The Marine Act 1890.

REGULATIONS FOR THE EXAMINATION MASTERS AND MATES FOR CERTIFICATES OF COMPETENCY.

WHEREAS by section 59 of the Marine Act 1890, it is amongst other things enacted that the Marine Board of Victoria may, with the consent of the Governor in Council, make, alter, and repeal regulations for the conduct of the examination of persons desiring to obtain certificates of competency as masters and mates, as to qualifications to be possessed by such persons, for the issue of certificates of competency thereto, and for prescribing the fees to be paid by applicants for examination (not exceeding the fees mentioned in the Fourth Schedule of the said Act): And whereas the said Board has from time to time made regulations as aforesaid: And whereas it is expedient to repeal all such regulations now in force and also to make amended regulations in lieu thereof : Now, therefore, the said Board, with the consent of His Excellency the Governor of Victoria, acting by and with the advice of the Executive Council thereof, doth hereby repeal all such previous regulations made for the purposes aforesaid and now in force, from the date hereinafter specified, and doth make the following amended regulations in lieu thereof, that is to say :-

- 1. These regulations may be cited as "The Regulations for the Regulation. Examination of Masters and Mates.'
- 2. These regulations shall come into force on the 1st day of Commencement. October, 1903, on which date all previous regulations relating to the same subjects shall be repealed.
- 3. Certificates of competency will be granted to those persons certificates who pass the requisite examinations and otherwise comply with pass cauditions

4. Examinations will be held at the offices of the Marine Examinations, bard, Melbourue, or at such other place and at such times as the where to be held. Board, Melbourne, or at such other place and at such times as the Board may from time to time direct.

5. A person desirous of obtaining a certificate shall make Application, application for examination on the proper form, which may be how to be made obtained at the Marine Board Office: such application form Exp. 2. properly filled in, together with the candidate's testimonials and discharges, as hereinafter specified, must be lodged with the Secretary at least two clear days before the date of examination, which date will be notified to the candidate on his obtaining the form of application.

- 6. Every candidate must properly account to the satisfaction Gaps in service. of the Secretary for any gaps in his service before he is allowed to present himself for examination.
- 7. Services which in case of doubt cannot be verified by Doubten proper entries in the articles of the ships in which the candidate service. has served will not be accepted.
- 8. Should any doubt exist as to the age of a candidate he will certificate as be required to produce a certificate of birth or baptism, or other to satisfactory evidence of age.
- 9. Applicants will be required to produce, in addition to the Testimonials. official forms of discharge, testimonials to the satisfaction of the Board as to sobriety, experience, ability, and general good conduct for (at least) the twelve (12) months of service immediately preceding the date of application for examination, and no person will be examined unless such forms of discharge and testimonials be produced.

10. Candidates who have neglected to join their vessels after pesertion and having signed articles, or who have deserted their vessels after gress misconduct. having joined, or who have been found by a competent court guilty of gross misconduct on board, will be required to produce satisfactory proofs of two (2) years' subsequent service and good conduct at sea, unless the Board, after having investigated the matter, should see fit to reduce the time.

- 11. Every candidate for a certificate of competency of any Sight tests. grade must pass the sight tests before he can proceed to the examination in navigation and seamanship. The regulations relating to such tests are as follow :-
 - (1) The sight tests are open to all persons serving or intending to serve in the Mercantile Marine, and all such persons are recommended to take the earliest opportunity of ascertaining by means of these tests whether their vision is such as to qualify them for service in that profession.

(2) Any person serving or intending to serve in the Mercantile Marine, if desirous of undergoing the form vision, colour vision, and colour ignorance tests only, must make application to the Secretary to the Marine Board on form to be obtained therefrom, and must pay a fee of One shilling. This fee will be payable on each occasion upon which a candidate is examined in form vision and colour tests only.

d

- (3) The three tests are-
 - (a) Form vision test.
 - (b) Colour vision test.
 - (c) Colour ignorance test.
- (4) No candidate will be examined in the colour vision test until he has passed the form vision test, or in the colour ignorance test until he has passed the colour vision test.
- (5) The foregoing rule must be observed, whether the candidate has or has not on any previous occasion passed the sight tests.
- (6) Candidates who fail to pass the form vision test or colour ignorance test can be re-examined at intervals of not less than three months.
- (7) Candidates who fail to pass the colour vision test cannot be re-examined. It is open, however, to any candidate who has failed to pass the colour vision test to appeal to the Board, who may, if they think fit, remit the case to a special examiner or body of examiners for final decision.
- (8) The expenses of candidates who are examined by such special examiner or body of examiners, and are reported by him or them to have passed, will, under certain circumstances, be paid by the Board, at a rate which will be notified to the candidate.
- (9) No payment whatever will be made towards the expenses of candidates who, upon their own application, are examined by the special examiner or examiners, and are reported by him or them to have failed, unless the Board consider that the particular circumstances of the case justify such payment. The special examinations will be held in Melbourne only.
- (10) When a candidate fails to pass the colour vision test, the examiner will point out to him the conditions under which he can appeal. Appeals are to be made through the examiner, and forwarded to the Board with the examiner's remarks.
- (12) The fee paid for examination for a certificate of competency includes the fee of One shilling for examination in form vision, colour vision, and colour ignorance, and if the candidate fails to pass those tests this fee will, with the exception of One shilling, he returned to him
- (13) Only examiners who have themselves passed the colour vision test are to undertake these examinations.

Foreigners to know English. 12. Foreigners must prove to the satisfaction of the examiners that they can speak and write the English language sufficiently well to perform the duties required of them on board a British vessel. (See also Regulations 23 and 127.)

Notification of

13. When an applicant has passed his examination, and has complied with requisite regulations, he will be notified to that effect by the Secretary, and will subsequently receive his certificate of competency from the Board. His testimonials will be returned to him with his certificate.

If after passing examination services are found to have been insufficient 14. If, however, a candidate has passed his examination, and it is subsequently discovered that his services are insufficient to entitle him to receive a certificate of the grade for which he has passed, it will not be granted to him; but, if the Board are satisfied that the error in the calculation of his services did not occur through any fauit or wilful misrepresentation on his part, he will be allowed to go up for re-examination without payment of further fee when he has performed the amount of service in which he was deficient.

Certificate of a lower grade may be granted on certain 15. If, in such a case, the applicant's services are sufficient to entitle him to receive a certificate of a lower grade, provided as aforesaid he has not wilfully misrepresented the amount of his services, an inferior certificate may be granted to him, and the difference, if any, between the fee paid by him for the superior certificate and the fee payable for the inferior certificate may be placed to his credit.

16. In such a case, when the applicant has by further service Must be made up the amount in which he was found to be short, he must, for certificate of before he can receive the higher certificate, be re-examined in all higher grade. the subjects.

FAILURE IN EXAMINATION.

17. In all cases of failure to pass any of the examinations Re-examination hereinafter in these regulations prescribed the candidate must failure. be examined de nove. If a candidate fails in seamanship, he will not be re-examined until after a lapse of six months. Whether the whole or part of this period must be served at sea must depend upon the subjects in seamanship in which the candidate failed, but what amount, if any, of sea service will be required · will be determined by the Board.

- 18. The examiner, in making out his report, should state what Examiner to amount, if any, of further sea service the candidate must perform, report. and he should also insert this information on the application form
- 19. If the candidate fail three times in navigation within three Failure in navigation. months, he will not be re-examined until after a lapse of three months from the date of the last failure.
- 20. A candidate for an Extra Master's certificate or for an Failure, extra master. Extra Master's certificate for Steam-ships will not be allowed to present himself for examination more than three times within a period of twelve months.

21. If a candidate has failed in his examination, but the sub-Certificate of a lower grade. jects in which he has failed are not included in the subjects required for a certificate of a lower grade, he may, if he desires it, receive a certificate of such lower grade.

- 22. No part, however, of the fee he has paid will be returned Fee. to him, and on presenting himself, when entitled, for re-examination for the higher grade of certificate he will be required to pay a further full fee.
- 23. If a candidate fail in his examination in consequence of bad Failure in spelling or writing he will not be re-examined until after a lapse writing. of at least three months; if he fail for ignorance of the English language, he will not be re-examined until after a lapse of six months. (See Regulation No. 12.)
- 24. If a candidate fail in seamanship, so far as regards the management of square-rigged sailing vessels, in his examination for an ordinary certificate, he may, if qualified as to service, without further formal application or further payment of fee, proceed with the examination for a certificate of competency for foreigngoing or home-trade steam-ships, as the case may be, or for foreand-aft rigged vessels. And if a candidate fails in the same manner in his examination for an Extra Master's certificate, he may, under the same conditions as above, proceed with the examination for an Extra certificate for steam-ships only.
- 25. A candidate will not be allowed to undergo examination Candidates not twice in the same week, unless under very special and urgent twice in same circumstances the Marine Board should see fit to relax this week. rule.

FEES.

26. The fee for examination shall be paid, prior to examination, Fees to be paid by applicants for examination. to the Secretary to the Marine Board.

- 27. No candidate shall prior to examination, or during the Bribery. course of any examination, offer directly or indirectly or cause to be offered any sum of money or other thing whatsoever by way of reward or bribe to any examiner or other officer of the Board for the purpose of influencing him in any manner in regard to such examination; if any candidate offend against this regula-tion, the Board may refuse to permit such candidate to be examined, or, if the examination have already commenced, may forbid him to proceed with such examination, and the Board may forfeit any fee paid by him, and may also debar such candidate from presenting himself at any future examination for a period not exceeding twelve months from the date of the offer of such bribe
- 28. If a candidate fails in his examination in navigation or Fee not seamanship, no part of the fee he has paid will be returned to case of failure.

