By His Excellency Sir Thomas David Gibson Carmichael, Baronet, Knight Commander of the Most Distinguished Order of Saint Michael and Saint George; Governor of the State of Victoria and its Dependencies in the Commonwealth of Australia, &c., &c., &c.

- "An Act to authorize the temporary application out of "The Public Account" of certain moneys to meet expenditure under certain Acts."
- "An Act to declare the Rates of Income Tax for the Year ending on the thirty-first day of December One thousand nine hundred and eleven and to continue the Income Tax Acts."
- "An Act relating to Diseases of Bees."
- "An Act to further amend the Savings Banks Acts."

"An Act to amend the Law relating to Holders of Residence Areas under the Mines Acts who die Intestate."

"An Act to amend Section Twenty-three of the *Licensing Act 1890*."

PUPIL SURVEYORS AND DRAUGHTSMEN,
SURVEY BRANCH.

APPLICATIONS will be received, addressed to the Secretary for Lands, up to 16th January, 1911, from candidates desirous of being appointed as Pupil Surveyors and Draughtsmen in connexion with this Department.

CONDITIONS.

An applicant for appointment must not be more than twenty years or less than sixteen years of age. He will be required to produce a medical certificate to the effect that he is of sound constitution, and not affected with any physical infirmity which would interfere with the proper exercise of his profession.

QUALIFICATIONS.

He must have passed the Matriculation Examination (including Algebra, Euclid, and Arithmetic) in the Melbourne or other recognised University, or—

Passed such other recognised examination, or produce such certificates from the Education Department, or other authority, as will satisfy the Surveyor-General as to his competency in the three subjects named, and as to his general educational proficiency.

He shall also with such certificates submit a specimen of his plan drawing.

COMPETITIVE EXAMINATION.

Having duly complied with the foregoing requirements, he will undergo a competitive examination in trigonometrical computation, plotting and plan drawing, when the competitors to whom shall be awarded a sufficient number of points by the Examiners will be recommended for appointment, subject to the regulations of the Department as to probation.

PROBATION.

Accepted candidates approved by the Minister shall enter the office as probationers for a period of one month without pay; and at the end of that time if reported by the Surveyor-General to have displayed aptitude for the work, may be appointed as pupils, and will be subject to the General Regulations for the Public Service as far as they are applicable.

TERM OF SERVICE.

The pupil's service in the Department shall be for a term of four years, the first two of which will be served in the office, where he will be engaged in drawing and computing. He will then (if thought necessary) be examined in trigonometry, including computation of areas and reduction or traverse surveys, also plotting from field book and plan drawing. If his progress up to this time be not deemed satisfactory, he will be liable to be dispensed with; but, if satisfactory, he will be placed under a departmental surveyor for two years for field practice.

Afterwards he will have the privilege of attending for two months at the Melbourne Observatory, where he will be instructed in such branches of practical astronomy as are necessary for the duties he may be called on to perform as a qualified surveyor.

He will be allowed to present himself at the next ensuing or subsequent examination for land surveyors for the purpose of obtaining the certificate of the Surveyors Board as to his qualifications.

REMUNERATION.

He will receive the following remuneration during the term of his pupilage:—1st year, £40; 2nd year, £52; 3rd year, £65; 4th year, £80.

SUBJECT TO REGULATIONS.

During the whole term of his pupilage and service in the Department he shall be subject to the Regulations for the Public Service of Victoria as far as they are applicable.

BONDS REQUIRED.

Each successful candidate for appointment as pupil surveyor and draughtsman will be required to find two approved sureties, who shall enter into bonds for £150 each for the faithful performance of his duties, and to provide for his remaining in the service of the Department for a further term of two years, if required, at a salary not less than £160 per annum.

SHIRE OF LILLYDALE.—BY-LAW No. 17.

A By-law of the Shire of Lillydale, made under the provisions of the *Health Act* 1890, and numbered 17, to regulate the removal and disposal of night-soil in the township of Lillydale.

Health Act 1890.

SHIRE OF LILLYDALE.—BY-LAW No. 17.

