SHIRE OF RODNEY.

By-LAW No. 26.

A By-law of the shire of Rodney made under sections 34, 35, and 38 of the *Health Act* 1915, and numbered twenty-six, for the proper management and construction of privies.

IN pursuance of the powers conferred by the *Health Act* 1915, the President, Councillors, and Ratepayers of the Shire of Rodney order as follows:—

1. A suitable privy shall be attached to every house, shop or building erected or hereafter to be erected within the boundaries of the townships of Tatura Mooroomna and Kyabram in the shire of Rodney.

2. Every such privy shall have (a) an entrance door (b) a trap door for removing the pan (c) a wooden covering for the seat (d) a sufficient ventilation pipe rising up to and through the roof (e) a fly proof middenstead (f) a proper and effectual screen from public view.

No privy shall be deemed to be a suitable privy unless it is equipped with each of these requirements.

3. Every such privy shall be kept in good repair and condition.

4. The owner or occupier of such house shop or building shall be liable for any breach of this By-law.

5. The penalty for a breach of this By-law shall not exceed £5 and shall not exceed £1 for each day during which such breach shall be continued.

Resolution for passing this By-law agreed to by the council of the shire of Rodney the thirty-first day of January, One thousand nine hundred and sixteen, and confirmed the twenty-eighth day of February, One thousand nine hundred and sixteen.

THE GLENROWAN WATERWORKS TRUST.
BY-LAW No. 5.

THE Commissioners of the Glenrowan Waterworks Trust, constituted under the Water Acts, do hereby, pursuant to and in exercise of the powers and authorities conferred by the *Water Act* 1915, make the By-law following:—

The following are the rates for 1916 which the occupiers or owners of lands, tenements, or vacant allotments within the Waterworks District of the aforesaid Trust and liable to be rated, shall pay to the Trust in respect to every such property.

1. For every house or tenement used either wholly or partly as a domicile of Twelve pounds annual municipal valuation and under, a rate of One pound ten shillings sterling shall be paid.

2. For every house or tenement of more than Twelve pounds annual municipal valuation a rate of Two shillings and sixpence on municipal valuation shall be paid.

3. The rate to be paid in respect of vacant or unoccupied allotments of land fronting a street in which a main shall have been laid shall be Ten shillings.

4. For all lands and tenements, situated otherwise than in streets in which pipes are laid down, and which are not supplied with water, and being within a quarter of a mile of a main, one half of the before-mentioned rate, and where tenements are over a quarter of a mile and under half-a-mile from a main, one quarter the before-mentioned rate to be paid.

5. Water supplied by meter shall be charged for at the rate of Two shillings per 1,000 gallons, and shall be paid for at such time or times as may be demanded by the Trust.

6. The foregoing rates are hereby made payable in equal moieties on the first day of January and the first day of July, 1916.

7. Such person or persons as the Commissioners of the said Trust may from time to time appoint for that purpose shall be authorized to demand, collect, and recover the said rates and charges.

TO BE DISCONTINUED.

No. 2626) it is amongst other things enacted that no cemetery or burial ground shall be established or opened in Victoria save with the approval of the Governor in Council; and that in case it shall appear to the Governor in Council that burials in any cemetery under any law relating to public cemeteries or in any other burial ground or place of burial whatsoever should be wholly discontinued, or should be discontinued subject to any exception or qualification, the Governor in Council may, by an Order to be published in the Government Gazette, direct that after a time to be mentioned in such Order, not being less than three months from the date thereof, burials in such cemetery or burial ground or place of burial shall be discontinued wholly or subject to any exceptions or qualifications mentioned in the same or in any subsequent Order, and may from time to time postpone the time mentioned in such Order, for the discontinuance of burials or otherwise vary any such Order, whether the time appointed for the discontinuance of burials thereunder or other operation of such Order shall or shall not have arrived: And whereas it appears to the Governor in Council that burials in the Old Cemetery at Seymour should be discontinued, subject to the exceptions and qualifications hereinafter mentioned: Now therefore His Excellency the Governor of Victoria, by and with the advice of the Executive Council thereof, doth by this Order direct that all burials in such cemetery shall be discontinued except in allotments or land the right of burial in which has already been purchased from the trustees of such cemetery, or shall be so purchased before the first day of September, 1916.

And the Honorable Donald McLeod, His Majesty's Minister of Health for the State of Victoria, shall give the necessary directions herein accordingly.

*Local Government Act 1915 (No. 2686).***ORDER IN COUNCIL UNITING THE SHIRE OF LANCEFIELD AND THE SHIRE OF SPRINGFIELD WITH THE SHIRE OF ROMSEY.**

At the Executive Council Chamber, Melbourne, the twenty-third day of May, 1916.

WHEREAS by notice in writing, dated the 31st day of May, 1915, to and duly served upon the Councils of the Shire of Lancefield and of the Shire of Springfield and of the Shire of Romsey respectively, on or about the 1st day of June, 1915, the Honorable Frederick William Hagelthorn, His Majesty's Commissioner of Public Works in and for the State of Victoria, and the Minister of the Crown for the said State at that time administering the Local Government Acts of the same (hereinafter referred to as the Minister), notified such Councils of his intention to proceed to obtain an order uniting the said shires of Lancefield and Springfield to the shire of Romsey, the municipal district of which, together with that of the said shires of Lancefield and Springfield, form one continuous area, by reason 'as the case in fact is) of the general and extra rates made and levied by the said shires of Lancefield and Springfield respectively during the twelve months ended the 30th day of September, 1914, did not yield a sum of One thousand and five hundred pounds, particulars of which notice were published in the *Government Gazette* of the 2nd day of June aforesaid, and respectively in three consecutive issues of the *Argus* and *Age* newspapers, generally circulating in Melbourne, and the *Lancefield Mercury*, and the *Romsey Examiner*, newspapers generally circulating in the several municipalities of Lancefield, Springfield, and Romsey (that is to say, in the *Argus* and *Age* of the 2nd, 3rd, and 4th June, 1915, and in the *Lancefield Mercury* and in the *Romsey Examiner* on the 4th, 11th, and 18th June, 1915). And whereas the said Minister has given to the Councils of the municipalities of Lancefield, Springfield, and Romsey (no creditor of either of them within the period of three months from the 18th day of June now last past or at all having notified the Minister of his or its desire so to do), full opportunity of showing cause why an Order in Council uniting the shire of Lancefield and the shire of Springfield to the shire of Romsey should not be passed. And whereas the Honorable William Addison Adamson, His Majesty's Commissioner of Public Works in and for the State of Victoria, and the Minister of the Crown of the said State for the time being administering the Local Government Acts of the same, having entertained inquiries into and decided upon all representations made by or on behalf of such Councils respectively has recommended that the shire of Lancefield and the shire of Springfield should, as on and from the 31st day of May, 1916, be united to the shire of Romsey and become part of the same, and that the territory of the said shires of Lancefield and Springfield should thenceforth form portion of the Romsey Shire by each being constituted a separate riding thereof. And whereas such recommendation has been duly considered and approved: Now therefore His Excellency the Governor of the State of Victoria, in the Commonwealth of Australia, by and with the advice of the Executive Council of the said State, being satisfied that all conditions precedent to the making hereof have been fulfilled and observed, and acting under the authority conferred by the *Local Government Act 1915*, and under all other powers him enabling in that behalf, doth hereby order and direct as follows (that is to say):—

