At the Executive Council Chamber, Melbourne, the fourteenth day of March, 1916.

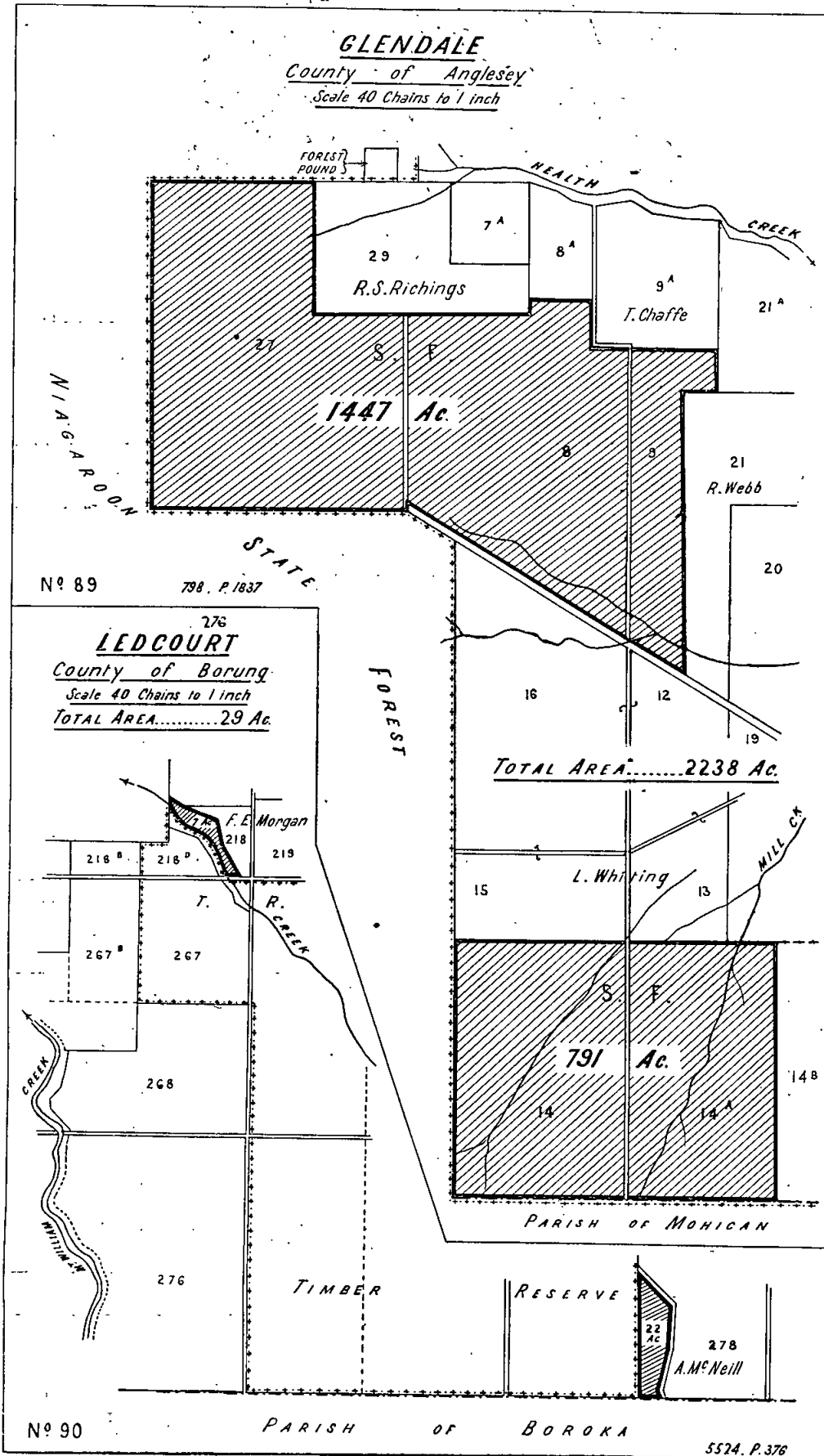

