Health Act 1890.

BOROUGH OF ST. ARNAUD.

BY-LAW No. 48.

IN pursuance of the powers conferred by the *Health Act 1890*, the Mayor, Councillors, and Burgesses of the Borough of St. Arnaud, make the following By-law for regulating the removal and disposal of night-soil, that is to say:—

1. This by-law shall apply to that part of the borough comprised within the following boundaries:—Commencing at the south-east corner of the town boundary and bounded on the east by that boundary bearing north one hundred chains; thence by the borough boundary, being a continuation of the last line bearing north twenty chains; thence on the north by a line bearing west about sixty chains to the west side of the Concoer-road at a point

twenty chains and fifty-three links along said road from the town boundary; thence by a line bearing north-westerly about fifty-four chains to a point on the west side of the Silvermines-road, distant forty-seven chains along said road from the town boundary; thence by a line bearing south-westerly about seventy chains seventy-five links to a corner on the south side of the North-western-road; thence on the west by a line bearing south about ninety-three chains to a corner of the borough boundary; thence by that boundary bearing south forty chains; thence on the south by the borough boundary bearing east one hundred and sixty chains; thence on the east by a line bearing north forty chains to the point of commencement.

2. By-law No. 43 of the Borough of St. Arnaud is hereby repealed, except that all charges which under the by-law hereby repealed are at the commencement of the operation of this by-law due or payable to the said borough shall be recoverable as if this by-law had not passed.

3. The system of removing the contents of closet-pans at night-time within the area aforesaid is hereby abolished, and a day service substituted therefor.

4. The day service will be that known as "the double-pan service," and the pans and covers used in making the removals will be provided by the council.

5. Once in each week the person contracted with by the council shall remove the pans in use and shall leave thoroughly cleaned ones in their place.

6. Every occupier and every person having the control or management of any premises shall cause to be kept in every earth-closet belonging thereto a supply of dry powdered earth, ashes, charcoal, lime, or some other material efficient for deodorizing night-soil, and shall cause all night-soil which may be deposited in any pan or other receptacle in such earth-closet to be immediately on deposit thereof, covered with a quantity of such deodorizing material sufficient to thoroughly and effectually deodorize the contents of such pan or other receptacle.

7. For the use of each pan supplied and for the removal and disposal of the contents thereof, each occupier of any tenement shall pay to the council half-yearly and in advance a sum at the rate of Fourpence per week or such other sum as may from time to time be fixed by resolution of the council.

8. Every person committing a breach of any one of the provisions contained in this by-law, shall forfeit and pay for every such offence a penalty or sum not exceeding Ten pounds, and not less than Five shillings, or if such breach be a continuing act or default, shall pay a penalty or sum not exceeding Five pounds and not less than Five shillings for each day during which such breach shall be committed or continued.

The births of 1,072 children, viz., 553 boys and 519 girls, were registered in Greater Melbourne during the month of April. This number was lower than in the corresponding month of any previous year since 1886. The births were 205 below the average of the month during the previous ten years, or 224 below that average if allowance be made for the increase of population.

The deaths registered in April numbered 533, viz., 281 of males and 252 of females; the births thus exceeded the deaths by 539, or 101 per cent. The deaths were about the same as in the corresponding month of the preceding two years, but were below the average of April during the previous ten years by 163, or, if allowance be made for the increase of population, below that average by 178.

To every 1,000 of the population of the district the proportion of births registered was equivalent to 28.92, and of deaths registered 14.38 per annum.

The highest temperature in the shade recorded at Melbourne Observatory during the month was 81.1° on the 20th, and the lowest was 40.1° on the 26th and 27th. The mean temperature of the month (58.6°) was two-fifths of a degree below the average. The greatest range of the thermometer in any one day (37.9°) took place on the 4th, and the least range (2.4°) on the 13th. The mean daily range was 17.7°. The highest atmospheric pressure recorded was 30.404 inches on the 26th, and the lowest was 29.201 inches on the 10th. The mean atmospheric pressure (29.913 inches), was the lowest, with one exception, during the last eleven years, and was about one-seventh of an inch below the average.

Rain fell on 12 days, the amount of rainfall being 2.71 inches, or .06 inches above the average of the month during the previous ten years. During the first four months of the current year the rainfall amounted to 10.36 inches, or 4.46 inches higher than in the corresponding period of 1895, and 3.62 inches above the average of the last ten years.

Males contributed 53 per cent. and females 47 per cent. to the mortality of the month. Children under five years of age contributed 32 per cent. to that mortality, as against 31 per cent. in April, 1895; 34 per cent. in April, 1894; 41 per cent. in April, 1893; 38 per cent. in April, 1892; 44 per cent. in April, 1891; and 37 per cent. in April, 1890.

Thirty-five deaths of persons who had attained or passed the age of 75 years were recorded during the month. Of these, a female, aged 75, died of diarrhoea; a labourer, aged 75, of phthisis; a female, aged 75, of cirrhosis of the liver; a gardener, aged 75, of cystitis; an accountant, aged 76, of cancer; a female, aged 76, of apoplexy; a gatekeeper, aged 76, of softening of the brain; an engine-driver, aged 76, of valvular disease of the heart; a shire secretary, aged 76, of heart disease; a surveyor, aged 76, of cystitis; a gentleman, aged 77, of syncope; two females, each aged 77, of heart disease and nephritis respectively; two females, each aged 78, of softening of the brain and heart disease respectively; a baker, aged 78, of syncope; a market gardener, aged 78, of bronchitis; a carpenter, aged 79, of syncope; a female, aged 80, of hernia; a gardener, aged 81, of cancer; a female, aged 82, of

diarrhoea; a bootmaker, aged 83, of pneumonia; a female, aged 83, of gastro-enteritis; a labourer, aged 83, of cirrhosis of the liver; a female, aged 85, of disease of the liver; a printer, aged 86, of cellulitis; a female, aged 87, of endocarditis; another, aged 88, of syncope; a farmer, aged 91, of Bright's disease; and three females, aged 79, 82, and 85 respectively, a station manager, aged 86, a dealer, aged 87, and a gentleman, aged 92, of old age.

Twenty-three deaths during the month were from external causes, of which 18 were set down to accident, 2 to homicide, and 3 to suicide. The following are the particulars of the accidental deaths:—A boy, aged 6, died of fracture of the skull, and a night watchman, aged 62, of internal injuries, the result in each case of the kick of a horse; a female child, aged 2, was trampled on by a horse; a labourer, aged 65, died of fracture of the skull, caused by a fall whilst drunk; a boy, aged 4, of injuries consequent on falling down a sewer shaft; a carpenter, aged 35, was killed by steel plates falling on him; an army pensioner, aged 59, died of a cut eyebrow, the result of a blow from a piece of wood whilst chopping; a female, aged 70, of fracture of femur; a confectioner, aged 17, of gunshot wounds, accidentally received; a female child, aged 10 months, and a plumber, aged 43, of burns; a male child, aged 1 year, of scalds; a female, aged 73, of mushroom poisoning; a male infant, aged 10 months, was accidentally drowned at Footscray; an engineer, aged 47, and a female, aged 50, were found drowned in the River Yarra; and two male infants, aged 5 days and 3 weeks respectively, were overlain. The homicidal deaths were those of a new-born female infant, who was suffocated; and a female, aged 30, who died of peritonitis, the result of an illegal operation, a verdict of wilful murder being returned in each case. The suicidal deaths were those of a female, aged 47, who poisoned herself; a female, aged 36, who drowned herself; and a gatekeeper, aged 55, who hanged himself.

