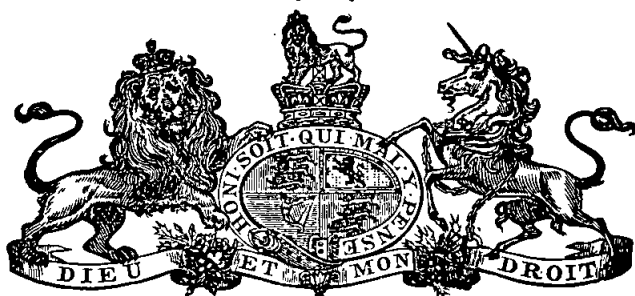

## REGULATIONS FOR PREVENTING COLLISIONS AT SEA.

THE following Order in Council, which has been received by His Excellency the Governor from the Right Honorable the Secretary of State for the Colonies, is published for general information, together with the accompanying Schedules.

PRESENT :

The King's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS by section 418 of the *Merchant Shipping Act 1894* His Majesty is empowered from time to time on the joint recommendation of the Admiralty and the Board of Trade by Order in Council to make regulations for preventing collisions at sea, in the said Act referred to as Collision Regulations :

And whereas by section 424 of the said Act it is provided that whenever it is made to appear to His Majesty in Council that the Government of any foreign country is willing that the said regulations or any of them should apply to the ships of that country when beyond the limits of British jurisdiction, His Majesty may, by Order in Council, direct that those regulations shall, subject to any limitation of time, conditions, and qualifications contained in the Order, apply to the ships of the said foreign country, whether within British jurisdiction or not, and that such ships shall for the purpose of such regulations be treated as if they were British ships :

And whereas by section 434 of the said Act His Majesty is empowered from time to time by Order in Council to make rules as to signals of distress :

And whereas by section 734 of the said Act it is provided that where it has been made to appear to His Majesty that the Government of any foreign country is desirous that any of the provisions of that Act which do not apply to the ships of that country, should so apply, and there are no special provisions in the Act for that application, His Majesty in Council may order that such of those provisions as are in the Order specified shall (subject to the limitations, if any, contained therein) apply to the ships of that country, and to the owners, masters, seamen, and apprentices of those ships, when not locally within the jurisdiction of the Government of that country, in the same manner in all respects as if those ships were British ships :

And whereas by section 738 of the said Act it is provided that where His Majesty has power under that Act or any Act amending the same to make an Order in

Council, His Majesty may from time to time make that Order in Council, and by Order in Council revoke, alter, or add to any Order so made :

And whereas by the said last-mentioned section it is further provided that, subject to any special provisions of that Act upon the publication of any such Order, the Order shall as from the date of its publication or any later date mentioned in the Order, take effect as if it were enacted by Parliament :

And whereas by an Order in Council dated the 27th day of November, 1896, regulations for preventing collisions at sea and as to distress signals were made as regards British ships and boats, and by a subsequent Order dated the 7th day of July, 1897, these regulations were extended, subject to the limitations stated in the Order, to the ships of the several countries specified in Schedule III. to the last-mentioned Order :

And whereas by Orders in Council dated respectively the 18th day of August, 1892, the 7th day of July, 1897, and the 4th day of April, 1906, other regulations for the prevention of collisions were made as regards British ships :

And whereas it is expedient to consolidate the regulations which have been made as regards British ships :

And whereas it has been made to appear to His Majesty that the Governments of the several countries mentioned in Schedule II. hereto annexed are willing that the regulations and rules contained in Schedule I. should, subject to the qualifications mentioned in the aforesaid Schedule I. and to the proviso in the case of Chinese ships that the application of the regulations and rules shall be limited to ships of foreign type, apply to the ships of those countries when beyond the limits of British jurisdiction :

And whereas the provisions of section 1 of the *Rules Publication Act 1893* have been complied with :

Now therefore His Majesty, by virtue of the powers conferred on him by the aforesaid Act, and on the joint recommendation of the Admiralty and the Board of Trade, and by and with the advice of His Privy Council, is pleased to direct that the collision regulations and the rules as to signals of distress contained in Schedule I. to this Order shall apply to all British ships :

And His Majesty is also pleased to direct that the said regulations and rules shall, subject to the aforesaid qualifications and to the proviso in the case of Chinese ships that the regulations and rules will be applicable only to ships of foreign type, apply to the ships of the countries named in Schedule II. to this Order whether they are within British jurisdiction or not, and that such ships shall for the purpose of such regulations and rules be treated as if they were British ships :

And His Majesty is further pleased to direct that this Order shall come into operation on and after the 13th day

of October, 1910, and that as and from the coming into operation of this Order the Orders in Council specified in Schedule III. to this Order shall be revoked, and the same shall be revoked accordingly.

#### SCHEDULE I.

##### *Preliminary.*

These Rules shall be followed by all vessels upon the high seas and in all waters connected therewith, navigable by sea-going vessels.

In the following Rules every steam vessel which is under sail and not under steam is to be considered a sailing vessel, and every vessel under steam, whether under sail or not, is to be considered a steam vessel.

The word "steam vessel" shall include any vessel propelled by machinery.

A vessel is "under way" within the meaning of these Rules when she is not at anchor, or made fast to the shore or aground.

##### *Rules concerning Lights, &c.*

The word "visible" in these Rules, when applied to lights, shall mean visible on a dark night with a clear atmosphere.

Article 1. The Rules concerning lights shall be complied with in all weathers from sunset to sunrise, and during such time no other lights which may be mistaken for the prescribed lights shall be exhibited.

Article 2. A steam vessel when under way shall carry—

- (a) On or in front of the foremast, or if a vessel without a foremast, then in the fore part of the vessel, at a height above the hull of not less than 20 feet, and if the breadth of the vessel exceeds 20 feet, then at a height above the hull not less than such breadth, so, however, that the light need not be carried at a greater height above the hull than 40 feet, a bright white light, so constructed as to show an unbroken light over an arc of the horizon of 20 points of the compass, so fixed as to throw the light 10 points on each side of the vessel, viz., from right ahead to 2 points abaft the beam on either side, and of such a character as to be visible at a distance of at least 5 miles.
- (b) On the starboard side a green light so constructed as to show an unbroken light over an arc of the horizon of 10 points of the compass, so fixed as to throw the light from right ahead to 2 points abaft the beam on the starboard side, and of such a character as to be visible at a distance of at least 2 miles.
- (c) On the port side a red light so constructed as to show an unbroken light over an arc of the horizon of 10 points of the compass, so fixed as to throw the light from right ahead to 2 points abaft the beam on the port side, and of such a character as to be visible at a distance of at least 2 miles.
- (d) The said green and red side-lights shall be fitted with inboard screens projecting at least 3 feet forward from the light, so as to prevent these lights from being seen across the bow.
- (e) A steam vessel when under way may carry an additional white light similar in construction to the light mentioned in subdivision (a). These two lights shall be so placed in line with the keel that one shall be at least 15 feet higher than the other, and in such a position with reference to each other that the lower light shall be forward of the upper one. The vertical distance between these lights shall be less than the horizontal distance.

Article 3. A steam vessel when towing another vessel shall, in addition to her side-lights, carry two bright white lights in a vertical line one over the other, not less than 6 feet apart, and when towing more than one vessel shall carry an additional bright white light 6 feet above or below such lights, if the length of the tow, measuring from the stern of the towing vessel to the stern of the last vessel towed, exceeds 600 feet. Each of these lights shall be of the same construction and character, and shall be carried in the same position as the white light mentioned in Article 2 (a), except the additional light, which may be carried at a height of not less than 14 feet above the hull.

Such steam vessel may carry a small white light abaft the funnel or aftermast for the vessel towed to steer by, but such light shall not be visible forward of the beam.