Fees to be paid by applicants.

29. The fees for examination shall be as follows:-

30. When any certificate issued by the Board has been lost or destroyed, and satisfactory proof of such loss or destruction has been furnished, a duplicate may be issued on payment of a fee of Five shillings, provided, however, that the Board may waive the payment of such fee in any case where the Board is satisfied that the loss or destruction of a certificate is not attributable to carelessness on the part of the holder. A declaration as to such loss or destruction must be made by applicants on forms to be obtained from, and returned to, the Secretary.

EXCHANGE OF COLONIAL LOCAL CERTIFICATES.

31. The holder of a certificate of competency as Master not granted under the provisions of the Merchant Shipping Act desirous of having such certificate exchanged for a certificate of the same grade under these Regulations must produce satisfactory testimonials as to character for at least a period of twelve months immediately preceding the date of his application to be examined; and upon compliance with the prescribed regulations he will be examined in all subjects which may have been added to the examination of a Master since the date of his obtaining his Colonial certificate, and if he pass such examination he will be entitled to receive from the Board a certificate of competency as a Master under the provisions of the Merchant Shipping Act 1894.

QUALIFICATIONS REQUIRED FOR THE VARIOUS GRADES.

CERTIFICATES FOR FOREIGN-GOING SHIPS, OR ORDINARY CERTIFICATES.

32. A candidate for an Ordinary Certificate of any grade in the Service in foreign or home trade who has not previously held an Ordinary sailing vessels certificate of a lower grade must prove that he has served twelve months in the foreign trade, or eighteen months in the home trade, in a square-rigged sailing vessel.

33. Ordinary certificates will entitle the holders to go to sea as Value of mates or masters, as the case may be, of any vessels, sailing or certificates. steam.

SECOND MATE.

- 34. A candidate must be not less than seventeen years of age, second mate, ordinary. and must have served four years at sea.
- 35. Examination in Navigation .- A candidate for a Second Navigation. Mate's certificate will be required-
 - (a) To write a legible hand and spell correctly. This will to tested by not less than a quarter of an hour's dictation.
 - (b) To write a short definition of various astronomical and other terms and to draw a rough sketch or diagram to illustrate their meaning.
 - (c) To show a competent knowledge of the first five rules of arithmetic and the use of logarithms.
 - (d) To work a day's work complete, correcting the courses for leeway, deviation, and variation.
 - (c) To find the latitude by the meridian altitude of the sun.
 - (f) To work any practical problem in parallel sailing. (y) To find the true course and distance from one given position to another by Mercator's method; also the compass course, the variation and deviation being
 - given. (h) To find the time of high water at a given port.
 - (i) To find the true amplitude of the sun and the error of the compass therefrom; also the deviation, the variation being given.
 - (j) To find the longitude by chronometer from altitude of the sun by the usual methods, computing the daily rate of chronometer from errors observed when required; also to find the true azimuth of the sun, and the error of the compass; and the deviation, the variation being given.
 - (h) To find the true azimuth of the sun by the "Time Azimuth" tables; the error of the compass; also the
 - deviation, the variation being given.
 (1) To find on either a "true" or "magnetie" chart* the course to steer and the distance from one given position to another; to find the ship's position on the chart from cross-bearings of two objects; from two bearings of the same object, the course and distance run between taking the bearings being given; also the distance of the ship from the object at the time of taking the second bearing.

He will be required to answer viva voce questions on the following subjects :-

- (m) The use and adjustments of the sextant, read off and on the are, and the mode of finding the index error by both horizon and sun.
- The International Code of Signals.
- The construction, use, and principle of the barometer, thermometer, and hydrometer.

(p) Weights and measures.

36. Examination in Scamanship.—He must understand and Second mate, ordinary scamanship. give satisfactory answers on the following subjects:-

- a) The standing and running rigging of ships.
- (b) Bending, unbending, setting, reefing, taking in, and furling sail.
- Sending masts and yards up and down, &c.
- (d) Management of a ship when under canvas.
 (e) Management of ships' boats in heavy weather.
- (f) Dunnaging and stowing cargo, &c.

^{*} The short terms "true" and "magnetic" are used for brevity and convenience throughout the Regulations to indicate charts which have compasses engraved upon them showing the true or magnetic points of the compass respectively.

- (g) The Rule of the Road as regards both steamers and sailing vessels, their regulation lights and fog and sound signals.
- (h) The signals of distress, and the signals to be made by ships wanting a pilot, and the liabilities and penaltics incurred by the misuse of these signals.

(i) The marking and use of the lead and log lines.

- (j) The use and management of the rocket apparatus in the event of a vessel being stranded.
- (k) Any questions of a like nature appertaining to the duties of a Second Mate that the Examiner may think necessary to ask.
- (I) Also questions on the additional subjects which are specified in the rules of examination for Second Mates' certificates of competency for foreign-going steam-ships. (See Regulation No. 53.)

ONLY MATE.

Only mate, ordinary.

37. A candidate must be not less than nineteen years of age, and have served five years at sea.

FIRST MATE.

First mate, ordinary. 38. A candidate must be not less than nineteen years of age, and have served five years at sea, of which one year must have been in a capacity not lower than Fourth Mate of a foreign-going vessel whilst holding a Second Mate's certificate for foreign-going vessels. If his service was as Third or Fourth Mate, proof will be required that he had during the whole year charge of a watch. (See Regulation No. 123.)

Mate, Ordinary. Navigation. 39. Examination in Navigation.—A candidate for an Only or First Mate's certificate will be required—

- (a) To work out any three of the nautical problems prescribed for the Second Mates' examination which may be given him by the Examiner, in addition to the chart paper (1) and the oral subjects (m, n, o, p) prescribed for that grade.
- (b) To compute the time at which a given star will be on the observer's meridian. [Occasionally by inspection.]
- (c) To describe where tables giving the names of the principal stars passing the meridian may be found.

(d) To describe where the meridian passage of the principal planets may be found.

- (e) To determine what bright stars will be within an hour, or more, of the observer's meridian, above the pole and above the horizon, at any given time; also the hour angle, east or west, of each of the stars, and whether to the north or south of the observer's zenith when passing the meridian.
- (f) To describe any maps or diagrams which the candidate knows and prefers for further facilitating the recognition of the stars and planets.
- (g) To compute the approximate meridian altitude of one of the stars just found, for setting the sextant.
- (h) To find the latitude from the meridian altitude of the same star.
- (i) To find the longitude by chronometer by altitude of a star.
- (j) To find the true azimuth of a star by the "Time Azimuth" tables, and get the deviation therefrom.
- (h) To find the latitude by ex-meridian altitude of the sun or a star.
- (l) To find the line of position and the true bearing of the sun, and the ship's position, by Sumner's method by projection.
- (m) To answer certain questions relative to cyclones or revolving storms.

He will be required to answer rivâ roce questions on the following subjects:—

- (n) How to keep a ship's log-book.
- (o) How to calculate the capacity of a given bunker or
- (p) How to calculate a freight and its commissions.

First Mate, Ordinary, Seamanship.

- 40. Examination in Seamanship.—In addition to the qualifications required for a Second Mate's certificate, an Only or First Mate will be required to show a knowledge of the following
 - (a) Shifting large spars, rigging sheers, taking lower masts in and out.

- (b) How to moor and unmoor ship; to keep a clear anchor; and to carry out an anchor.
- (c) How to manage a ship in stormy weather, and to cast a ship on a lee shore.
- (d) How to secure the masts in the event of accident to the bowsprit.
- (e) How to rig purchases for getting heavy weights, anchors, machinery, &c., in or out.
- (f) How to dispose various kinds of cargo and weights, in a stiff, and in a tender vessel.
- (g) The ventilation of holds, and the stowage of explosives.
 (h) How to rig a sea anchor, and what means to employ to keep a vessel, disabled or unmanageable, out of the trough of the sea, and lessen her lee drift.
- (i) How to get a cast of the deep sea lead in heavy weather.
- (j) Accidents, and how to deal with them.
- (k) Any other questions appertaining to the duties of an Caly or First Mate which the examiner may think necessary to ask.
- (I) Also questions on the additional subjects which are specified in the rules of examination for Only and First Mate's certificates of competency for foreign-going steam-ships. (See Regulation 57.)

MASTER.