1. That on and from the thirty-first day of May, 1916, the Shire of Lancefield, incorporated under the style or title of "The President, Councillors, and Ratepayers of the Shire of Lancefield," and the Shire of Springfield, incorporated under the style or title of "The President, Councillors, and Ratepayers of the Shire of Springfield," shall by virtue of these presents be and become united with the Shire of Romsey, incorporated under the style or title of "The President, Councillors, and Ratepayers of the Shire of Romsey," and that thereupon and thenceforward the territory constituting the said Shires of Lancefield and Springfield with the territory constituting the said Shire of Romsey shall together form one shire, the boundaries of which are set out and defined in the First Schedule hereunto, with the assigned name of the "Romsey Shire," and that the inhabitants thereof shall be and become incorporated under the style or title of "The President, Councillors and Ratepayers of the Shire of Romsey."

2. That from and after union the new shire of Romsey shall consist of six separate ridings, namely, the Romsey Riding, the Monegeetta Riding, the Riddell's Creek

Riding, the Rochford Riding, the Lancefield Riding, and the Springfield Riding, which several ridings shall have the boundaries set forth and described in the Second Schedule hereunto under their respective names.

3. For the purpose of the annual election to be held next after the 31st day of May, 1916, and of the government of the municipality constituted by the union, but without prejudice to the operation of the provisions of section 24 of the *Local Government Act 1915*, it is hereby declared that the council of the new shire of Romsey will, in accordance with the terms of section 11 of the said Act, consist of eighteen members, being produced by three councillors being returned by each of the six ridings into which the new shire is by this Order divided.

WHEREAS by section 41 of the *Agricultural Colleges Act 1915* it is enacted that the Council of Agricultural Education may from time to time, with the approval of the Governor in Council, make, alter, and repeal regulations for regulating the manner in which any of the lands vested in the Trustees may be demised by them, and the forms of the leases, and the terms, covenants, and conditions to be therein contained: Now therefore the said Council of Agricultural Education, in exercise of the powers conferred by the above said recited Act, doth hereby order that the special conditions as set out hereunder be inserted in the Leases of Allotments Nos. 47 to 53 and 64 to 71 inclusive, parish of Yallock, and His Excellency the Governor of the State of Victoria, with the advice of the Executive Council thereof, doth hereby approve of the same.

And the Honorable Frederick Hagelthorn, His Majesty's Minister of Agriculture for the State of Victoria, shall give the necessary directions herein accordingly.

SPECIAL CONDITIONS.

Fencing.

Each tenant will require to erect such fencing as may be necessary to be erected on his allotment, and shall erect same within twelve months from date of lease. All fencing to consist of seven wires and posts, three to the chain, with two droppers between posts. Posts to be sunk 2 feet, and if split 8 by 4 inches, sawn 6 by 3 inches. Fencing to be erected to the satisfaction of the Trustees, who reserve the right of constructing same at lessee's expense should he fail to comply with said conditions.

Drainage.

The lessee shall within three years of date of lease excavate along the line of his division fence a drain sufficient to discharge surface drainage, and such other drains, cuts, or ditches as the Trustees may require to be constructed, and shall at all times during term of lease keep open and free from obstruction all drains, ditches, cuts, &c., now upon the land, or which at any time he may be required to construct thereon, and will not permit nor cause to be done any acts, &c., whereby any such drains may be injured or endangered.

Failing compliance by lessee to carry out the above provisions relating to maintenance of drainage, the Trustees, after giving thirty days' notice to lessee, shall have power to employ workmen and carry out the work to the satisfaction of the Trustees, and money so expended shall be recoverable in any Court of Petty Sessions.

Each lessee shall make provision for supply of water for his own use by construction of water holes, tanks, or wells fitted with windmills.

The Trustees reserve the right to enter or authorize any other person to enter on any allotment for the purpose of connecting with any existing drain, or with any newly constructed drain, or for clearing out existing drains, or drains that may be excavated by the tenant.

Lessees abutting on drains will be required to attend to sluice gates and to maintain them in proper working order by the removal of debris, snags, or other foreign matter.

REGULATIONS FOR THE MANAGEMENT OF THE AMHERST UNITED BOROUGH AND GOLD- FIELD COMMON.

IN pursuance of the regulations relating to commons made by the Governor in Council on the 19th day of October, 1915, the managers of the Amherst United Borough and Gold-field Common, having drafted the following Regulations for the management thereof, submit the same for revision by the Board of Land and Works, and approval of the Governor in Council, in lieu of the Regulations hitherto in force in respect of such Common :—

REGULATIONS.

1. In the construction and for the purpose of these Regulations the words "large" cattle shall mean cows, heifers, oxen, steers, horses, mares, geldings, colts, fillies, asses, mules, and the words "small" cattle shall mean sheep and goats.

2. Ratepayers, holders of miners' rights, business licences, or carriers' licences, and farmers residing within five (5) miles of the Common, may respectively depasture thereon four head of large cattle, or the equivalent of the whole or a portion thereof in small cattle, on the basis that one head of large cattle be deemed equivalent to three head of small cattle. A farmer having under cultivation not less than one-tenth portion of the land occupied by him may depasture on the Common one (1) additional head of large cattle, or the equivalent in small cattle, for every ten (10) acres of such land cultivated by him.

3. The fees for depasturing stock on the Common shall be as follows, and shall be payable in advance on the 1st day of January in each and every year :—For every head of large cattle, Two shillings (2s.) per annum; for every sheep up to the number of six (6), One shilling (1s.) per annum; for every sheep above that number and up to twelve (12), Two shillings and sixpence (2s. 6d.) per annum; for every goat up to the number of six (6) belonging to any one household, One shilling (1s.) per annum; for every goat above that number and up to twelve (12), Two shillings and sixpence (2s. 6d.) per annum; for every horse, Five shillings, (5s.) per annum.

4. No person shall depasture on the Common stock of which he is not the *bona fide* owner.

5. No person shall depasture on the Common any entire horse, bull, or any swine without the consent in writing of the managers.

6. No animal affected with any contagious disease shall be depastured on the Common. Should any animal die on the Common, the owner thereof shall immediately remove same, and failing his doing so, the managers shall be at liberty to do so at the expense of the owner.

7. All stock on which the prescribed fees shall remain unpaid for fourteen (14) days after commencement of any year shall be liable to be impounded.

