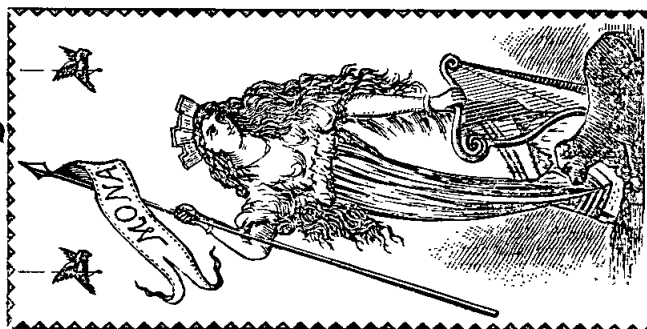

IN pursuance of the provisions of the *Land Surveyors Act 1895* (59 Vict. No. 1400) the Surveyors' Board has made the subjoined Regulations for the Examination of Land Surveyors, viz.:—

REGULATIONS FOR THE EXAMINATION OF LAND SURVEYORS, VICTORIA.

INTENDING candidates must give notice of their intention, in writing, and must forward to the Board documentary evidence that they have complied with the following preliminary conditions; and, upon their applications being approved by the Board, shall pay the prescribed fee of £2 2s. to the Secretary of the Board.

All candidates presenting themselves for examination must be provided with a book of logarithms, a 40-20 scale, a parallel ruler, protractor, and all necessary appliances (except paper) for plan drawing.

PRELIMINARY CONDITIONS.

I. A candidate must have passed the matriculation examination at the University of Melbourne, including English, Geography, Arithmetic, Geometry, Algebra, and Physics, or such other examination as shall, in the opinion of the Board, be equivalent thereto; and must have served with some recognised surveyor for not less than three years, two of which must have been in the field.

II. Or he must have served under articles for not less than four years some recognised surveyor, two years at least of such service to have been in the field; and must give satisfactory evidence of having received such education as will qualify him for the proper exercise of his profession.

III. Or he must have completed the third year's course in the Engineering School of the Melbourne University, or have obtained the Land Surveyor's Certificate as prescribed in the School of Mines, Ballarat, and must have served in the field for two years with some recognised surveyor.

NOTE.—By service in the field is to be understood the survey and subdivision of land.

A candidate whose application shall have been approved as showing that he has complied with any of the above conditions will be eligible for examination, but certificates will not be issued to candidates under 21 years of age. After 1st March, 1899, no candidate will be admitted to examination under the age of nineteen years.

Spherical trigonometry, as applied to land surveying;
Determination of latitude in field and office;
Determination of true meridian in field and office;
Barometric measurements of heights in field and office.

5. Levelling, &c.:

Levelling and mensuration of earthwork.

6. Drawing and Charting:

Construction of maps and charts, including projection;
Compilation of plan from detached plans and notes;
Drawing;
Hill shading;
Writing.

Marine Act 1890.

PORTS IN VICTORIA, WITH RULES AND REGULATIONS; ALSO RULES FOR THE
MANAGEMENT OF THE ALFRED GRAVING DOCK, THE PATENT SLIP, AND THE
FIFTY-TON CRANE.

PROCLAMATION

By His Excellency the Right Honorable Thomas, Baron Brassey, Knight Commander of the Most Honorable Order of the Bath; Governor and Commander-in-Chief in and over the Colony of Victoria and its Dependencies, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS by Part II. of the *Marine Act 1890* (54 Vict. No. 1165) it is amongst other things enacted that the Governor in Council, by Proclamation published in the *Government Gazette*, may from time to time define the limits and boundaries of ports in Victoria, and frame rules and regulations for the governance and preservation of the said ports respectively, and for the regulation of shipping in the same, and also for the due protection and preservation and the good government and management of all public wharfs, and may appoint officers to carry out and enforce such rules and regulations; but that no rules or regulations made as aforesaid respecting any public wharf shall have any force or validity to repeal or affect any by-law passed by the corporation of the city of Melbourne or of the town of Geelong or by the council of any borough, district, or shire for preventing obstruction and encumbrances in and upon any wharf within the limits of such city, town, borough, district, or shire; and that any such limits, boundaries, rules, and regulations may from time to time be in like manner altered, amended, or repealed, and others substituted in their stead: Now therefore I, the Governor of Victoria, acting with the advice of the Executive Council thereof, do hereby repeal all previous Proclamations defining the limits and boundaries of Ports in Victoria, all previous Rules and Regulations relating to such Ports, and all previous Rules for the Management of the Alfred Graving Dock, the Patent Slip, and the Fifty-ton Crane, and do by this Proclamation re-define as hereunder the limits and boundaries of Ports in Victoria, and do make the following Rules and Regulations for such Ports, and for the management of the Alfred Graving Dock, the Patent Slip, and the Fifty-ton Crane respectively, that is to say:—

PORTS DEFINED.

PORT PHILLIP.

The port of Port Phillip shall include all inlets, rivers, bays, harbors, and navigable waters not included in the ports of Melbourne and Geelong respectively, north of and within a line bearing south 80° east from Point Lonsdale to Point Nepean.

MELBOURNE.

The port of Melbourne shall include all inlets, rivers, bays, harbors, and navigable waters north of and within a line bearing north 74° 30' east from a point marked by a post situate on the western shore of Hobson's Bay opposite the eastern end of Little Nelson-street, Williamstown, to a point on the eastern shore of Hobson's Bay and in line with the north-western side of Fitzroy-street, St. Kilda.

GEELONG.

The port of Geelong shall include all inlets, rivers, bays, harbors, and navigable waters southward and westward of and within a line bearing north 88° 30' west from Point Richards to Point Wilson.

WARRNAMBOOL.

The port of Warrnambool shall include all inlets, rivers, bays, harbors, and navigable waters north of and within a line bearing south 71° 30' west from the entrance to the Hopkins River to the outer end of the reef, south of the breakwater pier.

PORT FAIRY.

The port of Port Fairy shall include all inlets, rivers, bays, harbors, and navigable waters north-west of and within a line bearing north 45° east from the eastern end of Griffith Island to the opposite shore.

PORTLAND.

The port of Portland shall include all inlets, rivers, bays, harbors, and navigable waters westward of and within a line bearing north from Point Danger to the opposite shore.

WESTERN PORT.

The port of Western Port shall include all inlets, rivers, bays, harbors, and navigable waters north of and within a line bearing south 71° east from West Head to Grant Point, and also north of a line bearing north 45° east from Cape Woolamai to the opposite shore.

ANDERSON'S INLET.

The port of Anderson's Inlet shall include all inlets, rivers, bays, harbors, and navigable waters northward of and within a line bearing north 74° east from the Petril Rock to the opposite shore.

CORNER INLET AND PORT ALBERT.

The port of Corner Inlet and Port Albert shall include all inlets, rivers, bays, harbors, and navigable waters north of and within a line bearing north 35° east from the south end of Rabbit Island to the entrance buoy to the eastern entrance to Port Albert.

GIPPSLAND LAKES.

The port of Gippsland Lakes shall include Lakes Wellington, Victoria, King, Reeves, Bunga, and all inlets, rivers, bays, harbors, and navigable waters northward of and within a line bearing north 62° east and south 62° west across the outer end of the eastern pier forming the entrance to the Gippsland Lakes.

SNOWY RIVER.

The port of Snowy River shall include all inlets, rivers, bays, harbors, and navigable waters northward of and within a line bearing north 78° east and south 78° west, south of the entrance to the Snowy River in 12 feet of water.

MALLAGOOTA.

The port of Mallagoota Inlet shall include all inlets, rivers, bays, harbors, and navigable waters northward of and within a line bearing north 45° east from Bastion Point to the opposite shore.

LORNE.

The port of Lorne, Loutitt Bay, shall include all inlets, rivers, bays, harbors, and navigable waters west of and within a line bearing south 39° east from the eastern side of Erskine River until abreast of the jetty.

APOLLO BAY.

The port of Apollo Bay shall include all inlets, rivers, bays, harbors, and navigable waters west of and within a line bearing north 20° east from the eastern end of Hayley Reef to mouth of Wild Dog Creek.

RULES AND REGULATIONS FOR THE PORTS IN VICTORIA.

Flags for
vessels from
other than
Australasian
ports.

1. The person in charge of any ship from other than Australasian ports shall, when entering any port of Victoria, hoist and keep an ensign and a blue flag flying at the mainmast-head until the vessel has been boarded and cleared by the Health Officer, when the ensign shall be hauled down, but the blue flag shall be kept flying until the ship has been cleared by the Immigration Officer, if such vessel have passengers on board; if there be no passengers on board such ship, the blue flag may be hauled down at the same time as the ensign.

2. The person in charge of any ship having passengers on board from any Australasian port (not in Victoria), shall, when entering any port in Victoria, hoist a blue flag at the mainmast-head, and keep it flying until such ship has been cleared by the Immigration Officer.

Boarding
vessels.

3. No person, except the pilot and Health and Immigration Officers, and boatmen employed to convey them, shall, with any vessel or boat whatever, go alongside of any ship

from other than an Australasian port, when entering or within any port in Victoria, before she has been cleared by the Health Officer, nor shall any person except the pilot or the Officer of Health board any such ship before she has been so cleared.

4. No person, except the pilot and duly authorized ^{Boarding vessels having passengers.} officers of Government, and such reporters for the press and shipping clerks as may be authorized in writing by the Secretary for Trade and Customs, shall go on board of or leave any ship carrying passengers entering or within any port until such vessel has been cleared by the Immigration Officer, which clearance shall be indicated by the blue flag being hauled down: Provided, nevertheless, that agents of ships and their authorized clerks, may, by written permission from the Secretary of Trade and Customs, go on board vessels consigned to them *after* the clearing officer has boarded, and with his concurrence, notwithstanding that the blue flag may be still flying.

5. No vessel which requires to be cleared by the Health ^{Vessel to wait in bay until cleared.} or Immigration Officer shall enter the River Yarra or go alongside any wharf until such clearance has been duly effected.

6. The master of any ship entering any port in Victoria shall furnish the Health Officer, pilot, or Immigration Officer with a written report of his voyage, cargo, and passengers, and such information relating to the same as may be required. ^{Master to report to boarding officer.}

The pilot, on boarding any vessel arriving at Port Phillip ^{Pilot's duties.} Heads from other than Australasian ports, shall deliver to the master or person in charge of such vessel a form containing the questions relating to Health prescribed by section 168 of the *Health Act* 1890; and shall carefully examine the written replies given to such questions by the master or person in charge of such vessel.

If it shall appear to the pilot from the answers to such questions that such vessel has arrived from, or touched at, any port which shall have been declared by the Governor in Council to be infected, under section 160 of the *Health Act* 1890, or that there is then on board or that there has occurred on board during the voyage, any case of small-pox or any other form of eruptive skin disease, fever, plague, cholera, or any other dangerous infectious or contagious disease, the pilot shall cause such vessel to be at once anchored as close as may be convenient to the Sanitary Station jetty, for inspection by the Health Officer.

In all other cases the master or pilot shall cause such vessel to be taken direct either to the port of Melbourne or the port of Geelong, as the case may be, for inspection by the Health Officer there.

Mail steamers carrying mails for the Western District ^{Clearance of mail steamers.} which require to be landed at Queenscliff shall be inspected and cleared by the Health Officer before such mails are landed.

7. If, and so soon as, the pilot finds from the answers to the health questions that it is necessary that the vessel be taken to the Sanitary Station for inspection, he shall hoist and keep flying a yellow flag at the foremast-head, and the Signal-master at Queenscliff shall thereupon telegraph to the Health Officer at the Sanitary Station that a vessel ^{Health questions answered to pilot.} requires health inspection. ^{Yellow flag.} ^{Clearance by Health Officer.}

Any vessel arriving at the Heads during the night-time, and requiring health inspection, shall be anchored in the Quarantine anchorage, Point Nepean, for inspection on the following morning.

So soon as the Health Officer places a ship in quarantine, the master of such vessel shall forthwith cause a yellow flag to be hoisted and kept flying at the mainmast-head; and if a vessel shall be placed in quarantine by the Health Officer of the port of Melbourne or the port of Geelong, the master of such vessel shall cause such vessel to be at once taken to the Quarantine anchorage at Point Nepean.

Vessels calling at Australasian ports on their way to Victoria, vessels from Australasian ports declared by the Governor in Council to be infected under section 160 of the *Health Act* 1890, and vessels having any person on board at the time of arrival suffering from or affected with any contagious or infectious disease and arriving from any

Australasian port shall not be considered or deemed to be vessels coming from Australasian ports within the meaning of these rules and regulations.

Blue flag.

8. No boat, except steam-tugs and such boats as may be duly authorized by the Government, shall make fast to or tow alongside of any inward-bound ship carrying passengers under way within any port before such ship is properly anchored and the blue flag hauled down.

Heave to for boarding officer.

9. The pilot, or master, of any vessel within, entering, or departing from, any port, shall by every means in his power, consistent with the safety of such ship, assist every duly authorized Government officer in boarding or leaving such ship, and no person on board of any such ship shall interfere with or obstruct any Government officer or any pilot while such officer or pilot shall be engaged in the execution of his duty.

