## Factories and Shops Acts.

#### DETERMINATION OF THE CHAFF-CUTTERS BOARD.

IN accordance with the provisions of the Factories and Shops Acts, the Special Board appointed to determine the lowest prices or rates which may be paid to any provisions. determine the lowest prices or rates which may be paid to any person or persons or classes of persons-

- (a) employed in the process, trade, or business of chaff-cutting, corn-crushing, or compressing
- (b) employed in carting or driving or assisting in carting or driving in connexion with the trade or business of chaff-cutting, corn-crushing, or compressing fodder;

has made the following Determination, namely:-

- 1. That the previous Determination of this Board is hereby amended, and such amendments shall come into force and be operative on and after the 9th day of October, 1914. The Determination and amendments are printed hereunder:-

## APPRENTICES AND IMPROVERS.

- "Apprentice" means any person under 21 years of age bound by indentures of apprenticeship,
- "Apprentice" means any person order 21 years of age bound by indentures of apprenticeship, or any person over 21 years of age who, with the sanction of the Minister, is bound by indentures of apprenticeship. (Act 2386, Section 5.)

  "Improver" means any person (other than an apprentice) who does not receive a piece-work price or a wages rate fixed by any Special Board for persons other than apprentices or improvers, and who is not over 21 years of age, or who being over 21 years of age holds a licence from the Minister to be paid as an improver. (Act 2386, Section 5.)

#### SPECIAL RATES FOR SUNDAYS AND PUBLIC HOLIDAYS.

6. That time and a half shall be the rate for all work done on-

Sunday,
New Year's Day,
Good Friday,
Easter Monday,
Eight Hours Day (21st April),
King's Birthday (3rd June),
Christmas Day,
Boxing Day;

but if any other day be by Act of Parliament or Proclamation substituted for any of the above-named holidays, the special rate shall only be payable for work done on the day so substituted.

# CASUAL LABOUR.

7. That casual employés (i.e., persons employed for less than 48 hours in any week) shall be paid at the rate of 1s. 3d. per hour, but the total payment shall not in any case exceed the ordinary weekly wage as fixed in this Determination.
