REGULATIONS FOR PREVENTING COLLISIONS AT SEA.

THE following Order in Council, which has been received by His Excellency the Governor from the Right Honorable the Secretary of State for the Colonies, is published for general information, together with the accompanying Schedules.

PRESENT:

The King's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS by section 418 of the Merchant Shipping Act 1894 Ilis Majesty is empowered from time to time on the joint recommendation of the Admiralty and the Board of Trade by Order in Council to make regulations for preventing collisions at sea, in the said Act referred to as Collision Regulations:

And whereas by section 424 of the said Act it is provided that whenever it is made to appear to His Majesty in Council that the Government of any foreign country is willing that the said regulations or any of them should apply to the ships of that country when beyond the limits of British jurisdiction, His Majesty may, by Order in Council, direct that those regulations shall, subject to any limitation of time, conditions, and qualifications contained in the Order, apply to the ships of the said foreign country, whether within British jurisdiction or not, and that such ships shall for the purpose of such regulations be treated as if they were British ships:

And whereas by section 434 of the said Act His Majesty is empowered from time to time by Order in Council to make rules as to signals of distress:

And whereas by section 734 of the said Act it is provided that where it has been made to appear to His Majesty that the Government of any foreign country is desirous that any of the provisions of that Act which do not apply to the ships of that country, should so apply, and there are no special provisions in the Act for that application, His Majesty in Council may order that such of those provisions as are in the Order specified shall (subject to the limitations, if any, contained therein) apply to the ships of that country, and to the owners, masters, seamen, and apprentices of those ships, when not locally within the jurisdiction of the Government of that country, in the same manner in all respects as if those ships were British ships:

And whereas by section 738 of the said Act it is provided that where His Majesty has power under that Act or any Act amending the same to make an Order in No. 35.-March 8, 1911.-3410.-1.

Council, His Majesty may from time to time make that Order in Council, and by Order in Council revoke, alter, or add to any Order so made:

And whereas by the said last-mentioned section it is further provided that, subject to any special provisions of that Act upon the publication of any such Order, the Order shall as from the date of its publication or any later date mentioned in the Order, take effect as if it were enacted by Parliament:

And whereas by an Order in Council dated the 27th day of November, 1896, regulations for preventing collisions at sea and as to distress signals were made as regards British ships and boats, and by a subsequent Order dated the 7th day of July, 1897, these regulations were extended, subject to the limitations stated in the Order, to the ships of the several countries specified in Schedule III. to the last-mentioned Order:

And whereas by Orders in Council dated respectively the 18th day of August, 1892, the 7th day of July, 1897, and the 4th day of April, 1906, other regulations for the prevention of collisions were made as regards British ships:

And whereas it is expedient to consolidate the regulations which have been made as regards British ships:

And whereas it has been made to appear to His Majesty that the Governments of the several countries mentioned in Schedule II. hereto annexed are willing that the regulations and rules contained in Schedule I. should, subject to the qualifications mentioned in the aforesaid Schedule I. and to the proviso in the case of Chinese ships that the application of the regulations and rules shall be limited to ships of foreign type, apply to the ships of those countries when beyond the limits of British jurisdiction:

And whereas the provisions of section t of the Rules Publication Act 1893 have been complied with:

Now therefore His Majesty, by virtue of the powers conferred on him by the aforesaid Act, and on the joint recommendation of the Admiralty and the Board of Trade, and by and with the advice of His Privy Council, is pleased to direct that the collision regulations and the rules as to signals of distress contained in Schedule I. to this Order shall apply to all British ships:

And His Majesty is also pleased to direct that the said regulations and rules shall, subject to the aforesaid qualifications and to the proviso in the case of Chinese ships that the regulations and rules will be applicable only to ships of foreign type, apply to the ships of the countries named in Schedule II. to this Order whether they are within British jurisdiction or not, and that such ships shall for the purpose of such regulations and rules be treated as if they were British ships:

And His Majesty is further pleased to direct that this Order shall come into operation on and after the 13th day

of October, 1910, and that as and from the coming into operation of this Order the Orders in Council specified in Schedule III. to this Order shall be revoked, and the same shall be revoked accordingly.

SCHEDULE I. Preliminary.

These Rules shall be followed by all vessels upon the high seas and in all waters connected therewith, navigable

In the following Rules every steam vessel which is under sail and not under steam is to be considered a sailing vessel, and every vessel under steam, whether under sail or not, is to be considered a steam vessel.

The word "steam vessel" shall include any vessel proposed

A vessel is "under way" within the meaning of these Rules when she is not at anchor, or made fast to the shore or aground,

Rules concerning Lights, &c.

The word "visible" in these Rules, when applied to lights, shall mean visible on a dark night with a clear atmosphere.

atmosphere.

Article 1. The Rules concerning lights shall be complied with in all weathers from sunset to sunrise, and during such time no other lights which may be mistaken for the prescribed lights shall be exhibited.

Article 2. A steam vessel when under way shall carry—

- the prescribed lights shall be exhibited.

 Article 2. A steam vessel when under way shall carry—

 (a) On or in front of the foremast, or if a vessel without a foremast, then in the fore part of the vessel, at a height above the hull of not less than 20 feet, and if the breadth of the vessel exceeds 20 feet, then at a height above the hull not less than such breadth, so, however, that the light need not be carried at a greater height above the hull than 40 feet, a bright white light, so constructed as to show an unbroken light over an arc of the horizon of 20 points of the compass, so fixed as to throw the light 10 points on each side of the vessel, viz., from right ahead to 2 points abaft the beam on either, side, and of such a character as to be visible at a distance of at least 5 miles.

