IN THE COURT OF INDUSTRIAL APPEALS.

In the MATTER of the FACTORIES AND SHOPS ACTS and in the MATTER of the DETERMINATION dated the 1st day of July, 1912, of the SPECIAL BOARD appointed to determine the lowest prices or rates which may be paid to any person or persons wheresoever employed in the process, trade, or business of—

- (a) Boiler-making;
- (b) Plating or rivetting or caulking, or angle-iron smithing, in connexion with—
 - (1) Iron and steel ship building;
 - (2) Bridge building;
 - (3) Girder, tank, waggon, or truck making;
 - (4) Wrought-iron or steel pipe making.

Before His Honour Mr. Justice HOOD.

THIS APPEAL coming on for hearing before this Court on the 13th, 14th, 15th, 16th, 19th, 20th, 21st, 22nd, and 23rd days of August, 1912, and this day: Upon reading the notices of appeal herein, dated the 24th day of July, 1912, and the 15th day of August, 1912, and upon hearing what was alleged in support of and in opposition to the said appeal, this Court doth order and determine that so much of the above Determination of the said Special Board as determines that the lowest rate of wages payable to Labourers assisting in manufacturing work, except those employed in wrought-iron or steel pipe making, shall be 1s. 1½d. per hour, or £2 14s. per week of 48 hours; and that the lowest rate of wages payable to Labourers employed in wrought-iron or steel pipe making and all other Labourers not therein provided for shall be 1s. per hour, or £2 8s. per week of 48 hours, be amended by striking out the said part of the said Determination and by substituting therefor the following:—

Labourers shall be paid as follows:—

- (1) When engaged as assistants, including holders-up employed in repairing hulls, boilers, funnels, tanks, or bunkers, or engaged in any other work on board ship or steamer—1s. 1½d. per hour, or £2 14s. per week of 48 hours.
- (2) When engaged as assistants working inside boilers (other than on board ship or steamer), or working in hand flanging or levelling material at the furnace or fires, or working with hammers 14 lbs. weight or over, or working the handles of a straightening machine—1s. 1d. per hour, or £2 12s. per week of 48 hours.
- (3) All other assistants employed on any boiler, or on any shop machine, or on any structural work not included in classes (1) and (2)—1s. 0½d. per hour, or £2 10s. per week of 48 hours.
- (4) Labourers—1s. per hour, or £2 8s. per week of 48 hours.
Labourers employed in wrought-iron or steel pipe making are included in class (4).

ADDENDUM.

“Any employé employed in any day upon work included in more than one of the above classes shall be paid for the whole day according to the higher scale provided that he has worked during that day for more than one hour on the work included in such higher scale.”

This Determination will come into force on the 13th day of September, 1912.
