PROCLAMATION

By His Excellency the Honorable Sir John Madden, Knight Commander of the Most Distinguished Order of Saint Michael and Saint George, Lieutenant-Governor of the State of Victoria and its Dependencies in the Commonwealth of Australia.

IN pursuance of the provisions contained in Part III. of the *Banks and Currency Act 1890* (54 Vict. No. 1164), and in the *Public and Bank Holidays Act 1897* (61 Vict. No. 1534), I, the Lieutenant-Governor of the State of Victoria in the Commonwealth of Australia, do by this my Proclamation appoint

WEDNESDAY, THE 26TH DAY OF JUNE INSTANT, to be observed as Bank Half-Holidays, from the hour of Twelve o'clock noon, at Lilydale and Stawell.

Given under my Hand and the Seal of the State of Victoria aforesaid, at Melbourne, this seventeenth day of June, in the year of our Lord One thousand nine hundred and one, and in the first year of His Majesty's reign.

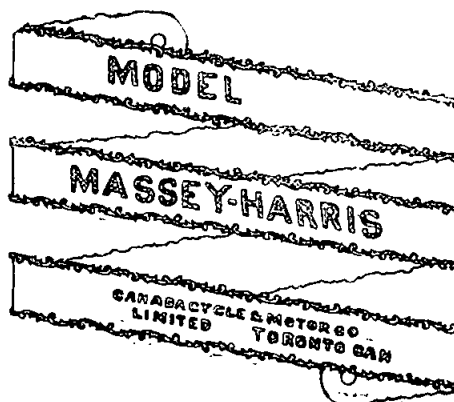

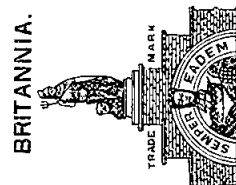

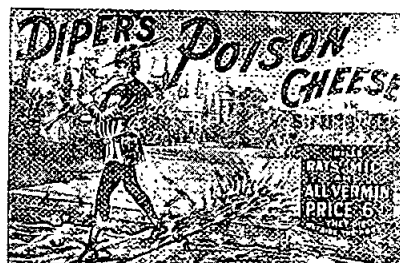

**MYSTIC PARK PUBLIC CEMETERY RULES AND
REGULATIONS.**

IN pursuance of the powers conferred by the *Cemeteries Act 1890*, the Trustees of the Mystic Park Public Cemetery make the following Rules and Regulations (that is to say):—

1. These rules and regulations shall come into force immediately after their publication in the *Government Gazette*, and from and after such publication all rules and regulations heretofore made shall be and are hereby rescinded.
2. The office of the Trust shall be open daily (Sunday, Christmas Day, and Good Friday excepted) from Ten a.m. to Four p.m.
3. All fees and charges shall be paid when applications are made or orders are given.
4. Any person desiring ground for a private grave shall apply to the Trustees therefor, who, if the application is approved and the prescribed fees are paid, will issue a burial right (Schedule B) which shall give the holder and his representatives the exclusive right of burial or interment in the portion of ground allotted thereby as a family or private burial place, and the right on obtaining the permission of the Trustees, as hereafter mentioned, to erect and maintain any monument, cenotaph, tablet, or other erection therein.
5. Any person desiring to construct a vault, grave, tombstone, or other erection shall apply to the Trustees for permission to do so, and submit a plan or drawing with a copy of any proposed inscription or epitaph, and no such erection shall be made without the written approval of the Trustees.
6. No interment shall be permitted until an application has been made, the particulars required in the form Schedule A given, an order obtained, and a certificate from a coroner, justice of the peace, or registrar of deaths has been delivered to the secretary (gatekeeper or sexton).
7. Application for an order for interment shall be made at least eight working hours before the time fixed for the burial.
8. No coffin shall be buried within 4 feet of the ordinary level of the ground unless it contains the body of a child under twelve years, when it shall be not less than 3 feet below that level, and a layer of earth at least 1 foot thick shall be left undisturbed above and around any coffin previously buried in the same grave.
9. The hours for burials shall be:—On week days (September to April inclusive), Ten a.m. to Six p.m.; May to August inclusive, Ten a.m. to Four p.m.; on Sundays throughout the year, from Eight to Ten a.m. or from Two to Five p.m.
10. No re-interment or removal from another cemetery or another grave will be permitted until there be submitted a certified copy of the original certificate of the coroner, justices of the peace, or registrar of deaths, and the licence for disinterment of the Minister of the Crown authorized in that behalf.
11. The Trustees will cause all ordinary graves to be dug; but any person having paid the fee for a private grave, and requiring a brick grave or vault, shall be permitted to construct the same, subject to the approval of the Trustees; but every coffin placed therein shall be bricked in, cemented, and covered by a slab of stone, slate, or iron, securely cemented.
12. No private grave shall be re-opened or any interment permitted therein without the consent, in writing, of the person entitled to give the same.

13. No person employed by the Trustees shall accept any gratuity whatever in the discharge of his duty, nor shall he be allowed to be pecuniarily interested in any work in the cemetery other than that for which he receives payment or for which he has special authority from the Trustees.

14. The cemetery shall, unless otherwise ordered, be open to the public from Seven a.m. to sunset daily throughout the year.

15. No person shall be permitted to pluck any flower, or take any tree, shrub, or plant from the cemetery, unless with the previous authority of the Trustees.

16. No smoking shall be allowed nor any firearms discharged within the cemetery.

17. No dogs shall be allowed within the cemetery.

VACCINATION DISTRICTS CONSTITUTED.

PROCLAMATION

By His Excellency the Honorable Sir John Madden, Knight Commander of the Most Distinguished Order of Saint Michael and Saint George, Lieutenant-Governor of the State of Victoria and its Dependencies in the Commonwealth of Australia.

WHEREAS by the Health Act 1890 (54 Vict., No. 1098) it is amongst other things enacted that the Governor in Council may, by proclamation in the Government Gazette, divide Victoria into districts for the purpose of affording facilities for vaccination, and may, from time to time, vary or revoke such proclamation, and establish other districts for the purpose aforesaid: Now, therefore, I, the Lieutenant-Governor of the State of Victoria in the Commonwealth of Australia, with the advice of the Executive Council of the said State, do, by this Proclamation, divide Victoria into seven Vaccination Districts, as respectively described hereunder, namely:—

THE METROPOLITAN VACCINATION DISTRICT, which shall consist of the municipal districts of Boromandara, Braybrook, Brighton, Broadmeadows, Brunswick, Bulla, Caulfield, Coburg, Collingwood, Dandenong, Doncaster, Eltham, Epping, Essendon, Fern Tree Gully, Fitzroy, Flemington and Kensington, Footscray, Hawthorn, Healesville, Heidelberg, Kailor, Kew, Lilydale, Malvern, Melbourne, Merriang, Moorabbin, Mulgrave, Northcote, North Melbourne, Nunawading, Oakleigh, Port Melbourne, Prahran, Preston, Richmond, St. Kilda, South Melbourne, Templestowe, Upper Yarra, Whittlesea, Williamstown, and Wyndham.

THE MIDLAND VACCINATION DISTRICT, which shall consist of the municipal districts of Alexandra, Bacchus Marsh, Ballan, Broadford, Castlemaine, Chewton, Daylesford, Gisborne, Glenlyon, Goulburn, Howqua, Kilmore, Kyneton, Lancefield, Maldon, Malmsbury, Mansfield, Melton, Metcalfe, Mount Alexander, Mount Franklin, Melvor, Newham United, Newstead, Pymlyon, Romsey, Seymour, Springfield, and Yea.

