**ASSISTANT MEDICAL INSPECTOR, DEPARTMENT
OF PUBLIC HEALTH.**

APPLICATIONS will be received by the Public Service Board up to Saturday, the 5th January proximo, from persons who are qualified and are desirous of applying for appointment to the position of Assistant Medical Inspector, Department of Public Health.

Salary—£450 a year.

The officer appointed will be required to give his whole time to assisting the Medical Inspector in the following matters and such others as the Board of Public Health or the Minister of Health may from time to time direct:—

- (1) Advising the Board on the medical aspects of all sanitary matters which come before it.
- (2) Preparing regulations, circulars, and memoranda for publication on all sanitary and medical subjects connected with the health of the community.
- (3) Perusing, minuting, and advising on the reports of local officers of health and inspectors, and on the reports of the Board's sanitary inspectors.
- (4) Watching the returns and notifications of infectious diseases, and advising when special inquiries are needed or when special action by the Board is required.
- (5) Investigating the causes of and conditions attending outbreaks of infectious or contagious diseases in particular localities, making recommendations for the prevention of the spread and for the abatement of such outbreaks, and guarding against their recurrence.
- (6) Making periodical inspections of and reporting on the sanitary condition and sanitary administration of the various municipal districts of the colony.
- (7) Advising the Board on the relations between the vital statistics of the colony and all conditions affecting them.
- (8) Inspecting, reporting on, and directing the work of public vaccination throughout the colony.
- (9) Advising the Board in regard to matters relating to quarantine.
- (10) Taking immediate supervision and direction of the arrangements required for stamping out any disease introduced into Victoria.
- (11) Making original investigations into prevalence of diseases in man, and the relations of the same to disease in animals.
- (12) Advising the Board concerning the wholesomeness of water, and of the various kinds of foods on analyses submitted in connexion with the provisions of any Act relating thereto and administered by the Board.
- (13) Advising the Board, acting as a Court of Appeal, in regard to applications for the granting or cancelling of licences for noxious trade establishments.

The person appointed must be prepared at any moment to clear incoming and outgoing vessels; to take the duties of Medical Superintendent of the Quarantine Station, or to take the general medical management of any isolation hospital under the control of the Board.

Applicants should be between the ages of 25 and 40 years, and must be in vigorous and sound health, have all the necessary qualifications for registration as a medical practitioner of Victoria, and engage to become at once, on appointment, registered as such, and show that he has general experience in the treatment of communicable disease.

DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC INSTRUCTION, VICTORIA.—REGULATIONS FOR
TECHNICAL SCHOOLS.

HIS Excellency the Lieutenant-Governor of Victoria, with the advice of the Executive Council thereof, has by an Order dated the 20th day of December, 1900, rescinded the Regulations for Technical Schools dated 19th May, 1896, and has approved of the following Regulations in lieu thereof:—

1. Payments from the Annual Vote for Technical Schools shall be made only to such schools as may receive the approval of the Governor in Council, and the Governor in Council may at any time either withdraw approval from, or reduce the grant allotted to, any school.
2. Each school shall be under the control and management of a Local Committee or Council, to whom grants-in-aid of maintenance will be paid by the Minister of Public Instruction, who may, if he think fit, appoint one or more representatives on any of the Local Committees or Councils.
3. Accounts shall be kept in all schools showing the receipts under the heads of—(1) students' fees in the respective classes, (2) donations and subscriptions, (3) Government grants; and the expenditure under the heads of payments—(1) to instructors, (2) for clerical assistance, (3) for apparatus and repairs, (4) for lighting, cleaning, and incidental expenses. An annual Balance-sheet shall be submitted by each school to the Secretary, Education Department, not later than the 31st January in each year, showing the receipts and expenditure under the above heads. The Minister may at any time authorize any person to audit the accounts of any of the schools subsidized under these Regulations.
4. The Minister of Public Instruction must be satisfied that the various instructors employed in any school receive a due proportion of the Government Grant to such school and of the fees paid by the students.
5. All Technical Schools shall be open to inspection by any officer appointed for the purpose by the Minister of Public Instruction. Should an adverse report be received from such officer, or from the auditor mentioned in Regulation 3, the grant-in-aid may be partially or wholly withdrawn.

