SIR, I have the honour to transmit to you, for publication in the colony under your Government, a copy of an Order of Her Majesty the Queen in Council, dated the 2nd of March, 1900, for giving effect to the Treaty between Her Majesty and the Republic of San Marino for the mutual extradition of fugitive criminals, signed at Florence on the 10th of October, 1899, the ratifications of which were exchanged at Rome on the 5th of December, 1899.

ORDER IN COUNCIL.

EXTRADITION TREATY—SAN MARINO.

Windsor, 3rd March, 1900.

At the Court at Windsor, the 3rd day of March, 1900.

PRESENT:

The Queen's Most Excellent Majesty.

Lord Chancellor
Lord President

Lord James of Hereford.

WHEREAS by the Extradition Acts, 1870 to 1895, it was amongst other things enacted that, where an arrangement has been made with any foreign State with respect to the surrender to such State of any fugitive criminals, Her Majesty may, by Order in Council, direct that the said Acts shall apply in the case of such foreign State; and that Her Majesty may, by the same or any subsequent Order, limit the operation of the Order, and restrict the same to fugitive criminals who are in or suspected of being in the part of Her Majesty's dominions specified in the Order, and render the operation thereof subject to such conditions, exceptions, and qualifications as may be deemed expedient.

And whereas a Treaty was concluded on the sixteenth day of October, One thousand eight hundred and ninety-nine, between Her Majesty and the Captains Regent of the Most Serene Republic of San Marino, for the mutual extradition of fugitive criminals, which Treaty is in the terms following:—

Her Majesty the Queen of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, Empress of India, and the Most Serene Republic of San Marino, having judged it expedient, with a view to the better administration of justice and to the prevention of crime within their respective territories, that persons charged with or convicted of the crimes hereinafter enumerated, and being fugitives from justice, should, under certain circumstances, be reciprocally delivered up, the said High Contracting Parties have named as their Plenipotentiaries to conclude a Treaty for this purpose, that is to say:—

Sua Maestà la Regina del Regno Unito della Gran Bretagna e d'Irlanda Imperatrice delle Indie, e la Serenissima Repubblica di San Marino, avendo giudicato conveniente per la migliore amministrazione della giustizia e per prevenire i reati nei rispettivi loro territori, che gli individui accusati o condannati per i reati qui appresso enumerati, e che cerchino sottrarsi alla giustizia, sieno, in certi casi, reciprocamente consegnati, le dette Alte Parti Contraenti hanno nominato come loro Plenipotenziali per concludere un Trattato a questo scopo, cioè:—

Her Majesty the Queen of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, Empress of India, his Excellency Philip Henry Wodehouse, Baron Currie of Hawley, a Member of Her Most Honourable Privy Council, Knight Grand Cross of Her Most Honourable Order of the Bath, Her Ambassador Extraordinary and Plenipotentiary to His Majesty the King of Italy;

Sua Maestà la Regina del Regno Unito della Gran Bretagna e d'Irlanda, Imperatrice delle Indie, sua Eccellenza Philip Henry Wodehouse, Barone Currie di Hawley, Membro del Onorevolissimo Consiglio Privato di Sua Maestà, Gran Croce del Onorevolissimo Ordine del Bagno, Ambasciatore Straordinario e Plenipotenziario presso Sua Maestà il Re d'Italia;

And the Most Serene Republic of San Marino, his Excellency Cavaliere Paolo Onorato Vigliani, Patrician of San Marino, Grand Cross and Grand Cordon of the Order of Saint Maurice and Saint Lazarus, and of the Crown of Italy, Knight Grand Cross of the Most Distinguished Order of St. Michael and St. George, &c., &c., Minister of State, ex-President of the Court of Cassation, Senator of the Kingdom of Italy;

Who, having communicated to each other their respective full powers, found in good and due form, have agreed upon and concluded the following Articles:—

Article I.

The High Contracting Parties engage to deliver up to each other those persons who, being accused or convicted of a crime or offence committed in the territory of the one Party, shall be found within the territory of the other Party, under the circumstances and conditions stated in the present Treaty.

Article II.

The crimes or offences for which the extradition is to be granted are the following:—

1. Murder, or attempt, or conspiracy to murder, and manslaughter.
2. Assault occasioning actual bodily harm. Malicious wounding or inflicting grievous bodily harm.
3. Counterfeiting or altering money or uttering counterfeit or altered money.
4. Knowingly making any instrument, tool, or engine adapted and intended for counterfeiting coin.
5. Forgery, counterfeiting, or altering or uttering what is forged, counterfeited, or altered.
6. Embezzlement or larceny.
7. Malicious injury to property if the offence be indictable.
8. Obtaining money, goods, or valuable securities by false pretences.
9. Receiving money, valuable security, or other property, knowing the same to have been stolen, embezzled, or unlawfully obtained.
10. Crimes against Bankruptcy Law.
11. Fraud by a bailie, banker, agent factor, trustee, or Director, or member or public officer of any company.
12. Perjury, or subornation of perjury.
13. Rape.
14. Carnal knowledge, or any attempt to have carnal knowledge, of a girl under 16 years of age, so far as such acts are punishable by the law of the State upon which the demand is made.
15. Indecent assault. Indecent assault, even with consent, upon children of either sex under 13 years of age.
16. Administering drugs or using instruments with intent to procure the miscarriage of a woman.
17. Abduction.
18. Child stealing.
19. Abandoning children, exposing or unlawfully detaining them.
20. Kidnapping and false imprisonment.
21. Burglary or housebreaking.

