#### MORWELL WATERWORKS TRUST.

#### RATING BY-LAW FOR YEAR 1914.

A BY-LAW for making a rate for the year 1914 on the rateable property within the Waterworks District of the Morwell Waterworks Trust, which district has for the purposes of the Water Act 1905 been proclaimed an Urban District, also for dealing with the charges for the sale of water by measure from the works of the Trust:—

1. A rate of One shilling and sixpence in the pound shall be paid on the annual value of all rateable property in the Waterworks District, according to the valuation for the time being of all lands and tenements for the municipal rate of the Shire of Morwell, but no such rate for tenements shall be less than One pound five shillings (£1 5s.).

- 2. For every unoccupied piece or allotment of land, the municipal value of which does not exceed Five pounds per annum, the sum of Seven shillings and sixpence (7s. 6d.). When such value is over Five pounds a rate of One shilling and sixpence in the pound.
- 3. For every public water trough, the sum of One pound (£1).
- 4. When water is supplied by measure for domestic or other than domestic purposes, a charge of One shilling per 1,000 gallons shall be made, and the minimum quantity to be charged for shall be the quantity which at the price named would be equal to the rate payable in respect of such property if water were supplied etherwise the payable property. plied otherwise than by measure.
- 5. When water is supplied solely for other than domestic purposes, the charge shall be One shilling per 1.000 gallons, and the minimum quantity to be supplied during each year ending on the 31st December, shall be 15,000 gallons. The charge hereby made shall be payable on demand by the Trust.
- 6. The Trust may, by notice in writing, intimate to any owner or occupier using water for other than domestic purposes solely, that the water supplied is to be charged for by measure, and may, by such notice, require such owner or occupier to provide a meter within one month after the receipt of such notice, and thereupon such owner or occupier shall, within the time specified, at his own expense, provide a meter.
- 7. In all cases not herein provided for, the Trust shall make such special provision as may be deemed necessary.
- 8. The foregoing rates are made payable on the first day of May, 1914.
- 9. Such person or persons as the Commissioners of the said Trust may from time to time appoint shall be authorized to demand and receive the said rates and charges.

WHEREAS by section 23 of the Education Act 1890 (54 Vict. No. 1086) it is enacted that the Governor in Council may from time to time make and rescind regulations for all or any of the purposes therein mentioned, and generally for carrying the said Act into effect: Now therefore His Excellency the Governor of the State of Victoria, by and with the advice of the Executive Council thereof, doth hereby rescind Regulation VII.—Appointment and Transfer of Junior Teachers and Sewing Mistresses—and Regulation X.—Continuation Schools for the Training of Junior Teachers—of the Regulations under the Education Act 1890, and doth substitute the following Regulations in lieu thereof, that is to say:—

#### REGULATION X.

#### JUNIOR TEACHERS AND SEWING MISTRESSES.

A .- JUNIOR TEACHERS.

- 1. The conditions for appointment as junior teachers shall be-
  - (a) Except as hereinafter provided, candidates must not be less than 16 years of age, and must have obtained the Intermediate Certificate, or have passed the Junior Public or some higher examination of the Melbourne University, or hold an approved equivalent qualification.
     (b) They must furnish satisfactory evidence of good moral character

- (b) They must furnish satisfactory evidence of good moral character.
  (c) They must produce a certificate from an inspector of schools, or from the head master of a district high school, or higher elementary school, or other approved school, that they exhibit aptitude and general suitability for the work of a teacher.
  (d) Before appointment as junior teachers, candidates must submit a certificate from a schools medical officer or medical practitioner approved for this purpose by the Director, that they are of sound constitution and are free from any physical defect likely to impair their usefulness as teachers.
- 2. Candidates who as pupils of district high schools and higher elementary schools, have been awarded an Intermediate Certificate of the Education Department, or have passed the Junior Public Examination of the Melbourne University and are certified by the head master as having spent the time allotted in the study of all the subjects prescribed for junior teachers in the Instructions appended to this Regulation, and as having made satisfactory progress therein, shall be recorded in order of merit for appointment to such vacancies amay exist for junior teachers. When the number of such qualified pupils, however, exceeds the number of vacancies for junior teachers, appointments cannot be guaranteed. Qualified pupils not appointed as junior teachers by reason of there being an insufficient number of vacancies shall be recorded for vacancies which may arise during the year next succeeding the annual examination at which they qualified for appointment.

