Income Tax Acts.

REGULATIONS.

*At the Executive Council Chamber, Melbourne, the twenty-first day of
December, 1910.*

PRESENT :

His Excellency the Governor of Victoria.

Mr. Brown
Mr. Edgar

Mr. Hagelthorn.

WHEREAS by the *Income Tax Act* 1895 (58 Vict. No. 1374) it is amongst other things enacted that the Governor in Council may make regulations not inconsistent with the said Act for the purposes, or any of them, therein mentioned : Now therefore His Excellency the Governor of the State of Victoria, by and with the advice of the Executive Council thereof, doth by this order make the following Regulations (that is to say) :—

1. These Regulations shall be read and construed with the Regulations made on the 14th day of March, 1895, the 10th day of February, 1896, and the 24th day of December, 1896, or such of them as shall now remain in force.

2. The notice to make returns for the period commencing on the 1st day of January, 1911, shall be in the following form :—

“ Income Tax.

“ NOTICE TO MAKE RETURNS.

“ Notice is hereby given that in pursuance of the *Income Tax Acts* and the Regulations made thereunder, every person whose income for 1910 consisted solely of salary, wages, allowance, pension, superannuation, or retiring allowance, or of rents, interest, or annuity, and whose income within the meaning of the *Income Tax Acts* earned in or derived from Victoria

amounted to Two hundred and one pounds or upwards, is hereby required to duly make and furnish to me in the prescribed form a return of such income on or before the 1st day of February, 1911. And every other person or company liable to make any return under the said Acts or Regulations is hereby required to duly make and furnish to me in the prescribed form such return on or before the 1st day of March, 1911.

"Every such return shall be addressed to the Commissioner of Taxes, and be delivered at, or forwarded by post to, the Income Tax Office, Railway Buildings, Flinders-street, Melbourne.

"Any person or company failing or neglecting to furnish a return at the prescribed time, or making a false return, is under the said Acts liable to be prosecuted, and to pay a penalty of not less than £2 nor more than £100, and will be assessed and charged a double amount of tax in addition to the tax for which he would have been otherwise liable; and under the said Acts the Commissioner may assess any such defaulter for such sum as the Commissioner thinks ought to be charged.

"Any person making a false return is liable to be prosecuted for perjury.

3. A return for the period commencing on the 1st day of January, 1911, in the form of Schedule "A" hereto, containing the information and particulars mentioned or referred to in such form, and verified by the declaration therein set forth, and accompanied by such balance-sheets, statements, lists, and other documents as may be mentioned in such form or as may be required, shall be furnished to the Commissioner on or before the 1st day of February, 1911, by—

- (a) Every person whose income for 1910 consisted solely of salary, wages, allowance, pension, superannuation, or retiring allowance, or stipend, of rents, interest, or annuity, and whose income within the meaning of the Income Tax Acts earned in or derived from Victoria amounted to Two hundred and one pounds or upwards;

And on or before the 1st day of March, 1911, by—

- (b) Every person (not being a company) carrying on any profession, vocation, trade, business, calling, employment, occupation, manufacture, adventure, or concern, or who derives income from any other source whatsoever [except (a)], whose gross income, within the meaning of the Income Tax Acts, earned in or derived from Victoria, for 1910, amounted to Two hundred and one pounds or upwards;
- (c) Every attorney or agent for any taxpayer permanently or temporarily absent from Victoria;
- (d) Every trustee, executor, administrator, guardian, committee, or receiver entitled to or having the management, receipt, care, or control of any income earned in or derived from Victoria;

And on or before the expiration of the 14th day from the date of the notice requiring the same by—

- (e) Every person who is required by the Commissioner to furnish a return.

4. A return for the period commencing on the 1st day of January, 1911, in such one of the forms of Schedule "C" hereto as may be applicable, and containing all the information and particulars therein mentioned, and verified as therein set forth, together with such balance-sheets, trading accounts, and profit and loss accounts as may be required, shall be furnished to the Commissioner on or before the 1st day of March, 1911, by—

- (a) Every company liable to pay tax;
- (b) Every agent for owners or charterers of ships resident out of Victoria.

