ACT OF PARLIAMENT.

PROCLAMATION

By His Excellency Sir George Sydenham Clarke, Knight Commander of the Most Distinguished Order of Saint Michael and Saint George; Fellow of the Royal Society; Governor of the State of Victoria and its Dependencies in the Commonwealth of Australia, &c., &c., &c.

THE Governor of the State of Victoria in the Commonwealth of Australia, do hereby declare that I have this day assented, in His Majesty's name, to the Bill passed by the Parliament of the said State, the title whereof is hereinafter set forth, that is to say:—

"An Act to apply out of the Consolidated Revenue the sum of Seven hundred and seventy-one thousand five hundred and ninety-one pounds to the service of the year One thousand nine hundred and two and One thousand nine hundred and three."

Given under my Hand and the Seal of the State of Victoria aforesaid, at Melbourne, this twenty-second day of December, in the year of our Lord One thousand nine hundred and two, and in the second year of His Majesty's reign.

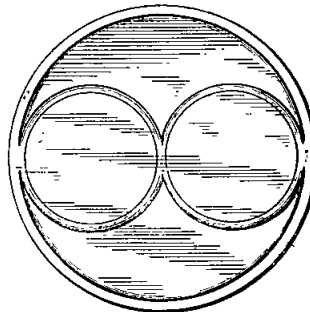

BOROUGH OF DAYLESFORD WATERWORKS TRUST.—RATING REGULATION FOR 1903.

THE Chairman and Commissioners of the Borough of Daylesford Waterworks Trust do hereby, pursuant to and in exercise of the powers and authorities conferred by the Water Acts, make the following Regulation:—

REGULATION NUMBERED 22,

Fixing the rates and charges which the owners and occupiers of lands and tenements shall pay in respect of water supplied within the Trust District, such rate being made for the year commencing on the 1st day of January and ending on the 31st day of December, 1903.

The rates and charges which shall be payable by the owners and occupiers of lands and tenements within the Borough of Daylesford Waterworks Trust District, who are supplied with water by the Trust, shall be as follows:—

1. On every house or tenement, not being an hotel or wine shop, of the annual value of Twenty pounds or under, the sum of One pound one shilling per annum.
2. On every house or tenement, not being an hotel or wine shop, above the annual value of Twenty pounds, and not exceeding the annual value of Two hundred pounds, the sum of Five pounds per cent. per annum on the valuation.
3. On every house or tenement, not being an hotel or wine shop, above the annual value of Two hundred pounds, the sum of Four pounds ten shillings per cent. on the valuation.
4. On every hotel or wine shop of the annual value of Thirty pounds and under, a minimum rate of Two pounds per annum.
5. On every hotel or wine shop above the annual value of Thirty pounds, the sum of Six pounds per cent. per annum on the valuation, provided that the charge shall not in any case be less than Two pounds.
6. On unoccupied lands, and lands on which no tenements are erected, nor water laid on, the sum of Five pounds per cent. on the annual valuation. Should water be laid on, the charge to be in accordance with the rates fixed in this by-law for tenements.
7. On livery, coach, and hotel stables, at the rate of Ten shillings per annum for the first stall, and Seven shillings and sixpence per annum for each additional stall. In open sheds used for stabling, each 6 feet to be considered as one stall. For horses kept on private premises, Ten shillings per annum for the first horse kept, and Seven shillings and sixpence per annum for each additional horse.

Cows to be paid for at the rate of One shilling each per annum. Water troughs, Ten shillings each per annum.

8. Water supplied by meter to be at the rate of Two shillings per 1,000 gallons, except to manufacturers, aerated water makers, &c., to whom the charge shall be One shilling and sixpence per 1,000 gallons, provided that not less than 60,000 gallons per annum is consumed, failing which the charge shall be Two shillings per 1,000 gallons.

9. Water supplied for irrigation of gardens, nurseries, cricket grounds, &c., to be charged for at the rate of One shilling and sixpence per 1,000 gallons, provided that the minimum quantity charged for shall be 20,000 gallons per annum.

10. For water supplied to buildings in course of erection, the charge shall be Twenty shillings per cent. on the amount of the contract for brickwork, stonework, or plastering; or, should the Trust require a meter to be affixed, the rate shall be One shilling and sixpence per 1,000 gallons.

11. For water supplied to steam-boilers, the charge shall be at the rate of Ten shillings per horse-power per annum.

12. The charge for water supplied for mining purposes shall be as per agreement.

13. These rates and charges shall be payable by equal half-yearly instalments, in advance, on the 1st day of January and the 1st day of July, 1903, except in cases where the Trust may have made a special agreement regarding the times of payment for water supplied by measure or for mining purposes.

14. Such person or persons as the Chairman and Commissioners of the Borough of Daylesford Waterworks Trust may from time to time appoint for that purpose shall be authorized to demand, collect, and recover the said rate and charges.

15. The minimum quantity of water to be charged for in each case where water is supplied by measure, except in the cases of special agreement with the Trust, shall be the quantity for which the charge, at Two shillings per 1,000 gallons, would be equal to the amount of the assessed water rate if water was supplied otherwise than by measure.

The foregoing Regulation, numbered 22, was made and adopted by the Borough of Daylesford Waterworks Trust this 31st day of October, 1902.

BENALLA WATERWORKS TRUST.—RATING REGULATION FOR 1903.

THE Commissioners of the Benalla Waterworks Trust, in pursuance of the powers conferred by the Water Acts, do hereby make the following Regulation:—

Regulation for the making of a rate on all rateable property within the Waterworks District of the Benalla Waterworks Trust.

A rate of One shilling in the pound sterling on the annual value of all the rateable property in the Benalla Waterworks Trust District, according to the valuation for the time being of all lands and tenements for the municipal rate of the shire of Benalla, is hereby made for the year 1903.

Such rate is made payable on the 1st day of January, 1903.

The minimum rate payable in respect of any property liable to be rated shall be One pound sterling for lands or tenements supplied with water from the pipes of the Trust, and Ten shillings for every piece of vacant or unoccupied land not so supplied, as fixed by the Governor in Council.

Such person or persons as the Commissioners of the said Trust shall appoint for that purpose shall be authorized to demand, collect, and recover the said rate.

The foregoing Regulation was made by the Commissioners of the Benalla Waterworks Trust this 3rd day of November, 1902.