  3. Other candidates who have passed the Junior Public
- examination at which they qualified for appointment.

  3. Other candidates who have passed the Junior Public or some higher examination of the Melbourne University, or who hold a qualification approved by the Director as equivalent, shall be recorded for appointment to such vacancies as may exist for junior teachers, precedence in order of appointment to be determined by the following considerations:—(a) the standard and number of the subjects passed in the Junior Public or some higher examination of the Melbourne University; (b) evidence of proficiency in one or more of the following subjects, manual training, drawing, nature-study; (c) aptitude for teaching as certified by an inspector of schools. schools.
- 4. Candidates who have obtained an Intermediate Certificate, or who have passed the Junior Public or some higher examination of the Melbourne University, and who attend a district high school approved for that purpose for a further course of study extending over at least one year, shall, if they desire to qualify for appointment as junior teachers of the Second Class, undertake a course of study equivalent to the requirements for the examination for the Leaving Certificate, or the Senior Public Pass examination. The subjects of study shall be as approved from time to time by the Director.

- 5. Candidates under clause 4° who hold the Leaving Certificate or have passed the Senior Public examination may receive appointments as junior teachers in an elementary, or a higher elementary, or a district high
- school.

  6. When a vacancy exists for a junior teacher and there is no candidate qualified as in any clause above, the vacancy may be filled by the appointment of a candidate having the highest qualifications, and who in the opinion of a district inspector is qualified for such a position. If it is considered necessary, the appointment shall be determined by competitive examination.

7. (a) Junior teachers will be divided into four class

classes,
(b) Candidates who comply with the conditions in clauses 4 and 5 above and who are at least 17 years of age may be appointed as junior teachers, and upon appointment shall, without further examination, be classified and paid as junior teachers of the Second

(c) Candidates who comply with the conditions set out in clause 2 or in clause 3 above and who are at least 16 years of age may be appointed as junior teachers, and upon appointment shall, without further examination, be classified and paid as junior teachers of the Third Class.

the Third Class.

(d) Where vacancies for junior teachers are filled by the appointment of candidates as in 'clause 6 above, such candidates shall, upon appointment, be classified and paid as junior teachers of the Fourth Class.

8. Candidates who have qualified for appointment as junior teachers under any of the clauses of this regulation shall be appointed in order of merit and in the following order of preference:

(a) those who have purified to the latter that the following order of preference:

(a) those who have qualified under clauses 4 and 5 above:

(b) those who have qualified under clause 2 above; (c) those who have qualified under clause 3 above; (d) those who have qualified under clause 6 above.

(d) those who have qualified under clause 6 above. Provided, however, that the Director may determine in each year the proportionate number of males and females to be appointed. Notwithstanding anything contained in any previous section no candidate shall be appointed as a jumior teacher who does not comply with provisions (h), (c), and (d) of clause 1 above.

9. During their course, jumior teachers may be required to attend such classes of instruction as the Director may from time to time determine.

10. (a) The appointment of all junior teachers shall be on probation during the full term of the course of such junior teachers.

be on probation during the full term of the course of such junior teachers.

(b) The services of any junior teacher may be dispensed with for repeated failure to pass the annual examinations or for failure to obtain satisfactory reports from the district inspector.

(c) Each junior teacher will be examined from time to time by a medical officer, and if the medical report is not satisfactory in any case the services of such junior teacher may be dispensed with.

11. The conditions necessary for the prometion of junior teachers to the Third Class shall be as follow:—

(a) To have completed a year as junior teachers.