 (b) On the starboard side a green light so constructed as to show an unbroken light from right ahead to 2 points abaft the beam on the starboard side, and of such a character as to be visible at a distance of at least 2 miles.

 (c) On the port side a red light so constructed as to show an unbroken light over an arc of the horizon of 10 points of the compass, so fixed as to throw the light from right ahead to 2 points abaft the beam on the starboard side, and of such a character as to be visible at a distance of at least 2 miles.

 (c) On the port side a red light so constructed as to show an unbroken light over an arc of the horizon of 10 points of the compass, so fixed as to throw the light from right ahead to 2 points abaft the beam on the port side, and of such a character as to be visible at a distance of at least 2 miles.

 (d) The said green and red side-lights shall be fitted with inboard screens projecting at least 3 feet

(d) The said green and red side-lights shall be fitted with inboard screens projecting at least 3 feet forward from the light, so as to prevent these lights from being seen across the bow.

(e) A steam vessel when under way may carry an additional white light similar in construction to the light mentioned in subdivision (a). These two lights shall be so placed in line with the keel that one shall be at least 15 feet higher than the other, and in such a position with reference to each other that the lower light shall be forward of the upper one. The vertical distance between these lights shall be less than the horizontal distance. the horizontal distance.

the horizontal distance.

Article 3. A steam vessel when towing another vessel shall, in addition to her side-lights, carry two bright white lights in a vertical line one over the other, not less than 6 feet apart, and when towing more than one vessel shall carry an additional bright white light 6 feet above or below such lights, if the length of the tow, measuring from the stern of the towing vessel to the stern of the last vessel towed, exceeds 600 feet. Each of these lights shall be of the same construction and character, and shall be carried in the same position as the white light mentioned in Article 2 (a), except the additional light, which may be carried at a height of not less than 14 feet above the hull. Such steam vessel may carry a small white light abaft the funnel or aftermast for the vessel towed to steer by, but such light shall not be visible forward of the beam.

Article 4.—(a) A vessel which from any accident is not

Article 4.—(a) A vessel which from any accident is not under command shall carry at the same height as the white light mentioned in Article 2 (a), where they can best be seen, and, if a steam vessel, in lieu of that light, two red lights, in a vertical line one over the other, not less than 6 feet apart, and of such a character as to be visible all round the horizon at a distance of at least 2 miles; and shall by day carry in a vertical line one over the other not less than 6 feet apart, where they can best be seen, two black balls or shapes each 2-feet in diameter.

- (b) A vessel employed in laying or in picking up a telegraph cable shall carry in the same position as the white light mentioned in Article 2 (a), and if a steam vessel, in lieu of that light, three lights in a vertical line one over the other, not less than 6 feet apart. The highest and lowest of these lights shall be red, and the middle light shall be white, and they shall be of such a character as to be visible all round the horizon, at a distance of at least 2 miles. By day she shall carry in a vertical line one over the other, not less than 6 feet apart, where they can best be seen, three shapes not less than 2 feet in diameter, of which the highest and lowest shall be globular in shape and red in colour, and the middle one diamond in shape and white. diamond in shape and white.
- (c) The vessels referred to in this Article when not making way through the water, shall not carry the side lights, but when making way shall carry them.
- (d) The lights and shapes required to be shown by this Article are to be taken by other vessels as signals that the vessel showing them is not under command and cannot therefore get out of the way.

These signals are not signals of vessels in distress and quiring assistance. Such signals are contained in requiring assistance.
Article 31.

Article 5. A sailing vessel under way, and any vessel being towed, shall carry the same lights as are prescribed by Article 2 for a steam vessel under way, with the exception of the white lights mentioned therein, which they shall never carry.

Article 6. Whenever, as in the case of small vessels under way during bad weather, the green and red sidelights cannot be fixed, these lights shall be kept at hand lighted and ready for use; and shall, on the approach of or to other vessels, be exhibited on their respective sides in sufficient time to prevent collision, in such manner as to make them most visible, and so that the green light shall not be seen on the port side nor the red light on the starboard side, nor, if practicable, more than 2 points abaft the beam on their respective sides.

To make the use of these portable lights more certain and easy, the lanterns containing them shall each be painted outside with the colour of the light they respectively contain, and shall be provided with proper screens.

Article 7. Steam vessels of less than 40, and vessels under oars or sails of less than 20, tons gross tonnage respectively, and rowing boats, when under way, shall not be obliged to carry the lights mentioned in Article 2 (a), (b), and (c), but if they do not carry them they shall be provided with the following lights:—

- 1. Steam vessels of less than 40 tons shall carry-
 - (a) In the fore part of the vessel, or on or in front of the funnel, where it can best be seen, and at a height above the gunwale of not less than 9 feet, a bright white light constructed and fixed as prescribed in Article 2 (a), and of such a character as to be visible at a distance of at least 2 miles.
 - (b) Green and red side-lights constructed and fixed as prescribed in Article 2 (b) and (c), and of such a character as to be visible at a distance of at least 1 mile, or a combined lan-tern showing a green light and a red light from right ahead to 2 points abaft the beam on their respective sides. Such lantern shall be carried not less than 3 feet below the white light.
- 2. Small steamboats, such as are carried by sea-going vessels, may carry the white light at a less height than 9 feet above the gunwale, but it shall be carried above the combined lantern, mentioned in subdivision 1 (b).
- 3. Vessels under oars or sails, of less than 20 tons, 3. Vessels under ours or sails, of less man 20 tons, shall have ready at hand a lantern with a green glass on one side and a red glass on the other, which, on the approach of or to other vessels, shall be exhibited in sufficient time to prevent collision, so that the green light shall not be seen on the port side nor the red light on the starboard side. on the starboard side.
- 4. Rowing boats, whether under oars or sail, shall have ready at hand a lantern showing a white light, which shall be temporarily exhibited in sufficient time to prevent collision.