8. Sheep shall be depastured on such portions of the Common only as the managers may set apart for the purpose.

9. The managers may grant to butchers or slaughtermen special licences to depasture on the Common for such periods of time as may be agreed upon, subject to the condition that the fees shall not be at a proportionately less rate than Two shillings (2s.) per head per annum for large cattle, and One shilling (1s.) per head per annum for small cattle.

10. All stock legally depasturing on the Common shall (as far as possible) be branded by their respective owners with some distinctive brand or mark, for the purpose of identification, which shall at all times be kept legible and distinct by the owners, and shall be supplied to the managers at the time of registration. In all cases where such stock shall be impounded from the Common in consequence of non-observance or non-compliance with this Regulation, the managers shall not be responsible in any respect.

11. All stock depasturing on the Common shall wear a chain and badge, and the managers shall be at liberty to appoint certain times and places for registration, or renewing of registration, of stock, on at least three days' notice of intention to do so, being given by the herdsman, either by advertisement in the local newspaper or by hand-bills posted about the Common; and the herdsman shall attend at such times and places for the purpose aforesaid. Every person entitled to commonage shall, after paying the herein prescribed fees, obtain from the herdsman the necessary number of chains and badges, which shall at all times be the absolute property of the managers. Every such person shall then be responsible and liable to be charged for stock equivalent to the number of badges and chains from the time of receiving such badges and chains until they are returned to the herdsman. No person shall use other than the authorized or registered badge and chain in connexion with stock legally depasturing on the Common. In addition to the fee for depasturing stock the sum of Sixpence (6d.) shall be paid to the herdsman at the time of registration for the hire of each badge and chain in the case of large and small cattle, and One shilling (1s.) in the case of horses; but should any person cease at any time to depasture stock on the Common, the amount paid for each badge and chain shall be refunded to such person, provided the badge and chain be returned to the herdsman in good order and condition. Should any such badge or chain be from any cause removed or lost from any stock, every such badge or chain removed or lost from any stock shall at once be replaced by a new badge or chain at the sole expense of the owner of the stock, and the sum of One shilling (1s.) in the case of a horse, and Sixpence (6d.) in the case of large or small cattle, be paid to the herdsman for such extra badge or chain, but no refund shall be made by the managers for any badge or chain removed or lost. No person shall place or allow to be placed or remain on any stock on the Common a lost badge or chain, or one removed from another animal, without the authority of the herdsman, and any stock wearing or carrying a lost badge or chain, or one feloniously removed from other stock, shall be treated as illegally depasturing on the Common, and shall be liable to be impounded without notice to the owner. Owners of stock shall render every assistance to the herdsman in placing chains and badges on the animals.

12. The managers shall be at liberty to call at any time upon the owners of stock on the Common, by advertisement in the local newspaper, to muster their stock at such places as may be appointed for the purpose of registering, or to see that all stock depasturing on the Common are duly registered or carrying the correct badge and chain, and the herdsman shall give every assistance at such mustering.

13. All fees as hereinbefore set forth must be paid on registering of stock.

14. The financial year of the Common shall commence on the first day of January in each year, and all fees must be paid within fourteen days from the said first day of January. No rebate or reduction shall be made in the fees for registration of stock for a portion or portions of the said financial year.

15. Owners of registered stock will be required to give immediate notice in writing to the herdsman of any stock sold or permanently removed from the Common.

16. The managers shall not be responsible for the safe custody of stock depasturing on the Common, or for the loss or damage sustained through the neglect or mistake of the herdsman, or from any cause whatsoever.

17. No person shall unnecessarily disturb any stock depasturing on the Common.

18. The herdsman shall give notice to the owner (if known by him) of stock impounded in any pound where the Common brand or badge is registered, within twenty-four hours after receiving notice of such impounding, but the cost of releasing impounded stock shall in all cases be paid by the owner thereof.

Every person offending against any of the foregoing Regulations shall, on conviction, before any Justice of the Peace, forfeit and pay a penalty not exceeding £20 for each offence.

Printed forms of tender, schedules, conditions of contract, and stipulation of tendering, &c., may be obtained at the office of the Secretary to the Tender Board, by whom also the samples will be shown and any information afforded to persons tendering.

Each group, schedule, or item can be tendered for, and may be accepted or rejected separately.

Each tender must be accompanied by a preliminary deposit of 2½ per cent. of total of tender submitted.

The prices must be expressed without alterations or erasures, and the total amount of the tender must be stated.

Preference will be given by the Tender Board to tenders for articles manufactured within the Commonwealth, provided the quality of such articles is equal to the particular manufacture indicated in the schedule and the rates charged are considered reasonable.

The tenderers must state where the supplies have been, or are to be, manufactured. Supplies of British manufacture will receive preference over those of foreign manufacture.

Tenders must be accompanied by the preliminary deposit, as shown and designated in the conditions of tendering.

The Government will not necessarily accept the lowest or any tender.

Tenders must be enclosed in a separate envelope, marked "Tender for Printing Paper," or as the case may be, and must be deposited in the Tender-box, at the Pay Office, Treasury, Melbourne, or if sent by post, must be addressed to the Chairman of the Tender Board, Treasury, Melbourne.

CONDITIONS OF CONTRACT.

1. In these conditions and in the form of contract and schedule hereto annexed the words "Government Printer" shall include the officer bearing or acting under that title or such other officer as the Government may from time to time appoint to perform the duty in the matter in relation to which the expression is used. The word "Storekeeper" shall mean the officer (or officers) of the Government who inspects and takes delivery of the stores. The word "Schedule" shall mean and embrace the schedule or schedules hereto annexed.

2. As regards supplies of Commonwealth manufacture no subletting will be allowed; all work must be carried out in the factory of the contractor; the standard hours of employment of any person engaged in the manufacture of the paper, envelopes, and other supplies tendered for in this schedule shall not exceed 48 per week, and every such person shall be paid at a minimum wage of not less than £2 6s. per week for a man, and £1 per week for a woman respectively, unless other wages and conditions may be determined by any special Board under the Factories and Shops Acts which may be appointed during the currency of the contract for the paper-making or other trades under which the manufacture of the various supplies is included, when every such person shall be employed at such wages and subject to such conditions as may thus be determined; and a copy of these conditions shall be kept conspicuously and continually posted in legible Roman characters in the factory (and in each part of the factory where several rooms are in use) in which goods are prepared or manufactured under this contract. Any infringement of these conditions, in the opinion of the Treasurer, will subject the contractor, upon report from the Tender Board, to such mulct, not exceeding Fifty pounds (£50), as the Treasurer may direct, and the amount will be deducted from the contractor's account or from the security money, and the Treasurer's decision shall be binding, final, and conclusive as to the fact of infringement and in all other respects.

3. The contractor shall, before any account is passed for payment for services rendered in terms of clause 2, furnish a statutory declaration that all the workmen under this contract have been employed in accordance with clause 2 of these conditions, and have been paid not less than the minimum rate of wages for such workmen as is provided for under that clause.

4. Under no circumstances will a contractor be permitted to abandon his contract. In the event of the contractor failing to carry on the contract, the contract security money will in that case be absolutely forfeited; and, in addition, the contractor will be held liable for any loss which the Government may sustain in consequence of such failure.