SHIRE OF WINCHELSEA WATERWORKS TRUST.— RATING REGULATION, 1903.—No. 14.

A REGULATION of the Shire of Winchelsea Waterworks Trust, made under the Water Acts, for the purpose of imposing, levying, and receiving a rate.

In pursuance of the powers granted and conferred by the Water Acts, the Commissioners of the Shire of Winchelsea Waterworks Trust make the following Regulation:—

A rate of One shilling and sixpence in the pound sterling shall be imposed and levied on all the rateable property in the Waterworks District of the Shire of Winchelsea Waterworks Trust, according to the valuation for the time being of all lands and tenements for the municipal rate of the shire of Winchelsea in which such lands and tenements are situated, for one year, commencing on the 1st day of January, 1903, and ending on the 31st day of December, 1903; provided that the sum of Ten shillings shall be the minimum amount of rates to be paid annually by every owner or occupier of any such lands or tenements.

Such rate shall be payable and collected in two equal portions or instalments of Ninepence each, and the first portion or instalment shall be due and payable on the 1st day of January, 1903, and the second portion or instalment shall be due and payable on the 1st day of July, 1903.

Such person as the Commissioners of the Shire of Winchelsea Waterworks Trust may from time to time appoint for that purpose shall be authorized to demand and receive, collect and recover the said rate.

Passed this 3rd day of October, 1902.

WARRNAMBOOL WATERWORKS TRUST.— REGULATION.

THE Warrnambool Waterworks Trust doth hereby, pursuant to and in exercise and execution of the powers and authorities conferred on it by the Water Acts (and whose Water District has, for the purposes of the said Acts, been proclaimed an Urban District), make the Regulation following:—

The following rates and charges are those which the owners and occupiers of lands and tenements shall pay for the year 1902 in respect of water supplied by the Trust (that is to say):—

- (a) On every house or tenement, whether occupied or not, a rate of Fifteen pence for each pound sterling on the amount of the annual value, but the annual minimum amount to be paid shall be One pound sterling.
- (b) Unoccupied lands where no water is laid on shall be charged Five pounds per centum on the amount of the annual valuation.
- (c) Houses unoccupied for a period of not less than six calendar months, commencing on the 1st day of January or the 1st day of July, shall be charged two-third rates.
- (d) Tenements built and used for storage purposes only, such as bonded stores, warehouses, and wholesale stores, not being dwellings nor used in retail business, a rate of Twelve pence in the pound on the amount of the annual valuation, except in cases where the Trust shall order a meter to be used.
- (e) Private water-troughs shall be charged at the rate of Twenty shillings per annum each, except when the Trust shall order a meter to be used, in which case the minimum quantity of water to be charged for half-yearly shall be 10,000 gallons.
- (f) For water supplied by the Trust by measure, except in cases of special agreement with the Trust, or otherwise provided for in this Regulation, the rate shall be Fifteen pence per 1,000 gallons.
- (g) The rate to be charged to non-ratepayers for water supplied from stand-pipes shall be Threepence per 100 gallons; and ratepayers shall be charged for the quantity of water which, at Fifteen pence per 1,000 gallons, exceeds the amount of the assessed rate payable for lands or tenements according to their distance from such stand-pipe.
- (h) Water for gas-engines shall be charged for at the rate of Ten shillings per annum for each engine, except in cases where the Trust shall order a meter to be used.
- (i) For steam boilers the rate shall be Twelve shillings and sixpence per annum for each horse-power of each boiler, except in cases where the Trust shall order a meter to be used.
- (j) On buildings in course of erection where water is required for building purposes, the charge shall be Five shillings per 1,000 gallons, and the owner or occupier of such premises shall provide and fix the water meter and all necessary fittings for same, otherwise the owners or occupiers of such premises may, by special agreement with the Trust, pay a minimum charge of Ten shillings per centum on the total cost of the work for stone buildings, or Five shillings per cent. for wooden buildings, when a meter will not be required to be provided. Payment in either case to be made in advance.
- (k) For water supplied to shipping, the charge shall be Five shillings per 1,000 gallons, with a minimum charge of Five shillings. With paid meters, the charge shall be Two shillings per 1,000 gallons.
- (l) Supplies of water for purposes not specified herein must be paid for at such rate as the Trust shall in each case determine, and the preliminary payment at such rate must be made at the office of the Trust before a supply can be taken or used.
- (m) In the event of any dispute as to which sub-section applies to any particular case, the Trust shall have power to decide or to make a special charge.
- (n) The minimum quantity of water to be charged for in each case where water is supplied by measure for domestic and other than domestic purposes shall be the quantity which, at Fourteen pence per 1,000 gallons, equals the amount of the assessed rate for the year, which would be payable for the premises or land so supplied if supplied otherwise than by measure.
- (o) For water supplied to public gardens, parks, show grounds, baths, hospitals, or charitable institutions, the charge shall be Ninepence per 1,000 gallons, and the supply must be taken through a meter.

KOROIT WATERWORKS TRUST.—RATING REGULATION FOR YEAR 1903.

THE Chairman and Commissioners of the Koroit Waterworks Trust, the Waterworks District of which has been proclaimed an Urban District for the purposes of the Water Acts, do hereby, pursuant to and in exercise of the powers and authorities conferred by the said Acts, make the following Regulations, viz.:-

The following are the rates which the owners or occupiers of land and tenements liable to be rated within the Trust District shall pay for the year 1903:-

1. For every house or tenement of the annual value of Ten pounds sterling or under, according to the valuation for the time being of such rateable property for the municipal rate of the borough of Koroit, the sum of One pound per annum.

2. For every house or tenement above the annual value of Ten pounds sterling, the sum of Two shillings on each pound of such value.

3. An annual charge of Five shillings per head shall be made for each head of stock more than two (whether horses or cattle) kept on any premises along the line of mains; unless meters are placed on the service-pipes to such premises, in which case the provision of clause 3 of the general Regulations shall apply.

4. Such rates are hereby made payable in equal moieties on 1st January and 1st July, 1903.

Such person or persons as the Commissioners of the Koroit Waterworks Trust may from time to time appoint for that purpose shall be authorized to demand, receive, and collect the said rates.

YARAWONGA URBAN WATERWORKS TRUST.—RATING REGULATION FOR 1903.