Article 4.—(a) A vessel which from any accident is not under command shall carry at the same height as the white light mentioned in Article 2 (a), where they can best be seen, and, if a steam vessel, in lieu of that light, two red lights, in a vertical line one over the other, not less than 6 feet apart, and of such a character as to be visible all round the horizon at a distance of at least 2 miles; and shall by day carry in a vertical line one over the other not less than 6 feet apart, where they can best be seen, two black balls or shapes each 2 feet in diameter.

(b) A vessel employed in laying or in picking up a telegraph cable shall carry in the same position as the white light mentioned in Article 2 (a), and if a steam vessel, in lieu of that light, three lights in a vertical line one over the other, not less than 6 feet apart. The highest and lowest of these lights shall be red, and the middle light shall be white, and they shall be of such a character as to be visible all round the horizon, at a distance of at least 2 miles. By day she shall carry in a vertical line one over the other, not less than 6 feet apart, where they can best be seen, three shapes not less than 2 feet in diameter, of which the highest and lowest shall be globular in shape and red in colour, and the middle one diamond in shape and white.

(c) The vessels referred to in this Article when not making way through the water, shall not carry the side lights, but when making way shall carry them.

(d) The lights and shapes required to be shown by this Article are to be taken by other vessels as signals that the vessel showing them is not under command and cannot therefore get out of the way.

These signals are not signals of vessels in distress and requiring assistance. Such signals are contained in Article 31.

Article 5. A sailing vessel under way, and any vessel being towed, shall carry the same lights as are prescribed by Article 2 for a steam vessel under way, with the exception of the white lights mentioned therein, which they shall never carry.

Article 6. Whenever, as in the case of small vessels under way during bad weather, the green and red side-lights cannot be fixed, these lights shall be kept at hand lighted and ready for use; and shall, on the approach of or to other vessels, be exhibited on their respective sides in sufficient time to prevent collision, in such manner as to make them most visible, and so that the green light shall not be seen on the port side nor the red light on the starboard side, nor, if practicable, more than 2 points abaft the beam on their respective sides.

To make the use of these portable lights more certain and easy, the lanterns containing them shall each be painted outside with the colour of the light they respectively contain, and shall be provided with proper screens.

Article 7. Steam vessels of less than 40, and vessels under oars or sails of less than 20, tons gross tonnage respectively, and rowing boats, when under way, shall not be obliged to carry the lights mentioned in Article 2 (a), (b), and (c), but if they do not carry them they shall be provided with the following lights:—

1. Steam vessels of less than 40 tons shall carry—

- (a) In the fore part of the vessel, or on or in front of the funnel, where it can best be seen, and at a height above the gunwale of not less than 9 feet, a bright white light constructed and fixed as prescribed in Article 2 (a), and of such a character as to be visible at a distance of at least 2 miles.
- (b) Green and red side-lights constructed and fixed as prescribed in Article 2 (b) and (c), and of such a character as to be visible at a distance of at least 1 mile, or a combined lantern showing a green light and a red light from right ahead to 2 points abaft the beam on their respective sides. Such lantern shall be carried not less than 3 feet below the white light.

2. Small steamboats, such as are carried by sea-going vessels, may carry the white light at a less height than 9 feet above the gunwale, but it shall be carried above the combined lantern, mentioned in subdivision 1 (b).

3. Vessels under oars or sails, of less than 20 tons, shall have ready at hand a lantern with a green glass on one side and a red glass on the other, which, on the approach of or to other vessels, shall be exhibited in sufficient time to prevent collision, so that the green light shall not be seen on the port side nor the red light on the starboard side.

4. Rowing boats, whether under oars or sail, shall have ready at hand a lantern showing a white light, which shall be temporarily exhibited in sufficient time to prevent collision.

The vessels referred to in this Article shall not be obliged to carry the lights prescribed by Article 4 (a), and Article 11, last paragraph.

Article 8. Pilot-vessels, when engaged on their station on pilotage duty, shall not show the lights required for other vessels, but shall carry a white light at the mast-head, visible all round the horizon, and shall also exhibit a flare-up light or flare-up lights at short intervals, which shall never exceed fifteen minutes.

On the near approach of or to other vessels they shall have their side-lights lighted, ready for use, and shall

flash or show them at short intervals, to indicate the direction in which they are heading, but the green light shall not be shown on the port side, nor the red light on the starboard side.

A pilot-vessel of such a class as to be obliged to go alongside of a vessel to put a pilot on board, may show the white light instead of carrying it at the masthead, and may, instead of the coloured lights above mentioned, have at hand ready for use a lantern with a green glass on the one side and a red glass on the other, to be used as prescribed above.

A steam pilot-vessel exclusively employed for the service of pilots licensed or certified by any pilotage authority or the Committee of any pilotage district, when engaged on her station on pilotage duty and not at anchor, shall, in addition to the lights required for all pilot boats, carry at a distance of 8 feet below her white masthead light a red light visible all round the horizon, and of such a character as to be visible on a dark night with a clear atmosphere at a distance of at least 2 miles, and also the coloured side-lights required to be carried by vessels when under way.

When engaged on her station on pilotage duty and at anchor she shall carry, in addition to the lights required for all pilot boats, the red light above mentioned, but not the coloured side-lights.

Pilot-vessels, when not engaged on their station on pilotage duty, shall carry lights similar to those of other vessels of their tonnage.

Article 9.\*† Fishing-vessels and fishing-boats, when under way and when not required by this Article to carry or show the lights hereinafter specified, shall carry or show the lights prescribed for vessels of their tonnage under way.

- (a) Open boats, by which it is to be understood boats not protected from the entry of sea water by means of a continuous deck, when engaged in any fishing at night with outlying tackle extending not more than 150 feet horizontally from the boat into the seaway, shall carry one all-round white light.

Open boats, when fishing at night, with outlying tackle extending more than 150 feet horizontally from the boat into the seaway, shall carry one all-round white light, and in addition, on approaching or being approached by other vessels, shall show a second white light at least 3 feet below the first light and at a horizontal distance of at least 5 feet away from it in the direction in which the outlying tackle is attached.

- (b)‡ Vessels and boats, except open boats as defined in subdivision (a), when fishing with drift-nets, shall, so long as the nets are wholly or partly in the water, carry two white lights where they can best be seen. Such lights shall be placed so that the vertical distance between them shall be not less than 6 feet and not more than 15 feet, and so that the horizontal distance between them, measured in a line with the keel, shall be not less than 5 feet and not more than 10 feet. The lower of these two lights shall be in the direction of the nets, and both of them shall be of such a character as to show all round the horizon, and to be visible at a distance of not less than 3 miles.

Within the Mediterranean Sea and in the seas bordering the coasts of Japan and Korea§ sailing fishing-vessels of less than 20 tons gross tonnage shall not be obliged to carry the lower of these two lights; should they, however, not carry it, they shall show in the same position (in the direction of the net or gear) a white light, visible at a distance of not less than 1 sea mile, on the approach of or to other vessels.

- (c) Vessels and boats, except open boats as defined in subdivision (a), when line-fishing with their lines out and attached to or hauling their lines, and when not at anchor or stationary within the meaning of subdivision (h), shall carry the same lights as vessels fishing with drift-nets. When shooting lines, or fishing with towing lines, they shall carry the lights prescribed for a steam or sailing vessel under way respectively.

Within the Mediterranean Sea and in the seas bordering the coasts of Japan and Korea§ sailing fishing-vessels of less than 20 tons gross tonnage shall not be obliged to carry the lower of these two lights; should they, however, not carry it, they shall show in the same position (in the direction of the lines) a white light, visible at a distance of not less than 1 sea mile, on the approach of or to other vessels.

