Factories and Shops Acts.

#### DETERMINATION OF THE OVENMAKERS BOARD.

IN accordance with the provisions of the Factories and Shops Acts, the Special Board appointed to determine the lowest prices or rates which may be paid to any person or persons, or classes of persons (other than moulders), employed in the process, trade, or business of a maker of ovens, stoves, or ranges, or parts thereof, has made the following Determination, namely:—

1. That previous Determinations of this Board are hereby amended, and such amendments shall come into force and be operative on and after the 17th day of June, 1912. The Determination and amendments are printed hereunder—

## APPRENTICES.

#### NUMBER.

3. That the number of apprentices who may be employed within any factory or shop or place shall be one apprentice to every three or fraction of three workers receiving not less than 48s. per week.

#### IMPROVERS.

4. That the number of improvers-who-may-be-employed within any factory or shop or place shall be one improver to every two persons of fraction thereof receiving not less than 54s. per week.

#### OVERTIME.

6. (a) That any male employé over the age of sixteen years who works for any time in excess of 48 hours in any week, shall be paid for such extra time at the rate of time and a quarter.

### SPECIAL RATES FOR SUNDAYS AND PUBLIC HOLIDAYS.

- 7. That the special price or rate of payment payable to any person for all work done on-
  - (a) Sundays,
  - (b) On the undermentioned Public Holidays (that is to say) :-

Good Friday,
21st April,
Christmas Day,

or such other day as may be observed as a Public Holiday in lieu thereof,

shall be at the rate of double time.

#### PIECE-WORK.

8. The Board determines under the provisions of sub-sections (1) and (2) of Section 98 of the Factories and Shops Act 1905, No. 1975, that any employer may fix and pay piece-work prices or rates to any person employed in the process, trade, or business of a maker of ovens, stoves, or ranges, or parts thereof, provided that such employer shall base such piece-work prices or rates on the earnings of an average worker working under like conditions, and such piece-work prices or rates shall be fixed so that an average worker can earn not less than the wages rate fixed by the Board for such work.