THE NORTHERN VACCINATION DISTRICT, which shall consist of the municipal districts of Bendigo, Deakin, Eaglehawk, East Loddon, Echuca (borough), Echuca (shire), Huntly, Marong, Numurkah, Raywood, Rodney, Shepparton, Strathfeldsaye, Tungamah, Waranga, and Yarrowonga.

THE NORTH-EASTERN VACCINATION DISTRICT, which shall consist of the municipal districts of Beechworth, Bonalla, Bright, Chiltern, Euroa, North Ovens, Omeo, Oxley, Rutherglen (borough), Rutherglen (shire), Towong, Violet Town, Wangaratta, Wodonga, and Yackandandah.

WHEREAS by Part I. of the *Chinese Act 1890* (54 Vict. No. 1073) it is amongst other things enacted that it shall be lawful for the Governor in Council from time to time, by Proclamation to be published in the *Government Gazette*, to exempt any person or class of persons from the provisions of the said Part of the said Act, and to declare that such provisions shall not at any time, or for any specified period, apply to the person or class of persons mentioned in such Proclamation: Now therefore I, the Lieutenant-Governor of the State of Victoria in the Commonwealth of Australia, by and with the advice of the Executive Council of the said State, do by this Proclamation exempt the Chinese named in the first column of the Schedule hereto subjoined from the provisions of Part I. of the *Chinese Act 1890* aforesaid, from the date hereof, for the periods specified opposite their respective names in the fourth column of the said Schedule, that is to say:—

PROCLAMATION

By His Excellency the Honorable Sir John Madden, Knight Commander of the Most Distinguished Order of Saint Michael and Saint George, Lieutenant-Governor of the State of Victoria and its Dependencies in the Commonwealth of Australia.

WHEREAS by the *Fisheries Act 1890* (54 Vict. No. 1093) it is amongst other things enacted that the Governor in Council may from time to time make Proclamations which shall have force and effect only in any waters or places specified therein for all or any of the purposes mentioned in section 38 of the said Act; and that every Proclamation under the said Act shall be published in the *Government Gazette*, and may be explained, varied, revoked, annulled, or superseded by any other Proclamation under the said Act: Now therefore I, the Lieutenant-Governor of the State of Victoria in the Commonwealth of Australia, with the advice of the Executive Council of the said State, do hereby revoke the Proclamation dated the 20th day of July, 1897, prohibiting fishing in North Arm or Limeburners' Bay, and do by this Proclamation prohibit the use of trammels, trawls, and other nets or fixed engines in North Arm or Limeburners' Bay, from the 1st January to the 31st December inclusive in each year, in the waters contained within a line between two posts marking the mouth of Hovell's Creek, and a line bearing east from a post fixed on the North Shore to a post fixed on Austin's Baths.

By His Excellency the Honorable Sir John Madden, Knight Commander of the Most Distinguished Order of Saint Michael and Saint George, Lieutenant-Governor of the State of Victoria and its Dependencies in the Commonwealth of Australia.

WHEREAS by the *Fisheries Act 1890* (54 Vict. No. 1093) it is amongst other things enacted that the Governor in Council, from time to time by Proclamation to be published in the *Government Gazette*, may for any species of fish prescribe a "close season" or "close seasons" in every year, and that every Proclamation under the said Act may be explained, varied, revoked, annulled, or superseded by any other Proclamation under the said Act: Now therefore I, the Lieutenant-Governor of the State of Victoria in the Commonwealth of Australia, with the advice of the Executive Council of the said State, do by this Proclamation revoke that part of the Proclamation dated the 4th day of April, 1893, which prohibits fishing in the Baala Creek for a distance up-stream of about 40 chains from the crest of the Numurkah Weir to where the Water Trust fence crosses the said creek.

Given under my Hand and the Seal of the State of Victoria, at Melbourne, this seventeenth day of June, in the year of our Lord One thousand nine hundred and one, and in the first year of His Majesty's reign.

The births of 1,069 children, viz., 574 boys and 495 girls, were registered in Greater Melbourne during the month of May. The number was, it will be observed, 17 more than in May, 1900, and 60 more than in May, 1896, but lower than that recorded for the month in any other of the last eleven years, and 173 below the average of the month during the previous ten years, or 242 below it if allowance be made for the increase of population.

The deaths recorded in May numbered 621, viz., 320 of males and 301 of females; the births thus exceeded the deaths by 448, or 72 per cent., as against 113 per cent. in May, 1900, and 119 per cent. according to the average. The number was, it will be noticed, 127 more than in May, 1900, and the highest recorded for the month in any other of the last eleven years, except 1891 and 1898; it was also 52 above the average of May during the last ten years, and 21 above it if allowance be made for the increase of population.

To every 1,000 of the population of the district the proportion of births registered was equivalent to 25.48, and of deaths registered to 14.80 per annum, as compared with averages of the same month in 1900 of 25.22 and 12.17 respectively, and during the last ten years of 31.37 and 14.42 respectively, and averages of the whole year of 29.74 and 16.16.

The highest temperature in the shade recorded at Melbourne Observatory during the month was 73.0° on the 3rd, and the lowest was 36.9° on the 30th. The mean temperature of the month (55.0°) was one and four-fifths of a degree above the average. The greatest range of the thermometer in any one day (28.0°) took place on the 1st, and the least range (4.2°) on the 20th. The mean daily range was 14.5°. The highest atmospheric pressure recorded was 30.412 inches on the 1st, and the lowest was 29.710 inches on the 9th. The mean atmospheric pressure (30.106 inches) was slightly above the average.

Rain fell on eight days, the amount being .45 of an inch, which was lower than in any corresponding month during the previous ten years, and 2 inches below the average during that period.

The mean humidity of the month was 73.3.

Males contributed 52 per cent. and females 48 per cent. to the mortality of the month. Children under five years of age contributed 21 per cent. to that mortality, as against 20 per cent. in May, 1900; 22 per cent. in May, 1899; 34 per cent. in May, 1898; 25 per cent. in May, 1897; 30 per cent. in May, 1896; and 25 per cent. in May, 1895. The falling off in this proportion is a natural result of the smaller proportion of children in the population, owing to the decline in the birth rate.

The deaths of infants under twelve months numbered 97, as compared with 76 in May, 1900. The rate of infantile mortality was 91 per 1,000 births, registered in the month under review, as compared with 72 in May, 1900; 85 in May, 1899; 108 in May, 1898; 84 in May, 1897; 106 in May, 1896; 88 in May, 1895; 79 in May, 1894; 91 in May, 1893; 76 in May, 1892; and 87 in May, 1891.

Seventy-one persons—as against 52 in May, 1900—whose deaths were recorded during the month had attained or passed the age of 75 years. Of these a female, aged 75, died of diarrhoea; an ex-civil servant, aged 75, of apoplexy; two females, each aged 75, of syncope; a female, aged 75, of bronchitis; a pensioner (old age) and a female, each aged 75, of pneumonia; two females, each aged 75, of concussion of the brain the result of a fall from a vehicle, and gangrene of foot respectively; a medical practitioner and a female, each aged 76, of cancer; two females, each aged 76, of diabetes and valvular disease of the heart respectively; a manufacturer, aged 76, of embolism; a gardener, aged 76, of heart disease; a hotel-keeper, aged 76, of pneumonia; a female, aged 76, of enteritis; a clerk, aged 76, of Bright's disease; a female, aged 77, of dropsy; a tailor, aged 78, of apoplexy; a mariner, aged 78, of pericarditis; a farmer, aged 78, of heart disease; two females, each aged 78, of bronchitis and ulceration of stomach respectively; a plasterer, aged 78, of cellulitis; a gardener, aged 79, of cystitis; a carter, aged 80, of influenza; two females, each aged 80, of paralysis and heart disease respectively; an agent and a female, each aged 80, of bronchitis; a female, aged 80, of congestion of the lungs; a miner, aged 80, of emphysema; three females, each aged 81, of hemiplegia, paralysis, and heart disease respectively; a dealer, aged 81, of enteritis; a female, aged 82, of bronchitis; three gentlemen, each aged 82, of pneumonia; two females, each aged 82, of gastritis and ulceration of the stomach respectively; an agent, aged 83, of heart disease; two females, each aged 84, of apoplexy and enteritis respectively; a male, of no occupation, aged 84, of dropsy; two females, each aged 85, of heart disease and bronchitis respectively; a female, aged 86, of influenza; a gentleman, aged 86, of hemiplegia; a female, aged 86, of dilatation of the heart; a male of no occupation, aged 89, of congestion of the brain; a female, aged 89, of heart disease; a female, aged 76, a builder and a french-polisher, each aged 76, a male of no occupation, aged 79, three females, each aged 80, a gentleman and two females, each aged 81, two females, each aged 83, a gentleman and a missionary, each aged 87, a female, aged 92, and a farmer and a female, each aged 94, of old age.