The vessels referred to in this Article shall not be obliged to carry the lights prescribed by Article 4 (a), and Article 11, last paragraph.

Article 8. Pilot-vessels, when engaged on their station on pilotage duty, shall not show the lights required for other vessels, but shall carry a white light at the masthead, visible all round the horizon, and shall also exhibit a flare-up light or flare-up lights at short intervals, which shall never exceed fifteen minutes.

On the near approach of or to other vessels they shall have their side-lights lighted, ready for use, and shall

flash or show them at short intervals, to indicate the direction in which they are heading, but the green light shall not be shown on the port side, nor the red light on the starboard side.

A pilot-vessel of such a class as to be obliged to go alongside of a vessel to put a pilot on board, may show the white light instead of carrying it at the masthead, and may, instead of the coloured lights above mentioned, have at hand ready for use a lantern with a green glass on the one side and a red glass on the other, to be used as prescribed above. scribed above.

A steam pilot-vessel exclusively employed for the service of pilots licensed or certified by any pilotage authority or the Committee of any pilotage district, when engaged on her station on pilotage duty and not at anchor, shall, in addition to the lights required for all pilot boats, carry at a distance of 8 feet below her white masthead light a red light visible all round the horizon, and of such a character as to be visible on a dark night with a clear atmosphere at a distance of at least 2 miles, and also the coloured side-lights required to be carried by vessels when under way.

When engaged on her station on pilotage duty and at anchor she shall carry, in addition to the lights required for all pilot boats, the red light above mentioned, but not the coloured side-lights.

Pilot-vessels, when not engaged on their station on pilotage duty, shall carry lights similar to those of other vessels of their tonnage.

Article 9.*† Fishing vessels and fishing boats, when under way and when not required by this Article to carry or show the lights hereinafter specified, shall carry or show the lights prescribed for vessels of their tonnage under

(a) Open boats, by which it is to be understood boats not protected from the entry of sea water by means of a continuous deck, when engaged in any fishing at night with outlying tackle extending not more than 150 feet horizontally from the boat into the seaway, shall carry one allround white light.

Open boats, when fishing at night, with outlying tackle extending more than 150 feet horizontally from the boat into the seaway, shall carry one all-round white light, and in addition, on approaching or being approached by other vessels, shall show a second white light at least 3 feet below the first light and at a horizontal distance of at least 5 feet away from it in the direction in which the outlying tackle is attached. tached.

tached.

(b): Vessels and boats, except open boats as defined in subdivision (a), when fishing with drift-nets, shall, so long as the nets are wholly or partly in the water, carry two white lights where they can best be seen. Such lights shall be placed so that the vertical distance between them shall be not less than 6 feet and not more than 15 feet, and so that the horizontal distance between them, measured in a line with the keel, shall be not less than 5 feet and not more than 10 feet. The lower of these two lights shall be in the direction of the nets, and both of them shall be of such a character as to show all round the horizon, and to be visible at a distance of not less than 3 miles.

Within the Mediterranean Sea and in the seas Within the Mediterranean Sea and in the seas bordering the coasts of Japan and Koreas sailing fishing vessels of less than 20 tons gross tonnage shall not be obliged to carry the lower of these two lights; should they, however, not carry it, they shall show in the same position (in the direction of the net or gear) a white light, visible at a distance of not less than 1 sea mile, on the approach of or to other vessels.

(c) Vessels and boats, except open boats as defined in subdivision (a), when line-fishing with their lines out and attached to or hauling their lines, and when not at anchor or stationary within the meaning of subdivision (h), shall carry the same lights as vessels fishing with drift-nets. When shooting lines, or fishing with towing lines, they shall carry the lights prescribed for a steam or sailing vessel under way respectively.

* This Article does not apply to Chinese or Siamese vessels.

Within the Mediterranean Sea and in the seas within the Mediterranean Sea and in the seas bordering the coasts of Japan and Korea's sailing fishing-vessels of less than 20 tons gross tonnage shall not be obliged to carry the lower of these two lights; should they, however, not carry it, they shall show in the same position (in the direction of the lines) a white light, visible at a distance of not less than 1 sea mile, on the approach of or to other vessels.

(d) Vessels, when engaged in trawling, by which is meant the dragging of an apparatus along the

bottom of the sea-

1. If steam vessels, shall carry in the same position as the white light mentioned in Article 2 (a), a tricoloured lantern so constructed and fixed as to show a white light from right ahead to 2 points on each bow, and a green light and a red light over an arc of the horizon from 2 points on each bow to 2 points abaft the beam on the starboard and points about the beam on the starboard and port sides respectively; and not less than 6 nor more than 12 feet below the tricoloured lantern a white light in a lantern, so constructed as to show a clear, uniform, and unbroken light all round the horizon.

