SHIRE OF NEWHAM AND WOODEND.

BY-LAW NO. 10.

A By-law of the Shire of Newham and Woodend made under the provisions of the *Health Act 1915*, and numbered 10, for the introduction of the double-pan sanitary service within the township of Woodend.

IN pursuance of the powers contained in the *Health Act 1915*, and of any other power thereunto enabling them in that behalf, the Council of the Shire of Newham and Woodend, in the name, and on behalf of the President, Councillors, and Ratepayers of the said shire for the purpose of carrying the said Act into execution within their jurisdiction, make the following By-law, that is to say:—

1. All former By-laws so far as they relate to the matters and things provided for in this By-law are hereby repealed.

2. This By-law shall come into full force and operation on its confirmation by the Board of Public Health, and immediately after its publication in the *Government Gazette*.

3. This By-law shall apply to and have operation in the township of Woodend.

4. The occupiers of any premises on which there is a closet or privy shall cause the space under the seat of each closet or privy on such premises to be prepared, and shall permit the same to be used, for the double-pan service hereinafter provided for, and shall cause the closet or privy to be kept in a fit state for such service.

5. The Council shall cause every closet or privy to be supplied and kept supplied with two pans for the reception of night-soil, and a lid to closely fit the same, and shall cause one or other of such pans to be kept under the seat aforesaid.

6. The occupier aforesaid or other person having the control or management of the premises shall cause to be kept in every closet or privy belonging thereto a supply of dry powdered earth, ashes, charcoal, lime, sawdust, or some other material efficient for deodorizing night-soil, and shall cause all night-soil which may be deposited in the pan in such closet or privy to be immediately on the deposit thereof covered with a quantity of such deodorizing material, sufficient to thoroughly and effectually deodorize the contents of such pan.

7. The Council shall at least once a week cause the pan in use to be closed with a lid and removed with its contents from the premises in the night time and the other pan to be left in its place.

8. Before leaving any pan in a closet or privy the Council shall cause the same to be cleansed by superheated steam and tar painted inside or by some equally efficient means.

9. The occupier aforesaid or other person shall not contract for the removal of night-soil from such premises except in accordance with this By-law.

10. The Council shall have power, in lieu of making a rate, to make a charge on each occupier for the pans supplied, and for the removal of night-soil, and the other work herein directed, the amount in default of payment to be recovered in any court of petty sessions.

11. If any person or the council commit a breach of this By-law, he or they shall for every such breach be liable to a penalty not exceeding Ten pounds and not less than Five shillings, for each day during which such breach shall be committed or continued.

BOROUGH OF SEBASTOPOL.

BY-LAW NO. 10.

IN pursuance of the powers contained in the *Health Act 1915*, and of any other power thereunto enabling them in that behalf, the Council of the borough of Sebastopol, in the name of and on behalf of the Mayor, Councillors, and Burgesses of the said borough for the purpose of carrying the said Act into execution within their jurisdiction, make the following By-law, that is to say:—

1. The occupier of every house, building or premises in the whole length of Albert-street within the borough of Sebastopol shall provide and keep thereon a covered receptacle or receptacles constructed of non-absorbent material, and shall cause all house refuse, rubbish and garbage produced or accumulated in and about such house, building or premises to be from time to time deposited in such receptacle or receptacles.

2. Every such receptacle shall be kept constantly covered (except when such refuse or garbage is being deposited therein or discharged therefrom), and a sufficient quantity of some efficient deodorant shall be from time to time introduced therein when necessary to keep the same in an inoffensive condition.

3. Once a week on such day in each week as may be appointed by the council for the removal of house refuse from such house, building or premises such occupier shall cause such receptacle or receptacles to be placed close to the entrance to such house, building or premises from the street, lane or right-of-way on which such house, building or premises abut, in order that the contents of such receptacle or receptacles may be conveniently removed by the person or persons authorized in that behalf by the council.

4. This By-law shall apply to and have operation in the whole length of Albert-street in the borough of Sebastopol.

REGULATIONS FOR THE CARE, PROTECTION, AND MANAGEMENT OF THE RESERVE FOR A RACE-COURSE AND OTHER PURPOSES OF PUBLIC RECREATION IN THE PARISH OF GLENBURNIE, KNOWN AS THE KILMORE RACE-COURSE.

WE, Patrick O'Neill, Richard Fennelly, Thomas Hunt, Patrick Skehan, James Proudfoot, John Morrissey, Charles Joseph Morrissey, Colin McNab, and Patrick Andrew Harrington, the duly appointed trustees of the Reserve for a race-course and other purposes of public recreation in the parish of Glenburnie, known as the Kilmore Race-course, do hereby, in exercise and in pursuance of the powers conferred on us by the Crown grant thereof, and by the *Land Act* 1915, section 182, make the following Regulations in respect of the said Reserve:—

REGULATIONS.