Copy of regulations and Health Officer's report form to be given by pilot.

10. A copy of these regulations, together with the Health Officer's report, shall be delivered to the master of every inward-bound ship which shall take a pilot on board, by such pilot, who shall take a receipt for the same, which receipt such master is hereby required to give on demand; provided that in all cases where a copy of these regulations has been previously furnished it shall not be necessary to supply a further copy unless the first has been lost.

Copy of regulations to be given by boarding officer.

11. The master of every ship not required to take a pilot shall have a copy of these regulations delivered to him by the boarding officer; provided that it shall not be necessary in any case to issue a second copy of the regulations to the master, unless proof be given that the regulations previously issued have been lost. Every master or other officer of a ship or vessel to whom a copy of these regulations shall have been delivered shall give, on demand, an acknowledgment in writing to the officer delivering the same.

Fishermen not to take passengers, Queenscliff.

12. No fisherman, waterman, or other person shall, within the port of Port Phillip, take off in any boat to any outward-bound ship passing Queenscliff and trading to any place beyond the Australasian colonies, any passenger or other person, unless such passenger or other person has in his possession a passenger list containing his name duly entered thereon, and signed by the nearest Emigration Officer.

White flag for outward clearance.

13. The master of any ship outward bound requiring his clearance shall hoist a white flag at the mainmast-head when the ship is ready for sea.

Passengers shipped after clearance.

14. No passenger shall be taken on board any ship outward bound after the clearance has been delivered to the master of such ship, unless such passenger has in his possession a passenger list containing his name duly entered thereon, and signed by the nearest Emigration Officer.

National colours.

15. Every ship shall, between sunrise and sunset, hoist and keep flying her national colours under the following circumstances:—

- (1) When entering any port, from the time of entering such port until the vessel has arrived at her final destination.
- (2) On Sundays and public holidays, weather permitting.
- (3) On leaving port.

Show number.

16. The master or pilot in charge of any vessel entering or departing from any port shall, as the vessel approaches any signal station, hoist the vessel's number or distinguishing flag; and, further, if inward bound, the number of the port the vessel is from. Such flags shall be kept flying until answered from the station, or so long as the vessel shall be within signalling distance of such station.

Competent crew on board.

17. All ships plying within any port shall be in charge of a competent master, and shall also be manned by a sufficient number of experienced seamen.

Anchor buoys.

18. All ships shall have proper buoys and sufficient buoys for their anchors. Any anchor, kedge, cable, or mooring slipped, parted, or cut from, if not weighed within twelve hours, may be weighed by order of the Port Officer, at the risk and expense of the owner, unless the permission in writing of the Port Officer to allow such anchor, kedge, cable, or mooring to remain unweighed, has been previously obtained.

19. All vessels shall unshot their guns immediately after entering any port, and no guns or firearms shall be discharged by any person on board any ship or boat, within any port, nor shall any blue-lights, rockets, or other combustibles be burned on any ship or boat within any port unless permission, in writing, has been previously obtained from the Port Officer, except only when assistance is urgently required. Firearms, rockets, &c.

20. Vessels moored with two anchors shall always have both cables clear. Vessels lying at single anchor shall have the second anchor clear. In both cases the cable shall be kept in readiness to be slipped, veered, or hove in, in case of fire or other accident. Vessels moored.

21. All boats alongside of ships or wharfs shall give way to Government boats on duty. Government boats.

22. No vessel (except those plying with passengers only and certificated tug steamers) shall be unmoored or got under way on Sundays from such vessel's berth, anchorage, or moorings, unless by the express permission, in writing, of the Port Officer; and no work shall be done on, or in connexion with, any vessel in harbor on Sundays, except such as may be necessary for the cleanliness and safety of such vessel, or for the navigation of the passenger vessels and tug steamers aforesaid, unless by the express permission, in writing, of the Port Officer. Work on Sundays.

23. The master or person in charge of any vessel at anchor within the ports of Port Phillip, Melbourne, or Geelong shall not permit any boat or lighter to ride astern of, and be attached to, such vessel at a greater distance from such vessel than 3 fathoms, nor shall the master or such person as aforesaid permit any deeply-laden boat, log or logs of timber, or other floating object likely to injure other vessels or boats to remain astern of and be attached to any vessel. Boats, &c., astern of vessels.

24. No lighter or boat shall anchor at a less distance than 100 fathoms from any wharf, except for the purpose of immediately hauling alongside. Anchoring of boats near wharfs.

25. For the preservation of the submarine cable at Western Port no vessel shall anchor off Flinders during the night within the arc of the *white* light exhibited to seaward from the end of the Flinders wharf, nor shall any vessel anchor during the day within the same area, viz., with the end of such wharf bearing between W. $\frac{1}{2}$ S. and N.W. $\frac{1}{4}$ N. Submarine cable preservation, Western Port.

26. For the preservation of the submarine electric cable laid between Swan Island and Observatory Point, Point Nepean, no vessels shall anchor within four (4) cables' length on either side of an imaginary line crossing Port Phillip Bay from Swan Beacon to Pope's Eye Fort, and thence to Observatory Point. Submarine cable preservation, Heads.

27. For the preservation of the submarine electric cable laid down between the South Channel Fort and Sorrento, and crossing the South Channel about one cable's length to the westward of buoys Nos. 4 and 5, no vessel shall anchor within three-quarters of a mile on either side of an imaginary line from Point King to the South Channel Fort. Submarine cable preservation, South Channel.

28. For the preservation of the electric wire which connects the mainland with Phillip Island, and which is suspended across the eastern entrance to Western Port at an elevation ranging from 110 feet to 140 feet above high-water mark, no person shall navigate any vessel thereunder until he shall have first ascertained that the masts of such vessel are sufficiently low to clear the electric wire. Preservation of overhead electric wire at Phillip Island.

The wire reaches its maximum elevation between the buoy and San Remo wharf.

29. All foreign ships of war or transports arriving in Victoria shall occupy a special anchorage, viz.:—An anchorage situate near the western entrance to the South Channel, Port Phillip Bay, and about six (6) cables to the north of the Quarantine wharf. Foreign ships of war, anchorage place for.

Foreign ships of war or transports on entering the port of Port Phillip shall proceed to such anchorage, unless otherwise notified by the Commissioner of Trade and Customs.

Commanding officers in charge of foreign warships or transports who may be desirous of proceeding to any other anchorage in Victoria shall make application, in writing, to

- the Commissioner of Trade and Customs, who may grant permission to any such warship or transport to occupy any other anchorage should he deem it advisable to do so ; but no person will be allowed to land near or approach the vicinity of any of the forts.
- Armed and unarmed parties. Foreign ships, whether of war or transport, shall not land armed parties. Unarmed parties may, however, be landed for drill or exercise upon permission being previously obtained from the Commissioner of Trade and Customs.
- Boiling pitch, tar, &c. 30. No pitch, tar, resin, oil, or other such like combustible matter shall be heated by fire on board any vessel or boat without the permission, in writing, of the Port Officer. Provided that this rule shall not extend to prevent the burning of any lamp or candle for giving light on board any vessel or boat, or the lighting of any fire for the purpose of cooking or working the machinery of any vessel or boat, although such permission as aforesaid may not have been given.
- Fires—Smoking ships. 31. Between the hours of Ten o'clock p.m. (10 p.m.) and Four a.m. (4 a.m.) no fires, except the furnaces of steamers, shall be lighted, nor shall any unenclosed lights be allowed to burn on board any vessel in any port or harbor where vessels lie for the purpose of loading and discharging cargo or effecting repairs ; nor shall any vessel be fumigated or smoked, except such vessel be moored at a safe and sufficient distance from other vessels, and permission, in writing in that behalf, be obtained from the Port Officer. All fires and lights allowed shall be properly enclosed.
- Fire-buckets. 32. The master or owner of every vessel under 400 tons gross registered tonnage shall provide such vessel with fire-buckets in the proportion of four to each 100 tons, and two for each additional 100 tons above 400, one half of which buckets shall be constantly hung up in some convenient place, with lanyards attached ready for drawing water.
- Lights must be enclosed. 33. The master of every ship shall see that no artificial light is used in any part of any vessel, except the same be securely enclosed, and in charge of some trustworthy person.
- Hatches, lights out, &c. 34. After work has ceased for the day on board any vessel all hatches shall be put on and properly closed to prevent accidents, and before closing the hatches an officer shall go into the hold and into the between decks and satisfy himself that—(1) there are no signs of fire ; (2) that all lights have been put out except those authorized as aforesaid ; and an entry thereof shall be made in the log-book.
- Ship on fire. 35. In the event of fire occurring on board any vessel in port, all persons in charge of or otherwise belonging to any vessel or boat then in such port shall afford such assistance towards extinguishing the fire and the protection of neighbouring vessels as the Port Officer or person deputed by him may demand.
- Beacons not to be made fast to. 36. No person in charge of any vessel shall moor or make fast any such vessel to any buoy or beacon not being a compass adjusting mooring or warping buoy or beacon.
- Dead animals. 37. No person shall throw, place, or leave any dead animal within the boundary of any port, or on the shores thereof.
- Death on board. 38. In the event of the death of any person on board of any vessel in port, the master of such vessel shall immediately report the particulars of such death to the police, and shall then cause the body to be buried on shore, according to law.
- Watch on board. 39. All vessels in port shall always have at least one seaman at watch on deck, with the following exceptions :—(1) Vessels laid up, coal hulks, ballast or other lighters lying within such limits as the Port Officer shall have authorized them to occupy ; but such vessel or vessels shall always have one person on board. (2) Vessels (not being vessels moored to or lying at any pier or jetty) and boats lying within the limits specified in Schedule A. All persons on watch or on board as aforesaid, and all persons in charge of boats, shall answer the challenge of the police or other public officer.

40. Masters requiring to careen, heave down, or haul ^{Careening,} their vessels or boats on shore for the purpose of inspection ^{&c.} or repairs, shall first obtain the permission of the Port Officer so to do, except where such work is proposed to be done on private property.

41. Every person in charge of a vessel to which the ^{White light} "Regulations for Preventing Collisions at Sea" for the ^{on vessels} time being in force do not apply, shall, whenever under ^{under way.} way in any port in Victoria between sunset and sunrise, and approaching or being approached by any other vessel, exhibit a bright white light which shall be capable of being seen from such other vessel at a distance of at least half-a-mile.

42. Every person in charge of any vessel which is ^{White light} required by the preceding regulation number 41 to show a ^{on vessels} white light, and which is anchored or moored in any port ^{anchored.} in Victoria in such a position that such vessel may possibly form a danger to navigation, shall exhibit between sunset and sunrise where it can be best seen a white light in a globular lantern, and so constructed as to show a clear uniform and unbroken light visible all round the horizon at a distance of at least half-a-mile.

43. When any vessel to which the "Regulations for ^{White light} Preventing Collisions at Sea" for the time being in force do ^{on vessels} not apply is being towed by any steam-ship between sunset ^{being towed.} and sunrise in any port of Victoria, the person in charge of such vessel shall exhibit a white light thereon. Such light shall be capable of being seen at a distance of at least half-a-mile all round the horizon.

44. For the purpose of the preceding regulations, numbers 41, 42, and 43, the word "vessel" shall mean and ^{Interpre-} include every ship, lighter, barge, boat, launch, wherry, ^{tation of} punt, canoe, and any kind of navigable vessel or craft ^{"vessel."} whatsoever.

45. Every vessel lying in any port and not alongside any ^{Gangway} wharf shall be provided with a good and sufficient gang- ^{ladder} way ladder. Every vessel lying alongside any wharf, or ^{or stage.} alongside any vessel moored to any wharf, shall be provided with a good and sufficient stage for the use of persons coming from or going on board such vessel, and every such stage shall be made of not less than two (2) inch planks, and be at least three (3) feet broad, with cross battens and ropes on both sides from the vessel to the wharf or from vessel to vessel, supported by wooden or iron stanchions not less than three (3) feet high, and also with a good and sufficient net, placed underneath the stage to prevent accidents, of not less than the following dimensions, viz.:—Length eighteen (18) feet, breadth eight (8) feet, to be made of one and a half (1½) inch rope, to be seven and a half (7½) inches from seizing to seizing so as to form fifteen (15) inch meshes. At night a good and sufficient light shall be provided for every such gangway, ladder, and stage.

46. Accidents involving personal injury, loss of life or ^{Report of} property, from loss or collision of vessels or boats, within the ^{accidents.} limits of any port, shall be reported, in writing, by the persons in charge of the vessels or boats concerned to the Port Officer or nearest Officer of Customs as soon as possible.

47. The Port Officer, or a person deputed by him, shall ^{Berthing} appoint the places where all vessels, lighters, and boats shall ^{vessels.} lie within any port.

48. The Port Officer, or a person deputed by him, may ^{Removing} at any time order any vessel, lighter, boat, timber, or other ^{vessels.} article to be removed from any berth alongside any wharf or from any anchorage to any other part of the port.

49. All vessels, when not engaged in loading or unloading, ^{Hatches to} shall have their hatchways and coal scuttles securely ^{be on.} closed.