- (a) To have completed a year as junior teacher of the Fourth Class, and to have received satisfactory annual reports from the district inspector and half-yearly reports from the head teacher of the school in which they are employed.

  (h) To have passed a satisfactory examination in the practice of teaching, and in reading and recitation as prescribed for junior teachers of the Third Class.
- 12. The conditions necessary for the promotion of junior teachers to the Second Class shall be as fol-
  - (a) To have completed a year as junior teachers of the Third Class, and to have received satisfactory annual reports from the district inspector and half-yearly head teacher of the school in which they are employed.

(b) To have passed a satisfactory examination in at least five of the subjects prescribed for the Intermediate Certificate or the Junior Public examination; and

(c) To have passed a satisfactory examination in Drawing, Part I., and in the theory and practice of teaching as prescribed for junior teachers of the Second Class.

13. The conditions necessary for the promotion of junior teachers to the First Class shall be as follow:—

(a) To have completed twelve months as junior teachers of the Second Class, and to have received satisfactory annual reports from the district inspector and half-yearly reports from the head teacher of the school in which they are employed;

(b) To have passed a satisfactory examination in the full course of study for teacher students as prescribed for the third and fourth years

in district high schools;

(c) To have passed a satisfactory examination in Drawing, Part II., in Needlework, and in the theory and practice of teaching as prescribed for junior teachers of the First Class.

14. Junior teachers who hold an Intermediate Certificate, or who have passed the Junior Public Examinaficate, or who have passed the Junior Public Examina-tion of the Melbourne University, provided they produce satisfactory evidence of proficiency in drawing, manual training, and nature-study, will be regarded as having completed thoir examination in the literary subjects pre-scribed for junior teachers of the First Class, and, upon complying with the conditions set out in sub-clauses (a) and (c) of clauses 12 and 13 above, shall be classified as junior teachers of the First Class.

as junior teachers of the First Class.

15. Junior teachers who, as pupils of registered schools, have passed the Junior Public or some higher examination of the Melbourne University, will be credited with a pass in the corresponding subjects of the examination for junior teachers of the First Class. Upon passing a satisfactory examination in the remaining subjects of one of the alternative courses of study set out in the Instructions appended to this Regulation, such junior teachers shall be regarded as having completed their examination in the literary subjects prescribed for junior teachers of the First Class, and, upon complying with the conditions set out in sub-clauses (a) and (c) of clauses 12 and 13, shall be classified as junior teachers of the First Class.

16. Junior teachers shall be regarded as having completed their junior teacher course when they have completed one year as First-class junior teachers.

17. A general examination of junior teachers will be held annually, and all junior teachers who have been appointed not less than twelve months will be required to attend thereat.

18. At the annual examination, junior teachers will be classed for the year. In order to obtain promotion, junior teachers must pass in all the subjects prescribed for the classes for which they are respectively presenting themselves.

19. To enable junior teachers to pass their examinations for promotion, for admission to training, and for a First-class Certificate head teachers and assistants will be required to give to the junior teachers in their schools instruction, outside of the ordinary school hours, as follows: hours, as follows :-

In a school having but one junior teacher, two hours per week; in a school having more than one junior teacher, at least three hours per week. Of this instruction, a satisfactory proportion shall be given by the head teacher. The time for such instruction, and the names of the teachers giving the instruction, must, in all cases, appear on the time-table.

The time actually given to the instruction shall be entered in the teachers' rolls by such head teacher or assistant, as the case may be. The exercise-books kept by the junior teachers, showing the work done under the direction of the head teachers and assistants, shall be dated from day to day, and shall be produced to the district inspector at his half-yearly visits.

district inspector at his half-yearly visits.

20. Special classes for the instruction and training of junior teachers may be formed, where practicable, in the principle centres of population. Junior teachers employed in schools situated at convenient distance from the places in which these classes are, or may be, held will be required to attend such classes at such times as the Director may from time to time direct.