5. The Government will order from the contractor all the articles enumerated in the schedules. Should the Government, however, require a larger supply of any article than the quantity stated in the schedule, the contractor will nevertheless be bound to supply the same at contract rates.

6. The first delivery under this contract—three months' supply based on the requirements for one year—shall be made not later than 1st July, 1916. The contractor shall, in addition, hold and keep in Melbourne a reserve stock or stocks equal to one-fourth of the requirements for one year as set out in the schedule. The Government Printer may at any time require, and shall be entitled to receive, delivery of the whole or any portion of such reserve stock or stocks to meet his requirements. In the event of the Government Printer requiring and receiving delivery of such reserve stock or stocks, or any portion thereof, the contractor shall within a reasonable time, but not exceeding

four months, replace and make good such reserve stock or stocks, or the portion thereof delivered to the Government Printer as aforesaid. The Government Printer shall at any time be entitled to call upon the contractor to satisfy, and the contractor being so called upon shall satisfy, the Government Printer that he holds all reserve stock or stocks that he is required or bound to hold in terms of conditions of tender.

7. The supplies are to be the same as sample and in accordance with schedule conditions where so stated, and of the particular manufacture indicated in the schedule of tenders. Substantial and effective preference will, however, be given to goods of Commonwealth manufacture, provided the quality is equal to the particular manufacture indicated in the schedule. Preference will also be given to articles of British manufacture as against those of foreign manufacture.

8. The value of all packages, cases, wrappings, &c., whether bulk be broken or not, all wharfage fees and duty of Customs must be included in the prices stated in the contractor's tender; all such packages, &c., to be considered the property of the Government, and no charges or expenses whatsoever beyond the price tendered and set out in the schedule will be allowed to the contractor for any articles or packages, cases, wrappings, &c. The net weight or quantity only will be paid for. Contractors must provide, without extra charge, whatever labour, &c., may be required in the packing and delivery of the supplies.

9. All orders for supplies will emanate from the Government Printer. The goods shall be delivered as may be directed by that officer in terms of contract. At the time of delivering the supplies, the contractor shall produce the order for the same, setting out the order number and particulars of the supply, together with an invoice in duplicate, to the officer authorized to accept delivery, and such officer shall give an acknowledgment to the contractor of the receipt of the stores tendered by him. The contractor shall also furnish a statement at the end of each month setting forth deliveries during the month, and the total money value of same. Arrangements as to time and place of delivery and of inspection of goods will be made by the Government Printer or such other officer as he may appoint.

10. Orders must receive prompt execution in terms of contract; and in the event of the goods not being delivered within forty-eight hours after the contractor shall have received the order, or within such other time as the order may specify for delivery, it will be competent for the Government Printer, on giving the contractor twenty-four hours' notice, to purchase the supplies, or any like supplies that are suitable for the service, at the contractor's risk, and the extra expense incurred over and above the contract price (if any) will be deducted from the contractor's account or from the security money.

11. The stores supplied under every item or group of items shall in respect of quality, shape, and (when only one size is specified) size, be in accordance with the sample or samples exhibited by the Tender Board to the contractor when tendering. Any samples furnished by the contractor shall become the property of the Government.

12. The acceptance of the supplies shall be subject to the approval of the Government Printer, whose decision shall be final. If, after the delivery of the supplies has been taken, any deficiency or defect is discovered therein, such stores may be returned to the contractor. All rejected goods must be removed by the contractor within forty-eight hours after notice has been given to him by the Government Printer of such rejection, and if not so removed the Government Printer is hereby empowered to send same to any store in Melbourne, there to be stored at the contractor's risk and expense, such expenses to be deducted as in Clause 10. Delivery will not be deemed to have been made until the goods have been approved of. In case of the rejection or return of any supplies, the contractor shall bear the whole cost of replacing the supplies rejected or returned, otherwise purchases will be effected at the contractor's risk, and the extra expense deducted as in Clause 10.

13. A refusal to execute orders, irregularity in the quantity or quality of the supplies, or delay in delivering or replacing them when required, will subject the contractor, upon report from the Government Printer to the Tender Board, to such mulct, not exceeding One hundred pounds, for each and every default as set out in Clauses 4 and 10. It will also be in the power of the Treasurer, upon such refusal, irregularity, or delay, to terminate the contract forthwith, and declare forfeit the whole or any portion of the security money; and, in addition, the contractor may be disqualified from tendering or holding any future contract or contracts for a period of twelve months from the date of such disqualification.

14. Contractors are not at liberty to transfer their contracts under cover of power of attorney, coupled with an interest or otherwise; and no such transfer will be recognised by the Government.

15. In the event of any alteration in the duties of Customs which may affect any of the items included in these contracts, the Government or the contractor, as may be the case, will make a proportionate allowance by way of deduction from or increase of the price of the item so affected, provided that the duty on such item at the altered rate has actually been paid.

16. The contract shall not be considered as being infringed, broken, or vitiated—

By the manufacture or importation by the Government of any stores for the use of the Victorian Government Printing Office; by the purchase or use of any stores manufactured by any Government establishment; or by the purchase of any stores which, in the opinion of the Government Printer, may be necessary to meet special circumstances or requirements.

CONDITIONS OF CONTRACT.

1. All the articles are to be of the best quality of the several kinds, in the best condition, and in conformity with the Pure Food Act, and to be delivered in sound packages, free from all charges for cartage, freight, &c. The goods shall be delivered as may be directed by the officer ordering the supply.

2. As the exact quantity of any article which may be required cannot be stated, the estimate being approximate only, the Government will not be bound by the quantity stated in the schedule, but will be at liberty to order more or less, according to circumstances, and the contractor will be bound to supply the same as ordered.

Lady Loch and Albert*; the Ararat, Beechworth, and Ballarat Districts will include the Hospitals for the Insane, Gaols, and Police Gaols, at these places; and the Geelong District embraces a radius of two miles from the Post Office; Lara, the Inebriates Retreat; Greenvale, the Sanatorium; Rutherglen, the Viticultural College; Wynna, the Irrigation Farm; Wahgunyah, the Vine Nursery; and Creswick, the Forest School. The lock-ups at City Watch-House, Bourke-street West, Brunswick, Carlton, Coburg, Collingwood, Fitzroy, Fitzroy North, Hotham Hill, Little Bourke-street, North Melbourne, Port Melbourne, Prahran, Richmond, St. Kilda, South Melbourne, and South Yarra are included in the contracts for the Melbourne District. Delivery must be made at the places, institutions, &c., named in the schedules.

5. Packages suitable for transport of goods supplied must be provided by the contractor free of expense, and the value of these packages, whether in bulk or otherwise, is to be included in the price demanded, except brandy casks, porter cases, hogsheds, butter firkins or boxes, and soap boxes (not including fancy soaps), jam jars, flour, meal, and potato bags, which will remain the property of the contractor, and only the actual net weight or quantity received will be paid for. The empties to be removed from the place of delivery at the contractor's expense.