5. A return for the period commencing on the 1st day of January, 1911, in form Schedule "H" hereto, containing the information and particulars mentioned or referred to in such form, and verified by the declaration therein set forth, and accompanied by such balance-sheets, statements, lists, or other documents mentioned in such form or as may be requisite, shall be furnished to the Commissioner on or before the 1st day of March, 1911, by—

Every company acting as trustee, executor, administrator, guardian, committee, or receiver, entitled to or having the management, care, or control of any income earned in or derived from Victoria by or on behalf of any trust or estate for which such company acts as aforesaid.

6. The assessments of incomes for the period commencing on the 1st day of January, 1911, shall be prepared on or before the 15th day of April, 1911.

7. Notice of the making of the assessment of income of any taxpayer shall be given to such taxpayer pursuant to Section 23 of the Principal Act as amended by Section 2 of the *Income Tax Act* 1903, in the form in Schedule "E" hereto, with such additions to or variations of the particulars thereof as may in any particular case be required by the Commissioner.

8. The returns to be furnished for the period commencing on the 1st day of January, 1911, under the provisions of Section 38 (1) of the Principal Act shall be in the form in Schedule "B" hereto.

9. The returns to be furnished for the period commencing on the 1st day of January, 1911, under the provisions of Section 38 (2) of the Principal Act, so far as regards moneys received from any person on deposit for any fixed time or period with or without interest, shall be in the form in Schedule "D" hereto.

10. The income tax on assessment of incomes for the period commencing on the 1st day of January, 1911, shall be paid in one sum on or before the 1st day of May, 1911.

11. In every case in which a return shall be required by the Commissioner in pursuance of any of the provisions of the Income Tax Acts, the same shall be furnished to the Commissioner within fourteen days from the date of the notice requiring the return to be furnished.

SURVEY BRANCH.

PROBATION.

Accepted candidates approved by the Minister shall enter the office as probationers for a period of one month without pay; and at the end of that time if reported by the Surveyor-General to have displayed aptitude for the work, may be appointed as pupils, and will be subject to the General Regulations for the Public Service as far as they are applicable.

TERM OF SERVICE.

The pupil's service in the Department shall be for a term of four years, the first two of which will be served in the office, where he will be engaged in drawing and computing. No. 1093) and all other powers me enabling in that behalf, do hereby revoke the Proclamation dated the fourteenth day of December, 1909, and published in the *Government Gazette* of the 22nd December, 1909, page 5457, re restrictions on netting, &c., in the Gippsland Lakes, and do also by this Proclamation,

(1) Prohibit the use of trammels, trawls, or other nets or engines, whether fixed or unfixed, to be employed in fishing within the waters known as the Gippsland Lakes, from Ten o'clock in the morning of each Friday until sunrise on each Sunday following throughout the year;

(2) Restrict the lengths of nets to be used in the waters known as the Gippsland Lakes, as follows, viz.:—Seine nets not to exceed 400 fathoms; mesh or set nets not to exceed 700 fathoms for those with meshes measuring less than $4\frac{1}{2}$ inches between knots, or 1,200 fathoms for those with meshes measuring $4\frac{1}{2}$ inches and upwards between knots; and provide that only one fleet of net (of any class) shall be allowed for each licensed fisherman of sixteen years and upwards.

MALLEE LANDS AVAILABLE FOR SELECTION AS AGRICULTURAL ALLOTMENTS.

THE land is situated on the Mildura railway line, and is from 5 to 11 miles north-west from Ouyen.

Applications (with uncanceled Victorian duty stamp of 5s., or postal note for same amount, affixed) must be made on the usual form, and delivered or forwarded by post to any Local Land Office, or to the Secretary for Lands, Melbourne, on or before Wednesday, 25th January, 1911.

Not more than one allotment can be included in any application, but any number of applications may be lodged, with the prescribed fee in each case.