2. If sailing vessels, shall carry a white light in a lantern, so constructed as to show a clear, uniform, and unbroken light all round the horizon, and shall also, on the approach of or to other vessels, show where it can best be seen a white flare-up light or torch in sufficient time to prevent collision.

All lights mentioned in subdivision (d) I and a shall be visible at a distance of at least a miles.

2 miles.

(e) Oyster dredgers and other vessels fishing with dredge-nets shall carry and show the same lights

(e) Oyster dredgers and other vessels fishing with dredge-nets shall carry and show the same lights as trawlers.
(f) Fishing-vessels and fishing-boats may at any time use a flare-up light in addition to the lights which they are by this Article required to carry and show, and they may also use working lights.
(g) Every fishing-vessel and every fishing-boat under 150 feet in length, when at anchor, shall exhibit a white light visible all round the horizon at a distance of at least 1 mile.

Every fishing-vessel of 150 feet in length or upwards, when at anchor, shall exhibit a second light as provided for vessels of such length by Article 17.

Should any such vessel, whether under 150 feet in length, or of 150 feet in length or upwards, be attached to a net or other fishing gear, she shall on the approach of other vessels show an additional white light at least 3 feet below the anchor light, and at a horizontal distance of at least 5 feet away from it in the direction of the net or gear.
(h) If a vessel or boat when fishing becomes stationary in consequence of her gear getting fast to a rock or other obstruction, she shall in daytime haul down the day-signal required by subdivision (k); at night show the light or lights prescribed for a vessel at anchor; and during fog, mist, falling snow, or heavy rain-storms make the signal prescribed for a vessel at anchor; (See subdivision (d), and the last paragraph, of Article 15.)
(i) In fog, mist, falling snow, or heavy rain-storms, drift-net vessels attached to their nets, and vessels when trawling, dredging, or fishing with any kind of drag-net, and vessels line-fishing with their lines out, shall, if of 20 tons gross tonnage or upwards, respectively, at intervals of not more than one minute, make a blast; if steam vessels, with the whistle or siren, and if sailing vessels, with the whistle or siren, and if sailing vessels and boats of less than 20 tons gross tonnage shall not be obliged to give the abovementioned signals; but

(&) All vessels or boats fishing with nets or lines or trawls, when under way, shall in daytime indicate their occupation to an approaching vessel by displaying a basket or other efficient signal where it can best be seen. If vessels or boats at anchor have their gear out, they shall, on the approach of other vessels, show the same signal on the side on which those vessels can pass.

The vessels required by this Article to carry or show the lights hereinbefore specified shall not be obliged to carry the lights prescribed by Article 4 (a), and the last paragraph of Article 11.

[†] The expression "Mediterranean Sea" contained in sub-sections (b) and (c) of this Article includes the Black Sea and the other adjacent inland seas in communication with it.

[†] Dutch vessels and boats when engaged in the "kol," or hand-line fishing, will carry the lights prescribed for vessels fishing with drift nets. § Also, as regards Russian vessels, in the seas (excluding the Baltic) bordering the coasts of Russia.

Article 10. A vessel which is being overtaken by another shall show from her stern to such last-mentioned vessel a white light or a flare-up light.

The white light required to be shown by this Article may be fixed and carried in a lantern, but in such case the lantern shall be so constructed, fitted, and screened that it shall throw an unbroken light over an arc of the beginning of the points of the country wire for a point. horizon of 12 points of the compass, viz., for 6 points from right aft on each side of the vessel, so as to be visible at a distance of at least 1 mile. Such light shall be carried as nearly as practicable on the same level as the side-lights.

Article 11. A vessel under 150 feet in length, when at anchor, shall carry forward, where it can best be seen, but at a height not exceeding 20 feet above the hull, a white light in a lantern so constructed as to show a clear, uniform, and unbroken light visible all round the horizon at a distance of least 1 mile.

At a distance of least 1 mile.

A vessel of 150 feet or upwards in length, when at anchor, shall carry in the forward part of the vessel, at a height of not less than 20, and not exceeding 40 feet above the hull, one such light; and at or near the stern of the vessel, and at such a height that it shall be not less than 15 feet lower than the forward light, another such light.

light.

The length of a vessel shall be deemed to be the length

appearing in her certificate of registry.

A vessel aground in or near a fairway shall carry the above light or lights and the two red lights prescribed by Article 4 (a).

Article 12. Every vessel may, if necessary in order to attract attention, in addition to the lights which she is by these Rules required to carry, show a flare-up light or use any detonating signal that cannot be mistaken for a distress signal.

Article 13. Nothing in these Rules shall interfere with the operation of any special rules made by the Govern-ment of any nation with respect to additional station and signal lights for two or more ships of war or for vessels sailing under convoy, or with the exhibition of recognition signals adopted by ship-owners, which have been authorized by their respective Governments and duly registered and published.

Article 14. A steam vessel proceeding under sail only, but having her funnel up, shall carry in daytime, forward, where it can best be seen, one black ball or shape 2 feet in diameter.

Sound Signals for Fog, &c.

Article 15. All signals prescribed by this Article for vessels under way shall be given—

1. By "steam vessels" on the whistle or siren;
2. By "sailing vessels and vessels towed" on the fog-horn.

The words "prolonged blast" used in this Article shall mean a blast of from 4 to 6 seconds' duration.