50. All masters or pilots in charge of vessels shall, when ^{General} called upon by the Port Officer, or a person deputed by him, ^{order.} or the pier or harbor master, immediately strike their top-gallant yards and masts, have their jib, spanker, and all booms rigged close in, top up, and brace fore and aft all yards and moor with two anchors, or clear hawse, and further shall obey all lawful orders of the Port Officer or the person deputed by him, or the pier or harbor master, and generally follow such directions as the weather, the crowded

condition of the port, or other circumstances may render necessary or expedient in the judgment of the Port Officer, or the person deputed by him, or the pier or harbor master, for the safety and interests of the whole shipping.

Compulsory
removal of
vessels.

51. In the event of any hostile attack or other emergency rendering necessary, in the Port Officer's opinion, the immediate removal of any vessel from one part to any other part of any port, the Port Officer may order such vessel to be removed at once; and should the owner or master, on being called upon, not immediately take the most prompt measures to carry the Port Officer's orders into effect, the Port Officer may hire such steam-tugs and men, tackle or ballast, as may be required, and effect such removal; and the expenses of such removal shall be paid by the owner or master of such vessel; and no such vessel shall be cleared out at the Custom House until the expenses so incurred in such removal shall have been paid to the Collector of Customs, due notice thereof having been given to the Collector of Customs; and no responsibility shall attach to the Port Officer for any damage that may be occasioned by his act done in such emergency in accordance with this rule.

Obstruc-
tions to be
removed.

52. No wharf, pier, jetty, tramway, landing, wool or hide washing stage, fencing of any description, or obstruction, shall be erected by any person on the margin of any bay, river, or navigable creek or place in any port without the permission of the Port Officer; and any such wharf, pier, jetty, tramway, landing, wool or hide washing stage, fencing, or any obstruction whatever, may be removed by the Port Officer, or, if the Port Officer so directs, such wharf, pier, jetty, tramway, landing, wool or hide washing stage, fencing, or obstruction, shall be removed by the owner thereof, who in either case shall pay all the expenses incurred in such removal; and such owner shall exhibit on or near such wharf, pier, jetty, tramway, landing, wool or hide washing stage, fencing, or obstruction, such flags, masts, or lights as the Port Officer may direct, until it is removed to his satisfaction.

Stray boats,
&c., to be
handed to
police.

53. All stray boats, timber, or other articles found within any port shall be immediately delivered by the person finding the same to the nearest member of the police force, in whose custody they shall remain until claimed by the proper owner, who shall pay all reasonable expenses thereon.

Look-out on
vessel under
way.

54. The master of every steam and every sailing vessel being under way within the port of Port Phillip, either by day or night, shall, provided an uninterrupted view over the bow is not obtainable from the look-out bridge or deck of his ship, cause a special look-out to be kept by a man stationed in such a position that an uninterrupted view over each bow and also right ahead may be obtained with certainty.

Rubbish,
ballast, &c.

55. No ballast, rubbish, gravel, earth, stone, wreck, filth, or refuse, or any other material whatsoever, shall be thrown by any person into any port, river, or anchorage, or be placed, landed, or shipped in any port, except at the places and in the manner pointed out by the Port Officer; and all such ballast, gravel, rubbish, earth, stone, wreck, filth, or refuse, or other material, shall be removed at such times and to such places as the Port Officer may direct.

Horse-
bathing at
St. Kilda.

56. Bathing of horses is prohibited from any part of the fore-shore extending from the St. Kilda jetty to Point Ormond, except on that portion of the beach lying between the outlet of the main drain at the foot of Shakespear-street and the Royal Ladies' Baths opposite to and in a line with the end of Robe-street, where horses may be bathed between the hours of 6 p.m. and 11 a.m.

Horse-
bathing at
Geelong.

57. Horses may be bathed between the west side of the Yarra-street pier and the reclamation works on the east side of the Moorabool jetty, but except at such place no person shall bathe horses within 500 yards of any bathing establishment on the fore-shore of Geelong.

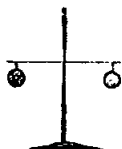

58. Bathing of dogs is prohibited from any wharf or from any part of the fore-shore within 100 yards of any wharf.

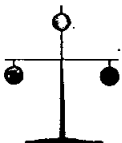

59. *The following Signals are to be used when requisite within the Ports of Victoria.*

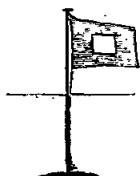

FAIRWAYS, CHANNELS, AND RIVERS.

60. No ship, lighter, boat, or raft shall be anchored near the middle of any fairway, channel, or river; but when detained in any such fairway, channel, or river, all such ships, lighters, boats, or rafts shall lie close over on either

No vessel to lie in fairways.

side of such fairway, channel, or river; nor shall any cable, chain, hawser, or rope, or other obstruction be placed across any such fairway, channel, or river, without the permission of the Port Officer; and such Port Officer may define by bearings or otherwise as he may deem most convenient, the limits of the fairway, channel, or river, in any port or place within his jurisdiction within which no ship or vessel shall bring up, provided that public notice be given thereof.

Exempt
vessels not
to lie in
fairways.

61. Masters of vessels exempt from pilotage shall comply with the preceding regulation number 60, so far as relates to the anchorage within Hobson's Bay.

Fairway to
be kept
clear.

62. The person in charge of any vessel compelled by unavoidable circumstances to let go an anchor in the middle of any fairway, channel, or river shall, as soon as possible, lift the same, and place it in such a situation as not to interrupt or interfere with the free passage of other vessels.

Navigation
of Geelong
Channels.

63. Persons in charge of steam-ships navigating the waters of the Hopetoun Channel, Point Henry, or the South Channel, Geelong, shall cause the speed of such steam-ships to be so reduced that it shall not exceed the rate of 5 nautical miles per hour, and no sailing vessel shall enter either of the above channels whilst any other vessel is proceeding through such channel in an opposite direction.

Navigation
of Mitchell
River.

64. Persons in charge of steam-ships navigating the waters of the Mitchell River, Gippsland, shall cause the speed of such steam-ships to be so reduced that it shall not exceed the rate of 5 nautical miles per hour.

Navigation
of Sale
Canal.

65. The Sale Canal, in the port of the Gippsland Lakes, having been opened for traffic, persons in charge of steam-ships navigating the waters of the said canal shall cause the speed of such steam-ships to be so reduced that it shall not exceed the rate of 4 miles per hour.

Navigation
of Reeves'
Channel.

66. Persons in charge of steam-ships navigating the Cunningham arm of Reeves' Channel shall cause the speed of such steam-ships to be so regulated that it shall not exceed the rate of 4 miles per hour.

67. In the case of a vessel grounding in the South, West, or Hopetoun Channels, and thereby obstructing the navigation, the master or other person in charge of such vessel shall, in addition to the lights provided under the *Marine Act* 1890, exhibit between sunset and sunrise two red lights, placed vertically 6 feet apart in globular lanterns of not less than eight (8) inches diameter, and in such a position from the white light as to indicate as near as possible the position and extent of the obstruction, and he shall also have a man stationed as a look-out on board or in a boat to give warning to approaching vessels, and shall also, between sunrise and sunset, exhibit two balls or shapes in lieu of lights.

WHARFS.

Time

68. The time allowed vessels with full cargoes on board to occupy berths at wharfs, for the purpose of discharging cargo, shall be (exclusive of Sundays and holidays) as follows:—

For ships under 150 tons	2 days
" from 151 " to 200 tons	...	3	"
" " 201 " " 300 "	...	4	"
" " 301 " " 400 "	...	5	"
" " 401 " " 500 "	...	6	"

and so on at the rate of one (1) day for each additional 200 tons register. Vessels not having full cargoes on board shall be allowed time in proportion.

Vessels discharging or taking in cargo at outside berths shall be allowed two days for one of the above scale.

69. No vessel shall be taken alongside any wharf without the authority of the Port Officer, Pier-master, or Wharf Manager.

Ships to be
berthed in
rotation.

70. All vessels, on application being made to the Port Officer, Pier-master, or Wharf Manager, shall be provided with vacant berths in rotation, according to their time of arrival in the port. Any vessel on being appointed to a discharging berth shall immediately proceed to occupy it, otherwise the berth may be given to the vessel next in turn.

71. Vessels taking in cargo shall be liable to removal to ^{Taking in} any berth pointed out for that purpose by the Port Officer, ^{cargo.} Pier-master, or Wharf Manager.

72. Vessels discharging cargo shall have prior claim to a ^{Loading and} berth at the wharf to vessels taking in cargo. ^{discharging.}

The cargo of any vessel loading or discharging at any wharf shall not occupy a greater space there than the length of such vessel, except by special permission of the Port Officer.

73. Cargo may be discharged from or taken in by any ship ^{Outside} lying outside over and across the deck of any vessel lying ^{berth.} alongside of any wharf.

74. All goods or other articles landed on any wharf shall be so placed as to keep the mooring posts or rings free, and ^{Placing} allow a clear passage of at least 5 feet from the edge of ^{goods on} the wharf nearest the vessel, upon which space no goods ^{wharf.} shall be allowed to remain.

75. No goods shall be allowed to remain after being ^{Space} landed upon any wharf or wharf-road within the radius of ^{around} any of the public cranes, nor shall any goods or other articles ^{cranes to be} be deposited for shipment or otherwise upon any wharf or ^{kept clear.} wharf-road within the above-named radius and an approach of twenty-five (25) feet wide of the wharf-roads in front of and in line with the public cranes, which shall at all times be kept clear, and upon which no goods, carts, carriages, or other articles shall be placed or deposited so as to prevent the free use and working of the cranes.

76. All persons about to use any crane placed upon any ^{Oiling and} wharf shall, before using such crane, see that all the work- ^{use of} ing parts thereof have been properly oiled, and must be care- ^{cranes.} ful not to lift any weights which exceed the weights painted on the jib of such crane, and indicating the maximum weight intended to be lifted thereby, and must not use any such crane for the purpose of breaking out any articles or goods, or for any purpose for which it was not originally intended.

77. No vessel shall be removed from a wharf until the ^{Wharfs to be} portion of it opposite to or which has been required for ^{cleared.} the use of such vessel has been thoroughly cleared of all rubbish, and swept clean to the satisfaction of the Port Officer, Pier-master, or Wharf Manager by some person belonging to such vessel or hired by the master or owner thereof.

78. In the event of any goods which shall have been ^{Removin} landed or placed for shipment on any wharf being ^{goods from} allowed to remain on such wharf for more than 24 ^{wharfs.} hours, notice shall be served on the owner, consignee, or exporter of such goods, and if the owner, consignee, or exporter of such goods cannot be ascertained or found, a notice shall be posted upon or affixed to some conspicuous part of such goods; and if they are not removed within three days from the date of such notice, the goods shall be taken by the officer discharging the duties of wharfinger to the Customs Reserve, or some other place duly appointed for that purpose, and there dealt with according to section 11 of the *Marine Act* 1890.

79. No goods shall be placed on any wharfs for shipment ^{Goods} until the vessel for which the goods have been entered out- ^{outwards.} wards has been berthed thereat.

80. No person shall carry on any retail trade in timber or ^{Trading on} other goods on any wharf or wharf-land. ^{wharfs, &c.}

81. No sorting, bulking, or repacking of timber or other ^{Improper} goods, nor screening of coals, shall be permitted on any ^{use of} portion of a wharf, and no coals shall be placed thereon ^{wharfs.} except in bags, nor shall any goods or other articles be put on any wharf which, in the opinion of the Port Officer, are likely to occasion damage to such wharf, nor shall any goods or other articles be placed on any wharf so as to be an impediment to the wharf approaches or an obstacle to the removal of other goods from such wharf.

82. No boat shall be allowed to remain at any landing- ^{Boats at} place after discharging her cargo and passengers (or be ^{landing-} made fast to the steps or handrail belonging thereto) unless ^{place.} there be some person in charge ready to remove such boat when required to do so by the Port Officer, Pier-master, or Wharf Manager.