THE Chairman and Commissioners of the Yarrawonga Urban Waterworks Trust, in pursuance of the powers conferred by the Water Acts and all other powers enabling them in this behalf, do make the following Regulation:-

Regulation for determining the rates and charges which shall be made for water supplied within the boundaries of the Yarrawonga Urban Waterworks Trust District.

1. A rate of One shilling in the pound sterling on the annual municipal value of all rateable property valued at Twenty-five pounds sterling and upwards (except in cases of special arrangements with the Trust), situate within the Waterworks District of the Yarrawonga Urban Waterworks Trust, is hereby made for the year 1903.

2. Upon properties of the annual municipal value of Thirteen pounds sterling, and not more than Twenty-four pounds sterling, a rate of One pound five shillings sterling per annum shall be payable. Upon properties valued at Twelve pounds sterling and under, a rate of Two shillings in the pound sterling shall be payable, according to the municipal value of such properties, provided that in no case shall a less rate than Twenty shillings per annum be payable in accordance with section 122 of the *Water Act 1890*.

3. On each vacant allotment or piece of land rated for the ordinary municipal rate within the Trust's District before mentioned, separately from any building, the annual rate of Ten pounds sterling per centum on the annual valuation of the same shall be payable.

4. Water supplied by measure from the works of the Trust shall be charged for at the rate of Two shillings and sixpence per 1,000 gallons up to an amount equal to that which the Trust would be entitled to receive under the municipal assessed value of any premises, and at the rate of Two shillings and sixpence per 1,000 gallons for any quantity of water used beyond such an amount aforesaid. Nevertheless it shall be competent for the Trust to make special arrangements from time to time for the supply of water by meter or otherwise.

5. For any public water-trough supplied with water by the Trust, the sum of Forty shillings per annum shall be charged, unless supplied by measurement.

6. For any steam-boiler supplied with water by the Trust (except in cases of special arrangement with the Trust), the sum of Thirty shillings per annum for each horse-power of such steam-boiler, in addition to the charge for domestic use where water is supplied for domestic purposes also. In case the charge by measure would exceed the charge per horse-power a charge by measurement shall be made.

7. Water supplied to Government Departments, cricket grounds, show yards, cattle yards, and similar properties shall be charged for by measure, provided the minimum quantity to be charged for shall not be less than Thirty shillings per annum, or the charge may be made by special arrangement with the Trust.

8. For water supplied from stand-pipe or hydrant, for each load of 200 gallons or under, the sum of Sixpence, and for each additional load *pro rata* upon the above scale.

9. For a temporary supply during the erections of new buildings, repairs, or additions, Twenty shillings per centum on the amount of contract for stonework, brickwork, or plastering, or, in the absence of a contract, of the sum paid for stonework, brickwork, or plastering, or the Trust may require a meter to be fixed, when the charge will be by measurement.

10. A minimum rate of Five shillings and a maximum rate of Forty shillings per annum shall be chargeable to persons for using water for ornamental, garden, or other like purposes, and any owner or occupier using more water than (in the opinion of the Trust or its officer) they are entitled to, the Trust may compel such owner or occupier to put on a meter, or may cut off the water supply from the premises. No water shall be used for any purpose whatever other than purely domestic use except between the hours of Seven o'clock a.m. and Eight o'clock p.m.

11. For each spray supplied with water by the Trust, used for the purpose of cooling houses, the sum of Ten shillings per annum shall be chargeable, in addition to the charges under any previous clauses of this Regulation, provided that such spray shall only be used between the hours of Seven o'clock a.m. and Eight o'clock p.m.

12. Such rates are hereby made for the year 1903, and are made payable in equal moieties half-yearly in advance, on the 1st day of January and the 1st day of July in the year, excepting those by measure, which shall be paid quarterly, or as the Trust may direct.

13. Such person or persons as the Commissioners of the Trust may from time to time appoint for that purpose shall be authorized to demand, receive, and recover the said rates.

The births of 907 children, viz., 470 boys and 437 girls, were registered in Greater Melbourne during the month of November. The number was the lowest recorded since 1881, and was 162 below the average of the month during the previous ten years, and 235 below it if allowance be made for the increase of population.

The deaths recorded in November numbered 614, viz., 329 of males and 285 of females; the births thus exceeded the deaths by 293, or only 48 per cent., as against 81 per cent. in November, 1901, and 80 per cent. according to the average. The number was, it will be noticed, the highest recorded for the month during the previous ten years, except 1898, 1899, and 1900. It was also 21 above the average of November during that period, but 19 below it, allowing for the increase of population.

To every 1,000 of the population of the district the proportion of births registered was equivalent to 29.00, and of deaths registered to 14.89 per annum, as compared respectively with averages of the same month in 1901 of 23.68 and 12.92, with averages of the month during the last ten years of 26.74 and 15.66, and with averages of the year 1901 of 24.85 and 15.09.

The highest temperature in the shade recorded at Melbourne Observatory during the month was 101.4° on the 25th, and the lowest was 45.0° on the 29th. The mean temperature of the month (61.1°) was 2.3° above the average. The greatest range of the thermometer in any one day (45.3°) took place on the 21th, and the least range (4.6°) on the 5th. The mean daily range was 23°. The highest atmospheric pressure recorded was 30.193 inches on the 23rd, and the lowest was 29.291 inches on the 12th. The mean atmospheric pressure (29.913 inches) was slightly above the average.

Rain fell on seven days, the amount being 0.93 of an inch, which was lower than in the corresponding month during any of the previous ten years, except 1894, 1895, 1896, 1897, and 1898, and .35 of an inch below the average.

The mean humidity of the month was 62.3.

Males contributed 51 per cent. and females 46 per cent. to the mortality of the month. Children under five years of age contributed 36 per cent. to that mortality, as against 23 per cent. in November, 1901; 23 per cent. in November, 1900; 26 per cent. in November, 1899; 33 per cent. in November, 1898; 32 per cent. in November, 1897; 36 per cent. in November, 1896; 33 per cent. in November, 1895; 33 per cent. in November, 1894; 38 per cent. in November, 1893; and 36 per cent. in November, 1892.