1. The Reserve shall be parcelled out into the following divisions:—

(a) The grand stand, the saddling paddock and the paddock for carriages and horses, the weighing yard and the passages thereto, the stewards' stand and the judge's box (these being within the enclosure which is surrounded by a close fence) and any other stand that may be erected outside such enclosure by the trustees.

(b) All the residue of the Reserve excepting such parts (if any) as may be hereafter fenced in and set apart for plantations or other purposes.

2. No person shall enter at any race or other meeting into either of the said divisions, nor bring any horses, carriages, or other vehicles to the first or second division, or train or exercise any horses therein except on production of a ticket issued by the trustees or the committee of the Kilmore Turf Club duly authorizing him in that behalf, and then only in such part or parts of the said divisions as shall be indicated on the ticket, and only on the days for which the ticket is issued; but the ticket holder shall not remain in the first or second division, or any part thereof, for a longer period than half an hour after the last race of the day shall have been run, unless by and with the consent of the trustees or the committee or stewards of the Kilmore Turf Club, or those authorized by such trustees, committee, or stewards.

3. No person except the judge or any person he may call to his assistance shall enter the judge's box at the time the horses are prepared to start for or are running in any race.

4. No person shall enter the weighing stand or the weighing yard or the approaches thereto except the jockeys requiring to be weighed and the owners and trainers of horses desirous of seeing their jockeys weighed.

5. No person who has been proved to the satisfaction of the trustees or the committee or stewards of the Kilmore Turf Club, or those authorized by such trustees, committee, or stewards to have been at any time guilty of any malpractice or dishonorable conduct in connexion with racing, or who has been proved to the satisfaction of the trustees, committee, or stewards, or those authorized by such trustees, committee, or stewards, to be a defaulter, or who has been warned off the course by the trustees, committee, or stewards, or any person authorized by them, shall enter upon the said Reserve or any division or part thereof.

6. Every person paying for admission to the first or second division, or any part thereof, shall be supplied with a ticket of admission, which he shall, upon demand, produce, or, if required, surrender to any gatekeeper or other person having authority to demand its production or surrender.

7. The trustees shall be at liberty to rent or hire from time to time and upon such terms and conditions as they may think fit, any stand or stands on the Reserve, or the gates of admission thereto, or to any part thereof. Persons renting or hiring for any race meeting or for any sports or recreation the grand stand or any portion thereof, or any booth in the Reserve, and persons allowed to train or exercise horses in the Reserve shall abide by any order given by the trustees in reference to the Reserve and the buildings and other erections thereon for the time being.

8. No person shall bring any dog into the first or second division or into any building thereon.

9. No person shall enter or remain in the Reserve who may offend against decency as regards dress, language, or conduct.

10. No person shall damage or in any way injure any trees, shrubs, or flowers at any time planted or growing in the Reserve, nor shall fires be lighted therein.

11. No person shall climb or jump over the fences or gates, stick bills thereon, or cut names on the fences, trees, or seats, or roll or throw stones in the Reserve.

12. No person shall put into the Reserve any cattle, sheep, goats, or pigs without the permission, in writing, of the trustees. Provided always that the moneys received for agistment shall be expended in the maintenance and improvement of the Reserve.

13. No person shall erect on the Reserve any dwelling, booth, or other structure for the purpose of offering for sale any article without the consent, in writing, of the trustees first obtained.

14. No person except labourers and workmen employed in the Reserve shall enter any plots therein which may be enclosed for plantations of young trees or shrubs.

15. Any person committing in the Reserve, or in any of the buildings or erections for the time being thereon, any of the following offences, shall, together with any horses, carriages, or other vehicles in his possession or care, be liable to be removed forthwith from the Reserve notwithstanding such person may have purchased and is or may be in possession of a ticket of admission to the Reserve or any part thereof:—

(a) Being drunk or using any profane, indecent, or abusive language.

(b) Assaulting any person, making use of any abusive, threatening, or insulting expressions, or behaving in an improper or riotous manner.

(c) Riding, crossing, or trespassing upon the course, or any part of it, during a race meeting, or when horses are preparing to start for or running in a race.

(d) Being found in any part of the first or second divisions and not producing upon demand, or not surrendering if required, to any gatekeeper or other person having authority from the trustees or the committee or stewards of the Kilmore Turf Club, to demand production or surrender of tickets, a ticket duly authorizing admission of such person to that part of the first or second division where such person may be so found, unless such person shall forthwith satisfy such trustees, committee, or stewards, or those authorized by such trustees, committee, or stewards, that the proper charge for admission has been paid by such person, and that such person's ticket has been lost.