21. Head teachers will be required to supervise the work done by junior teachers for these special classes, and to supplement this instruction.

22. At least once in each year the district inspectors will include in their reports on head teachers reports on the character of the instruction of the junior teachers, and on the arrangements made for their practical training in the art of teaching.

23. Junior teachers and pupils of district high schools who have the qualifications specified in Regulation XII., and who are applicants for studentships, may be nominated annually for free studentships at the Teachers' College.

The number of such nominations under this clause shall be determined annually by the Director.

24. Nominations for studentships will be determined by—(a) the record of the applicant as a junior teacher and as a pupil; (b) the standard and number of the subjects passed in the examinations for the Junior Public and the Leaving Certificate or the Senior Public examination; and (c) aptitude for teaching as certified by an inspector of schools or the head master of a district high school.

25. Pupils of district high schools nominated for free studentships at the Teachers' College will be required to spend at Jeast a year' in gaining practical experience as junior teachers in schools, and during this period they shall be paid the salary of junior teachers of the Second Class and shall receive the instruction specified in clauses 19 and 21 above.

26. No nomination for studentship shall be confirmed unless the studentship holder shall, during the first year of his studentship, obtain from his head master and from an inspector of schools, satisfactory reports as to his conduct, progress, and aptitude for teaching.

27. Upon the completion of the period of one year or more', as junior teachers, and on passing a meritorious examination in the theory and practice of teaching as prescribed for the training of junior teachers of the First Class, persons nominated for free studentships will be admitted to the Teachers' College without further examination, and on fulfilling the requirements set forth in Regulation XII, they shall be entitled to all the privileges of holders of the studentships under the provisions of that Regulation.

28. On and after 1st January, 1915, the provisions of clauses 1-22 of this Regulation shall apply to exit student candidates from district high schools and higher elementary schools, and to other candidates appointed as junior teachers, but exit student candidates of any year prior to 1915, and other candidates appointed as junior teachers prior to 1st January, 1916, may complete their junior teacher course under the Regulation in force at the date of their appointment; provided, lowever, that on and after 1st January, 1918, the provisions of this Regulation shall apply to all junior teachers.

(a) To draw to scale from dimensioned sketches, from actual measurement, and from given data, simple objects, such as a box, a table, a chair, and the like, in easy positions. Easy working drawings of such objects in orthographic and isometric projection.
(b) To design and construct simple decorative geometric patterns—borders, diapers, panels, and the like. To analyze given patterns, such as the "fret," the "scale," the "zig-zag," and the like. The questions will be based upon a knowledge of elementary practical plane and solid geometry embraced in the following:—

  To bisect a line, an arc, and an angle; to draw lines perpendicular and parallel to each other by construction and with the ruler and set square; the equal and proportional division of lines; the construction and use of plain scales, diagonal scales, and scales of chords; to make an angle equal to a given angle, or containing a given number of degrees; to find the centre of a circle; to describe a circle to pass through two or more given points; to divide a circle into any number of equal sectors; the construction of triangles, quadrilaterals, and polygons under simple conditions; to draw a straight line tangent to a circle or a circle tangent to a straight line; to describe eircles or arcs and rectilinear figures within and about others; to describe the cllipse under simple conditions; plans and elevations of geometric solids and objects of simple form; simple isometric projection.

  (c) Elementary Linear Perspective: To draw in perspective, freehand, or with instruments, simple objects composed of straight lines, such as a cube, a square prism, a triangular prism, a door, a fence, and the like.

  (d) Drawing from models or objects. (Such models as the cube, cone, cylinder, and pyramid, and such objects as a flower-pot, a bowl, a jug, a teapot, and the like, will be given.) The exercise will consist of not more than two models or objects in combination. Candidates must show a knowledge of the effects of perspective in modifying the appearance of objects.

