used in such house or building or upon such ground.

The water-closet fitting must be entirely open to inspection, and with no enclosures.

STRAINERS.

25. The entrance to exit pipes to all fixtures except water-closets shall be furnished with suitable permanently attached strainers.

URINALS.

26. Internal cradle urinals must be small, free from projecting ornament, and of non-absorbent material. The waste pipe shall be of potteryware or lead, and, after being trapped, deliver out into the open air over a gully trap or into a disconnector trap, keeping the waste pipe as short and free from bends as possible. The urinal must be provided with approved flushing apparatus. The floor under urinals must be covered with non-absorbent material.

In hotels, clubs, restaurants, theatres, and other public places, enamelled slate or other approved water troughs shall be provided, sunk in an impervious floor under the range of urinals, and kept full of flowing water by approved flushing apparatus. The floors of the urinals must be tiled or paved with a fall towards the trough. The walls behind and screens between urinals must be of non-absorbent material, and of approved height; the screens must also be free from the floor for a portion of the width of the divisions. They must project at least 1ft. 6in., and be not less than 2 feet apart.

HOUSEMAIDS' SLOP SINKS.

27. The waste pipe from a slop sink must be of at least 8-lb. lead, and must be carried independently out to the open air, with a quick fall, and into a full-bore ventilated 3-in. down pipe to the ground, where a gully trap or disconnector trap must take the waste to the drain, and must be trapped with 8-in. trap, having a 2 1/2-in. seal and a brass cleansing screw under the water line, well opened out into a deep cone to receive the sink basin. The trap must be fitted with a 2-in. vent pipe. The sink must be of approved material. Draw-off taps must not be used directly over slop sinks unless at least 2 feet above the sink. Slop sinks must be provided with approved flushing arrangements.

KITCHEN AND SOULLERY SINKS OR TROUGHS.

28. Unless where otherwise specially approved kitchen and scullery sinks and troughs must discharge into the open air over a gully trap. The trap and waste pipes must be not less than 1 1/2 inches diameter.

The brass strainer must be sunk in a hollow cone to the level of the trough.

BATHS AND LAVATORIES.

29. The waste pipe must be at least 1 1/2 inches diameter, of 8-lb. lead pipe, trapped with a deep syphon trap, with a cleansing screw provided with a 2-in. vent pipe. The waste pipe must be carried separately to the open air and delivered over a gully trap, or into a disconnector trap.

The waste pipe and trap from single lavatories must be at least 1 inch in diameter, but the area of the grating must be sufficient to fill the waste pipe full bore. The waste pipe must be as short as possible, and discharge into the open air.

CONSENT OF BOARD.

30. Where the sanction, permission, authority, consent, approval, satisfaction, order, direction, opinion, indication, or notice of or from the Board is necessary, whether special, in writing, or otherwise, with regard to any act, matter, or thing mentioned in this By-law, the same may be given by and under the hand of the Chairman of the Board or of the Engineer-in-Chief, personally, or through an inspecting officer appointed under him, who severally shall be competent to give the same and on behalf of the Board to prescribe any conditions attaching thereto, and subject to and in accordance with which only the same shall be deemed to have been given. The giver of the same shall notify his having done so at the next following meeting of the Sewerage Committee of the Board, with a view to report thereof to the Board for confirmation where necessary.

PENALTY.

31. Any person offending against any provision of this By-law, for violation of which no special penalty is hereinbefore prescribed, shall be liable for every such offence to a penalty not exceeding Twenty pounds, or may be proceeded against under the 165th section of the Act as an offender against the Act.—[Sections 93, 110, 113, and 165.]

WHEREAS by the *Health Act 1890* (54 Vict. No. 1098) it is amongst other things enacted that the Governor in Council may, by order published in the *Government Gazette*, make all regulations necessary for carrying out the provisions of section 125 of the said Act and for the payment of fees to medical practitioners for forwarding reports under that section: Now therefore His Excellency the Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, doth make the following Regulations, that is to say :—

1. On and after the 1st day of April, 1895, the fee to be paid to every legally-qualified medical practitioner for reporting, in obedience to and in accordance with the provisions of section 125 of the *Health Act 1890*, the occurrence of a case of dangerous infectious or contagious disease, if such case occurs in his own private practice, shall be One shilling instead of Two shillings.

2. No medical practitioner shall be entitled to a fee for reporting the occurrence of a case of dangerous infectious or contagious disease under the provisions of the said section unless he shall, within a period of six months from the date of such report, forward a claim for such fee to the Board of Public Health.