(b) The expenditure of grants-in-aid of buildings is subject to the following conditions:—

That the plans and specifications are approved by the Department before the commencement of the work, and that 25 per cent. of the grant be retained until the work has been passed by the Public Works Department.

(c) Grants for the purchase of furniture and apparatus may be made by the Department, at a rate of not more than two-thirds of the amount to be expended. Grants for the purchase of Museum Specimens, at the rate of not more than half the amount to be expended, may be made by the Department. No grant, however, for such purposes will be made unless plans and specifications of furniture and details and estimated cost of apparatus or specimens be first submitted to the Department for the approval of the Minister.

8. Should the Council of a School desire the inclusion of any subject of instruction not mentioned in the above list, special application must be made to the Minister for Public Instruction.

9 (a) Sanction will not be given for the teaching of any approved subject in a Technical School unless the Minister of Public Instruction is satisfied that the teacher is competent to give instruction in that subject.

(b) No new appointments of teachers are to be confirmed unless the approval of the Minister shall have been first obtained.

10. The course of study in each subject taught in Technical Schools under these Regulations shall be defined by a Syllabus, approved of by the Minister of Public Instruction.

11. (a) Examinations in the subjects mentioned in Regulation 7, or in any subject added with the approval of the Minister to those therein mentioned, will be held in the months of November and December of each year by Examiners appointed by the Minister of Public Instruction.

(b) In Dressmaking and Needlework and in Cookery (six months' courses) the examinations will be held half-yearly—in June and November.

12. Should the Examiners' reports show that the teaching during the year has been of an unsatisfactory character, the grant-in-aid is liable to be partially or wholly discontinued.

13. In those subjects of Lists B and D which are preceded by *, the year's school work of the students must be retained in the school for examination.

14. (a) Successful candidates at examination will be classified as follows :—

List A. (Ordinary examinations in all grades).—Passed, or passed with credit.

A special examination paper (or additional questions on the ordinary paper) will be set for "Honours" in the final grade of the following subjects:—

Euclid.	Assaying.
Algebra.	Metallurgy.
Trigonometry.	Geology.
Theoretical Chemistry.	Mining Geology.

Candidates will be allowed to enter either for "Pass" or "Honours" (not both); but if a candidate who works a special "Honour" paper falls below the standard required for "Honours," the Examiner will decide whether the marks gained are sufficient to entitle him to a "Pass."

In Assaying, candidates for "Honours," in addition to the written work and the practical tests set at the ordinary examination, will be required to submit themselves to a special practical examination, either at their own schools or in Melbourne at a laboratory to be named by the Examiner.

List B. Passed or passed with credit.

List D. Passed or excellent.

(b) A student recorded as "passed" at the examination in any grade of a subject may, at the next succeeding examination, present himself for the higher qualification.

15. (a) In the subjects of the General Syllabus of Examinations, it is expected that students should take up the several grades in the order therein set forth. The Pass, Honours, Excellent, or Credit in the higher grades of each subject will not therefore be awarded to any candidate until he has given evidence of satisfactory proficiency in the preceding grade or grades.

(b) In the subjects of List A, candidates, as a rule, will not be allowed to present themselves for more grades than one of a subject at each annual examination. A student, however, who fails in the elementary or intermediate grade of a subject may be examined in that and also in the next higher grade at a subsequent annual examination. If it is desired that other students may be examined in more grades than one of a subject at the same annual examination, special application must be made by the registrar of the school, giving reasons for the request in the case of each student named, at least three months before the commencement of the annual examinations.

16. Students must have recorded at least fourteen attendances during the year to be eligible for examinations in the subjects in which yearly examinations are held; in the subjects examined half-yearly, students must have recorded seven attendances during the half-year preceding the examination.

17. Certificates will be issued by the Department to candidates for the particular subject in which they may be successful at the Department's examinations held under these Regulations. No certificate will be issued for any subject of List B until the student has passed in the final grade.

18. Any person not being a student in a Technical School may, upon the payment of a fee of 10s. for each subject, be examined in, and, if successful, receive a certificate for, such subject.