One hundred and fourteen deaths, or 21 per cent. of the whole, took place in public institutions, viz.:—56 in the Melbourne Hospital, 10 in the Alfred Hospital, 2 in the St. Vincent's Hospital, 3 in the Women's Hospital, 4 in the Children's Hospital, 7 in the Homoeopathic Hospital, 1 in the Austin Hospital, 10 in the Metropolitan, and 8 in the Yarra Bend Lunatic Asylum, 6 in the Immigrants' Home, 2 in the Benevolent Asylum, 2 in the Infant Asylum, 1 in the Convent of the Little Sisters of the Poor, 1 in the Melbourne Gaol, and 1 in the Protestant Refuge.

The deaths of children under five years of age numbered 170, of which 104, or 61 per cent., were of males, and 66, or 39 per cent., were of females. Of those who died, 116 were under one year of age, 36 were between one and two, 9 were between two and three, 2 were between three and four, and 7 were between four and five.

The persons who died at a more advanced age than five years numbered 363. Of these, 177, or 49 per cent., were males, and 186, or 51 per cent., were females; 14 were between five and ten, 11 were between ten and fifteen, 20 were between fifteen and twenty, 17 were between twenty and twenty-five, 33 were between twenty-five and thirty, 28 were between thirty and thirty-five, 22 were between thirty-five and forty, 22 were between forty and forty-five, 21 were between forty-five and fifty, 21 were between fifty and fifty-five, 25 were between fifty-five and sixty, 33 were between sixty and sixty-five, 34 were between sixty-five and seventy, 27 were between seventy and seventy-five, 19 were between seventy-five and eighty, 7 were between eighty and eighty-five, 7 were between eighty-five and ninety, and 2 were between ninety and ninety-five.

Although the deaths as a whole during the month under review were about the same as in the corresponding month of the preceding year, there was an increase of 21 deaths resulting from zymotic diseases, and of 5 from local diseases, which were counterbalanced by a decrease of 3 deaths from constitutional, 7 from developmental, and 11 from ill-defined diseases (chiefly debility, atrophy, &c.). Under the zymotic head, deaths from influenza rose from 1 to 4, whooping cough from nil to 5, diphtheria from 5 to 9, typhoid fever from 20 to 30, puerperal fever from 1 to 4; as against a decrease under diarrhoeal diseases from 17 to 12. Under the constitutional class, a marked decrease occurred in the deaths from phthisis, which fell from 79 to 37; but those from

rheumatism rose from 1 to 4, and from tuberculosis, &c. (undefined), from 2 to 11. Under developmental diseases, those peculiar to children remained about the same, for although deaths from premature birth fell from 23 to 14, those from cyanosis rose from nil to 7; but those from old age show a decrease from 17 to 10. In the local class, the most prominent increase occurred in the mortality from enteritis, viz., from 34 to 51, as against which the chief decreases were in deaths from diseases of the respiratory system and of parturition, which fell from 49 to 41, and from 9 to 3 respectively. In considering the above variations in the mortality climatic influences must not be overlooked, more especially as the rainfall was nearly twice as great in the month under review as in April, 1895.

The following is a statement of the deaths set down to diphtheria and typhoid fever in each month of the years 1890 to 1895 and the first four months of 1896, from which may be traced the rise and fall of the mortality at various periods of the year. It will be noticed that the mortality from typhoid fever usually attains its maximum in March, and is at a minimum from July to November; also that more deaths were set down to both causes in April, 1896, than in the corresponding month for any previous years since 1891.

KOROIT WATERWORKS TRUST.—LOAN.

THE Governor in Council has revoked the Order in Council of the 5th day of May, 1896, making additional loan to the Koroit Waterworks Trust available to the extent of Seventy pounds, and in lieu thereof has, in pursuance of section 2 of the *Water Supply Loans Application Act 1891*, granted, as an additional loan for water supply purposes, to the said Waterworks Trust the sum of Seventy pounds (£70), such said Trust being a corporation named in the First Part of the Schedule to the said Act, and the sum not being in excess of the amount set forth in the said Part opposite the name of such corporation; the said sum of Seventy pounds being authorized as an additional loan to the said Trust by an Order in Council dated the 26th day of September, 1895.

The rate of interest to be paid upon the said additional loan by the said Trust to be Four pounds ten shillings per centum per annum.

BRIGHT WATERWORKS TRUST.—REGULATIONS.

WHEREAS by the provisions of section 122 of the *Water Act 1890*, No. 1156, it is enacted that the Commissioners of any Waterworks Trust, the whole or portion of whose waterworks district has been proclaimed an urban district, may, subject to the approval of the Governor in Council, make Regulations for or relating to all or any of the subjects mentioned in the said section. And whereas the Waterworks District of the Bright Waterworks Trust has been proclaimed an Urban District within the meaning of the said Act: Now therefore the Commissioners of the Bright Waterworks Trust do hereby, pursuant to and in exercise of the powers and authorities conferred by the said Act, make the Regulations following:—

REGULATIONS.

1. No person supplied with water for domestic use solely from the works of the Trust shall wilfully or negligently allow the same to run to waste.
2. No person shall use a hose for the purpose of irrigating gardens, nor shall water be drawn from the mains for any other purpose than domestic use unless the supply be by measure.
3. The charge for water by measure shall be One shilling per thousand gallons, and shall be paid for in advance or as may be required by the Trust.
4. The use of water by hose or otherwise for garden purposes or for any other than domestic use solely shall be absolutely prohibited between the hours of Six o'clock a.m. and Six o'clock p.m.

5. The penalty for each offence in respect of a breach of any such regulations shall not exceed Five pounds, and may be recovered from any offender in a summary way before any two justices.

BACCHUS MARSH IRRIGATION AND WATER SUPPLY TRUST.—GRADUATED RATE.

REGULATION No. 3 (DRAFT FORM).

REGULATION for the making of a graduated rate, under Part III of the *Water Act 1890*, on all rateable property in the Irrigation and Water Supply District.

1. A rate is hereby made for the Irrigation and Water Supply District of the Bacchus Marsh Irrigation and Water Supply Trust:—

- In the Werribee Division, Three shillings in the pound sterling;
- In the Parwan Division, One shilling in the pound sterling;
- In the Urban Division, One shilling and sixpence in the pound sterling (except on tenements not used as a domicile, on which the rate will be Three and a half per cent. on the annual value, with a minimum of One pound)

respectively, on the annual value of all rateable property within the said divisions of the said district of the said Trust, according to the valuation for the time being of all lands and tenements for the municipal rate of the municipal district in which such lands and tenements are situated.

2. Such rate is made for the year 1896, commencing on the 1st day of January, 1896, and ending on the 31st day of December, 1896.

3. Such rate is made payable on the 2nd day of January, 1896, and on the 1st day of July, 1896.

4. Such person or persons as the Commissioners of the said Trust may from time to time appoint for that purpose shall be authorized to demand and receive the said rate.

