NEW DESIGNS FOR SILVER COINS.

BY THE KING,
A PROCLAMATION.

EDWARD R. & I.

WHEREAS under section eleven of the *Coinage Act 1870*, We have power, with the advice of Our Privy Council, from time to time by proclamation to determine the design for any coin:

And whereas it appears to Us desirable to determine new designs for the silver coins specified in this Proclamation, being silver coins mentioned in the First Schedule to the *Coinage Act 1870*:

We, therefore, in pursuance of the said enactment and of all other powers enabling Us in that behalf, do hereby, by and with the advice of Our Privy Council, proclaim, direct, and ordain as follows:—

1. The designs for the said silver coins shall be as follows:—

- (1) *Crown*.—Every crown shall have for the obverse impression Our effigy with the inscription, "EDWARDUS VII DEI GRA: BRIT: OMN: REX FID: DEF: IND: IMP:" and for the reverse the image of Saint George armed, sitting on horseback, attacking the dragon with a sword, and a broken spear upon the ground, and the date of the year, and on the edge of the piece in raised letters, "DEUS ET FUTAMEN ANNO REGNI," the year of the reign being in Roman numeral letters.
- (2) *Half-Crown*.—Every half-crown shall have for the obverse impression the aforesaid effigy, with the inscription, "EDWARDUS VII DEI GRA: BRIT: OMN: REX:" and for the reverse the Ensigns Armorial of the United Kingdom contained in a shield surmounted by the Royal Crown and surrounded by the Garter bearing the motto, "HONI SOIT QUI MAL Y PENSE," with the inscription, "FID: DEF: IND: IMP:" together with the words "HALF CROWN" and the date of the year, with a graining upon the edge.

- (3) *Florin*.—Every florin shall have the same obverse impression as the half-crown, with the inscription, "EDWARDUS VII D.G. BRIT: OMN: REX F.D. IND: IMP:" and for the reverse the figure of Britannia standing upon the prow of a vessel, her right hand grasping a trident, and her left resting on a shield, with the words "ONE FLORIN TWO SHILLINGS" and the date of the year, with a graining upon the edge.
- (4) *Shilling*.—Every shilling shall have the same obverse impression and inscription as the half-crown, and for the reverse, Our Royal Crest with the date of the year placed across the Crest, with the inscription, "FID: DEF: IND: IMP:" together with the words "ONE SHILLING," with a graining upon the edge.
- (5) *Sixpence*.—Every sixpence shall have the same obverse impression and inscription as the crown, and for the reverse the words "SIX PENCE" placed in the centre of the piece, having an olive branch on one side and an oak branch on the other, surmounted by the Royal Crown, and the date of the year between and below the branches, with a graining upon the edge.
- (6) *Silver Fourpence, Threepence, Twopence, and Penny*.—Every silver fourpence, threepence, twopence, and penny shall have for the obverse impression Our aforesaid effigy, with the inscription, "EDWARDUS VII D.G. BRIT: OMN: REX F.D. IND: IMP:" and for the reverse the respective figures "4," "3," "2," "1" (according to the denomination or value of the piece) in the centre, with the date of the year placed across the figure, and encircled with an oak wreath surmounted by the Royal Crown, with a plain edge.

Given at Our Court at *St. James's*, this Thirteenth day of *January*, in the year of our Lord One thousand nine hundred and two, and in the first year of Our Reign.

WEDNESDAY, THE 16TH DAY OF APRIL, 1902, as a Bank Half-Holiday, from the hour of Twelve o'clock noon, at Wodonga;

WEDNESDAY, THE 23RD DAY OF APRIL, 1902, as a Public Holiday throughout the Shire of Healesville, and as a Bank Half-Holiday, from the hour of Twelve o'clock noon, at Yea;

TUESDAY, THE 29TH DAY OF APRIL, WEDNESDAY, THE 30TH DAY OF APRIL, AND THURSDAY, THE 1ST DAY OF MAY, 1902, as Public Half-Holidays, from the hour of Twelve o'clock noon on each day, throughout the Town of Warrnambool.*

SMALL-POX ON THE S.S. "INDRADEVI."

WHEREAS by the *Health Act 1890* it is amongst other things provided that in any emergency or sudden necessity with respect to any vessel arriving in Victoria and having any infectious or contagious disease on board, or on board of which any such infectious or contagious disease may have appeared in the course of the voyage, the Board of Public Health may take all necessary steps to prevent infection or contagion until the issue or refusal of an Order in Council under the provisions of section 165 of the said Act: And whereas the steam-ship or vessel *Indradevi* has arrived in Victorian waters, and has on board a case of the contagious disease small-pox: And whereas it is expedient to make an order to prevent, as far as possible, the spread of such contagious disease in Victoria: And whereas it is also enacted by such Act that all the powers, rights, and authorities vested in the above-named Board shall, whenever he deems fit, be exercisable by the Minister: Now therefore I, the Minister of Health for the State of Victoria, do hereby order and direct that, until the issue or refusal of an Order in Council as aforesaid, and in order to prevent infection or contagion, the said vessel shall be detained and anchored off the Quarantine Station at Point Nepean, or at the Outer Anchorage off Williamstown, and shall fly and keep flying the yellow flag at the mainmast-head; and do further direct that no person other than the passengers for Victoria, unless directed to do so by the Health Officer or other officer in charge on behalf of the said Board, nor any article, cargo, goods, or letters, shall leave the said vessel, nor be taken, or allowed or suffered to be taken and removed from her, nor shall any boat put off from the said vessel, except only that her mails, cargo, and passengers' luggage for Victoria may be discharged into lighters, and may, after careful disinfection under the supervision of the Health Officer, be afterwards conveyed to shore under his directions; and, further, that cargo, provisions, luggage, and mails may be slung or hoisted on board the said vessel under such conditions as the Health Officer may direct, and under his supervision; and, further, that no person except the Medical Inspector or Health Officer or person authorized by either of such officers necessarily employed in fumigating or discharging cargo shall be permitted to board or approach the said vessel, nor shall any one remain unnecessarily in her vicinity; and, further, that all persons engaged in conveying any cargo, passengers' luggage, provisions, or mails to or from the said vessel shall immediately afterwards, together with their clothing, be fumigated and disinfected to the satisfaction of the Health Officer; and, further, that the said vessel and all persons and things on board of her shall be detained in quarantine until severally released by the Health Officer.