Thirty-three of the deaths recorded during the month, as compared with 26 in May, 1900, were from external causes, of which 28 were set down to accident and 5 to suicide. The following are the particulars of the accidental deaths:—A train examiner, aged 50, and a seamstress, aged 29, were passed over by railway trains; a female, aged 43, died of injuries, the result of being crushed between railway carriages; a gentleman, aged 26, died of injuries, caused by his horse falling in a race; a labourer, aged 19, of fracture of the skull, the result of colliding with a bicycle; a cook, aged 37, was passed over by a cart; a carrier, aged 64, died of fracture of the skull; and two females, aged 28 and 76 respectively, of concussion of the brain, caused in each case by a fall from a cart; a painter, aged 23, of injuries, a labourer, aged 37, of fracture of the spine, and a servant (female), aged 28, of fracture of the skull, consequent in each case on a fall from a building; a labourer, aged 66, of fracture of the skull, the result of a fall whilst in a fit; two females, aged 44 and 50 respectively, of burns; a male child, aged 2, of scalds; a squatter, aged 42, was drowned in a bath whilst in a fit; a saddler, aged 57, by falling from a train which had been brought to a standstill on a bridge over the river Yarra; a seaman, aged 51, was drowned in Hobson's Bay; five persons were "found drowned," viz., a bank manager, aged 39, a donkeyman, aged 42, a cook, aged 50, and a male of no occupation, aged 68, in the River Yarra; a book-keeper, aged 50, in Hobson's Bay; a boy, aged 13, and a labourer, aged 44, were suffocated by vomited matter getting into air passages; a male infant, aged 3 months, was overlain; and a female infant, aged 1 week, died of umbilical hæmorrhage. The suicidal deaths were those of a gentleman, aged 42, and a bone-mill proprietor, aged 65, who shot themselves; a baker, aged 29, and a dentist, aged 50, who cut their throats; and a female, aged 55, who hanged herself.

One hundred and sixty deaths, or 26 per cent. of the whole, took place in public institutions, viz.:—81 in the Melbourne, 17 in the Alfred, 5 in St. Vincent's, 5 in the Women's, 10 in the Children's, 9 in the Homœopathic, and 10 in the Austin Hospitals; 7 in the Metropolitan and 6 in the Yarra Bend Lunatic Asylums; 5 in the Immigrants' Home; 4 in the Benevolent Asylum; and 1 in the Convent of the Little Sisters of the Poor.

The deaths of children under five years of age numbered 132, of which 71, or 54 per cent., were of males, and 61, or 46 per cent., were of females. Of those who died, 97 were under one year of age, 22 were between one and two, 9 were between two and three, 2 were between three and four, and 2 were between four and five.

The persons who died at a more advanced age than five years numbered 489. Of these 249, or 51 per cent., were males, and 240, or 49 per cent., were females; 12 were between five and ten, 7 were between ten and fifteen, 16 were between fifteen and twenty, 21 were between twenty and twenty-five, 22 were between twenty-five and thirty, 38 were between thirty and thirty-five, 41 were between thirty-five and forty, 35 were between forty and forty-five, 25 were between forty-five and fifty, 30 were between fifty and fifty-five, 32 were between fifty-five and sixty, 32 were between sixty and sixty-five, 56 were between sixty-five and seventy, 51 were between seventy and seventy-five, 30 were between seventy-five and eighty, 29 were between eighty and eighty-five, 9 were between eighty-five and ninety, and 3 were between ninety and ninety-five.

As compared with the corresponding month of the preceding year, there was an increase of 15 deaths under zymotic, 20 under constitutional, 15 under local diseases, 7 under the head of violence, and 8 under ill-defined causes, whilst there was a decrease of 3 deaths under dietic diseases. Under the zymotic class, deaths from influenza rose from 3 to 11, and those from diarrhoeal diseases from 3 to 9. Under the constitutional class, deaths from cancer rose from 33 to 42; those from phthisis from 55 to 71; and those from other forms of tuberculosis from 3 to 8; but those from tubercular meningitis fell from 8 to 1. Under the developmental class, deaths from old age rose from 16 to 27. In the local class, deaths from diseases of the nervous system increased by 15, those from diseases of the respiratory system by 25; those from diseases of the digestive system by 13; those from diseases of the urinary system by 6; and those from diseases of parturition by 4.

The following is a statement of the deaths set down to diphtheria and typhoid fever in each month of the years 1890 to 1900, and the first five months of 1901, from which may be traced the rise and fall of the mortality at various periods of the year. It will be noticed that the mortality from typhoid fever usually attains its maximum in March, and is at a minimum from July to November. It will also be noticed that the mortality from both causes during the month was below the average.

CITY OF HAWTHORN.

By-Law No. 49.

A By-law of the City of Hawthorn, made under Sections 191 and 512 of the *Local Government Act 1890*, and numbered 49 for regulating the Central Gardens, situated between Henry and William streets, in the said city.

IN pursuance of the powers conferred by the *Local Government Act 1890*, the Mayor, Councillors, and Citizens of the City of Hawthorn order as follows:—

1. Except when the Council of the said City or the Gardens Committee of the said Council shall otherwise decide, the gardens shall be open to the public between the hours of half-past seven o'clock in the morning and nine o'clock in the evening, every day from the first day of October to the following thirtieth day of April, both inclusive; and between the hours of half-past seven o'clock in the morning and five o'clock in the evening every day from the first day of May to the following thirtieth day of September, both inclusive; and no person shall enter or remain in the gardens except between the hours aforesaid.

2. No person shall light any fire in the gardens, or destroy, damage, disturb, pick, pluck, tear, remove or interfere with any of the trees, shrubs, plants, flowers, seeds, or property therein, or walk on the beds or borders, or remove any of the tallies therein.

3. No person shall climb, jump, or get upon or over any of the fences or gates of the gardens, or cut or in any way remove or damage any of such fences or gates or any of the seals in the gardens, or stick bills or advertisements, or writings on any of such fences, gates, or seats, or roll or throw stones or missiles, or commit any nuisance in the gardens, or leave therein any bottle, glass, orange peel, paper, cast-off clothing, or any litter or rubbish.

4. No person in a state of intoxication shall enter or remain in the gardens.

5. No person, except those in the employ of, or authorized by the Council, shall bring into the gardens any dog unless it be led by a chain or collar, nor any other animal, nor any vehicle, except a perambulator.

6. No person shall take into the gardens, or ride therein, any bicycle or tricycle.

7. No person shall carry any firearm in or through the gardens, nor shoot, snare, catch, or destroy any bird or fish in the gardens, or on or in any water therein, or bathe in any such water.

8. No visitor to the gardens shall interrupt the gardeners or labourers by conversation or otherwise.

9. Children under the age of ten years, not being under the control of some competent person, shall be removed from the gardens.