(e) Obtaining admission to any part of the first or second divisions when not entitled to such admission under these Regulations.

16. The scale of charges or fees which may be levied and taken for admission to the first and second divisions and buildings thereon respectively shall be fixed from time to time by the trustees, but shall not exceed the following:—

For the admission of every person to the first division, a sum not exceeding Ten shillings.

For the admission of every person to the second division, a sum not exceeding Three shillings.

For the admission to the second division of every person with truck or barrow, cart, or other vehicle engaged in trade, a sum not exceeding Twenty shillings.

For the admission to the second division of every horse, not being a horse entered for any race, a sum not exceeding One shilling.

For the admission to the second division of every vehicle drawn by one horse, a sum not exceeding Two shillings and sixpence.

For the admission to the second division of every vehicle drawn by more than one horse, for each horse a sum not exceeding Two shillings and sixpence.

For the admission of every horse to the training ground for training or exercise for every twelve months, a sum not exceeding Two pounds.

Provided that the trustees or committee or stewards of the Kilmore Turf Club may exempt any member of a racing club wholly or partially from the payment of all or any such charges or fees; and that the moneys so received and all rents shall, after deducting necessary expenses, be applied in the permanent improvement of the Reserve or in the erection, maintenance, or repair of buildings and fences, or the planting of trees or shrubs in the Reserve and in prizes for any race, or in such other manner in or upon the Reserve as shall be necessary or expedient for the purposes of rendering the same more convenient and useful for racing and recreation purposes.

17. No person shall injure, destroy, or damage any building, fence, or erection, or any other property, tree, shrub, or plant erected, being or growing on the Reserve, or plough, harrow, remove, or otherwise damage any portion of the grass or the surface soil of the Reserve.

18. No person shall, after the first day of April, 1917, carry on the trade, business, or calling of a bookmaker upon any portion of the Reserve unless and until he shall comply with the following conditions:—

- (a) That he be registered annually or for each or for any race meeting as a bookmaker by the trustees or the committee or stewards of the Kilmore Turf Club, or those authorized by such trustees, committee, or stewards.
- (b) That during the time he shall be in or upon the Reserve carrying on his trade, business, or calling of a bookmaker he shall wear a ticket or badge, to be supplied by the trustees or the committee or stewards aforesaid, or by those authorized by such trustees, committee, or stewards, which ticket or badge shall be visible to the public, and shall have his name legibly printed thereon.

19. The fee for registration of every such person as a bookmaker under the foregoing Regulations shall be—(a) if registered, annually the sum of Two pounds two shillings; and (b) if registered for any single race meeting, the sum of One pound one shilling for each and every such race meeting.

20. The trustees shall have power to lock all gates during wet weather and from sunset to sunrise, to preclude the admission of any cattle, horse, or vehicle to the Reserve.

21. Notwithstanding anything contained in these Regulations, the second division shall be open and free to pedestrians at all times, except on such days in any one year as the Reserve may be required by the trustees for holding race meetings, sports, or other amusements.

Every person offending against any of these Regulations shall, in accordance with section 182 of the *Land Act 1915*, for each offence be liable to a penalty of not more than Five pounds; and every person who so offends and who, after he has been warned by any bailiff of Crown lands or officer or servant of such trustees, or by any member of the police force, does not desist from so offending may be forthwith apprehended by such bailiff, officer, or servant or member of the police force and taken before some justice, and shall be liable to a penalty of not more than Ten pounds.

ADDITIONAL REGULATIONS FOR THE CARE, PROTECTION, AND MANAGEMENT OF THE RESERVE FOR A CHILDREN'S PLAYGROUND IN THE CITY OF COLLINGWOOD, KNOWN AS THE CORNFOT CHILDREN'S PLAYGROUND.

WE, William Hardinge Gregson, William Fleming Gates, Herbert Brookes, James Cornfoot, Patrick John McNamara, and Arthur Collins, a majority of the duly appointed Committee of Management of the land temporarily reserved by Order in Council of 16th November, 1914, as a site for a Children's Playground in the city of Collingwood, known as the Cornfoot Children's Playground, having framed the following additional regulations for the care, protection, and management thereof, and for the preservation of good order and decency therein, submit the said additional regulations to the Board of Land and Works, to be made by such Board, in pursuance of the power conferred by section 181 of the *Land Act 1915*.

ADDITIONAL REGULATIONS.