22. Arson.
23. Robbery with violence.
24. Any malicious act done with intent to endanger the safety of any person in a railway train.

25. Threats by letter or otherwise, with intent to extort.
26. Piracy by law of nations.
27. Sinking or destroying a vessel at sea, or attempting or conspiring to do so.
28. Assaults on board a ship on the high seas with intent to destroy life or to do grievous bodily harm.
29. Revolt, or conspiracy to revolt, by two or more persons on board a ship on the high seas against the authority of the master.
30. Dealing in slaves in such a manner as to constitute a criminal offence against the laws of both States.

Extradition is also to be granted for participation in any of the aforesaid crimes, provided such participation be punishable by the laws of both the Contracting Parties.

Extradition may also be granted, at the discretion of the State applied to, in respect of any other crime for which, according to the laws of both the Contracting Parties for the time being in force, the grant can be made.

Article III.

Either Government may, in its absolute discretion, refuse to deliver up its own subjects to the other Government.

Article IV.

The extradition shall not take place, if the person claimed on the part of the British Government, or the person claimed on the part of the Government of San Marino, has already been tried and discharged or punished, or is actually upon his trial, within the territory of the other of the two High Contracting Parties, for the crime for which his extradition is demanded.

If the person claimed on the part of the British Government, or if the person claimed on the part of the Government of San Marino, should be under examination, or be undergoing sentence under a conviction, for any other crime within the territories of the two High Contracting Parties respectively, his extradition shall be deferred until after he has been discharged, whether by acquittal or on expiration of his sentence, or otherwise.

I quali, dopo essersi comunicati i rispettivi loro pieni poteri, trovati in buona e debita forma, hanno convenuto e conchiuso gli Articoli seguenti:—

Articolo I.

Le Alte Parti Contraenti si obbligano di consegnarsi reciprocamente coloro i quali, essendo accusati o condannati per un misfatto commesso nel territorio di una di esse Parti, saranno trovati nel territorio dell'altra, nei modi o con le condizioni stabilite nel presente Trattato.

Articolo II.

I misfatti per i quali è convenuta le estradizione sono i seguenti:—

1. Omicidio volontario di qualunque grado e denominazione punibile secondo la legge di San Marino, tentativo, complicità, o cospirazione nel medesimo reato.
2. Ferite o percosse volontarie, producenti gravi lesioni corporali secondo il Codice Penale di San Marino.
3. Contraffazione o alterazione di moneta od emissione di moneta contraffatta o alterata.
4. Scienze fabbricazione di qualsiasi strumento, ordigno od apparecchio adatto e destinato per la contraffazione di moneta.
5. Falsificazione, contraffazione o alterazione od emissione della cosa falsificata, contraffatta o alterata.
6. Furto od indebita sottrazione od appropriazione.
7. Danni dolosi alla proprietà quando il reato è oggetto di procedimento formale.
8. L'ottenuta consegna di denaro, oggetti o valori col mezzo di raggio.
9. Ricettazione di denaro, valori od altro di nota provenienza furtiva.
10. Bancarotta dolosa.
11. Frode commessa da un depositario, banchiere, agente, amministratore, curatore, o direttore o membro o pubblico ufficiale di qualsiasi compagnia.
12. Spergiuro o subornazione allo spergiuro.
13. Violenza carnale.
14. Commercio carnale o tentativo di commercio carnale con una minore degli anni sedici, in quanto tali atti siano punibili dalla legge dello Stato richiesto.
15. Attentato al pudore con qualsiasi violenza. Qualunque altro attentato al pudore su persone dell'uno o dell'altro sesso (anche con loro consenso) quando siano de età inferiore ai tredici anni.
16. Sommistrazione di medicinali od uso di strumenti allo scopo di procurare l'aborto ad una donna.
17. Rapimento di persona.
18. Sottrazione di fanciulli.
19. Abbandono, esposizione, od abusiva detenzione di fanciulli.
20. Sottrazione ed abusivo sequestro di persona.
21. Burglary e housebreaking, comprendendosi sotto queste designazioni l'atto di chi di notte tempo, o anche di giorno, si introduce mediante rottura o scialata, o per mezzo di chiave falsa od altro strumento, nell'altrui abitazione per commettere un reato.
22. Incendi dolosi.
23. Furto con violenza.
24. Qualsiasi atto doloso commesso con l'intento di mettere in pericolo l'incolumità di qualunque persona in un convoglio ferroviario.
25. Minacce per lettera o per altro modo, al l'intento di estorsione.
26. Pirateria, secondo il diritto internazionale.
27. Sommersione o distruzione di nave in mare, o tentativo ovvero cospirazione a tale oggetto.
28. Assalto a bordo di una nave in alto mare col fine di uccidere o di produrre gravi danni corporali.
29. Rivolta o cospirazione di rivolta di due o più persone a bordo di una nave in alto mare contro l'autorità del capitano.
30. Commercio di schiavi in maniera tale da costituire reato contro le leggi di entrambi gli Stati.