The deaths of infants under twelve months numbered 158, as compared with 85 in November, 1901. The rate of infantile mortality was 174 per 1,000 births registered in the month under review, as compared with 88 in November, 1901; 117 in November, 1900; 174 in November, 1899; 203 in November, 1898; 134 in November, 1897; 165 in November, 1896; 127 in November, 1895; 15 in November, 1894; 147 in November, 1893; and 112 in November, 1892.

Fifty-seven persons—as against 57 in November, 1901—whose deaths were recorded during the month had attained or passed the age of 75 years. Of these, a caretaker and a female, each aged 75, died of cancer; two females, each aged 75, of paraplegia and valvular disease of the heart respectively; a male of no occupation, aged 75, of syncope; a dog inspector and a labourer, each aged 75, of heart disease; four females, each aged 76, of cancer, syncope, heart disease, and pleurisy respectively; a farmer, aged 77, of valvular disease of the heart; two gentlemen and a female, each aged 77, of aneurism, heart disease, and obstruction of bowels respectively; a farmer, aged 78, of paralysis; a female, aged 78, of bronchitis; a storeman, aged 78, of Bright's disease; two females, each aged 78, of gangrene of foot and abscess respectively; a joiner, aged 79, of dysentery; a female, aged 79, of cancer; a carpenter, aged 79, of apoplexy; a grocer, aged 79, of softening of the brain; two females, each aged 80, of cancer and insanity respectively; an accountant, aged 80, of heart disease; three females, each aged 81, of diarrhoea, cancer, and heart disease respectively; a cooper, aged 81, of jaundice; an engineer, aged 81, of lupus; a merchant, aged 82, of pericarditis; a female, aged 83, of heart disease; a station hand and a labourer, each aged 84, of apoplexy; a carpenter and a male of no occupation, each aged 84, of syncope; a gentleman, aged 84, of inflammation of the bowels; a female, aged 85, of pneumonia; another, aged 86, of congestion of the brain; another, aged 75, a hat-maker and a seaman, each aged 76, a dressmaker, aged 78, a seaman, aged 79, a female, aged 80, a labourer, a male of no occupation, and two females, each aged 83, a male of no occupation and a female, each aged 85, a gentleman and a female, each aged 86, a female, aged 88, and a gentleman, aged 90, of old age.

Twenty-eight of the deaths recorded during the month—as compared with 25 in November, 1901—were from external causes, of which 19 were set down to accident, 5 to homicide, and 4 to suicide. The following are the particulars of the accidental deaths—A seaman, aged 19, a labourer, aged 42, and a female, aged 18, were passed over by railway trains; a male child, aged 3, by a cart; a labourer, aged 32, died of injuries, the result of a fall from a bicycle; a plumber, aged 66, of injuries, consequent on a fall from a railway platform; two boys, aged 11 and 14 respectively, of injuries caused by falling from a tree; a storeman, aged 20, of injuries, consequent on falling out of a basket; a groom, aged 22, of gunshot wounds; two male children, aged 1 and 7 respectively, and a girl, aged 11, of burns; two female children, aged 4 and 7 months respectively, of heat apoplexy; a male of occupation unknown, aged 45, of strychnine poisoning; a boy, aged 13, was drowned in the Saltwater River; a cook, aged 86, was suffocated by food; and a new-born male infant, at birth. The homicidal deaths were those of a boy, aged 8, and a female, aged 43, who were shot; a female, aged 55, who was suffocated; a railway employé, aged 34, who was stabbed, a verdict of wilful murder being returned in the three former cases, and of manslaughter in the latter; and a female child, aged 3 months, who was suffocated (probably murdered). The suicidal deaths were those of a merchant, aged 51, who shot himself; a servant, aged 24, who poisoned herself with phosphorus; a carpenter, aged 49, who hanged himself; and a female, aged 37, who threw herself in front of a passing lorry.

The deaths of children under five years of age numbered 220, of which 124, or 56 per cent., were of males, and 96, or 44 per cent., were of females. Of those who died, 158 were under one year of age, 32 were between one and two, 13 were between two and three, 12 were between three and four, and 5 were between four and five.

The persons who died at a more advanced age than five years numbered 394. Of these 205, or 52 per cent., were males, and 189, or 48 per cent., were females: 11 were between five and ten, 14 were between ten and fifteen, 13 were between fifteen and twenty, 17 were between twenty and twenty-five, 20 were between twenty-five and thirty, 24 were between thirty and thirty-five, 34 were between thirty-five and forty, 31 were between forty and forty-five, 25 were between forty-five and fifty, 22 were between fifty and fifty-five, 25 were between fifty-five and sixty, 25 were between sixty and sixty-five, 33 were between sixty-five and seventy, 43 were between seventy and seventy-five, 29 were between seventy-five and eighty, 20 were between eighty and eighty-five, 7 were between eighty-five and ninety, and one at the age of ninety.

N.B.—The figures in parentheses represent the numbers in the corresponding month of the preceding year.

As compared with the corresponding month of the preceding year, there was an increase of 9 deaths under zymotic, 8 under constitutional, 70 under local diseases, 3 under the head of violence, and 7 under ill-defined causes; whilst there was a decrease of 7 under dietic diseases. Under the zymotic class, deaths from measles rose from nil to 3, and those from diarrhoeal diseases from 4 to 20; whilst those from influenza fell from 5 to 1, whooping-cough from 16 to 3, and diphtheria from 7 to 3. Under the constitutional class, deaths from cancer rose from 25 to 36, and those from tubercular meningitis from 8 to 12, whilst those from rheumatism fell from 6 to 1, and those from phthisis from 63 to 61. In the local class, deaths from diseases of the respiratory system increased by 9, those from diseases of the digestive system by 77 (chiefly enteritis), those from diseases of the organs of generation by 6, and those from diseases of the integumentary system by 4; on the other hand, deaths from diseases of the circulatory system diminished by 11, and those from diseases of the urinary system by 14.

The following is a statement of the deaths set down to diphtheria, typhoid fever, and tubercular diseases in each month of the years 1897 to 1901, and in each of the first eleven months of 1902, from which may be traced the rise and fall of the mortality at various periods of the year. It will be noticed that the mortality from typhoid fever usually attains its maximum in March, and is at a minimum from July to November.

NOTE.—During the third quarter of the current year the number of births was 8,024, or 71 less, and the number of deaths 4,281, or 161 more than in the corresponding quarter of the preceding year. The natural increase was thus 3,743, or 232 less than in the third quarter of 1901, and 218 less than in that of 1900.