FIRST MILDURA IRRIGATION TRUST.—REGULATION No. 1.

THE Commissioners of the First Mildura Irrigation Trust, in pursuance of the powers conferred by section 69 of the *Mildura Irrigation Trusts Act 1895*, do make the following Regulation:—

No. 1.—REGULATION OF PROCEEDINGS AT MEETINGS OF THE FIRST MILDURA IRRIGATION TRUST, ETC.

1. General conduct of business.—In all cases not herein provided for, resort shall be had to the rules, forms, and usages of Parliament, which shall be followed as far as the same are applicable to the proceedings of the Trust.

2. Minutes of meeting to be read at next subsequent meeting.—At every meeting of the Trust the first business thereof shall be the reading and putting a question for the confirmation of the minutes of the proceedings at the preceding meeting, and no discussion shall be permitted thereon except as to their accuracy as a record of the proceedings; and the said minutes of the proceedings at the preceding meeting shall be signed by the chairman; and the rough minutes of the proceedings of the Trust at any meeting shall be read at the close of such meeting, if required.

3. Order of business at meetings.—After the signing of the minutes as aforesaid, the order of business of an ordinary meeting shall be as follows, or as near thereto as may be practicable, but, for the greater convenience of the Trust at any particular meeting thereof, it may be altered by resolution to that effect:—

- (i.) Reading of copies of letters sent by the authority of the Trust.
- (ii.) Reading letters received, and considering and ordering thereon.
- (iii.) Reception and reading of petitions and memorials.
- (iv.) Presentation of reports of committees.
- (v.) Payments.
- (vi.) Ordinary business.
- (vii.) Orders of the day, including subjects continued from proceedings of former meetings.
- (viii.) Extraordinary business and new rules and regulations.
- (ix.) Other motions of which previous notice has been given.
- (x.) Notices of motion.
- (xi.) Reading of rough minutes (if required).

And the order of business at a special meeting shall be the order in which such business stands in the notice thereof.

4. Addresses to Governor.—All addresses to the Governor shall be presented by the chairman and secretary of the Trust, unless otherwise ordered by the Trust.

5. Motions.—All notices of motion shall be dated, and given by the intending mover to the secretary at the close of the meeting of the Trust, or delivered to him at his office personally or by post, provided that he receive them at least four days before the meeting at which they are to be proposed; and such secretary shall number and enter the same in the notice of motion book in the order in which they may be received.

6. Notice of motion to be given.—No commissioner shall make any motion initiating a subject for discussion but in pursuance of notice given, as prescribed in the last preceding clause.

7. Petitions.—No motion except that for receiving the same shall, unless under most urgent circumstances, be made on any petition, memorial, or other like application until the next ordinary meeting of the Trust after that at which it has been presented.

8. Motions to be moved in order in motion book.—Except by leave of the Trust, motions shall be moved in the order in which they have been received and recorded by the secretary in the notice of motion book, or they may be postponed by vote of the Trust, and if not so moved or postponed shall be struck out.

9. Motion to be proceeded with by commissioner giving same, except with consent.—No motion entered in the notice of motion book shall be proceeded with in the absence of the commissioner who gave notice of the same, unless by some other commissioner producing written authority from him to that effect.

10. Draft of address or petition to be submitted at previous meeting.—No motion for an address or petition shall be entertained unless the mover shall at some previous meeting have submitted a draft of the same.

11. Order, &c., of debate.—Any commissioner desirous of making a motion or amendment, or taking part in discussion thereon, shall rise and address the chairman, and shall not be interrupted unless called to order, when he shall sit down until the commissioner (if any) calling to order shall have been heard thereon, and the question of order disposed of, when the commissioner in possession of the chair may proceed with the subject.

12. Nature of motion to be stated.—Any commissioner desirous of proposing an original motion or amendment must state the nature of the same before he addresses the Trust thereon.

13. Motion not to be withdrawn without leave.—No motion or amendment shall be withdrawn without the leave of the Trust.

14. Motion to be seconded.—No motion or amendment shall be discussed or put to the vote of the Trust unless it be seconded, but a commissioner may, however, require the enforcement of any standing order of the Trust by directing the chairman's attention to the infraction thereof.

15. Mover of motion.—A commissioner moving a motion shall be held to have spoken thereon, but a commissioner merely seconding a motion shall not be held to have spoken upon it.

16. Designation of commissioners.—The commissioners in meeting of Trust shall designate each other by their official title, namely, that of chairman or commissioner, as the case may require.

17. Priority of commissioners.—If two or more commissioners rise to speak at the same time, the chairman shall decide which is entitled to priority.

18. Chairman to rise in addressing Trust.—The chairman shall rise in addressing the Trust to discuss any question, and shall not leave the chair on such occasions.

19. Commissioner not to speak a second time on same question.—No commissioner shall speak a second time on the same question, unless entitled to reply or in explanation when he has been misrepresented or misunderstood.

20. Points of order.—The chairman, when called upon to decide on points of order or practice, shall state the provision, rule, or practice which he deems applicable to the case, without discussing or commenting on the same, and his decision as to order or explanation in each case shall be final, except when an appeal is made to the Trust immediately upon the chairman giving his decision. On such an appeal no commissioner shall speak more than once, and the question shall be put thus:—"Shall the decision of the chair be maintained?"

21. Commissioners not to digress, &c.—No commissioner shall digress from the subject-matter under discussion, or comment upon the words used by any other commissioner in a previous debate; and all imputations of improper motives and all personal reflections on commissioners shall be deemed highly disorderly.

22. Commissioners to apologize for disorderly, &c., expressions.—Whenever any commissioner shall make use of any expression disorderly or capable of being applied offensively to any other commissioner, the commissioner so offending shall be required by the chairman to withdraw the expression, and to make a satisfactory apology to the Trust.

23. Commissioner called to order to sit down.—A commissioner called to order shall sit down, unless permitted to explain.

24. Commissioner twice offending guilty of an offence.—Any commissioner using offensive or disorderly language, and having been twice called to order or to withdraw and apologize for such conduct, and refusing so to do, shall be liable to the penalty imposed for a breach of any of the provisions of this Regulation.

25. Strangers.—Any person, not being a commissioner, who, having been admitted to any meeting of the Trust, shall be guilty thereof of any improper or disorderly conduct, or who shall not leave when lawfully requested by the chairman so to do, may be forthwith removed by him, and shall be liable to the penalty imposed for a breach of any of the provisions of this Regulation.

26. Committees of the whole.—Whenever a majority of the Trust determine, any matter before the Trust may be referred to a committee of the whole for consideration and report to the Trust, and such report may be received and adopted, or otherwise, as the Trust may think fit. When the Trust resolves itself a committee of the whole, the public shall be ordered to withdraw by the chairman, and the doors shall be closed, unless a majority of the committee determine otherwise.

27. Commissioner not attending order for call.—Any commissioner not attending in compliance with an order for call of the whole Trust, without reasonable excuse to the satisfaction of the majority thereof, shall be liable to the penalty imposed for a breach of any of the provisions of this Regulation.