Sarà pure accordata la estradizione di coloro che avranno partecipato ad alcuno dei suddetti reati, purchè tale partecipazione sia punibile secondo le leggi di entrambi le Parti Contraenti.

La estradizione può anche essere accordata, a discrezione dello Stato richiesto, per qualsiasi altro reato per il quale, a tenore delle leggi vigenti di entrambe le Parti Contraenti, essa possa essere accordata.

Articolo III.

Sarà in facoltà di ciascun Governo rifiutare di consegnare i propri nazionali all'altro Governo.

Articolo IV.

La estradizione non avrà luogo se l'individuo domandato dal Governo Britannico, o dal Governo di San Marino, sia stato già processato od assolto o punito, ovvero sia effettivamente sotto processo entro il territorio dell'altra delle due Alte Parti Contraenti, per il reato per cui chiedesi la sua estradizione.

Se l'individuo domandato dal Governo Britannico, o dal Governo di San Marino, fosse sotto istruttoria, o in espiazione di pena in seguito a condanna, per qualsiasi altro reato entro i territori di entrambi le Alte Parti Contraenti rispettivamente, la sua estradizione verrà differita fino al suo rilascio, sia in seguito ad assoluzione sia per aver scontata la condanna, od altrimenti.

Article V.

The extradition shall not take place if, subsequently to the commission of the crime, or the institution of the penal prosecution or the conviction thereon, exemption from prosecution or punishment has been acquired by lapse of time, according to the laws of the State applied to.

Article VI.

A fugitive criminal shall not be surrendered if the offence in respect of which his surrender is demanded is one of a political character, or if he prove that the requisition for his surrender has in fact been made with a view to try or punish him for an offence of a political character.

Article VII.

A person surrendered can in no case be kept in prison, or be brought to trial in the State to which the surrender has been made, for any other crime or on account of any other matters than those for which the extradition shall have taken place, until he has been restored or had an opportunity of returning to the State by which he has been surrendered.

This stipulation does not apply to crimes committed after the extradition.

Article VIII.

The requisition for extradition shall be made in the following manner:—

Application on behalf of Her Britannic Majesty's Government for the surrender of a fugitive criminal in San Marino shall be made by Her Majesty's Consul for the Republic of San Marino.

Application on behalf of the Republic of San Marino for the surrender of a fugitive criminal in the United Kingdom shall be made either direct by the Captains Regent or by the Consul of the Republic accredited to the British Government in London.

The requisition for the extradition of an accused person must be accompanied by a warrant of arrest issued by the competent authority of the State requiring the extradition, and by such evidence as, according to the laws of the place where the accused is found, would justify his arrest if the crime had been committed there.

If the requisition relates to a person already convicted, it must be accompanied by the sentence of condemnation passed against the convicted person by the competent Court of the State that makes the requisition for extradition.

A sentence passed *in contumaciam* is not to be deemed a conviction, but a person so sentenced may be dealt with as an accused person.

Article IX.

If the requisition for extradition be in accordance with the foregoing stipulations, the competent authorities of the State applied to shall proceed to the arrest of the fugitive.

Article X.

If the fugitive has been arrested in the British dominions, he shall forthwith be brought before a competent Magistrate, who is to examine him and conduct the preliminary investigation of the case, just as if the apprehension had taken place for a crime committed in the British dominions.

In the examinations which they have to make in accordance with the foregoing stipulations, the authorities of the British dominions shall admit as valid evidence the sworn depositions or the affirmations of witnesses taken in San Marino, or copies thereof, and likewise the warrants and sentences issued therein, and certificates of, or judicial documents stating the fact of, a conviction, provided the same are authenticated as follows:—

1. A warrant must purport to be signed by a Judge, Magistrate, or officer of the Republic of San Marino.

2. Depositions or affirmations, or the copies thereof, must purport to be certified under the hand of a Judge, Magistrate, or officer of the Republic of San Marino, to be the original depositions or affirmations, or to be the true copies thereof, as the case may require.

3. A certificate of or judicial document stating the fact of a conviction must purport to be certified by a Judge, Magistrate, or officer of the Republic of San Marino.

4. In every case such warrant, deposition, affirmation, copy, certificate, or judicial document must be authenticated either by the oath of some witness, or by being sealed with the official seal and legalization of the Republic of San Marino; but any other mode of authentication for the time being permitted by the law in that part of the British dominions where the examination is taken may be substituted for the foregoing.

Article XI.