- (d) Vessels, when engaged in trawling, by which is meant the dragging of an apparatus along the bottom of the sea—

1. If steam vessels, shall carry in the same position as the white light mentioned in Article 2 (a), a tricoloured lantern so constructed and fixed as to show a white light from right ahead to 2 points on each bow, and a green light and a red light over an arc of the horizon from 2 points on each bow to 2 points abaft the beam on the starboard and port sides respectively; and not less than 6 nor more than 12 feet below the tricoloured lantern a white light in a lantern, so constructed as to show a clear, uniform, and unbroken light all round the horizon.

2. If sailing vessels, shall carry a white light in a lantern, so constructed as to show a clear, uniform, and unbroken light all round the horizon, and shall also, on the approach of or to other vessels, show where it can best be seen a white flare-up light or torch in sufficient time to prevent collision.

All lights mentioned in subdivision (d) 1 and 2 shall be visible at a distance of at least 2 miles.

- (e) Oyster dredgers and other vessels fishing with dredge-nets shall carry and show the same lights as trawlers.

- (f) Fishing-vessels and fishing-boats may at any time use a flare-up light in addition to the lights which they are by this Article required to carry and show, and they may also use working lights.

- (g) Every fishing-vessel and every fishing-boat under 150 feet in length, when at anchor, shall exhibit a white light visible all round the horizon at a distance of at least 1 mile.

Every fishing-vessel of 150 feet in length or upwards, when at anchor, shall exhibit a white light visible all round the horizon at a distance of at least 1 mile, and shall exhibit a second light as provided for vessels of such length by Article 11.

Should any such vessel, whether under 150 feet in length, or of 150 feet in length or upwards, be attached to a net or other fishing gear, she shall on the approach of other vessels show an additional white light at least 3 feet below the anchor light, and at a horizontal distance of at least 5 feet away from it in the direction of the net or gear.

- (h) If a vessel or boat when fishing becomes stationary in consequence of her gear getting fast to a rock or other obstruction, she shall in daytime haul down the day-signal required by subdivision (k); at night show the light or lights prescribed for a vessel at anchor; and during fog, mist, falling snow, or heavy rain-storms make the signal prescribed for a vessel at anchor. (See subdivision (d), and the last paragraph, of Article 15.)

- (i) In fog, mist, falling snow, or heavy rain-storms, drift-net vessels attached to their nets, and vessels when trawling, dredging, or fishing with any kind of drag-net, and vessels line-fishing with their lines out, shall, if of 20 tons gross tonnage or upwards, respectively, at intervals of not more than one minute, make a blast; if steam vessels, with the whistle or siren, and if sailing vessels, with the fog-horn; each blast to be followed by ringing the bell. Fishing-vessels and boats of less than 20 tons gross tonnage shall not be obliged to give the above-mentioned signals; but if they do not, they shall make some other efficient sound signal at intervals of not more than one minute.

- (k) All vessels or boats fishing with nets or lines or trawls, when under way, shall in daytime indicate their occupation to an approaching vessel by displaying a basket or other efficient signal where it can best be seen. If vessels or boats at anchor have their gear out, they shall, on the approach of other vessels, show the same signal on the side on which those vessels can pass.

The vessels required by this Article to carry or show the lights hereinbefore specified shall not be obliged to carry the lights prescribed by Article 4 (a), and the last paragraph of Article 11.

\* This Article does not apply to Chinese or Siamese vessels.

† The expression "Mediterranean Sea" contained in sub-sections (b) and (c) of this Article includes the Black Sea and the other adjacent inland seas in communication with it.

‡ Dutch vessels and boats when engaged in the "kol," or hand-line fishing, will carry the lights prescribed for vessels fishing with drift-nets.

§ Also, as regards Russian vessels, in the seas (excluding the Baltic) bordering the coasts of Russia.

Article 10. A vessel which is being overtaken by another shall show from her stern to such last-mentioned vessel a white light or a flare-up light.

The white light required to be shown by this Article may be fixed and carried in a lantern, but in such case the lantern shall be so constructed, fitted, and screened that it shall throw an unbroken light over an arc of the horizon of 12 points of the compass, viz., for 6 points from right aft on each side of the vessel, so as to be visible at a distance of at least 1 mile. Such light shall be carried as nearly as practicable on the same level as the side-lights.

Article 11. A vessel under 150 feet in length, when at anchor, shall carry forward, where it can best be seen, but at a height not exceeding 20 feet above the hull, a white light in a lantern so constructed as to show a clear, uniform, and unbroken light visible all round the horizon at a distance of least 1 mile.

A vessel of 150 feet or upwards in length, when at anchor, shall carry in the forward part of the vessel, at a height of not less than 20, and not exceeding 40 feet above the hull, one such light; and at or near the stern of the vessel, and at such a height that it shall be not less than 15 feet lower than the forward light, another such light.

The length of a vessel shall be deemed to be the length appearing in her certificate of registry.

A vessel aground in or near a fairway shall carry the above light or lights and the two red lights prescribed by Article 4 (a).

Article 12. Every vessel may, if necessary in order to attract attention, in addition to the lights which she is by these Rules required to carry, show a flare-up light or use any detonating signal that cannot be mistaken for a distress signal.

Article 13. Nothing in these Rules shall interfere with the operation of any special rules made by the Government of any nation with respect to additional station and signal lights for two or more ships of war or for vessels sailing under convoy, or with the exhibition of recognition signals adopted by ship-owners, which have been authorized by their respective Governments and duly registered and published.

Article 14. A steam vessel proceeding under sail only, but having her funnel up, shall carry in daytime, forward, where it can best be seen, one black ball or shape 2 feet in diameter.

#### *Sound Signals for Fog, &c.*

Article 15. All signals prescribed by this Article for vessels under way shall be given—

1. By "steam vessels" on the whistle or siren;
2. By "sailing vessels and vessels towed" on the fog-horn.

The words "prolonged blast" used in this Article shall mean a blast of from 4 to 6 seconds' duration.

A steam vessel shall be provided with an efficient whistle or siren, sounded by steam or some substitute for steam, so placed that the sound may not be intercepted by any obstruction, and with an efficient fog-horn, to be sounded by mechanical means, and also with an efficient bell.\* A sailing vessel of 20 tons gross tonnage or upwards shall be provided with a similar fog-horn and bell.

In fog, mist, falling snow, or heavy rain-storms, whether by day or night, the signals described in this Article shall be used as follows, viz. :—

- (a) A steam vessel having way upon her shall sound, at intervals of not more than two minutes, a prolonged blast.
- (b) A steam vessel under way, but stopped and having no way upon her, shall sound, at intervals of not more than two minutes, two prolonged blasts, with an interval of about one second between them.
- (c) A sailing vessel under way shall sound, at intervals of not more than one minute, when on the starboard tack one blast, when on the port tack two blasts in succession, and when with the wind abaft the beam three blasts in succession.
- (d) A vessel, when at anchor, shall, at intervals of not more than one minute, ring the bell rapidly for about five seconds.
- (e) A vessel, when towing, a vessel employed in laying or in picking up a telegraph cable, and a vessel under way, which is unable to get out of the way of an approaching vessel through being not under command, or unable to manoeuvre as required by these Rules, shall, instead of the signals prescribed in subdivisions (a) and (c) of this Article, at intervals of not more than two minutes, sound three blasts in succession, viz., one prolonged blast followed by two short blasts. A vessel towed may give this signal and she shall not give any other.

\* In all cases where the Rules require a bell to be used a drum may be substituted on board Turkish vessels, or a gong where such articles are used on board small sea-going vessels.