10. All dogs, goats, and poultry found within the gardens, except a dog led by a chain or cord, shall be destroyed, and the owner shall make compensation, to be recovered before any justice for any damage done.

11. No person shall hawk or sell in the gardens anything of any description, or offer the same for sale therein without the previous written permission of the Council.

12. No person in the gardens shall behave in a disorderly or noisy manner, or create or take part in any disturbance, or commit any act of indecency, or offend against decency in dress, language, or conduct.

13. INTRODUCTORY.

1. Repeal of former By-laws.—All by-laws made prior to the date of making these by-laws shall be and the same are hereby repealed, saving all existing rights.

2. Meaning of Governor.—In these by-laws the word "Governor" shall mean and be equivalent to the word "Contributor" in the Act of the Parliament of Victoria, No. 1099.

NAME.

3. Name.—The name of the institution shall be "The Austin Hospital for Incurables."

OBJECT.

4. Object of the Institution.—The institution is an establishment for the treatment of persons suffering from incurable diseases (excepting those declared ineligible by the Rules) which require medical treatment and nursing, as defined in the Appendix.

COMMON SEAL.

5. Custody of Seal.—The common seal of the Corporation shall be kept at the office of the Institution, in a box having two different locks: one key shall be kept by the President and the other by the Secretary.

6. Affixing of Seal.—The common seal shall not be affixed to any deed, instrument, or writing, except by order of the committee and shall be verified by the signature of the President or Vice-President or the Chairman for the time being, and the Treasurer or Secretary.

GOVERNORS AND THEIR PRIVILEGES.

7. Annual Governors and Life Governors.—Any person who shall contribute the sum of £1 per annum shall be an annual governor, or not less than £20 in one donation shall be a life governor of the hospital, and shall be entitled to one vote at all general meetings; any person who shall contribute the sum of £2 per annum shall be an annual governor, or not less than £50 in one donation shall be a life governor, and shall be entitled to two votes at all general meetings; and any person who shall contribute the sum of £5 per annum shall be an annual governor, or not less than £100 in one donation shall be a life governor, and shall be entitled to three votes at all general meetings.

8. Governors on Collections.—Any person who shall pay to the hospital in one year in one sum collections, from persons not claiming membership on account of their contributions towards such sum, amounting to not less than £1, shall be an annual governor, or not less than £20, shall be a life governor of the hospital, and shall be entitled to one vote at all general meetings; and any person who shall pay to the hospital in one year in one sum collections, from persons not claiming membership on account of their contributions towards such sum, amounting to not less than £2, shall be an annual governor, or not less than £50, shall be a life governor of the hospital, and shall be entitled to two votes at all general meetings; and any person who shall pay to the hospital in one year in one sum collections, from persons not claiming membership on account of their contributions towards such sum, amounting to not less than £5, shall be an annual governor, or not less than £100, shall be a life governor of the hospital, and shall be entitled to three votes at all general meetings.

9. Contributions by Corporations.—Any public or corporate body which shall contribute the sum of £1 annually shall be authorized to nominate some one person to be enrolled an annual governor, or not less than £20 in one sum, such nominee shall be a life governor, and shall be entitled to one vote at all general meetings. And any public or corporate body which shall contribute the sum of £2 annually shall be authorized to nominate some one person to be enrolled an annual governor, or not less than £50 in one sum, such nominee shall be a life governor, and shall be entitled to two votes at all general meetings. And any public or corporate body which shall contribute the sum of £5 annually shall be authorized to nominate some one person to be enrolled an annual governor, or not less than £100 in one sum, such nominee shall be a life governor, and shall be entitled to three votes at all general meetings.

10. Life Governors under Bequests.—The acting executor, or, if more than one, then the first named acting-executor under any will through which the hospital shall receive the sum of not less than £20, shall be enrolled a life governor, and shall be entitled to one vote at all general meetings. Where the bequest shall be not less than £100, the executor shall be enrolled a life governor, and shall be entitled to two votes at all general meetings. And where the bequest shall be £500 and upwards, the executor shall be enrolled a life governor, and shall be entitled to three votes at all general meetings.

11. Governors not to have more than three votes.—No one governor shall be entitled to more than three votes at any general meeting.

12. Absent Governors may act by Attorney.—Any governor may, by power of attorney, appoint some person to exercise all the privileges to which he would be entitled if personally present, but such power of attorney shall be deposited with the

secretary of the hospital for examination and record at least three clear days before the same can be used in exercise of such privileges.

13. Contributions by Firms.—Every firm or partnership subscribing to the funds of the hospital shall exercise their privilege through some person nominated by the firm or partnership to act as representative on their behalf; all such nominations to be in writing, and lodged with the secretary of the hospital.

14. Payment of Subscriptions.—Every yearly subscription shall be paid in advance, and every first yearly payment shall be calculated from the date of such payment, but no such first yearly payment shall entitle to a vote at a general meeting within two months from the date of such payment.

15. Honorary Life Governors.—Persons who shall have conferred any signal benefit on the hospital, irrespective of subscriptions, may be elected honorary life governors at any general meeting on the recommendation of the committee, and shall be entitled to one vote at all general meetings.

COMMITTEE OF MANAGEMENT.

16. Consistence of Committee.—The Committee of Management shall consist of not more than fifteen governors (of whom six, at most, shall be ladies); four shall form a quorum.

17. Officers of the Corporation and their Tenure.—A President, Vice-President, Treasurer (who shall be members of committee), and two Auditors, shall be elected at the annual general meeting. The President shall be *ex officio* a member of all sub-committees.

18. Time and Filling up Vacancies.—At the annual general meeting of governors, to be held in the month of July in each year, one-third part of the committee (being the longest in office without re-election), shall retire, but be eligible for re-election. Any casual vacancies may be filled by the committee, until the next annual general meeting.

19. Powers of Committee.—The committee shall direct all business of the hospital, shall provide all requisites for its use, shall appoint, hire, and discharge or dismiss all paid officers and servants, and fix and pay all salaries and wages; may from time to time enter into contracts, and may make rules not inconsistent with these by-laws for the regulation of the hospital, and of such paid officers and servants, shall have power to order the discharge of any patient; and generally in all matters whether of the same kind as those hereinbefore mentioned, or of a different kind not provided for by law or by these by-laws that they think proper.

20. Rotation of business by Committee.—The committee shall meet once a fortnight or oftener if necessary, at such times and places as they may appoint. The business shall be as follows:—

- (1) To confirm the minutes of previous meeting.
- (2) To consider correspondence since last meeting.
- (3) To deal with the reports of sub-committees, of officers, and of visitors.
- (4) General business.

21. Member of Committee not to hold office of profit.—No member of the committee may contract with or hold any office of profit with the hospital.

22. Absent Members of Committee.—Any member of the committee who shall be absent, without the permission of the committee, from four consecutive meetings, shall vacate his office. (See Act No. 1099.)

MEETINGS IN GENERAL.

23. Presidency at Meetings of Committee.—At all meetings of the committee the president, or in his absence, the vice-president, shall take the chair, but in the absence of both officers the meeting shall choose its own chairman. Each sub-committee shall elect its own chairman.

24. Chairman to have a Double Vote.—At all meetings of the committee, the chairman shall have a deliberative vote, and also a casting vote whenever the numbers are equal.

25. As to calling of Special Meetings of Governors.—The committee may convene a special general meeting of governors at any time upon giving notice at least seven days previously in two or more of the Melbourne newspapers; which notice shall be advertised three times in each of such papers, and shall specify the time and place of meeting and the particular subjects to be brought before such general meeting, and none other shall be discussed thereat. Any twelve governors may require the committee to call a special meeting at any time, and should the committee, after receiving such requisition, signed by twelve or more governors, neglect to call such meeting within seven days after the next ordinary meeting of the committee, then any twelve governors shall have power to convene such meeting upon giving notice as directed above, to discuss the business of which notice has been given to the committee, and no other. In that case the calling of the meeting shall devolve on the requisitionists.