28. Commissioners may demand documents.—Any commissioner may of right demand the production of any documents of the Trust applying to the question under discussion, and he may, at any time during business hours, require the officers of the Trust to produce for his inspection or examination any books or documents belonging to the Trust; but such books or documents shall not be removed from the offices without the permission of the chairman, and then only for short and limited periods.

29. Voting.—The Trust shall vote by show of hands, and any commissioner present and not voting, and not being disabled by law from so doing, shall be liable to the penalty imposed for a breach of any of the provisions of this Regulation. Divisions shall be taken upon any question submitted to the vote of the Trust, provided any commissioner demand it, before the next business has been proceeded with. When a division is taken, the secretary shall call the names of those commissioners who are present, and enter in his minute book how each vote, whether affirmatively or negatively, and the result shall be declared by the chairman.

30. Question, how declared.—The chairman shall, in taking the sense of the Trust, put the question first in the affirmative, then in the negative, and the result thereof shall be recorded in the minutes.

31. Motions, &c., to be in writing.—At every meeting of the Trust all motions, whether original motions or amendments, shall be reduced into writing, signed by the mover, and delivered to the chairman immediately on their being moved and seconded.

32. Amendments.—(1) No second or subsequent amendment, whether upon an original proposition or on an amendment, shall be taken into consideration until the previous amendment is disposed of. (2) An amendment destroying or altering the intention of a motion shall be in order; but an amendment relating to a different subject shall not be in order. (3) On an amendment to "strike out and insert," the paragraph to be amended shall first be read as it stands, then the words proposed to be struck out and inserted, and, finally, the paragraph as it would stand if so amended.

33. Effect of rejection of original motion.—If any words of an original question be rejected, the insertion of other proposed words shall form the next question, whereupon any further amendment to insert other words may be moved.

34. If amendment be negatived a second one may be moved.—If an amendment be negatived then a second amendment may be moved to the question to which the first-mentioned amendment was moved, but only one amendment shall be submitted to the Trust for discussion at a time.

35. Mover of motion to have right of reply.—The mover of every original proposition, but not of any amendment, shall have a right to reply, immediately after which the question shall be put from the chair; but no commissioner, with the above

exception, shall be allowed to speak more than once on the same question, unless permission be given to explain, or the attention of the chair be called to a point of order.

36. Adjournment.—(1) No discussion shall be allowed on any motion for adjournment of the Trust, but if, on the question being put, the motion be negatived, the subject then under consideration or the next on the notice-paper shall be discussed, or any other that may be allowed precedence, before any subsequent motion for adjournment be made. (2) A motion to adjourn shall always be in order, except—1st, when a commissioner is in possession of the floor; 2nd, when the commissioners are voting; 3rd, when adjournment was the last preceding motion; 4th, when it has been decided that the previous question shall be taken. (3) A motion simply to adjourn a discussion cannot be amended, but a motion to adjourn may be and is open to debate.

37. Protests.—Any commissioner may protest against any resolution of the Trust, and notice of intention to protest shall, in every case, be given forthwith on the adoption of the resolution protested against; and the protest shall specify the reasons for protesting, and shall be entered three days at least before the next ordinary meeting of the Trust by the protesting commissioner in a book to be kept for that purpose in the office of the secretary, and signed by such commissioner, and shall be also entered in the minutes of the meeting at which notice of the intention to protest shall have been given previously to the confirmation thereof; but such protest may be expunged from the minutes if declared by a majority of the Trust to be not in accordance with truth or in its terms disrespectful to the Trust.

38. Lapsed questions.—If a debate on any motion moved and seconded be interrupted by the number of the commissioners present becoming insufficient for the transaction of business, such debate may be resumed at the point where it was so interrupted on motion upon notice.

39. Explanations.—While a member is speaking no one shall interrupt, except for the purpose of calling to order, or asking of the chairman leave to explain, or to call the previous question. A commissioner allowed to explain shall only have the right to explain an actual misunderstanding of language, and shall be strictly prohibited from going into debate on the merits of the case.

40. Privileged questions.—(1) When a question is before the Trust the only motions in order shall be—1st, to adjourn; 2nd, the previous question; 3rd, to lay on the table; 4th, to postpone indefinitely; 5th, to postpone to a definite period; 6th, to refer; 7th, to divide, if the sense will permit of it; 8th, to amend; to take precedence as herein arranged, and the first three to be decided without debate. (2) When the previous question is moved and seconded, it shall be put in this form—"Shall the main question now be put?" If this is carried all further amendments and debates shall be excluded, and the question be put without delay. If the question has been amended, the question shall be taken on the amendment first. It shall not be in order to re-consider the agreement to take the previous question. (3) When a motion and amendment are under discussion, it will be in order for any member to give notice of another amendment which he intends to move in the event of the amendment being lost. Upon such notice no debate will be allowed at that stage. (4) When a motion is postponed indefinitely, it shall not come up again during that meeting.

41. Resolutions, how revoked or altered.—No resolution at any meeting of the Trust shall be revoked or altered at any subsequent meeting, unless notice of the intention to propose such resolution or alteration be given to each of the commissioners seven days at least before holding the meeting, nor unless such revocation or alteration be determined upon by a majority consisting of two-thirds of the commissioners present at such subsequent meeting, if the number of commissioners present at such subsequent meeting be not greater than the number present when such resolution was come to, or by a majority, if the number of commissioners present at such subsequent meeting be greater than the number present at such former meeting.

42. Special meetings.—The Trust may hold special meetings, and the chairman or any two of the commissioners may call a special meeting, but in the latter case no such meeting shall be held unless seven clear days' notice thereof at least be given to each commissioner.

43. Notices of meetings.—All notices of any meeting or adjourned meeting of the Trust shall be in writing, and shall be delivered or sent by the post or otherwise to the place of abode or place of business of each of the commissioners two clear days at least previous to such meeting; and every such notice shall specify the time of meeting; and in case of a special meeting shall specify the object thereof; and no business shall be transacted at any special meeting except such as is stated in the notice thereof.

44. Power to suspend officers.—The Trust may, at any ordinary or special meeting, resolve that a special meeting be called to consider the removal from his office of any officer appointed by the Trust, and may direct that notice of such special meeting be given, and thereupon may suspend such officer from his office pending the holding of such meeting, and may appoint some other person to perform the duties of such office in the meanwhile.

45. Committees of Trust, and quorum.—The Trust may from time to time, as they may see fit, appoint occasional or standing committees, and may fix the quorum of every such committee, and every such committee shall appoint one of the commissioners thereof to be chairman of such committee; and the Trust may from time to time continue, alter, or discontinue such committee, and such committee may from time to time remove such chairman, and every such committee shall report to the Trust. The chairman of the Trust shall be *ex officio* member of all committees, and shall preside at all meetings at which he is present.

46. Meetings, chairman, &c., of committee.—Every committee so appointed may meet from time to time, and may adjourn

from place to place as they may think proper, but no business shall be transacted at any meeting of the committee unless the quorum of members (if any) fixed by the Trust—and, if no quorum be fixed, three members—be present; and at all meetings of the committee, if the chairman be not present, one of the commissioners present shall be appointed chairman; and all questions shall be determined by a majority of the votes of the commissioners present, and, in case of an equal division of votes, the chairman shall have a casting vote in addition to his vote as a member of the committee.