Sailing vessels and boats of less than 20 tons gross tonnage shall not be obliged to give the above-mentioned signals, but if they do not, they shall make some other efficient sound-signal at intervals of not more than one minute.†

#### *Speed of Ships to be Moderate in Fog, &c.*

Article 16. Every vessel shall, in a fog, mist, falling snow, or heavy rain-storms, go at a moderate speed, having careful regard to the existing circumstances and conditions.

A steam vessel hearing, apparently forward of her beam the fog-signal of a vessel the position of which is not ascertained, shall, so far as the circumstances of the case admit, stop her engines, and then navigate with caution until danger of collision is over.

#### *Steering and Sailing Rules.*

##### PRELIMINARY—RISK OF COLLISION.

Risk of collision can, when circumstances permit, be ascertained by carefully watching the compass bearing of an approaching vessel. If the bearing does not appreciably change, such risk should be deemed to exist.

Article 17. When two sailing vessels are approaching one another, so as to involve risk of collision, one of them shall keep out of the way of the other, as follows, viz. :—

- (a) A vessel which is running free shall keep out of the way of a vessel which is close-hauled.
- (b) A vessel which is close-hauled on the port tack shall keep out of the way of a vessel which is close-hauled on the starboard tack.
- (c) When both are running free, with the wind on different sides, the vessel which has the wind on the port side shall keep out of the way of the other.
- (d) When both are running free, with the wind on the same side, the vessel which is to windward shall keep out of the way of the vessel which is to leeward.
- (e) A vessel which has the wind aft shall keep out of the way of the other vessel.

Article 18. When two steam vessels are meeting end on, or nearly end on, so as to involve risk of collision, each shall alter her course to starboard, so that each may pass on the port side of the other.

This Article only applies to cases where vessels are meeting end on, or nearly end on, in such a manner as to involve risk of collision, and does not apply to two vessels which must, if both keep on their respective courses, pass clear of each other.

The only cases to which it does apply are when each of the two vessels is end on, or nearly end on, to the other; in other words, to cases in which, by day, each vessel sees the masts of the other in a line, or nearly in a line, with her own; and, by night, to cases in which each vessel is in such a position as to see both the side-lights of the other.

It does not apply, by day, to cases in which a vessel sees another ahead crossing her own course; or by night, to cases where the red light of one vessel is opposed to the red light of the other, or where the green light of one vessel is opposed to the green light of the other, or where a red light without a green light, or a green light without a red light, is seen ahead, or where both green and red lights are seen anywhere but ahead.

Article 19. When two steam vessels are crossing, so as to involve risk of collision, the vessel which has the other on her own starboard side shall keep out of the way of the other.

Article 20. When a steam vessel and a sailing vessel are proceeding in such directions as to involve risk of collision, the steam vessel shall keep out of the way of the sailing vessel.

Article 21. Where by any of these Rules one of two vessels is to keep out of the way, the other shall keep her course and speed.

*Note.*—When, in consequence of thick weather or other causes, such vessel finds herself so close that collision cannot be avoided by the action of the giving-way vessel alone, she also shall take such action as will best aid to avert collision. (See Articles 27 and 29.)

† Dutch steam pilot-vessels, when engaged on their station on pilotage duty in fog, mist, falling snow, or heavy rain-storms are required to make at intervals of 2 minutes at most one long blast with the siren, followed after 1 second by a long blast with the steam whistle and again after 1 second by a long blast on the siren. When not engaged on their station on pilotage duty, they make the same signals as other steam-ships.

Article 22. Every vessel which is directed by these Rules to keep out of the way of another vessel shall, if the circumstances of the case admit, avoid crossing ahead of the other.

Article 23. Every steam vessel which is directed by these Rules to keep out of the way of another vessel shall, on approaching her, if necessary, slacken her speed or stop or reverse.

Article 24. Notwithstanding anything contained in these Rules, every vessel, overtaking any other, shall keep out of the way of the overtaken vessel.

Every vessel coming up with another vessel from any direction more than two points abaft her beam, *i.e.*, in such a position, with reference to the vessel which she is overtaking, that at night she would be unable to see either of that vessel's sidelights, shall be deemed to be an overtaking vessel; and no subsequent alteration of the bearing between the two vessels shall make the overtaking vessel a crossing vessel within the meaning of these Rules, or relieve her of the duty of keeping clear of the overtaken vessel until she is finally past and clear.

As by day the overtaking vessel cannot always know with certainty whether she is forward or abaft this direction from the other vessel, she should, if in doubt, assume that she is an overtaking vessel, and keep out of the way.

Article 25. In narrow channels every steam vessel shall, when it is safe and practicable, keep to that side of the fairway or mid-channel which lies on the starboard side of such vessel.

Article 26. Sailing vessels under way shall keep out of the way of sailing vessels or boats fishing with nets, or lines, or trawls. This Rule shall not give to any vessel or boat engaged in fishing the right of obstructing a fairway, used by vessels other than fishing vessels or boats.

Article 27. In obeying and construing these Rules, due regard shall be had to all dangers of navigation and collision, and to any special circumstances which may render a departure from the above Rules necessary in order to avoid immediate danger.

#### *Sound Signals for Vessels in Sight of one Another.*

Article 28. The words "short blast" used in this Article shall mean a blast of about one second's duration.

When vessels are in sight of one another, a steam vessel under way, in taking any course authorized or required by these Rules, shall indicate that course by the following signals on her whistle or siren, *viz.* :—

One short blast to mean, "I am directing my course to starboard."

Two short blasts to mean, "I am directing my course to port."

Three short blasts to mean, "My engines are going full speed astern."

#### *No Vessel under any circumstances to Neglect Proper Precautions.*

Article 29. Nothing in these Rules shall exonerate any vessel, or the owner, or master, or crew thereof, from the consequences of any neglect to carry lights or signals, or of any neglect to keep a proper look-out, or of the neglect of any precaution which may be required by the ordinary practice of seamen, or by the special circumstances of the case.

#### *Reservation of Rules for Harbors and Inland Navigation.*

Article 30. Nothing in these Rules shall interfere with the operation of a special rule, duly made by local authority, relative to the navigation of any harbor, river, or inland waters.

#### *Distress Signals.*

Article 31. When a vessel is in distress and requires assistance from other vessels or from the shore, the following shall be the signals to be used or displayed by her, either together or separately, *viz.* :—

In the daytime—

1. A gun or other explosive signal fired at intervals of about a minute;
2. The International Code signal of distress indicated by NC;
3. The distant signal, consisting of a square flag, having either above or below it a ball or anything resembling a ball;
4. A continuous sounding with any fog-signal apparatus.

At night—

1. A gun or other explosive signal fired at intervals of about a minute;
2. Flames on the vessel (as from a burning tar-barrel, oil-barrel, &c.); . . .

3. Rockets or shells, throwing stars of any colour or description, fired one at a time, at short intervals;
4. A continuous sounding with any fog-signal apparatus.

**H**IS Excellency the Governor of the State of Victoria, with the advice of the Executive Council thereof, has, by Order made on the 21st day of February, 1911, under the provisions of section 148 of the *Local Government Act 1903* (3 Edw. VII. No. 1893), and pursuant to the petition of the Council of the Municipality of the Shire of Colac, directed that the provisions of the *Voting by Post Act 1900*, applicable and severally referred to in the underwritten Schedules, shall apply to the elections of Councillors for the Municipality of the said Shire, with the alterations of such provisions as shown or indicated in the said Schedules, the same being alterations deemed necessary for the purpose of carrying into effect such provisions as so applied, and to give effect to the requirements of sub-section (1) of section 2 of the said Act.

His Excellency has also directed that the official to give the public notices required by the said section as altered shall be the Municipal Clerk of the said Shire.