DIPLOMAS.—CERTIFIED SCIENCE SCHOOLS.

19. The Department will grant diplomas to students who have completed full courses, and passed the required examinations in Metallurgy, Mining Engineering, &c., at a Certified Science School. These diplomas will be indorsed with the name of the school at which the student has been educated.

The following conditions must be fulfilled in order that a school may be recognised by the Department as a certified science school:—

- (a) That the school is regarded by the Department as suitable for the training of students in specified science courses.
- (b) That the regulations framed by the Council of the school for the instruction and general management of these course classes are approved of by the Department.

NOTE.—Under (b) are included the standard of education required for admission to the courses, the subjects and grades of subjects prescribed for the several years of a course, time-tables, &c.

REGISTERS.

20. (a) A General Register must be kept in each school, in which must be entered the register number, name, age, and occupation (if any) of each student, class or classes in which enrolled, and date of passing any examination of the Education Department held under these Regulations. The instructions issued by the Department for keeping this Register must be strictly adhered to.

(b) A register of the students' attendances must be kept, and must be correctly posted up daily, in accordance with the instructions issued by the Department.

(c) A fee-book, in which all fees paid by students are to be inserted, must also be kept.

(d) All Attendance Registers in use during the year must be forwarded to the Department within seven days after the closing of the fourth term. These Registers will be retained by the Department.

21. An Abstract, showing the number of the term attendances of all students enrolled in the several classes and grades of classes, must be forwarded to the Secretary, Education Department, not later than seven days after the close of each term.

22. An Annual Return must be submitted by each school to the Secretary, Education Department, not later than the 31st January in each year, giving—

- (1) The number of individual students (male and female separately) on the roll for the year.
- (2) The number of students who have attended seven times or more during the fourth term of the year.
- (3) The maximum and minimum fee paid by students.
- (4) The number of (a) artisans, (b) apprentices, (c) those attending State or private schools on the rolls for the year.
- (5) Number of teachers.

23. There shall be four terms in each year, each of not less than ten weeks' duration.

GENERAL.

24. A copy of the Time Table for each term shall be forwarded to the Department not later than three weeks after the commencement of each term.

25. Classes in which the lectures or lessons are less than one hour in duration will not be recognised. In all subjects of List D, and in those of Lists A and B (Regulation 7), marked with a †, classes must be at least of one and a half hour's duration.

26. Lectures or lessons in each grade of a subject on the Time Table of any particular school must be held at least twice weekly, and on separate days. No departure from this course will be sanctioned except by the special permission of the Minister of Public Instruction.

27. No class will be recognised in which the fee charged is less than Five shillings per term.

28. No portion of the annual grants for maintenance, nor any portion of the fees paid by students for tuition in subjects subsidized under these Regulations, is to be paid by Councils of Schools for the maintenance of classes in subjects other than those mentioned under Regulation 7, or subjects otherwise approved of by the Minister of Public Instruction. Any infringement of this Regulation will render a school liable to the withdrawal of the whole or a part of the grant-in-aid.

29. The expenditure necessary for examinations and materials and labour for models in connexion with these schools shall be a charge on the vote for Technical Schools.

WHEREAS by the *Railway and Public Works Loan Application Act 1898* (No. 1566) it is among other things enacted that the sum of One hundred thousand pounds to be raised by the sale of Victorian Government Three per cent. Stock under the authority of the said Act, may be applied for the purpose of District Co-operative Wineries and Viticulture Industry, Dairy Schools, Experimental Stations, Purchase of Live Stock, Machinery, Implements, and other Appliances, and Technical Agricultural Education, Development of the Export Trade, Bonuses for the encouragement of the Cultivation, Manufacture, and Export of Fruit, Tobacco, Flax, Hemp, Silk, and of other Rural Industries, to be expended under Regulations to be approved by the Governor in Council: Now therefore His Excellency the Lieutenant-Governor of Victoria, with the advice of the Executive Council thereof, doth make the following Regulations, that is to say:—

Development of the Export Trade.

Out of the sum of Thirty-two thousand five hundred pounds applicable under the Railway and Public Works Loan Application Act for development of the export trade, expenditure may be incurred by the Minister of Agriculture for the purpose of preparing tobacco leaf for export.