41. A candidate must be not less than 21 years of age, and-

Master,

- (a) he must have served six years at sea, of which one year must have been in a capacity not lower than Only Mate of a foreign-going vessel, whilst holding a certificate not lower than an Only Mate's certificate for foreigngoing vessels, and unless this service as officer was performed whilst holding a First Mate's certificate for foreign-going vessels, he will also be required to prove the officer's service prescribed for that grade (see Regulation 38); or,
- (b) he must have served six years at sea, of which one year and a half must have been in a capacity not lower than Only Mate of a home-trade vessel, whilst holding a certificate not lower than an Only Mate's certificate for foreign-going vessels, and, unless this service as officer was performed, whilst holding a First Mate's certificate for foreign-going vessels, he will also be required to prove the officer's service prescribed for that grade (see Regulation 38); or,
- (c) he must have served six and a half years at sea, one year of which must have been in a capacity not lower than Second Mate of a foreign-going vessel, whilst holding a First Mate's certificate for foreign-going vessels, and one year and a half not lower than Third and Fourth mate of a foreign-going vessel in charge of a watch whilst holding a Second Mate's certificate for foreign-going vessels; or,
- (d) he must have served nine years at sea in the home trade, of which three years must have been as Master, or one year as Master and three years in a capacity not lower than that of Mate, provided that in either case he has served in such capacity for not less than one year with a Second Mate's certificate for foreign-going yessels, or a Master's certificate for home-trade ships.
- 42. Examination in Navigation.—A candidate for an Ordinary Master, Master's certificate will be required to work out any twelve of the Navigation nantical problems prescribed for the grades of Second and First Mate that may be given him by the examiner, in addition to the chart paper, the cyclone paper, and the oral subjects prescribed for the grades of Second and First Mate. He will also be required—
 - (a) To find the latitude by the altitude of the polar star at any time.
 - (b) To find the latitude by the meridian altitude of the moon.
 - (c) To find the magnetic bearing of any fixed object when at sea or at anchor from bearings of the object taken with the ship's head on the equidistant compass points, and to compute the deviation therefrom; to construct a deviation curve upon a Napier's diagram, which will be furnished by the examiner, and show that he understands its practical application; to give

satisfactory written and oral answers to certain practical questions as to the effect of the ship's iron upon the compasses, and the method of determining the deviation, and show how to compensate the deviation by magnets and soft iron by the aid of Beall's compass devinscope.

- (d) To find on a chart the course to steer by compass in order to counteract the effect of a given current, and tind the distance the ship will make good towards a given point in a given time; and to work out practically the correction to apply to soundings taken at a given time and place to compare with the depth marked on the chart.
- He will be required to answer vivil voce questions on the following subjects :-
 - (e) The law as to the engagement and discharge and management of the crew, and the entries to be made in the official log.
 - (f) How to prevent and check an outbreak of scurvy on board ship,
 - (g) The law as to the load-line marks, and the entries and reports to be made respecting them.
 - (h) Invoices, charter party, bills of lading, Lloyd's agent, nature of bottomry, bills of exchange, surveys, aver-
- The prevailing winds and currents of the globe.
- The trade routes.
- (k) Tides.

Master, ordinary, Scamanship,

- 43. Examination in Seamanship.—In addition to the qualifications required for the grades of Second and First Mate, an Ordinary Master will be required to show a knowledge of the following subjects:-
 - (a) Construction of jury rudders for both wooden and iron vessels, also rafts.
 - (b) Resources for the preservation of the ship's crew in the event of wreck.
 - (c) Management of ship in heavy weather.
 - (d) Rescuing the crew of a disabled vessel.
 - (e) Steps to be taken when a ship is on her beam ends, or in any danger or difficulty, or disabled or unmanageable and on a lee shore.
 - (f) Heaving a keel out.
 - (g) How to proceed when placing a ship in dry dock, and directing repairs, and when putting into port in distress with damage to cargo and ship.
 - (h) Any other question of a like nature appertaining to the management of a ship which the examiner may think it necessary to ask.
 - (i) Also questions on the additional subjects which are specified in the rules of examination for Masters' certificates of competency for foreign-going steam-ships. (See Regulation 60.)

CERTIFICATES OF COMPETENCY FOR "FOREIGN-GOING FORE AND AFT RIGGED VESSELS ONLY."

Certificates for for fore and aft rigged vessels.

44. Certificates for the grades of Master, First Mate, Only Mate, and Second Mate of foreign-going ships, and on which the words "For fore and aft rigged vossels only" will be stamped, will be issued to candidates who have not complied with the regulation which requires them to have served at least one year in squarerigged sailing vessels, or who prove in course of examination that they are ignorant of the management of square-rigged ships. In other respects the qualifications for examination for such certificates are the same as for Ordinary Certificates.

Character of examinations.

45. The examinations for the grades of Second Mate, Only Mate, First Mate, and Master of fore and aft rigged vessels will be precisely the same as for the Ordinary Certificates, excepting that in seamanship a knowledge of the management of squarerigged vessels is not required.

Value of certificates.

46. A certificate "For fore and aft rigged vessels only" will not entitle the possessor to act in a capacity for which a certificate is required in square-rigged vessels, amongst which are classed full-rigged ships, barques, brigs, barquentines, brigantines, and steam-ships carrying square sails.

47. A candidate possessing a certificate "For fore and aft How certificates rigged vessels only," and desiring to be examined for an Ordinary certificate, must prove that he has served at sea at least one year in a square-rigged sailing vessel, unless he has previously held an Ordinary certificate of a lower grade.

CERTIFICATES FOR FOREIGN-GOING STEAM-SHIPS.

- 48. Certificates applying only to steam-ships will be issued, steam-ship subject to the examinations hereinafter described, to candidates who are either unable to comply with the regulation which requires them to have passed one year in square-rigged sailing requires them to have passed one year in square recovering that they are vessels or who prove in course of examination that they are ignorant of the management of square-rigged sailing vessels. the qualifying officers' service prescribed for these certificates must have been performed in steam-ships.
- 49. These certificates will entitle the holders to go to sea as Masters or Mates of foreign-going steam-ships, but will not entitle them to go to sea as Masters or Mates of foreign-going sailing ships.
- 50. There will be no distinction in these certificates between fore and aft rigged steam-ships and square-rigged steam-ships.

SECOND MATE.

- 51. The qualifications as to age and service are the same as for second mate, an Ordinary Second Mate's certificate, excepting that no service steam-ships. in square-rigged sailing vessels is required. (See Reg. 34.)
- 52. Examination in Navigation .- The examination in naviga- Navigation. tion for a Second Mate's certificate for foreign-going steam-ships will be precisely the same as that prescribed for an Ordinary Second Mate's certificate. (See Reg. 35.)
- 53. Examination in Seamanship .- The candidate must under- Seamanship. stand and be able to give satisfactory answers on the following

 - (a) The standing and running rigging of steam-ships.
 (b) Bending, unbending, setting, reefing, taking in, and furling sail.

Sending masts and yards up and down, &c.

- (d) Seeing everything in readiness and clear for getting under way, and the precautions to be then observed with regard to engines, propeller, &c.

 (e) Management of a steam-ship when under canvas.
- (f) Management of a ship's boat in heavy weather.

(q) Dunnaging and stowing cargo, &c.

- (h) The rule of the road as regards both steamers and sailing vessels, their regulation lights and fog and sound
- (i) Signals of distress, and signals to be made by ships wanting a pilot, and the liabilities and penalties incurred by the misuse of these signals.

The marking and use of the lead and log lines.

(k) The construction, use, and action of the sluices, and of the water-ballast tanks.

(1) Engine-room telegraph, &c.

- (m) Use and management of the rocket apparatus in the event of a vessel being strauded.
- (n) Any other questions of a like nature appertaining to the duties of the Second Mate of a steam-ship which the Examiner may think necessary to ask.

ONLY MATE.

54. The qualifications as to age and service are the same as only mate, for an Only Mate's Ordinary certificate, excepting that no ser-steam-ships. vice in square-rigged vessels is required. (See Reg. 37.)

FIRST MATE.

- 55. The qualifications as to age and service are the same as First mate, for a First Mate's Ordinary certificate, excepting that the service steam-ships. required as officer must have been in steam-ships, and that no service in squared-rigged vessels is required. (See Reg. 38.)
- 56. Examination in Navigation .- The examination in navi-Navigation. gation for an Only or First Mate's certificate for foreign-going steam-ships will be precisely the same as that prescribed for an Ordinary First Mate's certificate. (See Reg. 39.)
- 57. Examination in Seamanship .- In addition to the qualifi- Seamanship. cations required for a Second Mate's certificate, an Only or First

Mate will be required to show a knowledge of the following subjects :

(a) Shifting large spars; rigging sheers; and taking lower masts in and out.

(b) How to moor and unmoor ship; keep a clear anchor; and to carry out an anchor.

Management of a steam-ship in stormy weather.

- (d) How to rig purchases for getting heavy weights, anchors, machinery, &c., in and out.
- (e) How to dispose various kinds of cargo and weights in a stiff and in a tender vessel.

Ventilation of holds, and the stowage of explosives.

(g) The effects of the serew race upon the rudder; and the effect produced on the direction of the head of the ship by going ahead or astern with a right or left handed screw when the rudder is ported or starboarded; also, the effect of twin screws under the same conditions, and when going ahead with one and reversing the other, &c., &c.

(h) How to rig a sea anchor, and what means to employ to keep a steam-ship, with her machinery disabled, out of the trough of the sea, and to lessen her

lee drift."

- (i) How to turn a steam-ship short round.
 (j) How to get a cast of the deep-sea lead in heavy weather.
- (k) Any other questions of a like nature appertaining to the duties of a First Mate of a steam-ship which the Examiner may think necessary to put to him.

MASTER.

Master, steam-ships,

58. The qualifications as to age and service are the same as a Master's Ordinary certificate for a foreign-going ship, excepting that the service required as officer must have been performed in steam-ships, and that no service in square-rigged vessels is (See Reg. 41.) required.

Navigation.

59. Examination in Navigation.-The examination in navigation, &c.. will be precisely the same as that prescribed for an Ordinary Master's certificate. (See Reg. 42.)

Seamanship,

- 60. Examination of Seamonship .- In addition to the qualifications required for the grades of Second and First Mate, a Master will be required to show a knowledge of the following
 - (a) Construction of rafts and jury runners suitable for serew steam-ships
 - (b) The preservation of the ship's crew in the event of wreck.
 - Management of steam-ships in heavy weather.