IN pursuance of the powers contained in the *Health Act* 1890, and of any other power thereunto enabling them in that behalf, the Council of the Shire of Lillydale, in the name of the President, Councillors, and Ratepayers of the said Shire, for the purpose of carrying the said Act into execution within their jurisdiction, make the following By-law, that is to say:—

1. All former By-laws so far as they relate to the matters and things provided for in this By-law are hereby repealed.

2. This By-law shall come into force and operation on its confirmation by the Board of Public Health, and immediately after its publication in the *Government Gazette*.

3. This By-law shall apply to and have operation in the township of Lillydale in the area set out in clause 12 hereto, but it shall cease to apply to any portion or portions of the said area that may from time to time be exempted from its operation by special order of the Council.

4. The occupier of any premises in which there is a closet or privy shall cause a space under the seat of each closet or privy on such premises to be prepared, and shall permit the same to be used for the double pan service hereinafter provided for, and shall cause the closet or privy to be kept in a fit state for such service.

5. The Council shall cause each closet or privy to be supplied or kept supplied with two pans for the reception of night-soil and a lid to closely fit the same, and shall cause one or other of such pans to be kept under the seat aforesaid.

6. The occupier aforesaid or other person having control or management of the premises shall cause to be kept in every closet or privy belonging thereto a supply of dry powdered earth, ashes, charcoal, lime, sawdust, or some other material efficient for deodorizing night-soil, and shall cause all night-soil deposited in the pan of such closet or privy to be immediately on the deposit thereof covered with a quantity of deodorizing material sufficient to thoroughly and effectually deodorize the contents of such pan.

7. The Council shall at least once a week cause the pan in use to be closed with a lid and removed with its contents from the premises in the day-time and other pan to be left in its place.

8. Before leaving any pan in a closet or privy the Council shall cause the same to be cleansed by superheated steam and tar-painted inside, or by some equally efficient means.

9. The occupier aforesaid, or other person, shall not contract for the removal of night-soil from such premises, except in accordance with this By-law.

10. The Council shall have power, in lieu of making a rate, to make a charge on each occupier on the pans supplied and for the removal of night-soil and other work herein directed, the amount in default of payment to be recovered in any Court of Petty Sessions.

11. If any person or the Council commit a breach of the By-law, he or they shall for every breach be liable to a penalty not exceeding Ten pounds and not less than Five shillings, or to a penalty not exceeding Five pounds and not less than Five shillings for each day during which such breach shall be committed or commenced.

12. The sanitary area for Lillydale shall be as follows:—

Commencing at a point at the intersection of the main Melbourne-road and Victoria-road, running north along the centre of the said Victoria-road to its intersection with Nelson-road; thence easterly along the centre of the said Nelson-road to its eastern termination; thence south along the western boundary of Crown allotment 6, section 29, parish of Yering, to the main Healesville-road; thence through the Mount Olinda Estate along the centre of Queen-road to the three-chain road; and thence two hundred feet south of the said three-chain road; and thence by a line two hundred feet distant and parallel to the three-chain road to the main Melbourne-road, and westerly by that road to the point of commencement.

IN pursuance of the powers contained in the *Health Act* 1890 and of any other power thereunto enabling them in that behalf, the Council of the Shire of Lillydale, in the name of the President, Councillors, and Ratepayers of the said Shire, for the purpose of carrying the said Act into execution within their jurisdiction, make the following By-law, that is to say:—

1. All former By-laws, so far as they relate to the matters and things provided for in this By-law, are hereby repealed.

2. This By-law shall come into force and operation on its confirmation by the Board of Public Health, and immediately after its publication in the *Government Gazette*.

3. This By-law shall apply to and have operation in the Township of Croydon in the area set out in clause 12 hereto, but it shall cease to apply to any portion or portions of the said area that may from time to time be exempted from its operation by special order of the Council.

4. The occupier of any premises in which there is a closet or privy shall cause a space under the seat of each closet or privy on such premises to be prepared, and shall permit the same to be used for the double-pan service hereinafter provided for, and shall cause the closet or privy to be kept in a fit state for such service.

5. The Council shall cause each closet or privy to be supplied or kept supplied with two pans for the reception of night-soil and a lid to closely fit the same, and shall cause one or other of such pans to be kept under the seat aforesaid.

