*Meat Supervision Act 1900.***REGULATIONS FOR THE BRANDING OF CARCASSES OR MEAT.**

BY virtue of the powers conferred by the *Meat Supervision Act 1900* and all other powers it enabling in that behalf, the Board of Public Health of the State of Victoria, in the Commonwealth of Australia, doth hereby make the Regulations following, that is to say:—

REGULATIONS.

Carcasses or meat, whether fresh, frozen, dried, preserved, or chilled, shall be branded with a brand which in the case of the whole of the animal having been examined prior to the branding, shall be in the form of a circle, and in the case of only a part of the animal having been examined prior to the branding, shall be in the form of a triangle, the circle having a diameter of one inch and a quarter, the triangle having sides each one inch and a quarter long, the outline of the circle and that of the triangle being represented by fifteen points evenly distributed and enclosing Roman capital letters not less than three-sixteenths of an inch in height, and arranged in two parallel lines, the first or the first two letters forming the upper line, and the rest forming the lower line, the letters being as follows, and in each case in the order hereunder given, viz:—

In the case of the carcass or meat being branded under direction of the Board—B P H.

And in the case of the carcass or meat being branded by or under the direction of a meat inspector of the Council of—

The branding shall leave a distinctly seared and legible mark on the carcass or meat, showing the circle or the triangle, as the case may be, the points, and the letters.

The brand shall be applied to the following parts, viz:—

A. In the case of beef, on the upper surface of the tongue, and on each side of the carcass—

- (1) On the outside of the buttock;
- (2) On the flank;
- (3) On the outside of the ribs; and
- (4) On the inside of the ribs near the backbone.

B. In the case of veal if the carcass has been flayed then on each side of the carcass—

- (1) On the outside of the buttock;
- (2) On the flank; and
- (3) On the outside of the ribs or on the inside of the ribs near the backbone.

C. In the case of mutton and lamb—on the shoulders and legs.

D. In the case of pork—on each side of the carcass, on the cheek, the hand, the loin, and the leg.

E. In the case of a non-flayed carcass taken to an appointed place—on the breast and the leg.