No person who already holds the area of mallee land allowed by classification will be eligible to select, but holders of less than such area will be entitled to apply for the difference between the area held and that which the classification of the land entitles them to select.

Applicants will be hereafter notified as to the date and place of hearing of their applications by Local Land Board.

The land will be granted under agricultural allotment licence, and at the end of 6 years, if the residence, cultivation, improvement, and all other conditions have been complied with, a lease for 34 years will be granted, or, if desired, on expiry of licence, or at any time within the period of 34 years, a Crown grant will be issued on payment of the full amount of the purchase money.

The survey fee must be paid within 28 days of demand, and will range from £9 to £11 per allotment.

The licence will be subject to the following conditions:—

That substantial and permanent improvements shall be made on the land, if in the first class, to the value of 3s. 4d. per acre before the end of the second year from the date of the licence, another 3s. 4d. per acre before the end of each year of the third and fourth years, and the balance of 10s. per acre before the end of the sixth year of the licence. If in the second class, improvements to the value of 2s. 6d. per acre must be made during the like periods, and the balance of 7s. 6d. per acre before the end of the sixth year of the licence.

The first half-year's rent and licence-fee must be paid prior to issue of licence, and, provided improvements equivalent in value to the amount of rent due for each year be expended on the land during each of such years, in addition to the value required by the ordinary improvement condition, as set forth above, further payment of rent may be suspended until the end of the third year, and such suspended payments, without interest, will be collected in instalments during the remaining term of the licence.

That the licensee shall go into residence on the land within twelve months after the date of the licence, and shall reside on the land during the continuance of such licence, and shall also clear and cultivate at least one-fourth of his allotment within two years of obtaining a permit to occupy the land.

That the licensee shall not transfer, assign, mortgage, or sublet, or part with the possession, or grant the use of the whole, or any part of the allotment, during the currency of the licence.

That a special condition shall be inserted in the Lease and the Crown Grant, providing that the land referred to therein shall at all times be maintained and used for the purpose of agriculture, grazing, and residence, and that no person will be permitted to subsequently acquire or hold, or have an interest in, more than 1,000 acres, if the land be in the first class, or more than 1,500 acres, if the land be in any other class.

That the licensee shall preserve the timber on an area, or otherwise plant an area, of not less than 3 per cent. of the total area of his holding, preferably along the exposed boundary lines, viz., the western and southern.

No person, unless specially authorized, will be permitted to clear timber from any portion of areas retained for the purposes of roads and wind breaks.

Tenders for supply of forage to more than five separate stations in any one district must be accompanied by a preliminary deposit of 10s. for each and every station over and above five, except in the case of the Melbourne District, the preliminary deposit for which shall be £25 with each tender, irrespective of the number of stations tendered for, in bank notes, or a bank draft payable to the order of the Secretary to the Tender Board (cheques will in no case be received), which will be returned within ten days to unsuccessful tenderers on their application. Such deposit to be forfeited in the event of the successful tenderer failing to complete the necessary bond within a reasonable time after the acceptance is notified.

Tenderers failing to take up their accepted tenders, or failing to carry out their contract satisfactorily, will be ineligible to hold contracts for Government supplies for a period of two years.

The price must include delivery at the stations, and all charges except the bags, which will remain the property of the contractor. At stations where the bags can be at once emptied the contractor will be required to remove them when delivery is taken. At other stations, notice will be sent to the contractor when the bags are empty. Bags to be removed at contractor's expense.

For police stations, excepting the depot and institutions other than police, the successful tenderer will be required to enter into a bond for the sum of £5 per horse per station, and for the depot and other institutions a bond based on one-quarter of the total amount of the tender accepted, such bonds to be entered into within a reasonable time after the acceptance is notified. Two approved sureties are required for contracts where the sum stated in the bond is £50 and upwards, and one surety where the sum stated is under £50.

CONDITIONS OF CONTRACT.

