BANK HALF-HOLIDAYS.*

PROCLAMATION

By His Excellency the Honorable Sir Reginald Arthur James Talbot, Knight Commander of the Most Honorable Order of the Bath, Governor of the State of Victoria and its Dependencies in the Commonwealth of Australia, &c., &c., &c.

IN pursuance of the provisions contained in Part III. of the *Banks and Currency Act* 1890 (54 Vict. No. 1164), and in the *Public and Bank Holidays Act* 1897 (61 Vict. No. 1534), I, the Governor of the State of Victoria in the Commonwealth of Australia, by and with the advice of the Executive Council of the said State, do by this my Proclamation appoint the days and dates named hereunder special days to be observed as Bank Half-Holidays, from the hour of Twelve o'clock noon on each such day, at the places respectively mentioned, that is to say:—

THURSDAY, THE 18TH DAY OF OCTOBER, 1906, at Warrnambool;

FRIDAY, THE 19TH DAY OF OCTOBER, 1906, at Rainbow;

THURSDAY, THE 25TH DAY OF OCTOBER, 1906, at Colac.