3. In so far as is necessary to give effect to these Regulations, the Regulations made on the 11th day of June, 1894, are hereby repealed.

WHEREAS by the *Land Act 1890* (54 Vict. No. 1106, Part I., section 142) power is given to the Governor in Council from time to time to make, alter, and rescind rules, regulations, and orders for the various purposes therein specified: Now therefore His Excellency the Governor of Victoria, with the advice of the Executive Council thereof, doth hereby make the following Alterations in the Regulations made under the provisions aforesaid, that is to say:—

Chapter XI.

NITRO COMPOUNDS.

Division 2.

CANNONITE No. 1.—Consisting of gun-cotton (consisting of thoroughly purified nitro-cellulose), mixed or impregnated with a nitrate or nitrates (other than nitrate of lead or nitrate of ammonium) and resin, and with or without the addition of graphite.

CANNONITE No. 2.—Consisting of gun-cotton (consisting of thoroughly purified nitro-cellulose) mixed or impregnated with resin, and with or without the addition of graphite.

LIFE SAFE.—Consisting of a mixture of potassium, nitrate, sulphur, picric acid, and wood meal. Provided that (1) the amount of picric acid shall not exceed 1 per cent. of the finished explosive, (2) all the ingredients shall be thoroughly purified.

The births of 941 children, viz., 465 boys and 476 girls, were registered in Greater Melbourne during the month of February. In the month of January 1,154 births were registered, or 213 more than in the month under review. The births were 220 below the average of the month during the previous ten years, and 239 below that average if allowance be made for the increase of population.

The deaths registered in February numbered 551, viz., 306 of males and 245 of females; the births thus exceeded the deaths by 390, or 71 per cent. The deaths were fewer than those in January by 60, and below the average of February during the previous ten years by 189. If, however, allowance be made for the increase of population, they will be found to have been under that average by 201.

To every 1,000 of the population of the district the proportion of births registered was 2·14, and of deaths registered 1·26.

The highest temperature in the shade recorded at Melbourne Observatory during the month was 100·6°, on the 13th, and the lowest was 50·3°, on the 11th. The mean temperature of the month (69·3°) was 4° above the average. The greatest range of the thermometer in any one day (46·8°) took place on the 11th, and the least range (1·1°) on the 18th; the mean daily range was 24·4°. The highest atmospheric pressure recorded was 30·201 inches, on the 22nd, and the lowest was 29·530 inches, on the 4th. The mean atmospheric pressure (29·882 inches) was the same as the average.

Rain fell on 5 days, the amount of rainfall being 74 inches. The average rainfall in February during the previous ten years was 1·10 inches, or about a third of an inch more than in the month under notice.

Males contributed 56 per cent., and females 44 per cent., to the mortality of the month. Children under 5 years of age contributed 40 per cent. to that mortality, as against 40 per cent. in February, 1894; 49 per cent. in February, 1893; 49 per cent. in February, 1892; 49 per cent. in February, 1891; 48 per cent. in February, 1890; and 52 per cent. in February, 1889.

Forty deaths of persons who had attained or passed the age of 75 years were recorded during the month. Of these, a female, aged 75, died of cancer; a male, of occupation unknown, aged 75, of valvular disease of the heart; a labourer, aged 75, of heart disease; a female, aged 75, of apoplexy; two females, each aged 75, of pneumonia; a doctor of medicine, aged 75, of cirrhosis of liver; a minister, aged 75, of cystitis; a sergeant of police, aged 76, of influenza; a female, aged 76, of apoplexy; another, aged 76, of syncope; another, aged 76, of gastritis; another, aged 77, of heart disease; and another, aged 77, of bronchitis; a dairyman, aged 78, was accidentally run over by his cart; a gentleman, aged 79, died of syncope; a female, aged 79, of bronchitis; a gentleman, aged

79, of pneumonia; a housekeeper, aged 80, of paralysis; a watchmaker, aged 80, of bronchitis; a bootmaker, aged 80, of Bright's disease; a male, of unknown occupation, aged 81, of apoplexy; a contractor, aged 81, of heart disease; a female, aged 82, of phthisis; a gentleman, aged 82, of apoplexy; a female, aged 82, of hemiplegia; another, aged 82, of brain disease; two gentlemen, aged 82 and 83 respectively, of nephritis; a gentleman, aged 84, of apoplexy; a female, aged 85, of bronchitis; a male, of unknown occupation, aged 86, of pneumonia; a female, aged 87, of cerebral effusion; three females, aged 78, 79, and 80 respectively, two labourers, each aged 84, a female aged 87, and a gardener, aged 88, of old age.