If the fugitive has been arrested in the Republic of San Marino, his surrender shall be granted if, upon examination by a competent authority, it appears that the documents furnished by the British Government contain sufficient *prima facie* evidence to justify the extradition.

The authorities of the Republic shall admit as valid evidence records drawn up by the British authorities of the depositions of witnesses, or copies thereof, and records of conviction or other judicial documents, or copies thereof: Provided that the said documents be signed or authenticated by an authority whose competence shall be certified by the seal of a Minister of State of Her Britannic Majesty.

Article XII.

The extradition shall not take place unless the evidence be found sufficient, according to the laws of the State applied to either to justify the committal of the prisoner for trial, in case the crime had been committed in the territory of the said State, or to prove that the prisoner is the identical person convicted by the Courts of the State which makes the requisition, and that the crime of which he has been convicted is one in respect of which extradition could, at the time of such conviction, have been granted by the State applied to. In Her Britannic Majesty's dominions the fugitive criminal shall not be surrendered until the expiration of fifteen days from the date of his being committed to prison to await his surrender.

Articolo V.

Non sarà accordata la estradizione se dal commesso misfatto, dall'iniziato procedimento, o dalla condanna, si sia avverata la prescrizione dell'azione penale, o della pena, in base alle leggi dello Stato richiesto.

Articolo VI.

Non verrà consegnato il delinquente fuggitivo se il reato per il quale viene chiesta la estradizione è di carattere politico, ovvero se egli prova che la domanda della sua consegna è fatta con l'intendimento di giudicarlo o di punirlo per un reato politico.

Articolo VII.

L'individuo consegnato non potrà in verun caso essere detenuto in prigione o sottoposto a giudizio nello Stato a cui fu consegnato per qualsiasi reato o per altre ragioni diverse da quelle per le quali avvenne la estradizione, fino a tanto che non sia stato liberato o non abbia avuto l'opportunità di ritornere nello Stato da cui fu consegnato.

Ciò non si applica ai reati commessi dopo la estradizione.

Articolo VIII.

Le domande di estradizione saranno fatte come appresso:—

Il Governo di Sua Maestà Britannica farà la sua domanda per la consegna di un delinquente fuggitivo in San Marino per mezzo del Console di Sua Maestà presso la Repubblica di San Marino.

La Repubblica di San Marino farà la sua domanda per la consegna di un delinquente fuggitivo nel Regno Unito o direttamente per mezzo dei Capitani Reggenti, ovvero per mezzo del suo Console accreditato a Londra presso il Governo Britannico.

La domanda di estradizione di un accusato deve essere accompagnata da un mandato di cattura rilasciato da una autorità competente dello Stato richiedente la estradizione, e da tale prova che, secondo le leggi del luogo dove l'accusato è trovato, giustificherebbe il suo arresto se il reato fosse stato qui commesso.

Se la domanda riguarda un individuo già condannato, essa deve essere accompagnata dalla sentenza di condanna della Corte competente dello Stato richiedente la estradizione.

Una sentenza pronunciata in contumacia non può ritenersi come condanna; ma l'individuo così colpito potrà essere trattato come imputato.

Articolo IX.

Se la domanda di estradizione sarà conforme agli anzidetti patti, le autorità competenti dello Stato richiesto procederanno alla cattura del fuggitivo.

Articolo X.

Se il fuggitivo è stato arrestato nei domini Britannici, egli sarà senz'altro tradotto dinanzi al competente Magistrate, il quale lo interrogherà ed eseguirà le indagini preliminari del fatto, nel modo stesso come se la cattura fosse avvenuta per un reato commesso nei domini Britannici.

Le autorità nei domini Britannici negli esami che debbono fare giusta i patti precedenti ammetteranno come prova valida le deposizioni o dichiarazioni testimoniali giurate raccolte in San Marino, o copie di esse, e similmente i mandati e le sentenze ivi emanate ed i certificati o documenti giudiziari attestanti la condanna, purchè siano autenticati come appresso:—

1. Un mandato si deve presupporre firmato da un Giudice, Magistrate, od ufficiale della Repubblica di San Marino.

2. Le deposizioni o dichiarazioni, o le copie di esse, si devono presupporre certificate come originali, o come vere copie, a secondo del caso, da un Giudice, Magistrate, od ufficiale della Repubblica di San Marino.

3. Un certificato o documento giudiziario di condanna si deve presupporre certificato da un Giudice, Magistrate, od ufficiale della Repubblica di San Marino.

4. In ogni caso tale mandato, deposizione, dichiarazione, copia, certificato o documento giudiziario deve essere autenticato sia col giuramento di qualche testimone, o contrassegnato col sigillo ufficiale e con la legalizzazione della Repubblica di San Marino; ma qualsiasi altra forma di autenticazione consentita dalla legge vigente in quella parte dei domini Britannici dove viene eseguito l'esame può essere sostituita alle precedenti.

Articolo XI.

Se il fuggitivo è stato arrestato nella Repubblica di San Marino, la sua consegna sarà accordata se, previo esame condotto da una competente autorità, risulti che i documenti forniti dal Governo Britannico contengono prova sufficiente, prima facie, da giustificare la estradizione.