- 1. No person shall remain in the Reserve after he has been ordered by the supervisor, bailiff of Crown lands, or member of the police force to leave the Reserve.
- 2. No person shall by any means enter or remain in the Reserve after the gates giving free access thereto have been locked.
- 3. No person shall use the swings, gymnastic apparatus, or other property in the Reserve, after the gates thereof have been locked, until such gates have been re-opened by the supervisor.
- Every person offending against these Regulations shall, in accordance with section 181 of the *Land Act 1915*, for each offence be liable to a penalty of not more than Five pounds (£5), and every person who knowingly and wilfully offends against these Regulations, and who, after he has been warned by any bailiff of Crown lands or by any member of the police force does not desist from

so offending, may be forthwith apprehended by such bailiff or member of the police force, and taken before some justice, and shall be liable to a penalty of not more than Ten pounds (£10).

REGULATIONS FOR THE CARE, PROTECTION, AND MANAGEMENT OF THE NATIONAL PARK, IN THE PARISHES OF WANDILIGONG, TOWAMBA, DONDANGADALE, AND EURANDELONG.

WHEREAS by the 181st section of the *Land Act 1915*, power is given to the Board of Land and Works to make rules and regulations or to rescind any rules and regulations for the care, protection, and management of all Public Parks and Reserves not conveyed to and vested in trustees, and for the preservation of good order and decency therein, and also for the collection and receipt of tolls, entrance fees, and other charges for entering therein or thereupon: Now therefore the Board of Land and Works, in pursuance of the powers conferred as aforesaid, doth hereby make the following Regulations to be observed and enforced in respect of:—

- 2,880 acres reserved by Order in Council of the 31st October, 1898, in the parish of Wandiligong, as a site for a National Park; and
- 23,100 acres reserved by Order in Council of the 6th October, 1908, in the parishes of Wandiligong, Towamba, Dondangadale, and Eurandelong, for a National Park, in addition to and adjoining the land temporarily reserved therefor by Order in Council of the 31st October, 1898, both of which are together hereinafter called "The National Park."

REGULATIONS.

- 1. No person shall enter or remain in the National Park who may offend against decency as regards dress, language or conduct.
- 2. No person shall, without the permission of the Minister of Lands or duly authorized officer, remove, cut, damage, or deface any rocks, trees, shrubs, ferns, plants, seats, tables, gates, posts, or fences in the National Park, or write or paint, or otherwise mark any rock, tree, bridge, seat, gate, post, fence, wall, table, pillar, railing, or any building or other erection within the National Park.
- 3. No person (except as hereinafter provided) shall shoot, poison, trap, snare, hook, catch, or otherwise destroy or interfere with or take away any game, wild fowl, or any animal, bird, or fish of any description, or carry any firearms, poison, traps, snares, or gins within the National Park without the permission, in writing, of the Minister of Lands or duly authorized officer first obtained. Provided always that from the first day of October in every year to the thirtieth day of April following any person may take fish from Lake Catani, within the National Park; but such person shall use only a rod and line, and no line shall have more than one hook attached thereto, and no fish of a less weight than eight (8) ounces other than native fish shall be taken or removed from the said lake.
- 4. No person shall light or maintain any fire within the National Park without the permission of the Minister of Lands or duly authorized officer, and then only in such place as may be directed.
- 5. No person shall camp in the National Park, or erect therein any dwelling, hut, or other structure without the permission, in writing, of the Minister of Lands or duly authorized officer.
- 6. No person shall bring into the National Park, or allow to wander therein, any horse, cattle, sheep, goats, or pigs without the permission, in writing, of the Minister of Lands or duly authorized officer.

7. No person shall bathe in the National Park except in the places set apart for the purpose; and every person bathing therein shall be decently clad from the neck to the knees.

8. No dog shall be allowed in the National Park, and all dogs found therein shall be liable to be destroyed and the owners thereof to prosecution.

9. No person, except labourers and workmen employed in the National Park, shall enter any plots therein which may be enclosed for plantations of young trees or shrubs.

10. No person shall cut in the National Park, or remove therefrom any live or dead timber without the permission, in writing, of the Minister of Lands or duly authorized officer.

11. No timber shall be allowed within the National Park without the permission, in writing, of the Minister of Lands or duly authorized officer.

12. Except as hereinafter provided no motor, delivery cart, dray, lorry, waggon, truck, van, or other vehicle carrying a load exceeding one (1) ton shall be allowed within the National Park without the permission, in writing, of the Minister of Lands or duly authorized officer.

13. No person, unless duly authorized, in writing, by the Board of Land and Works, shall ply for hire or carry passengers for reward within the boundaries of the National Park.

