PUPIL SURVEYORS AND DRAUGHTSMEN, SURVEY BRANCH.

A PPLICATIONS will be received, addressed to the Secretary for Lands, up to 20th June next, from candidates desirous of being appointed as Pupil Surveyors and Draughtsmen in connexion with this Depart-

### CONDITIONS.

An applicant for appointment must not be more than twenty years or less than sixteen years of age. He will be required to produce a medical certificate to the effect that he is of sound constitution, and not affected with any physical infirmity which would interfere with the proper exercise of his profession.

### OUALIFICATIONS.

He must have passed the Matriculation Examination (including Algebra, Euclid, and Arithmetic) in the Melbourne or other recognised University, or—

Passed such other recognised examination, or produce such certificates from the Education Department, or other authority, as will satisfy the Surveyor-General as to his competency in the three subjects named, and as to his general educational proficiency.

He shall also with such certificates submit a specimen of his plan drawing.

### COMPETITIVE EXAMINATION.

Having duly complied with the foregoing requirements, he will undergo a competitive examination in trigono-metrical computation, plotting and plan drawing, when the competitors to whom shall be awarded a sufficient number of points by the Examiners will be recommended for appointment, subject to the regulations of the depart-ment as to probation.

### PROBATION.

Accepted candidates approved by the Minister shall enter the office as probationers for a period of one month without pay; and at the end of that time if reported by the Surveyor-General to have displayed aptitude for the work, may be appointed as pupils, and will be subject to the General Regulations for the Public Service as far as they are applicable.

### TERM OF SERVICE.

The pupil's service in the Department shall be for a term of four years, the first two of which will be served in the office, where he will be engaged in drawing and computing. He will then (if thought necessary) be examined in trigonometry, including computation of areas and reduction or traverse surveys, also plotting from field book and plan drawing. If his progress up to this time be not deemed satisfactory, he will be liable to be dispensed with; but, if satisfactory, he will be placed under a departmental surveyor for two years for field practice.

Afterwards he will have the privilege of attending for two months at the Melbourne Observatory, where he will be instructed in such branches of practical astronomy as are necessary for the duties he may be called on to perform as a qualified surveyor.

He will be allowed to present himself at the next ensuing or subsequent examination for land surveyors for the purpose of obtaining the certificate of the Surveyors' Board as to his qualifications.

He will receive the following remuneration during the term of his pupilage:—1st year, £40; 2nd year, £52; 3rd year, £65; 4th year, £80.

During the whole term of his pupilage and service in the Department he shall be subject to the Regulations for the Public Service of Victoria as far as they are applic-

### BONDS REQUIRED.

# SUNBURY WATERWORKS TRUST.—RATING BY-LAW FOR 1907.

SUNBURY WATERWORKS TRUST.—RATING BY-LAW FOR 1907.

THE Chairman and Commissioners of the Sunbury Waterworks Trust, the Waterworks District of which has been proclaimed an Urban District, do hereby, in exercise of the powers conferred by the Water Act 1905; make the following By-law:—

By-law for the making of a rate for the year 1907 on all rateable property within the Waterworks District of Sunbury Waterworks Trust, also dealing with the sale of water by measure from the works of the Trust.

1. A rate of One shilling and sixpence in the pound sterling shall be paid on the annual value of all rateable property fronting streets on which a main pipe has been laid, according to the valuation for the time being of all lands and tenements for the municipal rate of the Shire of Bulla, the minimum amount to be paid in respect of any tenement to be not less than Twenty shillings.

2. For all unoccupied allotments facing the mains, a minimum sum of Ten shillings shall be paid.

3. For water supplied by measure for domestic and other than domestic purposes, a charge of One shilling per 1,000 gallons shall be paid, and the minimum quantity to be charged for shall be the quantity which would be equal to the assessed rate payable for the premises so supplied; and where water is used for other than domestic purposes solely the charge shall be One shilling per 1,000 gallons, and the minimum quantity to be charged for shall be 30,000 gallons, and shall be paid for in advance or as the Trust may deem necessary.