A steam vessel shall be provided with an efficient whistle or siren, sounded by steam or some substitute for steam, so placed that the sound may not be intercepted by any obstruction, and with an efficient fog-horn, to be sounded by mechanical means, and also with an efficient bell.* A sailing vessel of 20 tons gross tonnage or upwards shall be provided with a similar fog-horn and bell.

In fog, mist, falling snow, or heavy rain-storms, whether by day, or night, the signals described in this Article shall be used as follows, viz.:—

- (a) A steam vessel having way upon her shall sound, at intervals of not more than two minutes, a prolonged blast.
- (b) A steam vessel under way, but stopped and having no way upon her, shall sound, at intervals of not more than two minutes, two prolonged blasts, with an interval of about one second between them.
- them.

 (c) A sailing vessel under way shall sound, at intervals of not more than one minute, when on the starboard tack one blast, when on the port tack two blasts in succession, and when with the wind abaft the beam three blasts in succession.

 (d) A vessel, when at anchor, shall, at intervals of not more than one minute, ring the bell rapidly for about five seconds.
- not more than one minute, ring the bell rapidly for about five seconds.

 (e) A vessel, when towing, a vessel employed in laying or in picking up a telegraph cable, and a vessel under way, which is unable to get out of the way of an approaching vessel through being not under command, or unable to manœuvre as required by these Rules, shall, instead of the signals prescribed in subdivisions (a) and (c) of this Article, at intervals of not more than two minutes, sound three blasts in succession, viz., one prolonged blast followed by two short blasts. A vessel towed may give this signal and she shall not give any other.

Sailing vessels and boats of less than 20 tons gross tonange shall not be obliged to give the above-mentioned signals, but if they do not, they shall make some other efficient sound-signal at intervals of not more than one minute.†

Speed of Ships to be Moderate in Fog, &c.

Article 16. Every vessel shall, in a fog, mist, falling snow, or heavy rain-storms, go at a moderate speed, having careful regard to the existing circumstances and conditions.

A steam vessel hearing, apparently forward of her beam the fog-signal of a vessel the position of which is not ascertained, shall, so far as the circumstances of the case admit, stop her engines, and then navigate with caution until danger of collision is over.

Steering and Sailing Rules. PRELIMINARY-RISK OF COLLISION.

Risk of collision can, when circumstances permit, be ascertained by carefully watching the compass bearing of an approaching vessel. If the bearing does not appreciably change, such risk should be deemed to exist.

Article 17. When two sailing vessels are approaching one another, so as to involve risk of collision, one of them shall keep out of the way of the other, as follows, viz.:—

- (a) A vessel which is running free shall keep out of the way of a vessel which is close-hauled.
- (b) A vessel which is close-hauled on the port tack shall keep out of the way of a vessel which is close-hauled on the starboard tack.
- (c) When both are running free, with the wind on different sides, the vessel which has the wind on the port side shall keep out of the way of the other.
- (d) When both are running free, with the wind on the same side, the vessel which is to windward shall keep out of the way of the vessel which is to leeward.
- (e) A vessel which has the wind aft shall keep out of the way of the other vessel.

Article 18. When two steam vessels are meeting end on, or nearly end on, so as to involve risk of collision, each shall alter her course to starboard, so that each may pass on the port side of the other.

- This Article only applies to cases where vessels are meeting end on, or nearly end on, in such a manner as to involve risk of collision, and does not apply to two vessels which must, if both keep on their respective courses, pass clear of each other on the

Article 19. When two steam vessels are crossing, so as to involve risk of collision, the vessel which has the other on her own starboard side shall keep out of the way of the other.

Article 20. When a steam vessel and a sailing vessel are proceeding in such directions as to involve risk of collision, the steam vessel shall keep out of the way of the sailing vessel.

Article 21. Where by any of these Rules one of two vessels is to keep out of the way, the other shall keep her course and speed.

Note.—When, in consequence of thick weather or other causes, such vessel finds herself so close that collision cannot be avoided by the action of the giving-way vessel alone, she also shall take such action as will best aid to avert collision. (See Articles 27 and 29.)

^{*} In all cases where the Rules require a bell to be used a drum may be substituted on board Turkish vessels, or a gong where such articles are used on board small seargoing vessels.

[†] Dutch steam pilot-ves-els, when engaged on their station on pilotage duty in fog, mist, falling snow, or heavy rain-storms are required to make at intervals of 2 minutes at most one long blast with the siren, followed after 1 second by a long blast with the steam whistle and again after 1 second by a long blast on the siren. When not engaged on their station on pilotage duty, they make the same signals as other steam-ships.

Article 22. Every vessel which is directed by these Rules to keep out of the way of another vessel shall, if the circumstances of the case admit, avoid crossing ahead of the other.

Article 23. Every steam vessel which is directed by these Rules to keep out of the way of another vessel shall, on approaching her, if necessary, slacken her speed or stop or reverse.

Article 24. Notwithstanding anything contained in these Rules, every vessel, overtaking any other, shall keep out of the way of the overtaken vessel.

the way of the overtaken vessel.

Every vessel coming up with another vessel from any direction more than two points abaft her beam, i.e., in such a position, with reference to the vessei which she is overtaking, that at night she would be unable to see either of that vessel's sidelights, shall be deemed to be an overtaking vessel; and no subsequent alteration of the bearing between the two vessels shall make the overtaking vessel a crossing vessel within the meaning of these Rules, or relieve her of the duty of keeping clear of the overtaken vessel until she is finally past and clear.