83. For the preservation of good order, and for the con- ^{Good order} venience of the shipping generally, all watermen, stevedores, ^{on wharfs,} porters, carters, and others engaged on any wharf shall ^{&c.} obey the lawful orders of the Port Officer, Pier-master, or

- Wharf Manager** ; and no owner or driver of any carriage, cab, dray, or other vehicle drawn by horses or other animals shall ply on any wharf without the permission of the Port Officer ; nor shall any person without such permission bring or leave any carriage, cab, dray, or other vehicle, or any animal upon any wharf.
- Traffic on wharfs.** 84. No person shall take, lead, drive, or conduct any horse or other animal, or any carriage, cab, dray, lorry, or any vehicle whatever drawn by any horse or horses, animal or animals, upon or along any wharf without the permission of the Port Officer ; and no owner or person in charge of any carriage, cab, dray, lorry, or vehicle shall, without the permission of the said Port Officer, leave the same or allow or permit or suffer the same to be left on such wharf.
- Ship at owners' risk.** 85. The Government shall not in any way be responsible for the charge of any vessels or boats lying within any port, and their security and safety, whether at anchor or moored alongside any wharf, shall be at the risk of the owners.
- Steam hoisting machinery.** 86. No master of any ship within the meaning of the *Marine Act* 1890, nor any person under his command, shall permit any steam machinery to be used on any wharf for hoisting cargo into or out of such ship, nor for any other purpose in connexion with such ship, unless the owner of such steam machinery shall have obtained a certificate from the Port Officer, which certificate shall be uncanceled, that such machinery is in good order, and that the person in charge thereof is duly qualified ; and every such owner shall on demand deliver up to such master such certificate ; and such master or other person shall, while such machinery is being so used, hold and keep possession of such certificate, and shall produce it on demand to the Port Officer, Pier-master, or Wharf Manager. Such certificate may be issued by the Port Officer, subject to the following conditions :—
- (1) All steam hoisting engines, and the persons in charge thereof, shall be examined by some competent person to be approved of by the Commissioner of Trade and Customs, and passed by him as being qualified.
 - (2) Such engines shall be examined once every six months.
 - (3) A fee of Twenty shillings (20s.) shall be paid for each survey of an engine, and a fee of Twenty shillings (20s.) for each person so examined and passed.
- Cancellation or suspension of certificates.** 87. Such certificates may be cancelled or suspended when it shall be found to the satisfaction of the Port Officer that any engine is out of repair, or that any engine-driver has been guilty of any misconduct which in the opinion of the Port Officer constitutes a sufficient cause for the cancellation or suspension of any certificate issued under the preceding clause.
- Steamers at wharfs.** 88. When two or more steamers having passengers or goods on board arrive at any wharf at or about the same time, and have occasion to land or take on board passengers or goods, the steamer last in arriving shall stop not less than 50 yards from the other steamer, and remain until the operations of the latter shall be completed, which operations shall be carried out with all despatch.
- Steamer's furnace.** 89. The masters of steam-vessels shall, so soon as their vessels are berthed, cause the furnaces and dampers to be so regulated as to prevent as far as possible accidents by fire, and shall so adjust their furnace doors and temper their furnace fires as that no more than the smallest practicable quantity of smoke shall pass therefrom.
- Punctuality in sailing.** 90. The master or pilot in charge of all steam-ships carrying passengers shall depart punctually from any wharf at the hour publicly advertised and fixed for sailing, excepting always in case of accidents actually happening to the machinery or hull, which shall be immediately reported to the Pier-master or Wharf Manager ; when any steamer is prevented from sailing at the hour originally announced, the Port Officer, Pier-master, or Wharf Manager may have such steamer removed in order to make way for the next vessel in turn for the berth.
- Port Officer, &c., to berth** 91. All ships and steam-ships within any port being at any of the wharfs thereof shall be placed as the Port Officer, Pier-master, or Wharf Manager may direct, and shall be subject to the orders of the Port Officer, Pier-master, or Wharf Manager as aforesaid in regard to moving or shifting,

and in regard to the extent of the accommodation such ships or steam-ships may require from each other.

92. If any person shall injure in any way or destroy any wharf, tramway, shed, building, or erection of any kind situated in any port or harbor, or any crane, truck, tackle, or other Government property whatsoever belonging to or connected with any such wharf, tramway, shed, building, or erection, such person shall be deemed guilty of an offence against these regulations, and liable to the penalty prescribed by law therefor.

93. No person shall smoke on or under any wharf, or in or under or in close proximity to any shed, or shall affix to or inscribe on any building, wall, fence, hoarding, post, board, or any other thing whatsoever attached to any wharf or under the control of the Port Officer, or any Pier-master or Wharf Manager, any printed or written matter or inscription without the consent first obtained of the Port Officer, or shall, without the written consent of the Port Officer, address any assemblage of persons in any shed or on any wharf or wharf-land, and all persons shall depart from any shed, wharf, or wharf-land when required to do so by the Port Officer, Pier-master, or Wharf Manager.

BALLAST.

94. No sand ballast or other material shall be raised from below high-water mark, except under conditions approved of and at places appointed by the Port Officer.

Sand ballast.

95. Proper tarpaulins or shoots shall be used in discharging or taking in ballast, coal, rubbish, gravel, earth, or filth, so as to effectually prevent any part thereof falling overboard; and no ballast shall be taken on board or discharged from any vessel after dark without the special permission of the Port Officer.

96. The master or pilot in charge of any ship shall not receive ballast into any ship under his command unless the owner of the lighter supplying it shall have obtained a certificate from the Port Officer, which certificate shall be uncanceled, that such lighter has been duly measured and marked, and is in good order, and that the person in charge of such lighter is duly licensed; and every such owner shall on demand deliver up to such master such certificate; and such master or other person shall, while such lighter is employed supplying ballast to the ship under his command, hold and keep possession of such certificate, and shall produce it on demand to the Port Officer, or any other officer deputed by him; and no ballast shall be supplied by a ballast lighter except such lighter, as well as the person in charge thereof, is duly licensed by the Port Officer. Provided that this regulation shall be of no force or effect as regards ballast lighters, and persons in charge thereof duly licensed under the provisions of the *Harbor Trust Act* 1890.

97. Certificates may be issued by the Port Officer subject to the following conditions:—

Conditions
upon which

(1) All ballast lighters and persons in charge thereof shall be examined by an officer acting under the orders of the Port Officer and passed by him.

(2) All ballast lighters shall be surveyed once in every twelve months or within such shorter period as may be found necessary by the Port Officer.

(3) Every ballast lighter shall have the number of her certificate painted on both bows in figures (white on black ground) of not less than twelve (12) inches deep and two (2) inches wide.

(4) Every ballast lighter shall have an iron batten three (3) inches wide secured to the sides of the stem and stern posts, or other convenient place to be decided by the Port Officer or other officer acting under his orders, and so marked as to show the draught of water for every five (5) tons weight of ballast carried or discharged, such marks to be in white figures where practicable of not less than one and a half (1½) inches in length, or of such dimensions as may be approved by the Port Officer.

(5) Every ballast lighter shall have two (2) grooves cut into the planking from the stem to the stern post of not less than two (2) inches in width, and painted white, to denote the loaded and light draught lines; the lower edge of these grooves to be on a level with the water's edge to mark these measurements; such marks and corresponding draught of water shall be indorsed upon the certificates.

(6) Such licences may be cancelled or suspended when it shall be found to the satisfaction of the Port Officer that the owner or master has defrauded or attempted to defraud the master, owner, or charterer of any ship, by altering the marks or figures on any ballast lighter, or by delivering or attempting to deliver short weight of ballast to any vessel, or has been guilty of any such misconduct which in the opinion of the Port Officer constitutes a sufficient cause for the cancellation or suspension of any such licence or certificate. Masters of vessels shall have power to inspect any lighter bringing ballast alongside such vessel for ballasting purposes, and to test the accuracy of the measurement of the ballast lighter, and the weight of ballast she supplies; and no master or owner of any lighter shall refuse to allow such master or owner of a ship to examine such lighter, or test the weight of the ballast during her discharge, or to pump out water from the said lighter, when requested to do so.

98. Masters of ships having any complaint shall report the same to the Port Officer.

99. The Port Officer or any person acting under his orders, may inspect or re-measure any ballast lighters, or test the accuracy of such measurement, and appoint the place and method where and how such measurement shall be made.

100. The expense of measuring and marking ballast lighters shall be borne and paid by the owner or owners of such ballast lighters.

EXPLOSIVES.

Gunpowder
flag.

101. Ships and boats shall not approach any licensed explosives-hulk nearer than 200 yards, unless duly authorized; and every person in charge of a ship or boat shall observe due caution when approaching any vessel having the gunpowder flag hoisted.

No fire
allowed.

102. No fire or light shall be lighted or be allowed to continue burning on board any ship or boat during the time any explosive is being discharged from or taken on board such ship or boat.

Stores.

103. All explosives retained on board any ship as stores shall, during the time such ship is within any port, be securely kept in a suitable copper magazine, to be approved of by the Inspector of Explosives.

104. No explosive shall be shipped on board any vessel as cargo within any port in Victoria, unless such vessel shall be lying in the anchorage hereinafter prescribed for vessels having more than 20 lbs. of explosives on board, or such quantity as may be necessary to meet the law's requirements for signalling purposes, and no explosives shall be shipped on board any vessel as stores within the limits of any port in Victoria, except in the quantities and according to the manner approved of or prescribed by the Inspector of Explosives, and all explosives shipped as stores shall be placed in properly constructed copper magazines, to be approved by the Inspector of Explosives.

Vessels with

105. No merchant vessel will be permitted to moor alongside any wharf with gun-cotton or combustibles on board. Vessels belonging to H.M. Navy, the Victorian or any Colonial Governments requiring to moor alongside any wharf, are to have their powder and other explosives, except filled shells, small arms, machine gun, and quick-firing gun ammunition, removed before mooring alongside any wharf. The filled shells and other ammunition retained on board are to be placed in the shell rooms, which, with the magazines containing the explosives retained on board, are not to be opened during the time the vessel remains alongside any wharf, except under special precautions to be approved of

by the Inspector of Explosives. Provided that the Commissioner of Trade and Customs may give permission, should he see fit, for the retention on board of any such vessels of any or all of their powder and other explosives.

106. All boats specially licensed to convey explosives Conveyance of explosives. either to or from ships, wharfs, or other places shall be subject to all the regulations, so far as the same may be applicable, in force for the time being for the management of hulks containing explosives; and no boat having explosives on board shall be towed by a high-pressure open-decked steam-boat whose furnaces are exposed, nor shall any such boat be towed by any other steamer with less tow-line between her and the steamer than 60 feet, and no steamer shall approach within 60 feet of any hulk, lighter, or boat containing explosives.

107. Lighters or boats other than those in Port Phillip Anchorage of boats conveying explosives. conveying explosives to or from any vessel or magazine shall not remain at anchor, except as provided for in the *Explosives Act* 1890; but, if unable to discharge all the explosives with which they may be laden into the magazine or vessel in which such explosives are intended to be discharged, as the case may be, between the hours of 7 a.m. and 5 p.m. or 7 a.m. and 4 p.m. respectively, they shall return and anchor in the anchorage provided in these regulations for vessels having on board more than 20 lbs. of gunpowder under the *Explosives Act* 1890, or such quantity as may be necessary to meet the law's requirements for signalling purposes.

108. Lighters and boats in Port Phillip conveying explosives to or from any vessel in Port Phillip or magazine shall not remain at anchor, except as provided for in the *Explosives Act* 1890; but, if unable to discharge all the explosives with which they may be laden into the magazine or vessel in which such explosives are intended to be discharged, as the case may be, between the hours of 7 a.m. and 5 p.m. or 7 a.m. and 4 p.m. respectively, they shall proceed to the mooring place for floating magazines, lighters, or boats, situate between Point Cook and Laverton, in 18 feet of water; but, if such mooring place cannot be reached by reason of adverse wind, weather, or other unforeseen cause, such lighters and boats containing explosives in transit may moor temporarily to the southward of a line drawn from the south side of the St. Kilda pier to the Time-ball Tower, Williamstown, the east and west boundary of such temporary anchorage being marked by two cask buoys painted red and moored in 16 feet of water. Mooring place for boats conveying explosives in Port Phillip.

109. No vessel having more than 20 lbs. of explosives Explosives on board or such quantity as may be necessary to meet the law's requirements for signalling purposes arriving or being or remaining in any of the undermentioned ports or harbors of Victoria shall be permitted to be or anchor otherwise than as follows:— Explosives anchorages.

Port of Port Phillip.—Not nearer than three-quarters of a mile of Gellibrand's Point, nor to the northward of the line bearing E. from the Gellibrand Light-ship.

Port of Geelong (Inner Harbor).—Not nearer than three-quarters of a mile from Limeburner's Point, nor to the westward of a line bearing N.N.W. from the Powder-magazine.

Port of Geelong (Outer Harbor).—Not nearer than 2 miles of the shore, nor to the northward of a line bearing E. from Point Henry.

Port of Portland Bay.—Not nearer than three-quarters of a mile of the shore, nor to the northward of a line bearing E. from Observatory Point.

Port of Port Fairy.—Not nearer than three-quarters of a mile of the shore, nor to the westward of a line bearing N.N.E. from the Light-house.

Port of Warrnambool.—Not nearer than half-a-mile of the shore, nor to the westward of a line bearing S.S.W. from the Beach Light-house.

Port of Port Albert.—Not nearer than 2 miles of the wharfs, nor to the northward of Sunday Island.

Port of Corner Inlet.—Not nearer than 1 mile of any wharf, nor outside the limits of Franklin Channel.

The bearings are magnetic.

DANGEROUS CARGOES.

Anchorage, &c. 110. No vessel having as cargo any oils, chemicals, or other materials of a dangerous or inflammable character shall be permitted to anchor, moor, or be within any port, except in such anchorage or berth as may be prescribed by the Port Officer; and no such vessel shall discharge any such cargo except at the landing-place or anchorage and in the manner prescribed by such Port Officer, nor shall any such cargo be carried or waterborne by any vessel, lighter, or vehicle unless such vessel, lighter, or vehicle shall have been previously approved of by the Port Officer aforesaid.