And the Honorable John Morrissey, Her Majesty's Minister of Agriculture for Victoria, shall give the necessary directions herein accordingly.

Customs Act 1896.

REGULATIONS AS TO EXPORT ENTRIES.

At the Executive Council Chamber, Melbourne, the twentieth day of December, 1900.

WHEREAS by the Customs Act 1896 (60 Vict. No. 1471) it is amongst other things enacted that the Governor in Council may make regulations for generally regulating the export of goods from Victoria, for the purpose of denoting what particulars shall be given in outward bills of entry, for the compilation of statistics, and for prescribing the various forms to be used, and for prescribing and limiting the penalty (which shall in no case exceed Twenty pounds) that may be enforced for the breach of any such regulations: Now therefore His Excellency the Lieutenant-Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, doth hereby make the following regulations, that is to say:—

REGULATIONS.

1. All goods exported under an outward bill of entry shall be described therein under one of the headings in the schedule hereto, such heading being used as is most applicable to the goods exported under such entry. The weights, quantities, or description shall be given in each case in accordance with such schedule.

2. The country of origin of all goods so exported shall be stated in the outward bill of entry under one of the following headings which may be most applicable, viz., Victoria, other Australasian Colonies, Great Britain, British Possessions, and Foreign. For the purposes of these regulations the term Australasian shall include New South Wales, South Australia, Western Australia, Queensland, and Tasmania.

3. The outward bill of entry must also show the true and correct value of all goods exported thereunder, and such value shall, except in the case of ad valorem goods exported under drawback, be the market value in Melbourne at the date of export. In the case of ad valorem goods exported under drawback the value shall be the sum upon which drawback is payable.

The port at which any goods exported are to be landed or delivered must be correctly stated on each entry and the requirements of the Customs Acts generally as to the form of export entry and particulars to be given therein must be fully complied with.

4. Any person who, on an outward bill of entry, shall wrongly describe any goods, or shall fail to give the particulars and values required by these regulations, or shall wrongly state the numbers, quantities, weights, values, place of origin, or other particulars required by these regulations shall, for each and every such offence, be liable to a penalty of not less than Ten shillings or more than Twenty pounds.

5. Any person who shall, without the consent of the Collector of Customs, export or ship or be concerned in exporting or shipping any goods for which an export entry shall not have been passed shall, for each and every such offence, be liable to a penalty of not less than Ten shillings or more than Twenty pounds.

6. No goods shall be shipped for export on any Sunday or holiday or before or after the hours specified in section 61 of the Customs Act 1890 on any other day on board any ship in respect to which authority as provided for in the said Act has not been first obtained.

7. These regulations shall come into force on and after the 20th December, 1900, and all regulations previously made under the authority of section 21 of Act 1471 are hereby cancelled.

- Sheeting, Old.—Half pound per quarter for every 50 rifles. The Rangoon oil is issued for lubricating the actions, for which purpose rifle oil is on no account to be used. No oil except that supplied by the Ordnance Branch will be applied to the arms under any circumstances.

By His Excellency the Honorable Sir John Madden, Knight Commander of the Most Distinguished Order of Saint Michael and Saint George, Lieutenant-Governor of the Colony of Victoria and its Dependencies, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS by the Vermin Destruction Act 1890 (54 Vict. No. 1153) it is amongst other things enacted that it shall be the duty of every occupier and of every owner of land, including every occupier and every owner of Mallee land, from time to time to suppress and destroy all vermin from time to time on any land so occupied or owned by him, or on the adjacent half-width of all roads bounding or adjoining the same or any part thereof, and for such purpose to do all necessary or proper acts or things, and that the Governor in Council shall have power from time to time, by Proclamation in the Government Gazette, to name any specified day, on and from and after which the duty thereby declared shall, in any part of Victoria described in such Proclamation, be simultaneously commenced, continued, and performed by every occupier and every owner of any land, including every occupier and every owner of Mallee land: Now therefore I, the Lieutenant-Governor of Victoria, with the advice of the Executive Council thereof, do hereby name the seventh day of January, 1901, as the day on and from and after which the duty thereby declared shall, in the colony of Victoria, be simultaneously commenced, continued, and performed by every occupier and every owner of any land, including every occupier and every owner of Mallee land throughout the said colony of Victoria.