4. For any public water-trough supplied with water by the Trust the sum of Thirty shillings per annum shall be charged, unless supplied by meter.

5. For water supplied from stand-pipe or hydrant, for each load of 200 gallons or under the sum of One shilling, and for each additional load pro rate on the above scale.

6. The foregoing rates are hereby made payable, in advance, on the 1st June, 1907, and such person or persons as the Commissioners of the Trust may from time to time appoint for the purpose shall be authori

REGULATIONS No. I. AND No. IV. RESCINDED. NEW REGULATIONS MADE.

At the Executive Council Chamber, Melbourne, the fourth day of June, 1907. PRESENT:

WHEREAS by section 23 of the Education Act 1890
(54 Vict. No. 1086) it is enacted that the Governor in Council may from time to time make and rescind regulations for all or any of the purposes therein mentioned, and generally for carrying the said Act into effect: Now therefore His Excellency the Lieutenant-Governor of the State of Victoria, by and with the advice of the Executive Council thereof, doth hereby rescind Regulation No. 1., Course of Free Instruction, and Regulation No. IV., The Certificate of Exemption from Compulsory Attendance and the Certificate of Merit, and doth substitute the following Regulations in lieu thereof, that is to say:—

### REGULATION I.

### Course of Free Instruction.

I. The secular instruction to be given in schools under the Education Acts shall be that shown in the following Course of Free Instruction:—

### Class I.

READING, SPELLING, AND TRANSCRIPTION.—(a) To read The Primer, the First Book; and, in addition, to read, from the blackboard, lessons in script or print containing, in new combinations, the words employed in the above books. Reasonable fluency will be required, and also ability to group words into phrases, and to read naturally and with expression.

(b) To spell the words contained in The Primer and up to page 44 of the First Book and the words printed in black type in the remaining portion of the First Book. The spelling should be both written and oral, and the more advanced scholars should be practised in easy dictation exercises. Oral spelling should not be required in the early stages of learning to read, but should be delayed until the children have become familiar with word pictures. The spelling of a word should be learnt in association with its meaning and with its use in a phrase or sentence. or sentence.

(c) To write, on slates or paper, any sentences which are prescribed for reading. The teacher's object should be to give the children, from the earliest stage, the power of using writing as a mode of thought expression, and, therefore, the subject-matter should often be taken from the children's own oral composition.

Alternative Course.-Teachers who desire to teach the above-mentioned subjects in correlation with the general lessons may select their own subject-matter, provided that the district inspector is satisfied that the work selected is equal in amount and in difficulty to that prescribed

LANGUAGE.—To be learning to speak correctly and naturally, and to be trained in giving clear and connected answers to questions; the class to be able to give the substance of a short story told by the teacher; to be receiving oral composition exercises in the form of lessons on pictures, and of conversations between teacher and class on objects or on incidents arising out of the school work.

FORMAL WRITING.—To be learning to form, on slates or on paper, the small and the capital letters and short words, from copies on the blackboard and from dictation. The more advanced pupils of the Lower First Class to be learning to write with pen or pencil in the Anstralian Intraductory Copy-book, and the pupils of the Upper First Class to be writing with pens in the Anstralian Copy-book No. 1. Plain books with similar ruling may be used. Care should be taken to avoid an unduly small and cramped formation of letters.

The teacher's object should be to show clearly the elements which go to the building-up of each letter, and how these may be produced; also to teach the child how to sit at writing exercises, how to hold the pencil or pen, and how to form words without lifting the pencil or pen.

POETRY .-- To learn at least 150 lines of suitable verse.

Where practicable, this verse should be related to the subject-matter of other lessons, especially of those on nature-study. All suitable means for bringing home to the minds of the children the meanings of the words and phrases, and of the verse as a whole, should be adopted.