47. Seal.—The seal of the Trust shall be in the custody of the secretary, and shall not be impressed except by direction of the Trust, and in the presence of at least two commissioners.

48. Lapsed order of the day may be restored.—If a debate on any order of the day be interrupted by such insufficiency of number as aforesaid happening, such order may be restored to the notice-book for a future day, on motion upon notice, and then such debate shall be resumed at the point where it was so interrupted.

49. Committees.—Minutes of all proceedings of committees, as well as their reports, numbered in consecutive order, shall be entered in the committee's minute-book, and, being signed by the chairman of the committee, shall be presented to the Trust; and the secretary, when practicable, shall attend all meetings of the committee.

50. Meetings of committee.—The secretary shall convene every committee within ten days of its first appointment, or at any time thereafter by order of the Trust, or on the written order of the chairman of the committee or of any two members of the committee.

51. Petitions.—No petition shall be presented after the Trust shall have proceeded to the orders of the day.

52. Petitions to be respectful.—It shall be incumbent on every commissioner presenting a petition to acquaint himself with the contents thereof, and to ascertain that it does not contain language disrespectful to the Trust, and that the contents do not violate any by-law or any provision hereof.

53. Commissioners to affix their names.—Every commissioner presenting a petition to the Trust shall write his name at the beginning thereof.

54. Petition to be in writing.—Every petition shall be in writing, and not printed or lithographed, and shall contain the prayer of the petitioners at the end thereof; and the petition shall be prepared in a way similar to that adopted with regard to petitions presented to Parliament.

55. To be signed by the petitioners.—Every petition shall be signed by the persons whose names are appended thereto by their names or marks, and by no one else, except in cases of incapacity by sickness.

56. No letters, &c., to be attached.—No letters, affidavits, or other documents shall be attached to any petition.

57. No letters or memorials to be dealt with.—No letters or memorials shall be dealt with at any meeting of the commissioners unless received at the offices of the Trust, or the office of the chairman, not later than the day preceding the day of meeting.

58. Deputations to signify intention.—Deputations can only be received by the Trust when they have signified their intention of waiting upon the Trust, and stated their object at least one day beforehand.

59. Letters or memorials returned for amendments.—When letters or memorials do not accurately indicate the localities by giving the number of the allotment, and section, and name of the parish, or other technical description, it shall be in order to return the documents for amendment.

60. Commissioners confined to statement of certain facts.—Every commissioner presenting a petition to the Trust shall confine himself to a statement of the persons from whom it comes, of the number of signatures attached to it, of the material allegations contained in it, and to the reading of the prayer thereof.

61. Appointment, &c., of officers.—No appointment to any permanent office at the disposal of the Trust shall take place until seven clear days' public notice shall have been given, by advertisement, in one or more newspapers circulating in the irrigation district, and such other newspapers, if any, as the Trust may determine, inviting applications from qualified candidates for the same.

62. Salaries of officers, &c.—The salary or allowance attached to all offices and places at the disposal of the Trust shall, in all cases, be fixed before they proceed to appoint any person to fill the same by advertisement inviting applications as aforesaid, and shall be specified in such advertisement, except when the Trust, by special resolution, which may be moved without notice, orders otherwise.

63. No commissioner, &c., to be surety for officer.—No commissioner or officer of the Trust, and no assessor or auditor of the Trust, shall be received as surety for any officer appointed by the Trust, or for any work to be done for the Trust.

64. Expense of preparing security.—In all cases of security being given for the faithful performance of any duty or contract, the expense of preparing such security shall be borne by the person providing the same.

65. Suspension of rules.—Any one or more of the rules and regulations contained herein may be suspended for a special purpose, on motion upon notice duly given, and shall not otherwise be suspended except by a unanimous vote of the Trust.

66. Penalty.—If any person commit a breach of any of the provisions of this Regulation, he or she shall be liable, for every such offence, to a penalty of not exceeding Five pounds.

67. Commissioners' fees.—A sum not exceeding Fifty pounds per annum shall be allotted to the chairman of commissioners, and a sum not exceeding Fifteen shillings per Trust or committee meeting attended be allowed to each of the other commissioners, the aggregate sum to be paid to commissioners other than the chairman not to exceed One hundred pounds. When absent from the Trust district on Trust business commissioners shall be allowed a sum not exceeding Fifteen shillings per day

each, and fares. Such payment shall not be chargeable against any loan of the Trust, but shall be wholly paid from Trust revenue.

**PART OF THE SHIRE OF WIMMERA SEVERED
THEREFROM AND ANNEXED TO THE SHIRE OF
BORUNG.**

*At the Executive Council Chamber, Melbourne, the nineteenth
day of May, 1896.*

PRESENT:

WHEREAS by the Local Government Acts it is enacted that, subject to the provisions of the said Acts, the Governor in Council may from time to time make Orders exercising certain powers therein set forth, amongst others, to sever any portion of Victoria forming part of a municipal district from such municipal district, and annex the same to any other municipal district with which the portion so severed forms one continuous area, and from time to time make any apportionment of property rights and liabilities, and give any directions as to any matters and things that may be necessary to do justice as between the municipalities concerned; and that every such Order shall be published in the *Government Gazette*, and shall take effect as from the day of such publication: And whereas the powers conferred upon the Governor by the said Acts are now exercised upon a petition, signed by a majority of the ratepayers of portions of the North and North-East Ridings respectively of the Shire of Wimmera, with regard to a certain area therein described, notices of such petition having been published in the manner prescribed in the said Acts: Now therefore His Excellency the Governor of Victoria, with the advice of the Executive Council thereof, and in compliance with the prayer of the petition hereinbefore mentioned, doth by this present Order sever from the Shire of Wimmera the portions described in such petition, and doth annex the portions so severed from such shire to the West Riding of the Shire of Borung, and, with the advice aforesaid, doth re-define the boundaries of the said Shire of Wimmera as hereby reduced and of the several ridings thereof, and of the said Shire of Borung and of the West Riding thereof as hereby enlarged, in the manner set forth hereunder, that is to say:—

WIMMERA SHIRE REDUCED AND RE-DEFINED.

Commencing at a point on the Wimmera River where the south boundary of the parish of Dinboola abuts thereon; thence easterly by the said boundary to the south-west angle of the parish of Kewell West; thence northerly by the western boundary of the parish last named to its north-west angle; thence easterly by the northern boundary of that parish and the parish of Kewell East to the Yarriambiack Creek; thence southerly by that creek to the Wimmera River aforesaid; thence south-easterly by that river to the north boundary of the parish of Ledcourt; thence west by a road to the north-east angle of allotment 16 in the last-named parish; thence south by a road to the east angle of allotment 202; thence south-westerly by a two-chain road to the south-west boundary of the last-named parish; thence south-easterly by that boundary to a point bearing north-east (magnetic) from Brigg's Bluff, Grampians Range; thence south-west by a line to the said bluff; thence southerly by the Grampians Range to the head of the Glenelg River; thence north-westerly by that river to the west boundary of the parish of Knaaving; thence north by a road to the north-west angle of allotment 43 in the last-named parish; thence easterly and north-easterly by a road to the north-west angle of allotment 57, parish of Wartook; thence south by a road to the south-west angle of the last-mentioned allotment; thence north-easterly by a road to the west angle of allotment 13, parish of Wing Wing; thence south-easterly by that allotment and east by that allotment, allotment 17, parish of Burrong, and a line to the McKenzie Creek; thence north-westerly and westerly by that creek to the Wimmera River aforesaid; and thence westerly and northerly by that river to the commencing point: Excepting the municipal district of the borough of Horsham.