Le autorità della Repubblica riconosceranno come prova valida i verbali redatti dalle autorità Britanniche delle deposizioni dei testimoni, o copia di essi, ed i verbali di condanna od altri documenti giudiziari, o copie degli stessi, purchè i detti documenti siano firmati ed autenticati da un'autorità la cui competenza sarà certificata mediante il sigillo di un Ministro di Stato di Sua Maestà Britannica.

Articolo XII.

La estradizione non avrà luogo a meno che la prova sia trovata sufficiente, secondo le leggi dello Stato richiesto, a giustificare o il rinvio del detenuto a giudizio, nel caso che il reato fosse stato commesso nel territorio del suddetto Stato, ovvero dimostrare che il catturato è l'identica persona condannata dai Tribunali dello Stato richiedente, e che il reato per il quale è stato condannato sia uno di quelli per quali la estradizione avrebbe potuto, all'epoca di tale condanna, essere accordata dallo Stato richiesto. Nei domini di Sua Maestà Britannica il delinquente fuggitivo non sarà consegnato se non saranno decorsi quindici giorni dal dì della sua incarcerazione in attesa della sua consegna.

Article XIII.

If the individual claimed by one of the two High Contracting Parties, in pursuance of the present Treaty, should be also claimed by one or several other Powers, on account of other crimes or offences committed upon their respective territories, his extradition shall be granted to that State whose demand is earliest in date.

Article XIV.

If sufficient evidence for the extradition be not produced within two months from the date of the apprehension of the fugitive, or within such further time as the State applied to, or the proper Tribunal thereof, shall direct, the fugitive shall be set at liberty.

Article XV.

All articles seized which were in the possession of the person to be surrendered, at the time of his apprehension, shall, if the competent authority of the State applied to for the extradition has ordered the delivery thereof, be given up when the extradition takes place, and the said delivery shall extend not merely to the stolen articles, but to everything that may serve as a proof of the crime.

Article XVI.

The expenses of arresting, maintaining, and transporting the person whose extradition is applied for, as well as those of handing over and transporting the property and articles, which by the preceding Article, must be restored or given up, shall be borne by the two States within the limits of their respective territories.

The expenses of transport or other necessary expenses by sea or through the territories of a third State shall be borne by the demanding State.

Article XVII.

Either of the High Contracting Parties who may wish to have recourse for purposes of extradition to transit through the territory of a third Power shall be bound to arrange the condition of transit with such third Power.

Article XVIII.

When in a criminal case of a non-political character either of the High Contracting Parties should think it necessary to take the evidence of witnesses residing in the dominions of the other, or to obtain any other legal evidence, a "Commission Rogatoire" to that effect shall be sent through the channel indicated in Article VIII., and effect shall be given thereto conformably to the laws in force in the place where the evidence is to be taken.

Article XIX.

The stipulations of the present Treaty shall be applicable to the Colonies and foreign possessions of Her Britannic Majesty, so far as the laws for the time being in force in such Colonies and foreign possessions respectively will allow.

The requisition for the surrender of a fugitive criminal who has taken refuge in any of such Colonies or foreign possessions may be made to the Governor or chief authority of such Colony or possession by any person authorized to act in such Colony or possession as a Consular officer of the Republic of San Marino.

Such requisitions may be disposed of, subject always, as nearly as may be, and so far as the law of such Colony or foreign possession will allow, to the provisions of this Treaty, by the said Governor or chief authority, who, however, shall be at liberty either to grant the surrender or to refer the matter to his Government.

Her Britannic Majesty shall, however, be at liberty to make special arrangements in the British Colonies and foreign possessions for the surrender of criminals from San Marino who may take refuge within such Colonies and foreign possessions, on the basis, as nearly as may be, and so far as the law of such Colony or foreign possession will allow, of the provisions of the present Treaty.

Requisitions for the surrender of a fugitive criminal emanating from any Colony or foreign possession of Her Britannic Majesty shall be governed by the rules laid down in the preceding Articles of the present Treaty.

Article XX.

The present Treaty shall come into force ten days after its publication, in conformity with the forms prescribed by the laws of the High Contracting Parties. It may be terminated by either of the High Contracting Parties at any time on giving to the other six months' notice of its intention to do so.

The Treaty shall be ratified, and the ratifications shall be exchanged at Rome as soon as possible.

In witness whereof the respective Plenipotentiaries have signed the present Treaty in duplicate in English and Italian, and have affixed thereto the seal of their arms.

WHEREAS by the *The Constitution Act* it was amongst other things enacted that it should be lawful for the Governor to fix such places within Victoria, and, subject to the limitation therein contained, such times for holding the first and every other Session of the Council and Assembly, and to vary and alter the same respectively in such manner as he might think fit; and also from time to time to prorogue the said Council and Assembly, and to dissolve the said Assembly, by Proclamation or otherwise, whenever he should deem it expedient: And whereas the said Council and Assembly, called "The Parliament of Victoria," stand prorogued until Tuesday, the 22nd day of May, 1900, and it is expedient further to prorogue the same: Now therefore I, the Lieutenant-Governor of Victoria, in exercise of the power conferred by the said Act, do by this my Proclamation further prorogue the said Parliament of Victoria from Tuesday, the 22nd day of May, 1900, until Tuesday, the 12th day of June, 1900.