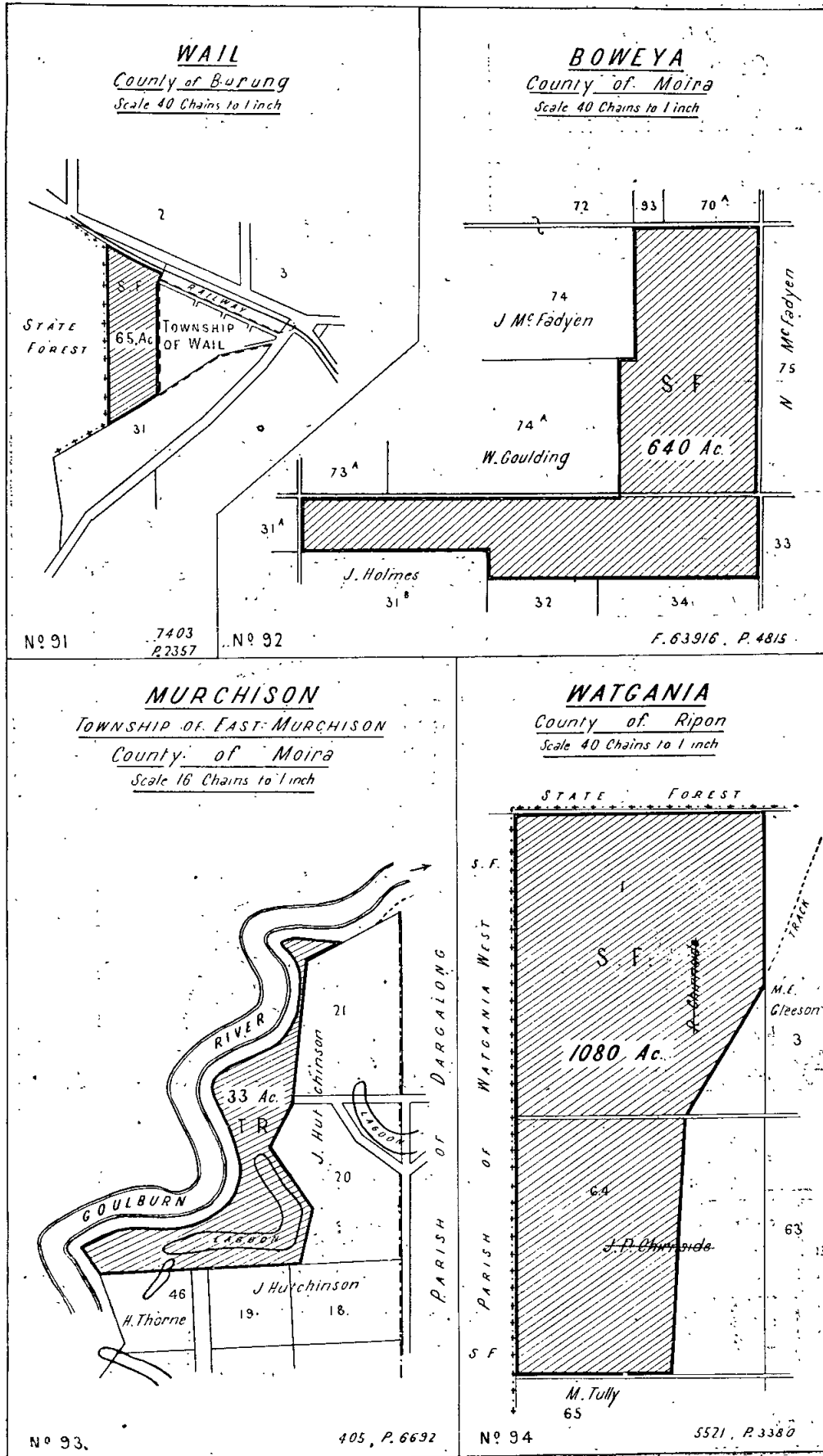

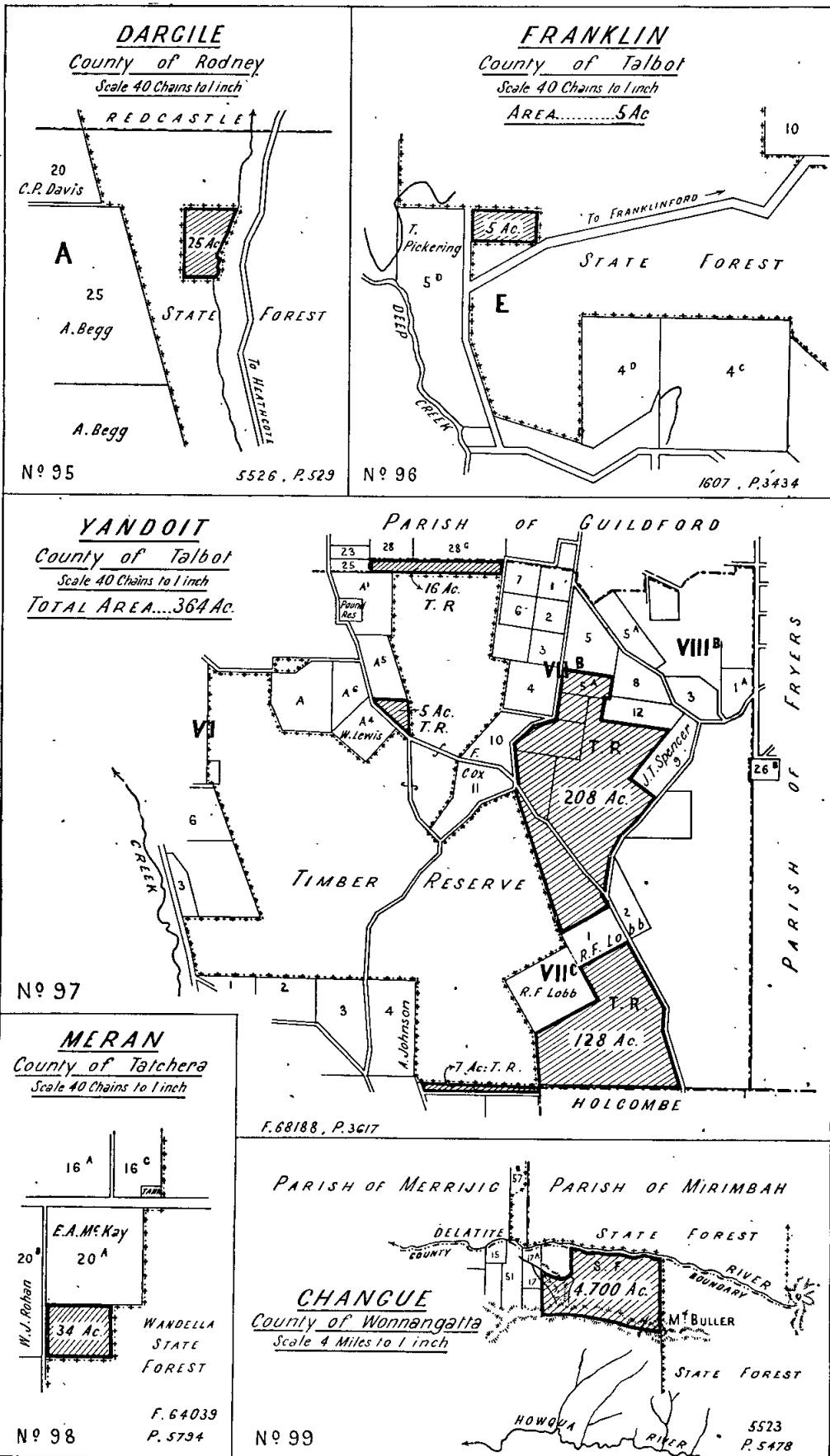