(d) Rescuing the crew of a disabled ship,

(e) Steps to be taken when a vessel is on her beam ends, or disabled and on a lec shore.

(f) How to use steam appliances in the event of fire.

- (g) The best arrangement for towing vessels under different circumstances.
- (h) Placing ship in dry dock; directing repairs; and the mode of procedure when putting into port in distress
- with damage to cargo and ship.

 (i) Any other questions of a like nature apportaining to the management of a steam-ship which the Examiner may think it necessary to put to him.

61. A candidate possessing a certificate for foreign-going Steam-ship certificates, how steam-ships only, and desiring to be examined for an Ordinary certificate, must prove that he has served at sea at least one year in a square-rigged sailing vessel, unless he has previously held an Ordinary certificate of a lower grade.

EXAMINATIONS FOR EXTRA AND HONORARY CERTIFICATES.

CERTIFICATES FOR FOREIGN-GOING SHIPS.

62. An Extra Master's Certificate for a foreign-going ship will entitle the holder to go to sea as Master of any vessel, sailing or

63. An Extra Master's examination is voluntary, and intended for such persons as wish to prove their superior qualifications and are desirous of having certificates of the highest grade granted by the Board; the Extra examination may take place when the applicant is qualified to go up for examination for an

ordinary master's certificate, or at any time subsequent to his having passed as master ordinary.

- 64. Examination in Navigation.—The candidate will be re-Extra master, quired to work out and show the construction of any four of the navigation, problems prescribed for the Ordinary certificates, and to satisfy the examiner in the oral subjects prescribed for those certificates. He must also be prepared to be examined in any of the following subjects, showing the construction of all the problems:—
 - (a) To work a lunar observation by either sun, star, or planet; and to compute the altitudes when they are not given.

(b) To find the latitude from double altitudes of the sun or of a star.

(c) To determine, from simultaneous observations of two different stars, the position of the ship, and the true bearing of the stars, by Sumner's method. The candidate may either determine the four longitudes from the two assumed latitudes which will be given, or solve the question in any other way he may choose.

(d) To find the error of a chronometer from the altitude of the sun or of a star, observed with an artificial, or with the natural, horizon.

(e) To explain clearly in writing the principles of (1) Great Circle Sailing; (2) Windward Great Circle Sailing; (3) Composite Great Circle Sailing; and their advantages and disadvantages.

(f) To show approximately on a terrostrial globe the Great Circle Track and the distance from one given position to another; also the latitude and longitude of vertex; and the longitude from vertex; and to explain how the track can then be transferred to a Mercator's chart. Occasionally the candidate will be required to lay the track down on a chart.

- (g) To determine the initial Great Circle Course, and the distance from one given position to another, the latitude and longitude of vertex, the longitude from vertex and the latitudes and longitudes through which the Great Circle will pass; laying the track, composite or otherwise, down on a Mercator's chart, and explaining briefly how the course and distance from one point to another on this track is then found. This problem may, subject to the decision of the examiner, be solved either by calculation, or by any tables, graphic method, or Great Circle chart, known to and preferred by the candidate, and it will usually be set so as to leave the choice of method to the candidate.
- (h) To draw a figure, and write down the trigonometrical ratios.
- (i) Right-angled plane trigonometry; deducing and writing down the formulal for each computation in the problem given.

(j) Oblique-angled plane trigonometry; deducing and writing down the formula, or the rule for each computation in the problem given.

- (k) To give Napier's rules for circular parts for the solution of right-angled spherical triangles, explaining clearly how the different angles and sides are considered in deducing the formulæ.
- (1) Right-handed spherical trigonometry.
- (m) The laws of the deviation of the compass in iron ships.
- (n) To construct a Mercator's chart.
- (o) The law of storms. The candidate to write a paper of what he knows of this subset.

He most be prepared to answer viva voce questions on the following subjets:—

- (p) The leading principles of the construction of the sextant and of the vernier.
- (q) The civil duties of the shipmaster, in which he will be expected to show a more extensive knowledge than a candidate for an Ordinary Master's certificate.

The construction of the problems mentioned above, and those in the compass syllabus, must be shown as follows:—

(a) A circle should be drawn projected on the plane of the horizon—unless the problem can be shown better otherwise—and a correct figure drawn in it, the magnitude of the sides and angles being estimated approximately by the eye. (b) The sides and angles used in solving the problem should be marked by distinguishing letters in the figure, and the candidate should over each fresh computation write down clearly what is given and what he is required to find, together with the formula which he proposes to use.

(c) Opposite each quantity in the computation he should put the letters denoting the part of the triangle which it represents, writing "comp." before the letters when the quantity is the complement of that part of the triangle.

Candidates will not be required to enter into the mathematical investigation of the rules and formulæ used in the solution of problems involving oblique-angled spherical triangles, but credit will be given to any candidate showing such knowledge. When, however, a problem or part of a problem is solved by right-angled spherical trigonometry, the simple process of deducing the formula from the figure, by Napier's rules for circular parts or other method, must be shown.

Where a problem is solved by right-angled plane trigonometry, the simple process of deducing the formula from the figure for each of the computations in it must be shown.

The rule for finding the latitude by meridian altitude must be

proved by the figure.

65. Examination in Seamanship.—In addition to the qualifications required of an Ordinary Master, an Extra Master will be expected to give satisfactory answers to any questions in practical seamanship that the Examiner may put to him

.

CERTIFICATES FOR "FOREIGN-GOING STEAM-SHIPS ONLY."

Extra certificates, steam-ships

Extra master, camanship.

66. Extra certificates for steam-ships only will also be issued, subject to the examination hereinafter described, to officers who can show the necessary service in steam-ships. The certificates will be marked "For steam-ships only," and will only entitle the holders to go to sea as masters of steam-ships.

67. The examination is open to all who are qualified to go up for a master's certificate for foreign-going steam-ships, or who have already obtained such a certificate. It is open also to men who have failed in the examination for an extra master's certificate to show the requisite knowledge of the management of square-rigged sailing vessels, provided they can prove the necessary amount of officer's service in steam-ships. (See Reg. 24.)

Extra master, steam-ship, navigation. 68. Examination in Navigation.—The Examination in navigation for an Extra Master's certificate for steam-ships will be precisely the same as that prescribed for an extra master's certificate. (See Reg. 64.)

Seamanship.

69. Examination in Seamanship —In addition to the qualifications required of a Master of a foreign-going steam-ship, the Extra Master will be expected to give satisfactory answers to any questions appertaining to the management of a steam-ship that the Examiner may put to him.

Home-trade ships.

CERTIFICATES OF COMPETENCY FOR "HOME-TRADE SHIPS."

MATE

Mate.

70. A candidate for examination as Mate of a Home-Trade ship must be not less than nineteen years of age, and have served four years at sea.

Navigation.

71. Examination in Navigation, &c.—He must write a legible hand and spell correctly, and understand and work out sums in the rules of compound addition, subtraction, multiplication, and division; he must be able to work a day's work, correcting the courses for deviation, leeway, and variation. He will be required to find the latitude by meridian altitude of the sun; he must be able to take a bearing by compass, and be conversant with the use of Mercator's chart, and be able to find on either a true or magnetic chart the course to steer and the distance from one given position to another; to find the ship's position on the chart from cross bearings of two objects; from two bearings of the same object, the course and distance run between taking the bearings being given; and also the distance of the ship from the object at the time of taking the second bearing; he must understand the use of the sextant with its adjustments, and be able to observe

with it, find the index error by the horizon, and to read off and on the are; he must be able to keep properly a ship's log. He must also pass an examination in the International Code of Signals.

72. Examination in Seamanship .-- He must give satisfactory Seamanship. answers to questions as to the standing and running rigging of ships; as to bending and unbending, setting, reefing, taking in, and furling sail; as to shifting large sprs, rigging sheers, taking lower masts in and out; as to the management of a ship's boat in heavy weather; how to moor and unmoor ship, and to keep a clear anchor; to carry out an anchor; how to rig purchases for getting heavy weights, machinery, &c., in and out; he must give satisfactory answers as to the ventilation of holds, the storage of explosives, and the dunnaging and stowing of cargo generally; he must have a thorough knowledge of the rule of the road as regards both steam-ships and sailing vessels, their regulation lights and fog and sound signals; he must be able to describe the signals of distress and the signals to be made by ships wanting a pilot, and the liabilities and penaltics incurred by the misuse of such signals; he must be able to mark and use the lead and log lines; he must also understand the use and management of the rocket apparatus in the event of his vessel being stranded; he must also have a knowledge of the character of the lights and dangers within the limits of the Home Trade. He will also be required to give satisfactory answers to questions as to his knowledge of the additional subjects (applying more particularly to steam-ships) which are specified in the rules of examination for mates' certificates of competency for Home-Trade steam-ships only.

MASTER.