PROCLAMATION

By His Excellency the Honorable Sir John Madden, Knight Commander of the Most Distinguished Order of Saint Michael and Saint George, Lieutenant-Governor of the Colony of Victoria and its Dependencies, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS by the Land Acts it is amongst other things enacted that, subject to the provisions of the *Land Act 1898*, the Governor in Council may, by Proclamation to be published in the *Government Gazette*, at any time increase or diminish the area of land comprised in any of the classes mentioned in Part I., Division 1, section 9, of the said *Land Act 1898*, but that the area of lands which may be sold by auction (class 6) shall not be increased: And whereas by the said Acts it is further enacted that where any portion of Crown lands not exceeding fifty acres, and not contiguous or adjacent to any other Crown lands, is so situated as to make it desirable, in the opinion of the Governor in Council, that the same should be sold, or where any portion of Crown lands not exceeding three acres is required for a site for a church or for any charitable purpose for which land cannot legally be reserved, the Governor in Council may direct the sale of such portion of Crown lands, and for such purpose may increase the area of lands which may be sold by auction (class 6 aforesaid) by adding such portion thereto: And whereas by the said Acts it is further enacted that, notwithstanding anything contained in section 9 of the *Land Act 1898* aforesaid the Governor in Council may increase the area of land described in the First Schedule to the said last-mentioned Act as lands which may be sold by auction by adding thereto any portion of the Crown lands described in the said Schedule as Swamp lands: Now therefore I, the Lieutenant-Governor of Victoria, by and with the advice of the Executive Council thereof, do hereby increase or diminish (as the case may be) the areas of Crown lands comprised in classes 1, 2, 3, 4, 6, and 7 respectively of the classes mentioned in section 9 of the *Land Act 1898* aforesaid to the extent set forth in the subjoined Schedules respectively (that is to say):—

The births of 1,028 children, viz., 521 boys and 507 girls, were registered in Greater Melbourne during the month of November. The number was, it will be observed, the highest recorded since 1895, but was 106 below the average of the month during the previous ten years, or 140 below it if allowance be made for the increase of population.

The deaths recorded in November numbered 616, viz., 332 of males and 284 of females; the births thus exceeded the deaths by 412, or 67 per cent., as against 23 per cent. in November, 1899, and 83 per cent. according to the average. The number was, it will be noticed, 194 less than in November, 1899—when an epidemic of influenza prevailed—and also less than in 1891 and 1898, but more than that recorded for the month during any other of the previous ten years; but was only 2 below the average of November during the last ten years, and 20 below it when allowance is made for the increase of population.

To every 1,000 of the population of the district the proportion of births registered was equivalent to 26.18, and of deaths registered to 15.69 per annum, as compared with averages of the same month in 1899 of 25.74 and 20.97 respectively, and during the last ten years of 29.75 and 16.20 respectively, and averages of the whole year of 31.27 and 16.80.

The highest temperature in the shade recorded at Melbourne Observatory during the month was 97.5° on the 25th, and the lowest was 40.4° on the 7th. The mean temperature of the month (58.3°) was 2.7° below the average, and was the lowest recorded since November, 1879, when the same temperature occurred. The greatest range of the thermometer in any one day (48.9°) took place on the 13th, and the least range (2.9°) on the 18th. The mean daily range was 19.0°. The highest atmospheric pressure recorded was 30.141 inches on the 20th, and the lowest was 29.688 inches on the 14th. The mean atmospheric pressure (29.921 inches) was slightly above the average.

Rain fell on 7 days, the amount being 1.04 inches, which was lower than in the corresponding month during any of the previous ten years except 1894, 1895, 1896, 1897, and 1898, and .68 of an inch below the average.

The mean humidity of the month was .698.

Males contributed 54 per cent. and females 46 per cent. to the mortality of the month. Children under five years of age contributed 28 per cent. to that mortality, as against 26 per cent. in November, 1899; 38 per cent. in November, 1898; 32 per cent. in November, 1897; 36 per cent. in November, 1896; 33 per cent. in November, 1895; and 33 per cent. in November, 1894.