MANUAL TRINING.—I. Drawing (a course of at least one hour and a half per week)—(a) To draw, on slates or blackboards and on plain paper, examples containing both straight and simple curved lines. No mechanical aids, such as ruling into squares, are to be used. The drawings on slates or blackboards are to be executed on a large scate, and with a free arm. Slate pencils are not to be used. The examples selected for freehand and freearm work should represent objects interesting to the children; they should hot be mere collections of lines.

(b) Drawing from memory.

(c) To draw, with the aid of a foot-rule, simple exercises representing objects or patterns in straight lines.

cises representing objects or patterns in straight lines.

II. (t) Brushwork (a course of at least one hour per week, but not compulsory for pupils who learn needlework).—To draw, with a brush and water-colour, simple natural forms and simple decorative forms.

(2) Occupations.-Where practicable, one or more of the (2) Vecupations.—where practicable, one of more of the following—(a) Outlining with coloured wool (for Lower First Class only); (b) paper folding and cutting; (c) matweaving; (d) clay modelling; (e) sand-tray work; (f) card-

board sewing.

(3) Needlework.—Lower First or Infants—To be learning needlework drill, and, on canvas samplers, running, stitching, top-sewing, hemming, and darning.

Upper First—Needlework drill (including needle, thimble, and position drill); placing a hem; hemming a strip (18 inches by 2 inches), or a handkerchief, or a duster, with coloured cottons in the following order, vit.—(a) black, (b) red, (c) blue; fastening a new thread on.

NOTE.—Boys as well as girls may, if the teacher so desires, receive instruction in the needlework of this class.

class.

SINGING.—(1) To sing, sweetly and without strain, suitable class songs. The aim should be to develop the sense of tune and rhythm by means of the neat execution of songs learnt by ear. The more advanced pupils to be learning the scale and common chord with the tonic sol-fa syllables. The hand-signs should be used. Where practicable, the songs chosen should be related to the subject-matter of the other lessons of the class.

(2) Practice in breathing exercises.

NATURE-STUDY.—To receive lessons on the animal and plant life of the district, whether native of introduced, and on simple natural phenomena familiar to the children.

STORIES.—To be told stories bearing on, illustrating, and deepening the interest in, the general class work, e.g., mythological stories, fairy stories, and nature stories.

PHYSICAL TRAINING.—To be practising finger plays, games, marching, and physical exercises and drill with music; breathing exercises:

### Class II.

READING, SPELLING, AND TRANSCRIPTION—(a) To read, with reasonable fluency and expression, and with understanding of the subject-matter, the Second Reading Book

Work under this head should consist only of such facts as are evident to young children.

Knitting with two needles, special attention being paid to the method of holding the needles; girls to show a strip of knitting, and to be seen knitting.

The children will be expected to write exercises of several lines in length, using such connective words as are used by young children, e.g., "when," "which," "so," "for"; the full stop, the comma, and the note of interregation to be intraduced.

To have an intelligent knowledge of the terms, "subject," "predicate," "nonn," "adjective," "pronoun," and "tverb," and to be able to distinguish them in easy sentences. (A knowledge of the subdivisions of nouns and pronouns will not be required.)

ARITHMETIC.—Numeration and notation of numbers up to 10,000,000; the four simple rules, with very easy problems thereon; farthings, pence, and shilling tables; reduction, addition, and subtraction of money, the reduction being restricted to pounds, shillings, pence, and farthings; multiplication and division of money by numbers up to 12.

Weights and Measurements.—As for Class II., with the addition of the chain and mile; quarter, hundredweight, ton; year; gross.

Mental Arithmetic.- Easy exercises on the work prescribed above, and, in fractional quantities (numerators and denominators up to twelve), dealing with numbers of which the denominators are measures, e.g., † of 20,

GEOGRAPHY .- Observation Work and the Making Plans and Models.—As for Class II., but to be studied more fully.

NOTE.—(1) The work prescribed under Geography and Elementary Esperimental Science has been divided into two parts; and that under History may be so divided by the teacher, the time for the subject, if one part only is taken, to be half that prescribed for the whole course. Of these parts, teachers will be espected to present the children in four, including one of each subject, that one being the first part under Geography and Elementary Experimental Science when the whole course in these subjects is not taken.