26. Decision of Questions.—All questions at general meetings or at meetings of the committee shall be decided by a show of hands, unless a ballot is demanded by any member.

ELECTIONS.

27. Election of Members of Committee.—All nominations (together with written acceptances by the nominees) for election as members of committee shall be furnished to the secretary at least three clear days before the annual meeting. If less than the number to be elected be nominated, the meeting shall have power to nominate governors; and if more than those required to fill the vacancies be nominated, the election shall be decided by a show of hands, unless a ballot be demanded on behalf of any candidate, to be taken on such day and at such place as may be appointed by the chairman, between the hours of two p.m. and five p.m., such ballot to be conducted by a member of the committee, and two scrutineers appointed by the meeting. In all cases of equal voting, the member of committee conducting the ballot shall have the casting vote.

RELIGIOUS INSTRUCTION.

28. Religious Instruction.—The inmates of the Institution shall be at liberty to receive religious instruction and consolation

from the ministers or authorized religious instructors of the denomination to which they respectively belong, who shall (unless their services are specially requested by any inmate belonging to any other communion) confine their ministrations to the members of their own denomination, and shall not speak or read loudly, but perform the duties of their office in such a way as to be as little overheard as possible by the other inmates. No person shall conduct any public religious service except in a place set apart for the purpose by the committee, and for extra religious services the permission of the matron must be obtained beforehand. Unless in cases of urgency the visits of authorized religious instructors, excepting ministers, shall be paid between the hours of 10 a.m. and 5 p.m.

MEETINGS OF GOVERNORS.

29. Annual Meeting of Governors.—At the Annual General Meeting the business shall be to confirm the minutes of previous general meeting, to receive a report from the committee, to receive and adopt the balance-sheet of the institution, to elect officers, auditors, and members of committee, and to transact any other business of which due notice shall have been given.

30. Quorum of Governors.—At all general meetings of the governors, ten shall constitute a quorum; but if no quorum be present within half-an-hour of the time named, such meeting shall stand adjourned for the following week, at the same day and hour.

ALTERING BY-LAWS.

31. At any Special General Meeting of Governors, these by-laws may be repealed, altered, or added to provided that the provisions of Act No. 1099, for the making of by-laws shall be deemed to apply to any repeal, alteration, or addition.

APPENDIX.

The following definition of the term "Incurable" has been supplied by Professor Allen:—

In order to define the scope of the Institution, the term "Incurables" shall be held to denote patients who suffer from chronic disease progressing to a fatal termination, and who require above all things careful nursing, with more or less frequent medical aid for the relief of symptoms. In other words, the Charity is in scope and in cost per occupied bed to occupy a place midway between a General Hospital and a Benevolent Asylum. It is not intended for cases of acute disease, nor for cases of chronic disease in which medical aid is the first essential. On the other hand, it is not intended for cases of senility, permanent disablement, &c., for which a home is the first requirement, with a minimum of attendance or nursing.

BY-LAWS OF THE NHILL DISTRICT HOSPITAL.
(Incorporated the 8th October, 1900, *Government Gazette*,
19th October, 1900.)

1. The Rules and By-Laws of the Nhill District Hospital (hereinafter referred to as "the hospital") in force up to the date of the publication of this By-law are hereby repealed, save as to all rights accrued, acts done, appointments made, or liabilities incurred thereunder.

OBJECTS OF INSTITUTION.

2. The hospital will afford gratuitously surgical and medical aid to any poor person requiring it, irrespective of creed, country, or colour; but any person who shall be admitted under any circumstances, and shall be found able to pay, shall be required to do so. Paying patients may be received under certain conditions, according to the by-laws.

MANAGEMENT AND ELECTION OF COMMITTEE.

3. The hospital shall be managed by the president, one vice-president, an honorary treasurer, and the committee of management, not exceeding eighteen members, nine of whom shall be residents of outlying districts. The above-named officers shall at the first election held in connexion with the hospital as an incorporated institution, be elected in accordance with the *Hospitals and Charities Act 1899*. Afterwards, on the last Thursday in the month of July in every year, one-third part of the elected members of the committee shall go out of office, but may, nevertheless, be re-elected, and the persons who shall go out of office shall be those who have been the longest in office without re-election, or where two or more shall have been in office for the same length of time, then those who shall go out of office shall be determined by lot.

FILLING VACANCY IN COMMITTEE.

4. Should a vacancy occur in any of the above-named offices, it should be filled at the then or next ensuing general meeting of subscribers, but in all cases the committee of management is empowered to temporarily fill the vacancy.

LIFE AND ANNUAL GOVERNORS.

5. That every contributor of £20 in one sum shall be a life governor; also any person nominated by any society that has added a sum of not less than £25 in one amount shall be a life governor, or any person nominated by any society that has added a sum of not less than £15 in one amount shall be an annual governor, or any layman £10 (collected in one year) shall be an annual governor, or the executors to a will by which a sum of not less than £100 has been added to the funds of the hospital shall be life governors; it being specially understood that the granting of such privileges shall be confirmed by the committee of management for the time being of the hospital, and the committee of management shall have power to add to the list of life or annual governors such persons as it may deem expedient for eminent services rendered.

PRIVILEGES OF LIFE AND ANNUAL GOVERNORS AND CONTRIBUTOR.

6. Every life governor shall have the privilege of one vote at all meetings of contributors, and of recommending five indoor and five outdoor patients in each year. Every annual governor shall, for a period of one year immediately following his being granted such privilege, have the right to one vote at all meetings of subscribers, and of recommending three indoor and three outdoor patients during such period of one year. And every contributor of £1 and upwards shall be entitled to one vote at such meetings, and to recommend one indoor and three outdoor patients for each £1 subscribed during the year. Members of the committee of management may recommend during the year of their holding such office two indoor and six outdoor patients each, but no person shall be qualified to vote at any meeting of subscribers unless he shall have been a contributor, within the meaning of the *Hospital and Charities Act 1899*, of at least £1 for the space of six months previous to such meeting; provided always that when a contributor shall have paid his subscription for the year immediately preceding the year in which any such meeting shall take place, the payment of his subscription for the then current year at any time before such meeting shall entitle such contributor to vote. Life governors only are entitled to vote by proxy.

AUDITORS.

7. The duly qualified electors shall, at each annual general meeting, appoint two auditors, not members of the committee, to examine the accounts; but in case either of such auditors neglect or refuse to perform his duty, the committee is empowered to temporarily appoint another auditor or auditors. And also it shall be competent for the president or in his absence a vice-president, at the request of not less than ten duly qualified contributors, to convene by advertisement a meeting of contributors at any time for the purpose of electing auditors if any emergency arise to warrant the same.

COMMITTEE OF MANAGEMENT.

8. The committee of management shall include all officers named in the third rule; it shall direct the collection and distribution of funds; appoint and dismiss all paid officers and nurses; frame regulations for the management of the hospital subject to the provisions contained in these by-laws; present a report to the annual general meeting; and conduct the affairs of the hospital generally, and may from among themselves from time to time appoint committees for any purpose which in their opinion would be better regulated and managed by means of such committees, and it may fix the quorum of such committees in accordance with No. 78 of these by-laws, and may continue to alter or discontinue such committees. A member of such committee who shall for four consecutive meetings absent himself from its meetings without consent of the committee duly recorded on its minutes shall forfeit his seat thereon.

MEETINGS OF COMMITTEE.