6. The meat supplied under these conditions must, if practicable, be slaughtered at abattoirs which are under proper authorized inspection and supervision. Any infringement of this condition will subject the contractor, on report from the Tender Board, to such mulct, not exceeding Fifty pounds, as the Treasurer may direct, and the amount will be deducted from the contractor's account, or from the security money.

7. The supplies coming under the head of Rations and Medical Comforts are to be delivered direct to the establishment entitled thereto on the written order of the officer in charge. All other supplies will be ordered by the head of the department concerned or any officer authorized by him.

8. At the time of delivering the supplies, the contractor shall produce the order for the same to the officer authorized to accept delivery, and such officer shall acknowledge thereon the receipt of the stores accepted, and shall return the order to the contractor, and the account is to be rendered as soon as possible after the delivery of the supplies, accompanied by the receipted delivery order. For the supplies coming under the head of Rations and Medical Comforts, the account is to be rendered monthly for such quantities only as are issued, the difference between the supply and issue to be kept at the contractor's credit. Supplies not issued at the termination of the contract to be removed by the contractor. The rates or quantities quoted in the orders cannot be exceeded.

9. When a contractor is required to make delivery of goods at a railway station for transmission by rail, he shall obtain a receipt for the goods in duplicate on the Stores and Transport consignment note, at the same time handing in a triplicate of the form as an authority for the carriers to act as agent for, and charge the freight to, the Stores and Transport Department. He shall as soon as possible, and not later than twenty-four hours thereafter, deliver at the Tender Board Offices the original, the duplicate to be retained by himself. Should the goods thus forwarded be rejected, the contractor must bear the cost of replacing such goods, for which service the departmental consignment note is not to be used. Any infringement of this condition may subject the contractor to such mulct as the Tender Board may recommend under clause 18 of these conditions.

10. Should the contractor fail to supply any articles at the time mentioned in the order, they or any like supplies suitable for the service will be otherwise procured, and the expense over and above the contract price will be deducted from his account or from the security money.

11. The acceptance of the supplies shall be subject to the approval of the officer authorized to take delivery of the stores, or such other officer as shall be named in the conditions. If, after the delivery of the supplies has been taken, any deficiency or defect is discovered therein, such stores may be returned to the contractor.

12. If the officer in charge of stores be not satisfied as to the quantity or quality of the stores, or if, after taking delivery of any stores or material, he shall discover any deficiency or defect therein, he may return such deficient or defective stores or material to the contractor, and shall report the same to the head of his department and to the Tender Board.

13. In the event of a difference of opinion between the contractor and the officer receiving the supplies as to the quality, the same is to be decided, in cases where the article is not of a perishable nature, by a board of survey composed of persons named by the Treasurer of the State for the time being; and the decision of the board is to be considered final. In the event of the decision being against the contractor, the survey fees and expenses (if any) will be deducted as in clause 10.

14. In cases where the article is of a perishable nature, or when from some other cause injury would be sustained either by the persons to whom the rations or stores are due or to the contractor in waiting for a board of survey, the head of the department or officer authorized to take delivery will have power to reject such article or articles as are obviously of inferior quality, it being understood that he will be responsible to the Government for so doing, and that the contractor must take back the rejected article and supply good in its stead; failing which, it or any like supply suitable for the service, will be obtained by the officer requiring it as in clause 10. In case of the rejection or return of any supplies, the contractor shall bear the whole cost of replacing the supplies so rejected or returned.

15. If the board shall decide that the article is not of proper quality it must be immediately replaced by the contractor;

failing which, it or any like supply suitable for the service will be procured by the officer requiring it; and the expense charged as in clause 10.

16. In the case of supplies for Hospitals for the Insane, it will be competent for a board of survey, consisting of the medical superintendent (or, in his absence, of the medical officer) and any two officers named by him, to examine and reject any supplies that may be objected to. It must be distinctly understood, however, that the contractor will have a right of appeal to the Treasurer of the State for the time being; but, pending such appeal, he must take back the rejected articles and at once supply others of approved quality; failing which, the supplies required or any like supplies suitable for the service may be obtained by the officer concerned, and the expense charged to the contractor.

17. In the case of supplies for Hospitals for the Insane, it will also be competent for two or more of the official visitors, in conjunction with the medical superintendent, to reject any supplies that they may consider not in accordance with contract; and in such cases the reference to a board of survey will not be deemed to be necessary on the part of the contractor.

18. A refusal to execute orders, irregularity in the quantity or quality of the supplies, or delay in delivering or replacing them when required, will subject the contractor, upon report from the Tender Board, to such mulct, not exceeding Fifty pounds, as the said Treasurer may direct, and the amount may be deducted as in clause 10. It will also be in the power of the said Treasurer, upon such refusal, irregularity, or delay, to terminate the contract forthwith, and forfeit the whole or any part of the security money.

19. Contractors are not at liberty to transfer their contracts under cover of power of attorney, coupled with an interest or otherwise, and no such transfer will be recognised by the Government. If it is found during the currency of the contract that the contractor has not conformed to the condition of advertisement which stipulates that if a tenderer be a member of a firm and such firm be interested in the contract, then the tender is to be in the name of the firm and not in that of the individual—then the Honorable the Treasurer may determine the contract, and forfeit the security money.

20. It will be competent for the Secretary to the Tender Board to terminate the contract, without notice, should there be reason to know that the contractor takes advantage of his contract to communicate with a prisoner.

21. The contracts entered into under this notice are not to be considered as being broken, infringed, or vitiated by the importation of stores for the Government service, or by any contracts or purchases made by the Imperial Commissariat, or on account of the Commonwealth Government; or by the consumption of the produce or surplus stock of any Government establishment, or by any article being made at and supplied for the use of any Government establishment.

22. For the purposes of the contracts entered into under these conditions, it is hereby expressly provided that in the event of any alteration in the Tariff affecting any of the items included in these contracts, the Government or the contractor (as the case may be) may give two months' notice, through the Secretary to the Tender Board, of the termination of the contract for the particular item or items so affected to the opposite party, it being understood that such notice can only be given from the first day of the month, and within the period for which the contract is made. The contract for the unaffected items to remain in full force and effect. Any notice to be served under this condition shall be deemed to have been duly served if sent to the contractor in a registered letter at his last-known place of business or abode.

23. Under no circumstances other than those mentioned in clause 22 will a contractor be permitted to abandon his contract. In the event of the contractor failing to carry on the contract, the contract security money will in that case be absolutely forfeited; and, in addition, the contractor will be held liable for any loss which the Government may sustain in consequence of such failure.

24. For the purposes of these contracts the word Government shall mean Government of the Commonwealth as regards supplies for the Commonwealth, and Government of the State as regards supplies for the State; and the word Treasurer shall mean Treasurer of the Commonwealth as regards supplies for the Commonwealth, and Treasurer of the State as regards supplies for the State.