6. The occupier aforesaid or other person having control or management of the premises shall cause to be kept in every closet or privy belonging thereto a supply of dry powdered earth, ashes, charcoal, lime, sawdust, or some other material efficient for deodorizing night-soil, and shall cause all night-soil deposited in the pan of such closet or privy to be immediately, on the deposit thereof, covered with a quantity of deodorizing material sufficient to thoroughly and effectually deodorize the contents of such pan.

7. The Council shall at least once a week cause the pan in use to be closed with a lid and removed with its contents from the premises in the day-time, and other pan to be left in its place.

8. Before leaving any pan in a closet or privy the Council shall cause the same to be cleansed by superheated steam, and tar-painted inside or by some equally efficient means.

9. The occupier aforesaid or other person shall not contract for the removal of night-soil from such premises except in accordance with this By-law.

10. The Council shall have power, in lieu of making a rate, to make a charge on each occupier on the pans supplied, and for the removal of night-soil and other work herein directed, the amount in default of payment to be recovered in any Court of Petty Sessions.

11. If any person or the Council commit a breach of the By-law, he or they shall for every breach be liable to a penalty not exceeding Ten pounds and not less than Five shillings, or to a penalty not exceeding Five pounds and not less than Five shillings for each day during which such breach shall be committed or commenced.

12. The Sanitary Area for Croydon shall be as follows:—

Commencing at the intersection of the main Melbourne-road and Lincoln-road, and extending easterly along the centre of Lincoln-road to Dorset-road; thence along the centre of that road to its intersection with Hull-road; thence westerly along Hewish-road to a natural gully or drain on that road; thence southerly by that drain to a point in Crown allotment A, parish of Warrandyte, five chains distant south of Oxford-road; thence westerly by a line parallel to Oxford-road, and five chains distant from that road to Bayswater-road; thence by that road and Oxford-road to the railway line; thence along that line to south boundary of Crown allotment 43, parish of Warrandyte; thence westerly five chains along that boundary and northerly five chains distant and parallel to the Healesville railway line to the south boundary of Crown allotment 43B, parish of Warrandyte; thence west to Crown allotment 43E and north to Kent-avenue; thence south-westerly along that road to a point distant five chains from the Healesville railway fence; thence northerly by a straight line to the centre of Croydon-road and north-westerly by the centre of that road to the point of commencement.

IN pursuance of the powers conferred by the *Local Government Act 1903* and by the *Health Acts* and of every other power enabling it in this behalf, the Council of the Shire of Lillydale, in the name and on behalf of the President, Councillors, and Ratepayers of the said Shire, for the purpose of carrying the said Acts into execution within its jurisdiction, orders as follows, that is to say:—

1. No person shall spit or expectorate on the footpath of any street or road, or on any pavement, floor, or wall of any place open to or frequented by the public.

2. Any person who shall commit a breach of this By-law shall for every such breach be liable to a penalty not exceeding £10.

3. This By-law shall apply to and have operation throughout the whole of the municipal district.

TOWN OF BALLAARAT EAST.

BY-LAW No. 39.

IN pursuance of the powers contained in the *Health Act 1890*, and of any other power thereunto enabling them in that behalf, the Council of the Town of Ballarat East, in the name and on behalf of the Mayor, Councillors, and Burgesses of the said Town, for the purpose of carrying the said Act into execution within their jurisdiction, make the following By-law, that is to say:—

1. The occupier or person in charge of any marine store, or flock, or bedding, or furniture manufactory, shall cause all rags or other material of a kind commonly used in the manufacture of flock or similar bedding to be thoroughly washed or cleansed, and to be disinfected by one of the following processes within 24 hours of such rags or material being taken in, or before such rags or material are taken in, to such store or manufactory, namely:—

(a) by being boiled for 30 minutes in a solution consisting of one part of washing soda (carbonate of soda) to 50 parts of water;

(b) by being subjected to saturated steam for 30 minutes at a pressure not less than 10 pounds per square inch; or

(c) by being soaked for one hour in a wooden vat in a solution consisting of one part of corrosive sublimate (bi-chloride of mercury) to 500 parts of water, and being afterwards washed in hot water.

2. Every person who shall by any act of default be guilty of any breach of this By-law shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding Ten pounds and not less than Five shillings for every such breach, or to a penalty not exceeding Five pounds and not less than Five shillings for each day during which such breach shall be committed or continued.