1. The hay to be good, sound, and sweet, and properly trussed except when otherwise specified in the contract; the straw to be wheaten or oaten, and both to be in all respects of the best quality; oats, white or Algerian (Victorian grown), of the best description, full kernel, clean, and free from wild oats or other objectionable seeds; bran to be sound and sweet, and of the best description; chaff to be made from oaten hay of the best quality. As much forage as can be stored at any station where the storage is small will, for the convenience of the contractor, be ordered at one time.

2. The quantities stated in the schedule are only approximate, and the Government may draw either more or less than those mentioned. Should new telegraph stations be formed or additional horses be required at any station, the contractor will be required to supply the extra forage. Unless otherwise specified in the tender form the contractor may, if he desires it, terminate the contract by supplying at once the whole quantity due at the station, should the additional number of permanent horses exceed two.

3. Notwithstanding anything contained in the preceding condition, the contractors for the supply to the Police Depot may be called upon to supply any Government Departments within a radius of six miles from Melbourne, for which no contracts have been taken, and also forage for any extra horses that may be at any time stabled at the depot for police purposes, at the same rates. The contract for the supply of forage to the Military Barracks may be terminated by three months' notice being given by the Secretary to the Tender Board to the contractor of such determination.

4. Should forage duly ordered under these contracts not be delivered within forty-eight hours of the time specified in the order for delivery, it will be competent for the department to purchase the same at the risk of the contractor, from whose account any expense over and above the contract price is to be deducted.

5. In the event of a difference of opinion between the contractor and the officer receiving the forage as to the quality of the same, it is to be decided by a board of survey, composed of persons named by the head of the department ordering the supply, and the decision of the Board is to be considered final.

6. If the Board shall decide that the forage is not of proper quality, it must be immediately replaced, failing which it will be procured elsewhere, and the extra cost, if any, will be charged as in clause 4.

7. When a board of survey cannot be conveniently assembled, or when, from some other cause, injury would accrue to either party by waiting for a board of survey, the officer in charge will have the power to reject such supplies as are obviously of inferior quality, but he will be responsible to the Government for so doing; and the contractor must take back the rejected forage, and supply good in its stead, failing which it will be obtained by the officer requiring it, and the expense will be charged as in clause 4.

8. A refusal to execute orders, irregularity in the quantity or quality of the forage, or delay in delivering or replacing it when required, will subject the contractor, upon report from the Tender Board, to such mulct, not exceeding £20, as the Treasurer of the State for the time being may direct. It will also be in the power of the said Treasurer, upon such refusal, irregularity, or delay, to terminate the contract forthwith.

9. Contractors are not at liberty to transfer their contracts under cover of power of Attorney, coupled with an interest or otherwise; and no such transfer will be recognised by the Government.

10. Under no circumstances will a contractor be permitted to abandon his contract, and in the event of his failing to carry on his contract he will be held liable for any loss which the Government may sustain in consequence of such failure. In the event of a station being discontinued or any change in the supplies required, the contractor will receive the earliest possible intimation.

11. The contracts entered into under this notice are not to be considered as broken, infringed, or vitiated by the purchase by any Department of forage grown at any Government establishment.

BOROUGH OF DAYLESFORD.**BY-LAW NO. 41.**

A By-law of the Borough of Daylesford made under Part VII. of the *Local Government Act 1903*, and numbered 41, for the adoption of certain provisions of the Thirteenth Schedule to the said Act.

IN pursuance of the powers conferred by the *Local Government Act 1903*, the Mayor, Councillors, and Burgesses of the Borough of Daylesford order as follows:—

1. That the following portions of the Thirteenth Schedule to the *Local Government Act 1903* shall be and the same are hereby adopted as a By-law of and for the

said Borough, that is to say:—The clauses numbered one to forty inclusive and forty-four to forty-nine inclusive of Part I. relating to streets and footways.