NOTE.—(2) The work of the second year under Composition and Grammar, Arithmetic, and Geography, need not be presented by pupils who learn needlework, or who are in attendance at cookery or sloyd centres.

### GENERAL NOTES.

- r. Subject to the approval of the Director, classes in the smaller schools may be suitably combined for in-struction in certain subjects.
- 2. In Elementary Science, suitable courses, other than those specified above, may, with the approval of the Director, be taken.
- 3. Special Lessons .- To children above nine years of age, lessons prepared from some recognised books on the laws of health and temperance should be given at least fortnightly. The health lessons should include the information contained in the following wall-sheets—

Treatment of Snake-bite; Treatment of the Apparently Drowned; What to Do till the Doctor Comes.

The lessons on temperance should include the informa-

tion contained in the wall-sheets on that subject. An abstract of the lessons given should be left in the school when a teacher is transferred.

4. Girls will take, as their course in manual training, drawing and needlework. Teachers are, however, at drawing and needlework. Teachers are, however, at liberty to give them instruction in brushwork or paperwork, in lieu of a half course in drawing. In schools where needlework is not taught, the girls should take the same work as the boys. With the approval of the Director, a course of work in gardening may, in country schools, be substituted for any form of manual training other than drawing or needlework.

### REGULATION IV.

THE STANDARD OF EDUCATION, THE CERTIFICATE OF EXEMPTION FROM COMPULSORY ATTENDANCE, AND THE CERTIFICATE OF MERIT.

A .- The Standard of Education.

1. The Standard of Education shall be-

Reading .- Ability to read fluently from any ordinary book or newspaper a passage not containing any unusual scientific or technical words.

Writing and Spelling.—Ability to write neatly in small hand from dictation, with correct spelling, words selected from such a book or newspaper, and a short passage containing no words of exceptional difficulty.

Composition.—Ability to compose short essays and descriptions, to tell in prose the story in a simple ballad or poem, and to punctuate such exercises.

Arithmetic.-Ability to work the four rules and reduction in the weights and measures in ordinary use; to work easy examples in the four rules in decimal and vulgar fractions; to reduce decimal fractions to vulgar fractions and vulgar fractions fractions to vulgar fractions and vulgar fractions to decimals; to work easy examples in practice and in simple proportion, averages, taxes, percentages, trade discounts, and simple interest; to calculate the area and sides of rectangular figures; to work easy examples in finding the cubical contents of rectangular solids and easy questions in carpeting and fencing.

Mental Arithmetic.-Ability to work suitable examples based on the foregoing exercises.

2. No child is to be regarded as in course of being "educated up to the required standard" unless the following conditions are complied with:—

- (1) Children of the ages shown in the following table must be learning the reading, writing, spelling, composition, and arithmetic prescribed by Regulation from time to time as the course of free instruction for the respective Classes I., II., III., IV., and V. in State schools—
  - (i.) Children under 8 years of age, the work
  - (i.) Children over 8 years of age, the work prescribed for Class I.

    (ii.) Children over 8 years of age and not exceeding of years of age, the work prescribed for Class II.
  - (iii.) Children over og years of age and not exceeding 10½ vears of age, the work prescribed for Class III.

    (iv.) Children over 10½ years of age and not exceeding 12 vears of age, the work prescribed for Class IV.

  - (v.) Children over 12 years of age, the work prescribed for Class V., or that prescribed for Class VI.

NOTE.—The work of any Class above Class I, will be held to include that of any lower Class.

(2) Children of the maximum age specified in each of the Classes I., II., III., and IV. above must show a satisfactory knowledge of the work set out in the Regulation prescribing the course of free instruction for such class. Children who are not less than 13 years of age must show a satisfactory knowledge of the work prescribed for Class V.