  (e) Drawing plant forms from nature. (Such plants as the eucalyptus, the pittosporum, the ivy, and the geranium will be selected.) The work may be executed with the brush and water-colour, in monochrome or in colour, in silhouette or in outline, or with the lead pencil in outline.

Note.—Junior teachers who have obtained a pass in Drawing in the Junior Public or who hold an approved equivalent qualification will not be required to present themselves in sub-clauses (a) (b) (c) and (d) above.

(c) Practice.—To give a satisfactory class lesson in model drawing from a single object, explain-ing and illustrating such terms as "vanish-ing," "eye-level."

  (b) To have passed a satisfactory examination in the full course of study for teacher students as prescribed for the third and fourth years in district high schools.
  (c) To have passed a satisfactory examination in Drawing, Part II., in Needlework, and the theory and practice of teaching as prescribed for the training of junior teachers of the First Class.

Junior teachers who hold an Intermediate Certificate. or who have passed the Junior Public examination of the Melbourne University, provided they produce satisfactory evidence of proficiency in drawing, manual training, and nature-study, will be regarded as having completed their examination in the literary subjects prescribed for junior teachers of the First Class, and, upon complying with the conditions set out in sub-clauses (a) and (c) above, shall be classified as junior teachers of the First Class. the First Class.

#### Drawing, Part II .-

- (a) Drawing from models and objects. As in Part I., but of more advanced character; not more than three models or objects in combination will be employed. A perspective or a geometric analysis of one or more of the models may be required.
  (b) Drawing from memory common objects. natural forms (including those studied under Drawing, Part I. (a) above), and simple animal forms; illustrating such terms as "mountain range," "river flat," "mandible," "web-footed," and the like.

  The drawings from memory are to be executed in white or coloured chalk upon brown or tinted

paper.

In practising for the examination, the blackboard should be largely employed.

(c) Modelling from nature.

Plant forms similar to those given under Drawing, Part I. (h), above, will be selected.

The examination exercises will be executed in plasticine, but, in practising for the examination, both clay and plasticine should be employed where possible, in order to acquire facility in the use of a plastic medium.

NOTE.—Candidates who have passed in the subject of Drawing as prescribed for the Intermediate Certificate need not present themselves for Drawing, Part I.

(d) Practice.—To give a satisfactory lesson in drawing plant forms from nature.

Head teachers should draw the attention of the district inspector to any marked irregularity, unpunctuality of attendance, or unsatisfactory work on the part of junior teachers.

Junior teachers may be enrolled for instruction in special classes in high schools, to be held at suitable times in the afternoons or evenings, and on Saturdays. Attendance at these classes will be held to satisfy the requirements of Regulation XI., so far as applicable to the subjects taught in the special classes, but head teachers are required to supplement the work given at a high school by supervising the individual preparation prescribed for the students in any subject.

Special attention is called to the necessity for carrying on systematically the practical training of junior teachers in the art of teaching throughout the year.

To ensure efficient practical training, the following course is considered necessary, and should be followed in schools in which junior teachers are employed:—

- (a) Previous preparation by student teachers of at least two of the lessons they will be called upon to give next day. Brief notes indicating in outline the matter and the method of presentation should be kept.
- (b) Preparing full notes of and giving ten criticism lessons under the supervision of the head teacher or the assistant in charge of a depart-
- (c) The giving of ten example or demonstration lessons by the head teacher or other teachers of experience and skill. These lessons should not be criticised. A list showing the names of the teachers, the subjects treated, and the time of the lessons, should be suspended in the office for the inspector's perusal.

Of these (a) may be omitted on those days when the junior teacher attends evening classes.

Ten of these lessons should be given during the year, i.e., one in each mouth, from February to November inclusive, and the lesson should be given on the first Tuesday in each month, or on some other day in the same

week as sanctioned by the district inspector, commencing at 11.45 a.m. On this day, the usual morning recess will be dispensed with in all classes. If, on the day appointed for the example lesson, the school is closed, the lesson should be given on the next school day. On such occasions, the school, with the exception of the class to be taught, should be dismissed for the morning at 11.45; but all members of the staff should be present as auditors while the lesson is being given. They are not to be employed in any other duties while these example lessons are in progress. example lessons are in progress.