(1) Porticoes, projections, &c. (2) Naming streets and numbering houses. (3) Spouts and drains from houses, &c. (4) Crossings over footways and channels. (5) Deposit or discharge of rubbish, liquid, &c., on streets, &c. (6) Depositing building materials, excavations, &c. (7) Lighting, &c., of obstructions generally. (8) Houses, &c., encroaching on street, &c. (9) Obstructions, &c., to streets, &c., by cattle, &c. (10) Undermining streets. (11) Miscellaneous.

The whole of the clauses in Part II. relating to water-works, drains, &c.

The whole of the clauses in Part IV. relating to places of improvement and recreation, &c.

(1) Public libraries and museums. (2) Public gardens.

The whole of the clauses in Part V. relating to regulation, &c., of buildings. (2) Ruinous or dangerous buildings, &c.

The whole of the clauses in Part VI. relating to buildings, &c., for public meetings, &c.

The whole of the clauses in Part VII. relating to fire prevention.

(1) Foul chimneys. (2) Deposit, &c., of inflammable material, &c.

The clauses number 9 to 16 inclusive of Part VIII. relating to nuisances, &c.—Portions (b) swine, &c.; and (c) nightsoil of (1) nuisances of various kinds; (2) private slaughter-houses.

The whole of the clauses in Part IX. relating to miscellaneous matters.

The clauses numbered 1 to 74 inclusive of Part X. relating to carriage of persons and goods.

(1) Passenger vehicles. (2) Carts and carter.

The whole of the clauses in Part XI. relating to regulations of proceedings of Council, officers, &c.

2. By-laws numbered 1 to 32 and 34 to 36 inclusive, except such of these By-laws or portions thereof as have not previously been repealed shall be and the same are hereby repealed, provided that the said repeal shall not affect any action taken, commenced, or pending under the said By-laws, and that all regulations and joint regulations made under the said By-laws shall continue in force until they are respectively repealed by the said Council.

3. This By-law shall apply to and have operation throughout the whole of the said Borough.

BOROUGH OF DAYLESFORD.

BY-LAW No. 42.

A By-law of the Borough of Daylesford made under Sub-section 20 of Section 197 of the *Local Government Act* 1903, and numbered 42, for regulating the keeping of goats within the Borough of Daylesford.

IN pursuance of the powers conferred by the *Local Government Act* 1903, the Mayor, Councillors, and Burgesses of the Borough of Daylesford order as follows:—

1. That within an area bounded on the north by the north side of Raglan-street, on the east by the east side of East-street, on the south by the south side of Stanbridge-street, and on the west by the west side of West-street, no person shall be allowed to keep any goat or goats, and any goat or goats found wandering within the area named may, by the proper officer of the Council, be seized and destroyed.

2. Every person who, within the Borough but outside of the area above named, shall keep any goat or goats, or shall own any goat usually kept therein, shall register with the Town Clerk thereof the name of such person as a keeper of goats within the Borough, together with the address of such, and shall at the time of such registration pay to the Town Clerk the sum of Two shillings, and thereafter, on the first day of January of each year, shall likewise pay to the Town Clerk the sum of Two shillings as annual fee for each goat so kept within the Borough, and shall place and keep upon the neck of every goat so owned and kept a triangle, with bars 18 inches long, bearing the name and address so registered (together with the number of the licence) legibly printed or written in letters at least half an inch long and proportionately wide; and if any person shall, without lawful excuse,

offend in any respect against this section, he shall, on conviction, forfeit and pay for such an offence a penalty not exceeding Twenty shillings.

3. If any goat shall be found within the Borough having on its neck such triangle purporting to bear the name and address of a person registered in the Borough as aforesaid, such goat shall *prima facie* be presumed to be owned and kept within the Borough by such person.

BY-LAWS OF THE ALFRED HOSPITAL.

1. *Objects.*—To establish and maintain (subject to the by-laws or regulations affecting the same) a hospital for the relief of persons requiring medical or surgical treatment and who are unable to pay the ordinary fees therefor.