- 73. A candidate for examination as Master of a Home-Trade Master ship must not be less than twenty years of age, and have served five years at sea, of which—
 - (a) one year must have been as First or Only Mate in a home-trade or foreign-going ship of not less than 100 tons gross registered tonuage, during which service he must have been in possession of a Mate's certificate for home-trade ships or of a First or Only Mate's certificate for foreign-going ships; or
 - ficate for foreign-going ships; or

 (b) two and a half years must have been in a capacity not lower than Second Mate of a home-trade ship of not less than 100 tons gross registered tonnage in charge of a watch whilst holding a Mate's certificate for home-trade ships or a Second Mate's certificate for foreign-going ships.
- 74. Examination in Navigation.—In addition to the navigation Navigation, qualifications required of a Mate of a Home-Trade ship, the candidate must show that he is able to observe and calculate by inspection the amplitude of the sun, and to find the error of the ship's compass therefrom; and also the deviation, the variation being given. He must be able to observe the sun's azimuth, and to find its true bearing from the "Time Azimuth Tables"; to find the error and deviation of a ship's compass, the variation being given. He will be required to answer in writing the questions regarding the deviation of the compass; he will also be required to find on a chart the course to steer by compass in order to counteract the effect of a given current, and to find the distance the ship will make good towards a given point in a certain time, and to work out practically the correction to apply to soundings taken at a given time and place to compare with the depth marked on the chart, &c.

75. Examination in Seamanship.—In addition to the qualifi-Seamanship. cations required for a Mate of a Home-Trade ship, the candidate must know how to rig a sea anchor, and what means to apply to keep a vessel which has become disabled or unmanageable out of the trough of the sea, &c., &c.; how to get a cast of the deep-sea lead in heavy weather, &c.; he will be examined as to his resources for the preservation of the passengers and crew in the event of wreck, and the steps to be taken if his vessel is disabled and drifting towards a lee shore; he must be able to construct jury rudders for both wooden and iron vessels, and also rafts. He must explain the mode of procedure when placing a ship in dry dock, directing repairs, and when putting into port in distress with damage to cargo and ship. He must possess a sufficient knowledge of what he is required to do bylaw as to entry and clearance of vessel, the engagement, the discharge, and management of his crew, and as to infliction of penalties and entries to be made in

the official log, and the law as to load-line marks and the entries and reports to be made respecting them. He must answer any questions appertaining to the management of a ship which the examiner may consider it necessary to put to him. He will also be required to give satisfactory answers as to his knowledge of the additional subjects (applying more particularly to steam-ships) which are specified in the rules of examination for Master's certificates of competency for Home-Trade steam-ships only.

Home-trade steam-ships.

CERTIFICATES OF COMPETENCY FOR "HOME-TRADE STEAM-SHIPS ONLY."

76. Certificates of competency will be issued, subject to the examinations hereinafter described, to candidates who have served in steam-ships or who prove in course of examination for Ordinary certificates that they are ignorant of the management of square-rigged sailing-vessels, provided they are qualified as to service.

77. These certificates will entitle the holders to go to sea as Masters and Mates of Home-Trade steam-ships, but will not entitle the holders to go to sea as Masters or Mates of Home-Trade sailing

ships.
78. There will be no distinction in these certificates between

fore and aft rigged and square-rigged steam-ships.

MATE.

Mate.

79. A candidate for examination as Mate of a Home-Trade steam-ship only must not be less than nineteen years of age, and must have served four years at sea.

80. Examination in Navigation.—The examination will be the same as that prescribed for Mates of Home-Trade ships. (See

Regulation 71.)

81. Examination in Seamanship.—In addition to the examination prescribed for Mates of Home-Trade ships in so far as such may apply to steam-ships (see Regulation 72), he must give satisfactory answers to questions as to a steam-ship getting under way, either from a berth at a wharf, &c., or from an anchorage, and as to the precautions to be then observed with regard to engines, propeller, &c.; as to the management of a steam-ship when under canvas; he must also understand the construction, use, and action of the sluices, and of the water-ballast tauks, engine-room telegraph, &c, and any questions appertaining to the duties of the Mate of a Home-Trade steam-ship.

MASTER

Master.

- 82. A candidate for examination as Master of a Home-Trade steam-ship only must not be less than twenty years of age, and have served five years at sea, of which—
 - (a) One year must have been as First or Only Mate in a foreign-going or home-trade steam-ship or of not less than 100 tons gross registered tonnage, during which service he must have been in possession of a Mate's certificate for home-trade steam-ships or of a First or Only Mate's certificate for foreign-going steam-ships; or
 - (b) two and a half-years must have been in a capacity not lower than Second Mate of a home-trade steam-ship of not less than 100 tons gross registered tonnage, in charge of a watch whilst holding a Mate's certificate for home-trade steam-ships or a Second Mate's certificate for foreign-going steam-ships.

Navigation.

83. Examination in Navigation.—The examination will be the same as that prescribed for Masters of Home-Trade ships. (See Regulation 74.)

Seamanship.

84. Examination in Seamanship.—In addition to the qualifications prescribed for Masters of home-trade ships in so far as such may apply to steam-ships (see Regulation 75), he must show that he understands the management of a steam-ship in heavy weather. He must be able to describe the effects of the screw-race upon the rudder; and the effect produced on the head of the ship by going ahead or astern with a right or left handed screw when the rudder is ported or starboarded. He must know what means to apply to keep a steamship with machinery disabled out of the trough of the sea, and lessen her lee drift; he must know how to use the steam appliances in the event of fire, and the best arrangement for towing vessels under different circumstances; he must be able to answer any questions appertaining to the management of a steam-ship that the examiner may consider necessary to put to him.

CERTIFICATES OF COMPETENCY FOR MASTERS OF FORE AND AFT RIGGED HOME-TRADING SAILING SHIPS NOT EXCEEDING 100 TONS GROSS REGIS-TERED TONNAGE.

MASTER.

- 85. A candidate for examination for a certificate of competency as Master of a fore and aftrigged Home-Trade sailing ship not exceeding 100 tons gross registered tonnage must be not less than twenty years of age, and must have served five years at sea as a deck-hand in sailing vessels of not less than 15 tons gross registered tonnage, and must prove that he has served in such capacity at least twelve months within the three years immediately preceding the date of his application to be examined.
- 86. Examination.—He must write a legible hand, and have a knowledge of notation and the first four rules of arithmetic. He must be able to take a bearing by compass, and be conversant with the use of Mercator's chart, and be able to find on either a true or magnetic chart the course to steer, and the distance from one given position to another, to find the ship's position on the chart from cross bearings of two objects; from two bearings of the same object, the course and distance run between taking the bearings being given; and also the distance of the ship from the object at the time of taking the second bearing; and he must be able to properly keep a ship's log. He must give satisfactory answers as to the management of fore and aft rigged home-trade sailing vessels under all conditions of weather, and as to the dunnaging and stowing of cargo generally. He must have a thorough know-ledge of the rule of the road as regards both steam-ships and sailing vessels, their regulation lights and fog and sound signals. He must be able to describe the signals of distress and the signals to be made by ships wanting a pilot, and the liabilities and penal-ties incurred by the misuse of such signals. He must be able to mark and use the lead and log lines. He must also understand the use and management of the rocket apparatus in the event of his vessel being stranded. He must also have a knowledge of the character of the lights and dangers within the limits of the hometrade, and answer any questions appertaining to the duties of a Master of a fore and aft rigged home-trade sailing ship not exceeding 100 tons gross registered tonnage which the Examiner may consider necessary to put to him.

CERTIFICATES OF COMPETENCY FOR MASTERS OF River and bay SAILING SHIPS UNDER 100 TONS GROSS REGIS-sailing ships. TERED TONNAGE IN THE RIVER AND BAY SERVICE.

MASTER.

- 87. Master .- A candidate for examination for a certificate as Master. Master of a River and Bay sailing ship under 100 tons gross registered tonnage must be not less than twenty years of age, and must have served three years as a deck-hand in sailing vessels of not less than 15 tons gross registered tonnage.
- 88. He must write a legible hand; he must know thoroughly the rule of the road, and show that he possesses the requisite local knowledge of the bays, lakes, or rivers for which he desires to be examined; he must also be acquainted with the port signals of Victoria, and answer any questions apertaining to the duties of a Master of a sailing vessel engaged in the river and bay service that the examiner may consider necessary, particularly as to the management of fore and aft rigged vessels.
- 89. Exchange of Certificates.—The holder of a Master's certificate Exchange of of competency for a River and Bay sailing ship, desirous of being qualified to take charge of a river and bay steam-ship of less than 100 tons gross registered tonnage, may have his certificate exchanged therefor, on his producing satisfactory evidence of his having been employed as a deck-hand in a river and bay steamship for a period of not less than six months while in possession of such certificate as aforesaid; he must also show, on examination, of such a steam-ship, and that he has a knowledge of potation, and the first four rules of arithmetic,

CERTIFICATES OF COMPETENCY FOR MASTERS OF STEAM-SHIPS. UNDER 100 TONS GROSS REGISTERED TONNAGE IN THE RIVER AND BAY SERVICE.

MASTER. .

Master,

90. A candidate for examination for a certificate of competency as Master of a River and Bay steam-ship under 100 tons gross registered tonnage will, on his passing the examination hereinafter prescribed, receive a certificate for such waters as his previous experience and service may entitle him to, namely (if limits restricted):—"Port of Melbourne," "Port of Geelong," "Western Port," "Gippsland Lakes," "River Murray," &c., and his certificate will be indorsed accordingly; the holder of such certificate of competency, as Master for restricted limits, shall be deemed competent to act as Mate of any River and Bay steam-ship of 100 tons gross registered tonnage and upwards.

Restricted limits.