Given under my Hand and the Seal of the Colony, at Melbourne, this fifteenth day of May, in the year of our Lord One thousand nine hundred, and in the sixty-third year of Her Majesty's reign.

To His Excellency the Right Honorable Thomas, Baron Brassey, Knight Commander of the Most Honorable Order of the Bath, Governor and Commander-in-Chief in and over the Colony of Victoria and its Dependencies, &c., &c.

THE humble petition of the contributors of The Victorian Neglected Children's Aid Society sheweth—

1. That The Victorian Neglected Children's Aid Society was founded in the year 1894, and has ever since continued and still continues in active existence, carrying out the objects for which it was formed.

2. That the said society was formed for the following purposes:—

- Of receiving neglected and destitute children in the colony of Victoria, or those in danger of becoming so, and of providing for their physical, moral, and spiritual welfare.
- Of employing and paying a person or persons as the agent or agents of the said society, who shall, so far as possible, visit once a year all the children under the care of the said society.
- Of establishing, maintaining, and supporting, in such place or places as the committee or governing body for the time being of the said society may deem most suitable, a receiving home or homes in which neglected and destitute children may be committed to the care of the society or of the said agent or agents, and may be lodged or cared for under the supervision and control of the committee or governing body for the time being of that society, and of providing therein, so far as the funds of the society will allow, skilled nursing and attendance for such children.
- Of having such children committed to the charge of the said society or its said agent or agents, duly empowered in that behalf under the provisions of section 61 of the *Neglected Children's Act 1890*.
- Of transferring neglected and destitute children so committed to the care of the society or its agent or agents as aforesaid to suitable homes in the country or elsewhere.

3. That the pamphlets accompanying this petition set out the names of the office bearers and ladies' committee and council of the said society, and also the fourth annual report and balance-sheet of the said society, and the rules under which the society has hitherto been carried on.

4. That The Victorian Neglected Children's Aid Society is an institution, society, or association established for the relief of destitute persons, and having for its objects the promotion of morality and the prevention of vice within the meaning of the *Hospitals and Charities Act 1890*.

5. That such society is supported by the voluntary contributions of not less than 50 persons, each of whom has paid not less than One pound per annum for the support thereof.

6. That the persons signing this petition are 25 of such contributors.

Every person who shall commit a breach of this by-law shall, for every such breach, be liable to a penalty not exceeding Ten pounds, and not less than Five shillings.

The births of 962 children, viz., 495 boys and 467 girls, were registered in Greater Melbourne during the month of April. The number was the lowest recorded for the month during the previous ten years, except 1898 and 1899, and was, moreover, 224 below the average of the month during that period, or 200 below it if allowance be made for the increase of population.

The deaths recorded in April numbered 518, viz., 296 of males and 222 of females; the births thus exceeded the deaths by 444, or 86 per cent., as against 71 per cent. in April, 1899, and 83 per cent. according to the average. The number was, it will be noticed, 39 smaller than in April, 1899, and the lowest recorded for the month during the previous ten years except in 1897; it was also 131 below the average of April during the last ten years, or 151 below it allowing for the increase of population.

To every 1,000 of the population of the district the proportion of births registered was equivalent to 24.49 and of deaths registered to 13.19 per annum, as compared with averages of the same month in 1899 of 24.70 and 14.42 respectively, and during the last ten years of 30.41 and 17.02 respectively, and averages of the whole year of 31.27 and 16.80.

The highest temperature in the shade recorded at Melbourne Observatory during the month was 74.0° on the 8th, and the lowest was 39.6° on the 16th. The mean temperature of the month (54.6°) was 4.1° below the average. The greatest range of the thermometer in any one day (23.0°) took place on the 8th, and the least range (2.3°) on the 24th. The mean daily range was 12.4°. The highest atmospheric pressure recorded was 30.298 inches on the 25th, and the lowest was 29.491 inches on the 14th. The mean atmospheric pressure (29.969 inches) was slightly below the average.

Rain fell on nineteen days, the amount being 4.97 inches, which was higher than in any corresponding month during the previous ten years, except April, 1892, and 2.58 inches above the average during that period.

Fog occurred on one day during the month.

The mean humidity of the month was .836.

Males contributed 57 per cent. and females 43 per cent. to the mortality of the month. Children under five years of age contributed 24 per cent. to that mortality, as against 30 per cent. in April, 1899; 40 per cent. in April, 1898; 31 per cent. in April, 1897; 32 per cent. in April, 1896; 31 per cent. in April, 1895; and 34 per cent. in April, 1894.