And His Excellency, by the Order hereinbefore mentioned, has further directed that the Regulations following shall have effect:—

1. The following persons are hereby appointed officers within the meaning of section 21 of the *Voting by Post Act 1900* as applied to Municipal Elections, viz.:—

All Councillors of any City, Town, Borough, or Shire,	
All Municipal Clerks,	
All Clerks of Courts,	
All Head-masters of State Schools,	
And every member of the Police Force,	

2. Every letter or envelope transmitted through the post-office, pursuant to the *Voting by Post Act* as applied to Municipal Elections, either by or to a Returning Officer, shall have the necessary postage upon same prepaid.

#### SCHEDULE.

Section 5 shall apply, omitting the words "any electoral" in the third line, and substituting therefor the words "the Voters"; and omitting the words "province or district" in the third and fourth lines, and substituting therefor the word "Municipality."

Section 6 shall apply unaltered.

Section 7 shall apply, omitting the words "initial letter" in the third line, and substituting therefor the words "special mark"; omitting all the words after the word "section" in the third line down to the word "and" in the fourth line, and substituting therefor the words "one hundred and forty-one of the *Local Government Act 1903*"; omitting all the words after the word "the" where it appears the second time in the eighth line down to the word "in" in the ninth line, and substituting therefor the word "Municipality"; omitting the word "electoral" in the twelfth line, and substituting therefor the word "Voters'."

Section 8 shall apply, omitting the word "electoral" in the first line, and substituting therefor the word "Voters"; omitting the words "province or district" wherever they appear, and substituting therefor the word "Municipality."

Section 9 shall apply, omitting the words "electors electoral province or district" in the second and third lines, and "province or district" in the third line, and substituting therefor the word "Municipality" in both places; omitting the words "electoral provinces or districts" in the twentieth and twenty-first lines, and substituting therefor the word "Municipality," and in line three after the word "Postmaster" inserting the words "or Officer."

Section 10 shall apply unaltered.

Section 11 shall apply unaltered.

Section 12 shall apply, omitting the words "province or district" in the third and fourth lines, and substituting therefor the word "Municipality."

Section 13 shall apply, omitting all the words from the beginning of the section down to the word "the" where it appears the second time in the second line; omitting the words "province or district" in the fourth line, and substituting therefor the word "Municipality"; omitting the word "any" in the eighth line, and substituting therefor the word "the"; omitting all the words after the word "for" in the eighth line down to the word "to-day" in the ninth line, and substituting therefor the words "Councillor or Councillors for the Shire of Colac."

Section 14 shall apply, omitting the words "pursuant to the Constitution Acts Amendment Acts" in the second line, and substituting therefor the words "in pursuance of the *Local Government Act 1903*"; omitting all the words after the word "together" in the twenty-sixth line down to the word "such" in the twenty-ninth line; omitting the words "said sections" in the thirtieth line, substituting therefor the words "*Local Government Act 1903*"; omitting all the words after the word "the" where it appears the second time in the thirty-ninth line down to the end of the section, and substituting therefor the word "Municipality."

It shall be lawful for the Governor, by and with the advice of the Executive Council, at any time within thirty (30) days from the date of sale to annul the sale of the right to the lease of any lot or lots, and to repay to the purchaser the amount of rent paid by him, without interest, cost, or damages of any description, in full satisfaction of all claims and demands whatsoever by such purchaser, and the publication of a notice to the effect that the Governor has as aforesaid annulled any such sale shall be conclusive evidence that such sale has been completely and effectually annulled.

## CONDITIONS OF LEASE.

## For Business Sites.

1. The term shall be twenty-one (21) years (the maximum allowed under the Act), commencing at the expiry of one (1) calendar month from the date of sale, but parliamentary authority will be sought for an extension of the term to 33 years, and if such be granted no increased rental will be charged.
2. The rent shall be payable quarterly in advance.
3. The site is to be used for business purposes, including, if necessary, residential accommodation, and the lessee of each site shall erect thereon within three years of the date of the lease a building or buildings of a value equal at least to amount set forth in schedule. Each allotment, however, must be *bond-fide* used and occupied to the satisfaction of the Minister for Lands within three months from the date of sale. Plans of all buildings proposed to be erected on the land shall be submitted to and approved by the Board of Land and Works before erection, and shall be of stone, brick, or concrete, and, unless otherwise approved, shall be erected on the street alignment.
4. The site and all improvements thereon shall absolutely revert to the Crown at the expiry of the term of lease, or on any previous determination of the same, on account of breach of conditions, without any compensation therefor being paid by the Crown to the lessee, his assigns, or legal representatives.
5. The buildings when erected must be maintained throughout the whole term of the lease in good order and repair to the satisfaction of the Board of Land and Works.
6. The lessee shall be bound to keep all buildings insured to their full value, as fixed from time to time by the Surveyor-General for the time being, the insurance to be in the name of the Treasurer of the State of Victoria, and the policy in respect thereof to be deposited at the Treasury.
7. The lessee shall not assign or sub-lease the allotment, or any portion thereof, without the consent of the Governor in Council, but buildings may be let to tenants without such consent.
8. The lease will be voidable for non-payment of rent, for breach of any condition thereof, or if the lessee fail at any time to use the land *bond fide* for the purpose for which it has been demised.
9. The site shall not be used, nor be allowed to be used, for the purpose of storing dynamite, gunpowder, kerosene, or other combustible or inflammable manufactured materials, excepting in accordance with the law relating to such storage on business premises.
10. The site shall not be used as a place in connexion with which the occupier or any other person carrying on business there, is or becomes registered or holds a licence limited to sell spirits, wine, or fermented liquor in quantities of two gallons or upwards, or upon which spirits, wine, or fermented liquor is limited to be sold in quantities of two gallons or upwards.

## For Residential Sites.

Conditions of lease are to be the same as those governing business sites, omitting Condition No. 9 and amending Condition No. 3, which shall read as follows:—

Condition No. 3.—Each site is for residence purposes only, and must be *bond-fide* used and occupied to the satisfaction of the Minister for Lands within three months from the date of sale, and within twelve months from the date of the lease a habitable dwelling must be erected thereon.

Buildings covered with canvas, hessian, or other similar material will not be allowed, and no secondhand buildings will be permitted to be erected on the ground unless they have first been approved of by the officer in charge.

That the licensee shall not sublet, assign, transfer, or part with the possession, or grant the use of, or agree to assign, transfer, or part with the possession of the land described in this licence, or any portion thereof, without the consent, in writing, of the Minister first had and obtained.
5. That the licensee shall keep the area licensed in a cleanly and orderly condition to the satisfaction of the Minister.
6. That the licensee shall on the area licensed, and on a rear corner thereof, erect a closet, with floor measurement of not less than five (5) feet by three (3) feet, to be constructed of wood with iron roof, and the pan door to be placed in the wall abutting on the right-of-way.
7. That this licence shall be produced by the licensee upon the request of any Bailiff of Crown Lands.
8. That the non-observance of or non-compliance with or non-performance of any of the obligations or conditions set forth in this licence shall render such licence

null and void, and the Governor in Council may thereupon cancel such licence and cause the land described therein to be re-entered by any Bailiff of Crown Lands and dealt with as unoccupied Crown land. Provided always that, with the consent, in writing, of the Minister of the Crown for the time being administering the Land Acts, the out-going licensee may, within one month from date of cancellation of licence, sell or remove the improvements on the land hereby licensed.

REGULATIONS FOR THE CARE, PROTECTION,  
AND MANAGEMENT OF THE RESERVE FOR  
RACING AND OTHER PURPOSES OF PUBLIC  
RECREATION AT AVENEL.