2. *Management.*—The management of the affairs of the hospital shall be vested in the Board of Management (herein referred to as the Management) who, in addition to the powers and authorities herein expressly conferred upon them, shall manage and superintend all the affairs of the hospital, with power to frame regulations for the management of the hospital and its affairs, and to appoint sub-committees with power to act, or to report only, as the Board may from time to time determine.

3. The Board of Management shall consist of (a) twelve elective members (hereinafter referred to as "ordinary managers"), and (b) the following *ex officio* managers, viz.:—The president, two vice-presidents, and the treasurer. Four managers shall form a quorum. The managers, if constituting a quorum of the Board, may act in all things, notwithstanding any vacancy in their number.

4. The president, vice-presidents, and treasurer shall be elected by the contributors at the annual general meeting, to be held in the month of July in each year, and shall respectively hold office for one year, and thereafter until the election of their successors, but they shall be eligible for re-election.

5. The ordinary managers shall be elected by the contributors at the annual general meeting in the month of July, and shall hold office for three years, subject to these by-laws. At the general meeting, to be held on the last Thursday in the month of July in each year, one-third of the ordinary managers shall retire by rotation, but shall be eligible for re-election. The persons who shall retire shall be those who have been longest in office without re-election, and where two or more shall have been in office for the same length of time, then those who retire shall be determined by lot.

6. If any member of the management shall die, or resign by letter under his hand addressed to the president, or become insolvent, or compound with his creditors, or be convicted of any criminal act, or, without the permission of the management, be absent for four consecutive meetings from the management, his office shall become vacant, and the remaining members of the management may declare his office vacant, and temporarily appoint thereto

some contributor to such institution until the next annual meeting for the election of management, when the person thus temporarily appointed shall retire as one of those who by the provisions hereof are required to go out of office.

7. The managers shall meet at least once a fortnight. Special meetings of the managers may also be held as often as necessary, and may be summoned by the president or secretary.

8. The management shall have power to invest any moneys of the hospital in or upon any of the following investments, viz.:—

(a) Any stocks, funds, debentures, bonds, or other Government securities of the Commonwealth of Australia, or of any State in such Commonwealth.

(b) Any stocks, funds, debentures, bonds, or other securities of or issued by any municipality, local authority, or other public or corporate body in any of the States in the said Commonwealth.

(c) First mortgages on real property in Australia.

(d) And may place money on temporary or fixed deposit with the bank or banks for the time being of the hospital.

(e) All investments shall be made in the name of or under the control of the hospital.

9. *The Officers of the Hospital.*—All officers shall be appointed by the management, except the auditor or auditors.

10. The honorary medical staff shall consist of such number of duly qualified persons as the management may from time to time determine, subject to the following provisions, viz.:—

(a) That they must be engaged in the active practice of their profession whilst members of the honorary medical staff.

(b) That no person shall be eligible as a physician, unless, in addition to the requirements of the *Medical Act 1890*, he possess the degree of Doctor of Medicine from some University in the United Kingdom or in the Australian Commonwealth, or from some foreign University recognised by the University of Melbourne, or the diploma of Fellow from some College of Physicians in the United Kingdom.

(c) That no person shall be eligible as a surgeon, unless, in addition to the requirements of the *Medical Act 1890*, he hold the diploma of Fellow of some College of Surgeons in the United Kingdom, or the degree of Master of Surgery recognised by the University of Melbourne, and shall have been at least five years in the actual practice of his profession.

(d) That no person shall be eligible as a member of the honorary medical staff in any other capacity unless he be registered as a legally qualified medical practitioner under the *Medical Act 1890*, or any Act repealing or amending the same.

(e) Notwithstanding the above provisions, it shall be within the discretion of the management to make an exception in favour of any person not possessing the said qualifications who shall, in the opinion of the management, have gained for himself a high reputation in his profession.

(f) That all members appointed to the staff as physicians or surgeons shall be appointed for a period of five years (subject to the regulations for the time being in force), and shall be eligible for re-appointment.