This Order shall be deemed to have been in force on and since 2nd April, 1902.

Factories and Shops Acts.

IN compliance with an application in writing under the provisions of the Factories and Shops Acts, and after due inquiry, I, the responsible Minister for the time being administering the Factories and Shops Acts, do hereby suspend the operation of the first clause of section 30 of the *Factories and Shops Act 1890*, as re-enacted by the *Factories and Shops Act 1896*, in the

FACTORY OR WORK-ROOMS OF JOHN CONNELL AND CO. PROPRIETORS, LTD., TEA-PACKING DEPARTMENT, BOURKE-STREET, MELBOURNE,

for a period of four weeks from the 1st April, 1902, upon the following express conditions, that is to say:—

1. That no person or persons shall employ in the said factory or work-rooms more than fifteen females for more than forty-eight hours in any one week, and that the said fifteen females shall not be employed for more than fifty-seven hours in any one week, nor for more than eleven hours in any one day, in preparing or manufacturing articles for trade or sale.
2. That each female so employed shall receive not less than eight shillings per week for each week during which she works overtime, and, in addition, each wage-worker shall be paid for such overtime at the rate of time and a half; and each piece-worker shall be paid three pence per hour for overtime in addition to ordinary earnings by piece-work.

4. That none of such females shall be so employed for more than forty-eight hours in any one week without their consent.
5. That a copy of this Order be kept conspicuously and continually posted in such factory or work-rooms for the information of all concerned.

COMMANDER COMBE, of H.M.S. *Penguin*, reports as follows:—
Much foul ground exists to the southward and eastward of Tuahina Point. The outermost dangers are—

1. A rocky patch with a least depth over it of 5 fathoms at L.W.O.S., lying S. 39° E., 1½ miles from the extreme of Tuahina Point.

2. A rock with 3 fathoms over it at L.W.O.S. lying S. 66° E., 1½ miles from the extreme of Tuahina Point.

3. A rock with 4 fathoms over it at L.W.O.S., lying S. 80° E., 1½ miles from the extreme of Tuahina Point.

These rocks break in a heavy swell. Vessels should not round Tuahina Point at a less distance than 1½ miles.

Ariel rock has a least depth over it of 6 feet at L.W.O.S. A bank with general depths over it from 10 to 20 fathoms extends from the Ariel Rock and in a north-north-easterly direction for a distance of 5 miles, its width varying from a quarter of a mile to 1 mile; near its northern end is a rock with 4 fathoms over it at L.W.O.S., from which Gable-end Foreland bears N. 30° W., distance 9½ miles, and Tuahina Point bears S. 68° W., distance 13½ miles.

Monowai Rock has a least depth over it of 12 feet at L.W.O.S. It lies in the following position:—

Gable-end Foreland bears N. 1° W., distance 4½ miles. Summit of Whangara Islet bears N. 59° W. distance 2½ miles.

It will be observed that during the last decade the population of Greater Melbourne increased by only 5,202, which resulted from an increase of about 63,259 by excess births over deaths, but a decrease of 58,057 through net efflux of persons from the metropolis to the country districts or other States. It should be pointed out, however, that after 1891 the population fell steadily year by year until it was as low as 441,900 in 1894, but since then it has increased by 55,100. The population consisted of 235,410 males and 260,688 females, showing a proportion of 111 females to every 100 males, as against 98 in 1891.

Omitting the shipping, where there was a small decrease, there were increases of population in sixteen sub-districts amounting to 22,091, but decreases in nine amounting to 16,654. The principal increase was over 3,000 in Hawthorn; whilst the greatest decrease was nearly 5,000 in Melbourne City, the next nearly 2,900 in North Melbourne, 2,800 in Collingwood, and over 1,900 in Williamstown.

In 1901, 41 per cent., as compared with 43 per cent. in 1891, of the whole population of the State was resident in Greater Melbourne.

The following table shows the estimated population at the middle of 1901, the number of births and deaths registered during the year, and the excess of the former over the latter; also the number of twins and the number of illegitimate children born during the year in Greater Melbourne, and its various sub-districts.

In 119 instances twins, and in two cases triplets, were born in Greater Melbourne during the year under notice. As the births in the same period numbered in all 12,375, the confinements must have numbered 12,252. Thus one mother in 101 gave birth to more than one infant, as compared with 1 in 85 in 1900, 1 in 87 in 1899, 1 in 94 in 1898, 1 in 96 in 1897, 1 in 119 in 1896, and 1 in 90 in 1895.

The births set down as illegitimate in 1901 numbered 1,040, or 90 less than in 1900. Over two-fifths of these took place in the Women's Hospital or in buildings under the supervision of the officers of that institution. The proportion of illegitimate births to the whole number of births registered was 1 in 12, as against 1 in 11 in 1900, and 1 in 12 in the eight previous years.

Subjoined are the birth and death rates in each sub-district in 1901, and according to the average of the ten years 1892-1901. Births and deaths in hospitals, &c., are excluded, and the sub-districts are arranged in order, the sub-district with the highest birth-rate and the highest death-rate in 1901 being placed first, and the rest in succession:—

Oakleigh, it will be observed, is conspicuous in having had the highest birth and the highest death-rate of both periods. It usually happens that the intensity of the birth-rate is proportional to that of the death-rate; but Footscray—which stood next to Oakleigh in regard to the birth-rate—Preston, Essendon, and Flemington with comparatively high birth-rates, had low death-rates. Next to Footscray, Preston, Brunswick, and Collingwood had the highest birth-rates in 1901. On the other hand, the lowest birth-rates in 1901 prevailed in St. Kilda, Caulfield, Melbourne City, Boroondara, and Coburg—all of which, with the exception of Melbourne City, had, also, very low death-rates. After Oakleigh, but considerably below it, Williamstown had the highest death-rate, followed closely by Melbourne City, North Melbourne, and Port Melbourne; whereas those sub-districts possessing the lowest death-rates (after the shipping) were Caulfield, Boroondara, Flemington, Essendon, Preston, and Coburg—all with very low rates between 3 and 9 per 1,000.