9. The committee of management shall meet for general business once at least in each month, and for special business whenever requisite, such meeting to be convened by the secretary at any time or place which may be ordered by the committee, the president, the vice-president, or upon the requisition

of not less than three members of the committee. At any meeting five members shall form a quorum, and in the absence of the president or vice-president one of the members present shall be elected to act as chairman. If no quorum be present within thirty minutes after the time named such meeting as well as every special meeting hereinafter authorized shall stand adjourned to such day as the members present may determine.

ANNUAL MEETING.

10. The annual meeting of contributors shall be held on the last Thursday in the month of July in each year, at which the report of the committee of management dealing with the affairs of the hospital for the previous year, and statement of receipts and expenditure made up to the thirtieth day of June of the year in which such annual meeting is held, and which shall be duly audited by the auditors appointed in accordance with number 7 of these by-laws shall be submitted for the approval of the contributors. In addition to appointing members of the committee of management as per number 3 of these by-laws and auditors as per number 7 of such by-laws, all matters pertaining to the hospital shall be open to discussion, and resolutions may be passed on such matters and any business brought before it (which may consistently with the act of incorporation and the by-laws be transacted at it) may be absolutely decided upon. A copy of the annual report and statement of receipts and expenditure above referred to shall, together with such information concerning the working of the hospital as may be necessary, be furnished to each contributor at his known address. The annual meeting shall be convened by the secretary in accordance with these by-laws by advertisement in the local paper at least seven days previous to the meeting.

SPECIAL MEETINGS OF CONTRIBUTORS.

11. Special meetings of contributors shall be convened by the secretary by advertisement in a local paper at least seven days previous to such meetings when directed by the committee of management, or on the written application of ten duly qualified contributors of at least £1 each, the objects of such meetings to be stated in the advertisements; the secretary shall also give special notice to each member of the committee of such meetings.

QUORUM OF MEETINGS OF CONTRIBUTORS.

12. The quorum of those entitled to vote at any meeting of contributors shall not be less than ten in number.

ALTERATION OF BY-LAWS.

13. That no alteration or rescinding of by-laws shall be made except by duly qualified contributors in public meeting assembled, of which the secretary shall have given at least seven days' notice by advertisement appearing in a local paper, stating the business for which such meeting shall be convened.

HOUSE COMMITTEE.

14. The house committee of the hospital shall be appointed from the members residing in the town of Nhill of the committee of management; the number of its members shall be three, of whom two shall form a quorum, it being provided that unless special circumstances shall compel the committee of management to so determine, no member of the house committee shall hold office for a longer term than four months. The house committee shall, at least once a week, visit the hospital for the purpose of inspecting the arrangements thereof, and of inquiring of the patients if they are properly attended to, and shall report in writing to the next meeting of the committee of management any alterations or suggestions they may think necessary.

ADMISSION OF PATIENTS.

15. That accidents and such cases as may be deemed of decided emergency by the medical officer in attendance, he received at any time, and at such hours as may be from time to time appointed by the committee, on recommendation of a contributor of at least £1 sterling for the then current year, or by a person entitled by By-law 6 to do so, who shall certify that such patient is not capable of providing for medical assistance.

16. No person who, in the opinion of the medical officer or of the committee, is unsuitable to be admitted shall be received as an in-patient under any circumstances.

17. In all cases when an application for admission to the hospital is refused by the medical officer, he shall indorse his reasons for such refusal on the back of the order presented, and every such case, together with the indorsement, shall be reported to the first meeting of the committee.

18. That no female, for the purpose of confinement, child under three years of age, insane person, or one affected with any infectious disease (with the exception of cases of accidents or emergency as per By-law 15) shall be admitted, except by the express permission of the house committee, or committee of management, or the medical officer.

CONTRACTORS.

19. Any contractor to the institution being a member of the committee of management, shall absent himself from its sittings or from the sittings of any sub-committee of the board, while any subject relating to his contract is under consideration.

HONORARY TREASURER.

20. The honorary treasurer shall receive all moneys on behalf of the hospital, and invest the same in such bank or banks as the committee shall direct, to the credit of the hospital. He shall pay all accounts, after the same have been signed by the chairman of the meeting as having been approved of by the committee, by drafts on the bank or banks, which shall be countersigned by the president, or by one of the vice-presidents, and by the secretary. He shall also keep an account of all money received and paid by him, and report the same at least once a month to a meeting of the committee.

HONORARY SURGEONS.

21. The honorary medical officers shall consist of legally qualified medical practitioners, who shall be elected for the year on the last Thursday in the month of July of that year. They shall have access to the hospital at all times, and are to be called into consultation when deemed necessary by the medical officer.

MEDICAL OFFICER.

22. The medical officer shall be a duly qualified medical practitioner, who shall reside near the premises of the hospital, and shall not be absent therefrom for any lengthened period without the permission of the committee. He shall be allowed private practice, provided such practice does not interfere with his duties as medical officer.

23. The medical officer shall receive all applicants with properly signed certificates of admission (except that they are disqualified by By-law 18), examine the nature of their cases and decide upon their fitness to be either indoor or outdoor patients, and discharge all patients when he considers they are fit to be discharged. His actions in such admitting and discharging to be subject to the approval of the house committee.

24. The medical officer shall have charge of patients in the hospital and of their treatment; but in all cases of difficulty, or danger, or long continuance in the hospital, he is requested to consult the honorary surgeons.

25. The medical officer shall superintend and control all nurses and servants of the hospital, and in case of neglect of duty or insubordination may suspend any of them, and report thereon to the house committee, who may deal with them.

26. The medical officer shall keep such accounts respecting the patients as the committee of management may direct in books kept for the purpose, and report to the committee such cases as he may think necessary.

27. The medical officer shall have charge of the surgical instruments, drugs, and chemicals, carefully examine them both as to quality and quantity, and report any defects in either respect to the committee; make an inventory of the same in a book to be kept for that purpose; make and keep an account of the receipts and expenditure, or loss and breakage of all such instruments, drugs, and chemicals. And he must, in the absence of a dispenser, perform such duties as would devolve upon that officer.

28. The medical officer shall enter regularly in books kept for that purpose the names of persons as they are admitted or discharged, together with the nature and history of their disease while under treatment.

29. The medical officer shall accompany the honorary surgeons through the wards and report to them the state of the patients; visit each patient every morning and evening if necessary; and inquire if the treatment prescribed has been attended to; and if any case of complaint exist, immediately remove the same or report it to the committee at its next meeting.

30. The medical officer shall perform all surgical operations and post-mortem examinations, keep the key of the dead-house, and in all serious operations give notice to the honorary medical officers when a consultation is to be held or an operation to be performed; but in all cases of emergency he shall act to the best of his judgment.

SECRETARY.

31. The secretary shall keep the minutes, accounts, and records of the hospital; compile all reports, conduct the correspondence, attend all meetings, and bring all business before the same; carry out the resolutions, and perform all clerical and other duties which may be ordered by the committee. He shall also, at the expense of the committee, furnish security by way of an approved bond for £100.

COLLECTOR.

32. The collector shall collect subscriptions for the hospital, and in all cases give a receipt of the same, and pay to the treasurer, at least once in every fortnight, all moneys he may have received, and render an account of the same to the committee of management, and shall, at the expense of the committee, give security by way of an approved bond to the amount of £50. The appointment of and the nature of the collections to be made by the collector to be subject to the discretion of the committee of management.

MATRON.

33. The matron shall live in the house, and, subject to the general control of the medical officer, shall be mistress of the household. She shall not be absent from the hospital without the consent of the medical officer, and she shall acquaint him of her departure and return.