NORTH RIDING REDUCED AND RE-DEFINED.

Commencing at a point on the boundary of the shire at the south-west angle of the parish of Kewell West; thence following the southern boundary of that parish easterly to its south-east angle; thence north by the eastern boundary of the parish of Kewell West to the northern boundary of the shire; and thence following the shire boundary westerly and southerly to the commencing point.

NORTH-EAST RIDING REDUCED AND RE-DEFINED.

Commencing at a point on the northern boundary of the parish of Kalkee where it is intersected by a three-chain road

WHEREAS by the Local Government Acts it is enacted that, subject to the provisions of the said Acts, the Governor in Council may from time to time make Orders exercising certain powers therein set forth, amongst others, to sever any portion of Victoria forming part of a municipal district from such municipal district, and annex the same to any other municipal district with which the portion so severed forms one continuous area, and from time to time make any apportionment of property rights and liabilities, and give any direction as to any matters and things that may be necessary to do justice as between the municipalities concerned; and that every such Order shall be published in the *Government Gazette*, and shall take effect as from the day of such publication: And whereas the powers conferred upon the Governor by the said Acts are now exercised upon a petition signed by a majority of the ratepayers of portions of the North and East Ridings respectively of the Shire of Borung, with regard to a certain area therein described, notices of such petition having been published in the manner prescribed in the said Acts: Now therefore His Excellency the Governor of Victoria, with the advice of the Executive Council thereof, and in compliance with the prayer of the petition hereinbefore mentioned, doth by this present Order sever from the Shire of Borung the portions described in such petition, and doth annex the portions so severed from such shire to the Shire of Birchip; and with the advice aforesaid, doth re-define the boundaries of the said Shire of Borung and of the North and East Ridings thereof, as hereby reduced, and of the said Shire of Birchip as hereby enlarged, in the manner set forth hereunder, that is to say:—

TREE RESERVE IN THE SHIRE OF HAMPDEN.

WHEREAS by the *Local Government Act 1890* (54 Vict. No. 1112) it is amongst other things enacted that the Governor in Council, at the request of the council of any municipality, including the City of Melbourne and the Town of Geelong, may, by Order to be published in the *Government Gazette*, direct that any portion of a street or road in the municipal district shall be a Tree Reserve, so that the portion of such street or road remaining available for traffic upon both sides of such Tree Reserve, including footpaths, shall in no place be reduced by any such Tree Reserve to less than forty-six feet, and so that no such reserve be a greater length than ten chains, and that the Governor in Council may revoke any such Order, and that the council of the municipality shall have charge of such reserve, and may fence and plant the same with trees, and tend and cultivate the same: Now therefore His Excellency the Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, and in compliance with a request made by the Council of the Shire of Hampden, doth by this Order declare a certain portion of Mainfold-street, in the township of Camperdown, in the said shire, as shown on a plan marked "A," deposited in the Office of the Department of Public Works, Melbourne, to be a Tree Reserve within the meaning of section 417 of the Act aforesaid, and doth furthermore authorize the Council of the Shire of Hampden aforesaid to take charge of, and fence, plant, and cultivate the same.

And the Honorable John William Taverner, Her Majesty's Commissioner of Public Works for Victoria, shall give the necessary directions herein accordingly.

PELLUEBLA PUBLIC CEMETERY.

RULES AND REGULATIONS.

CLAUSE 1. These Rules and Regulations shall come into force immediately after publication in the *Government Gazette*, and all Rules and Regulations heretofore made shall and are hereby rescinded.

Clause 2. All charges must be paid at the office of the trustees when orders are given, and all particulars given as in Schedule A before the ground or vault is opened, when a burial-right (Schedule B) will be issued.

Clause 3. Any person making a vault or erecting or placing a monument or any works in the cemetery by and with the permission of the trustees under these rules, and on payment of the charges therein mentioned, is entitled to have, maintain, and keep such vault, monument, tombstone, &c., according to the terms of such permission, and any one employed by such person shall in no way interfere with, remove, or use anything in the cemetery other than that taken therein by them; and they shall remove from the cemetery all bricks, rubbish, scaffolding or other materials immediately upon completion of the work which they had permission to perform, and if they do not remove such material the trustees, or their secretary, may have the same material removed at the cost of such persons, or the trustees may sell or dispose of such materials, and place the proceeds to the trustees' credit account.

Clause 4. The trustees will cause all common graves to be dug, but when a brick grave or vault is required, or the friends of indigent persons wish to dig the grave themselves, they must be constructed under the directions of the trustees or some person duly appointed by them.

Clause 5. The charges will be remitted on the burial of any poor person upon an order signed by a Justice under section 49 of the *Cemeteries Act 1850*.

Clause 6. Orders for interment must be given at the office of the trustees during the day previous to that on which it is intended to take place.

Clause 7. The certificate of the registration of death must be produced before interment, and the interment must take place on the day appointed for it, otherwise extra fees will be charged.

Clause 8. No re-interment or removal from another cemetery or another grave will be permitted until there be submitted a certified copy of the original certificate of the Coroner, Justice of the Peace, or Registrar of Deaths, and the licence for disinterment of the Minister of the Crown authorized in that behalf.

Clause 9. Every grave shall be 6 feet deep for an adult's body, and not more than two adults (unless the grave be of greater depth or of extra width) shall be interred in each, two infants being considered equal to an adult.

Clause 10. No coffin shall be buried within 4 feet of the ordinary level of the ground, unless it contains the body of a child under twelve years, when it shall be not less than 3 feet below that level, and a layer of earth at least 1 foot thick shall be left undisturbed above and around any coffin previously buried in the same grave.

Clause 11. The hours fixed for burials shall be as follows:—On week days, September to April inclusive, from Ten a.m. to Six p.m.; May to August inclusive, from Ten a.m. to half-past Four p.m. Sundays throughout the year, from One to Four p.m.

Clause 12. All monuments, vaults, graves, tombstones, and fences to be kept in repair and proper condition by and at the expense of the owner, and every coffin in a vault or brick grave to be bricked in, cemented, and covered by a slab of stone, slate, iron, or redgum.

Clause 13. A drawing of every stone, tomb, pedestal, or tablet, proposed to be erected, and a copy of every epitaph or inscription must be submitted to the trustees for approval, who are required by the 18th section of *Cemeteries Act 1850*, to determine the suitability of same. In the erection of tablets copper cramps must be used.

Clause 14. The cemetery will be open to the public daily from sunrise to sunset.

Clause 15. No dogs or stock of any description will be allowed in the cemetery, nor will smoking nor the lighting of fires be allowed therein without the permission of the trustees.

Clause 16. The owners of any and all cattle or other animals which may be discovered or known to have been trespassing on or damaging the cemetery or fences, or any part thereof, or any erection whatsoever within the fence will be prosecuted according to law.