It should be noted that all the rates quoted are exclusive of any allowance for the occurrences in public institutions; and assuming that each sub-district contributed its quota to the inmates on a population basis, the total birth-rate in each sub-district in 1901 would be over 1½ per 1,000, and the death-rate nearly 3¼ per 1,000 greater than shown in the foregoing table.

All the sub-districts—with six exceptions in the case of death-rates only—show a considerable reduction in the birth and death rates as compared with the average of the ten years 1892-1901, the former having fallen off in the majority of cases by from 2 to 5 per 1,000, and in some cases by over 7 per 1,000; and the latter—with the exceptions referred to, which were below 2 per 1,000 above the average—having fallen off by various proportions fairly and equally distributed up to 3 per 1,000. Taking the districts as a whole, the birth-rate fell off by nearly 4 per 1,000, or by 13 per cent., and the death-rate by ¾ per 1,000, or by 4 per cent.

In Greater Melbourne, taken as a whole, there was an average of 3 persons to the acre at the end of 1901; but taking the principal towns only—which, although occupying considerably less than half the total area, contain nearly 97 per cent. of the total population—there was a density of 6½ persons to the acre. The density varies considerably in the different sub-districts, ranging from 34 persons to the acre in Fitzroy, 32 in North Melbourne, and over 30 in Richmond, to 1 person to the acre in Boroondara, and less than 1 in Oakleigh, Preston, and the outlying portions of the district. The following table shows the area of, and the density of the population living in, each sub-district:—

The most densely populated districts of Greater Melbourne in 1901, according to this table, were Fitzroy—with 34½ persons to the acre, next North Melbourne, next Richmond and Collingwood, next South Melbourne, and next Prahran and Melbourne (proper). Of these, Fitzroy, Richmond, and South Melbourne had death-rates below, and Collingwood one only slightly above, the average of the whole district; whilst two sub-districts had higher death-rates than Melbourne (proper), and two (besides Melbourne) higher rates than North Melbourne. On the other hand, of the nine sub-districts in the above list having a density of less than four persons to the acre, only five had exceptionally low death-rates; whereas three had death-rates above the average, including Oakleigh, which was at the head of the list. It should be noted, however, that Oakleigh also had the highest birth-rate, a circumstance which might tend to swell the mortality.

The municipal estimate of population, the births and deaths, and their proportions to the population, the excess of births over deaths, the mean temperature in the shade, the rainfall, and the mean atmospheric pressure in Greater Melbourne, during each of the twenty years ended with 1901, were as follow:—

The birth-rate has shown a heavy and continuous fall from 1889—when it was at a maximum of 38 per 1,000—to 1900 and 1901 when it appears to have at last reached its lowest level of a little below 25 per 1,000. The birth-rate in 1901 was 3·6 per 1,000 below the average of the last decade, and 11 per 1,000 below that of the previous one.

The rate of mortality in 1901 was the lowest in the last twenty years except 1897, 1899, and 1900. Ever since 1891—with one exception, 1898—the mortality has been exceptionally low. The fall in the death-rate in later as compared with earlier years is most striking—viz., from an average of nearly 20½ per 1,000 in the decade ended with 1891 to 15½ in that ended with 1901. This fall is no doubt partly due to a change in the age constitution of the people, brought about by a gradual fall over a series of years in the birth-rate, which has naturally reduced the proportion of infants and young children, amongst whom the mortality is always high.

The proportion by which the births exceeded the deaths in 1901 was only 65 per cent., which was lower than in any previous year since 1884, with two exceptions—viz., 1889 and 1898; it was 16 below the average of the last decade, and 10 below that in the preceding one. All the figures in the table relating to births and deaths include those which occurred in hospitals, &c.; which accommodate large numbers of persons coming from country districts. Should such of these as are not *bona fide* residents of Greater Melbourne be eliminated the number of deaths would be less, whilst the excess of births over deaths would be somewhat higher than that shown.

The highest temperature in the shade recorded at Melbourne Observatory during the year 1901 was 109·5°, on the 7th February, as compared with 111·2°, the maximum on record; and the lowest was 30·0°, on the 6th July. The mean temperature of the year (56·9°) was the lowest registered during the last 20 years, except 1884 and 1900; it was ½° below the average of each of the last two decades. The greatest range of the thermometer in any one day (48·9°) took place on the 7th February, and the least range (0·5°) on the 22nd April. The mean daily range was 17·6°. The highest atmospheric pressure recorded was 30·476 inches, on the 1st August, and the lowest was 29·119 inches, on the 6th June. The mean atmospheric pressure (29·95 inches) was about the average. Rain fell on 113 days, or 17 days below the average; whilst the amount of rainfall (27·45 inches), about ¾ inches above the average, was, with four exceptions—viz., 1880, 1887, 1899, and 1900—the highest recorded in the last 27 years. The number of days in which fog occurred was 12.

The mean humidity was 727, as compared with 741 in 1900, and 723 in 1899.

Of the births registered in Greater Melbourne during 1901, 52 per cent. were of males, and 48 per cent. of females. Of the deaths, 54 per cent. were of males, and 46 per cent. of females. Children under the age of 5 years contributed 27 per cent. to the total mortality, as against 26 per cent. in 1900, 28 per cent. in 1899, 35 per cent. in 1898, 29 per cent. in 1897, 32 per cent. in 1896, 31 per cent. in 1895, 34 per cent. in 1894, 41 per cent. in 1893, and 38 per cent. in 1892. The great fall in the birth-rate of recent years accounts in a large measure not only for the smaller proportion of deaths of children under five years, amongst whom the mortality is always high, but also for the fall in the general death-rate, which would be materially affected by the lower proportion of children in the population.