WE, Patrick Joseph Gleeson, Richard John Shelton, and Edward Plummer, a majority of the duly appointed Committee of Management of the Reserve for Racing and other purposes of Public Recreation at Avenel, having framed the following additional regulations for the care, protection, and management thereof, and for the preservation of good order and decency therein, and also for the collection and receipt of tolls, entrance fees, or other charges for entering therein or thereupon, submit the said regulations to the Board of Land and Works to be made by such Board in pursuance of the powers conferred by section 199 of the *Land Act* 1901.

The reserve which is parcelled into the following divisions shall be open to the public free of charge from sunrise to sunset, except as hereinafter provided :—

1st Division.—The portions set apart for the saddling paddock, carriage paddock, and grandstand.

2nd Division.—The judges' box, stewards' room, weighing room, secretary's office, jockeys' room, and stewards' stand.

3rd Division.—The course proper and the training track.

4th Division.—The remainder of the reserve.

2. No person shall use the reserve for the purpose of training or racing horses on, or for any other purpose, without the permission, in writing, of the Committee of Management first obtained.

3. No person except the judge and timekeeper, and any person whom the judge may call to his assistance, shall enter the judge's box on any day on which the reserve is set apart for racing.

4. No person shall on the days on which the reserve is set apart for racing enter the stewards' room or stewards' stand except the stewards or officials of the Avenel Turf Club, and such persons as they may invite.

5. No person shall on any day on which the reserve is set apart for racing enter the weighing room or weighing yard, or the jockeys' room, except the stewards, the secretary, the officials of the Avenel Turf Club, and those authorized by such stewards, and also the jockeys requiring to dress or to be weighed, and the owners and trainers of horses desirous of seeing their jockey weighed.

6. Every member of the Avenel Turf Club, and every person paying for admission to the reserve shall be supplied with a ticket, which he shall upon demand produce, or, if required, surrender to any gatekeeper, servant, or other person duly authorized by the Committee of Management to demand the production or surrender of tickets.

7. All members, including the members of the Avenel Turf Club, renting or hiring for any race meeting the reserve, or any portion thereof, or any booth or other structure upon the reserve, shall abide by these regulations, and by any order given by the Committee of Management in reference to the reserve, or the buildings or other erections thereon.

8. The maximum scale of fees which may be charged and taken for admission to the reserve on such days (not exceeding twelve in any one year) as the reserve may be set apart for racing, shall be as follows :—

For the admission of every adult to the 1st division, such sum as the Committee may determine, not exceeding 10s.

For the admission of every adult to the 4th division, such sum as the Committee of Management may determine, not exceeding 2s.

For admission of every horse to the 3rd division for training purposes, such sum as the Committee of Management may determine, not exceeding One pound per half-year.

9. No person shall carry on any trade, business, or calling whatsoever on any portion of the reserve other than upon such portions as may be respectively set apart for the purpose by the Committee of Management.

10. No person shall carry on the trade, business, or calling of a bookmaker except in and on such portions of the reserve as may be set apart for that purpose, and then only when he shall have complied with the following conditions :—

That he be registered annually as a bookmaker by the Committee of Management of the reserve on payment of such fee as the Committee of Management may determine, not exceeding Two pounds.

That during the time he shall be in or upon the reserve carrying on his trade, business, or calling of a bookmaker he shall wear a ticket to be supplied to him by the Committee of Management of the reserve, which shall be visible to the public and shall have thereon his name.

11. Any person committing in the reserve, or any division or part thereof, or in any of the buildings or erections for the time being thereon, any of the following offences, shall be liable, in addition to any other penalty provided by these regulations, to be removed from the reserve, notwithstanding such person may have purchased

and is or may be in possession of a ticket of admission thereto:—

- (a) Assaulting any other person.
- (b) Being drunk.
- (c) Riding, crossing, or trespassing upon the course, entering or remaining on the running straight when the horses are in the hands of the starter, or are running for any race.

Every person offending against these regulations shall, in accordance with section 199 of the *Land Act* 1901, on conviction before any Justice, forfeit and pay a penalty not exceeding Five pounds for each offence, and every person who knowingly and wilfully offends against any such regulation, and who, after he has been warned by any bailiff of Crown lands or any constable, does not desist from so offending, may be forthwith apprehended by such bailiff or constable and taken before some Justice of the Peace, and shall, on conviction, forfeit and pay a penalty not exceeding Ten pounds.

bailiff or constable and taken before some Justice of the peace, and shall, on conviction, forfeit and pay a penalty not exceeding £10.

Every person offending against these Regulations shall, in accordance with section 199 of the *Land Act* 1901, on conviction before any Justice, forfeit and pay a penalty not exceeding £5 for each offence, and every person who knowingly and wilfully offends against any such Regulations, and who, after he has been warned by any bailiff of Crown lands or any constable, does not desist from so offending, may be forthwith apprehended by such bailiff or constable and taken before some Justice of the peace, and shall, on conviction, forfeit and pay a penalty not exceeding Ten pounds.

## WORKMEN'S HOMES ALLOTMENTS ON BONA VISTA ESTATE AVAILABLE FOR APPLICATION.

## MALLEE LANDS AVAILABLE FOR SELECTION AS AGRICULTURAL ALLOTMENTS.

THE land is situated around the Cow Plains Station, on the Ouyen-Cow Plains railway line, now in course of construction, and is from 2 to 18 miles east from Murrayville, and from 49 to 67 miles south-west from Ouyen.

The survey fee must be paid within 28 days of demand, and will range from £9 to £11 per allotment.

That substantial and permanent improvements shall be made on the land, if in the first class, to the value of 3s. 4d. per acre before the end of the second year from the date of the licence, another 3s. 4d. per acre before the end of each year of the third and fourth years, and the balance of 10s. per acre before the end of the sixth year of the licence. If in the second class, improvements to the value of 2s. 6d. per acre must be made during the like periods, and the balance of 7s. 6d. per acre before the end of the sixth year of the licence.

## CITY OF PRAHRAN.

## REGULATION NO. 47 FOR REGULATING PORTICOES WITHIN THE CITY OF PRAHRAN.

A Regulation of the City of Prahran, made under Part I. of the Thirteenth Schedule to the *Local Government Act* 1903, in force in the City of Prahran by virtue of the provisions of By-law No. 119 of the said city, adopting, *inter alia*, Subdivision I. of the said Part I. of the said Thirteenth Schedule to the said Act. For the purpose of repealing Regulation No. 23 in so far as it affects the erection of verandahs or porticoes in Chapel-street, in the said city, on the frontage of any new building, and otherwise amending the said Regulation No. 23.

IN pursuance of the *Local Government Act* 1903, the Mayor, Councillors, and Citizens of the City of Prahran make and pass the following Regulation, that is to say:—

1. Regulation No. 23 of the Council of the Municipality of the City of Prahran shall be and is hereby repealed only in so far as it affects the erection of verandahs or porticoes in Chapel-street, in the said city, on the frontage of any new building.
2. Every verandah or portico to be constructed over any portion of Chapel-street, in the City of Prahran, on the frontage of any new building, shall be constructed so and in such manner and form as that the lowest part thereof shall be and remain at a height of not less than 8 feet above the surface of the kerb and supported otherwise than by columns on the footway.
3. Every verandah or portico to be constructed over any portion of Chapel-street, in the said city, on the frontage of any new building, shall be of the shape, figure, dimensions, materials, and strength set forth and portrayed in the plan and specifications hereunto annexed.

## SPECIFICATION.

Specification in accordance with which and the accompanying drawing all verandahs to be erected over the footways in Chapel-street, of the City of Prahran, are to be executed.

**Materials and Design.**—All verandahs to be composed of materials and designs as shown on the accompanying drawing, and constructed as described in this specification.

