LETTERS PATENT PASSED UNDER THE GREAT SEAL OF THE UNITED KINGDOM CON- Letters Patent, STITUTING THE OFFICE OF GOVERNOR OF THE STATE OF VICTORIA AND ITS DEPENDENCIES IN THE COMMONWEALTH OF AUSTRALIA.

VICTORIA, by the Grace of God of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland Queen, Defender of the Faith, Empress of India: To all to whom these Presents shall come, Greeting.

WHEREAS, by certain Letters Patent, under the Great Seal of Our United Kingdom Preamble, of Great Britain and Ireland, bearing date at Westminster the Twenty-first day of February, 1879, We did constitute the Office of Governor and Commander-in-Chief in and over Our Colony of Victoria as therein described, and its Dependencies: And whereas, in virtue of the provisions of the Commonwealth of Australia cies: And whereas, in virtue of the provisions of the Commonwealth of Constitution Act 1900, and of our Proclamation issued thereunder, by and with the Recites Imperial Act advice of Our Privy Council on the Seventeenth day of September, 1900, We have by 63 &64 Vict., c. - 12 Proclamation of Council of Council of Our United Kingdom of Great Britain 12 Proclamation of Council of Coun certain Letters Patent under the said Great Seal of Our United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, bearing even date herewith, made provision for the Office of Governor-General and Commander-in-Chief in and over Our Commonwealth of Australia: And whereas it has become necessary to make permanent provision for the Office of Governor in and over Our State of Victoria and its Dependencies in the Commonwealth of Australia, without making new Letters Patent on each demise of the said Office. Now know ye that We do by these presents revoke and determine the said first-recited Letters Revocation of Patent of the Twenty-first day of February, 1879, and everything therein contained, from and after the proclamation of these Our Letters Patent as hereinafter provided: And further know ye that We do by these presents constitute, order, and declare that there shall be a Governor in and over Our State of Victoria (comprising the territories bounded on the west by Our State of South Australia, on the south by the sea, and on the cast and Boundaries. north by a straight line drawn from Cape Howe to the nearest source of the River Murray, and thence by the course of that river to the Eastern Boundary of Our State of South Australia) and its Dependencies in the Commonwealth of Australia (which said State of Victoria and its Dependencies are hereinafter called the State), and that appointments to the said Office shall be made by Commission under Our Sign Manual and Signet.

II. We do hereby authorize, empower, and command Our said Governor to do and Governor's powers and the below to his said Office according to the tenor of these Our and authorities. execute all things that belong to his said Office, according to the tenor of these Our Letters Patent and of such Commission as may be issued to him under our Sign Manual and Signet, and according to such Instructions as may from time to time be given to him under Our Sign Manual and Signet, or by Our Order in Our Privy Council, or by Us, through one of Our Principal Secretaries of State, and to such Laws as are now or shall hereafter be in force in the State.

Every person appointed to fill the office of Governor shall with all due solemnity, before entering on any of the duties of his Office, cause the Commission appointing him to be Governor to be read and published at the seat of Government, in the presence of the Chief Justice, or some other Judge of the Supreme Court of the State, and of the Members of the Executive Council thereof, which being done, he shall then and there take before them the Oath of Allegiance, in the form provided by an Act Oath to be taken by . passed in the Session holden in the Thirty-first and Thirty-second years of Our Reign, intituled an Act to Amend the Law relating to Promissory Oatlis; and likewise the usual Oath for the due execution of the Office of Governor, and for the due and impartial administration of justice: which Oaths the said Chief Justice or Judge is

V. The Governor shall keep and use the Public Scal of the State for scaling all things whatsoever that shall pass the said Public Seal: and until a Public Seal shall be provided for the State the Public Seal formerly used in Our Colony of Victoria shall be

VI. There shall be an Executive Council for the State, and the said Council shall consist of such persons as were, immediately before the coming into force of these Our Letters Patent, Members of the Executive Council of Victoria, or as may at any time be Members of the Executive Council for Our said State in accordance with any Law enacted by the Legislature of the State, and of such other persons as the Governor shall, from time to time, in Our name and on Our behalf, but subject to any Law as aforesaid, appoint under the Public Seal of the State to be Members of Our said Executive Conneil for the State.

VII. The Governor, in Our name and on Our hehalf, may make and execute, under the said Public Seal, grants and dispositions of any land which may be lawfully granted

and disposed of by Us within the State.

VIII. The Governor may constitute and appoint, in Our name and on Our behalf, all such Judges, Commissioners, Justices of the Peace, and other necessary Officers and Ministers of the State as may be lawfully constituted or appointed by Us.

IX. When any crime or offence has been committed within the State against the laws of the State, or for which the offender may be tried therein, the Governor may as he shall see occasion, in Our name and on Our behalf, grant a pardon to any accomplice in such crime or offence who shall give such information as shall lead to the conviction of the principal offender, or of any one of such offenders if more than one; and further, may grant to any offender convicted in any Court of the State, or before any Judge or other Magistrate of the State, within the State, a pardon, either free or subject to lawful conditions, or any remission of the sentence passed on such offender, or any respite of the execution of such sentence for such period as the Governor thinks fit; and further may remit any fines, penaltics, or forfeitures due or accrued to Us: Provided always that the Governor shall in no case, except where the offence has been of a political nature unaccompanied by any other grave crime, make it a condition of any pardon or remission

of sentence that the offender shall absent himself or be removed from the State. X. The Governor may, so far as We Ourselves lawfully may, upon sufficient cause to him appearing, remove from his office, or suspend from the exercise of the same, any person exercising any office or place under the State, under or by virtue of any Commission or Warrant granted, or which may be granted, by Us, in Our name, or under Our

XI. The Governor may exercise all powers lawfully belonging to Us in respect of the summoning, proroguing, or dissolving any Legislative Body, which now is or hereafter may be established within Our said State.