The deaths of 1,536 infants under 1 year of age—as compared with 1,364 in the previous year—occurred in Greater Melbourne during 1901, the proportion being 12·41 to every 100 births. This was 3½ below the average (viz., 15·67); it was also the fourth lowest of the extremely low rates which prevailed in nine of the last ten years, when the average was only 12·91, the rates being as follow, viz.:—11·30 (the lowest during a period of 20 years) in 1900, 12·48 in 1899, 15·97 in 1898, 11·90 in 1897, 13·09 in 1896, 12·44 in 1895, 12·25 in 1894, 14·41 in 1893, and 12·86 in 1892.

The proportion of deaths of elderly persons—aged 75 and upwards—has shown a marked increase in the last eleven years, proving infallibly that the percentage of elderly persons in the population has considerably increased, and has apparently not yet reached a maximum. This point is of considerable interest as bearing on the question of old-age pensions. The actual numbers of aged persons cannot be ascertained until the results of the recent Census have been fully tabulated.

As compared with the preceding year an increase of 172 occurred in the age-group under 1 year, of 36 between 15 and 25 years, of 91 between 35 and 55, and of 266 at the age of 65 or upwards, but a decrease of 18 at the age-groups of 25 to 35, and 44 between 55 and 65.

The following are the numbers of deaths in 1901 which took place in Public Institutions:—773 in the Melbourne, 210 in the Alfred, 54 in the St. Vincent's, 80 in the Women's, 111 in the Children's, 92 in the Homeopathic, and 118 in the Austin Hospitals; 103 in the Metropolitan and 74 in the Yarra Bend Lunatic Asylums; 14 in the Infant Asylum; 91 in the Immigrants' Home; 136 in the Benevolent Asylum; 37 in the Convent of the Little Sisters of the Poor; 17 in the Protestant Refuge; 21 in the Melbourne Gaol; 4 in the Pentridge Penal Establishment; 4 in the Eye and Ear Hospital; and 1 in the Blind Asylum. The total number is 1,940; of which 1,322 took place in Melbourne City, 136 in North Melbourne, 103 in Kew, 92 in South Melbourne, 54 in Fitzroy, 37 in Northcote, 4 in Coburg, and 192 in the remainder of district. These figures, compared with the total deaths (7,515), furnish a proportion of 25 per cent., or, in other words, 1 person in every 4 who died in Greater Melbourne during 1901 ended his or her days in a hospital, an asylum, or a gaol. Nearly one-third of all who died of the age of 5 or upwards in 1901, four-sevenths of those who died of typhoid fever, two-fifths of those who died of diphtheria, one-third of those who died of cancer, or an accident, and more than one-fourth of those who died of phthisis, ended their days in hospitals, as will be seen from the following statement:—

The mortality in 1901 from influenza, whooping-cough, cancer, diseases of the brain and nerves, heart diseases and diseases of the urinary system, were considerably above, and that from child-birth a little above, the average of the last ten years. On the other hand, the mortality from phthisis was about the same as the average; but that from lung diseases generally was slightly below, and that from all other causes shown in the table much below, the average.

According to the experience of the ten years named, the general mortality and the mortality from diarrhoeal diseases are greatest from December to March, by far the worst months being January and December; the mortality from typhoid fever is greatest from January to April, and falls to an extremely low level from July to November; and the mortality from diphtheria and croup is greatest from March to July, and lowest from November to January. It will be noticed that the last-mentioned complaints are the only ones named which appear to be more destructive in winter than in summer.

The estimated mean population, the births and deaths, and their proportions to population, and the excess of births over deaths in each of the metropolitan cities of Australasia (except Perth) in 1901 were as follow:—

It will be noticed that the birth-rate was higher in Melbourne than in Adelaide, but somewhat lower than in the other cities named; that the death-rate in Melbourne was higher than in any of the other cities, except Hobart; and that the proportion of excess of births over deaths was lowest in Melbourne and Hobart. The birth-rates, excepting Brisbane, all range in narrow limits between 24½ and 27 per 1,000. The death-rates in Sydney, Brisbane, and Wellington appear to be, for large urban centres of population, extraordinarily low.

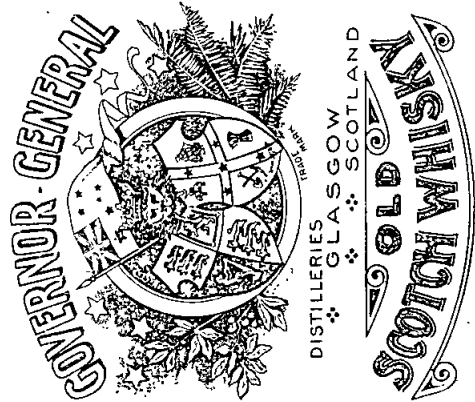

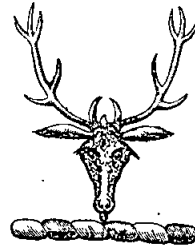

SHIRE OF PORTLAND.—ORDER CONFIRMED.

IN pursuance of the powers conferred by sections 390 and 391 of the *Local Government Act 1890*, the Council of the Shire of Portland doth hereby order that the land firstly hereunder described shall be a public highway from and after the date of the publication of this Order in the *Government Gazette* :—

LAND REFERRED TO.