The recorded arrivals by sea during the quarter numbered 16,580, and the recorded departures 19,734, the former being

1,487 less, but the latter 1,508 more than in the previous corresponding quarter. The net recorded loss by emigration was thus 3,154, as against a recorded loss of 159 in the third quarter of 1901, and a recorded gain of 583 in that of 1900. The allowance for unrecorded departures, however, increases the total estimated loss during the quarter to 4,597, consisting of 2,464 males and 2,133 females, as shown in the table.

The total recorded increase of population was 589, as against recorded increases of 3,816 and 4,552 in the corresponding quarters of the two preceding years. After allowing for unrecorded departures, however, the net loss for the quarter amounted to 854 persons, of whom 781 were males and 73 females.

The records regarding the apparent origin or destination of migrants show a net loss of 3,444 to other parts of the Commonwealth, but a gain of 290 from other countries. The former comprised a net loss of 448 to New South Wales, of 5 to Queensland, of 15 to South Australia, of 2,203 to Western Australia, and of 773 to Tasmania. The latter resulted from a net gain of 21 from the South Seas, of 480 from the United Kingdom, of 163 from South Africa, and of 108 from foreign ports, less a net loss of 301 to New Zealand, and of 181 to other British Dominions.

The emigration to each of the adjoining States and New Zealand during the quarter exceeded for the first time for many years the immigration, the total net loss during the quarter amounting to 3,745 persons, of whom the greater number left for Western Australia. The gain from the United Kingdom is probably due to the return of the visitors to the Coronation. During the quarter 1,043 officers and men of the Victorian Battalions of the Commonwealth Horse returned from South Africa, but, despite the slightly relaxed restrictions still imposed on immigrants, nearly 600 "permits" were issued, and there was a net emigration of 880 civilians, some of whom were doubtless from the neighbouring States.

The issue of this licence shall not prevent the land comprised therein, or any part or parts thereof, being sold, leased, licensed, alienated, or dealt with under any of the provisions of the *Land Acts*, except under the 187th section of the *Land Act 1901*, or being resumed by order of the Governor or Administrator of the Government of Victoria, with the advice of the Executive Council, for any of the purposes for which land may be reserved under section 10 of the *Land Act 1901*, or for mining purposes.

2. In case the said land, or any part thereof, should be sold, leased, licensed, alienated, dealt with, or resumed as aforesaid, the licensee shall not be entitled to any compensation other than that which the responsible Minister of the Crown for the time being administering the *Land Acts* may think fit.

3. This licence is subject to the rights of the holders of miners' rights or of mining leases now issued or hereafter to be issued to enter upon the allotment hereby licensed, and to search for gold, and to mine thereon, and to erect and occupy mining plant and machinery, without making any compensation to the licensee, his executors, administrators, or assigns, for surface or other damage.

4. Subject to these conditions, the licensee shall be entitled to use the land for the purpose for which this licence has been granted, until such land, or any part thereof, has been sold, leased, licensed, alienated, dealt with, or resumed as aforesaid, and thereupon all the interest of the licensee therein shall cease and be determined.

6. The price must include delivery at the stations, and all charges except the bags, which will remain the property of the contractor. At stations where the bags can be once emptied the contractor will be required to remove them when delivery is taken. At other stations, notice will be sent to the contractor when the bags are empty. The successful tenderer will be required to enter into a bond for the sum of £5 per horse per station, based on the estimated quarterly consumption of 8 centals of oats, 1 of bran, 12 of hay, and 3 of straw per horse, or thereabouts, within ten days after the acceptance is notified. Two approved sureties are required for contracts where the sum stated in the bond is £50 and upwards, and one surety where the sum stated is under £50.

CONDITIONS OF CONTRACT.

1. The hay to be good, sound, and sweet, and properly trussed except when otherwise specified in the contract; the straw to be wheaten or oat, and both to be in all respects of the best quality; oats, white or Algerian (Victorian grown), of the best description, full kernel, clean, and free from wild oats or other objectionable seeds; bran to be sound and sweet, and of the best description; chaff to be made from oat hay of the best quality. As much forage as can be stored at any station where the storage is small will, for the convenience of the contractor, be ordered at one time.

2. The quantities stated in the schedule are only approximate, and the Government may draw either more or less than those mentioned. Should new telegraph stations be formed or additional horses be required at any station, the contractor will be required to supply the extra forage. Should the additional number of horses, however, exceed two, the contractor may, if he desires it, terminate the contract by supplying at once the whole quantity due at the station.

3. Notwithstanding anything contained in the preceding condition, the contractors for the supply to the Police Depot may be called upon to supply any Government Departments within a radius of six miles from Melbourne, for which no contracts have been taken, and also forage for any extra horses that may be at any time stabled at the depot for police purposes, at the same rates.

4. Should forage duly ordered under these contracts not be delivered within forty-eight hours of the time specified in the order for delivery, it will be competent for the department to purchase the same at the risk of the contractor, from whose account any expense over and above the contract price is to be deducted.

5. In the event of a difference of opinion between the contractor and the officer receiving the forage as to the quality of the same, it is to be decided by a board of survey, composed of persons named by the head of the department ordering the supply, and the decision of the Board is to be considered final.

6. If the Board shall decide that the forage is not of proper quality, it must be immediately replaced, failing which it will be procured elsewhere, and the extra cost, if any, will be charged as in clause 4.

7. When a board of survey cannot be conveniently assembled, or when, from some other cause, injury would accrue to either party by waiting for a board of survey, the officer in charge will have the power to reject such supplies as are obviously of inferior quality, but he will be responsible to the Government for so doing; and the contractor must take back the rejected forage, and supply good in its stead, failing which it will be obtained by the officer requiring it, and the expense will be charged as in clause 4.

8. A refusal to execute orders, irregularity in the quantity or quality of the forage, or delay in delivering or replacing it when required, will subject the contractor, upon report from the Tender Board, to such mulct, not exceeding £20, as the Treasurer of the State for the time being may direct. It will also be in the power of the said Treasurer, upon such refusal, irregularity, or delay, to terminate the contract forthwith.

9. Contractors are not at liberty to transfer their contracts under cover of power of attorney, coupled with an interest or otherwise; and no such transfer will be recognised by the Government.