The deaths of infants under twelve months numbered 93, as compared with 125 in April, 1899. The rate of infantile mortality was only 97 per 1,000 births, registered in the month under review, as compared with 131 in April, 1899; 171 in April, 1898; 107 in April, 1897; 108 in April, 1896; 107 in April, 1895; 129 in April, 1894; 145 in April, 1893; 140 in April, 1892; 154 in April, 1891; and 155 in April, 1890.

Forty-eight persons—as against 45 in April, 1899—whose deaths were recorded during the month had attained or passed the age of 75 years. Of these, a gentleman, aged 75, died of cancer; a female, aged 75, of hemiplegia; a gentleman and a secretary,

each aged 75, of heart disease; a plumber, aged 75, of emphysema; two females, each aged 75, of pneumonia and gastritis, respectively; a farmer, aged 75, of Bright's disease; a male, of no occupation, aged 76, of syncope; two females, each aged 76, of heart disease and ulceration of intestines, respectively; a butcher, aged 77, of pulmonary tuberculosis; a carrier, aged 77, of pericarditis; a gentleman, aged 78, of apoplexy; a female, aged 78, of dilatation of the heart; a gentleman, aged 78, of heart disease; a female, aged 79, of cancer; a gentleman, aged 79, of paralysis; a male of no occupation, aged 79, of insanity; a labourer, aged 79, of bronchitis; a coal merchant, aged 79, of pneumonia; a gentleman and a minor, each aged 79, of disease of prostate; a sailor, aged 80, of dysentery; a male, of occupation unknown, aged 80, of phthisis; a seamstress, aged 80, of paralysis; a male, of no occupation, aged 80, of syncope; two females, each aged 80, of gastric catarrh and enteritis, respectively; a pensioner, aged 82, of heart disease; a female, aged 84, of bronchitis; a farmer, aged 86, of heart disease; a laundress, aged 89, of paralysis; a female, aged 95, of diarrhoea; another, aged 98, of bronchitis; a grocer, aged 75, a painter, aged 76, a school-master, aged 77, three females, aged 80, 80, and 81, respectively, a baker, aged 82, a draper, aged 84, a female, aged 90, a gentleman, aged 92, a labourer, aged 93, a female, aged 97, and a gold miner, aged 99, of old age.

Thirty of the deaths recorded during the month—as compared with 40 in April, 1899—were from external causes, of which 25 were set down to accident, and 5 to suicide. The following are the particulars of the accidental deaths:—A boy, aged 4, was passed over by a railway train; a labourer, aged 19, was killed by a horse falling and rolling on him; a clerk, aged 41, by a fall from a horse; a plumber's apprentice, aged 17, died of injuries received in a lift accident; a saddler, aged 31, and a labourer, aged 55, of fracture of the skull, the result in each case by a fall down stairs; an inspector, aged 64, of injury to the head, consequent on a fall; a quarryman, aged 49, was killed by an explosion of gunpowder; two female children, aged 1 and 2 years, respectively, died of scalds; two females, aged 37 and 53, respectively, of burns; two boys, aged 9 and 11, respectively, were drowned in the River Yarra, whilst bathing; a boy, aged 8, and a labourer, aged 45, by falling into the River Yarra; a seaman, aged 23, in Coode's canal; four persons were found drowned, viz., a seaman, aged 50, a grocer, aged 53, and a wood turner, aged 64, in the River Yarra; and a fireman, aged 39, in Hobson's Bay; a male infant, aged 6 weeks, was overlain; a hotel boots, aged 20, was suffocated from the inhalation of coal gas; a market gardener, aged 54, when under the influence of opium; and a female infant, aged 3 weeks, not sufficient evidence to show how caused. The suicidal deaths were those of a gentleman, aged 28, who poisoned himself; a female, aged 68, who drowned herself; two females, aged 35 and 74, respectively, who hanged themselves; a wool-roller, aged 40, who suffocated himself with charcoal fumes.

One hundred and twenty-nine deaths, or 25 per cent. of the whole, took place in public institutions, viz.:—59 in the Melbourne, 17 in the Alfred, 3 in the Women's, 6 in the Children's, 8 in the Homoeopathic, and 5 in the Austin Hospitals; 6 in the Metropolitan and 9 in the Yarra Bend Lunatic Asylums; 9 in the Immigrants' Home; 3 in the Benevolent Asylum; 3 in the Convent of the Little Sisters of the Poor; and 1 in the Melbourne Gaol.

The deaths of children under five years of age numbered 124, of which 72, or 58 per cent., were of males, and 52, or 42 per cent., were of females. Of those who died, 93 were under one year of age, 21 were between one and two, 3 were between two and three, 4 were between three and four, and 3 were between four and five.