Twenty-six deaths were set down to external causes during the month, of which 17 were ascribed to accident, 1 to homicide, and 8 to suicide. The following are the particulars of the accidental deaths:—A dealer, aged 60, died of fracture of the skull, the result of being thrown from a buggy; a dairyman, aged 78, was run over by a cart; a cutter, aged 17, was killed by machinery; a coal miner, aged 31, died of fracture of the spine, caused through injuries received in a coal mine; a labourer, aged 40, of injuries to the head, through falling down the bank of Merri Creek; an engine-driver, aged 62, was killed by a fall from a staging; a female, aged 40, died from shock, through sticking in a skylight whilst attempting to get on board the *Malay*; a male child, aged 2, and a female, aged 4, of scalds; a female child, aged 4 months, of heat apoplexy; a male child, aged 4, was poisoned; five persons were accidentally drowned, viz.:—a boy aged 12 at Blackburn, a carter aged 20 in the Saltwater River, a drover aged 31 whilst bathing at West Melbourne; a female, aged 25, and a male of unknown occupation, aged 60, were found drowned in the River Yarra; and a female infant, aged 12 days, died from umbilical hemorrhage. The homicidal death was that of a new-born male infant, who was suffocated. The suicidal deaths were those of a law clerk, aged 34, a bank clerk, aged 38, a constable, aged 37, and a grocer, aged 58, who shot himself; a wood merchant, aged 55, who killed himself with an axe; a male of occupation unknown, aged 45, who drowned himself; a bootmaker, aged 35, who hanged himself; and a female teacher of music, aged 34, who suffocated herself.

One hundred and twenty deaths, or 22 per cent. of the whole, took place in public institutions, viz.:—61 in the Melbourne Hospital, 14 in the Alfred Hospital, 4 in the St. Vincent's Hospital, 7 in the Children's Hospital, 1 in the Women's Hospital, 5 in the Immigrants' Home, 10 in the Benevolent Asylum, 12 in the Yarra Bend Lunatic Asylum, 1 in the Metropolitan Lunatic Asylum, 3 in the Austin Hospital, 1 in the Melbourne Gaol, and 1 in the Convent of the Little Sisters of the Poor.

The deaths of children under five years of age numbered 220, of which 126, or 57 per cent., were of males, and 94, or 43 per cent., were of females. Of those who died, 162 were under one year of age, 38 were between one and two, 11 were between two and three, 4 were between three and four, and 5 were between four and five.

The persons who died at a more advanced age than five years numbered 331. Of these, 180, or 54 per cent., were males, and 151, or 46 per cent., were females; 18 were between five and ten, 8 were between ten and fifteen, 12 were between fifteen and twenty, 14 were between twenty and twenty-five, 28 were between twenty-five and thirty, 33 were between thirty and thirty-five, 24 were between thirty-five and forty, 21 were between forty and forty-five, 14 were between forty-five and fifty, 15 were between fifty and fifty-five, 24 were between fifty-five and sixty, 36 were between sixty and sixty-five, 24 were between sixty-five and seventy, 20 were between seventy and seventy-five, 20 were between seventy-five and eighty, 15 were between eighty and eighty-five, and 5 were between eighty-five and ninety.

In the month under review, as compared with the previous one, deaths from zymotic diseases decreased by 12; those from scarlet fever having fallen from 6 to 2, from whooping cough from 13 to 4, and diarrhoeal diseases from 25 to 16; whereas those from typhoid fever rose, as is usual about this time of year, from 26 to 30, and those from diphtheria from 2 to 8. Besides whooping cough and diarrhoeal diseases, a marked decrease also took place in the mortality from other infantile complaints—deaths from want of breast milk having fallen from 8 to 3, from hydrocephalus from 17 to 13, from premature birth from 24 to 13, and atrophy and debility from 45 to 36—chiefly to be accounted for by a decline in the number of births. Moreover, the mortality from phthisis fell from 67 to 59, that from other forms of tuberculosis scrofula, &c. from 8 to 3, from diseases of the circulatory system from 50 to 35, from those of respiratory system from 41 to 36, and from enteritis from 83 to 72; but, on the other hand, deaths from cancer rose from 21 to 26, those from brain and nervous affections from 49 to 52, and those from diseases of the urinary system from 22 to 30.

The following is a statement of the deaths set down to typhoid fever and diphtheria in each month of the years 1890 to 1894, and the first two months of 1895:—