25. Where specially indicated in the schedules no subletting will be allowed, and no delivery shall be made on Sundays; all work must be carried out by the contractor, and the hours of employment of any person engaged in the preparation or manufacture of the articles tendered for in the schedules, or engaged in the delivery of or in any way engaged in connexion with the supply of the articles tendered for in the schedules under this contract, are not to exceed forty-eight per week (unless otherwise stated), and every such person shall be paid such wages and shall be employed subject to such conditions as are or may be determined by any Wages Board under the Factories and Shops Act to which such persons are subject as employees, and a copy of the labour condition, as indorsed on the schedules affected, shall be kept conspicuously and continually posted, in legible Roman characters, in the factory, shop, or dairy (and in each part of the factory, shop, or dairy where several rooms are in use) in which goods are prepared or manufactured under these contracts. Any infringement of this condition will subject the contractor, upon report from the Tender Board, to such mulct, not exceeding £50 (Fifty pounds), as the Treasurer may direct, and the amount will be deducted from the contractor's account or from the security money; and the Treasurer's decision shall be binding, final, and conclusive as to the fact of infringement and in all other respects.

FUNERALS OF DESTITUTE PERSONS AND REMOVAL OF DEAD BODIES IN THE MELBOURNE DISTRICT.

TENDERS will be received until Eleven o'clock a.m. on Tuesday, 6th June, 1916, from persons willing to undertake Funerals of Destitute Persons at the Necropolis (Springvale) and the New Melbourne Cemetery, Fawkner, and Removals of Dead Bodies to the Melbourne Morgue, as required by the several Departments of the Government, from 1st July, 1916, to 30th June, 1919, in the Melbourne district, which includes the following police sub-districts:—Melbourne City, Bourke-street west, Little Bourke-street, East Melbourne, West Melbourne, Albert Park, Alphington, Armadale, Ascot Vale, Auburn, Balaclava, Brunswick, Brunswick East, Brunswick West, Burnley, Camberwell, Carlton, Carlton North, Clifton Hill, Coburg, Collingwood, Essendon, Essendon North, Fitzroy, Malvern, North Fitzroy, Flemington, Hawthorn, Hawthorn West, Hotham Hill, Kensington, Kew, Middle Park, Montague, Northcote, North Melbourne, Port Melbourne, Port Melbourne North, Prahran, Prince's Hill, Richmond, South Richmond, Royal Park, St. Kilda, East St. Kilda, St. Kilda West, St. Kilda-road, South Yarra, South Melbourne, South Wharf, Toorak, and Windsor. Also in the Bourke district, for the following police sub-districts:—Bentleigh, Brighton, Caulfield, Elsternwick, Malvern East, Moorabbin, and Sandringham for the same period.

Burials of deceased persons from sub-districts north of the Yarra, with the exception of those buried from the Morgue will take place at the New Melbourne Cemetery, Fawkner, and those from sub-districts south of the Yarra, including burial from the Morgue, at the Springvale Necropolis respectively.

Tenders, which must be upon the printed form obtainable from the Secretary to the Tender Board, Gisborne street, Melbourne, will be received for either funerals or removals, but if both services be included in one tender it may, if advisable, be accepted for one service only.

For funerals separate prices must be stated for adults, for children above five years under fourteen years of age, and for children under five years of age including still-born—one sum is to be stated for each, including internment, conveyance, Railway charges, and all other charges whatsoever, except ministers' fees. For removals separate prices must be stated for adults and children under seven years of age.

Tenderers are advised to attach to their tenders lists of their business branches, specifying telephonic connexions, as accessibility and means of prompt communication will be considered in accepting the tenders.

Tenders must state the prices in words as well as in figures, without alterations or erasures.

Tenders must be accompanied by a preliminary deposit in bank notes, or a bank draft payable to the order of the Secretary to the Tender Board for £5 for burials and £5 for removals (cheques will in no case be received), which will be returned within ten days to unsuccessful tenderers on their application. Such deposit to be forfeited in the event of the successful tenderer withdrawing the tender before notification of acceptance, or, in the event of being successful, failing to complete the security or sign the contract within the prescribed period.

Security will be required, in the sum of £25 for burials, £25 for removals, Melbourne District; and £5 Bourke District, either in cash, Victorian Government debentures, Bank deposit receipt, or Savings Bank deposit book in favour of the Secretary to the Tender Board, as the tenderer may elect.

The security must be completed and contract signed within five days of acceptance of the tender, failing which the contract may be again advertised, or another tender accepted.

Tenders, indorsed "Tender for Funerals or Removals" (as the case may be), are to be deposited in the Tender-box at the Pay Office, Treasury; or, if sent by post, postage must be prepaid, and tenders addressed to the Chairman, Tender Board, Pay Office, Treasury, Melbourne, which office they must reach by first post on the date of closing of tenders.

The Government will not necessarily accept the lowest or any tender.

CONDITIONS OF CONTRACT.

1. The services are to be performed upon an order signed by a member of the Police Force. Under the *Cemeteries Act 1915* (No. 2626), section 50, cemetery fees are not payable in the cases of poor persons buried upon an order signed by a Justice, and in such cases the contractor's account for the burial will be correspondingly reduced.

2. No claim will be allowed under this contract for any burial respecting which the contractor receives or arranges for any payment whatever from the relatives or friends of the deceased; but in the event of friends or relatives desiring to have the deceased buried in private ground, while availing themselves of the Government funeral, they must, in such case, pay all the cemetery charges.

3. The funerals are to be of the most economical description consistent with propriety. A plain hearse for an adult, and a covered, plain, suitable four-wheeled vehicle for a child under five years of age, to be provided.

4. The body shall be taken direct to the necropolis, or to the New Melbourne Cemetery, as the case may be, by rail. Not more than one body shall be carried in the hearse or vehicle at a time. No body shall be retained on the premises of the Contractor. Any infringement of this condition will subject the Contractor, upon report from the Tender Board, to such mulct, not exceeding £10, as the Treasurer may direct, and the amount shall be deducted as in clause 16.

5. Coffins for funerals must be waterproof and sufficiently long, deep, wide, and substantial to bear the corpse and permit it to lie extended at full length, and must be made of 1-in. white pine timber covered with black cloth, and fastened down with screws, and pitched in the seams to prevent leakage. The Contractor

shall provide 2 inches of sawdust for the bottom of the coffin; a small block of wood to keep the head of the deceased in position, and sufficient white calico to cover the body. Coffins to be properly lowered into the graves, and the graves filled up again.

6. In cases of burials of bodies which are, in the opinion of the Department ordering the burial, of a distinctively offensive character, such as of persons drowned and long in the water, or such as are in a state of putrefaction from any other cause, or persons who have died from an infectious disease, such bodies shall, on certification of the officer ordering the burial that such precaution is necessary, be placed for burial in zinc-lined coffins, hermetically sealed by soldering the lids of same, such coffins to be provided by the Contractor, of timber 1-inch in thickness.