As by day the overtaking vessel cannot always know with certainty whether she is forward or abaft this direction from the other vessel, she should, if in doubt, assume that she is an overtaking vessel, and keep out of the way.

Article 25. In narrow channels every steam vessel shall, when it is safe and practicable, keep to that side of the fairway or mid-channel which lies on the starboard side of such vessel.

Article 26. Sailing vessels under way shall keep out of the way of sailing vessels or boats fishing with nets, or lines, or trawls. This Rule shall not give to any vessel or boat engaged in fishing the right of obstructing a fair-way used by vessels other than fishing vessels or boats.

Article 27. In obeying and construing these Rules, due regard shall be had to all dangers of navigation and collision, and to any special circumstances which may render a departure from the above Rules necessary in order to avoid immediates descent order to avoid immediate danger.

Sound Signals for Vessels in Sight of one Another. Article 28. The words "short blast" used in this Article

shall mean a blast of about one second's duration. When vessels are in sight of one another, a steam vessel under way, in taking any course authorized or required by these Rules, shall indicate that course by the following signals on her whistle or siren, viz.:—

One short blast to mean, "I am directing my course to starboard." Two short blasts to mean, "I am directing my course

Three short blasts to mean, "My engines are going full speed astern."

No Vessel under any circumstances to Neglect Proper Precautions.

Article 29. Nothing in these Rules shall exonerate any vessel, or the owner, or master, or crew thereof, from the consequences of any neglect to carry lights or signals, or of any neglect to keep a proper look-out, or of the neglect of any precaution which may be required by the ordinary practice of seamen, or by the special circumstances of the case.

Reservation of Rules for Harbors and Inland Navigation.

Article 30. Nothing in these Rules shall interfere with the operation of a special rule, duly made by local authority, relative to the navigation of any harbor, river, or inland waters.

Distress Signals.

Article 31. When a vessel is in distress and requires assistance from other vessels or from the shore, the following shall be the signals to be used or displayed by her, either together or separately, viz.:—

In the daytime-

- r. A gun or other explosive signal fired at intervals of about a minute;
 2. The International Code signal of distress indi-
- a. The International Code signal of distress indicated by NC;
 The distant signal, consisting of a square flag, having either above or below it a ball or anything resembling a ball;
 A continuous sounding with any fog-signal
- apparatus.

At night---

- i. A gun or other explosive signal fired at intervals of about a minute;
 2. Flames on the vessel (as from a burning tarbarrel, oil-barrel, &c.);

- 3. Rockets or shells, throwing stars of any colour or description, fired one at a time, at short
- 4. A continuous sounding with any fog-signal apparatus.

MAILEE LANDS AVAILABLE FOR SELECTION AS AGRICULTURAL ALLOTMENTS.

THE land is situated around the Cow Plains Station, on the Ouyen-Cow Plains railway line, now in course of construction, and is from 2 to 18 miles east from Murrayville, and from 49 to 67 miles south-west from Ouyen.

Applications (with uncancelled Victorian duty stamp of 5s., or postal note for same amount, affixed) must be made on the usual form, and delivered or forwarded by post to any Local Land Office, or to the Secretary for Lands, Melbourne, on or before Wednesday, 19th April, 1911.

The survey fee must be paid within 28 days of demand, and will range from £9 to £11 per allotment.

The licence will be subject to the following conditions:-

That substantial and permanent improvements shall be made on the land, if in the first class, to the value of 38. 4d. per acre before the end of the second year from the date of the licence, another 38. 4d. per acre before the end of each year of the third and fourth years, and the balance of 10s. per acre before the end of the sixth year of the licence. If in the second class, improvements to the value of 2s. 6d. per acre must be made during the like periods, and the balance of 7s. 6d. per acre before the end of the sixth year of the licence.

The first half-year's rent and licence-fee must be paid prior to issue of licence, and, provided improvements equivalent in value to the amount of rent due for each year be expended on the land during each of such years, in addition to the value required by the ordinary improvement condition, as set forth above, further payment of rent may be suspended until the end of the third year, and such suspended payments, without interest, will be collected in instalments during the remaining term of he licence.

That the licensee shall go into residence on the land within twelve months after the date of the licence, and shall reside on the land during the continuance of such licence, and shall also clear and cultivate at least one-fourth of his allotment within two years of obtaining a permit to occupy the land.

That the licensee shall not transfer, assign, mortgage, or sublet, or part with the possession, or grant the use of the whole, or any part of the allotment, during the currency of the licence.

That a special condition shall be inserted in the lease and the Crown grant, providing that the land referred to therein shall at all times be maintained and used for the purpose of agriculture, grazing, and residence, and that no person will be permitted to subsequently acquire or hold, or have an interest in, more than 1,000 acres, if the land be in the first class, or more than 1,500 acres, if the land be in any other class.

That the licensee shall preserve the timber on an area, or otherwise plant an area, of not less than 3 per cent. of the total area of his holding, preferably along the exposed boundary lines, viz., the western and southern.

Face Girder.—Face girder to be as shown of 9 in. x 3 in. x 19 lbs. rolled steel channel. Holes are to be drilled through flanges, but may be punched through web for any necessary bolts. On outside face of this at proper level a 7 in. x 1 in. Oregon or red pine facia plate is to be bolted as shown and firmly secured.