14. On and after 1st April, 1917, motor cars and motor cycles may travel on the main road in the National Park to Mount Buffalo (hereinafter called the main road) only at such times and in such direction as are set forth in clause 20 of these Regulations.

15. Horses or vehicles drawn by horses or other animals may travel on the main road only at such times and in such direction as are set forth in clause 20 of these Regulations.

16. Motor cars and motor cycles shall not travel on the main road at a greater speed than ten (10) miles an hour, and drivers shall slow down and sound the bell or horn at all turns in the main road.

17. The Bailiff of Crown Lands or other officer controlling traffic on the main road shall have full authority to close it against all motor traffic whenever, in his opinion, the said main road is unfit for such traffic, or whenever for any other reason the closing thereof is considered necessary. A notice, "Closed against motor traffic," and placed on the entrance gate shall be sufficient evidence that the main road is closed against such traffic.

18. The Bailiff of Crown Lands or other officer controlling traffic on the main road shall have full authority to stop the passage of any type of motor which is considered to be unsafe, or which, in his opinion, would cause undue damage to the road.

19. No person in or with a vehicle shall enter the National Park or be therein therewith without the permission, in writing, of the Minister of Lands or duly authorized officer, which shall be produced by such person, on demand, to any Bailiff of Crown Lands, member of the police force, or authorized officer.

20. The time-table for the regulation of motor and other vehicular traffic on the Government road to Mount Buffalo shall be as set forth in the Schedule hereto:—

1915, 20th April, 1916, and 31st January, 1917, in respect of—

2,880 acres, reserved by Order in Council of the 31st October, 1898, in the parish of Wandiligong, as a site for a National Park; and
23,100 acres, reserved by Order in Council of the 6th October, 1908, in the parishes of Wandiligong, Towamba, Dondangadale, and Eurandelong, for a National Park, in addition to and adjoining the land temporarily reserved therefor by Order in Council of the 31st October, 1898, both of which are together called "The National Park."

A By-law of the City of Hawthorn, made under sections 198 and 228 of the *Local Government Act 1915*, and numbered 68, for altering By-law numbered 68, and for regulating and restraining the erection and construction of buildings, erections or hoardings, or of fences abutting on or within 10 feet of any street or road, and for requiring the pulling down or removal of same.

IN pursuance of the powers conferred by the *Local Government Act 1915*, the Mayor, Councillors, and Citizens of the City of Hawthorn order as follows:—

1. That the By-law of the City of Hawthorn, made under sections 198 and 228 of the *Local Government Act 1903*, and numbered 68, shall be altered as follows:—

- (a) At the end of Part II. there shall be inserted the following clause:—"13. No dwelling house shall, without the permission of the Council, be hereafter built, unless such dwelling house will have for its whole width a clear frontage to a street, and no dwelling house or building

of any class intended for separate use or occupation shall be built so as to deprive and leave without such clear frontage any dwelling house which shall have been previously built."

(b) At the end of Part XI. there shall be added the following clauses:—

"3. When in the opinion of the Council any fence abutting on or within 10 feet of any street or road within the municipal district is in a dangerous or unsightly state, the Council may, by notice in writing to be served on the owner of such fence, require such owner forthwith to take down, secure, or repair such fence as the case may require."

"4. Every fence to be hereafter erected abutting on or within 10 feet of any street or road shall have affixed thereto a suitable base or plinth unless in the opinion of the Council it is unnecessary."

(c) At the end of Part XII. there shall be inserted the following clauses:—

"8. No person shall exhibit any advertisement in any place in such manner, or by such means, as to effect injuriously the amenities of a public park or pleasure promenade, or disfigure the natural beauty of any landscape within the Municipal District of Hawthorn."

"9. No person shall attach, fix, or paint on any hoarding, building, fence or tree, within the Municipal District of Hawthorn, any advertisement which, in the opinion of the Council, is unsightly or objectionable."

"10. No person shall attach or affix or cause to be attached or affixed to or upon any portion of any verandah upon or over any footpath within 20 feet of the corner of the kerb at the intersection of any streets or roads, any awning, blind, shade, or screen, unless the lowest portion of the same is at least 6 feet 6 inches above the footpath level, nor shall any awning, blind, shade or screen be attached or affixed to or upon any verandah upon or over any footpath where a public crossing has been provided unless the lowest portion of such awning, blind, shade or screen is at least 5 feet 6 inches above the footpath level."