- 3. Notwithstanding anything contained in Section 2 above, a child of any age who is not attending a State school may, considering the mental capacity of the child school may, considering the mental capacity of the child and other similar circumstances affecting his progress, be regarded as in course of being educated up to the required standard, provided that on the report of an inspector of schools or some other officer deputed to report on the matter the Director is satisfied that the instruction which such child is receiving is efficient and regular, and that such child is complying with the like conditions of attendance as are prescribed in sub-section (1) of section 3 of Act No. 2005 with regard to attendance at State schools.
- 4. In the case of children who do not attend State schools, the books to be used by such children in connexion with their instruction in reading, spelling, and writing, shall either be those specified for the several classes named in the Course of Free Instruction (Regulation I.) or others of at least equivalent difficulty

### B .- The Certificate of Exemption from Compulsory Attendance.

5. A certificate of having been educated up to the standard may be obtained by a candidate who is at least 12 years of age, and has passed an examination, to the satisfaction of an inspector of schools in reading, writing, spelling, composition, and arithmetic as prescribed Section I. above.

A candidate who has passed in the work in these subjects, as prescribed for Class VI. in the Course of Free Instruction, will be held to have satisfied the above re-

### C .- Certificate of Merit.

- 6. A Certificate of Merit will be awarded to candidates who pass fully in the subjects prescribed for Class VI. of State schools, Regulation I., under such conditions as may be approved by the Director.
- y. Candidates, other than State-school pupils, will be afforded an opportunity, at the annual examination of the nearest State school, of being examined for the Certificate of Exemption from Compulsory Attendance or the Certificate of Merit on due notice being given to the district inspector.

REGULATIONS FOR THE CARE, PROTECTION, AND MANAGEMENT OF CERTAIN RESERVES FOR ORNAMENTAL PLANTATIONS AND FOR ROAD AND ORNAMENTAL PURPOSES IN THE CITY OF MELBOURNE.

WHEREAS by section 199 of the Land Act 1991, power is given to the Board of Land and Works to make rules and regulations, or to rescind any rules and regulations, for the care, protection, and management of all public parks and reserves not conveyed to and vested in trustees, and for the preservation of good order and decency therein. Now therefore the Board of Land

and Works, in pursuance of the power conferred as aforesaid, doth hereby make the regulations following in respect of the land temporarily reserved by Order in Council of 21st May, 1907, as a site for Ornamental Plantations in the City of Melbourne, and of the land temporarily reserved by Order in Council of the same date as a site for Road and Ornamental purposes in the said City of Melbourne.

### REGULATIONS.

- 1. No person in a state of intoxication, or who is disorderly or not decorously dressed, shall enter or remain in the Reserves, or either of them, and no person shall commit therein any act of indecency.
- 2. No person shall interfere with, damage, or destroy the seats, trees, shrubs, grass, flowers, or any property in the Reserves, or either of them, or throw stones or other missiles, or light fires therein, or leave in the Reserves, or either of them, any bottles, orange peel, paper, east-off clothing, litter, or refuse of any kind.
- 3. No person shall climb or jump over the fences in or around the Reserves, or either of them, or lie on the seats or grass, or stick bills on the fences, gates, seats, or tiees, or cut names, letters, or marks on the trees, seats, gates, posts, or fences, or otherwise deface the same or write thereon.
- .4. No person shall bring into the Reserves, or either of them, any dog, unless held by a chain or cord, and all goats or poultry found therein shall be liable to be destroyed by any bailiff of Crown lands or constable.
- 5. No person, except workmen employed in the Reserves, or either of them, shall enter any plots therein which may be enclosed for plantations or for other pur-
- oses.

  6. No assemblies for fêtes, picnics, or concerts, or for the purpose of public worship, preaching, or public speaking of any kind, or meetings of a like character, shall take place in the Reserves, or either of them, without the permission, in writing, of the Minister of Lands first obtained.
- 7. No person, unless authorized by the Minister of Lands, shall offer for sale in the Reserves, or either of them, any article, fruit, or merchandise.
- 8. Any person found removing or taking any plants, flowers, seeds, or other property from the Reserves, or either of them, or injuring any property therein, shall be liable to be removed from the Reserves, or either of them, and to be prosecuted.