Stamped Steel Ceiling, &c.—Along the bottom faces of intermediate joists 1½ in. x 1½ in. Oregon battens are to be securely nailed, making up piece as shown to be put in position between facia plate and last batten. To these the metal ceiling of approved type is to be fixed. Cornices, mouldings, and cornice-mouldings of approved type are to be fixed where shown in a proper manner, and finished off in a neat and workmanlike way to the satisfaction of the city engineer.

Painting.—Paint the whole of the verandah both inside and outside, except the corrugated, iron of roof, with three coats of best oil and white-lead paint.

Variations for Special Conditions.—Where a new verandah is to be added to an old building, or where no party wall occurs that the main rafter can be built into, the verandah must be constructed as in cross section "B" on plan. A 7 in. x 4 in. x 16 lbs. rolled steel joist is to be built into a chase left or cut in wall (as case may be), with a footing piece of similar section firmly riveted to i. End of footing piece to rest on a concrete block at least 18 in. x 12 in. x 12 in. Main rafter of verandah is to be riveted to top of rolled steel joist in wall. All rivets to be § in. diameter, and all cleats 4 in. x 3 in. x § in. All riveting to be done in an approved manner and all joists made tight and secure.

In places where party walls are more than 16 feet centres, larger main rafters will have to be used of a size and section approved by the city engineer.

Supervision.—The whole of the works shall be executed in accordance with such instruction as may be given from time to time by the city engineer, and should the person erecting the verandah fail to carry out the work as herein specified, it shall be in the power of the city engineer to older the removal of such objectionable work. It must, however, be distinctly understood by owners, agents, architects, and others erecting verandahs in front of their properties that the city engineer does not guarantee or properties that the city engineer does not guarantee or hold himself responsible, by passing the work, for unsound material which may have been used or any faulty workmanship in the same.

The market shall be opened for the sale of market-able commodities, vegetables, goods, wares and merchan-dise on Wednesday in every week from Eight o'clock ante meridian until Two o'clock post meridian; on Friday-in every week from Eight o'clock ante meridian until half-past Ten o'clock post meridian, and on Saturday in every week from Eight o'clock ante meridian until One o'clock post meridian.
- 2. The duties of the Market Inspector, the Collector of Market and Stallage Dues and Inspector of Provisions, and their assistants shall be generally as follows:—
 - To see that the provisions of this By-law are duly observed in and with respect to the market. To see that the market is lighted from 4.30 o'clock
 - ante meridian until sunrise.
 - To preserve order and regularity in the market, and to cause to be apprehended any person making a disturbance or using indecent language or offend-ing against decency or in any manner provoking a breach of the peace within the precincts of the
 - To inspect all articles of food or drink for human consumption exposed for sale in the market and to seize such as are bad or unwholesome or of a nature deleterious to health, and prosecute or cause the persons in possession of the same to be prosecuted, and to prohibit the sale of any articles in the market which he may consider offensive. offensive.
 - offensive.

 To take charge of the market, weighbridge, and of the legally stamped verified scales and weighing appliances and standard weights and measures of the market, and on behalf of the Council to demand, receive and collect all tolls in respect of the weighing of carts with or without goods, or for the weighing or measuring of any commodities or articles sold in the market, to see that all scales and weighing appliances, weights and measures used in the market are in accordance with the standard, and to seize such as are found fraudulent, unstamped or defective, and proceed as directed by the Weights and Measures Act in respect to them and to their possessors.

 To demand, receive and collect in the name and on
 - Act in respect to them and to their possessors.

 To demand, receive and collect in the name and on behalf of the Council such sums of money as and for stallages, standings, rents, tolls, and market dues, as are for the time being appointed by special order of the Council to be demanded, received and had in that behalf respectively, and on non-payment thereof respectively to levy the same by distress, or to take proceedings before a justice in respect of the same, or for recovery of any penalty in respect of the selling, offering or exposing for sale any commodity, article or thing without payment of dues or tolls. To proceed for the recovery of all penalties against any person who sells, offers or exposes for sale, any unwholesome meat or provisions in the Market and for the destruction or confiscation of the same.
 - To weigh or measure any commodity as to the just-ness of which he shall have doubt, and if found unjust to prosecute the offender, and to seize such commodity in the meantime.
 - To appoint the several standing places and places for the deposit of goods, wares, and merchandise in the market, as well as the places for depositing and using utensils or materials requisite for the fixing of stalls and to order the removal of the same, when and in such manner as they shall deem necessary. deem necessary.
- 3. The market standings shall be appropriated to the sale of marketable commodities, garden, farm and dairy produce, goods, wares, and merchandise. Standings in