Damage by fire. 111. It shall be the duty of the master of any vessel carrying any such cargo to take every precaution against loss or damage by fire or otherwise to any of the shipping, wharfs, or buildings in any port during the time such cargo remains on board his vessel, or while it is being discharged therefrom.

Precautions re landing and removal of combustibles or dangerous goods. 112. No fires or lights shall be permitted in any ship having combustibles or dangerous goods on board while in any port, and all such goods must be landed between sunrise and sunset, and also removed beyond the limits of any wharf within two hours after being landed; also every care must be exercised to prevent risk of accident to the packages or cases in which combustibles or dangerous goods are contained; and no fires or smoking shall be permitted on any vessel or wharf berth while such goods are lying on the wharf or in process of being landed or removed to or from any vessel.

Combustibles not to lie on wharfs, &c. 113. No lime, tar, pitch, resin, spirituous liquors, turpentine, aquafortis, oil of vitriol, kerosene, inflammable acids of all descriptions, or other combustible article or substance shall be placed or allowed to remain on any wharf or on the deck of any vessel, unless the same is under the protection of a watchman; and the owner of such lime, tar, pitch, resin, aquafortis, oil of vitriol, spirituous liquors, turpentine, or kerosene, or other combustible thing must remove the same to a place of safety within two hours after being required to do so by the Pier-master or Wharf Manager. In the case of goods left on any wharf, the owner of such goods shall be liable to the penalties in respect of every such breach of this regulation as aforesaid; and in case of goods left on the deck of any vessel, the master or owner of such vessel shall be liable to the penalties in respect thereof.

Dangerous and other goods. Re placing of in sheds. 114. No gasoline, benzine, naphtha, petroleum, kerosene, turpentine, casks containing oils, castor oil in cases, inflammable acids of all descriptions, vitriol in packages of any description, kegs or casks of white lead and casks of all kinds of paints, bales of kapok, bales of cotton waste, bales of old rags, green skins, or hides, iron in bar or bundles, casks of hardware, casks of cement or whiting, bags of bark, cases, kegs, or casks of nails or hardware, galvanized fencing wire, bundles or bales of fibre, wooden doors, windows, sashes, or any kind of woodenware shall be placed in any transit shed without the permission of the Pier-master or Wharf Manager.

MAILS.

Mail flags. 115. All vessels having mails on board for Melbourne or any other port of Victoria except the port of Geelong shall, on approaching their anchorage, hoist a white flag at the foremast-head, which flag shall be kept flying until the mails are taken out of the vessel.

Mails for Geelong. 116. All vessels having mails on board for Geelong shall, on entering between the heads of Port Phillip, hoist a white flag at the foremast-head, as a signal for the mail boat to come off, and shall heave to or anchor within a reasonable distance of Queenscliff until such mails are taken out of the vessel.

Mail boats. 117. All mail boats shall have a preference of berth, whether alongside vessels or wharfs, during such time as they are occupied in shipping or landing mails.

REGULATIONS FOR STEAM-BOATS, AND FOR VESSELS MEETING AND PASSING.

118. When steamers have vessels in tow, and are steering ^{Steamers} opposite courses, the steamer towing a vessel bound inwards ^{with vessels} before meeting the steamer with a vessel in tow bound out- ^{in tow.}wards shall slack her speed, when practicable, until the other shall have passed her.

119. Steamers about to pass any dredging machine at ^{Steamers to} work in any river or channel, or any licensed ferry, or ^{go slow} public work in progress shall slow their engines to less than ^{passing} half-speed for at least 100 yards before arriving abreast of ^{dredges, &c.} the dredge, ferry, or work, and shall keep their engines so slowed until they shall have passed such dredge, ferry, or work.

120. All vessels passing any dredge shall pass on the side ^{Side to pass} indicated by a red ball by day and by a red light by night; ^{dredge.} when the ball is down they may pass on either side without slackening their speed.

121. Steamers must proceed at moderate speed whilst ^{Steamers,} navigating amongst the shipping in any port. ^{moderate} ^{speed.}

MISCELLANEOUS REGULATIONS.

122. In every case in the above regulations where any ^{Onus on} act is forbidden or required to be done in relation to any ^{master.} ship or vessel, the duty of performing such act or forbearance shall rest upon the master of such ship or vessel unless where otherwise expressly directed to the contrary.

123. In the foregoing regulations the expression "Aus- ^{Interpreta-} tralasian" shall apply to ports in New Zealand and Tas- ^{tion.} mania, as well as in Australia proper; the expression ^{"Austra-} "Immigration Officer" shall include any immigration or ^{lasian."} emigration agent or officer, or any assistant immigration or ^{"Immigra-} emigration agent or officer duly appointed to carry out these ^{tion officer."} regulations; words imputing the masculine gender shall be deemed and taken to include females, the singular to include ^{"Masculine} the plural and the plural the singular, unless the contrary ^{gender."} as to gender or number is expressly provided; the word ^{"Singular} "explosives" shall, except where otherwise expressly stated ^{number."} to the contrary, include gunpowder and all such substances as may be included in the term "explosives," under the provisions of the *Explosives Act* 1890, or any Act amending the same; the term "ship" shall include vessel and ^{"Ship."} *versâ*, unless expressed to the contrary. "Master" shall ^{"Master."} include the person in charge of any ship except the pilot. ^{"Wharf."} The term "wharf" shall mean every public wharf, pier, jetty, quay, or landing-place.

124. The above regulations shall not in any way be taken ^{Harbor} to repeal, vary, or interfere with any rules or regulations ^{Trust} made or to be made under the authority of the *Melbourne* ^{regulations.} *Harbor Trust Act* 1890, or any Act amending the same, or ^{Not to} of any rules or regulations made by the Melbourne Harbor ^{interfere} Trust Commissioners, and in force at the time of the ^{with.} coming into operation of the first-mentioned Act and not subsequently repealed, and shall have no force or effect in any case where they are contrary to, or are inconsistent with, any such rule or regulation lawfully made by the Melbourne Harbor Trust Commissioners.

125. All steamers or boats employed to tow or in any way ^{Tugs under} move or assist any vessel in charge of a licensed pilot shall ^{pilots'} be (whilst employed on such service) under the orders of ^{orders.} such pilot in all matters connected with the navigation of such vessel.

126. The master of every ship on entering any port in ^{Signal for} Victoria for which a pilot or pilots is or are licensed, unless ^{pilot.} such ship or such master is exempt from pilotage by law, or unless there be a licensed pilot on board such ship, shall until a licensed pilot has come on board, display and keep flying the usual sign for a pilot; and such master shall, by every means in his power, consistent with the safety of his ship, facilitate such pilot getting on board, and shall not enter such port without a pilot being on board and in charge of such ship.

127. The master of every ship which by law is exempt ^{Master} from payment of pilotage shall, on entering any port or ^{exempt.} harbor in Victoria, cause a white flag to be hoisted (below

the blue flag mentioned in clause 1) at the mainmast-head, and keep it flying until such ship is anchored within the port.

Vessel not to be moved unless in charge of Harbor-master or pilot. 128. No ship which is liable to pilotage on entering or leaving any port shall be moved from any place or position within the limits of that port to any other place or position in such port unless such ship shall be in charge of the Harbor-master or of a pilot duly licensed for that port.

Certificate of pilotage. 129. Certificates of pilotage shall be filled up and signed by the master or person in charge of each vessel piloted, and delivered to the pilot.

SCHEDULE A (SEE SEC. 39).

(1) A line drawn from the end of the Port Melbourne town pier to the south end of the steam-boat jetty on the east side of the Port Melbourne railway pier.

(2) A line drawn from the south end of the steam-boat jetty on the west side of the Port Melbourne railway pier to the red dolphin at the northern side of the entrance to the River Yarra Yarra.

(3) A line drawn from the black dolphin at the southern side of the entrance to the River Yarra Yarra to the end of the Ann-street wharf, and thence to the end of the railway and breakwater piers at Williamstown.

RULES FOR THE MANAGEMENT OF THE ALFRED GRAVING DOCK AND PATENT SLIP.

Hours. 1. The gates of the dock-yard will be opened at 7.30 a.m. and closed at 5 p.m. daily, Sundays and holidays excepted. Should any extension of hours be required in consequence of continuous repairs to a vessel in dock or on the slip, such may be obtained on application to the Superintendent, and on payment of the requisite overtime.

Free vessels. 2. All vessels belonging to Her Majesty's Navy, the Victorian or any Colonial Government, the Melbourne Harbor Trust Commissioners, commissioned ships of foreign nations, vessels wholly employed in the whale fisheries, and vessels used exclusively for missionary transport or charitable purposes will be admitted into dock or on the slip without payment of the usual dock or slip dues, but only of such sum as is necessary for the reimbursement of actual expenditure of stores, wages, and materials.

Dues. 3. All other vessels will be required to pay dues according to the Schedules hereunto annexed; the said dues including and covering the cost of pumping, hauling up, and launching, shoring, wedges, and blocking, and the use of the shores, wedges, and blocks, as hereinafter provided; the cost of all labour on shore connected with the docking or undocking of a vessel, and the use of the warp required for warping a vessel in or out of dock.

Blocks, shores, &c. 4. Blocks, shores, and stages will be provided by the Government, as follow:—

Blocks.—One set for the length given at the time of registering.

Horizontal shores.—One for every 15 feet of the length given at the time of registering.

Stage poles and planks.—A sufficient number to make one tier of stages around the vessel, to consist of two planks in breadth, and a gangway stage of two poles and five planks.

All necessary stage planks and cross-bearers, with the use of the yard during the carrying on of repairs, will be allowed the persons effecting the repairs without any additional charge; but any damage occurring to the same, or to the dock, caisson, the keel-blocks, slip-cradle, or other material, shall be made good at the expense of the applicant for registration of the ship, and all such materials lent by the

Government to the person using the dock or slip shall be returned in the same order as received, and stacked to the satisfaction of the Superintendent of the dock or his foreman previous to the vessel being undocked or launched, and no such materials will be allowed to be taken from the dock premises for effecting repairs after the vessel is undocked or launched.

5. The owner, master, or agent of any vessel desiring the use of the dock or slip should make his application to be registered on the form to be obtained from the office of the Officer in charge of the Harbor Department, such application to be lodged between the hours of 9 a.m. and 4.30 p.m. on week days, and from 9 a.m. until noon on Saturdays, which will be duly registered in order of receipt. Should any dispute arise as to priority for registration, such shall be submitted to and decided by the Commissioner of Trade and Customs, or other Minister acting in his behalf, whose decision shall be final. With the application for registration, and before registration is made, the sum of Ten pounds (£10) shall be paid to the Secretary for Harbors as "entrance fee," which sum shall be allowed as part payment of dock or slip dues, provided that such dock or slip dues shall be settled within seven days after delivery of the account for the same, otherwise such fee will be liable to forfeiture, and dock or slip dues to be paid in full. No vessel will be taken into dock or on the slip until all claims due in respect of such vessel, or other vessels belonging to the same owners, or having the same master or agent, shall have been paid. The Officer in charge of the Harbor Department will duly intimate to the applicant the date when the dock or slip will be available.

6. Any vessel employed under contract with the Victorian Government to carry mails shall, with the special sanction of the Commissioner of Trade and Customs, have precedence over vessels on the dock register.

7. Should any vessel not be in position and ready to be warped into dock or over slip-cradle at such time as may be specified in writing by the Officer in charge of the Harbor Department, and addressed to the person making the application, the turn of such vessel will lapse, and fresh application for registration must be made, the entrance fee being also forfeited, and the applicant will be responsible for any expenses already incurred in connexion with the docking or slipping, unless the inability to dock or slip shall have occurred through stress of weather, which the Officer in charge of the Harbor Department shall determine, when such vessel may retain her position upon the register without forfeiture of the entrance fee.

8. The Government will not hold itself responsible for any delay or accident occurring to any vessel during docking or undocking, hauling up or launching, nor while in dock or on the slip, the vessel being during the whole of such time entirely at the risk of the owners, except such may occur by the fault or negligence of any of its servants. No repairs are undertaken by the Government.

9. So soon as any warp shall have been made fast to any vessel by instruction of the Superintendent of the dock, such vessel having been placed in position by and at the expense of the master or owner in line with the fairway and within 20 feet of the entrance of the dock or slip-way, and until relieved by the withdrawal of such warp, such vessel shall be held to be under the control of the Superintendent, whose directions must be implicitly and promptly attended to.

10. There shall be a sufficient number of officers and crew on board every vessel, while entering or going out of dock, for the purpose of warping the vessel in and out, or, if using slip, of warping her between the platforms and standing her on the cradle, and in either case assisting on board and attending to such orders as may be given by the Superintendent.

11. Changes of turns between vessels will be allowed with the written sanction of the Officer in charge of the Harbor Department, but not otherwise.