7. Bodies of deceased persons, with the exception of those provided for under clause 2, must be conveyed to the New Melbourne Cemetery, Fawkner, for burial should the death of such person take place in any sub-district north of the Yarra, excepting bodies buried from the Morgue, and to the Springvale Necropolis should the death take place in any sub-district south of the Yarra, including burials of bodies from the Morgue.

8. The graves to be dug of the proper depth, and in conformity with the Necropolis and Cemetery Regulations.

9. In the event of the contractor failing to attend punctually to any order, the work will be otherwise performed, and the extra expense incurred, if any, will be charged to the contractor. Should any circumstance, however, make it necessary in any particular case that an immediate removal to the Morgue be effected, the hiring of another vehicle for the purpose will not be an infringement of the contract.

10. When burials or removals are required to take place on Sunday, or, in the case of any lunatic asylum, burials on the same day as the inquest, no delay must take place in complying therewith, and any additional fees charged by the necropolis or cemetery authorities in the case of burials will be repaid to the contractor.

11. The attendance of a minister of the denomination named in the order for the burial must, if practicable, be provided. If for any burial such minister is not available the burial service is to be conducted by the resident chaplain deputed by the denomination, and in cases where no such deputy is appointed by the denomination, or where the religious denomination of the deceased is unknown, the services are to be performed by the resident chaplains alternately, and the contractor must inform the Police of the hour when the funeral service will take place, so that the friends of the deceased may attend at the cemetery if they wish. Such order to be produced at the cemetery when the contractor gives the order for internment. The contractor must pay the minister's fee for reading the burial service should it be claimed, and he will be reimbursed, on producing the minister's receipt, which must specify that the burial service was duly and properly performed at the time of the burial, and that he received the fee for so doing. Should the burial service not be performed at the time of the burial no reimbursement will be allowed. The receipt must also specify the name, age, and denomination of deceased, the name and denomination of the minister who performed the burial service, and the hour when the service was performed.

12. Bodies to be removed to the Morgue shall be placed by the contractor before removal in shell coffins, zinc lined and water-tight, securely closed, and shall be conveyed in suitable covered four-wheeled vehicles.

13. Every practicable precaution must be taken in order to prevent offensiveness from decomposition, but in no case of removal must any disinfectant be used without the authority of the medical officer performing the *post-mortem* examination.

14. Under no circumstances will the contractor be permitted to use any undue or improper influence with the friends or relatives of, or any other person connected or associated with, the deceased person for the purpose of obtaining any concession or privilege whatsoever in regard to the funeral of such person. Any infringement of this condition will subject the contractor, on report of the Tender Board, to the immediate cancellation of his contract. The decision of the Board as to whether any breach of the condition has taken place to be final and conclusive.

15. The account is to be rendered monthly to the officer ordering the service for payment at the Treasury, Melbourne. The charge for the minister's fee should be included in the account for the funeral.

16. A refusal to execute orders, impropriety, neglect, or delay in conducting the funerals or removals will subject the contractor, upon report from the Tender Board, to such mulct, not exceeding £50, as the said Treasurer may direct, and the amount may be deducted from the contractor's account or from the security money. It will also be in the power of the said Treasurer, upon such refusal, impropriety, neglect, or delay, to terminate the contract forthwith, and forfeit the whole or any part of the security money.

17. Under no circumstances will a contractor be permitted to abandon his contract. In the event of the contractor failing to carry on the contract, the security money will in that case be absolutely forfeited, and, in addition, the contractor may be held liable for any loss which the Government may sustain in consequence of such failure.

18. Contractors are not at liberty to transfer their contracts under cover of power of attorney, coupled with an interest or otherwise; and no such transfer will be recognised by the Government.

19. No subletting will be allowed; all work must be carried out by the contractor. Every person engaged in the burials or removals tendered for in this schedule shall be paid such wages and shall be employed subject to such conditions as are or may be determined by the Undertakers Board under the Factories and Shops Acts; and a copy of these conditions shall be kept conspicuously and continually posted, in legible Roman characters, in the factory or shop (and in each part of the factory or shop where several rooms are in use) in which funerals are arranged or prepared under this contract. Any infringement

of these conditions, in the opinion of the Treasurer, will subject the contractor, upon report from the Tender Board, to such mulct, not exceeding £50 (Fifty pounds), as the Treasurer may direct, and the amount will be deducted from the contractor's account or from the security money, and the Treasurer's decision shall be binding, final, and conclusive as to the fact of infringement and in all other respects.

A deposit of £5 in bank notes or bank draft, payable to the order of the Secretary to the Tender Board (cheques will in no case be received) must accompany each tender, which will be returned to unsuccessful tenderers within ten days on their application. Such deposit to be forfeited in the event of the tenderer withdrawing his tender before notification of acceptance of the tender, or in the event of the successful tenderer failing to sign and complete his contract within the prescribed period.

Security of £10 for each sub-schedule will be required, either in Victorian Government Debentures, Savings Bank Deposit Book, or Bank Deposit Receipt in favour of the Secretary to the Tender Board, or cash deposit, as the tenderer may elect.

The security must be completed and contract signed within five days of acceptance of the tender, failing which the contract may be again advertised, or another tender accepted.

CONDITIONS OF CONTRACT.

1. The prices quoted cover all descriptions of parcels and goods, including furniture, &c.

2. A separate charge is to be made for each consignment, such charge to be for the gross weight thereof, irrespective of the number of packages. Accounts in all cases to be made out by weight only, and to be rendered monthly, supported by the waybills properly receipted, subject to any deductions for goods lost or damage sustained to the goods whilst in the custody of the carrier. For removal of officers' furniture and effects, however, a separate charge must be made per van per hour, including loading and reloading as required, and a certificate from the officer concerned must accompany the voucher setting forth the number of hours employed before payment can be made. Where it is necessary to employ extra labour, as in the case of bulky consignments, a receipt for the amount paid, duly witnessed, shall accompany the account.

3. Double rates will be paid for consignments of beer and spirits obtained from bond, and also to cover detention when obtaining shipments from the railways or ship's side, but in no other cases will detention be allowed for.

4. The contractor shall in all cases, against each separate charge in his accounts, quote the number of the consignment or delivery note, which will be found on each consignment or package forwarded by the departments. Should the number not be on the package then the name of the consignor should be quoted and a description of the parcel given in lieu thereof. Any infringement of this condition will render the contractor, on report, liable to such fine as the Tender Board may recommend, and the amount will be deducted from any account due to the contractor or from the security money.

5. The vehicles in which goods, &c., are carried must be in thorough working order, with good waterproof covers. Horses to be sound, fast, and staunch, and subject to the approval of the officer requiring the service.

6. The contractor must have an office connected by telephone, and within the radius of the city proper, and as regards the service for the Government Printing Office under sub-schedule C, he will be liable to be called upon to provide the vehicle at any hour of the day or night.