10. Under no circumstances will a contractor be permitted to abandon his contract, and in the event of his failing to carry on his contract he will be held liable for any loss which the Government may sustain in consequence of such failure. In the event of a station being discontinued or any change in the supplies required, the contractor will receive the earliest possible intimation.

11. The contracts entered into under this notice are not to be considered as broken, infringed, or vitiated by the purchase by any Department of forage grown at any Government establishment.

BY-LAWS OF THE ARARAT DISTRICT HOSPITAL AND BENEVOLENT ASYLUM.

OBJECT.

1. The institution will afford gratuitously surgical and medical aid to any poor person requiring the same; will relieve the infirm, disabled, and destitute, and afford a home to those who require and are deserving of it; giving also out-door relief to families and individuals in temporary distress. Any person who shall be admitted and shall be found able to pay, will be required to do so. Paying patients will be admitted to the hospital under certain conditions and in accordance with the by-laws.

GOVERNORS AND CONTRIBUTORS.

2. Any personal contributor of £20 or more, in one sum, shall be a life governor, with the privilege of voting personally or by post at all meetings of contributors. Any one person nominated by any society or public corporate body which shall contribute the sum of £30 or upwards in one sum, in any one year, shall be a governor for five years, with the privilege of voting personally or by post at all meetings of contributors. Any one executor to a bequest of £30 or upwards in one sum shall be a governor for a period of five years, with the privilege of voting personally or by post at all meetings of contributors. Any person collecting £30 or upwards shall be a governor for five years, with the privilege of voting personally or by post at all meetings of contributors. The committee of management shall have power to add to the list of life governors such persons as it may deem expedient for special services rendered to the institution. At all meetings of contributors the scale of voting shall be as follows:—Annual contributors of £1 and under £5, one vote; annual contributors of £5 and under £10, two votes; annual contributors of £10 and upwards, three votes. Life governors and governors shall have one vote as such, in addition to any vote or votes to which annual subscriptions may entitle them; always provided that the total number of votes exercised by any life governor or governor, or on behalf of any public or corporate body, shall not exceed three. It shall be competent for contributors to exercise their votes by post; such votes to be in the hands of the secretary prior to the advertised time of the meeting of contributors.

3. Life governors and governors shall have the same privilege in respect of recommending patients as contributors, and shall be eligible for election as members of committee or to any honorary office.

MEETINGS OF CONTRIBUTORS.

4. The annual meeting of contributors shall be held on the last Thursday in the month of July in every year, when the president, vice-president, treasurer, one-third of the committee of management, two auditors, and the honorary medical officers shall be elected in accordance with the Act, and the committee of management shall submit a general report of the affairs of the hospital, together with the treasurer's financial statement for the past year, duly audited, and any other business transacted, ten to form a quorum. If no quorum be present within half-an-hour of the time named, the meeting shall stand adjourned to the same day and hour of the following week. Should there not then be a quorum present the retiring officers and members of the committee of management shall continue in office till the next annual meeting.

5. Special meetings of contributors shall be convened by the secretary when directed by the committee, or on the written application of ten contributors of at least £1 each; the object of such special meeting to be stated in the advertisement, and he shall also give special notice to each member of the committee of such meetings.

6. At all meetings of the contributors and of the committee the chairman may exercise a deliberative vote, and in the case of an equal division of votes he shall in addition possess a casting vote.

7. No person shall be qualified to vote at any meeting unless he shall have been a contributor for the space of at least one month previous to such meeting; provided always that a contributor for the preceding year shall be entitled to vote at any meeting held prior to 30th September, and at any subsequent meeting by payment of his contribution for the then current year at any time before such meeting.

MODE OF ELECTION.

8. At the annual elections held under these by-laws the president for the time being shall be the returning officer, and shall have power to appoint a deputy to act in his behalf, such returning officer or his deputy to have full power to give a casting vote if necessary. Not less than fourteen clear days before any election held under these by-laws the returning officer or his deputy shall give public notice by advertisement in some newspaper generally circulating in the district, and by such notice shall require every candidate at such election to notify his candidature to the returning officer or his deputy, at such place and at such time as may be appointed, not being less than seven days after the time of giving such notice, and named therein, in writing, under his hand, and signed by two contributors nominating him, and by himself or his agent assenting to such nomination. Where, at the expiration of the time fixed for receiving nominations of candidates, there are not more candidates than there are vacancies in each office respectively, the returning officer or his deputy shall declare such candidates duly elected. If at the expiration of the time limited for the nomination of candidates the number of candidates exceeds the number of officers and members of committee to be elected, the returning officer or his deputy shall cause ballot-papers to be printed with the names of all the candidates in full thereon, and shall notify such nomination in some newspaper circulating in

the district. Any candidate duly nominated desirous to retire from such candidature may do so not later than four clear days before the day fixed for the annual election by forwarding to the returning officer or his deputy a paper signed by him stating that he retires from such election.

THE COMMITTEE.

9. The institution shall be governed by a general committee, consisting of the president, vice-president, treasurer, and twelve contributors of £1 and upwards. No person being a paid officer or servant of the institution shall be a member of committee. No member of committee shall vote on any question in which he is personally interested.

10. The committee shall direct the business of the institution, enter into contracts for the supply of provisions and articles for the use of the institution, and direct payment to be made for the same; and appoint and discharge all paid officers of the institution.

MEETINGS.

11. The committee shall meet for general business once, at least, in each month at such time and place as it may from time to time appoint; and for special business on the requisition of five members, four to form a quorum. In the absence of the president, or vice-president, one of the members present shall be elected to act as chairman.

12. All meetings in connexion with the institution shall be open to subscribers and to the representatives of the press, provided that no person present at committee meetings, who is not a member of committee, shall interfere or take any part in the proceedings.

VISITING COMMITTEE.

13. The visiting committee, consisting of three members of the managing committee, and the president, vice-president, and treasurer, shall have access to the institution at all times; and shall visit the institution at least once a week for the purpose of inspecting the arrangements thereof, and dealing with all applications. They shall make an entry in a book, to be kept for the purpose, of any remarks or suggestions they may deem necessary; and such book shall be laid before the general committee at each meeting.

TREASURER.