34. She shall have control of the nurses and servants, under the direction of the medical officer, and shall conduct the household affairs in accordance with such regulations or directions as shall be issued or given by the committee of management or house committee, and in the event of any sudden vacancy in any of the offices of the household between the monthly meetings she shall temporarily provide for the performance of the duties thus unprovided for. She shall exercise particular care to see that the nurses shall go on and off duty punctually at the hours appointed for such.

35. She shall, under the direction of the medical officer, take care that the nurses cause the patients to be placed in convenient beds within the wards assigned for their reception. She shall in course of the day of admission see that they are properly accommodated.

36. She shall see that the clothes of all patients as they are admitted are cleaned and put carefully away, and shall enter in a book a list of all such clothes as they are received, and obtain the receipt of each patient for the same when leaving. She shall not, except in her presence, permit any of the patients' clothes to be removed from the store.

37. She shall daily see that the beds, linen, and clothes of the patients are clean and in good order, and shall cause such as may require it to be replaced by others, and shall not allow any unnecessary accumulation of soiled clothing.

38. On the discharge or death of a patient she shall see that the whole of the bedding be replaced with clean articles, and in the case of the death of a patient she shall be responsible for the orderly disposal of the body till the death be reported to the medical officer and the body be removed.

39. She shall visit all wards daily before 9 a.m. and after 8 p.m., and at uncertain times besides, and see that good order

and cleanliness are everywhere maintained, that the rules are strictly observed, and that the nurses and servants do their duty and also assist them in the discharge of such duties. She shall attend to the distribution of all diets so that there may be no reasonable cause of complaint, and may claim the services of any convalescent patient able to assist. Any convalescent patient refusing to assist may be instantly dismissed by the medical officer on the report of the matron.

40. She shall visit the laundry daily and give the necessary instructions concerning the washing, drying, and getting-up of the linen, blankets, &c., and see that the same are in every respect fit for use before being again issued. She shall give the necessary directions for making and mending the linen and clothing, and take care that all articles are properly numbered and marked with the name of the institution, and shall notify to the resident surgeon any deficiency in the stock of such articles.

41. She shall have charge of the clothing, bedding, linen, haberdashery, cutlery, glass, delf, kitchen utensils, and other articles of household management, and shall keep an accurate account of same in a book, and make a quarterly return thereof early in the months of March, June, September, and December to the medical officer, to be laid before the house committee, showing the condition of the stock on hand and the probable requirements for the next quarter.

42. She shall see that all the food for the patients, officers, and servants is properly cooked and served, and generally shall perform all other duties as matron.

43. She shall strictly attend the directions of the medical officer, and use her utmost endeavours to prevent the introduction of liquor and improper provisions for the patients. She shall treat them with kindness, and never suffer any unkindness or neglect to go unreported or unreported.

44. She may employ the nurses and servants (when not engaged with the patients) in doing other work for the benefit of the institution, but not for her own personal benefit except in case of sickness of herself.

45. She shall not give leave of absence beyond two hours to any servant except by permission of the medical officer, and specifying the length of absence for which leave is granted in the attendance book.

46. In the event of any patient requiring the presence of any minister of religion, she shall give immediate notice of such request to such minister of religion.

47. She shall at once report to the medical officer any misconduct, neglect of duty, or irregularity which may come to her knowledge; and shall enter into the book to be kept for the information of the committee only any complaint made by any patient or employee.

48. At each monthly meeting of the house committee she shall furnish a report of the extra requirements for the current month, and should any emergency arise during the month which would necessitate the purchase of any goods not contracted for the house committee shall be authorized to purchase same, the amount not to exceed £5.

49. She shall enter regularly in books to be kept for the purpose the names of patients as they are admitted or discharged, their address, and the name of the person recommending them. She shall receive all money and other property belonging to the patients, and account for the same to the general committee when required, and issue acknowledgments for such on receipt to the patients. There shall be prepared by her and hung up in the office of the hospital a list on which she shall immediately on the admission of every patient enter the date, name, and residence of such patient.

50. She shall receive, examine, take charge of, and distribute all articles supplied for the use of the hospital.

51. She shall keep all such accounts and reports as may be directed by the committee of management.

52. She shall carry out all regulations made by the committee of management for the internal management of the hospital.

NURSES.

53. The nurses shall live in the hospital, and shall not leave it for any length of time, other than those hereinafter mentioned, without the special permission of the medical officer; they shall obey the orders of the said officer, be regular in attendance, behave with tenderness to all patients, and with civility and respect to strangers.

54. The nurses shall be each entitled to leave from duty from 3 until 10 p.m. o'clock on one day, which shall be determined by the medical officer, in each week, unless special circumstances necessitate their remaining on duty, and also to further leave of absence to each nurse on every alternate Sunday, from 2 p.m. to 10 p.m. o'clock. The medical officer shall have power to grant permission to the nurses at any time which he considers fit to attend divine service.

55. All nurses and staff shall sign a book kept for that purpose in which they shall also enter the times of their leaving and returning to the hospital when absent from it at any time.

56. The hours of duty for the nurses shall be:—Day nurses, from 6.30 a.m. to 8.30 p.m.; night nurses, from 8.30 p.m. to 6.30 a.m. This shall be the daily arrangement except on Saturdays, when the day nurse shall remain on duty until 10 p.m. o'clock, at which hour the night nurse shall assume duty.

57. All nurses shall be entitled to three weeks' leave of absence in each year on full pay, such leave of absence to be arranged at the discretion of the medical officer.

58. The nurses shall pay great attention to cleanliness personally in their respective wards, and in all things intrusted to their charge, particularly to the bedding of patients, and have it changed as often as may be necessary, taking care that it shall be thoroughly dried and aired, and that always on the admission of a fresh patient fresh bed linen is provided for such patient.

59. The nurses shall administer to the patients the medicine and diet at the time and in the manner directed by the medical officer, and not permit them to take any which have not been prescribed; they shall be careful to explain to the patients the

instructions of the said officer, and watch attentively the state of symptoms of the patients, and report the same to the medical officer.

60. They shall not permit patients to receive from visitors medicine, victuals, tobacco, or liquor of any kind, nor allow any portions of the medicines or diet nor anything to be removed from the wards by the patients or visitors without an order from the medical officer.

61. They shall not admit any stranger, without permission from the medical officer, except during the hours appointed for that purpose.

62. They shall be obedient to the regulations of the hospital, and report immediately to the medical officer any impropriety of conduct or infringement of the by-laws by any patient, visitor, or other person, and if such complaint is not properly attended to, report the same to the board at its next meeting.

63. They shall enter carefully in the report books provided for such all necessary details as to the condition of patients under their charge.

PROBATIONER NURSES.

64. Probationer nurses may be appointed as the committee of management shall think fit, on the following conditions:—

(a) That the probationer shall at first serve three months without pay on approval, and if her appointment as probationer nurse shall be decided upon, she shall receive payment at the first monthly meeting of the committee after her appointment, at the rate of 16s. 8d. per month for each of such three months of such service, and shall for a further term of nine months afterwards draw a salary at the same rate per month.

(b) That the salary for the second year of service shall be at the rate of £20 per annum.

(c) That the salary for the third year of service shall be at the rate of £25 per annum.

(d) That at the expiration of the term of two years and nine months from the date of her appointment, each probationer nurse shall retire from the service of the hospital.

(e) That an agreement, providing for the foregoing conditions and any other conditions which may be deemed necessary, be drawn up between the probationer nurse on the one side and the hospital on the other, such agreement to be submitted to the committee of management for approval before signature. Each probationer nurse shall, at the end of her time of probation, submit herself to examination in such manner as shall be provided by the medical officer as to her capable knowledge of her duties, and on passing such examination shall be entitled to receive her certificate as a properly trained nurse.

NURSES.