12. No merchant vessel will be admitted into dock, on the slip, or permitted to moor alongside the dock wharf with any explosives or combustibles on board. Vessels belonging to H.M. Navy, the Victorian or any Colonial Governments requiring the use of the dock, slip, or to moor

alongside the dock wharf, are to have their powder and other explosives, except filled shells, small arms, machine gun, and quick-firing gun ammunition, removed before entering the dock, slip, or before mooring alongside the dock wharf. The filled shells and other ammunition retained on board are to be placed in the shell rooms, which, with the magazines containing the explosives retained on board, are not to be opened during the time the vessel remains in dock, on slip, or is moored alongside the dock wharf, except under special precautions to be approved of by the Inspector of Explosives. Provided that the Commissioner of Trade and Customs may give permission, should he see fit, for the retention on board of any such vessels of any or all of their powder and other explosives.

Breaking up
or scuttling.

13. No vessel shall be broken up or scuttled while in dock or on the slip, except with the written permission of the Officer in charge of the Harbor Department; and should any master, owner, or agent commence to break up or scuttle any vessel in dock or on the slip without such permission, the Officer in charge of the Harbor Department may at once remove such vessel out of the dock or from the slip, and the master, owner, or agent shall be responsible, in addition to the dock or slip dues, for any expenses which may be incurred by such Officer in charge of the Harbor Department in so doing.

Delay in
undocking.

14. Should wind and weather or tide not permit of a vessel being undocked or launched when the repairs are completed, she may be allowed to remain in dock or on the slip, without any additional charge, subject to the decision of the Officer in charge of the Harbor Department, but no demand for demurrage can be entertained.

Dues

15. Sailing ships are to be charged dues on their registered tonnage, and steam-ships on their gross tonnage; tonnage in both cases to be British measurement.

Regulations

16. The officers, crew, and workmen of any vessel while in dock or on the slip shall strictly comply with the printed rules and regulations of the establishment, copies of which will always be posted at the dock gates and in the dock office. Any workmen committing any breach of the regulations will be liable to be prohibited from entering the dock premises; and before the water is let in to take any vessel out of dock, or any vessel be launched from the slip, the dock or slipway must be cleaned up to the satisfaction of the Superintendent, by or at the expense of the person who registered the vessel.

Special
agreements.

17. Should the Alfred Graving Dock or Patent Slip be engaged for the purpose of docking or slipping any vessel requiring extensive repairs for periods of not less than thirty (30) working days, the Commissioner of Trade and Customs will decide whether any, or what, concession is to be allowed in the payment of the dock or slip dues. Vessels using the dock or slip, under this rule, shall be kept in such a condition as to be able to leave the dock or slip (if required for another vessel) within a period of five days after notice has been given to leave, otherwise full rates or dues will be charged for every day the vessel remains in dock or on the slip after the date of notice has expired.

2. With application for registration, and before registration is made, a deposit of £3 shall be paid to the Secretary for Harbors, which sum shall be allowed as part payment of crane rates, provided such rates shall be settled within seven (7) days after delivery of the account for same, otherwise such deposit shall be liable to forfeiture, and the dues to be paid in full. Deposit.

3. Ships requiring the use of crane and for which deposit has been paid shall have prior claim to use of wharf abreast of crane so long as they are using the crane. Berth.

4. Should any vessel not be in position to use the crane at such times as may be specified by the Officer in charge of the Harbor Department or Harbor-master, Melbourne, the turn of such vessel will lapse, and fresh application for registration must be made, the deposit fee being liable to be forfeited, subject to the decision of the Honorable the Commissioner of Trade and Customs; and the applicant will be responsible for any expenses already incurred in getting the crane ready for use, unless the inability to use the crane shall have occurred through stress of weather or other circumstances, which the Officer in charge of the Harbor Department shall determine, when such vessel may retain her position upon the register without forfeiture of the deposit. BOARD OF LAND AND WORKS.—BY-LAWS.— GEELONG WATER SUPPLY.

THE Board of Land and Works doth hereby, pursuant to and in exercise of the powers and authorities conferred on such Board by the *Water Act* 1890, make the By-laws following :—

1. All by-laws heretofore made relating to the Geelong Water Supply shall be and the same are hereby repealed, except as to anything done or committed or the recovery of any rates due and payable thereunder.
2. The following rates and charges are those which the owners and occupiers of lands and tenements shall pay in respect of water supplied by the Board (that is to say)—
 - (i.) On every house or tenement of £10 annual value and under, Ten shillings per annum.
 - (ii.) On every house or tenement above the annual value of £10, a rate of Five pounds per centum on the amount of the valuation up to £100 inclusive ; Four pounds per centum on the amount of the valuation in excess of £100 up to £300 ; Three pounds per centum on the amount of the valuation in excess of £300 up to £500 ; and Two pounds ten shillings per centum on the amount of the valuation in excess of £500.
 - (iii.) Buildings used for storage purposes only, such as bonded stores, shall be subject to a rate of Two pounds ten shillings per centum on the amount of the valuation.
 - (iv.) Private water-troughs shall be charged at the rate of Twenty shillings per annum each.
 - (v.) For water supplied by the Board by measure, except in cases of special agreement with the Board, the rate shall be One shilling per 1,000 gallons.
 - (vi.) The rate to be charged for water supplied from stand-pipes shall be Twopence per 100 gallons.
 - (vii.) Horses shall be charged for at the rate of Seven shillings and sixpence each per annum.
 - (viii.) Water for steam boilers shall be charged at the rate of Fifteen shillings per horse-power per annum, except in such cases as the Board shall require that the supply shall be by measure at the rate of One shilling per 1,000 gallons.
 - (ix.) Water for gas-engines shall be charged for at the rate of Ten shillings per annum for each engine, except in such cases as the Board shall require that the supply shall be by measure at the rate of One shilling per 1,000 gallons.
 - (x.) On all buildings in course of erection where water is required for building purposes the rate to be charged shall be Five shillings per centum on the contract price of the work, excepting in such cases as the Minister of Water Supply shall direct that the supply shall be by measure at the rate of One shilling per 1,000 gallons or by special agreement.
 - (xi.) For water supplied to shipping the charge shall be One shilling per 100 gallons for the first 300 gallons ; above 300 gallons and not in excess of 400 gallons the charge shall be Ninepence per 100 gallons ; above 400 gallons and not in excess of 500 gallons the charge shall be Eightpence per 100 gallons ; in excess of 500 gallons the charge shall be at the rate of Six shillings per 1,000 gallons.
3. The minimum quantity of water to be charged for in each case where water is supplied by measure shall be—
 - (1) If for domestic and other than domestic purposes the quantity the charge for which at One shilling per 1,000 gallons would be equal to the amount of the assessed rate

which would be payable for the premises so supplied if supplied otherwise than by measure; and (2) if for other than domestic purposes only 12,500 gallons per quarter.

4. The Board may grant permission to persons requiring water for "domestic" and for "other than domestic purposes" to affix two service-pipes—one for domestic supply without meter, for which the ordinary assessed rate shall be paid, and one for other than domestic purposes with meter—the water used therefrom to be paid for at the rate of One shilling per 1,000 gallons, but subject to such regulations as may be approved by the Board against the use or re-use of water from the domestic service for irrigation or any other purpose not domestic.

5. Any person receiving water from the Board who shall take and carry away such water from his premises, or who shall allow any person to take or carry away such water, or shall sell the same to any other person, shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding Five pounds.

6. Any person not having agreed to be supplied by the Board who shall take or carry away water from any drinking-tap, trough, or private or public service-pipe shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding Five pounds.

7. Before any person shall affix any service-pipe to any pipe of the Board, or alter or repair, or in any way interfere with any pipe of the Board, or any service-pipe, cock, or fitting connected with the pipes of the Board, he shall obtain from the Board a licence in that behalf to execute such works; and any unlicensed person affixing, altering, repairing, or in any manner interfering with any such pipe, service-pipe, cock, or fitting, as aforesaid, shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding Ten pounds.

8. Such licence shall be for such period, and be from time to time renewable, as the Board shall see fit; and the Board may at any time cancel such licence in the event of the holder thereof, by himself or his employés, committing any breach of these by-laws.

9. Before any such licence shall be granted by the Board, the person applying for same shall satisfy the Board that he is a competent plumber.

10. Any person, whether licensed as aforesaid or not, who shall offend by opening any ground so as to uncover any pipe or pipes, the property of the Board, without giving two days' notice to the Board of his intention so to do, or who shall in any way tamper with or alter any pipe, the property of the Board, without the permission in writing of the Board being first obtained, or who shall wilfully or carelessly break, injure, or open any lock, cock, valve, pipe, work, or engine, the property of the Board, shall be liable for each such offence to a penalty not exceeding Twenty pounds.

11. Any person, whether licensed as aforesaid or not, who shall lay any pipe to communicate with the pipes of the Board, or with any service-pipe therefrom, without giving two days' notice of the day and hour when such pipe is intended to be made to communicate with the pipes of the Board, or who shall make such communication except under the superintendence and according to the directions of some officer of the Board, or who shall lay any leaden or other pipe to communicate with the pipes of the Board of a strength and material not sanctioned by the Board, shall be liable for each such offence to a penalty not exceeding Five pounds, and, in the event of continuing the offence, to a further penalty of Two pounds for each day after notice of the offence from the Board. Wrought-iron piping of approved quality, and lead piping of the following weights only, will be allowed to be fixed for either internal or external services :—

All fittings must be of good quality, and of strength sufficient to bear with safety the maximum pressure to which they may be subject. Ordinary connexion with sub-mains must be made with proper stop-cock, screwed ferrules, and with 2 feet of lead piping with brass unions. One service-pipe only for domestic supply for each tenement, will be permitted. The maximum size of service-pipes, unless by special consent of the Board, shall be, for tenements of annual value not exceeding £40, $\frac{1}{2}$ -in. bore, for tenements exceeding £40 annual value, $\frac{3}{4}$ -in. bore.

12. All connexions with lead and iron pipes must be made with brass union couplings. All joints connecting lead pipes must be "wiped" joints, and in no case will "bolt" or "copper bit" joints be allowed on water service-pipes, either in the interior or on the exterior of any building or tenement on pain of cancellation of licence. A high-pressure screw-down stop-cock shall be fixed on each house service between the main and the building line, and at a uniform distance of three (3) feet from the building line, properly secured and covered with an approved cast-iron cap.

13. No extensions of private services will be allowed except by consent of the Board.

14. If any person shall neglect to repair any service-pipe conveying water from the pipes of the Board into the premises of such person, after having received notice from any officer of the Board that such service-pipe requires repairing, the Board may stop the water from flowing into such premises, either by cutting off the service-pipe or otherwise, as to the said Board may seem fit, until the necessary repairs shall have been effected. The service-pipes from the mains being the property of the owners or occupiers of the tenements supplied by such service-pipes the occupiers (if any), and if none, the owner shall be responsible for keeping the same in repair, and in every instance in which, after notice that repairs to service-pipes are required, damage is caused by reason of their leaking or being otherwise out of repair or broken, the occupier or owner shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding Five pounds, and, in the event of continuing the offence, to a further penalty of Two pounds for each day after notice of the offence from the Board.

15. All water-troughs supplied from the pipes of the Board shall be lined with metal, so as to be perfectly water-tight, and shall have proper and efficient fittings for supplying them automatically. All such troughs and fittings, shall be kept in proper order and repair. No water-trough the supply to which is charged under sub-section (iv.) of section 2 of these by-laws shall be of greater capacity than 25 gallons. Should any trough or the fittings thereof be out of repair or leaking the supply thereto will be cut off until the same has been properly and efficiently repaired.

16. Any person supplied with water by the Board who shall wilfully or negligently allow the same to run to waste shall be liable for each offence to a penalty not exceeding Five pounds; and, in the event of continuing the offence, to a further penalty of Two pounds for each day after notice of the offence from the Board.

17. No meter shall be affixed until it shall have been examined, tested, and approved by a duly authorized officer of the Board. Each meter must be capable of registering at least one million (1,000,000) gallons.

18. If any meter shall cease registering, or be reported by the inspector or any authorized officer of the Board as out of repair or registering inaccurately, the Board shall estimate and charge for the water consumed during the period such meter was not in working order and until it is repaired and re-fixed, either by taking an average of the quantity used during the previous quarter or during the corresponding period of the previous year, or the Board may insert a check-meter on the service-pipe.

19. Meters affixed to services shall not be removed or interfered with except upon written application to and with the approval of the Board, unless for the purpose of repair,

as mentioned in the last preceding section, in which case notice in writing must be given to the officer in charge of the works of the Board six days at least before removal.

20. A separate meter shall in every case be provided for each tenement where the supply is by measure.

21. Baths supplied from the pipes, except where the supply is by meter, shall not exceed 6ft. 3in. in length along the centre line, by a mean width of 2 feet and a depth of 1ft. 9in., the ends sloping inwards. Overflow pipes to baths will not be permitted.

22. Any person, whether licensed as aforesaid or not, connecting any service-pipe or branch service-pipe with any steam boiler for the purpose of feeding or supplying the same with water without first affixing a self-acting valve for preventing the pressure of the steam reversing or affecting the dial of the meter shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding Five pounds, and, in the event of continuing the offence, to a further penalty of Two pounds for each day after notice of the offence from the Board.

23. Water-closets will not be allowed to be supplied direct from the main, but from a cistern only, so constructed that the water cannot flow continuously, and that not more than 2 gallons can escape at each flush.