Firstly.—All that piece of land in the State of Victoria, containing two acres and seventeen perches and three-quarters of a perch, situated in the county of Normanby, parish of Greenhills, being part of allotment 30 of section 16 of said parish: Commencing at a point on the western boundary of the said allotment, distant seventeen chains thirty-one links south-easterly from the north-west angle of the said allotment 30, along the east side of a one-chain road; bounded thence by the said one-chain road bearing S. 10° 4' E. one chain one link and a half; thence by a line bearing east twenty-one chains eleven links to a point on the eastern boundary of the said allotment, distant one thousand eight hundred and seventy and a half links from the north-east angle of the said allotment; thence by a line bearing N. 10° 4' W. one chain one link and a half along the west side of a one-chain road to a point on the eastern boundary of the said allotment, distant one thousand seven hundred and sixty-nine links from the north-eastern angle of the said allotment; thence by a line bearing west twenty-one chains eleven links to the point of commencement. And such land shall be in lieu of an existing one-chain road in the same parish, defined in the following description (that is to say) :—

All that piece of land in the State of Victoria, containing four acres three roods and twenty-one perches and three-quarters of a perch, situated in the county of Normanby, parish of Greenhills: Commencing at the south-east angle of allotment 6c of section 16; bounded thence by that allotment bearing N. 10° 8' W. twenty-two chains sixty links; thence by allotment 30, section 16, bearing N. 10° 4' W. twenty-six chains twenty-six links; thence by a line bearing N. 89° 57' E. one chain one link and a half; thence by allotments 4 and 1, section 17, bearing S. 10° 4' E. twenty-six chains eight links; thence by allotment 1, section 17, bearing S. 10° 8' E. twenty-two chains seventy-eight links; thence by a line bearing N. 89° 54' W. along the north side of a one-chain road one chain one link and six-tenths of a link to the point of commencement.

SHIRE OF COLAC.

BY-LAW NO. 57.

THE President, Councillors, and Ratepayers of the Shire of Colac, by virtue of the provisions of the *Health Act 1890*, and every other power enabling them in this behalf, hereby make the following by-law, being By-law No. 57 of the said shire :—

1. This by-law may be cited as a by-law for regulating earth-closets and the emptying and cleansing of cess-pans in the parish of Ondit, and for fixing a charge for the same.

2. This by-law shall come into force and operation on its confirmation by the Board of Public Health, and immediately after its publication in the *Government Gazette*.

3. This by-law shall apply to and have operation within the following area in the parish of Ondit, namely :—Commencing at a point on the shore of Lake Beac, where the northern boundary of allotment 51A, parish of Ondit, meets the shore of the

said lake; thence easterly by the northern boundary of the said allotment and the southern boundary of allotments 54A and B, parish of Ondit, to a point forty chains easterly from the south-west corner of said allotment 51A; thence due north to the northern boundary of allotment 86A, parish of Ondit; thence westerly by the northern boundary of said allotment 86A and the northern boundary of allotment 87A, parish of Ondit, to the north-west corner of said allotment; thence southerly by the western boundary of said allotment 87A and the western boundary of allotment 87B, parish of Ondit, direct to the shore of Lake Beac; thence by the shore of Lake Beac to the point of commencement.

4. The ordinary system of pans for night-soil is hereby abolished, and instead thereof every closet shall be furnished with a double-pan service, to be provided by the council.

5. No person shall construct or cause to be constructed any privy except in the form of an earth-closet, which shall consist of a suitable privy building, the floor whereof is at no point less than three inches above the surface of the adjoining ground, and shall have the requisite apparatus for the application of dry earth or some other deodorizing material to the contents thereof, and shall be constructed and placed so as to afford easy means of access for the purpose of removing the pan and emptying and cleansing the same. Every privy attached to any school, hotel, licensed public house, factory, work-room, or common lodging-house shall be flagged or paved with non-absorbent material, having a fall or inclination from the riser of seat towards the back of building of half-an-inch to the foot. All privies shall be constructed with proper openings or flues to provide sufficient means of ventilation.

6. Every occupier and every person having the management or control of any house or premises shall cause to be kept in every earth-closet belonging thereto a supply of dry powdered earth, ashes, charcoal, lime, sawdust, or some other material efficient for deodorizing night soil, and shall cause all night-soil which may be deposited in a pan placed in such earth-closet to be immediately, on the deposit thereof, covered with a quantity of such deodorizing material sufficient to thoroughly and effectually deodorize the contents of such pan.

7. No closet door or trap shall abut or open on any street or lane.

8. Once at least in each week, or so much more frequently as the Council of the said Shire may from time to time direct, the pan in use in every such earth-closet shall be closed with a tightly-fitting lid and removed in the day time to such place as the said Council may have appointed. No one except the persons authorized by the said Council shall be employed to remove the same.

9. The charge for emptying and cleansing the cess-pans to be paid by the occupier of any tenement under the provisions of section 259 of the *Health Act 1890* shall be as follows :—Once a week, for each pan, per annum, £1; twice a week, for each pan, £2; thrice a week, for each pan, £3. Such charges shall be payable half-yearly in advance. Failure to pay the said annual charge shall be a breach of this by-law.

10. Every person who fails to comply with or is guilty of any breach of the provisions of this by-law shall be liable for every such offence to pay a penalty not exceeding £10.

A By-law made under section 35 of the *Health Act 1890*, for determining the mode of carriage of, and precautions to be observed in carrying, meat within the borough.

IN pursuance of the powers conferred by the *Health Act 1890*, the Mayor, Councillors, and Burgesses of the Borough of Castlemaine ordain as follows (that is to say):—

No person shall bring or cause to be brought into the said borough, or carry or cause to be carried through any street in the said borough, in any cart or other vehicle, any butchers' meat or carcase of meat, unless such cart or other vehicle be so constructed or covered as that the rays of the sun, and the rain and the dust are not allowed to fall on or be capable of reaching such meat or carcase of meat, and that proper sitting accommodation be provided for the driver thereof.

Any person offending against any of the provisions of this By-law shall, upon conviction thereof, forfeit a sum of not less than Five shillings or more than Ten pounds.

KERANG EAST IRRIGATION AND WATER SUPPLY TRUST.—REGULATION FOR THE SALE OF WATER.

