NOTICE UNDER VOTING BY POST ACT 1900.

ELECTORAL DISTRICTS OF BOGONG AND MELBOURNE EAST.

A N Election of a Member of the Legislative Assembly is about to be held in each of the above-mentioned Electoral Districts, and any Elector thereof who appears from the rolls to reside at least five miles from the nearest polling booth at which he is entitled to vote, or who has reason to believe that on the polling day he will not be within five miles of the nearest polling booth at which he is entitled to vote, or that on account of ill-health or infirmity he will be prevented from voting personally thereat, who desires to vote through the post office at such Election may on posting an application to the Returning Officer obtain a Postal Ballot-paper enabling him to vote through the post at such Election.

Printed forms of application may be obtained at any post office, or the application may be in writing. If applicant is the holder of an elector's right, such right must be attached to his application. No postage is payable thereon.

Any Elector who intends to vote through the post must apply at once, as no Postal Ballot-paper will be supplied unless the Returning Officer receives application therefor sufficiently early to admit of Postal Ballot-paper being sent to and returned by such Elector so as to reach the Returning Officer before closing of Poll.

Caution.—Any person wilfully making a false statement in an application is liable on conviction to two years' imprisonment.

NOTICE.

If any such elector informs such Officer, in writing, that he has received a Postal Ballot-paper, and for the above-named reason requests him to witness his signature and post the paper, the Officer will visit him for the purpose.