The persons who died at a more advanced age than five years numbered 394. Of these 224, or 57 per cent., were males, and 170, or 43 per cent., were females; 17 were between five and ten, 8 were between ten and fifteen, 14 were between fifteen and twenty, 15 were between twenty and twenty-five, 27 were between twenty-five and thirty, 30 were between thirty and thirty-five, 32 were between thirty-five and forty, 29 were between forty and forty-five, 30 were between forty-five and fifty, 23 were between fifty and fifty-five, 31 were between fifty-five and sixty, 31 were between sixty and sixty-five, 31 were between sixty-five and seventy, 28 were between seventy and seventy-five, 26 were between seventy-five and eighty, 13 were between eighty and eighty-five, 2 were between eighty-five and ninety, 3 were between ninety and ninety-five, and 4 between ninety-five and a hundred.

As compared with the corresponding month of the previous year, there was little variation in the mortality under the various classes of diseases. From parasitic and from ill-defined diseases an equal number of deaths was recorded at each period, whilst those from constitutional and developmental diseases showed increases of only 1 and 3 respectively; but there was a reduction of 20 in deaths from zymotic diseases, chiefly made up of a decrease of 12 under whooping cough, of 7 under typhoid fever, and of 5 each under influenza and diarrhoea, less an increase of 8 under diphtheria, and one of 11 in those from local diseases, chiefly accounted for by a falling off of 34 under diseases of the digestive system (especially enteritis) less an increase of 20 under those of the nervous system; deaths from violence and from dietic diseases also showed decreases of 10 and 2 respectively.

The following is a statement of the deaths set down to diphtheria and typhoid fever in each month of the years 1890 to 1899, and the first four months of 1900, from which may be traced the rise and fall of the mortality at various periods of the year. It will be noticed that the mortality from typhoid fever usually attains its maximum in March, and is at a minimum from July to November. It will also be noticed that the mortality from both causes during the month was much below the average.

VITAL STATISTICS.

RETURN OF THE BIRTHS AND DEATHS REGISTERED IN BALLARAT AND SUBURBS DURING THE MONTH OF APRIL, 1900.

THE births of 62 boys and 65 girls, or in all of 117 children, were registered in Ballarat and Sebastopol during the month of April. Of these 48 occurred in Ballarat East, 65 in Ballarat West, 2 in Sebastopol, and 2 in the outlying districts; included were 7 illegitimate births and 2 cases of twins. In the previous month the births numbered 100, viz., 54 of boys and 46 of girls.

The deaths registered in April numbered 89, viz., 60 of males and 29 of females. The births thus exceeded the deaths by 28. In March, the recorded deaths numbered 81; in April, 1899, they numbered 67; in April, 1898, they numbered 96; in April, 1897, they numbered 56; in April, 1896, they numbered 71; in April, 1895, they numbered 62; in April, 1894, they numbered 76; in April, 1893, they numbered 81; in April, 1892, they numbered 82; in April, 1891, they numbered 74; and in April, 1890, they numbered 90.

The following table shows the deaths which took place in Ballarat East, Ballarat West, Sebastopol, and the Suburban Districts, distinguishing also the sexes and persons under and over five years of age:—

The mortality during the month was much above the average. As compared with the corresponding month of the preceding year, deaths from cancer rose from 1 to 5; those from phthisis from 3 to 13; those from old age from 1 to 5; and those from diseases of the digestive system from 10 to 18. On the other hand, deaths from typhoid fever fell from 6 to 2; those from diarrhoeal diseases from 3 to 1; and those from diseases of parturition from 3 to 1.

Regulations for the care, protection, and management of a Reserve for Public Recreation in the Borough of Stawell.

THE Council of the Borough of Stawell, the duly appointed Committee of Management of the Reserve for Public Recreation in section 24, Borough of Stawell, having framed the following regulations for the care, protection, and management thereof, and for the preservation of good order and decency therein, and also for the collection and receipt of tolls, entrance fees, or other charges for entering therein or thereupon, submit the said regulations to the Board of Land and Works, to be made by such Board in pursuance of the powers conferred by section 137 of the *Land Act 1890*:—

REGULATIONS.

All previous resolutions are hereby repealed.
 1. The reserve shall be open to the public free of charge from sunrise to sunset, except on such days (not exceeding fifty in any one year) as the reserve may be set apart for fêtes, sports, or shows, on any of which occasions a sum not exceeding One shilling (1s.) may be charged and taken for the admission of every adult to the reserve.

2. No person shall enter or remain in the reserve who may offend against decency as regards dress, language, or conduct; and no society, club, picnic party, or other combined body shall be allowed to use the reserve without the written consent of the committee of management.

3. No person shall climb or jump over the fences or gates, stick bills thereon, cut names on the fences, trees, or seats, or in any way damage any of the buildings, gates, fences, or other property in or around the reserve, or leave or roll stones therein, or pollute any water in the reserve, or remove therefrom any soil, sand, or manure.

4. No person shall interfere with the trees, shrubs, or other property in the reserve, or throw stones or other missiles, or commit any nuisance therein, or leave therein any bottles, orange peel, paper, cast-off clothing, or any litter.

5. No person shall erect any booth or other structure in the reserve, or hawk or offer for sale therein any goods or articles of any description, without having first obtained the written permission of the committee of management; and no person shall light any fires in the reserve without the special permission in writing of the committee of management.