- 91. Such candidate must be not less than twenty years of age, and must have served four years as a deck-haud in sea-going or river and bay steam-ships of not less than 15 tons gross registered tonnage, of which one year must have been on steam-ships plying in the waters for which he desires to obtain a certificate, and must prove that he has served in such capacity at least twelve months within the three years immediately preceding the date of his application to be examined.
- 92. The examination will be the same as that prescribed for Masters of steam-ships of 100 tons gross registered tonnage and upwards. (See Regulation 100.)

Exchange of certificates.

93. The holder of a Master's certificate of competency for River and Bay steam-ships under 100 tons gross registered tonnage desirous of being qualified to take charge of a River and Bay steam-ship of 100 tons gross registered tonnage and upwards, may have his certificate exchanged therefor on his producing satisfactory evidence of his having served as Mate of a River and Bay steam-ship of over 100 tons gross registered tonnage for a period of not less than six months while in possession of a master's certificate as aforesaid. He must also show on examination that he has acquired a knowledge of the management of the larger class of River and Bay steam-ships.

Unrestricted limits.

94. Any candidate who is in possession of a Master's certificate for River and Bay steam-ships under 100 tons for restricted limits (see Regulation 90), and is desirous of obtaining a like certificate for the River and Bay service generally (i.e., without restriction as to limits), will require to produce satisfactory evidence of having served for a period of not less than six months as a Mate or deckhand of a River and Bay steam-ship of not less than 15 tons gross registered tonnage plying in "Port Phillip Bay," and will require to show on examination that he has acquired the necessary local knowledge.

Certificates issued by other authorities. 95. Any candidate who is in possession of a certificate of competency as a Master of a steam-ship issued by any competent authority recognised as such by the Marine Board of Victoria (the said certificate being in the opinion of the Board equivalent in value to a Victorian River and Bay certificate for a similar grade), and who is desirous of obtaining a certificate of such grade applicable to Victorian waters, may make application (accompanied by the prescribed fee) to the Board, who will cause such candidate to be examined as to his local knowledge.

Upon passing such examination a certificate of competency as a Master of a River and Bay steam-ship under 100 tons gross registered tonnage may be issued to such candidate.

River and bay team-ships. QUALIFICATIONS FOR CERTIFICATES OF COM-PETENCY FOR STEAM-SHIPS OF 100 TONS GROSS REGISTERED TONNAGE AND UPWARDS IN THE RIVER AND BAY SERVICE.

96. A candidate for examination for a certificate of competency as Mate or Master of River and Bay steam-ships of 100 tons gross registered tounage and upwards will, on his passing the examination hereinafter prescribed, receive a certificate for such waters as his previous experience and service may entitle him to, namely (if limits restricted):—"Port of Melbourne," "Port of Geelong," "Western Port," "Gippsland Lakes," "River Murray," &c., and such certificate will be indorsed accordingly.

Restricted limits.

Mate

97. A candidate for examination for a certificate as Mate of Mate steam-ships of 100 tons gross registered tonnage and upwards must be not less than nineteen years of age, and must have served three years as a deck-hand in sea-going or river and bay steam-ships of not less than 15 tons gross registered tonnage, of which one year must have been on steam-ships of not less than 100 tons gross registered tonnage plying in the waters for which he desires to obtain a certificate, and must prove that he has served in such capacity at least twelve months within the three years immediately preceding the date of his application to be

98. He must write a legible hand, and have a knowledge of Examination notation and the first four rules of arithmetic; he must know thoroughly the rule of the road, how to mark and use the lead line, and be acquainted with the port signals of Victoria; he must show that he possesses the requisite local knowledge of the ports or rivers for which he desires to be examined, and answer any questions appertaining to the duties of a Mate in the River and Bay service that the Examiner may consider necessary.

MASTER.

99. A candidate for examination for a certificate as Master of Master. steam-ships of 100 tons gross registered tonnage and upwards must be not less than twenty years of age, and must have served four years in sea-going or River and Bay steam-ships, of which one year must have been as Mate of a River and Bay steam-ship of not less than 100 tons gross registered tonnage, during which service as Mate he must have been in possession of a Mate's certificate, or of a certificate as Master of steam-ships under 100 tons gross registered tonnage.

100. In addition to the qualifications required for a Mate he Examination must understand the first four rules of compound arithmetic; be able to take a bearing, and ascertain therefrom the position of a ship by cross bearings, as well as find on a local magnetic chart the course and distance to steer by compass between any one given point or place and another; he must have an intimate knowledge of the rivers, lakes, or bays for which he desires to obtain a certificate, and also of the International Code of Signals, and the use and management of the rocket apparatus in the event of the vessel being stranded; he must also be able to answer any questions appertaining to the management of a River and Bay steam-ship that the examiner may consider necessary.

101. Any candidate who is in possession of a river and bay unrestricted certificate as Master for restricted limits (see Regulation 96) and limits. is desirous of obtaining a certificate for the River and Bay service generally (i.e., without restriction as to limits), will require to produce satisfactory evidence of having served for a period of not less than six months as a Mate or deck-hand of a River and Bay steam-ship of not less than 100 tons gross registered tonnage plying in "Port Phillip Bay," and will require to show on examination that he has acquired the necessary local knowledge.

VOLUNTARY EXAMINATION IN COMPASS DEVIATION.

102. Any Master or Mate who wishes to pass a voluntary Examination, examination in the laws of the deviation of the compasses in an fee, &c. iron ship, and in the means of compensating or correcting it, can at any time be examined upon filling up the usual form of application and the payment to the Secretary to the Marine Board of a fee of One pound. If the candidate pass such examination, a statement to that effect will be duly made upon the certificate as Master or Mate held by him.

VOLUNTARY EXAMINATIONS IN STEAM.

103. A candidate who is possessed of a certificate of compe-voluntary tency of any grade for Foreign-going or Homo-Trade vessels may be examinations in examined as to his practical knowledge of the use and working of the steam-engine, and such examination will be conducted at such time and place as the Board may appoint for the purpose.

Application, how to be made 104. Any Master or Mate desiring to be examined in steam must deliver to the Secretary a statement in writing to that effect, upon the ordinary form of application; if the applicant has a certificate of competency, such certificate must be delivered with his statement.

Fee to be paid, conduct of examination, &c.

105. A fee of One pound must be paid by the applicant for the examination in steam, and the Secretary will thereupon inform him of the time and place at which he is to attend to be examined, and the examination will in due course proceed in the same manner as other examinations. If the applicant fail, and has given in his certificate of competency, it will be at once returned to him, but no part of the fee he has paid will be returned.

Record of certificate.

106. If the applicant passes, the words "Passed in Steam," with the date and place of examination, will be entered on the certificate.

Failure.

107. If the applicant fail, he may not present himself for re-examination until the expiration of three months from the date of failure.

Extent of examination.

Electricity.

108. The examination will be for the most part viva voce, and extends to a general knowledge of the practical use and working of the steam-engine, and of the various valves, fittings, and pieces of machinery connected with it, and will also extend to a practical knowledge of electricity as applied on board ship. Intricate theoretical questions on calculations of horse-power or areas of cylinders and valves, or any of the more difficult questions relating to steam-engines and boilers will not be asked. The examination will be confined to what a master of a steam-ship may be called upon to perform in the case of the death, incapacity, or delinquency of the engineer.

Practical knowledge.

109. Applicants must know the names and uses of the various parts of engines and boilers, and their connecting pipes, valves, and cocks, &c. Practical knowledge, as distinguished from theories, abstruse calculations, and book learning will be the test of the applicant's fitness to have his certificate indersed as having "passed in steam."

Where examination to be conducted. 110. The examiner will arrange to conduct part of the examination in the engine-room of a steam-ship, unless, from circumstances, he finds it impossible to do so; but, in the event of the candidate passing, the examiner must state in writing what circumstances prevented a visit to an engine-room; and if an opportunity offer, the applicant will be required under the guidance of the examiner to start and stop the engine of some vessel which may have her steam up.

Place of examination to be reported. 111. The examiner in sending in his report of the examination must state where the examination has been held.

Examination in elementary questions. 112. Candidates will be required to answer correctly sixteen out of twenty Elementary Questions. These questions will be altered from time to time without notice, and will be of such a nature as any man of ordinary capacity ought to answer who has any practical knowledge of the use and working of the steamengine.

Answers to be sent to the Board. 113. The questions, with the candidates' answers, must be handed by the Examiner to the Secretary to the Board with the reports after each examination.

In cases of failure examiners to report questions that decided it.

114. The examiner will report, in case of failure, the nature of the question or questions that caused the failure, or the point in as the management of the engine in which the candidate was deficient.

Service on board steam-ship unnecessary. 115. An applicant for voluntary examination is not required to have served on board steam-ships; but will require to show that he has acquired a practical knowledge of the use and working of the steam-engine.

RULES FOR ESTIMATING SEA SERVICE.

Discharges.

116. Sea service shall be reckoned from the commencement to the termination of a voyage, and certificates of discharge may be accepted as proof of sea service, but the Secretary will be careful to see that such discharges have not in any way been tampered with, and in any suspicious case shall report the matter to the Board.

Sea service.

117. For foreign-going certificates the term "sea service" shall mean, unless otherwise stated, service performed in foreign going ships.

- 118. Services must be verified in all possible cases by original Discharges discharges, but in cases of shipwreck or other unforeseen causes where the discharges have been lost a proper affidavit or declaration made and produced by the candidate may be accepted in lieu thereof.
- 119. Service in the home trade will be accepted as equivalent service in the to service in the foreign trade for certificates for home-trade home trade. ships, but for foreign-going certificates service in the home trade will only be accepted as equivalent to two-thirds of the same time served in the foreign trade.

