PROCLAMATION

By His Excellency the Honorable Sir John Madden, Knight Commander of the Most Distinguished Order of Saint Michael and Saint George, Lieutenant-Governor of the Colony of Victoria and its Dependencies, &c., &c., &c.

**I**N pursuance of the provisions contained in Part VI. of the *Public Service Act 1890* (54 Vict. No. 1133), I, the Lieutenant-Governor of Victoria, with the advice of the Executive Council thereof, do by this my Proclamation appoint the days and dates hereunder mentioned to be observed as Public Holidays at the places respectively specified, viz. :—

WEDNESDAY, THE 28TH DAY OF MARCH INSTANT, throughout the Borough of Maryborough\* and the Shire of Romsey ;

THURSDAY, THE 29TH DAY OF MARCH INSTANT, throughout the Shire of Rosedale ;\*

TUESDAY, THE 3RD DAY OF APRIL NEXT, throughout the Shire of Korong ;

WEDNESDAY, THE 4TH DAY OF APRIL NEXT, throughout the North Riding of the Shire of Euroa ;

WEDNESDAY, THE 25TH DAY OF APRIL NEXT, throughout the Shire of Deakin.

PREVENTION OF EPIDEMIC, ENDEMIC, AND  
CONTAGIOUS DISEASES IN VICTORIA.

*At the Executive Council Chamber, Melbourne, the twenty-third day of March. 1.00.*

**W**HEREAS by section 121 of the *Health Act 1890*, it was amongst other things enacted that the Governor in Council might make Orders from time to time directing that the provisions thereafter contained for the prevention of epidemic, endemic, and contagious diseases be put in force in Victoria, or in such parts thereof, or in such such places therein, as in such Orders respectively might be expressed, and might in like manner from time to time revoke, alter, or vary any such Order, and such Orders should have the like effect as if the provisions therein contained were included in the said Act. Provided that all such Orders shall within one week from the making thereof be published in the *Government Gazette*. And whereas the disease known as the "Bubonic Plague" is prevalent in the adjoining colonies, and it is expedient that the Board of Public Health should be enabled to enforce any regulation that may appear to be necessary for preventing the introduction and spread of the said disease : Now therefore His Excellency the Lieutenant-Governor, by and with the advice of the Executive Council, doth by this present Order direct that the provisions contained in the *Health Act 1890* aforesaid for the prevention of epidemic, endemic, and contagious diseases be put in force in Victoria until this Order in Council shall be revoked.

And the Honorable William Hill Irvine, Her Majesty's Attorney-General for Victoria, shall give the necessary directions herein accordingly.
