

QUARTERLY STATISTICAL ABSTRACT
TO 31ST MARCH, 1911.

COMPILED FROM OFFICIAL RETURNS IN THE OFFICE OF THE
GOVERNMENT STATIST.

QUARTERLY STATISTICAL ABSTRACT, 31ST MARCH, 1911.

Population.—The estimated population on the 2nd April, 1911, was 1,315,000. During the first three months of 1911, the natural increase in the population was 4,587, and the excess of recorded immigration was 4,232. New South Wales gained from this State 452 persons, South Australia 350, and Western Australia 515, whereas this State gained from Tasmania 3,672 persons, from the United Kingdom 1,543, and from Queensland 378 persons.

Vital Statistics of the State.—The marriages—2,561—were 27 less, the births—8,106—were 357 more, the deaths—3,519—were 301 fewer, and the excess of births over deaths was greater by 658 than in the corresponding quarter of the previous year. Of the total number of deaths, 239 were due to phthisis, and 49 to other tubercular diseases; 268 to cancer; 45 to typhoid fever; and 37 to diphtheria and croup.

Vital Statistics of Melbourne, &c.—The births during the quarter numbered 3,602. This includes one case of triplets, 26 cases of twins, and 347 illegitimate births. The deaths numbered 1,712, and the excess of births over deaths was 1,890. The deaths from diphtheria and croup numbered 18, from typhoid fever 13, and from tubercular diseases 162, as against 9, 20, and 167 respectively in the corresponding quarter of the previous year. The total deaths in Melbourne were 1,712, of whom 316 were under twelve months of age. In Ballarat, of 183 deaths, 34 were of infants; in Bendigo, of 156 deaths, 28 were of infants, and in Geelong, of 92 deaths, 12 were of infants. In Melbourne and Suburbs the infantile death rate was 2·3 (per 100 births), as against 3·2 for the preceding March quarter. In the four towns mentioned there were 694 deaths of people aged 65 years and upwards—or 32 per cent. of the total.

State Revenue and Expenditure.—The total revenue for the quarter was £1,877,464 which represents a decrease of £322,272 on the corresponding quarter of the previous year. The principal items of revenue were—Railways £1,328,704, and Probate Duty £106,461. The total expenditure was £2,095,885, an increase of £253,602 on that of the corresponding quarter of 1910.

Railways.—Compared with the corresponding quarter of the preceding year, the revenue increased by £54,076, the expenditure by £34,573, train miles run by 235,567, passengers carried by 1,950,822, and the tonnage of goods and live stock by 74,757.

Victorian Banking Returns.—On the 31st March the total liabilities of the banks were £47,208,264 and the assets £47,169,670, as against £43,210,094 and £43,256,603 on the 31st March, 1910. The reserves amounted to £7,090,444, and paid-up capital to £14,029,889. The ratio of coin and bullion to liabilities was 19·47 per cent.

Savings Banks.—On the 31st March the amount at credit of the 586,784 depositors was £16,475,285. During the quarter 29,041 accounts were opened, and 18,646 were closed; the deposits made were £3,453,583, and the withdrawals £2,969,155.

Gold Yield.—The total yield of gold up to the end of March, 1911, is 72,120,825 ounces.

Imports and Exports.—The total value of oversea imports into Victoria during the quarter under review was £5,679,638, and the total oversea exports during the same period were valued at £5,250,956, as compared with £4,813,879 and £5,910,763 respectively in the corresponding quarter of the previous year.

Exports of Frozen, Preserved, and Perishable Products.—For the first quarter in 1911, the total value of these exports oversea through Cool Stores was £1,011,929, of which £926,798 went to the United Kingdom, £32,902 to South Africa, and £51,329 to Eastern and other ports. The principal exports were—Butter, valued at £765,231; Mutton and Lamb, £123,522; Fruit, £95,229; and Beef, £10,097.

Miscellaneous.—In addition to the usual quarterly returns, tables are also given relating to Agricultural Statistics and the Wool Clip for 1910-11 and previous seasons.