120. When foreign-going certificates are required to be held to Nature of certificates. qualify candidates for examination they may be either the ordinary certificates or those for fore and aft rigged vessels or for foreigngoing steam-ships.

121 Officer's service, to be recognised as such, must be per-Officer's service formed with the requisite certificate as specified in these regulations. The officer's service performed by men who have been duly promoted during the course of a voyage (see Regulation 125) or who in consequence of serving in vessels plying between ports abroad have been unable to obtain the necessary certificate may, however, be recognised, provided that it is in other respects

122. Foreign officers who wish to apply for a certificate of Foreign officers. competency under these regulations, must in all cases have performed their qualifying officer's service with the requisite certificate as specified in these regulations. The service may have been performed in foreign vessels if the candidate can produce satisfactory testimonials to conduct and character, and is able to prove that the service has been in the required capacities, and that during the period of service he has held a certificate of competency of the rank required by the regulations (see Regulation 127) issued by the Board of Trade, Loudon, or by some authority duly recognised thereby.

123. When service "in charge of a watch," in either the Service "in foreign or home trade, is specified in the regulations, the candi-watch." date will have to prove that during the whole of the time claimed he had the regular charge of a watch or watches, which, if in the foreign trade, must amount to not less than eight hours of each 24 hours of service. It must be distinctly understood that occasional service in charge of a watch will not be accepted as mate's service under the regulations.

124. Service as additional or auxiliary First Mate, or as Auxiliary mates auxiliary Second Mate (when a Third Mate is carried), in large foreign-going vessels will count as First Mate's or Second Mate's service, as the case may be, provided that the candidate was entered on the articles in one of these capacities, and that he was, during the whole time claimed, in charge of a watch or

125. Whenever a man in the course of a voyage has, from any Promotion cause, been regularly promoted to a vacancy from the rank in during a voyage. which he first shipped, and the fact of such promotion, with the reason for which it has been made, is properly recorded in the articles and in the official log-book, he will receive credit for his service in the higher grade for the period subsequent to his promotion on his producing a discharge in evidence of such service.

126. Service in a lower grade than that of First or Only Mate in Mate's service in the home trade will not be recognised as officer's service towards the home trade. qualifying candidates for examination for certificates for foreigngoing ships.

- 127. The testimonials of service of foreigners and of British Testimonials of foreigners. seamen who have served in foreign vessels which cannot be verified in any Mercantile Marine Office, must be confirmed either by the consul of the country to which the ship in which the candidate served belonged, or by some other recognised official authority of that country, or by the testimony of some credible person having personal knowledge of the facts required to be established. The production of such evidence, however, will not of necessity be deemed sufficient, and in each case the Board reserves to itself the right of dealing with any application made under this regulation as it may see fit.
- 128. Service in auxiliary screw whaling ships and other vessels auxiliary screw with auxiliary steam power, which use their screws only in calms whaling ships. or during light winds, will be deemed to be service performed in sailing vessels.

Service in excursion steam-ships.

129. In the case of service on board excursion steam-ships, only such service as has been performed actually at sea, i.e., in other than the River and Bay trade, will be accepted as qualifying service for home-trade certificates of competency.

Service in capacities other than as apprentice, midshipman, or seaman.

130. Candidates whose services have been in capacities other than apprentice, midshipman, cadet, ordinary seaman, or able seaman, e.g., cook (when it is performed in small vessels, where cooking is only part of a man's duty), carpenter, or sailmaker, will be required to satisfy the Board that they have, during the whole time claimed, performed deck duties in addition to their own particular work, and that they have a good knowledge of seamanship. The latter may be proved by the production of satisfactory certificates from Masters with whom the applicants have served; but such service will only be accepted as equivalent to two-thirds of the same time served as ordinary deck hand. Failing satisfactory evidence, applicant will be required to perform additional service in the capacity of seaman. Service as cook (under other conditions than the above), or as steward, will not be accepted.

Service in trawlers, pilot vessels, &c.

- 131. Service performed exclusively in trawlers and other deepsea fishing vessels, or in pilot vessels, will not qualify a candidate for examination. He must, in addition, prove the following service:—
 - For a foreign-going certificate, service for at least eighteen months in an ordinary trading vessel in the Foreign Trade, or the equivalent period (27 months) in the Home Trade.
 - (2) For a Home-Trade certificate, service for at least twelve months in an ordinary trading vessel in the Foreign or Home Trade.

Service in tug-

132. Service performed in tug-boats employed outside partially smooth water limits may be accepted as sea service for qualifying for a Mate's or Master's certificate for home-trade steam-ships.

Service in lightships and engine-room.

133. Service in light-ships or in an engine-room of any steam vessel will not be accepted as sea service for a Master's or Mate's certificate of competency.

Service on rivers and in smooth waters.

134. Service performed on rivers, no matter of what size, or in smooth or partially smooth water will not be accepted as qualifying service for certificates of competency for Foreign-going or Home-Trade ships.

Service on board a training ship.

135. Half of the time served on board a training ship, officially recognised as such, will be allowed to count as service at sea, up to a limit of one year (i.e., no length of service will be allowed to count as more than one year at sea), provided that the candidate can produce amongst his testimonials a certificate to the satisfaction of the Board that he has conducted himself creditably, and passed a good examination in seamanship so far as practised in the training ship as well as in other matters down to the time of his leaving the ship, but this service will not be accepted as equivalent to service in square-rigged vessels.

Apprentices.

136. The whole of the time served under indentures of apprenticeship (unless the same are cancelled through some fault of the candidate) will be accepted as actual sea service under the regulations, provided that the applicant has served at sea four-fifths of of the time claimed as apprentice (i.e., that he has not spent more than one-fifth of the time claimed in home ports), and provided also that his indentures are indorsed by the owner or master to whom he has been bound, to the effect that he has performed his service faithfully during the time he remained apprentice. In cases where an apprentice may be qualified for examination before the expiration of his indentures (or for any other satisfactory reason) a letter from the owner or master will be accepted in place of this indorsement.

In the event of the candidate being short of the required fourfifths of his apprentice's time he will be required to show sufficient additional sea service, either as seaman or junior officer, to make up the four-fifths of the time claimed as apprentice.

Midshipmen no bound by indentures. 137. The whole of the time served in the mercantile marine by midshipmen or cadets who may not have been bound by indentures will be accepted as actual sea service under the regulations, and as counting towards the service required for the examination of a candidate for the grade of Second Mate, provided that in every case such service has been continuous, and that the applicant has served at sea four-fifths of the time claimed as midshipman or cadet (i.e. that he has not spent more than one-fifth of such time in port).

TIME ALLOWED FOR WORKING PROBLEMS AND WRITINGS.

138. The time that shall be allowed to candidates when undergoing examination for the various grades of certificates set forth in the foregoing regulations shall be such as the Marine Board may by resolution from time to time direct,

SPECIAL REGULATIONS FOR ALL CANDIDATES.

Candidates who submit themselves for examination must comply with the following rules, viz.:-

139. Candidates are required to appear at the examination- Punctuality. room punctually at the time appointed.

140. Candidates are prohibited from bringing into the examina-Books and tion-room books, papers, or memoranda of any kind whatever. papers stri The slightest infringement of this regulation will subject the offender to all the penalties of a failure, and he will not be allowed to present himself for re-examination for a period of three months.

141. In the event of any candidate being detected in defacing, Injuryto books. blotting, writing in, or otherwise injuring any book or books belonging to the Board, he will be required to pay to the Secretary such amount as may be necessary to replace such book or books. He will not, however, be at liberty to remove the damaged book, which will still remain the property of the Board; he will also subject himself to all the penalties of a failure.

142. In the event of any candidate being discovered referring copying, &c. to any book or memoranda, copying from another, or affording any assistance or giving any information to another, or communicating in any way with another during the time of examination, or copying any part of the problems for the purpose of taking out of the examination-rooms, he will subject himself to all the penalties of a failure, and he will not be allowed to be examined for a period of six months.

143. No candidate will be allowed to work out his problems All work to be on a slate or on waste paper, or to write on the blotting-paper s supplied for his use in the examination; violation of this rule will subject the candidate to all the penalties of a failure.

144. The corrections by inspection from tables given in works corrections by on navigation will not be allowed. Every correction must appear tables. on the papers of the candidates.

145. Any candidate who may be guilty of insolence to any Penalty for examiner or of other misconduct will render himself liable to the breach of rules. postponement of his examination.

146. Perfect silence is to be preserved in the examination-silence.

The foregoing Regulations and scale of fees were made and passed at a meeting of the Marine Board of Victoria, held this 28th day of August, in the year of our Lord One thousand nine hundred and three.

As compared with the corresponding month of the preceding year, there was an increase of 5 deaths under dietic diseases; whilst there was a decrease of 24 deaths under zymotic, 21 under developmental, 27 under local diseases, and 10 under the head of violence. Under the zymotic class, deaths from influenza fell from 38 to 12. Under the developmental class, deaths from old age fell from 38 to 24. Under the local class, deaths from diseases of the urinary system increased by 10; whilst those from diseases of the respiratory system diminished by 23.

The following is a statement of the deaths set down to diphtheria, typhoid fever, and tubercular diseases in each month of the years 1897 to 1902, and the first eight months of 1903, from which may be traced the rise and fall of the mortality at various periods of the year. It will be noticed that the mortality from typhoid fever usually attains its maximum in March, and is at a minimum from July to November.