The rate or price for water delivered from the works of the Trust for the irrigation of all cereal crops shall be for the first watering Fourpence per inch per acre, 3 inches per acre to constitute a watering; and Fourpence per inch per acre for the second watering, 2½ inches per acre to constitute a watering; and for third and subsequent waterings Fourpence per inch per acre, 1½ inches per acre to constitute a watering.

2. The rate or price for water delivered from the works of the Trust, for the irrigation of all fodder crops, shall be for the first watering Fourpence per inch per acre, 3 inches per acre to constitute a watering; and for second and subsequent waterings Fourpence per inch per acre, 1½ inches to constitute a watering.

3. The rate or price for water delivered from the works of the Trust for the irrigation of grass land, in winter months, shall be Fourpence per inch per acre for the first watering, 1½ inches per acre to constitute a watering; and for the second and subsequent waterings Fourpence per inch per acre, ¾ of an inch per acre to constitute a watering; and for conserved water in the summer months Fourpence per inch per acre, 2½ inches per acre to constitute a watering.

4. The rate or price for water delivered from the works of the Trust for the irrigation of gardens shall be for the first watering Fourpence per inch per acre, 3 inches per acre to constitute a watering; and for second and subsequent waterings Fourpence per inch per acre, 2½ inches per acre to constitute a watering; and for garden rights One pound per acre per annum for the first acre, and for every additional acre or portion of an acre Ten shillings per annum.

5. The rate or price for the filling of tanks shall be Ten shillings.

The minimum charge for water supplied for the above purposes shall be Ten shillings.

That the Regulation made by the Trust on the 11th day of October, 1898, and approved by the Governor in Council on the 20th March, 1899, shall be and the same is hereby repealed.

REGULATIONS NUMBERED XIII. AND XIV. OF THE REGULATIONS UNDER THE EDUCATION ACT 1890 RESCINDED.

WHEREAS by section 23 of the *Education Act 1890* (54 Vict. No. 1086) it is enacted that the Governor in Council may from time to time make and rescind regulations for all or any of the purposes therein mentioned, and generally for carrying the said Act into effect: Now therefore His Excellency the Governor of the State of Victoria in the Commonwealth of Australia, acting by and with the advice of the Executive Council of the said State, doth by this Order rescind the Regulations numbered XIII. and XIV. of the Regulations made by Order in Council dated the 24th day of September, 1900, and doth make the Regulations following in lieu thereof, that is to say:—

XIII.—RELIGIOUS INSTRUCTION IN STATE SCHOOLS.

1. For the purpose of affording facilities for giving religious instruction in State Schools, the ordinary school business shall, on one or two days in each week, as the Board of Advice may determine, terminate at half-past Three o'clock p.m., provided that immediately prior to such closing two hours' secular instruction, which must be consecutive, shall have been given after roll call.
2. On these occasions the teacher shall, immediately after announcing the dismissal of the school for the day, give notice that all pupils whose parents do not object to their receiving religious instruction may remain for that purpose.
3. Notwithstanding anything contained in clauses 1 and 2 of this Regulation, the dismissal of the school for the day shall not entitle any member of the staff to leave the school premises before the time fixed by the Minister, in accordance with the provisions of Regulation XII. (1) without the permission of the head teacher, or, in the case of head teachers, of the Department.

XIV.—DISCIPLINE.

1. Corporal punishment shall be administered only by the head teacher, and by such teachers holding the rank of assistant as he may authorize.
2. When more than one stroke is given, an entry, giving the date, the name, class, and age of the pupil, the nature of the offence, and the extent of the punishment, shall be made in a book kept for the purpose, entitled the "Register of Corporal Punishment."
3. The instrument employed shall be a strap. Boxing ears or striking on the head is strictly prohibited.
4. Corporal punishment shall be inflicted upon boys only.
5. The names of the assistant teachers authorized by the head teacher to inflict corporal punishment shall be entered, from time to time by the head teacher, on the first page of the "Register of Corporal Punishment."
6. The head teacher will be held responsible for the nature and extent of the punishment inflicted in the State School under his charge.
7. No pupil shall be refused admission to and no pupil shall be expelled from a State School except with the express sanction of the Minister. In extreme cases a head teacher may suspend the attendance of a pupil, at once reporting the matter to the Minister and the Board of Advice. If, after inquiry, the circumstances seem to call for expulsion, the Minister may so order. Otherwise the pupil shall be re-admitted.
8. The conduct of pupils until they leave the school precincts and the playground shall, during the hours fixed by the Minister under Regulation XII. (1), be carefully supervised by teachers acting under the direction of the head teacher.

Any single line in any schedule can be tendered for, and may be accepted or rejected separately.

The total amount of tender must be stated in words as well as in figures. Tenders having alterations or erasures therein will not be entertained.

Tenders must be accompanied by the preliminary deposit, as shown above, in bank notes, or a bank draft in favour of the Secretary to the Tender Board (cheques will in no case be received), which will be returned within ten days to unsuccessful tenderers on their application. Such deposit to be forfeited in the event of the successful tenderer failing to complete the security within the prescribed period.

Security will be required, either in Victorian Government debentures, Savings Bank Deposit Book, or Bank Deposit Receipt in favour of the Secretary to the Tender Board, or cash deposit, as the tenderer may elect.

The security must be completed and contract signed within five days of acceptance of the tender, failing which the contract may be again advertised or another tender accepted.

The Government will not necessarily accept the lowest or any tender.

Tenderers failing to take up their accepted tenders will be disqualified from tendering or holding any future contracts for Government supplies for a period of twelve months, such disqualification to date from the notification of acceptance of tender.

Tenders, enclosed in a separate envelope, and having the words "Tender for —" (as the case may be) written thereon, must be deposited in the Tender-box at the Pay Office, Treasury, Melbourne.

CONDITIONS OF CONTRACT.