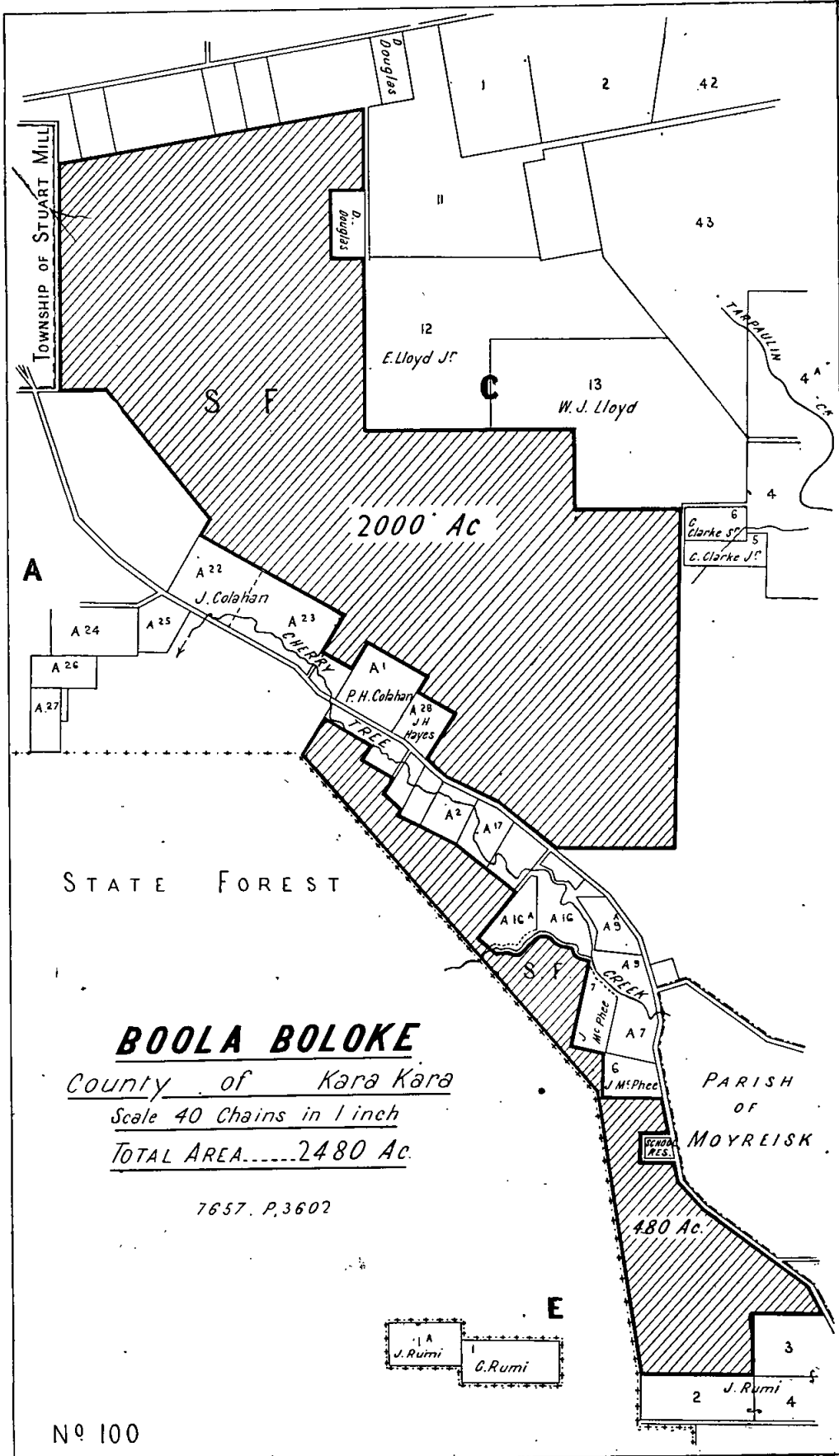