- the market shall be let to permanent occupiers for such days and periods and on such terms as the City Council may from time to time direct.
- 4. Commodities for food offered for sale in the market shall not be sold by bulk, but by imperial weight or measure, according to their kind; any person offering to purchase may require the vendor of any such commodity to weight or measure the same, and if any vendor shall refuse to weigh or measure such commodity, or if on reference to the Market Inspector it shall be found that such vendor has made a false representation of the weight or measure thereof every such vendor shall forfeit and pay any sum not exceeding Forty shillings for every such offence.
- 5. Any person who may sell or offer for sale by weight or measure any commodity which, when tried by the Market Inspector, may be found deficient in the weight or measure represented, shall forfeit and pay any sum not exceeding Forty shillings for every such offence.
- 6. Any person who may resist any Market Inspector or Collector in the discharge of his duty shall, independently of any other penalty which may be imposed for assault or otherwise, forfeit and pay the sum of Five pounds for every such offence.
- 7. The entrance for vehicles into each market shall be by Commercial-road, and the exit by that in Elizabeth-street, and any person contravening this rule shall, on conviction thereof, forfeit and pay for every such offence a sum not exceeding Ten shillings.
- 8. Except the carts of vendors occupying standings duly appointed for them, no carts or vehicles of any kind shall be permitted to stand in the market place, except where appointed by the Market Inspector, and after the ringing of the bell for opening the market.
- 9. Any person who may place any matter or thing so as to obstruct the roads or footways in the market, or to occupy any other place as such shall be appointed therefor by the Market Inspector, and shall neglect or refuse to remove the same on being required so to do by the Market Inspector, shall forfeit and pay the sum of Forty shillings for every such offence.
- 10. Any person who may place any nail, hook or peg in any part of the wood, stone, brick or ironwork of any standing or stall, or may in any way fit up or enclose any such standing or stall without the consent or contrary to the directions of the Market Inspector, or if any standing or stallholder neglect or refuse to take down any hook, nail, peg or fittings, or remove any obstructions or advertising matter in his or her standing or stall when required to do so by the Market Inspector, every such person shall forfeit and pay any sum not exceeding Forty shillings for every such offence.
- 11. Any person who may sweep or cause to be swept any dirt or rubbish into or upon any of the roads, gutters or footways of the market, and allow the same to remain there, or who, being the holder of any standing, shop, or stall in the market, shall fail to remove any fat, offal, or other refuse or matter when required to do so by the Market Inspector, shall forfeit and pay any sum not exceeding Forty shillings for every such offence.
- 12. Any person who may place or keep any cart, carriage, wheelbarrow or other matter or thing in any part of the market, contrary to the direction of the Market Inspector, shall forfeit and pay any sum not exceeding Forty shillings for every such offence.
- 13. Any person who may sell or offer for sale in the market any marketable commodity before the opening or after the closing of the market, or before or after the time appointed by law, for the sale of such commodity, or for the occupancy of any standing place for the sale thereof, shall forfeit and pay any sum not exceeding Forty shillings for every such offence.
- 14. Any person who may go into or appear in the Murket in a drunken or disorderly state, or cause any disturbance, or use any gross, indecent or abusive language, or be guilty of any gross or indecent conduct therein, shall forfeit and pay any sum not exceeding Five pounds for every such offence.
- 15. The closing of the market shall be announced by the ringing of a bell.
- 16. The permanent occupiers of standings shall pay for 16. The permanent occupiers of standings shall pay for them always in advance, for such period as the City Council may resolve from time to time to let them, the amount prescribed by any special order of the Council, and in the event of any cart being loaded in whole or in any part with vegetables or esculent roots containing other produce for which the said special order prescribes that dues shall be paid, then the owners shall pay the surplus dues over and above the previous payment. Any persons not holders of permanent standings shall occupy such places in the market as may be pointed out to them by the Inspector of the Market:

17. No person shall place any produce, article, or thing whatsoever, so as to obstruct any thoroughfare or avenue in or of the said market, or neglect or refuse to remove the same on being required to do so by the Market Inspector or other duly authorized officer of the Council.

18. Every person guilty of any breach of the provisions of the foregoing By-law shall be liable for every such offence to a penalty not exceeding Five pounds.

If any cattle are found without any person having charge of them-

(b) Upon any land (not being a common) which is not enclosed by any fence within the meaning of the Fences Act 1890, or any amendment thereof, and the openings (if any) in which fence are not secured and barred with gates or other fastenings of equivalent closeness and strength with the fence, the proper officer of the council may seize such cattle and impound them, or place them at some neighbouring place of safe custody.

the council may seize such cattle and impound them, or place them at some neighbouring place of safe custody.

The owner of such cattle shall forfeit a sum not exceeding Twenty shillings for every head of such cattle, and any justice, if such owner be not known, upon proof of the issue of a summons in the usual form addressed to such owner as "owner" only without otherwise naming or describing him, such cattle and the place of seizure being duly described therein, and of the publication of such summons in some newspaper commonly circulating in the neighbourhood, may after the expiration of Twenty-four hours from such publication proceed with respect to such owner not appearing as if personal service of a summons stating his name had been effected, or if such owner appear then as in other cases, and the justice may order the cattle to be sold and the money arising from the sale after deducting the said penalty and the costs awarded and the reasonable expenses, to be estimated and assessed by the justice, of seizing, keeping, and selling the said cattle, shall be paid if demanded within one mouth to the owner of the cattle, and if not so demanded then to the municipal fund; and if the said money is not sufficient for all the purposes aforesaid the amount whereby the same falls short, or if no such sale be ordered the whole of the said amount may be recovered from the said owner if and when known in like manner as other penalties and sums adjudged or ordered to be paid by justices are to be recovered.

If such cattle by reason of having been so found at large have been impounded by the council the amount of such penalty and costs if adjudged respectively before the release or sale of such cattle may remain in the hands of the poundkeeper shall be paid over by him accordingly; and if the proceeds of any sale of such cattle are not sufficient after paying the lawful fees and charges aforesaid to satisfy such penalty and costs, or if such penalty and costs have been adjudged after the release or sale of the cattle th

any information under this section the owner be not known then the provisions of the last preceding section so far as necessary to give the adjudicating justice jurisdiction