(g) In the event of any casual vacancy occurring among the physicians and surgeons (in accordance with the provisions of the regulations for the time being in force) the person appointed to fill such vacancy shall hold office so long only as the vacating member would have held the same if no vacancy had arisen.

(h) All members of the honorary medical staff other than the physicians and surgeons shall be appointed for such period (not exceeding five years) as the management may determine.

11. The retiring age for physicians shall be 65 years, and for surgeons 60 years, but as regards any physician or surgeon upon the staff at the time these by-laws first come into operation, the management may, by a three-fourths majority of managers present and qualified to vote at a meeting, extend the retiring age.

12. There shall also be a resident medical staff consisting of such number of duly qualified medical practitioners as the management may determine, whose term of office shall be fixed by the management, and who shall not be allowed to engage in private practice.

13. No medical officer of the hospital shall be appointed or dismissed except at a meeting of the managers specially summoned for the purpose, or at any adjournment thereof. No member of the honorary medical staff shall be dismissed except by a resolution of at least three-fourths of the managers present, and entitled to vote at any such

meeting as aforesaid, or at any adjournment thereof. No manager shall be entitled to vote in respect of the election or dismissal of any officer of the hospital unless he shall have been present at at least one-fifth of the meetings of the managers held during the preceding 365 days, or during such portion thereof as he shall have been a manager. If less than five meetings shall have been held whilst any person shall have been a manager, then this rule shall not apply to such person, and in the event of the number of meetings above referred to being more than five, but not a multiple of five, then the number nearest to, but not more than one-fifth, shall be the number required to comply with this rule. The president shall have power to suspend any officer of the hospital for misconduct, but in such case the president shall cause a special meeting of the management to be convened to consider the matter within seven days.

14. The physicians and surgeons attending out-patients shall be designated assistant-physicians and assistant-surgeons respectively, and shall act as such to the in-patient staff, and fill the position of *locum tenens* for the latter when absent.

15. The management shall make such regulations as they may think expedient for the purpose of defining the duties of the medical officers, and also all other officers and employees of the hospital, and all officers and employees shall on appointment sign an agreement to abide by the regulations for the time being in force.

16. The lecturers and tutors to the clinical school shall be members of the honorary medical staff, and shall from time to time be appointed by the management upon the nomination of the Faculty of Medicine of the Melbourne University.

17. *Medical Committee.*—The physicians and surgeons and such other members of the honorary medical staff as the management may from time to time determine shall meet once at least in every month as a committee to advise the management on all matters that may be referred to them by the management, and to confer as to professional matters they may think advantageous to the hospital.

18. *Contributors.*—Any person who shall contribute £20 in one donation shall be a life contributor, and shall be entitled to one vote at all general meetings, and also to recommend one in-patient annually. Any such person shall also be entitled to nominate a life contributor with similar privileges for every additional donation of £20. Any person who shall annually contribute the sum of £1 1s., or more, shall be entitled to one vote at all general meetings in the year in which the subscription was made, and to recommend one in-patient and five out-patients for every £1 1s. contributed in any year. The executor first named in any will through which the hospital shall receive not less than the sum of £100 may be appointed by the management an honorary contributor, and shall be entitled to one vote at all general meetings. The executors of such will may, however, unanimously determine which of their number may be so appointed.

19. Any person who shall contribute not less than £50 in one donation shall be a life contributor and shall be entitled to vote at all general meetings, and in the event of a ballot shall be entitled to three votes. Such contributor shall also be entitled to recommend one in-patient annually for every £20 so contributed.

20. Any society, public or corporate body which shall contribute £20 or more in one sum, or which shall contribute £2 2s. annually, shall have the privilege of recommending one in-patient annually for every £20 contributed, or for each £2 2s. annual contribution, and if the contribution shall amount to £26 or more in one sum, shall also be entitled, by notice in writing to the secretary of the hospital, to nominate some one person as an honorary life contributor, and such nominee shall be entitled to one vote at all general meetings.