14. The treasurer shall receive all money on behalf of the institution, and deposit the same within 24 hours in such bank or banks as the committee of management shall direct, to the credit of the institution. He shall pay all accounts, after the same have been signed by the chairman of the meeting as approved by the committee, by cheques on the bank or banks, which shall be countersigned by the president, or vice-president, and secretary. He shall also keep an account of all money received and paid by him, and report the same at least once a month to a meeting of the committee.

SECRETARY AND COLLECTOR.

15. The secretary and collector shall keep the minutes, accounts, and records of the institution, compile all reports, conduct the correspondence, attend all meetings, and bring all business before the same; carry out all resolutions agreed to, and perform all clerical duties that may be ordered by the committee.

16. He shall convene the annual general meeting in the month of July in each year, at such time and place as may be fixed by the committee, by advertisement in the local papers, at least seven days previous to the meeting.

17. He shall convene special meetings of contributors in the same manner, when directed by the committee, or on the written application of ten contributors of at least £1 each; the object of such special meeting to be stated in the advertisement, and he shall also give special notice to each member of the committee of such meetings.

18. He shall collect subscriptions and all moneys due to the institution, give receipts for the same, furnish admission orders, according to amount of subscription, pay to the treasurer, at least once in every week, all moneys he may have received, and render an account of the same. He shall also furnish a guarantee through some approved company.

19. He shall be in attendance at the institution at the meetings of the visiting committee, and shall at any time afford any member of the committee desiring to do so an opportunity of inspecting the books of the hospital.

AUDITORS.

21. The auditors shall at the end of each year examine the treasurer's annual statement, with all accounts, vouchers, and documents relating thereto, and shall report thereon to the annual general meeting.

HONORARY SURGEONS.

22. The honorary medical officers shall consist of legally qualified medical practitioners, who shall be elected in the same way as members of committee. They shall have access to the institution at all times; they shall record their visits in a book to be provided for that purpose, and enter any remarks they may deem necessary; they shall, in conjunction with the resident surgeon, perform all capital surgical operations as they may arrange among themselves, or in alphabetical order; but no such operation shall be performed without a previous consultation of as many of the medical staff as can be obtained, except in cases of emergency; and they shall regularly consult in all cases of importance or protracted continuance in the institution.

THE STAFF.

23. The staff of the hospital shall consist of a resident surgeon, a matron, and such number of trained nurses, probationers, and other servants as may be from time to time determined by the committee.

RESIDENT SURGEON.

24. The resident surgeon shall be a legally qualified medical practitioner, who shall reside on the premises, and who shall not be absent therefrom for any lengthened period without the permission of the managing committee. He shall not be allowed to engage in private practice, under any circumstances, except by express authority of the committee. He shall hold office under the direction of the committee, and one month's notice on either side shall terminate the period of his engagement.

25. He shall receive the certificates from applicants for admission, examine the nature of their cases, decide on their fitness for admission, either for in-door or out-door treatment, and report the same to the visiting committee; and shall also discharge all hospital patients as soon as he considers them fit to be discharged.

26. He shall have charge of all inmates in the institution, and their treatment; but in cases of difficulty or danger, or long continuance in the hospital, he shall consult the honorary surgeons and report to the committee.

27. He shall superintend and control the nurses and servants of the institution, and in case of neglect of duty or insubordination he shall have power to suspend any of them, and shall immediately report thereon to the visiting committee.

28. He shall keep such accounts respecting the inmates as the committee may direct, in books to be kept for that purpose, and furnish a monthly report to the managing committee.

29. He shall have charge of all surgical instruments, drugs, and chemicals, and shall carefully examine them, both as to quality and quantity, and report any defects, in either respect, to the managing committee, and shall make an inventory of the same in a book to be kept for the purpose, and keep an account of the receipt and expenditure or loss and breakage of such instruments, drugs, and chemicals. In the absence of a dispenser, he shall perform such duties as would devolve on that officer.

30. He shall enter regularly, in books to be kept for that purpose, the names of the inmates as they are admitted or discharged, and note the nature and history of their diseases while under treatment, and shall receive all money and other property belonging to inmates, and shall account for the same to the committee.

31. He shall accompany the honorary surgeons through the wards, and report to them the state of the patients. He shall also visit each patient every morning and evening, and inquire if the treatment prescribed has been attended to, and if any cause of complaint exists he shall immediately remove the same or report it to the committee at its next meeting.

32. He shall perform, or assist in performing (as provided by Rule 22) all surgical operations; shall make all *post-mortem* examinations, and shall keep the key of the dead-house. He shall give due notice to the honorary medical officers on all occasions when a consultation is to be held or an operation is to be performed; but in all cases of emergency he shall act to the best of his judgment.

MATRON.

33. The matron shall be a nurse of at least five years' standing and registered by the Victorian Trained Nurses' Association.

34. She shall be subject to the same regulations respecting living in the house and absence therefrom as the resident surgeon; she shall see that the female servants do their duty, and shall report any neglect or disobedience of orders on their part to the resident surgeon.

35. She shall visit each ward daily, and shall see that the beds, linen, and clothes of the patients are clean and in good order, and shall cause such of the bedding, &c., as require to be replaced by others and thoroughly cleansed and repaired where necessary, and furnish an inventory of goods belonging to the department to the resident surgeon.

36. She shall superintend the cooking of all food for the inmates, and shall generally discharge the duties of matron as shall be directed by the committee.

PUPIL NURSES.

37. A limited number of nurse pupils, as may be determined upon by the committee of management, may be received into the hospital from time to time, who shall be trained to become nurses, competent to fulfil all duties necessary in a hospital or private household, and shall be subject to the same discipline as the regular staff.

38. Applicants for training must be over twenty and under 35 years of age, be able to read and write, and do simple arithmetic correctly.

39. Nurse pupils shall, before entering the institution, pay a premium of £3 3s., which shall be returned if at the expiration of three months the candidate be deemed unsuitable.

40. If a pupil nurse be discharged, or fail to complete her probation, the premium paid shall in such case be forfeited.

41. For the first three months of her probation the pupil shall not receive any payment; but from the end of that term she may receive payment at the rate of £12 for the first year, thereafter up to two years at the rate of £18 per annum, and thereafter at the rate of £24 per annum, which shall be the maximum for probationers.