**Permission and Deposit.**—Any person desiring to erect a verandah must, previous to commencing such erection, obtain from the city surveyor a written permission to do so, and he will be required to deposit with the city treasurer prior thereto, such an amount as the city surveyor may consider necessary, which amount will be retained until such time as the city surveyor certifies that the verandah has been completed in accordance with the following specification, when the whole or the balance, if any, after deducting any charges hereunder, will be repaid.

**Roof.**—The roof is to have main rafters of 7 in. x 4 in. x 16 lbs. rolled steel joists, let into cross walls at least 5 feet. Each rafter is to have a sheet of 5-lb. lead extending at least 12 inches along the rafter between it and the bedstone, which is to be 9 in. x 9 in. x 6 in. blue-stone. No rafters shall be fixed at a greater distance than 16 feet apart, unless specially authorized by the city surveyor. Intermediate rafters to be 8 in. x 1½ in. Oregon, the best of its kind, dry, well seasoned, sawn square, free from sap, cracks, loose knots, or other defects. These are to cut at end to fit into face girder and bolted up to top flange of same with ½ in. timber bolts. Rafters to be at 2 ft. centres. Other ends to rest on 2½ in. x 2½ in. x ½ in. wall angle iron, and be bolted thereto with ½ in. timber bolts. Wall angle iron to be secured with ¾ in. bolts running through wall or breastsummers not more than 4 feet apart, or in the case of a wooden breastsummer, with ¾ in. coach screws not less than 6 inches long, or at the end of a party wall of where masonry occurs the wall must be drilled to a depth of 9 inches, and the bolts jagged and properly leaded into the holes. The purlins to be of Oregon of quality as before specified. Purlin nearest wall to be 3 in. x 2 in. as shown, others to taper off as required to give slope shown on plan. All to be securely nailed to rafters. The roof is to be covered with the best corrugated galvanized iron, No. 24 gauge, the shuts properly riveted together with galvanized iron rivets and washers with an end lap of 6 inches and a side lap of two corrugations, and to be secured to purlins with proper roofing nails through every second corrugation. Fix proper lead flashing wedged into groove in wall or otherwise properly secured so as to be watertight, and turned down at least six (6) inches over the iron of roof, and dressed into the corrugations.

**Gutter and Drains.**—The eaves gutter to be of cast-iron 4½ in. O.G. as shown on drawing, bolted through web of face girder with ½ in. bolts. Where 2 in. drainpipe is taken down, a boss is to be cast on eaves gutter and screwed for pipe to be fitted in. All drainpipes to be 2 in. wrought iron, with elbows, sockets, and bends of proper size, all to be screwed together, making watertight joints. These must be arranged as shown on plan, with downpipe let into wall or other method approved by the city engineer.

**Face Girder.**—Face girder to be as shown of 9 in. x 3 in. x 19 lbs. rolled steel channel. Holes are to be drilled through flanges, but may be punched through web for any necessary bolts. On outside face of this at proper level a 7 in. x 1 in. Oregon or red pine fascia plate is to be bolted as shown and firmly secured.

**Stamped Steel Ceiling, &c.**—Along the bottom faces of intermediate joists 1½ in. x 1½ in. Oregon battens are to be securely nailed, making up piece as shown to be put in position between fascia plate and last batten. To these the metal ceiling of approved type is to be fixed. Cornices, mouldings, and cornice-mouldings of approved type are to be fixed where shown in a proper manner, and finished off in a neat and workmanlike way to the satisfaction of the city engineer.

**Painting.**—Paint the whole of the verandah both inside and outside, except the corrugated iron of roof, with three coats of best oil and white-lead paint.

**Height.**—The face girder shall be carried along the several frontages in true horizontal line, the lowest point at a minimum height of 8 feet above the kerbing and carried along in that manner until the height of 10 feet above the kerbing shall have been attained, when the line shall be discontinued, and shall re-commence at the minimum height.

**Variations for Special Conditions.**—Where a new verandah is to be added to an old building, or where no party wall occurs that the main rafter can be built into, the verandah must be constructed as in cross section "B" on plan. A 7 in. x 4 in. x 16 lbs. rolled steel joist is to be built into a chase left or cut in wall (as case may be), with a footing piece of similar section firmly riveted to it. End of footing piece to rest on a concrete block at least 18 in. x 12 in. x 12 in. Main rafter of verandah is to be riveted to top of rolled steel joist in wall. All rivets to be ½ in. diameter, and all cleats 4 in. x 3 in. x ½ in. All riveting to be done in an approved manner and all joists made tight and secure.

In places where party walls are more than 16 feet centres, larger main rafters will have to be used of a size and section approved by the city engineer.

**Supervision.**—The whole of the works shall be executed in accordance with such instruction as may be given from time to time by the city engineer, and should the person erecting the verandah fail to carry out the work as herein specified, it shall be in the power of the city engineer to order the removal of such objectionable work. It must, however, be distinctly understood by owners, agents, architects, and others erecting verandahs in front of their properties that the city engineer does not guarantee or hold himself responsible, by passing the work, for unsound material which may have been used or any faulty workmanship in the same.

## CITY OF PRAHRAN.

## REGULATION NO. 48.

A Regulation of the City of Prahran numbered 48 made by special order under the provisions of the *Local Government Act* 1903, for the purpose of altering Regulation No. 42 of the City of Prahran in respect to the amount of tolls and dues payable by persons who hawk market commodities, produce, provisions and edibles, &c., in the City of Prahran.

IN pursuance of the powers conferred by the *Local Government Act* 1903, the Mayor, Councillors, and the Citizens of the City of Prahran make Regulation and order as follows:—

Notwithstanding the provisions contained in Regulation No. 42 of the said city, requiring certain tolls and dues to be demanded and received of all persons hawking market commodities, produce, provisions, edibles, &c., in the streets, ways or places of the said city according to the table contained therein any person who is a bona-fide ratepayer in the City of Prahran shall be entitled to hawk market commodities, &c., in the said city on paying to the council or the council's authorized collector the following sums in advance instead of the sums mentioned in the said table of the said Regulation No. 42, viz.:—

For every cart with vegetables, foliage, ferns, flowers, saplings, milk, honey, fruit, fish or any class of butchers' meat, bacon or small goods—Six shillings (6s.) per month; Fifteen shillings (15s.) per quarter.

## CITY OF PRAHRAN MARKET.

By-Law No. 130.

A By-law of the City of Prahran made under section 635 of the *Local Government Act* 1903 and numbered 130 for Regulating the Market Place situate in Commercial-road, in the City of Prahran, and the buildings, stalls, pens, and standings therein, and for preventing nuisance and obstructions therein, or in the immediate approaches thereto; for fixing the days and the hours during each day on which the market shall be held; for preventing the sale or exposure for sale of unwholesome provisions in the market; for regulating the use of the weighing machines provided by the Council; and for preventing the use of false or defective weights, scales, or measures.

**I**N pursuance of the powers conferred by the *Local Government Act* 1903 the Mayor, Councillors and Citizens of the City of Prahran order as follows:—

1. The market shall be opened for the sale of marketable commodities, vegetables, goods, wares and merchandise on Wednesday in every week from Eight o'clock ante meridian until Two o'clock post meridian; on Friday in every week from Eight o'clock ante meridian until half-past Ten o'clock post meridian, and on Saturday in every week from Eight o'clock ante meridian until One o'clock post meridian.

2. The duties of the Market Inspector, the Collector of Market and Stallage Dues and Inspector of Provisions, and their assistants shall be generally as follows:—

To see that the provisions of this By-law are duly observed in and with respect to the market.