1. The Government will not be bound to order from the contractor all the articles enumerated in the schedules, but only those articles, and such quantities of those articles, as it may be found necessary to order. Should the Government, however, require a larger supply of any article than the quantity stated in the schedules, the contractor will nevertheless be bound to supply the same at contract rates.

2. The supplies are to be the same as sample where so stated, and of the particular manufacture indicated in the schedule of tenders. In the case of different makers' goods, the contractor

will be required to supply the kind ordered. The supplies are to be the best quality of their several kinds or manufacture. A preference will, however, be given to goods of Victorian manufacture, provided the quality is equal to the particular manufacture indicated in the schedule.

3. The value of all packages, cases, casks, &c., whether bulk be broken or not, must be included in the prices stated in the contractor's tender; all such packages, &c., to be considered the property of the Government, and no charges or expenses whatsoever beyond the price tendered and set out in the schedule will be allowed to the contractor for any articles or packages, cases, casks, &c. The net weight or quantity only will be paid for. Contractors must provide, without extra charge, whatever labour may be required in the packing of stores.

4. All orders for supplies will emanate from the departments requiring the goods. The goods shall be delivered as may be directed by the officer ordering the supply. At the time of delivering the supplies, the contractor shall produce the order for the same to the officer authorized to accept delivery, and such officer shall acknowledge thereon the receipt of the stores accepted, and shall return the order to the contractor.

5. Supplies ordered for delivery in Melbourne and Williamstown districts are to be delivered free of all charges (whether cartage, freight, &c.) and, for the purposes of these contracts, Melbourne district will include a radius of six miles from the General Post Office; and Williamstown district will include the town of Williamstown, Hobson's Bay, and the River Yarra.

6. Arrangements as to time of delivery and inspection of goods will be made by the officers ordering the goods.

7. Orders must receive prompt execution; and in the event of the goods not being delivered within forty-eight hours after the contractor shall have received the order, or within such other time as the order may specify for delivery, it will be competent for the officers named in Condition 6, or the head of the department to whom the goods are to be supplied, on giving the contractor twenty-four hours' notice, to purchase the supplies, or any like supplies that are suitable for the service, at the contractor's risk, and the extra expense incurred over and above the contract price (if any) will be deducted from the contractor's account or from the security money.

8. The contractor will be required to furnish his account in the prescribed form at the time of the delivery of the goods, and the account shall be accompanied by the receipted delivery orders on which it is based. The prices quoted in the orders cannot be increased.

9. The acceptance of the supplies shall be subject to the approval of the officer authorized to take delivery of the stores, or such other officer as shall be named in the conditions. The contractor may, however, claim a survey on any goods objected to; but in that case he must, within twenty-four hours after objection is made, give notice thereof, in writing, to the officer rejecting the goods. If, after the delivery of the supplies has been taken, any deficiency or defect is discovered therein, such stores may be returned to the contractor.

10. All goods forwarded under these contracts shall, where practicable, be forwarded by rail, and all consignments shall bear the number of the consignment notes under which they are forwarded, and also the name of the contractor or contractors by whom consigned.

11. When a contractor is required to make delivery of goods at a railway station for transmission by rail for any department except the Defence Department, he shall obtain a receipt for the goods in duplicate on the Stores and Transport consignment note, at the same time handing in a triplicate of the form as an authority for the carrier to act as agent for and charge the freight to the Stores and Transport Department. He shall as soon as possible, and not later than twenty-four hours thereafter, deliver at the Tender Board Offices the original, the duplicate to be retained by himself. (In the case of the Defence Department, however, the consignment note only which accompanies the order must be used.) Should the goods thus forwarded be rejected, the contractor must bear the cost of replacing such goods, for which service the departmental consignment note is not to be used. Any infringement of this condition may subject the contractor to such mulct as the Tender Board may recommend under clause 14 of these conditions.

12. Delivery will not be deemed to have been made until the goods have been approved of. In case of the rejection or return of any supplies, the contractor shall bear the whole cost of replacing the supplies rejected or returned, otherwise purchases will be effected at the contractor's risk, and the extra expense deducted as in Condition 7.

13. The members of boards of survey will be appointed by the Treasurer of the State for the time being, and the decision of the board is to be considered as final. If the board shall decide that the article is not of proper quality it must be immediately replaced by the contractor, failing which it, or any like supply that is suitable for the service, will be procured elsewhere, and the survey fees and extra expense (if any) will be charged as in Condition 7.

14. A refusal to execute orders, irregularity in the quantity or quality of the supplies, or delay in delivering or replacing them when required, will subject the contractor, upon report from the Tender Board, to such mulct, not exceeding Fifty pounds, as the Treasurer may direct, and the amount may be deducted as in Condition 7. It will also be in the power of the said Treasurer, upon such refusal, irregularity, or delay, to terminate the contract forthwith, and forfeit the whole or any portion of the security money; and, in addition, the contractor will be disqualified from tendering or holding any future contract or contracts for a period of twelve months from the date of such disqualification.

BY-LAW No. 21.

A By-law of the Shire of Boroondara made under section 48 of the *Local Government Act 1891*, and numbered 21, for the purpose of repealing Part 2 of By-law 15, and for the purpose of regulating the construction and erection of buildings and erections.