21. Any church congregation which shall contribute £20 or more in one sum, or which shall contribute £2 2s. annually, shall have the privilege of recommending one in-patient annually for every £20 contributed, or for each £2 2s. annual contribution, and if the contribution shall amount to £20 or more in one sum, shall also be entitled by notice in writing to the secretary of the hospital to nominate some one person as an honorary life contributor, and such nominee may be appointed by the management an honorary life contributor and shall be entitled to one vote.

22. Contributors shall not be entitled to exercise their privileges until they have paid the contribution.

23. Joint contributors shall only vote through one of their number. Every firm or partnership who is a contributor may exercise their privilege as such through some one member of such firm.

24. Votes by proxy are not allowed.

25. Any person who has conferred some signal benefit on the hospital, irrespective of contribution, may be appointed by the management an honorary life contributor, and shall have the privilege of recommending one in-patient annually.

26. *Meetings.*—At all meetings of contributors or of the management, the president, or, in his absence, the treasurer, or one of the vice-presidents shall take the chair, but in the absence of all these officers the meeting shall choose its own chairman.

27. At all meetings of the contributors or of the management, the chairman shall have a deliberative vote, and also a casting vote whenever the numbers are equal. All questions at meetings of the management shall be decided by a show of hands, and if it be demanded by any member, by a division or ballot.

28. Every question submitted to a meeting of the contributors shall be decided in the first instance by a show of hands, and unless a ballot is demanded by the chairman or by at least three contributors personally present and entitled to vote, a declaration by the chairman that a resolution has been carried or carried by a particular majority or lost or not carried by a particular majority, and an entry to that effect in the book of the proceedings of the hospital, shall be conclusive evidence of the fact without proof of the number or proportion of the votes recorded in favour of or against such resolution. When a ballot is duly demanded, the chairman shall adjourn the meeting to permit of the ballot being taken on a day to be fixed by him not more than ten days or less than four days from the date of the meeting, and notice thereof shall be advertised in each of two daily newspapers published in Melbourne at least one day before the day so fixed.

29. At all meetings of the contributors, eight shall form a quorum, but if no quorum be present within half-an-hour of the time named, such meeting shall stand adjourned for the following week at the same day, place, and time.

30. Every meeting of contributors shall be called by advertisement setting out the objects for which the meeting is called in two at least of the Melbourne newspapers. The first of such publications shall be at least one week before the date of the meeting.

31. *Auditors and Accounts.*—The management shall cause true accounts to be kept of the assets and liabilities of the hospital, and of all receipts and expenditure, and at the general meeting of the contributors to be held in the month of July in every year the management shall present an audited account of the receipts and expenditure for the year ending 30th June previously.

32. The auditor or auditors shall be appointed at the general meeting to be held in the month of July in each year, and such meeting shall fix the amount of the remuneration to be paid to such auditor or auditors.

33. Any person desirous of being elected an auditor of the hospital shall give to the secretary notice in writing seven days at least before the date on which the meeting is to be held, but this rule shall not apply to an auditor retiring from office, who shall be assumed to be desirous of being re-elected unless he shall give notice to the contrary, and no person shall be eligible as an auditor unless he holds the qualifications for the time being required for an auditor under the Companies Acts for the time being in force.

34. Every auditor shall at all reasonable times have access to the books of account and other documents of the hospital.

35. *In-patients.*—Persons shall be admitted into the hospital on such days as the management may appoint. Persons desiring admission must attend at the hospital for examination on the day or days and hours fixed on (except in cases of accident and cases of emergency). No person shall be admitted without examination.

36. No lunatic, or person suffering from any contagious or incurable disease, or chronic epilepsy, or pregnant woman for the purpose of confinement, shall be deemed a proper case for admission.

37. Persons will be admitted on the written recommendation of a contributor, but every such recommendation must contain a guarantee to satisfy the management that the applicant comes within the objects of the hospital. Accidents and cases of emergency may be admitted without letter of recommendation.

38. All persons will be required to contribute towards their maintenance if able to do so.

39. *Common Seal.*—The following shall be the common seal of the hospital:—