Should any teacher find the afternoon a more convenient time than the morning, such lessons may commence after the school has been in session two hours; and on such occasions the school may assemble at 1.15

A Junior Teacher Record Book will be forwarded to each school in which a junior teacher is employed. In this book the following information should appear:—

(a) Record number of each junior teacher.
(b) Name in full.
(c) Date of appointment.
(d) Classes taught and period spent with each.
(e) Quarterly report of head teacher on general progress and teaching proficiency.

These reports of the head teacher will be considered in the case of each candidate (junior teacher) due for promotion.

promotion.

In order to afford junior teachers who have passed in the literary work for promotion to the First Class opportunities for acquiring experience and practical skill in the management of small schools, it is requested that head teachers will afford such junior teachers in the metropolitan area an opportunity of visiting a practising school for at least one day in each quarter, or a week continuously during the last year of their course. Similar facilities should be granted to any First-class junior teacher who has not had an opportunity of observing, and acquiring skill in the working of, small schools. Ample notice of intention to send visitors to a practising school should be sent to the head teacher of such school. Junior teachers will be required to take part, if deemed necessary, in the work of the school visited, and to enter in the time-sheet of such school the time of their arrival and departure.

A junior teacher should, during his course of training,

A junior teacher should, during his course of training, A jumor teacher smouth, during his coase of atmany, be afforded an opportunity of teaching in each department in the school, and should be required to study and prepare notes upon the programme of instruction for each grade. The head teacher should see that all circulars and notices in the Education Gazette and Teachers' Aid are studied by his junior teachers.

Teachers and junior teachers who wish to appeal against the result of any examination must lodge such appeal within fourteen days of the date of the notification of such result, and must forward, with their appeal, the sum of 2s. 6d. This sum will be returned if good grounds for appeal are shown, otherwise it will be retained.

Complaints that failure at examination has arisen from curtailment of the time specified or from illness of the candidate, will not be taken into consideration unless, at the time, the attention of the inspector conducting the examination is called to the matter.

1. Candidates for appointment as Sewing Mistresses in State elementary schools shall not be less than seventeen years of age; they must hold the Merit Certificate or possess some qualification approved as equivalent by the Director, and must furnish, with their applications, satisfactory evidence as to good character and suitability, and, prior to appointment, as to sound health.

2. When there is no person recorded for transfer and only one qualified candidate for any vacancy, the Director shall, if satisfied that the candidate is competent to perform the duties of the position, inform the Committee of Classifiers thereof, who shall enter the name of the candidate on the Employment Register for that vacancy.

3. When there is no person recorded for transfer and there are more candidates than one, a competitive examination shall be held in English, Arithmetic, Nature Knowledge, and History and Civies for Grade VII. in the "Course of Free Instruction in Elementary Schools," as provided for by the regulations in force for the time being, in all kinds of needlework required from girls in State schools, in teaching such needlework, and in teaching any other subjects prescribed for Grades I., II., and III.

The inspector shall arrange the names of the candidates in their orders.

The inspector shall arrange the names of the candidates in their order of merit as determined by the examination, and report to the Director for the information of the Committee of Classifiers, who shall enter in the Employment Register the name of the first candidate, provided she prove duly qualified.

4. Sewing mistresses may be recorded by the Director for transfer, in the following order:—

Frist—Sewing mistresses in schools that have been closed or whose services have been discontinued through alteration in the average attendance.

Second—Sewing mistresses recorded for transfer—

(i.) In the public interest;

(ii.) On the ground of ill-health, attested by by satisfactory medical evidence.

(iii.) For some other satisfactory reason.

YARRA PARK TENNIS COURTS.

Regulations for the Management of the Courts.