24. No person shall use a hose attached to any tap or pipe used for the purpose of supplying the water of the Board for domestic purposes to any house or premises for watering any garden, laying dust, or for any other purpose whatsoever, unless where a water meter is fixed, and the water is supplied by measure; and any person offending against this by-law shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding Five pounds for each such offence.

25. If any person supplied with water by the Board does, or causes to be done, anything in contravention of any of these regulations, or fails to pay his rates when due, or fails to do anything which under those regulations ought to be done, or wilfully or negligently allows water to run to waste, the Board may cut off the supply of water from the premises of such person, either by cutting the pipes by or through which water is supplied or otherwise, and may cease to supply him with water so long as the cause of injury remains or is not remedied.

26. The streets shall not be watered from hydrants or fire-plugs by means of a hose, but the water is to be supplied to the streets by carts, or by manual labour, or by special stand-pipes of approved size and form.

27. Channel flushing and filling of public baths shall only be permitted between the hours of Ten o'clock p.m. and Six o'clock a.m.

28. The water supplied in the above district shall be received and consumed under and in accordance with these regulations, and not otherwise, through pipes and meters laid, placed, and being under and in accordance with the same regulations, and not otherwise.

29. In the construction of these by-laws the word "person" shall be deemed to extend to and include a corporation, whether aggregate or sole; and the word "Board" shall mean the Board of Land and Works.

The Constitution Act Amendment Act 1890, Part III. and Part IV.

SALARIES TO ELECTORAL REGISTRARS AND DEPUTY ELECTORAL REGISTRARS WHO ARE OFFICERS OF THE PUBLIC SERVICE.

WHEREAS by *The Constitution Act Amendment Act 1890* it is amongst other things provided that Electoral Registrars and Deputy Electoral Registrars shall be respectively paid by salary only; and that such salary may be fixed by Regulations from time to time made by the Governor in Council, and that in fixing such salaries regard shall be had to the population of the division for which any such Registrar or Deputy Registrar may be acting, but that the amount of the salary of any Registrar or Deputy Registrar shall not be in anywise affected by the number of persons whose names appear upon any list prepared by him: It is hereby notified that the Governor in Council has revoked the Regulations made on the 6th day of October, 1890, fixing the salaries to be paid to Electoral Registrars and Deputy Electoral Registrars, so far

only as such Regulations relate to Electoral Registrars and Deputy Electoral Registrars who are officers of the Public Service, and has made the following Regulations, viz.:

1. The annual salaries to be paid to Electoral Registrars who are officers of the Public Service shall be as follow:—

Where the total population of the division or divisions of electoral districts or provinces for which the Registrar acts does not exceed one thousand persons ... £3 10 0

Where the total population of the division or divisions of electoral districts or provinces for which the Registrar acts exceeds one thousand but does not exceed two thousand persons ... 5 0 0

Where the total population of the division or divisions of electoral districts or provinces for which the Registrar acts exceeds two thousand, but does not exceed three thousand persons ... 7 10 0

Where the total population of the division or divisions of electoral districts or provinces for which the Registrar acts exceeds three thousand but does not exceed ten thousand persons ... 10 0 0

Where the total population of the division or divisions of electoral districts or provinces for which the Registrar acts exceeds ten thousand persons ... 15 0 0

2. The annual salaries to be paid to Deputy Electoral Registrars who are officers of the Public Service shall be as follow:—

Where the total population of the division or divisions of electoral districts or provinces for which the Deputy acts does not exceed five thousand persons ... £1 0 0

Where the total population of the division or divisions of electoral districts or provinces for which the Deputy acts exceeds five thousand persons ... 2 0 0

3. These Regulations shall apply to all officers of the Public Service who were appointed to the position of Electoral Registrar or of Deputy Electoral Registrar during the period from the 27th February, 1895, to the 30th June, 1895, to all such as may have held such positions during the period from the 1st July, 1895, to the 10th February, 1896, and to all such as now hold or may hereafter hold such positions.

4. For the purpose of these Regulations the population of any division of an electoral province or of an electoral district shall be taken to be that which, at the time of any payment under the said Regulations, is set forth in the latest official return of the Government Statist as the ascertained or estimated population of such division.

SHEPPARTON URBAN WATERWORKS TRUST.—RATING REGULATION FOR 1896.

THE Chairman and Commissioners of the Shepparton Urban Waterworks Trust, in pursuance of the powers conferred by the *Water Act 1890* and of all other powers enabling them in this behalf, do make the following Regulation:—

Regulation for determining the rates and charges, which shall be made for water supplied within the boundaries of the Shepparton Urban Waterworks Trust District.

1. A rate of One shilling and fourpence in the pound sterling on the municipal value of all rateable property valued at £15 (Fifteen pounds) and upwards, situated within the Waterworks District of the Shepparton Urban Waterworks Trust, is hereby made for the year 1896.

2. The minimum rate for such year in respect of properties valued at less than £15 (Fifteen pounds sterling) on the municipal value shall be Twenty shillings, as provided by section 122 of the *Water Act 1890*.

3. On each unoccupied allotment or piece of land rated for the ordinary municipal rate within the Trust District before mentioned separately from any building the annual rate of Five pounds sterling per cent. on the amount of the annual valuation of same shall be charged, provided that no allotment or piece of land shall pay less than Two shillings per annum.

4. Water supplied by measure to be used in private domiciles or other premises for domestic use, or for the irrigation or watering of private gardens, or distribution on or about such premises, shall be charged for at the rate of One shilling and sixpence per thousand gallons up to an amount equal to that which the Trust would be entitled to receive under the municipal assessed value of any such premises, and at the rate of One shilling per thousand gallons for any quantity of water used for the before-mentioned purposes beyond such an amount aforesaid.

5. For every steam-boiler supplied with water by the Trust the charge shall be the sum of Twelve shillings and sixpence per annum for each horse-power of such steam-boiler, in addition to the charge for domestic use where water is supplied for domestic purposes also. In cases where the charge by measure would exceed the charge per horse-power a charge by measurement shall be made.

6. For water supplied for manufacturing purposes (except in cases of special agreement with the Trust) the charge will be One shilling per thousand gallons.

7. Water supplied to Government departments, cricket-grounds, bowling-grounds, show-yards, cattle-yards, and similar properties shall be charged for by measurement, provided that the minimum charge shall not be less than Fifty shillings per annum.

8. For water supplied from stand-pipes or hydrant, for each load of two hundred and fifty gallons or under, Sixpence shall be charged.

9. For a temporary supply during the erection of a new building, repairs, or additions, the charge shall be Twenty shillings per cent. on the amount of contract for stonework, brickwork, and plastering, or, in the absence of a contract, of the sum paid for stonework, brickwork, and plastering; or the said Trust may require a meter to be fixed, when the charge shall be by measurement.

10. No person shall use or permit to be used on any premises any water for other than domestic, manufacturing, or fire-extinguishing purposes between the hours of Nine p.m. and Five a.m. Any person committing or permitting a breach of this clause shall be liable to a penalty of One pound.

11. Such rates and charges are hereby made payable half-yearly in advance, on the 1st day of January and the 1st day of July in said year 1896, excepting those by measure, which shall be payable monthly.

12. Such person or persons as the Commissioners of the said Trust may from time to time appoint for that purpose shall be authorized to demand and receive the said rates.

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**THE WARRNAMBOOL WATERWORKS TRUST.—
REGULATION NO. 6.**

THE Warrnambool Waterworks Trust doth hereby, pursuant to and in exercise and execution of the powers and authorities conferred on it by the *Water Act 1890* (and whose Water District has, for the purposes of the said Act, been proclaimed an Urban District), make the Regulation following:—

The following rates and charges are those which the owners and occupiers of lands and tenements shall pay for the year 1896 in respect of water supplied by the Trust, that is to say:—

- (a) On every house or tenement, whether occupied or not, a rate of Eighteen pence for each pound sterling on the amount of the annual value, but the annual minimum amount to be paid shall be One pound sterling.
- (b) Unoccupied lands where no water is laid on shall be charged Five pounds per centum on the amount of the annual valuation.
- (c) Houses unoccupied for a period of not less than six calendar months, commencing on the 1st day of January or the 1st day of July, shall be charged two-third rates.
- (d) Tenements built and used for storage purposes only, such as bonded stores, warehouses, and wholesale stores, not being dwellings nor used in retail business, a rate of Twelve pence in the pound on the amount of the annual valuation, except in cases where the Trust shall order a meter to be used.
- (e) Private water-troughs shall be charged at the rate of Twenty shillings per annum each, except when the Trust shall order a meter to be used, in which case the minimum quantity of water to be charged for, half-yearly, shall be 10,000 gallons.
- (f) For water supplied by the Trust by measure, except in special agreement with the Trust, or otherwise provided for in this Regulation, the rate shall be Twelve pence per 1,000 gallons.
- (g) The rate to be charged to non-ratepayers for water supplied from stand-pipes shall be Threepence per 100 gallons; and ratepayers shall be charged for the quantity of water which, at Twelve pence per 1,000 gallons, exceeds the amount of the assessed rate payable for lands or tenements, according to their distance from such stand-pipe.
- (h) Water for gas engines shall be charged for at the rate of Ten shillings per annum for each engine, except in cases where the Trust shall order a meter to be used.
- (i) For steam boilers the rate shall be Twelve shillings and sixpence per annum for each horse-power of each boiler, except in cases where the Trust shall order a meter to be used.
- (j) On buildings in course of erection where water is required for building purposes the rate shall be Ten shillings per centum on the contract price of the work, or by special agreement. Wooden houses shall be charged half rates. Payments to be made before the supply is given.
- (k) For water supplied to shipping the charge shall be Five shillings per 1,000 gallons, with a minimum charge of Five shillings. With fixed meters the charge shall be Two shillings per 1,000 gallons.
- (l) Supplies of water for purposes not specified herein must be paid for at such rate as the Trust shall in each case determine, and the preliminary payment at such rate must be made at the office of the Trust before a supply can be taken or used.
- (m) In the event of any dispute as to which sub-section applies to any particular case, the Trust shall have power to decide or to make a special charge.
- (n) The minimum quantity of water to be charged for in each case where water is supplied by measure for domestic and other than domestic purposes shall be the quantity which, at Fourteen pence per 1,000 gallons, equals the amount of the assessed rate for the year which would be payable for the premises or land so supplied if supplied otherwise than by measure.
- (o) For water supplied to public gardens, parks, show grounds, baths, hospitals, or charitable institutions, the charge shall be Ninepence per 1,000 gallons, and the supply must be taken through a meter.

PROCLAMATION

By His Excellency the Right Honorable Thomas, Baron Brassey, Knight Commander of the Most Honorable Order of the Bath ; Governor and Commander-in-Chief in and over the Colony of Victoria and its Dependencies, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS by the *Land Act 1890* it is amongst other things enacted that the Governor in Council may, by Proclamation to be published in the *Government Gazette*, from time to time increase or diminish the area of land comprised in any of the classes mentioned in section 6 of Part I. of the said Act, except increasing lands which may be sold by auction: And whereas by the *Land Act 1891* it is amongst other things further enacted that where any portion of Crown lands not exceeding twenty acres, and not contiguous or adjacent to any other Crown lands, is so situated as to make it desirable in the opinion of the Governor in Council that the same should be sold, or where any portion of Crown lands not exceeding three acres is required for a site for a church or for any charitable purpose for which land cannot legally be reserved, the Governor in Council may direct the sale of such portion of Crown lands, and for such purpose may increase the area of land described in the Second Schedule to the *Land Act 1890* as lands which may be sold by auction by adding such portion thereto: And whereas by the *Land Act 1893* it is amongst other things further enacted that, notwithstanding anything contained in section 6 of the *Land Act 1890* aforesaid, the Governor in Council may increase the area of land described in the Second Schedule to the said last-mentioned Act as lands which may be sold by auction by adding thereto any portion of the Crown lands described in the said Schedule as Swamp lands: Now therefore I, the Governor of Victoria, by and with the advice of the Executive Council thereof, do hereby increase or diminish (as the case may be) the areas of Crown lands comprised in Classes 2, 3, 5, and 7 of section 6 of the *Land Act 1890* aforesaid to the extent set forth in the subjoined Schedules respectively (that is to say):—

3. *The amount of the tender must be stated at RATE PER ANNUM in words as well as figures.*

4. Every tender must bear the *bond fide* signature and address of the tenderer, and bear the names of two responsible persons willing to become bound for the fulfilment of the contract in such sum as the Government may direct, not exceeding the gross amount of the contract.

5. Every tender must be accompanied by cash, bank cheque, bank draft, or a bank deposit-receipt to the credit of the Deputy Postmaster-General for a sum equal to TEN PER CENT. of the annual amount named in the tender; this deposit to be absolutely forfeited to the Government in case the person whose tender may be accepted shall fail to complete the usual bond and contract to the satisfaction of the Government within ten days of being notified that the documents are ready for execution. The notice of acceptance, if delivered at the address named in the tender, shall be deemed sufficient.

6. The money or other security deposited by successful tenderers will be returned to them upon application, on the bond and contract being duly signed.