42. Nurses must provide their own uniform, books, &c.

43. During the period of training the pupils shall receive instruction from the matron or other properly qualified nurse, as the resident surgeon may direct, subject to the approval of the general committee, in ward work and general nursing, according to the schedule of general study prescribed by the Victorian Trained Nurses' Association.

44. The pupils shall also receive instruction from the resident surgeon in elementary anatomy and physiology, and general, medical, and surgical nursing, as prescribed by the same association.

45. During the course of study the pupils shall be examined in anatomy and physiology by the resident surgeon, in conjunction with the honorary medical officers.

46. After a period of at least three years the resident surgeon may certify that the pupil has completed the prescribed course of study, and has passed the necessary examinations in anatomy and physiology and is therefore eligible for the final nursing examination of the Victorian Trained Nurses' Association.

SERVANTS.

47. The servants shall live in the institution, and shall not leave it without the permission of the resident surgeon. They shall obey the orders of the said officer, be regular in their attendance, behave with tenderness to all inmates, and with civility and respect to strangers.

48. They shall pay great attention to cleanliness personally, and to all things intrusted to their charge; particularly to the bedding of the inmates, and have it changed as often as may be necessary, taking care that it is thoroughly dried and aired.

49. They shall administer to the inmates the medicines and diet at the times and in the manner directed by the resident surgeon, and they shall not permit the inmates to take anything which is not prescribed, and shall be careful to explain to them the instructions of the said officer; they shall watch attentively the state and symptoms of the patients and report the same to the resident surgeon.

50. They shall not permit inmates to receive from visitors medicines, victuals, tobacco, or liquor of any kind, nor allow any portion of the medicines, diet, or any other things to be removed from the wards by the inmates or visitors without an order from the resident surgeon.

51. They shall be careful to collect and carry to the dispensary all empty phials, gallipots, &c., and shall attend at the dispensary at the time appointed to receive medicines and instructions.

52. They shall not admit any stranger without permission of the resident surgeon, except during the hours appointed for that purpose.

53. They shall be obedient to the regulations of the institution, and shall report immediately to the resident surgeon any impropriety of conduct, or infringement of the rules, by any inmate, visitor, or other person.

54. Accidents and such cases as may be deemed of decided emergency by the medical officer in attendance may be received into the hospital at any time; and in ordinary cases applications shall be dealt with only on Mondays, Thursdays, and Saturdays at Twelve o'clock.

55. No female for the purpose of confinement, insane person, person affected with syphilis or any infectious disease, or person who, in the opinion of the medical officer in attendance, is unfit to be an inmate, shall be received under any circumstances.

PATIENTS.

56. The patients shall conduct themselves in an orderly manner, and shall strictly observe all the directions of the resident surgeon and nurses, take their medicines and diet at the time directed, and shall not take any other than those prescribed; neither shall they conceal or put away any portion thereof.

57. They shall not leave their ward and go into another ward, nor leave the house, nor remain out for a longer time than may be granted, nor introduce visitors, nor receive medicines, victuals, liquors, tobacco, or any other thing; nor shall they smoke, without the express leave of the resident surgeon.

58. They shall not gamble, spit on the floor, deface or injure any part of the ward, furniture, bedding, clothing, books, or periodicals; nor sing, blaspheme, or use rude or indecent language.

59. Any patient having any cause of complaint, shall make the same known to the resident surgeon or visiting committee, whose duty it shall be to remedy the same or report it to the committee at its next meeting.

60. Patients judged by the resident surgeon as able to assist in the work of the institution shall, at his request, so employ themselves.

61. Patients shall not sit up after Eight o'clock in the winter nor Nine o'clock in the summer, and all patients considered by the resident surgeon able to do so, shall rise at Seven o'clock in the summer and Eight o'clock in the winter.

62. Patients receiving out-door relief must attend at the institution on Mondays, Thursdays, and Saturdays, at half-past Eleven o'clock a.m., and must observe the rules of the institution.

63. All property found on inmates who may die will be appropriated to defray the expenses of their maintenance and burial; the residue, if any, to be handed over to their legal representatives.

64. No person is allowed to give any fee, reward, or gratuity to any servant or other person employed in the hospital.

65. Visitors are admitted only on Wednesdays and Sundays, between the hours of Two and Five o'clock in the afternoon, except by a special order from a member of the managing committee or resident surgeon; and no visitor is allowed to remain more than one hour, except officiating ministers of religion, who may visit inmates at any time; but all visitors must retire when requested to do so.

66. Visitors shall not give or leave with any inmate, medicine, victuals, tobacco, or liquor of any kind, nor any other thing, without the permission of the resident surgeon; nor interfere with the servants, or disturb the inmates by loud talking or unnecessary noise.

67. Any visitor or inmate violating any of the rules of the institution, or behaving with impropriety, will be compelled to retire or be dismissed, and will not be re-admitted at any time without special leave from the visiting committee.

68. Any servant or other person in any way connected with the institution (except in so far as is provided for in the tenth rule) who shall receive directly or indirectly any fee, reward, or gratuity, shall, be immediately disqualified and dismissed, and shall not be permitted to hold any office or appointment in future.

PAYING PATIENTS.

69. Paying patients may be admitted under exceptional circumstances provided beds are not all occupied by ordinary patients.

70. Applications for admission as paying patients shall be signed by one of the honorary medical officers, or by one of the members of the committee, who shall satisfy himself as to the merits of the case.

71. Charge of admission shall be fixed at £4 4s. per week or such less sum as the visiting committee shall decide, subject to the approval of the general committee, which may increase or alter the same.

72. Paying patients shall receive the same treatment as ordinary patients, and they shall abide by the same rules.

73. If it should be found that out-door patients are able to pay, then such charges shall be fixed by two of the visiting committee, subject to approval of general committee.

OUT-DOOR RELIEF FOR BENEVOLENT CASES.

74. In giving relief, the committee shall be guided by the following fundamental rules:—

(a) To give relief only after interview and due inquiry.

(b) To give relief strictly in accordance with the recommendations of the visiting committee.

(c) Not to continue assistance longer than necessary.

75. The visiting committee shall act as an emergency committee, and the Secretary shall give aid to any applicant presenting an order from any two members of such committee.

76. All orders for relief shall be given by the Secretary, on the contractor, in accordance with the recommendations of the visiting committee. 4942