The deaths of infants under twelve months registered in the month under review, as compared with 173 in November, 1899; 208 in November, 1898; 134 in November, 1897; 160 in November, 1896; 127 in November, 1895; 115 in November, 1894; 147 in November, 1893; 112 in November, 1892; 183 in November, 1891; and 119 in November, 1890.

Sixty-two persons—as against 86 in November, 1899—whose deaths were recorded during the month had attained or passed the age of 75 years. Of these, two females, each aged 75, died of disease of the spinal cord and valvular disease of the heart respectively; a gentleman and a labourer, each aged 75, of bronchitis; a clergyman, aged 75, of cystitis; two females, each aged 76, of diarrhoea and cancer respectively; a gardener, aged 76, of hemiplegia; a labourer, aged 76, of heart disease; a brassfounder, aged 76, of bronchitis; a miner, aged 77, of abscess of the brain; two females, each aged 78, of valvular disease of the heart and senile gangrene respectively; an ostler, aged 78, of heart disease; a female, aged 78, of ulceration of the stomach; two females, each aged 79, of anaemia and endocarditis; a bricklayer and a female, each aged 79, of bronchitis; a carpenter, aged 79, of pneumonia; two females, each aged 79, of hepatitis and Bright's disease respectively; a gentleman, aged 80, of cancer; a miner, aged 80, of apoplexy; a female, aged 80, of dilatation of the heart; a mechanic, aged 80, of pericarditis; a miner, aged 80, of thrombosis; a female, aged 81, of enteritis; a gentleman, aged 82, of valvular disease of the heart; a shoemaker, aged 82, and a female, aged 83, of heart disease; a carpenter and a female, each aged 83, of bronchitis; a labourer, aged 83, of uræmia; a gardener, aged 84, of asthma; a gentleman, aged 85, of apoplexy; two females, each aged 85, of paralysis and syncope respectively; two females, each 85, of bronchitis; a carpenter and a female, each aged 85, of pneumonia; an engineer, aged 85, of abscess of elbow joint; two females, each aged 86, of cerebral effusion and jaundice respectively; a female, aged 88, of syncope; a carpenter, aged 89, of heart disease; a wheelwright, aged 92, of bronchitis; a gentleman and a female, each aged 78, a female, aged 79, a gentleman and a labourer, each aged 80, a male, of no occupation, aged 81, three females, aged 82, 83, and 83 respectively, a labourer, aged 84, a contractor and a female, each aged 85, and two females, aged 87 and 92 respectively, of old age.

Thirty-three of the deaths recorded during the month—as compared with 34 in November, 1899—were from external causes, of which 24 were set down to accident, 2 to homicide, and 7 to suicide. The following are the particulars of the accidental deaths:—A contractor, aged 31, and a ganger, aged 58, were passed over by railway trains; a labourer, aged 45, was killed by the upsetting of a cart; a labourer, aged 19, died of hæmorrhage, the result of a fall from a stage; a labourer, aged 22, of laceration of the brain, caused by a fall from a lift; a carter, aged 57, of fracture of the skull, consequent on a fall from a ladder; a labourer, aged 16, of injuries, the result of a fall from a tree; a male child, aged 1 year, of injury to the brain; and a farmer, aged 44, of fracture of the skull; two male children, each aged 4, and three females, aged 3, 4, and 9 respectively, of burns; a labourer, aged 42, and a female, aged 36, of heat apoplexy; a butcher, aged 37, was poisoned by carbonic oxide; a seaman, aged 35, was drowned in the River Yarra; four persons were "found drowned," viz., a hatter, aged 47, a caretaker, aged 59, and a female, aged 28, in the River Yarra, and a waterman, aged 60, in Hobson's Bay; a new-born female infant was suffocated at birth; and a laundryman, aged 31, by vomited food getting into the air passages. The homicidal deaths were those of an engraver, aged 63, who died of fracture of the skull, and a financier, aged 69, who was shot, a verdict of wilful murder being returned in the former and of manslaughter in the latter case. The suicidal deaths were those of a labourer, aged 22, an estate agent, aged 45, and a gentleman, aged 56, who shot themselves; a grocer, aged 64, who poisoned himself with arsenic; and a labourer, aged 37, a farmer, aged 60, and a paper-maker, aged 63, who drowned themselves.