XII. In the event of the death, incapacity, or removal of the Governor, or of his departure from the State, Our Lieutenant-Governor, or, if there be no such officer in the State, then such person or persons as We may appoint, under Our Sign Manual and Signet, shall during Our pleasure, administer the Government of the State, first taking the Onths hereinbefore directed to be taken by the Governor, and in the manner herein prescribed; which being done, We do hereby authorize, empower, and command our Lieutenant-Governor, and every other such Administrator as aforesaid, to do and execute during Our pleasure all things that belong to the Office of Governor according to the tenor of these Our Letters Patent, and according to Our Instructions as aforesaid, and the Laws of the State.

XIII. In the event of the Governor having occasion to be temporarily absent for a short period from the Seat of Government or from the State, he may in every such ease, by an Instrument under the Public Scal of the State, constitute and appoint Our Lieutenant-Governor, or, if there be no such Officer, or if such Officer be absent or unable to act, then any other person to be his Deputy during such temporary absence, and in that capacity to exercise, perform, and execute for and on behalf of the Governor during such absence, but no longer, all such powers and authorities vested in the Governor, by these Our Letters Patent, as shall in and by such Instrument be specified and limited, but no others. Provided, nevertheless, that by the appointment of a Deputy as aforesaid, the power and authority of the Governor shall not be abridged, altered, or in any way affected, otherwise than We may at any time hereafter think proper to direct.

XV. And We do hereby reserve to Ourselves, Our heirs and Successors, full Power reserved to power and authority from time to time to revoke, alter, or amend these our Letters Patent as to Us or Them shall seem meet.

XVI. And We do direct and enjoin that these Our Letters Patent shall be read and proclaimed at such place or places within Our said State as the Governor shall think fit.

One hundred and thirty-nine deaths, or 26 per cent. of the whole, took place in public institutions, viz.:—62 in the Melbourne, 15 in the Alfred, 3 in St. Vincent's, 4 in the Women's, 13 in the Children's, 5 in the Homosopathic, and 6 in the Austin Hospitals; 7 in the Metropolitan and 4 in the Yarra Bend Lunatic Asylums; 6 in the Immigrants' Home; 9 in the Benevlent Asylum; 2 in the Convent of the Little Sisters of the Poor; 1 in the Protestant Refuge; 1 in the Eye and Ear Hospital; and 1

The deaths of children under five years of age numbered 121, of which 65, or 54 per cent., were of males, and 56, or 46 per cent., were of females. Of those who died, 85 were under one year of age, 22 were between one and two, 3 were between two and three, 7 were between three and four, and 4 were between four and five.

The persons who died at a more advanced age than five years numbered 404. Of these 229, or 57 per cent., were males, and 175, or 43 per cent., were females; 13 were between five and ten, 9 were between ten and fifteen. 11 were between fifteen and twenty, 15 were between twenty and twenty-five, 17 were between twenty-five and thirty, 26 were between thirty and thirty-five, 6fty and fifty-five, 26 were between fifty-five and sixty, 26 were between the between forty-five and fifty, 18 were between 47 were between seventy and seventy-five, 25 were between seventy-five and eighty, 19 were between sixty-five and seventy, between eighty-five, 26 were between ninety and ninety-five, and 1 at ninety-nine.

As compared with the corresponding month of the preceding year, there was an increase of 5 deaths under dietic, 3 under constitutional, and 4 under developmental diseases; whilst there was a decrease of 25 under zymotic, 64 under local diseases, 8 under the head of violence, and 3 under ill-defined causes. Under the zymotic class, deaths from measles fell from 23 to nil, those from typhoid fever from 5 to 1, and those from disrrhoad diseases from 12 to 4. Whooping-cough still continues to cause a bigh nortality, 16 deaths therefrom having been recorded in the month, as against 17 in October, 14 in September, 3 in August, and 13 in July, whilst those from cancer fell from 37 to 25, and those from other forms of tuberculosis, &c., from 15 to 7. Under the local class, deaths from diseases of the nervous system increased by 6, those from diseases of the circulatory system by 4, those from diseases of the uninary system by 7, and those from diseases of the diseases of the respiratory system (chiefly pneumonia) diminished by 37, and those from diseases of the digestive system (chiefly enteritis) by 43. The favorable mortality of the month was thus due chiefly to the low fatality from epidemic diseases, diarrhoad diseases (including emeritis), and diseases of the respiratory organs.

The following is a statement of the deaths set down to diphtheria and typhoid fever in each month of the years 1890 to 1900, and the first cloven months of 1901, from which may be traced the rise and fall of the mortality at various periods of the year. It will be noticed that the mortality from typhoid fever usually attains its maximum in March, and is at a minimum from July to November. It will also be neticed that the mortality from typhoid fever during the month was very low.