(3) **Time of Beginning and Ending Work.**

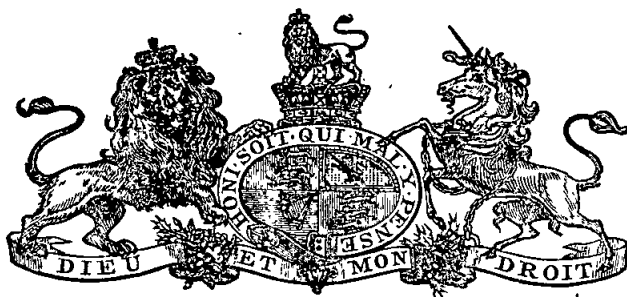

- All kinds of composition entirely in a foreign language shall be done on time, unless compositors are employed of the same nationality as the language in which the work is composed.
- All kinds of music composition, Greek, Hebrew, or dead languages, shall be done only on time.
- Alterations from copy to be done by the "house," or charged for every line passing through the stick, and all marks in revises not appearing in the first proof to be corrected by the "house."
- All kinds of composition in the English language shall be cast up at the standard rate per 1,000 en quads; where the twenty-six lower-case letters are less than the twenty-six en quads the cast up shall be by the lower-case letters; a thick space to be considered as an en quad in width. Em and en quads, or whatever may be used at the beginning or end of lines, to be reckoned in the width. Bastard founts to be cast up to the width of the smaller body of the founts to which they belong.
- All persons employed on column or tabular matter, with or without headings or rules :—Two columns—two justifications or arrangements to constitute half-measure—1s. 5½d. per 1,000 ens. Three columns—three justifications or arrangements—1s. 7½d. per 1,000 ens. Four columns—four or more justifications or arrangements—2s. 2d. per 1,000 ens. In all cases where braces are to be pieced each brace shall constitute a column.
- Tabular or column matter with headings in smaller type than the body is to be cast up at the relative value of the two bodies.
- Introductory lines or footnotes attached to table matter not exceeding six lines each to be charged as part of the table.

8. Matter consisting of subscribers' names, with the sums of money run out to the end of the line; names of horses, with st. and lb. run out; measurements of land, with acres, roods, and perches run out take no extra charge; but where there are two columns of such figures brought into the same width, 1s. 5½d. per 1,000 ens; three columns, 1s. 7½d. per 1,000 ens; four or more columns, 2s. 2d. per 1,000 ens. In all matter which requires casting-off to ascertain proper widths for the purpose of ranging (whether such matter consists of words or figures) each width or ranging shall be considered a column—with or without rules or headings.

9. Run-on matter, such as is shown in Appendix A, and other matter of a similar character, causing extra delay and trouble to the compositor, 1s. 5½d. per 1,000 ens.

10. Takings composed with ancient spelling, or dialect, 1s. 7½d. per 1,000 ens.

11. All matter with a border round, whether formed of rules, letters, or otherwise, 2s. 2d. per 1,000 ens.

12. Algebraical workings to be charged 2s. 2d. per 1,000 ens; matter interspersed with algebraical signs, 1s. 7½d. per 1,000 ens.

13. Narrow measures (other than tabular):—Ten ems pica and over, at 1s. 1d. per 1,000 ens; eight ems and under ten, 1s. 4½d. per 1,000 ens; four ems and under eight, 1s. 7½d. per 1,000 ens; under four ems, 2s. 2d. per 1,000 ens.

14. All lines composed away from the frame, 2s. 2d. per 1,000 ens.

[NOTE.—1s. 4½d. = 1½; 1s. 5½d. = 1½; 1s. 7½d. = 1½; 2s. 2d. double.]

SECOND SCHEDULE.

SLUG-CASTING MACHINE SCALE.

1. All kinds of composition in the English language shall be cast up at the standard rate per 1,000 en quads; a thick space over to be considered as an en quad in width. Em and en quads, or whatever may be used at the beginning or end of lines, to be reckoned in the width. Bastard founts to be cast up to the width of the smaller body of the founts to which they belong. Provided that the multipliers shall not be less than in Appendix B.

2. All persons employed on column or tabular matter cast on one bar:—Two columns—two justifications or arrangements to constitute half measure—4½d. per 1,000 ens. Three columns—three justifications or arrangements—4½d. per 1,000 ens. Four columns—four or more justifications or arrangements—6½d. per 1,000 ens. (The above charges are to be made whether the matter is with or without headings or rules.)

3. Matter requiring two bars to complete one measure (not being tabular matter), 4½d. per 1,000 ens; three, 4½d. per 1,000 ens; four or more, 6½d. per 1,000 ens.

4. All lines cast by the machine shall be charged as full lines, except when the vyce-jaw is reduced, when the full measure will be charged only for the first twenty lines.

5. Run-on figure matter (such as timber and wool sales and similar matter), 4½d. per 1,000 ens. (See Appendix A for sample.)