FOR THE SALE OF VEHICLES SUCH AS ARE
USUALLY MADE BY CARRIAGE, COACH, OR BUGGY BUILDERS IN THE CITY OF MEL-BOURNE.

W HEREAS by the Factories and Shops Acts it is enacted that the Governor in Council may make regulations to have effect within any specified municipal district or any specified part of such district, requiring shops within such district, of any particular class not included in the Fourth Schedule to the Factories and Shops Act 1850, to close before the hours mentioned in the said Acts, provided a petition shall have been previously addressed to the Governor in Council and forwarded to the Minister, certified to by the municipal clork as having been signed by a majority of all the shopkeepers of the particular class to be affected: And whereas a petition has been so addressed and forwarded praying that in the municipal district of the City of Melbourne all shops for the sale of vehicles such as are usually made by carriage, coach, or buzey builders shall be closed on the evenings of Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday, and Thursday, in each and every week, from the hour of Six o'clock: And whereas such petition has been certified to by the municipal clerk of the said district as having been signed by a majority of all the shopkeepers to be affected within the said district: Now therefore His Excellency the Governor of the State of Victoria, with the advice of the Eventure Council thereof, doth hereby make the following Legulation, that is to say: say:

All shops for the sale of vehicles such as are usually made by carriage, coach, or buggy builders in the municipal district of the City of Melbourne shall be closed on the evenings of Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday, and Thurs-day, in each and every week, from the hour of Six o'clock.

REGULATIONS FOR MANAGEMENT OF THE MOYSTON COMMON.

IN pursuance of the Regulations relating to Commons made by the Governor in Council on the 8th day of January, 1902, the managers of the Moyston Common, having drafted the following Regulations for the management thereof, submit the same for revision by the Board of Land and Works, and approval by the Governor in Council, in lieu of the Regulations heretofore in force in respect of such common:—

REGULATIONS.

- 1. In the construction and for the purpose of these Regulations the words "large cattle" shall mean cows, heifers, oxen, steers, horses, mrars, geldings, colts, fillies, asses, and mules; and the words "small cattle" shall mean sheep and goats.
- words "small cattle" shall mean sheep and goats.

 2. Ratepayers, holders of miners' rights, business licences, or carriers' licences, and farmers, residing within a distance of five (5) miles from the common may respectively departure thereon four (4) head of "large cattle," or the equivalent of the whole, or a portion thereof in "small cattle" on the basis that one (1) head of "large cattle "be deemed equivalent to three (3) head of "small cattle." A farmer having undercultivation not less than one-tenth (\frac{1}{2}) portion of the land occupied by him may depasture on the common one (1) additional head of "large-cattle" or the equivalent in "small cattle" for every ten (10) acres of such land cultivated by him.
- 3. No person shall depasture on the common any stock of which he is not the bond fide owner.
- 4. The following shall be the scale of fees for depasturing stock on the common:—For every horse; mare, gelding, colt, filly, ass, or nule, Seven shillings (7s.) per annum; for every cow, heifer, ox, steer, Five shillings (7s.) ger annum; for every goat, Two shillings and sixpence (2s. 6d.) per annum; for every sheep, Fivo shillings (5s.) per annum; progeny (under six months old) of stock legally depasturing on the common, free. All depasturing fees shall be due and payable on the first day of February and the first day of August in every year, and the herdsman shall not collect any fees before the commencement of the half-year for which stock are registered.
- 5. All owners of stock depasturing on the common, and all persons entitled to. depasture stock thereon, who shall have made application to the managers for licences, shall be required to muster their stock, during the months in which the prescribed fees are due and payable, in their own yards or in some other convenient place to be determined by the managers, within 48 hours after receiving notice from the herdsman to that effect, for the purpose of registering their stock, and to assist in branding them with the common brand. (Horses and sheep are exempted from being branded.)
- 6. No person shall depasture stock on the common without first having registered the same, with the private brands thereof, with the managers of the common in the book kept for the purpose. Nor shall any person depasture on the common any stock (not being borses or sheep) without first having them branded with the common brand. And the registration and the branding shall be respectively renewed every half-year.
- 7. All stock found upon the common, upon which the prescribed fees shall not have been paid, or of which the brands have not been duly registered with the managers, or upon which, where required, the common brand has not been affixed, shall be deemed to be trespassing on the common, and shall be liable to be impounded.
- 8. No bull or entire horse shall be depastured on the common without the written consent of the managers first obtained.
- 9. Sheep shall be depastured on such portions only of the common as the managers may set apart for the purpose, and sheep found depasturing on any other portion of the common shall be deemed to be trespassing, and shall be liable to be impounded.
- $10.\ \ No$ licence shall be transferred without the written consent of the managers first obtained.
- 11. No stock affected with any contagious disease shall be depastured on the common, and any stock thereon becoming so affected shall be removed within twelve (12) hours after receiving notice from the managers or herdsman; and, in the event of such stock not being removed within the time specified, they shall be removed or destroyed at the owner's expense.
- 12. The managers shall be at liberty, after twelve (12) hours' notice to the owner, to remove, bury, or de-troy, at the expense of the latter, all dead carcasses found on the common.
- 13. No person shall cart any water away from any dams situated on the common and the property of the managers without their permission in writing.
- 14. All owners of stock depasturing on the common shall not be allowed to remove same without first giving due notice to the managers or herdsman, and paying all fees due on such stock.

Every person offending against any lot the foregoing Regulations shall, on conviction before any justice of the peace, forfeit and pay a penalty not exceeding Twenty pounds (£20) for each offence.

TOWN OF WARRNAMBOOL.—REGULATIONS FOR MANAGEMENT OF THE WARRNAMBOOL MUNICIPAL COMMON.

IN pursuance of the Regulations relating to Commons, made by the Governor in Council on the 8th day of January, 1902, the Council of the Town of Warrnambeol, as managers of the Warrnambool Municipal Common, having drafted the following Regulations for the management thereof, submit the same for revision by the Board of Land and Works and approval by the Governor in Council, in lieu of the Regulations heretofore in force in respect of such common:—

REGULATIONS.

- 1. Ratepayers, holders of miners' rights, business licences, or carriers' licences, and farmers residing within a distance of 5 miles from the common may respectively depa-ture thereon four head of large cattle, or the equivalent of the whole, or a portion thereof in small cattle, on the basis that one head of large cattle be deemed equivalent to three head of small cattle. A farmer having under cultivation not less than one-tenth portion of the land occupied by him may depasture on the common one additional head of large cattle, or the equivalent in small cattle, for every 10 acres of such land cultivated by him.
- 2. No person shall depasture on the common stock of which he is not the $bond\,fdc$ owner.
- 3. Every person entitled to commonage shall, before depasturing any stock on the common, give to the herdsman a true and correct description of such stock and their brands and other distinctive marks, and shall obtain from the herdsman a certificate of having done so, and shall, at the same time, obtain a badge and chain from the herdsman (both of which shall be the absolute property of the managers) for any number of stock he wishes to depasture; he shall then be responsible, and liable to be charged for that number from the time the herdsman delivers the badge or badges to him to the date of delivery of same back to the herdsman. No person shall use other than registered badges in connexion with stock legally depasturing on the common; should the badge or badges aforesaid be from any cause removed from the stock, they must be at once replaced at the expense of the person depasturing (and shall be supplied by the herdsman at a cost of One shilling each), and any person who shall place or allow to be placed a chain and badge on any stock without the authority of the herdsman shall be liable to be prosecuted.

 4. All fees as hereinafter set forth shall be payable, in
- 4. All fees as hereinafter set forth shall be payable, in advance, on the first day of every week or month, as the case may require, and no stock shall be permitted to depasture on the common unless the fees and dues thereon are regularly paid.
- 5. The managers of the common shall not, under any circumstances whatever, be responsible or chargeable for the loss or damage of or to any stock depasturing on the common.
- 6. Sheep and goats shall be depastured on such portions only of the common as the managers may set apart for the purpose.
- 7. The fees for depasturing stock on the common shall be as follow:—For every horse, mare, gelding, colt, filly, ass, or mule, is, per week; or £2 12s, per annum. For every head of other large cattle, 4d, per week; or 17s. 4d, per annum. For every sheep or goat, 4d, per week; or 17s. 4d, per annum.
- 8. No bulls, entire horses, or swine shall be allowed to depasture on the common, and all swine found thereon shall be liable to be impounded; and all geese to be destroyed, or the owners thereof to be prosecuted for allowing the same to trespass on the common.
- All stock found on the common without being duly registered, licensed, and badged, shall be liable to be forthwith impounded, or their owner to be prosecuted for allowing such stock to trespass on the common.
- 10. The licence to use the common and the badges and chains shall not be transferable.
- 11. The hordsman shall muster the stock on the common on such days or at such times as the managers may from time to time appoint, and shall see that all brands are legible, and the chains and badges in proper order. The licensees shall be required to assist at the mustering.
- 12. When milch cows have calves at foot, the latter must be delivered every morning with the cows to the herdsman, or he will not be responsible in the event of the cows straying.
- 13. No person shall unnecessarily disturb stock depasturing on the common.
- 14. No person shall be allowed to herd stock on the common.
- 15. No person shall be allowed to remove stock from the common without first giving twelve hours notice, in writing, to the herd-man.

Every person offending against any of the foregoing Regulations shall, on conviction before any justice of the peace, forfeit and pay a penalty not exceeding £20 for each offence.