FARM ALLOTMENTS AVAILABLE FOR APPLICATION UNDER CONDITIONAL PURCHASE LEASE IN THE EUMERALLA ESTATE.

THE several allotments included in the Schedule hereunder are declared available as Farm Allotments. Applications will be received until Thursday, 19th January, 1911. Only one allotment can be granted to any one person.

The Crown grant may be issued to the lessee at the end of any half-year after the first twelve years have expired, on payment of the balance of purchase money.

The amount of deposit (less £1 5s.) will be deducted from the capital value, and the half-yearly instalments calculated on the balance of purchase money.

Payments in advance may be made at any time at the option of the lessee, and proportionate reduction of interest secured thereby.

The balance of purchase money, with interest at 4½ per cent., must be paid by 63 or a lesser number of half-yearly instalments, calculated according to any of the tables under Division 3 of Part I. of the Savings Banks Act 1890 Amendment Act 1896, the first of such instalments being payable six months after the date of the lease. Tenders for supply of forage to more than five separate stations in any one district must be accompanied by a preliminary deposit of 10s. for each and every station over and above five, except in the case of the Melbourne District, the preliminary deposit for which shall be £25 with each tender, irrespective of the number of stations tendered for, in bank notes, or a bank draft payable to the order of the Secretary to the Tender Board (cheques will in no case be received), which will be returned within ten days to unsuccessful tenderers on their application. CONDITIONS OF CONTRACT.

1. The hay to be good, sound, and sweet, and properly trussed except when otherwise specified in the contract; the straw to be wheat or oat, and both to be in all respects of the best quality; oats, white or Algerian (Victorian grown), of the best description, full kernel, clean, and free from wild oats or other objectionable seeds; bran to be sound and sweet, and of the best description; chaff to be made from oat or wheat hay of the best quality. As much forage as can be stored at any station where the storage is small will, for the convenience of the contractor, be ordered at one time.

2. The quantities stated in the schedule are only approximate, and the Government may draw either more or less than those mentioned. Should new telegraph stations be formed or additional horses be required at any station, the contractor will be required to supply the extra forage. Unless otherwise specified in the tender form the contractor may, if he desires it, terminate the contract by supplying at once the whole quantity due at the station, should the additional number of permanent horses exceed two.

3. Notwithstanding anything contained in the preceding condition, the contractors for the supply to the Police Depot may be called upon to supply any Government Departments within a radius of six miles from Melbourne, for which no contracts have been taken, and also forage for any extra horses that may be at any time stabled at the depot for police purposes, at the same rates. The contract for the supply of forage to the Military Barracks may be terminated by three months' notice being given by the Secretary to the Tender Board to the contractor of such determination.

4. Should forage duly ordered under these contracts not be delivered within forty-eight hours of the time specified in the order for delivery, it will be competent for the department to purchase the same at the risk of the contractor, from whose account any expense over and above the contract price is to be deducted.

5. In the event of a difference of opinion between the contractor and the officer receiving the forage as to the quality of the same, it is to be decided by a board of survey, composed of persons named by the head of the department ordering the supply, and the decision of the Board is to be considered final.

6. If the Board shall decide that the forage is not of proper quality, it must be immediately replaced, failing which it will be procured elsewhere, and the extra cost, if any, will be charged as in clause 4.

7. When a board of survey cannot be conveniently assembled, or when, from some other cause, injury would accrue to either party by waiting for a board of survey, the officer in charge will have the power to reject such supplies as are obviously of inferior quality, but he will be responsible to the Government for so doing; and the contractor must take back the rejected forage, and supply good in its stead, failing which it will be obtained by the officer requiring it, and the expense will be charged as in clause 4.

8. A refusal to execute orders, irregularity in the quantity or quality of the forage, or delay in delivering or replacing it when required, will subject the contractor, upon report from the Tender Board, to such mulct, not exceeding £20, as the Treasurer of the State for the time being may direct. It will also be in the power of the said Treasurer, upon such refusal, irregularity, or delay, to terminate the contract forthwith.

9. Contractors are not at liberty to transfer their contracts under cover of power of attorney, coupled with an interest or otherwise; and no such transfer will be recognised by the Government.

10. Under no circumstances will a contractor be permitted to abandon his contract, and in the event of his failing to carry on his contract he will be held liable for any loss which the Government may sustain in consequence of such failure.