Clause 17. A plan of the cemetery and a registry must be kept and may be inspected.

Clause 18. Any workman not employed by the trustees shall be under the supervision and control of the secretary, who shall see that his work is completed satisfactorily and with dispatch, and shall remove him summarily from the cemetery upon any cause of offence.

Clause 19. The secretary shall exercise a general supervision and control under and for the trustees over all matters appertaining to the cemetery.

Clause 20. The trustees reserve the right to make any alterations from time to time in these charges and regulations.

ADDITIONAL REGULATIONS FOR THE CARE, PROTECTION, AND MANAGEMENT OF PRINCE'S PARK.

WHEREAS by the Crown grant issued in favour of the Board of Land and Works and the Mayor, Aldermen, Councillors, and Citizens of the City of Melbourne, and their successors, in respect of Prince's Park, it is provided and declared that the land thereby granted, and the buildings for the time being thereon, shall be maintained and used as and for a Public Park, and offices and conveniences connected therewith, under and in accordance with such regulations as shall from time to time be made by the Governor or other officer for the time being administering the Government of the Colony of Victoria, with the consent of the Executive Council thereof, and in the meantime under and in accordance with such regulations as shall from time to time be made by the Board of Land and Works and the Mayor, Aldermen, Councillors, and Citizens of the said city of Melbourne, and for no other purpose whatsoever: Now therefore the Board of Land and Works and the Council of the city of Melbourne do hereby make the Regulations following for the care, protection, and management of the said Prince's Park, and for the preservation of good order and decency therein, in addition to the existing Regulations in respect of the said Prince's Park.

REGULATIONS.

1. Unless otherwise directed by the trustees, the double gates of the park shall, from the 1st day of April to the 30th day of September, be closed to the public from half-past Six o'clock in the evening to Six o'clock in the morning; and from the 1st day of October to the 31st day of March from Eight o'clock in the evening to half-past Five o'clock in the morning.
 2. No vehicle used for the transport of goods, stores, or materials of any description shall be allowed within the park.
 3. No horse or vehicle shall stand within the park or be attached to any of the fences around the park, nor shall any person in charge of a vehicle ply for hire within the park.
 4. No horses or cattle shall be allowed to graze or wander at large upon any of the drives or pathways.
 5. No person shall ride or drive on the grass or on the footways, and all persons using the carriage-ways shall keep to the proper side of the road as on public roads.
 6. No person shall enter the park for the purpose of breaking in horses, or training or exercising horses, or break in, train, or exercise horses within the park, or jump horses over any of the fences, or drive cattle or sleep through the park, and no person shall drive or ride furiously or negligently along any of the roads in the park.
 7. No person shall ride or drive along that portion of the centre walk running from the lodge to McPherson-street which lies between the roads on the east and west sides of the park.
- Every person offending against these Regulations shall, in accordance with section 137 of the *Land Act 1890*, on conviction before any justice, forfeit and pay a penalty not exceeding Five pounds for each offence; and every person who so offends, and

who, after he has been warned by the curator or other authorized officer or servant of the trustees, or by any constable, does not desist from so offending, may be forthwith apprehended by the curator or other authorized officer or servant of the trustees or constable, and taken before some justice of the peace, and shall, on conviction, forfeit and pay a penalty not exceeding Ten pounds.

THE BALLARAT DISTRICT BENEVOLENT ASYLUM AND LYING-IN HOSPITAL, INCORPORATED.

THE following are the By-laws of the Ballarat District Benevolent Asylum and Lying-in Hospital, confirmed at a meeting of its subscribers held at the Board-room, Camp-street, Ballarat, on the 13th May, 1896, as required by the provisions of the *Hospitals and Charities Act 1890*.

BY-LAWS OF THE BALLARAT DISTRICT BENEVOLENT ASYLUM AND LYING-IN HOSPITAL, INCORPORATED.

"That the By-laws of the Ballarat District Benevolent Asylum and Lying-in Hospital heretofore existing shall be and the same are hereby repealed, and that the following by-laws shall henceforth be the by-laws of the said asylum. Provided, however, that all acts, matters, things, heretofore had or done under or by virtue of such repealed by-laws shall be of the same force and effect and validity as if such by-laws were not hereby repealed, and as if the following new by-laws had not been passed."

1. The object of the Ballarat District Benevolent Asylum and Lying-in Hospital, incorporated (hereinafter designated throughout these by-laws "the asylum"), shall be to relieve the aged, infirm, permanently disabled, or destitute of all creeds and nations, and to minister to their necessities according to the means of the institution.

2. The asylum shall be governed by a president, two vice-presidents, treasurer, and a committee consisting of 21 members.

3. The asylum shall be supported by donations and voluntary contributions, together with such aid as may be obtained from Her Majesty's Government.

Qualifications and Privileges of Life Governors and Contributors.

4. The following shall be the qualifications and privileges of life governors—Every donor of £10 and upwards; every person who shall raise by one or more collections in one year the sum of £20 or upwards from persons not claiming membership on account of their contribution towards such sum; any person appointed by any society paying the sum of £20; or one of the executors under any will by which a bequest of £20 or upwards shall be paid to the asylum; or any person recommended by the committee for special services rendered shall be a life governor, and entitled to vote at all general and special meetings of life governors and contributors, and shall be entitled to all the privileges appertaining to contributors, but shall not be eligible to hold office.

5. Every contributor of £1 or upwards annually, dating from the time of payment, shall be entitled to vote at all the general and special meetings of life governors and contributors, and be eligible to hold office, but no person shall retain his seat whose subscription shall be in arrear seven days.

6. Every life governor or annual contributor of £1 shall be entitled to recommend for admission to the asylum one inmate, and no more during the current year; of £5 five, two inmates; of £10 ten, and upwards, three inmates; and the minister of any congregation making a collection in aid of the funds of the asylum of not less than £10 shall be entitled to recommend two inmates for admission, and three inmates for a collection of £20 and upwards, within twelve months from the date of the payment of such collection. The privilege of recommendation in all the above cases shall cease at the end of his subscription year.

7. No person shall in any case be entitled to more than one vote on any question, except the chairman, as hereinafter provided.

8. An annual meeting of life governors and contributors shall be held on the last Thursday in the month of July in each year, due notice of which shall be given at least one week previously in one or more of the local papers, at which meeting an annual report and balance-sheet shall be presented, and the election of president, vice-presidents, treasurer, seven members of the committee, two auditors, and the following honorary officers, viz., medical officers, solicitor, and oculist shall take place; and the consideration of such other business as may arise.

9. To qualify a contributor to become a candidate for election to the office of president, vice-president, treasurer, member of the committee, or any honorary office, or that of auditor, at the

annual meeting of life governors and contributors, he must be nominated by a life governor or contributor, in the form and to the effect set forth in the schedule hereto, addressed to the secretary, and delivered at his office not later than eight o'clock p.m., on the Tuesday preceding the date of the annual meeting. Provided, however, that after the formal nominations shall have been disposed of at such annual meeting, any office which may be vacant by reason of the election of any non-retiring member of the committee to the office of president, vice-president, or treasurer, or by reason of insufficient nominations having been received for any of the offices, such vacancies shall be filled up at the said annual meeting, in addition to those filled in accordance with this by-law.