  9. No delivery cart, tradesmun's cart, dray, lorry, waggon, van, truck, or barrow shall be allowed to enter or pass over or through the Reserves, or either of them, without the consent, in writing, of the Minister of Lands first obtained.
- to. No vehicle, motor car, or motor cycle shall be allowed to enter or pass over or through the Reserves, or either of them, except on the portions thereof specially provided for wheeled traffic.
- 11. No horse with a rider shall be allowed to enter or pass over or through the Reserves, or either of them, except on the portions thereof specially provided for equestrians.
- 12. No horse shall be broken in or trained in the Reserves, or either of them.
- 13. No bicycle shall be allowed to enter or pass over or through the Reserves, or either of them, except on the portions thereof specially provided for bicyclists.
- 14. No person on foot shall be allowed to enter or pass over or through the portions of the Reserves, specially set apart for bicyclists or equestrians, except to cross through the openings provided for access from one part of either of the Reserves to another part thereof, as indicated by notices in the Reserves.
- 15. No horse uncontrolled by rein or hand, and no cattle, sheep, or pigs shall be allowed to enter or pass over or through the Reserves, or either of them.

Every person offending against these Regulations shall, in accordance with section 199 of the Land Act 1901, on conviction before any justice, forfeit and pay a penalty not exceeding £5 for each offence; and every person who knowingly and wilfully offends against any such Regulations, and who, after he has been warned by any bailing of Crown lands or any constable, does not desist from so offending, may be forthwith apprehended by such bailiff or constable and taken before some justice of the pence, and shall, on conviction, forfeit and pay a penalty not exceeding £10.

ADDITIONAL REGULATIONS FOR THE CARE, PROTECTION, AND MANAGEMENT OF RICH-MOND PARK.

PROTECTION, AND MANAGEMENT OF RICH-MOND PARK.

WHEREAS by the Crown grant issued in favour of the Board of I and and Works and the Mayor, Councillors, and Citizens of the City of Richmond, in respect of Richmond Park, it is provided and declared that the land thereby granted and the buildings for the time being thereon shall be maintained and used as and for a Public Park and place of recreation, and offices and conveniences connected therewith, under and in accordance with such regulations as shall from time to time be made by the Governor or other officer for the time being administering the Government of the Colony (now State) of Victoria, with the consent of the Executive Council thereof, and in the meantime under and in accordance with such rules, orders, by-laws, and regulations as shall from time to time be made by the Board of Land and Works and the Mayor, Counciltors, and Citizens of the said City of Richmond, and for no other purpose whatsoever: And whereas by section 200 of the Land Act 1901 it is provided that where any such land has been vested in trustees or jointly with the Board of Land and Works and trustees, it shall be lawful for the trustees of any such land, with the approval of the Governor in Council, to make rules and regulations for all or any of the purpose mentioned in the said section: Now therefore the Board of Land and Works and the Council of the City of Richmond do hereby make the regulations following for the care, protection, and management of Richmond Park, and for the preservation of good order and decency therein, in addition to the existing Regulations in respect of the said Richmond Park:—

### REGULATIONS.

REGULATIONS.

1. No person shall drive nails nor cut foot-holes or boot-holes in any tree in the Park.

2. No person shall climb any tree, whether by the assistance of nails, foot-holes, boot-holes, or otherwise.

3. No person shall take, catch, trap, or remove any bird, or rob any bird's nest of eggs.

Every person offending against these Regulations shall, in accordance with section 200 of the Land Act 1901, on conviction before any Justice, be liable to a penalty not exceeding £5 for each offence, and every person who so offends, and who, after he has been warned by any bailiff of Crown lands or officer or servant of the Trustees or any constable, does not desist from 50 offending may be forthwith apprehended by such bailiff, officer, or servant, or constable, and taken before some Justice of the Peace, and shall, on conviction, be liable to a penalty not exceeding £10.