One hundred and fifty-four deaths, or 25 per cent. of the whole, took place in public institutions, viz.:—68 in the Melbourne, 17 in the Alfred, 3 in St. Vincent's, 6 in the Women's, 6 in the Children's, 3 in the Homeopathic, and 6 in the Austin Hospitals; 12 in the Metropolitan and 6 in the Yarra Bend Lunatic Asylums; 8 in the Immigrants' Home; 9 in the Benevolent Asylum; 6 in the Convent of the Little Sisters of the Poor; 3 in the Protestant Refuge; and 1 in the Eye and Ear Hospital.

The deaths of children under five years of age numbered 173, of which 93, or 54 per cent., were of males, and 80, or 46 per cent., were of females. Of those who died, 120 were under one year of age, 32 were between one and two, 8 were between two and three, 7 were between three and four, and 6 were between four and five.

The persons who died at a more advanced age than five years numbered 443. Of these 239, or 54 per cent., were males, and 204, or 46 per cent., were females; 23 were between five and ten, 10 were between ten and fifteen, 16 were between fifteen and twenty, 18 were between twenty and twenty-five, 24 were between twenty-five and thirty, 30 were between thirty and thirty-five, 27 were between thirty-five and forty, 26 were between forty and forty-five, 28 were between forty-five and fifty, 28 were between fifty and fifty-five, 26 were between fifty-five and sixty, 38 were between sixty and sixty-five, 48 were between sixty-five and seventy, 40 were between seventy and seventy-five, 25 were between seventy-five and eighty, 20 were between eighty and eighty-five, 15 were between eighty-five and ninety, and 2 were between ninety and ninety-five.

As compared with the corresponding month of the previous year, there was a decrease of 118 deaths under zymotic, 65 under local diseases, and 17 under ill-defined causes. Under the zymotic class, deaths from measles rose from nil to 23, those from diphtheria from 1 to 6, and those from typhoid fever from 1 to 5, whilst those from influenza fell from 152 to 3. Under the constitutional class, deaths from cancer rose from 29 to 37, and those from tuberculosis, &c., from 9 to 15, but a decrease from phthisis from 66 to 50. Under the developmental class, deaths from old age rose from 12 to 18, whilst those from premature birth fell from 18 to 13. Under the local class, deaths from diseases of the circulatory system increased by 12; whilst those from diseases of the nervous system diminished by 23, those from diseases of the respiratory system by 33, those from diseases of the digestive system by 19, and those from diseases of the urinary system by 8. The epidemic of measles now prevalent caused 23 deaths in the month under notice, as compared with 21 in the preceding one—making a total of 86 since the 1st January.

The following is a statement of the deaths set down to diphtheria and typhoid fever in each month of the years 1890 to 1899, and the first eleven months of 1900, from which may be traced the rise and fall of the mortality at various periods of the year. It will be noticed that the mortality from typhoid fever usually attains its maximum in March, and is at a minimum from July to November.

Alternative tenders are required for white and Algerian oats.

Printed forms of tender and conditions of contract may be obtained from the Secretary, Tender Board, Treasury, Melbourne, or from the officer in charge at the station, by whom also information or explanation will be afforded to persons tendering.

As much forage as can be stored at any station where the storage is small will, for the convenience of the contractor, be ordered at one time.

The price, which must be expressed in words as well as in figures, and without alterations, erasures, or discrepancies, must be per cental of 100 lbs. (net weight), including delivery at the stations, and all charges except the bags, which will remain the property of the contractor. At stations where the bags can be at once emptied the contractor will be required to remove them when delivery is taken. At other stations, notice will be sent to the contractor when the bags are empty. Bags to be removed at contractor's expense.

Tenders, which should be upon the printed form, will be received for either oats, bran, hay, or straw (the particular kind of hay or straw offered to be stated); but if all be included in one tender it may be accepted for one article only, if advisable. Oaten hay will be preferred. If sheaf hay be tendered for, it must be so stated in the tender.