65. Any nurse who, in the opinion of the matron, is guilty of neglect of duty, or of any incivility, or any act of insubordination, or infraction in any way of the rules of the hospital, shall be immediately reported by the matron to the medical officer, who, if the matter is considered by him to be of serious moment, shall report such act or acts to the house committee at its next meeting.

66. In the absence of the matron from the hospital, all the duties and responsibilities of the matron shall devolve on the senior nurse.

PATIENTS.

67. The patients shall conduct themselves in an orderly manner, strictly observe all the directions of the medical officer and nurses, take their medicines and diet at the time directed, and not take any other than those prescribed, neither shall they conceal or put away any portion thereof.

68. They shall not leave their ward and go into another ward, leave the house or remain but for a longer time than may be granted, or introduce visitors, or receive medicines, victuals, liquors, tobacco, nor anything without the express leave of the medical officer.

69. They shall not gamble, smoke, spit on the floor, deface or injure any part of the ward furniture, bedding, or clothing, nor sing, blaspheme, or use rude or indecent language.

70. Any patient having any cause of complaint shall make the same known to the medical officer, whose duty it shall be to remedy the same; if not remedied, the complaint may be made to the house committee or to the committee of management at its next meeting, but if complaints are not made before a patient leaves the hospital, or within two days after leaving, they cannot be entertained.

71. Any patient who shall be guilty of misconduct shall be subject to instant dismissal from this institution. Patients deemed able by the medical officer to assist in the work of the hospital shall, at his request, so employ themselves.

72. Patients shall not sit up after 8 p.m. in winter, or 9 p.m. in the summer, and all persons considered by the medical officer able to do so, shall rise at 7 a.m. in the summer, and 8 a.m. in the winter.

73. Outdoor patients shall attend at the hospital between 11 o'clock a.m. and 1 o'clock p.m. daily, and must observe the rules relating to indoor patients, as far as may be practicable. Indoor patients in ordinary cases shall be admitted daily.

74. Paying patients may be admitted, provided the wards are not all occupied by ordinary patients.

75. The admission tickets of paying patients to be signed by two members of the committee, and the charge for admission shall be fixed by the house committee, subject to the approval of the board of management.

76. Paying patients to receive the same treatment as ordinary patients, and they must abide by the same rules, it being left to the resident surgeon to place them in any ward, either separate or with ordinary patients.

STANDING RULES AND ORDERS OF THE COMMITTEE OF MANAGEMENT.

77. The business of the committee shall commence at the hour appointed, or as soon after as a quorum shall be present.

78. The presence of a majority of the number of the members of any sub-committee shall constitute a quorum.

79. The hour of meeting for the general committee shall be 8 p.m., unless in case of special necessity warranting the president, or in his absence the vice-president, in authorizing an alteration of such hour, or in the event of a special meeting being called.

80. If at the expiration of thirty minutes from the time appointed for the committee to meet there is not a quorum, such meeting shall be adjourned in manner provided by By-law 9, and such circumstance, together with the names of the members of the committee present, shall be recorded in the minute-book.

81. The minutes of any preceding meeting not previously confirmed shall be read as the first business at all meetings of the committee, in order that such may be confirmed, and no discussion shall be permitted thereon, except as to their accuracy as the record of the proceedings. The minutes when confirmed shall be signed by the president, or, in his absence, by the chairman of the meeting.

82. The remaining order of the business shall be as follows:—

1. Reading first the outward and next the inward correspondence and considering and ordering thereon. All correspondence of any nature whatsoever relating to the conduct or business of the hospital received by the secretary, or by any member of the committee in his official capacity as such, to be produced and read at the first meeting of the committee after its receipt.

2. Statement of collections for the month previous to date of such meeting.

3. Treasurer's report of receipts and expenditure for the month preceding date of such meeting and state of bank balance on the date of meeting.

4. Receiving report of accounts due, and dealing with payment thereof. All accounts received prior to date of such meeting to be properly checked by the medical officer, secretary, or matron, according as such account shall be within the sphere of the duties of each, and presented for payment or consideration by the committee.

5. Receiving reports of visits of inspection during the preceding month by the house committee, and dealing with matters brought forward in these reports.

6. Receiving and dealing with a complete list of the patients admitted and discharged from the hospital during the month preceding the date of such meeting, such list or report to furnish particulars dealing with their ability to pay or not.

7. Receiving and dealing with the report of the medical officer, setting forth the number of patients admitted and discharged during the month preceding the date of the meeting, also the number of out-patients treated during the same period, and a statement of all stimulants, alms, and cordials consumed during such time at the hospital.

8. The consideration of and dealing with any general business relating to the welfare or proper management of the hospital, whether special notice of the intention of any member of committee to bring such forward shall have been given or not.

NOTICES OF MOTION.

83. All notices of motion shall be read to the meeting at which they are given, handed to the chairman with the name of the proposer, and the day proposed to bring on such notice.

84. No motion entered on the notice-paper shall be considered unless the member who has given such notice, or some other member authorized by him, be present when the business is called on, and notices not so proceeded with shall be struck off the notice-paper.

ORDINARY BUSINESS.

85. The mover of any motion which shall be referred to a committee shall for the occasion be a member of such committee.

86. Any motion not seconded shall not be further debated, but shall lapse.

87. A member who has proposed a motion may withdraw the same by leave of the chairman, but should such motion be seconded, such leave can only be granted with the consent of the seconder.

88. So soon as a debate upon a question shall be concluded, the chairman shall put the question to the committee, and on being put it shall be resolved in the affirmative or negative by a show of hands.

89. No question or amendment which is the same in substance as any question which has been resolved in the affirmative or negative shall be a resolution of the committee unless carried by two-thirds of the members present.

AMENDMENTS.

90. A question having being proposed may be amended by leaving out, substituting, or adding words, and such amendment shall be decided by a majority of votes.

91. An amendment proposed but not seconded shall not be entertained.

92. Amendments may be proposed to an amendment as if such amendment were an original question.

93. When amendments have been decided the main question as amended shall be put.

94. When an amendment is carried as against a motion it shall take the place of the original motion, and one other amendment only may be moved upon it.

95. When amendments have been lost the original question shall be put.

ORDER OF DEBATE.

96. Any member desirous of proposing a motion or amendment or of discussing any matter under consideration must rise and address the chairman; and no member when speaking shall be interrupted unless called to order, when he shall sit down, in which case the member calling to order shall be heard thereon in preference to any other speaker, and the question of order shall be disposed of before the subject is resumed or any other subject entered upon.

97. No member may speak to any question after the same has been put by the chairman, and the voting has been given in the affirmative or negative thereon.

98. When two or more members rise to speak, the chairman shall call upon the member who, in his opinion, first rose in his place to address the meeting.

99. A member may speak once to any question before the committee, and upon any amendment proposed thereto, and upon a question or amendment proposed by himself, or upon a question of order arising out of debate, but not otherwise.

100. Any member proposing or seconding a resolution or amendment shall be held to have spoken, and the mover only shall have the right of reply.

101. Whenever the chairman rises during a debate any member then speaking or offering to speak shall sit down, so that the chairman may be heard without interruption.

102. Any member having used objectionable words, and not explaining or retracting the same, or offering an apology for the use thereof to the satisfaction of the committee, will be censured by the committee, and shall not be allowed to hold his seat or vote upon any question until the offensive words shall have been retracted by him, and an apology rendered to the satisfaction of the committee.

103. The chairman at general meetings shall have two votes—one deliberative and one casting.

SUSPENSION OF STANDING ORDERS.

104. It shall be competent by a vote of two-thirds of the members present for the committee to suspend any standing order herein contained, provided the effect of such suspension shall not be the rescinding of any resolution previously adopted by the committee.

SUB-COMMITTEES.

105. The foregoing rules and orders so far as practicable also regulate the proceedings of all sub-committees. 8155