7. Thirty minutes will be deemed sufficient notice, and in the event of the contractor failing to supply the vehicles when ordered, and to the satisfaction of the officer requiring his service, such service will be performed at his risk and expense, and the extra expense incurred will be deducted as in Condition 4.

8. Vehicles as required must call at the Stores and Transport Offices twice daily, viz., 12 noon and 4 p.m., and at 11 a.m. on Saturdays, for goods and parcels, and on such other special occasions when notified without extra payment, otherwise the service will be performed at the contractor's risk and expense, and the amount deducted as in Condition 4.

9. Bills of lading for oversea and Inter-State shipments must be obtained from the shipping company when required, and deposited at the office of the Secretary to the Tender Board in time for the first outgoing mail and prior to the departure of the vessel.

10. Contractors are not at liberty to transfer their contracts under cover of power of attorney, coupled with an interest or otherwise, and no such transfer will be recognised by the Government.

11. Under no circumstances will a contractor be permitted to abandon his contract. In the event of the contractor failing to carry on the contract, the security money will in that case be absolutely forfeited, and, in addition, the contractor may be held liable for any loss which the Government may sustain in consequence of such failure.

12. No subletting will be allowed; all work must be carried out by the contractor, and every person engaged in the cartage tendered for in these Schedules shall be paid such wages and employed subject to such conditions as are or may be provided in the Factories and Shops Acts, or any determination of a Wages Board thereunder; and a copy of this condition shall be kept conspicuously and continually posted, in legible Roman characters, on the premises of the contractor. Any infringement of this condition, in the opinion of the Treasurer, will subject the contractor, upon report from the Tender Board, to such mulct, not exceeding Fifty pounds (£50), as the Treasurer may direct, and the amount will be deducted from the contractor's account or from the security money; and the Treasurer's decision shall be binding, final, and conclusive as to the fact of infringement and in all other respects.

1. On week days from the 1st November to 31st March inclusive, the Baths shall be open to the public from daylight to 9 p.m., from the 1st April to the 31st October inclusive the Baths shall be open from 6 a.m. to 8 p.m., Sundays excepted. (With the consent of the Council and lessee the above dates and hours may be altered or varied.)

2. No person coming direct from any dirty work shall enter the swimming baths before first washing himself in the shower-bath.

3. No person suffering from any infectious disease shall be permitted to enter the Baths.

4. No person shall use soap in the swimming baths.

5. No person shall use obscene or profane language within the bath premises.

6. No person shall spit in the swimming bath or on to the floor or walls of any portion of the building.

7. No person shall deface by writing or otherwise the walls or any portion of the Baths.

8. No person under the influence of intoxicating liquor shall be permitted to enter the Baths.

9. No smoking shall be permitted on the platforms or in the sheds or dressing-boxes.

10. All dogs found within the precincts of the Baths shall be liable to be destroyed.

11. All towels to be returned to the ticket keeper taker.

12. No person shall be allowed to remain in the Baths for a longer period than one hour.

13. Any person committing a nuisance on any portion of the premises other than that set apart for that purpose will be prosecuted.

14. Every person using the Baths shall be decently attired in a Canadian bathing costume.

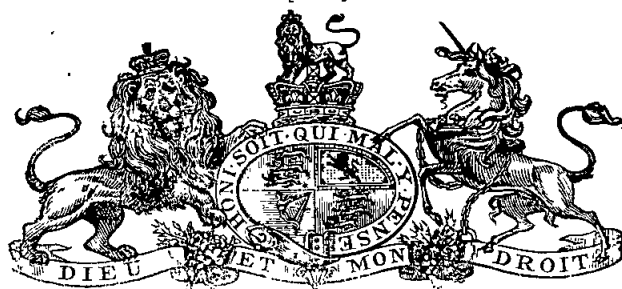

Factories and Shops Act 1915.

DETERMINATION OF THE QUARRY BOARD.

NOTE.—The powers of the Board were extended by the Governor in Council to determine the lowest prices or rates which may be paid to any person or persons, or classes of persons, employed in carting or driving, or assisting in carting or driving, in connexion with or incidental to the trade or business of quarrying (not including agriculture).

IN accordance with the provisions of the *Factories and Shops Act 1915*, the Special Board appointed to determine the lowest prices or rates which may be paid to any person or persons or classes of persons employed in the process, trade, or business of quarrying, not including agriculture, has made the following Determination, namely:—

(1) That previous Determinations of this Board are hereby amended, and such amendments shall come into force and be operative on and after the 12th day of June, 1916. The Determination and amendments are printed hereunder.

"Improver" means any person (other than an apprentice) who does not receive a piece-work price or a wages rate fixed by any Special Board for persons other than apprentices or improvers, and who is not over twenty-one years of age, or who, being over twenty-one years of age, holds a licence from the Minister to be paid as an improver.

Factories and Shops Act 1915.

DETERMINATION OF THE ELECTRICAL INSTALLATION BOARD.

IN accordance with the provisions of the *Factories and Shops Act 1915*, the Special Board appointed to determine the lowest prices or rates which may be paid to any person or persons or classes of persons wheresoever employed in any business or occupation connected with the installation of electrical fittings, appliances, motors, and heaters, including the laying of wires, has made the following Determination, namely:—

1. That previous Determinations of this Board are hereby amended, and such amendments shall come into force and be operative on and after the 6th day of June, 1916. The Determination and amendments are printed hereunder.

WAGES.

2. That the lowest rates of wages to be paid to the following shall be—

Electrical mechanics, linesmen, or wiremen	63s.	79s.
Battery erectors	66s.	82s. 6d.
Cablejointers	69s.	86s.

Leading hands, i.e., Journeymen who are placed in charge of two or more other journeymen, 1s. per shift in addition to the rate specified.

APPRENTICES AND IMPROVERS.

The Electrical Installation Board has prescribed a form of apprenticeship agreement. Section 187 of Act No. 2650, requires that the indentures must be in that form.

“Apprentice” means any person under 21 years of age bound by indentures of apprenticeship or any person over 21 years of age who, with the sanction of the Minister, is bound by indentures of apprenticeship. (Act 2650, Section 3.)

“Improver” means any person (other than an apprentice) who does not receive a piecework price or a wages rate fixed by any Special Board for persons other than apprentices or improvers, and who is not over 21 years of age, or who being over 21 years of age, holds a licence from the Minister to be paid as an improver. (Act 2650, Section 3.)

3. That—

(a) the lowest rates which may be paid to apprentices or improvers; and

(b) the proportionate number of apprentices and improvers who may be employed in any factory or place,

shall be as shown in the following table :—

SPECIAL RATES FOR SUNDAY AND PUBLIC HOLIDAYS.

6. That double time shall be the special rate for all work done on—

 Easter Monday,
 New Year's Day,
 Eight Hours Day (21st day of April),
 King's Birthday (3rd day of June),
 Christmas Day,
 Boxing Day,

but if any other day be by Act of Parliament or Proclamation substituted for any of the above-named holidays, the special rate shall only be payable for work done on the day so substituted.