6. All matter with a border round, whether formed of rules, letters, or otherwise, 6½d. per 1,000 ens.

7. Matter of and above four lines composed in other than ordinary English (*e.g.*, dialects), 4½d. per 1,000 ens; and foreign languages, 6½d. per 1,000 ens.

8. One line extra shall be charged for each word of small caps, italic, clarendon, fed in by hand, but where such words are set on the keyboard one line extra shall be charged for each line containing such words, excepting small caps, which shall be charged one line extra for each word. When double-letter matrices are used, matter set on the upper tier amounting to over twenty-five continuous lines shall be charged 4½d. per 1,000, and matter comprising twenty-five lines or under shall be charged 6½d. per 1,000.

9. Matter having to be transposed by the operator (*i.e.*, which is not set up in the order in which it appears in copy), 4½d. per 1,000 ens. Illegible or indistinct copy, 4½d. per 1,000 ens.

10. All first-proof and revise corrections (marks left undone in the first proof) to be done by the operator. "House" marks to be charged 6½d. per 1,000 ens if done by the operator. All "slugging" to be done by the "house."

11. All matter set from books or copy that will not go in the copy-tray, 4½d. per 1,000 ens.

12. Alterations from copy in the first proof to be charged at the rate of 6½d. per 1,000 ens for every line affected by such alterations. Authors' proofs to be charged at the same rate, but not less than twelve lines to be charged for any author's proof. The "house" shall be entitled to correct all revises or authors' marks on time.

13. Twelve lines of 16 ems pica or less, or their equivalent in wider measure, shall constitute a machine "take" of copy.

14. Matrices coming down wrong channel, transposition of matrices, repeated missing of matrices, matrices repeating of their own accord, space bands transposing, and sunken letters shall constitute machine errors, and shall be charged as "house" marks. Provided that the attention of the engineer shall have been called to such defect, and he shall have failed to remedy the matter.

15. Changing or altering mould in linotype machine, 4d.; changing magazine, 4d.; emptying and refilling magazine, 1s. Mergenthaler models Nos. 8 and 9 to be excepted in so far as changing magazine only is concerned.

16. Changing or altering mould in monoline machine, 5d.; changing magazine, 3d.; emptying and refilling magazine, 1s.

17. Slugs of 26 ems pica and over set in six point or smaller to be charged ½d. per 1,000 extra; measures of 27 ems pica and over set in type larger than six point to be charged ¾d. per 1,000 extra.

18. Balance-sheets to be charged not less than one-third extra.

[NOTE.—4½d. = 1½; 4½d. = 1½; 6½d. = double.]

THIRD SCHEDULE.

SLUG-CASTING MACHINE WORK IN THE OFFICES OF DAILY (MORNING OR EVENING) NEWSPAPERS, AND WEEKLY OR OTHER NEWSPAPERS CONNECTED THEREWITH.