10. Any non-retiring member of the committee being elected to the office of president, vice-president, or treasurer shall thereby vacate his first-named office.

11. No person shall hereafter be eligible for nomination to any office unless he shall have been a contributor for twenty-eight days prior to the date of the annual meeting. Provided that nothing herein contained shall apply to any person whose name for one year preceding such annual meeting shall appear on the list of contributors to the asylum.

12. In the event of any vacancy occurring during the year in the office of president, vice-president, treasurer, or in any honorary office, or that of auditor, the same shall be filled up at a special meeting of the committee convened by circular for that purpose, of which not less than seven days' notice shall have been given.

General Meetings.

13. At all meetings of life governors and contributors the president, or, in his absence, one of the vice-presidents, shall take the chair; but should neither be present the meeting shall choose its own chairman, and every question submitted to such meeting shall be decided by the majority of votes of the life governors and contributors then present, and in the event of the votes being equal the chairman shall have a casting vote in addition to his deliberative vote.

14. If at any annual or special general meeting of the life governors and contributors to the asylum at least ten of the life governors and contributors qualified to vote shall not assemble and proceed to business within one hour from the time fixed for the meeting, no election of officers shall be made, nor shall any business be done at that time; but in such case there shall be another meeting of the asylum, at the same place, and at the same hour of the same day in the following week; and at this last-mentioned meeting any number of life governors and contributors (qualified to vote as aforesaid) exceeding three shall constitute a meeting.

15. At the request of twenty life governors and contributors, or of the committee, a special meeting shall be called, and the secretary shall forthwith give notice of such meeting in one or more of the local papers, at least seven days before the meeting is to be held; and no other business than that specified in such requisition shall be transacted.

16. All elections when contested, shall be by ballot.

17. At all general and special meetings of life governors and contributors two scrutineers shall be appointed, whose duty it shall be to count the votes, and report the numbers to the president, and the secretary shall provide a list containing the names of all persons entitled to vote at such meetings.

Common Seal.

18. The common seal of the asylum shall be kept at the office in a box with two different locks and keys, one of which shall be kept by the president and the other by the secretary.

19. The common seal shall not be affixed to any deed or other instrument except by a resolution of the committee, and then only by the secretary in the presence of and witnessed by two members of the committee specially appointed for that purpose.

20. On the last Thursday in the month of July in every year one-third part of the elected members of the committee shall go out of office (but may nevertheless be re-elected), and the persons who shall go out of office shall be those who have been the longest in office without re-election, or where two or more shall have been in office for the same length of time, then those who shall go out of office shall be determined by lot.

21. If any member of the committee shall die, or resign by letter under his hand, addressed to the president of the asylum, or become insolvent, or compound with his creditors, or be convicted of any treason, felony, misdemeanour, or be absent for four consecutive meetings from the committee, his office shall become vacant, and the remaining members of the committee may declare his office vacant, and temporarily appoint thereto a contributor to the asylum until the next annual meeting for the election of the committee, when the person thus temporarily appointed shall retire in addition to those hereinbefore provided for.

Committee.

22. The committee shall conduct and supervise the general business and management of the asylum, admit and discharge inmates, appoint, suspend, and discharge salaried officers, accept contracts, authorize payments, frame rules for the internal management of the asylum, and shall meet fortnightly, or oftener, if necessary, at such time and place as they may determine.

23. The secretary and superintendent shall be appointed under the seal of the asylum.

24. The president may at any time convene a special meeting of the committee for the consideration of such special business as he may think fit to bring forward, seven days' notice of which shall be given by circular.

25. On receipt by the secretary of a requisition in writing, signed by seven members of the committee, requiring a special meeting of the committee to be called, he shall within seven days from the receipt of such requisition convene such meeting by circular, provided such requisition shall state the business to be brought forward, and no other business but that specified in said requisition shall be transacted or discussed at such special meeting.

26. The chairman shall have a deliberative and, in the event of an equality of votes, a casting vote.

27. At all meetings of the committee not less than seven shall constitute a meeting.

28. At the ordinary meetings of the committee in the months of February and August in each year five members shall be appointed an executive committee, in addition to the president, the two vice-presidents, and the treasurer, who shall be members *ex officio* (not less than three to form a quorum), and shall meet at such times as may be determined. They shall be competent to deal with applications for relief and admission; any ordinary routine business affecting the institution; be empowered to expend any sum not exceeding £10 at any one of their regular meetings; and also deal with any matters of a special character referred to them by the general committee. All the business conducted by the executive committee shall be laid before the general committee at their next meeting.

29. At the ordinary meeting of the committee in the month of August three members shall be appointed as a finance committee to examine the monthly accounts, receipts, and bank pass books, who shall furnish a report to the committee at the ensuing meeting.

30. No member of the committee shall be a contractor, or become security for a contractor, directly or indirectly; nor shall any member of the committee be present at the discussion or record his vote upon any matter in which he is pecuniarily interested.

31. The president shall be an *ex officio* member, and, when present, chairman of all committees.

Auditors.

32. The auditors shall examine, certify, and report on the correctness or otherwise of the half-yearly accounts, terminating on the 30th June and 31st December in each year.

Secretary.

33. The secretary shall attend all meetings, keep all accounts and minutes of all business transacted at all meetings of committees, and perform the clerical work of the asylum, as directed by the committee.

Treasurer.

34. All moneys received by the secretary or collector on account of the asylum shall be paid to the treasurer within three days, and the treasurer shall deposit the same within three days afterwards to the credit of the asylum, in such bank as the committee may from time to time appoint.

35. On receiving any moneys from the collector, the treasurer shall sign collector's acquittance-book for the amount so paid to him, after first satisfying himself that the addition of the items is correct.

36. That the president, vice-presidents, treasurer, and the members of the finance committee, shall be authorized to sign cheques, and any two of their signatures attached to a cheque shall be sufficient, when countersigned by the secretary.

Accounts.

37. All moneys that may be donated or bequeathed to the asylum for any special purpose, such as the building or endowment funds, shall be held for that purpose solely, but all interest derived from the investment of any such sum or sums shall be placed to the credit of maintenance account, unless the person donating or bequeathing the same shall order otherwise in writing.

Non-resident Medical Officer.

38. The non-resident medical officer of the asylum shall be a duly-qualified medical practitioner, who shall have access to the asylum at all times, perform all surgical operations, and report the same in a book kept for that purpose at the asylum.

Honorary Medical Officers.

39. There shall be three honorary medical officers of the asylum, who shall be duly-qualified medical practitioners, and who shall be elected annually at the annual meeting in July, after being duly nominated in the form prescribed in the schedule By-law No. 9.

40. The honorary medical officers shall be subject to the non-resident medical officer, and shall assist in all operations when required by him.

41. In the absence of the non-resident medical officer, the senior honorary medical officer shall assume charge, and perform the functions of the non-resident medical officer.

42. If any or all of the honorary medical officers shall neglect their duties, the committee shall have power to declare their seats vacant and elect other duly-qualified medical practitioners to fill the vacancies.

Superintendent.

43. The superintendent shall be responsible for the management and property of the asylum, under the direction of the committee.