To see that the market is lighted from 4.30 o'clock ante meridian until sunrise.

To preserve order and regularity in the market, and to cause to be apprehended any person making a disturbance or using indecent language or offending against decency or in any manner provoking a breach of the peace within the precincts of the market.

To inspect all articles of food or drink for human consumption exposed for sale in the market and to seize such as are bad or unwholesome or of a nature deleterious to health, and prosecute or cause the persons in possession of the same to be prosecuted, and to prohibit the sale of any articles in the market which he may consider offensive.

To take charge of the market, weighbridge, and of the legally stamped verified scales and weighing appliances and standard weights and measures of the market, and on behalf of the Council to demand, receive and collect all tolls in respect of the weighing of carts with or without goods, or for the weighing or measuring of any commodities or articles sold in the market, to see that all scales and weighing appliances, weights and measures used in the market are in accordance with the standard, and to seize such as are found fraudulent, unstamped or defective, and proceed as directed by the Weights and Measures Act in respect to them and to their possessors.

To demand, receive and collect in the name and on behalf of the Council such sums of money as and for stallages, standings, rents, tolls, and market dues, as are for the time being appointed by special order of the Council to be demanded, received and had in that behalf respectively, and on non-payment thereof respectively to levy the same by distress, or to take proceedings before a justice in respect of the same, or for recovery of any penalty in respect of the selling, offering or exposing for sale any commodity, article or thing without payment of dues or tolls. To proceed for the recovery of all penalties against any person who sells, offers or exposes for sale, any unwholesome meat or provisions in the Market and for the destruction or confiscation of the same.

To weigh or measure any commodity as to the justness of which he shall have doubt, and if found unjust to prosecute the offender, and to seize such commodity in the meantime.

To appoint the several standing places and places for the deposit of goods, wares, and merchandise in the market, as well as the places for depositing and using utensils or materials requisite for the fixing of stalls and to order the removal of the same, when and in such manner as they shall deem necessary.

3. The market standings shall be appropriated to the sale of marketable commodities, garden, farm and dairy produce, goods, wares, and merchandise. Standings in

the market shall be let to permanent occupiers for such days and periods and on such terms as the City Council may from time to time direct.

4. Commodities for food offered for sale in the market shall not be sold by bulk, but by imperial weight or measure, according to their kind; any person offering to purchase may require the vendor of any such commodity to weight or measure the same, and if any vendor shall refuse to weigh or measure such commodity, or if on reference to the Market Inspector it shall be found that such vendor has made a false representation of the weight or measure thereof every such vendor shall forfeit and pay any sum not exceeding Forty shillings for every such offence.

5. Any person who may sell or offer for sale by weight or measure any commodity which, when tried by the Market Inspector, may be found deficient in the weight or measure represented, shall forfeit and pay any sum not exceeding Forty shillings for every such offence.

6. Any person who may resist any Market Inspector or Collector in the discharge of his duty shall, independently of any other penalty which may be imposed for assault or otherwise, forfeit and pay the sum of Five pounds for every such offence.

7. The entrance for vehicles into each market shall be by Commercial-road, and the exit by that in Elizabeth-street, and any person contravening this rule shall, on conviction thereof, forfeit and pay for every such offence a sum not exceeding Ten shillings.

8. Except the carts of vendors occupying standings duly appointed for them, no carts or vehicles of any kind shall be permitted to stand in the market place, except where appointed by the Market Inspector, and after the ringing of the bell for opening the market.

9. Any person who may place any matter or thing so as to obstruct the roads or footways in the market, or to occupy any other place as such shall be appointed therefor by the Market Inspector, and shall neglect or refuse to remove the same on being required so to do by the Market Inspector, shall forfeit and pay the sum of Forty shillings for every such offence.

10. Any person who may place any nail, hook or peg in any part of the wood, stone, brick or ironwork of any standing or stall, or may in any way fit up or enclose any such standing or stall without the consent or contrary to the directions of the Market Inspector, or if any standing or stallholder neglect or refuse to take down any hook, nail, peg or fittings, or remove any obstructions or advertising matter in his or her standing or stall when required to do so by the Market Inspector, every such person shall forfeit and pay any sum not exceeding Forty shillings for every such offence.

11. Any person who may sweep or cause to be swept any dirt or rubbish into or upon any of the roads, gutters or footways of the market, and allow the same to remain there, or who, being the holder of any standing, shop, or stall in the market, shall fail to remove any fat, offal, or other refuse or matter when required to do so by the Market Inspector, shall forfeit and pay any sum not exceeding Forty shillings for every such offence.

17. No person shall place any produce, article, or thing whatsoever, so as to obstruct any thoroughfare or avenue in or of the said market, or neglect or refuse to remove the same on being required to do so by the Market Inspector or other duly authorized officer of the Council.

18. Every person guilty of any breach of the provisions of the foregoing By-law shall be liable for every such offence to a penalty not exceeding Five pounds.

#### SHIRE OF KARKAROOC.

BY-LAW NO. 4 FOR THE SUPPRESSION OF WANDERING CATTLE NUISANCE

A By-law of the Shire of Karkaroc, made under section 197 of the *Local Government Act 1903*, for prohibiting or regulating cattle being allowed to graze or wander upon any land not enclosed by a substantial fence.

IN pursuance of the powers conferred by the *Local Government Act 1903*, the President, Councillors, and Ratepayers of the Shire of Karkaroc order as follows:—

If any cattle are found without any person having charge of them—

- (a) In any street, or
- (b) Upon any land (not being a common) which is not enclosed by any fence within the meaning of the *Fences Act 1890*, or any amendment thereof, and the openings (if any) in which fence are not secured and barred with gates or other fastenings of equivalent closeness and strength with the fence, the proper officer of the council may seize such cattle and impound them, or place them at some neighbouring place of safe custody.

The owner of such cattle shall forfeit a sum not exceeding Twenty shillings for every head of such cattle, and any justice, if such owner be not known, upon proof of the issue of a summons in the usual form addressed to such owner as "owner" only without otherwise naming or describing him, such cattle and the place of seizure being duly described therein, and of the publication of such summons in some newspaper commonly circulating in the neighbourhood, may after the expiration of Twenty-four hours from such publication proceed with respect to such owner not appearing as if personal service of a summons stating his name had been effected, or if such owner appear then as in other cases, and the justice may order the cattle to be sold and the money arising from the sale after deducting the said penalty and the costs awarded and the reasonable expenses, to be estimated and assessed by the justice, of seizing, keeping, and selling the said cattle, shall be paid if demanded within one month to the owner of the cattle, and if not so demanded then to the municipal fund; and if the said money is not sufficient for all the purposes aforesaid the amount whereby the same falls short, or if no such sale be ordered the whole of the said amount may be recovered from the said owner if and when known in like manner as other penalties and sums adjudged or ordered to be paid by justices are to be recovered.

If such cattle by reason of having been so found at large have been impounded by the council the amount of such penalty and costs if adjudged respectively before the release or sale of such cattle shall be added to the pound fees and charges payable in respect of such cattle, and the amount thereof or such lesser amount (if any) as after the sale of the cattle may remain in the hands of the poundkeeper shall be paid over by him accordingly; and if the proceeds of any sale of such cattle are not sufficient after paying the lawful fees and charges aforesaid to satisfy such penalty and costs, or if such penalty and costs have been adjudged after the release or sale of the cattle the same or so much as remains unpaid shall and may be recovered from the owner of the cattle in like manner as other penalties and costs adjudged by justices are by law to be recovered; and if the case of

any information under this section the owner be not known then the provisions of the last preceding section so far as necessary to give the adjudicating justice jurisdiction shall apply.

This By-law shall apply to and have operation throughout the whole of the municipal district.