IN pursuance of the powers conferred by the *Local Government Act 1891*, the President, Councillors, and Ratepayers of the Shire of Boroondara order as follows:—

1. This by-law shall come into operation on its approval by the Governor in Council and immediately after its publication in the *Government Gazette*.
2. Part 2 of By-law 15 shall as and from the date of the coming into operation of this by-law be repealed and the following provisions shall be read in lieu thereof:—
3. No person shall erect build or construct or cause to be erected built or constructed any building or erection contrary to the provisions of this by-law or of any regulations made by this Council under or in pursuance of the powers contained in the *Local Government Acts* and in the thirteenth schedule to the *Local Government Act 1890* for the time being in force throughout the Shire of Boroondara or any part thereof.
4. No person shall erect build or construct or cause to be erected, built or constructed any building or erection without first obtaining a written permit or licence from the Council to the proposed building or erection and without first submitting to the council its secretary or building surveyor the plan and specifications of the proposed building or erection.
5. No person shall erect build or construct or cause to be erected built or constructed any building or erection which is intended to be used or which shall or may be used as, a shop office public building or warehouse upon or within lines at a distance of thirty feet (30 feet) from and running parallel with either side of the streets or roads mentioned in section seven (7) hereof unless the external walls thereof shall be of brick or stone, or of bricks and stone together, and unless the whole building or erection shall also comply with all the building regulations of the shire relating thereto.
6. No person shall erect, build, or construct, or cause to be erected built or constructed any building or erection to be used as a dwelling-house only upon or within lines at a distance of thirty (30) feet from and running parallel with either side of the streets mentioned in the seventh (7th) section hereof unless the whole of the said building or erection of whatever materials constructed shall cover an area of twelve hundred (1,200) square feet at the least and if such building or erection be of wood the external walls thereof shall be covered with new sound boards and the roof or roofs thereof shall be covered on the outside with incombustible roof coverings and the height between the floors and ceilings of the main rooms shall be 11ft. 6in. at the least and unless such building or erection shall also comply with all the building regulations of the shire relating thereto.
7. The streets to which the foregoing sections five (5) and six (6) shall apply are the following:—

- (1) Burke-road from Whitehorse-road to a point 56 chains south of Camberwell-road, opposite Anderson-street.
- (2) Riversdale-road from Burke-road to Outer Circle railway.
- (3) Camberwell-road, from Burke-road to Avenue-road and Arlington-street.

- (4) Canterbury-road, from Burke-road to Boundary-road and Alexandra-avenue.
- (5) Union-road, from Mont Albert-road to Kent-road and Bona-Vista avenue.
- (6) Mont Albert-road, from Bourke-road to Balwyn-road.
- (7) Balwyn-road, from Canterbury-road to Whitehorse-road.
- (8) Prospect Hill-road, from Burke-road to Derby-street and Kingsley-street.
- (9) Victoria-avenue, from Canterbury-road to Mont Albert-road.
- (10) Hopetoun-avenue, from Mont Albert-road to View-street.
- (11) Burwood-street, from Burke-road to Cookson-street.
- (12) Victoria-road, from Burke-road to Loch-street.
- (13) Kintore street, from Burke-road to Loch-street.
- (14) Hopetoun-street, from Canterbury-road to Burwood-street.
- (15) Loch-street, from Canterbury-road to Burwood-street.
- (16) Avoca-street, north and south.
- (17) Russell-street, from Canterbury-road to Cookson-street.
- (18) Oliver-street, from Canterbury-road, to Cookson-street.
- (19) Cookson-street, from Burke-road to Broadway.
- (20) Broadway, from Canterbury-road to Cookson-street.
- (21) Stanhope-grove, from Prospect Hill-road to railway.
- (22) Lorne-grove, from Prospect Hill-road to railway.
- (23) Royal-crescent, from Prospect Hill-road to railway.

8. No person shall remove or transport or cause to be removed or transported any building or erection either in whole or in part into any part of the area to which this by-law extends or from any part of such area to another part of the same unless such building or erection when completed shall comply with all the provisions of this by-law and of any building regulations made by the Council and unless six days' notice in writing of the intention to remove the same be first given to the Council, shire secretary or building surveyor.

9. If any building or erection shall be partly or wholly erected built or constructed contrary to the provisions of this by-law the Council its secretary or building surveyor may give to the owner or builder or leave upon the site of such building or erection fourteen (14) days' notice in writing to bring such building or erection into conformity with the said provisions or requiring the pulling down or removal of such building or erection and if default shall be made in complying with such notice and notwithstanding the imposition or recovery of any penalty it shall be lawful for the said Council its secretary or building surveyor to enter upon such building or erection, and on the site thereof with a sufficient number of workmen and to demolish and pull down the said building or erection or any part or parts thereof and to do any other act that may be necessary for the purpose and to remove the materials thereof to some convenient place and if the Council in its discretion thinks fit to sell the same in such manner as it thinks fit and all expenses incurred by the Council its secretary, or building surveyor in demolishing and pulling down the said building or erection or any part thereof or removing the materials thereof and selling the same and in doing such other acts as aforesaid and all fees or penalties due by the owner or builder thereof may be deducted and retained by the Council out of the proceeds of such sale and the Council shall restore any surplus arising from such sale on demand.

10. This by-law shall not apply to any fence greenhouse aviary or other separate outbuilding approved of by the said Council its secretary or building surveyor nor to the alteration of any building in existence at the date of this by-law coming into force nor to any Government or municipal building.

11. The Building Regulation No. 1 shall continue in force subject always to the provisions of this by-law.

12. The following words or expressions whenever used in this by-law shall have the meaning hereby assigned to them respectively so far as such meanings are not excluded by context, that is to say:—

"Council" shall mean the Council of the Shire of Boroondara.

"Building surveyor" shall mean the building surveyor for the time being of the Shire of Boroondara.

"Secretary" shall mean the secretary for the time being of the Shire of Boroondara.

The expression "public building" means a building used or constructed or adapted to be used as a church, chapel, or other place of public worship, or as a school, college, or place of instruction (not merely a dwelling-house so used), or as a hospital, public theatre, public hotel, public concert-room, public ball-room, public lecture-room, public library, or public exhibition-room, or as a public place of assembly, or used or constructed or adapted to be used for any public purpose; also a building used or constructed or adapted to be used as an hotel, lodging-house, home, refuge, or shelter.

The expression "warehouse" means a warehouse, factory, manufactory, workshop, public stable, brewery, or distillery, or any other building exceeding in cubical extent 150,000 cubic feet which is neither a public building nor a domestic building.

The expression "dwelling-house" means a building used or constructed or adapted to be used wholly or principally for human habitation.