7. The money or other security deposited by unsuccessful tenderers will be returned to them upon application, and on their signing receipts for the respective amounts.

8. In the event of a new line of railway, or a new railway station on an existing line being opened for traffic, and it being decided that the mails shall be conveyed by rail, the Postmaster-General shall have the power of cancelling the contract for any mail service running in the vicinity of the railway without compensation to the contractor, or shall have power to alter the points of arrival and departure of the mails; and, in the event of the travelling distance on any mail line being in such manner increased or diminished, all payments for the service subsequent to the alteration shall be computed on the basis of the average mileage-rate of the contract.

9. In the event of it being found necessary, from any cause, to absolutely cancel a contract, the Postmaster-General shall have full power to do so, provided that, unless the contract be cancelled on account of any fault on the part of the contractor, or on account of the opening of a railway line or a new railway station, payment shall be made to the contractor as compensation of a sum equal to ten per cent. of the moneys which would have become due on the unexpired period of the contract if the latter had been continued for the full term for which it was accepted.

4. Every tender must bear the *bona fide* signature and address of the tenderer, and bear the names of two responsible persons willing to become bound for the fulfilment of the contract in such sum as the Government may direct, not exceeding the gross amount of the contract.

5. Every tender must be accompanied by cash, bank cheque, bank draft, or a bank deposit-receipt to the credit of the Deputy Postmaster-General for a sum equal to TEN PER CENT. of the annual amount named in the tender; this deposit to be absolutely forfeited to the Government in case the person whose tender may be accepted shall fail to complete the usual bond and contract to the satisfaction of the Government within ten days of being notified that the documents are ready for execution. The notice of acceptance, if delivered at the address named in the tender, shall be deemed sufficient.

6. The money or other security deposited by successful tenderers will be returned to them upon application, on the bond and contract being duly signed.

7. The money or other security deposited by unsuccessful tenderers will be returned to them upon application, and on their signing receipts for the respective amounts.

8. In the event of a new line of railway, or a new railway station on an existing line being opened for traffic, and it being decided that the mails shall be conveyed by rail, the Postmaster-General shall have the power of cancelling the contract for any mail service running in the vicinity of the railway without compensation to the contractor, or shall have power to alter the points of arrival and departure of the mails; and, in the event of the travelling distance on any mail line being in such manner increased or diminished, all payments for the service subsequent to the alteration shall be computed on the basis of the average mileage-rate of the contract.

9. In the event of it being found necessary, from any cause, to absolutely cancel a contract, the Postmaster-General shall have full power to do so, provided that, unless the contract be cancelled on account of any fault on the part of the contractor, or on account of the opening of a railway line or a new railway station, payment shall be made to the contractor as compensation of a sum equal to ten per cent. of the moneys which would have become due on the unexpired period of the contract if the latter had been continued for the full term for which it was accepted.

10. Tenderers are requested to state the mode by which they propose to convey mails, whether by vehicle, on horseback, or by man on foot. If by vehicle, the description of vehicle and number of horses by which it is to be drawn to be given.

A By-law for closing shops of a particular class one afternoon in each week under the provisions of the *Factories and Shops Acts 1890 and 1893*.

WHEREAS by the 47th section of the *Factories and Shops Act 1890*, numbered 1091, and the 6th section of the *Factories and Shops Act 1893*, numbered 1383, it is enacted that any municipal council may, if it think fit, from time to time make, alter, and repeal by-laws in and for the municipality for *inter alia* closing all shops of any particular class within its municipality (not included in the 4th schedule to the *Factories and Shops Act 1890*), provided that a petition, certified to by the municipal clerk as being signed by a majority of the shopkeepers keeping shops of the particular class substantially interested and affected thereby within the municipal district, shall have been previously presented to such municipal council.

And whereas the Council of the City of Richmond, which is the municipal council in and for the municipality of the said city, has had presented to it a petition from shopkeepers keeping grocers' shops, which petition has been certified to by the town clerk of the said city as the municipal clerk thereof, as being, to the best of his knowledge and belief, signed by a majority of the shopkeepers keeping shops of the particular class substantially interested therein.

And whereas the Council of the City of Richmond, which is the municipal council in and for the municipality of the said city, so thinks fit, be it, and it is by the said municipal council hereby ordered and directed—

"That every shopkeeper keeping a grocer's shop within the City of Richmond, and which is not of the classes named in the fourth schedule to the *Factories and Shops Act 1890*, shall close and remain closed on the Wednesday afternoon in each week at and after the hour of One o'clock."

CITY OF RICHMOND.—BY-LAW NO. 45.

A By-law to Make a Regulation for the Management of the Abattoirs of the City of Richmond, and for the Dues to be Charged thereat.

WHEREAS by the twenty-fourth section of the *Butchers and Abattoirs Act 1890*, numbered 1063, it is enacted that the council may from time to time make such by-laws as they think fit for the inspection of the abattoirs and for keeping the same in a cleanly and proper state, and for removing filth and refuse at least once in every twenty-four hours, and for requiring that they be provided with a sufficient supply of water, and preventing the exercise of cruelty therein; and under the tenth section of the same act may demand, receive, and have from every person who shall use such abattoirs such sums of money as and for stallages, rents, and tolls as shall be appointed by special order of the council: Be it therefore ordered and directed by the Municipal Council of the City of Richmond, which is the municipal council in and for the municipality, that the abattoirs erected and established by the council on land defined in By-law No. 19, at the junction of Burnley and Berlin streets, in the said city, shall be regulated, managed, and made use of, subject and in accordance with the following regulations:—

1. *By-laws Nos. 20 and 31 repealed.*—By-law No. 20 of the Municipal Council of Richmond, for the regulation of the public abattoirs of Richmond, and for fixing the rates and dues for slaughtering to be charged therein; and By-law No. 31, a by-law of the City of Richmond, made under the 229th section of the *Local Government Act 1874*, for repealing By-law No. 28, and altering By-law No. 20 of the Municipal Council of Richmond, and to prescribe an increased scale of rates and dues for slaughtering to be charged in the public abattoirs of the city, are hereby repealed.

AS TO SUPERINTENDENCE.

2. *Superintendence.*—The land of the council held for abattoir purposes, and all buildings and structures thereon and appurtenances thereto (and which land, buildings, structures, and appurtenances are meant by and included in the word "establishment" where occurring in this By-law) shall be under the charge, care, management, and direction of a superintendent, with such assistants as the council may appoint for that purpose.

3. *Superintendent's duties.*—Along with such other duties as the council shall assign to the superintendent, it shall be specially his duty to carry out and enforce the regulations of the council for the management of the establishment as to cleanliness and otherwise. To examine all animals slaughtered at the establishment, and take action as prescribed by law with regard to any which he may find to be unfit for human food. To see that all animals awaiting slaughter be duly supplied with food and water, and that no ill-treatment or unnecessary cruelty be inflicted upon any such animal. To take care that good order and propriety in conduct and speech be observed throughout the establishment. To keep the register of names of slaughtermen permitted to work at the establishment. To report, weekly through the town clerk, as to the condition of the establishment, the work done thereat, and any breach of the regulations by any person employed or working there.

4. *Assistant superintendent.*—During absence of the superintendent his duties shall devolve upon and be performed by the assistant or other person in the service of the council then in charge of the establishment, and such assistant or person shall for the time being have all the power, authority, and duty of the superintendent.

AS TO SLAUGHTERMEN.

5. *Slaughtermen.*—No person shall be permitted to commence or continue to work for any other person at the establishment as a slaughterman unless his name shall be entered in the register of slaughtermen kept by the superintendent, and he shall have signed an undertaking to observe, comply with, and obey each and every of the rules of the establishment, under pain (apart from any other penalty) of having his name expunged from the register of slaughtermen.

6. *Responsible slaughterman.*—In every compartment of the abattoirs in which slaughtering shall be carried on one of the slaughtermen shall be especially responsible for the observance of the regulations of the establishment in such compartment. If the master butcher or employer be working in the compartment he shall be the responsible person, and if not he must nominate and appoint one of the slaughtermen who is to be responsible, and must notify such appointment to the superintendent. Such appointment, however, shall not absolve any other slaughterman from the consequences of wilful disregard or breach of the regulations.

AS TO USE AND MANAGEMENT.

7. *Use and Management.*—The establishment shall be open and slaughtering shall be permitted therein on every day (Sunday excepted) from Five o'clock in the morning until Ten o'clock at night, and at no other time unless upon special occasions, and except upon such special conditions as may be prescribed in writing under the hand of the town clerk.

8. *Use on payment of dues.*—Every person who shall pay to the superintendent the dues for slaughtering as hereinafter fixed, shall be entitled to the use, for a reasonable time, of such portion of the establishment as shall be available and assigned to him for the purpose by the superintendent.

9. *Repair of damage.*—Every persons using the establishment who shall do any breakage, injury, damage, or destruction thereto shall make good the same, and if he shall have so acted wantonly or maliciously he shall also, upon conviction thereof, forfeit and pay a penalty not exceeding Ten pounds.

10. *Cattle to be reported.*—Every person who shall bring cattle to the establishment shall inform the superintendent of the description and number thereof, and the superintendent shall

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enter such information in a book to be kept by him for that purpose, and shall direct and indicate the portion of the establishment in which such cattle shall be placed, and such person shall place such cattle in no other part of the establishment than that so directed and indicated, and shall himself be responsible for the safety and proper sustenance thereof. He must also give notice to the superintendent of his intention to commence slaughtering stock before he shall commence to slaughter same.

11. *Animals not to be ill-treated.*—No person shall ill-treat any animal or resort to unnecessary cruelty in slaughtering any animal at the establishment.

12. *Food and water for cattle.*—Every person who shall bring cattle to the establishment and keep the same there for more than one day shall provide the same with sufficient food and water.

13. *Compartments to be kept clean, &c.*—Every person who shall have assigned to him for his special use any compartment of the establishment shall at all times, while he shall use such compartment, keep the same, with the yards and appurtenances thereof, clean and free from offence, whether by accumulation of blood, filth, or otherwise; and shall, as and whenever required by the superintendent, cleanse, scrape, limewash, or otherwise purify in such manner as shall be necessary, and as the superintendent shall direct, the walls, doors, floors, or other portion of such compartment, and the appurtenances thereof, which he shall be so accustomed and entitled to use, and he shall in all respects comply with the regulations for the management of the establishment.

14. *Pithing-pens to be cleansed.*—In every compartment of the establishment upon one or more head of large cattle which shall have been enclosed in the pithing-pen being killed, and before any other beast is driven into such pen, the responsible slaughterman must sweep, or cause to be swept cleanly, all the blood from such cattle into the blood-pit constructed to receive the same, and must put, or cause to be put, any refuse which shall have resulted from such slaughtering into the separate bin or receptacle provided for it.

15. *Sheep, &c., to be killed on frames.*—In any such compartment no small cattle—that is to say, no sheep, lamb, pig, or goat—shall be slaughtered except with a knife and upon the frame provided for that purpose, and with a trough beneath such frame for reception of the blood of the animals slaughtered. And when such trough shall have become full, but not to overflowing, the responsible slaughterman shall call upon the labourer employed under the superintendent to empty and replace the said trough.

16. *Compartments to be cleansed after use.*—After completion of slaughtering, and before leaving the compartment, the responsible slaughterman shall carefully cleanse, or cause to be cleansed, the portion of the establishment which he shall have been at work in, and shall leave the same in a state of cleanliness and order to the satisfaction of the superintendent.

17. *Offal must be hung up.*—No offal which can be hung up shall be allowed to remain upon the floor of any pithing-pen or hanging room; but all such offal, when produced, must be hung up upon the hooks provided for that purpose in the hanging room or other portion of the compartment.

18. *Refuse not to be removed by users of the establishment.*—No refuse or offal other than such as shall be capable of being, without sanitary objection, used as or converted into human food shall be removed from the premises by any slaughterman or person permitted to use any portion of the premises.

19. *Dogs excluded.*—No dog shall be brought upon or allowed to remain upon the premises.

20. *Trespassers not to intrude.*—No person, unless registered as a slaughterman or having lawful business to transact at the establishment, shall intrude into it or remain therein.

21. *Penalty for misconduct.*—Any person who in any portion of the establishment shall be drunk, or shall be guilty of profane swearing, or of foul or abusive language, or of obscenity or indecency, or who shall conduct himself riotously, or create disturbance, or who shall obstruct in the execution of his duty the superintendent, his assistant, or other officer or person appointed by the council, to conduct or aid in the good management of the establishment, or who shall neglect or refuse to comply with any lawful request of any such superintendent, assistant, officer, or person, made in accordance with the provisions of this by-law, or of such regulations as shall for the time being be lawfully in force at the establishment, or shall deposit any blood, offal, filth, or refuse matter upon any portion of the establishment, or on any land or road abutting thereon, save in the pits, bins, or receptacles provided and appointed for reception of the same, shall, for every such offence, upon conviction thereof, forfeit and pay any sum not exceeding Ten pounds.

22. *Dues for slaughtering.*—The slaughtering dues which shall be demanded, received, and taken at the establishment by the superintendent or other officer or person appointed for that purpose by the council shall be as follows, that is to say:—