1. All kinds of composition in the English language shall be cast up at the standard rate per 1,000 en quads; a thick space over to be considered as an en quad in width. Em and en quads, or whatever may be used at the beginning or end of lines, to be reckoned in the width. Bastard founts to be cast up to width of the smaller body of the founts to which they belong.
2. All displayed advertisements to be charged at movable piece price. The "house" shall have the option of composing same on time, the matter afterwards to be charged by the companionship at machine prices.
3. Operators shall complete all "takes" as far as possible on machine, but where such "take" requires type heading, leads, rules, rules to advertisements, whiting, cutting, fitting, or extension of any kind; all such work required to complete "take" shall be done by the "house," and complete "take" as appearing to be charged by the operator.
4. All appearing lines to be charged by the operator.
5. The following are the extra charges to be made for column or tabular matter cast on one bar:—
Two columns—two justifications or arrangements—to constitute half measure, one-third extra. Three columns—three justifications or arrangements—to take the charge of one-half extra. Four columns—four or more justifications or arrangements—to be charged double. (The above charges are to be made whether the matter is with or without headings or rules.)
6. Matter requiring two bars to complete one measure (not being tabular matter) to be charged one-third extra; three, one-half extra; four or more, double.
7. All lines cast by the machine shall be charged as full lines.
8. Matter consisting of subscribers' names, with the sums of money run out to the end of the line; names of horses, with st. and lb. run out; measurements of land, with acres, roods, and perches run out, and matter of a similar nature, take no extra charge; but where there are two columns of such figures brought into the same width, one-third extra to be charged; three columns, one-half; four or more columns, double. In all other matter which requires casting off to ascertain the proper widths for the purpose of ranging (whether such matter consists of words or figures) each width or ranging shall be considered a column—with or without rules or headings.
9. Run-on figure matter (such as timber and wool sales and similar matter) to be charged one-third extra. (See Appendix "A.")
10. All matter with a border round, whether formed of rules, letters, or otherwise, to be charged double if set on machine.
11. Matter of and above four lines composed in other than ordinary English (*e.g.*, dialects) to be charged one-half extra, and foreign languages double for each line.
12. All block headings, let-in or other blocks in news or advertisements shall be charged by the operator. In permanently illustrated papers the "house" shall be entitled to all blocks, &c., except in advertisements, blocks in which shall be charged by the operator.
13. Tabular or column matter, with headings in smaller type than the body, is to be cast up at the relative value of the two bodies.
14. One line extra shall be charged for each word of small caps, italic, clarendon, fed in by hand; but where such words are set on the keyboard one line extra shall be charged for each line containing such words, excepting small caps, which shall be charged one line extra for each word.
15. Matter having to be transposed by the operator (*i.e.*, which is not set up in the order in which it appears in copy) shall be charged one-third extra. Illegible or indistinct copy is to be charged one-third extra.
16. Introductory lines or footnotes attached to table matter not exceeding six lines each to be charged as part of the table.
17. All first-proof and revise corrections (marks left undone in the first proof) to be done by the operator. "House" marks to be charged double if done by the operator. All "slugging" to be done by the "house."
18. All matter set from books or copy that will not go on the copy tray to be charged one-third extra.
19. Alterations from copy in the first proof to be charged at the rate of two lines for every line affected by such alterations. Authors' proofs to be charged at the same rate, but not less than 12 lines to be charged for any author's proof. The "house" shall be entitled to correct all revises or author's marks on time.
20. Standing advertisements are the property of the employer until they are given out for distribution. Alterations in standing advertisements must be charged at the rate of two lines for each line "set." Where such alterations affect more than half the length of the advertisement, if under 12 inches, and three-fourths if above 12 inches, the whole to be given out as ordinary copy. All extensions to standing advertisements, whether by "leading" or "whiting out," to be charged in lines by the operators.
21. All advertisements set in larger type than the standard shall be charged by depth according to the standard type of the advertisement column.
22. Twelve lines of 13-ems pica or less, or their equivalent in wider measure, to constitute a machine "take" of copy, provided that the copy given out at any one time, whether referring to different articles or not, shall constitute one "take."
23. That matrices coming down wrong channel, repeated transpositions of matrices, repeated missing of matrices, matrices repeating of their own accord, space bands transposing, and sunken letters shall constitute machine errors, and shall be charged as "house" marks. Provided that the attention of the engineer shall have been called to such defect, and he shall have failed to remedy the matter.
24. Piece workers called on time shall be paid the ordinary time rate—minimum charge, one hour.
25. Persons called for extraordinary or second editions shall receive 3s. in addition to ordinary time rates.

26. Operators kept waiting for copy shall charge at the rate of 1s. 6d. per hour. Standing time to be charged as follows:—Eight minutes, a quarter of an hour 25 minutes, half-an-hour; 35 minutes, three-quarters of an hour; 50 minutes, one hour.

27. All stoppages of five minutes and upwards, including change of magazines, to be cumulative; and are to be charged at ordinary time rate, provided the machine stoppage is not caused by the fault of the operator.

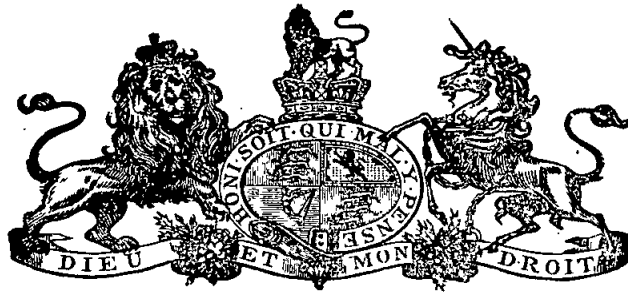

IN accordance with the provisions of the Factories and Shops Acts, the Special Board appointed to determine the lowest prices or rates which may be paid to any persons employed laying or fixing tiles, faience, majolica, or mosaic on floors, walls, or ceilings, has made the following Determination, namely:—

(7) The Board determines, under the provisions of section 144 of the *Factories and Shops Act 1915*, that any employer may fix and pay piece-work prices to any person employed at any work for which this Board has not fixed piece-work prices but has fixed a minimum wage, provided that such employer shall base such piece-work prices on the earnings of an average worker working under like conditions, and such piece-work prices shall be fixed so that an average worker can earn not less than the wages rate fixed by the Board for such work,