A tenderer not desiring to accept a contract for part of the requirements of any station should write against such station the words "all or none."

Telegrams or tenders not complying with the terms of advertisement will not be entertained.

The successful tenderer will be required to enter into a bond for one-third of the estimated amount of the contract within ten days after the acceptance is notified. Two approved sureties are required for contracts amounting to £150 and upwards, and one surety for contracts under £150.

Tenderers failing to take up their accepted tenders, or failing to carry out their contract satisfactorily, will be ineligible to again hold contracts for Government supplies.

CONDITIONS OF CONTRACT.

1. The hay to be good, sound, and sweet, and properly trussed, except when otherwise specified in the contract; the straw to be wheaten or oaten, and both to be in all respects of the best quality; oats, white or Algerian (Victorian grown), of the best description of their respective kind, full kernel, clean, and free from wild oats or other objectionable seeds; bran to be sound and sweet, and of the best description; chaff to be made from oaten hay of the best quality; the maize to be of the best quality. The hay tenders must specify whether they are for oaten or wheaten hay.

2. The supplies are for police, telegraph, and other horses, and are to be delivered on the order of the officer in charge of the district or station. The quantities stated in the schedule being only approximate, it must be understood that the Government may draw either more or less than those mentioned; and should new telegraph stations be formed, or additional horses required to be stationed at any of the stations, the contractor will be required to supply the additional forage. Should the additional number of horses, however, exceed two, the contractor may, if he desires it, terminate the contract by supplying at once the whole quantity due at the station under the contract according to the foregoing schedule.

3. Notwithstanding anything contained in the preceding condition, the contractors for the supply to the Police Depot may be called upon to supply any Government Departments within a radius of six miles from Melbourne, for which no contracts have been taken, at the same rates.

4. The forage, when delivered, must be accompanied by the particulars of quantity, showing the net weight, to be indorsed on the back of the order, which, when signed by the officer in charge of the station, for the net quantity received, will be returned to the contractor, and by him rendered in support of his account.

5. Each contractor will be required to prepare his own account in the prescribed form, and, on presentation thereof to the officer in charge of the station or district, it will be forwarded for payment at the Treasury, Melbourne, or the Pay Office of the district, as may be indicated by the contractor on the account.

6. Should forage duly ordered under these contracts not be delivered within forty-eight hours of the time specified in the order for delivery, it will be competent for the department (should circumstances require it) to purchase the same at the risk of the contractor, from whose account any expense over and above the contract price is to be deducted.

7. In the event of a difference of opinion between the contractor and the officer receiving the forage as to the quality of the same, it is to be decided by a board of survey, composed of persons named by the head of the department ordering the supply, and the decision of the Board is to be considered final.

8. If the Board shall decide that the forage is not of proper quality, it must be immediately replaced by the contractor, failing which it will be procured elsewhere, and the extra cost, if any, will be charged as in clause 6.

9. When a board of survey cannot be conveniently assembled, or when, from some other cause, injury would accrue either to the public service or to the contractor by waiting for a board of survey, the officer in charge will have the power to reject such supplies as are obviously of inferior quality, it being understood that he will be responsible to the Government for so doing; and the contractor must take back the rejected forage, and supply good in its stead, failing which it will be obtained by the officer requiring it, and the expense will be charged as in clause 6.

10. A refusal to execute orders, irregularity in the quantity or quality of the forage, or delay in delivering or replacing it when required, will subject the contractor, upon report from the Tender Board, to such mulct, not exceeding £20, as the Treasurer of the Colony for the time being may direct. It will also be in the power of the said Treasurer, upon such refusal, irregularity, or delay, to terminate the contract forthwith.

11. Contractors are not at liberty to transfer their contracts under cover of power of attorney, coupled with an interest or otherwise; and no such transfer will be recognised by the Government.

12. Under no circumstances will a contractor be permitted to abandon his contract, and in the event of his failing to carry on his contract he will be held liable for any loss which the Government may sustain in consequence of such failure. In the event of a station being discontinued or any change in the supplies required, the contractor will receive the earliest possible intimation.

13. The contracts entered into under this notice are not to be considered as broken, infringed, or vitiated by the purchase by any Department of forage grown at any Government establishment.
